GERMANY NOW READY TO ACCEPT TERMS

PARIS, July 22.—Germany has formally accepted the demands of the Allied committee on guarantees presented at Berlin last Tuesday, in a letter to the Reparation commission that was received today, Chancellor Wirth stated.

Germany after profound deliberation has decided to accept for the duration of moratorium which the German government assumed would be granted.

WOMEN JUMP FROM BURNING HOME; 1 HURT

RALLS, July 22.—Two dwelling houses belonging to Mrs. A. E. Johnston were totally destroyed by fire after daybreak this morning one being occupied by Mrs. Johnston and her daughter and the other by a tenant, Mrs. Johnston and daughter, Miss Bessie, were forced to jump from the second story as they were cut off from the stairway when the fire was discovered. Miss Johnston was painfully injured when she jumped.

The loss is estimated at \$7000, partly covered by insurance.

SMITHVILLE—The city ordinance passed in the city council several months ago prohibiting masked or hooded persons from marching through the streets has been repealed by the council as the result of the last city election, when a new mayor and a majority of the council were re-elected.

MOOSE CARE FOR CHILDREN

MOOSEHEAD, Ill., July 22.—This city, which is conducted by the Loyal Order of Moose, believes it has solved the problem of keeping children healthy.

Statistics recently compiled showed astonishing results for the continuous health campaign which the place conducts, it was stated by officials. The Moosehead scheme includes care in housing, feeding and clothing along with cleanliness, plenty of fresh air and exercise.

When a child has a minor ailment he is immediately put in a hospital. Even if he is well enough to attend the school sessions he must live at the hospital as long as the ailment lasts. At regular intervals each child is given a complete physical examination, including laboratory test. By comparison of the records of these examinations it is determined whether a child is developing properly.

The mortality record for the last 12 months shows only one death, while there was an average of 1,060 children, most of them nine years of age or under at Moosehead in the same period.

On the Road of Good Intentions



No Trouble to Tell Crop Condition in U. S. Now

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., July 22.—The lean and the fat years in agriculture can now be prophesied with a greater degree of accuracy according to A. J. Surratt, Agricultural statistician for Illinois under the Federal Bureau of Crop Estimates.

The consolidation recently of the bureau of markets and crop estimates and the offices of Farm management and farm economics into the United States bureau of agricultural economics attention to a crop reporting system of the United States that has been developing since long prior to the civil war.

Of the bureaus consolidated, the oldest bureau of crop estimate. The government began collecting crop reports as early as 1839 but it was not until 1865 that an appropriation was made for a separate department to do this work. In that year \$20,000 was set aside to gather crop estimates from as much of the country as could be covered.

The activity of estimating the crops of the country is simply giving to the business of farming a record of its past performances and knowledge of its present conditions in order that it may have some foundation on which to base its present activities, declared Mr. Surratt.

"The great business of agriculture cannot be conducted without records and information of growing crops," said Mr. Surratt in a statement on the work of his bureau. "Farmers need to know the crop conditions, to decide whether to sell from the field or to hold for later sale and what changes to make in their planting and harvesting. They need to know the price of their products and the needs of their customers. They need to know the local needs of loans and credits.

"Dependable knowledge of stocks on hand and of crop prospects make for a stable market. When it indicates that prices are too low local dealers and others invest freely for future needs, and producers who are able to hold do so, thus sustaining the price and benefiting the farmer who is compelled to sell, particularly at harvest time. Conversely when positive data on crops show speculative prices higher than justified by the actual situation, wise farmers sell more freely and the number of buyers decreases. Thus in either case such knowledge tends to stabilize the market which is to the benefit of all legitimate interests, and most of all

to the farmer and consumer.

"The practice of recording agricultural statistics is very old, dating back to ancient history when rulers recognized the fact that the food supply of the nation was of such vital importance that the government owed the obligation to its people to make sure that the home food supply was ample before allowing any to leave the country, and if there was a surplus to let other countries know about it and thereby open up a market for their farmers in the far years. Since that time every country of the old world has developed various forms of collecting agricultural statistics. The information was usually taken by the town collectors or in a census every five or ten years.

"The United States collects its agricultural statistics by means of field agents. Each of the states has a field agent, except the smallest states, where one agent may have charge of two states. These agents collect from volunteer reporters throughout the state, from bankers, farmers, merchants, business houses and railroads, figures on the crops. These scattering reports are combined, averaged, tabulated and digested, and from them the field agent first makes a county average, that is, he estimates what the average for each crop will be in each county.

"All this information is then sent to the Bureau of Crop Estimates at Washington. It is very necessary that these reports going to Washington be kept secret, in order that the information contained does not leak out prematurely thus permitting someone to speculate on the information thus obtained.

"The field agent's report is forwarded to Washington in especially prepared envelopes. And these envelopes are delivered from the Washington postoffice direct to the secretary of agriculture in sealed pouches. They are kept safe in this office until they are delivered by him to the chairman of the crop reporting board.

"This board is locked in a room which has no telephone communication with the outside, and the windows of which are high above a man's head. These precautions are taken to prevent any hint of the crop report leaking out. The board stays in the room until the work of getting up the estimates on crops for the entire country is completed. The report of the board is released simultaneously to press associations and newspapers."

BONHAM—The Bonham Board of Trade and local banks have been leading the fight on the cotton boll weevil in this community. Machine destroyers and poisons are used to combat the pest. Reports from farmers indicate the campaign is one of the most successful ever attempted. Cotton prospects are for the largest per he best in years.

DALLAS—Dallas music dealers have joined other merchants in the Thursday afternoon closing campaign. Recently a majority of Dallas merchants agreed to close their establishments during the summer months to give employees an opportunity to seek recreation.

MERCHINSON—Recommendation that a campaign be launched to float \$1,500,000 bonds for the construction of permanent roads in Henderson county was made at a good will meeting of the county, held here recently. Under the plan discussed, the county would issue bonds for one half the cost of road improvement and applications made to the federal government for the other half.

WAR LEAVES SOME WITHOUT A COUNTRY

CLEVELAND, July 22.—Swearing in new citizens in federal court presents puzzling questions arising from the distribution of territory as a result of the world war.

"What's my country? I came from Austria, but the town where I was born now belongs to Italy," one new citizen said to Fredrick J. Denzler, chief deputy United States court clerk.

He sometimes has difficulty convincing the applicants that the new order prevails in old world dominions regardless territory controlled by the present European governments. Folks born in sections of Hungary now belong to Rumania and Junco-Slavia have trouble in realizing they are regarded as subjects of these countries.

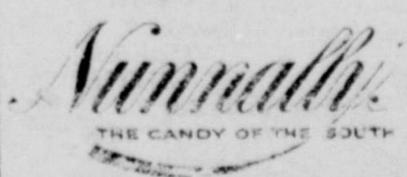
SELLING BALLINGER MELONS AT ANGELO

WHAT THEY ARE WEARING IN KNITTED GARMENTS



THERE are such regions and armies of knitted garments that if one were asked "what they are wearing," the answer might be "everything." But interest is still centered on sweaters and scarves, and there are some refreshing novelties to report in these two most important items that will interest every woman. Sweaters or scarves, with hats to match, made of wool or silk yarns are worn with plain and inconspicuous skirts. These skirts are mostly white or white with a thin stripe or small cross-bar in black. Any color in the matched set looks well with them and the ensemble has no rival that is prettier for out-dooring. Many of the hats are crocheted, others made of the knitted silk fabric used for the scarves in the pretty set shown here. Just now, white sweaters are in favor, knitted with tiny stitches, local wool or silk and wool combined, resembling Iceland, are used for them and they are made in both the Tuxedo and slip-on styles. Names conveying an idea of their sheer and delicate quality have been discovered for them and we use such terms as "oceanic wool" and "gardenline knit" in the parlance of the sweater manufacturers. Fine yarn knitted in close sweater-stitch, is varied by horizontal, figured stripes in slip-on sport sweaters, that have proved popular. One of them is pictured here. They usually display a white, tan or beige background with stripes in two or more colors. Very handsome sweaters of this kind are decorated with cross-stitch embroidery massed in one place, as on a broad hip band. Knitted dresses and suits cannot be overlooked. One suit of navy wool with plain skirt and slip-on jacket has a wide, standing collar of looped silk which also makes the cuffs and bands on the bottom of the jacket and skirt. Very practical wool sweaters for little folks are knitted of bright colored yarns in weights varying to suit the time of the year. They are usually plain and closely knit, in either slip-on or open styles, and they form a part of every little girl's belongings from those of the little two-year-old to "flapperettes."
