ROCKEFELLER HAS EDGE ON STEWART

NEW YORK, Feb. 28.—Proxies representing more than 57 per cent of the stock of the Standard Oil Company of Indiana were claimed today by the committee headed by John D. Rockefeller, Jr. This percentage, it was announced, represents 16,000 of the 58,000 stockholders.

The committee, which is seeking to prevent the re-election of Colonel Robert W. Stewart to the chairmanship of the company, charged that many of the 18,000 employee stockholders desired to give their

proxies to the Rockefeller faction but were afraid of losing their jobs if they did so.

"We feel very strongly that every employee stockholder should enjoy the right that every other stockholder enjoys, to vote as he pleases," said the statement. "Otherwise the support of employee stockholders loses its significance."

FLOOD THREAT FOR GEORGIA

CONTINUED RAINS GIVE WARNING TO FLORIDA AND ALABAMA

(By Associated Press)
 ATLANTA, Ga., Feb. 28.—While Georgia faced the prospect of the worst flood in several years, heavy rains in the area in Eastern Alabama and North Florida sounded an ominous warning for residents of lowlands drained by streams that in some cases go some above flood stage.

REVOLUTIONARY PLOT SEEN IN CUBA

ASSASSINATION OF MACHADO AND RUPTURE OF NATION'S PEACE HELD MOTIVES OF MOVE

HAVANA, Feb. 28.—Seventy-three warrants for arrest of prominent Cubans were issued by Superior Judge Manuel Quesada today in continuation of efforts to suppress a plot against the life of President Machado and the peace of Cuba.

The action was preceded by a statement by Colonel Alfonso Fors, Cuban secret service chief, saying: "I can now say that an open state of rebellion and utter disregard for legally constituted authority exists throughout the nation."

A later statement by Colonel Fors said the situation was well in hand and there were no fears of violence. Revelation of the plot came late yesterday with the filing of charges against ten prominent Cubans charging a plot to assassinate President Machado and create such a chaotic condition in Cuba that the United States would be forced to intervene.

Eight of the ten men named in the formal charges were arrested immediately. Two others were taken in custody before midnight and all were lodged in the Principe fortress to be held without bail. The eight arrests were made in a single raid on the headquarters of the Nationalists, or Nationalist political party.

Among those named in the warrants issued today were Rafael Barria, former minister of war in the Machado cabinet and believed now to be in exile in New York, and Octavio Segle, founder of the Nationalist party, accused of fathering the revolt.

It was reported police had in their possession a document ostensibly addressed to President-elect Hoover asking for intervention by the United States on the ground that "Cuba is unable to govern itself."

The woman, Geneva Henderson, burned the window frames of her cell until she could remove the bars, then let herself to the ground with sheets from her bunk. Attired in civilian dress, which had been smuggled into her cell, she struck out boldly on the Houston highway.

The guard, observing the lone pedestrian, thought nothing of it until she was 200 yards distant. Then he decided there was something familiar about the woman. It was peculiarly in her walk. He fired twice in her general direction and she returned as hurriedly as she had departed.

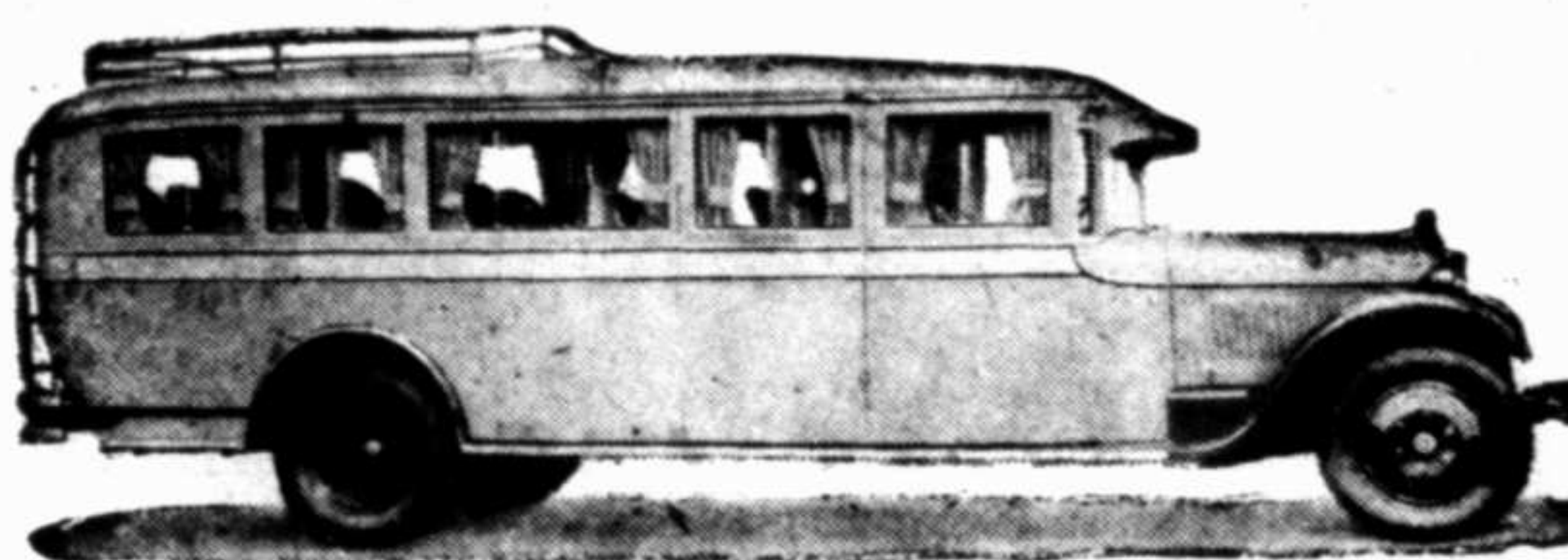

Dodge distinguished medal at the recent annual meeting of the Near East Relief at New York for their work in the service of unfortunate women and children. Miss Belinda Bass of New York was rewarded for her five years' continuous service overseas as superintendent of children's homes in Leningrad, Armenia, and as associate director of the Persian area. Miss Bass started her work when Armenia was a nation of refugees and Leningrad, then Alexandropol, was scarcely more than a vast refugee camp surrounding a "city" of 25,000 children housed in barracks of the armies of the former czar. Miss Louise Marks, Charleston, W. Va., received her award for directing the only training school of women nurses in Soviet Armenia, which has provided more than a hundred trained nurses for the country. Courage and devotion under fire during the siege of Adana, Turkey, in 1920 entitled Esther Louise Marks of New York to her medal. Also her energy and continuing enthusiasm in promoting sales in the United States for the products of the refugee women in Near East industries.

SENATE BEGINS ON STUDY OF LAST THREE APPROPRIATION BILLS

FILIBUSTER PERIL DISPELLED TODAY

HOPE BILL ALLOTING CRUISER FUND SOON WITH COOLIDGE

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—Enactment of the last three of the big appropriation bills was the task toward which congressional leaders today directed their energies.

The overnight threat of a senate filibuster was dispelled in the early morning hours but other difficulties remained. The three bills of chief concern are the naval measure carrying funds to initiate the 16 warship construction program; the interior department supply bill providing funds for a host of governmental activities; and a second deficiency measure to care for deficits in current appropriations.

Naval Bill Back to House
Of this group, the naval bill was on its way back to the house for consideration by that body of senate revisions and leaders were hopeful that before tomorrow night this measure would be in the hands of President Coolidge.

The outlook for the other two was less hopeful. Senators Walsh and Wheeler, democrats, Montana, have refused to abandon their opposition to a provision in the interior bill affecting national parks, while prohibition enforcement funds and a \$150,000 appropriation to enable a survey of the proposed Nicaraguan canal are controversial sections of the second deficiency measure.

Senator Dill, democrat, Washington, held the senate in session until 2:30 a. m. today as a result of his opposition to the Nicaraguan item.

Reach "Gentleman's Agreement"
Senate leaders, however, gained some satisfaction today over a gentleman's agreement reached last night to defer consideration for the remainder of this session of a bill to provide for reappointment of the house and also a companion measure to authorize the taking of the 1930 census. The proposed reappointment of house members would be based upon this census.

But the lessening of pressure on this legislation apparently was offset by the difficulty arising from the senate's action in sidetracking the house plan to kill the proposed \$24,000,000 increase for prohibition enforcement in favor of a \$2,500,000 appropriation for this purpose.

\$24,000,000 Item Attached
The \$24,000,000 item was attached by the senate to the first deficiency bill. House leaders decided to let this huge sum die in the hands of a conference committee and took practically all other items out of the measure and incorporated them in the second deficiency bill now before the senate.

But the senate last night eliminated from the second bill all items the house has transferred from the first measure. Now, the house, if the transferred items are to be saved, must revive the first bill and hereby breathe new life into the \$24,000,000 dry law enforcement controversy.

Except for agreeing to senate changes in various bills, the house has completed most of its work. The order of business today was the Jones bill to increase penalties for prohibition law violations with a vote expected before night adjournment.

read the judge's charge and look over some documentary evidence.

McCloskey sat without visible concern during most of the trial, last more than a week, as he heard a former court house subaltern tell a story of alleged vice theft.

The testimony of Dave Dewhurst, a deputy Bexar county clerk, serving the commissioners court over which former Judge McCloskey presided while he was running for a higher post, was that Charles Ramon, McCloskey's secretary, changed the vote records in certain precincts favorable to his chief. Dewhurst said he suggested this scheme and McCloskey fell in with it.

This, the state's "star" evidence, was met with an alibi defense.

Indictments Will Go With McCloskey

AUSTIN, Feb. 28 (AP).—Acquitted at 2 a. m. today after a ten day trial on an indictment charging election fraud, Congressman-elect Augustus J. McCloskey of San Antonio heard today that he nevertheless probably would have to go to Washington burdened by the remaining four indictments.

Lamar Sellison, Bexar county district attorney, declined to state his attitude toward dismissal of the charges or insistence upon another or other trials when the matter was brought before Judge J. D. Moore today by the defense.

McCloskey, county judge of Bexar county at the time of the November election, which he was charged in five indictments with having stolen from Congressman Harry M. Wurzbach, heard the prosecutors' decision with obvious disappointment. He said he would return to San Antonio today and probably start for Washington tomorrow in time to receive the capital two days prior to presenting his credentials to the new congress.

Appropriations Bill Is Passed

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28 (AP).—The second deficiency appropriation bill, the last of the necessary supply measures, was passed today by the senate and sent to conference with the house.

Judge Hardy acted as her attorney; that he counseled and directed "other" attorneys and detectives employed in behalf of the evangelist; that he interviewed persons having or alleging to have facts pertaining to the disappearance, and that he spoke of the matter to members of the grand jury, reporters and publicity men in an effort to create public opinion in favor of Mrs. McPherson.

That Judge Hardy received, within a few days after Mrs. McPherson's reappearance, information that she had not been kidnapped or held for ransom, is charged. The articles further declare that in spite of this knowledge the jurist conducted an "investigation" and attempted to direct the action of the grand jury in a channel favorable to the evangelist with the intention of obstructing an unbiased probe of the kidnapping story.

KERMITT, Feb. 28.—The second day of the six-day "Railroad Celebration" being observed in Kermitt and marking the arrival of the first passenger train of the Texas and New Mexico Railroad, which is to arrive here Saturday morning, saw thousands of people flocking into this city.

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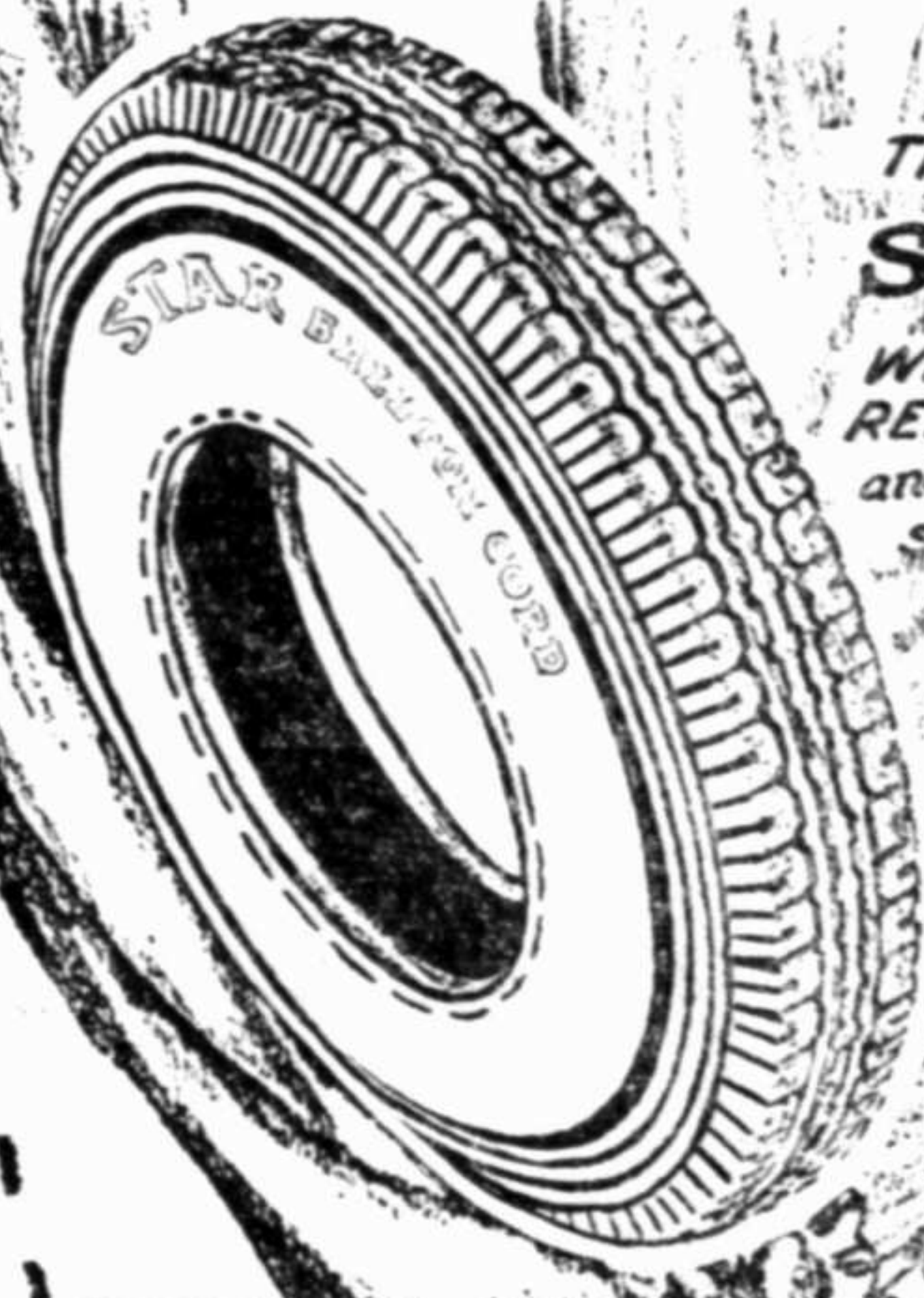

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Feb. 28.—The impetuous fling of youth, it seems, isn't enough. Young Stribling, idol of the South, had his fling last night, but at the end of the glamorous melodrama of Miami Beach, the official decision went to Jack Sharkey, the hard hitting sailor from down East.

In a ten round match, that was alternately fast and dull, Sharkey overcame a big lead on points piled up by Stribling in the first rounds and won with a strong finish in the last four rounds.

The Bostonian had his hand lifted aloft as the victor by Referee Lou Magnolia of New York, but his margin of victory was thin and far from convincing, due to a majority of experts or to most of the crowd of 40,000 packed in the picturesque setting of Flamingo Park. Magnolia, sole arbiter of the battle, did not hesitate to lift Sharkey's hand, nor did his score sheet, showing 35 rounds for the Boston boxer, three for Stribling, and one even, leave room for any doubt in his mind. Ring-side critics, although widely at variance in their opinions, were not far from unanimous in agreement with the verdict. The majority in a poll taken by the Associated Press, credited Sharkey with no more than a single round's margin.

Stribling Spectacular
Stribling, outweighed and outboxed, but not out-gamed, fought the more spectacular fight. He furnished the one big moment of drama in the fourth round when he caught Sharkey flush on the left temple with an overhand right that staggered the Boston sailor and made his knees sag momentarily. Then, as at other times, however, the Georgian was unable to follow up his advantage.

Sharkey in better fighting condition, was woefully slow, ineffective and wild at times, but he fought the more business-like fight. He won by the colorless, but nevertheless effective, method of pounding Stribling's body until it was sore, bruised and bloody.

May Fight Urag
Yet for all the closeness of the decision, the victory moves the Boston brawler another furlong along the comeback trail. His next opponent—in the program leading up to a possible come-back by Jack Dempsey in the struggle for Gene Tunney's vacant throne—probably will be the rugged Spaniard, Paulino Uzcudun, who grunted last night as he watched two of his rivals in action and flaunted his challenge to the winner.

Of the crowd of some 40,000, about 35,000 contributed to an astonishing "gate" estimated at \$400,000 for the venture that Tex Rickard planned as a big gamble and which his successors, led by Jack Dempsey and "Big Bill" Carey, saw through to success only after many misgivings.

The Southern stepped around him menacingly. The Bostonian forced Stribling to lead but the best the Southern could do was a long blow to the ribs. Sharkey began to solve Stribling's style as he stepped in with a whipping right uppercut that smacked loudly on the Southern's body. A full swing left hook caught Stribling in the pit of the stomach and cut down his speed.

Another cutting left hook as Sharkey pursued his foe about the ring cut Stribling's lip and the Southern was spitting blood at the bell.

ROUND FOUR
Sharkey was full of confidence and began to weave and feint with his head shooting lefts to Stribling's head. As they roamed about the ring Jack pulled his lighter for close quarters and buried both fists in the Georgian's body. Stribling rushed Sharkey and nearly threw him through the ropes. Referee Lou Magnolia warned Stribling for his rough work and ordered him to keep his punches up.

The Southern caught Sharkey with a smashing right to the chin. That nearly felled the sailor. The big job half dazed bounced back into a right that Stribling buried under his heart. Sharkey danced away fighting for time and was back to normal when the bell stopped Stribling's next rush.

ROUND FIVE
Sharkey recovered quickly in his corner from a right that dropped on his chin like a lightning bolt. He tore after Stribling with a rain of left jabs and slugged a right and left to the body until the referee warned him to keep his left hook above the belt. They fought closely and the referee was kept busy hauling them apart.

They danced about the ring poking left jabs at each other. Sharkey blinked as the Georgian lifted a stinging left hook to his chin. Stribling fought in deceptive fashion, leaping in suddenly with straight left jabs that kept the sailor blinking.

Another bruising exchange at close quarters brought more blood from Stribling's mouth but he was lashing back furiously with both hands at the bell.

ROUND SIX
During the interval, Referee Magnolia warned Sharkey's handlers against coaching from the corner. Jack bounced out and missed half a dozen shots at Stribling's weaving body. As he missed another long blow the Georgian lifted a left to Jack's chin. Stribling's speed and the strength in his left arm bothered Sharkey but he danced in close and drew blood from Stribling's nose with short lefts. Again they were warned as Sharkey rushed into Stribling's body with punches that sometimes shaded the belt line. Stribling bounced his left into Jack's face but he ran into a two fisted storm as the furious sailor retaliated with a charge that drove Stribling all around the ring. The bell ended the rally.

ROUND SEVEN
The fight was anything but sensational as the boxers, measured each other carefully and either boxed lightly at a distance or grappled at close quarters. Stribling threw another long right into Sharkey's chin but drew the referee's censure again from a left hook that seemed

COTTON MALADY FIGHT LAUNCHED

AUSTIN, Feb. 28 (AP)—Steps to prevent the spread of cotton wilt, a new malady and unlike cotton root rot, were taken yesterday at a conference of Agricultural and Mechanical college experts with George B. Terrell, commissioner of agriculture, and J. M. Delcurto, state entomologist.

It was recommended that the department of agriculture take steps to prevent seed from the affected area, principally in Mississippi and Louisiana, coming into Texas. It was agreed that seed should not be permitted to come into Texas unless it is certified to be free of wilt.

A survey by A. and M. college and the department of agriculture is now under way to determine the extent of the disease in Texas, Delcurto said.

ROUND EIGHT

As they came to close quarters Stribling buried a left hook in the Bostonian's body and had him slowed and back peddling when the bell rang.

ROUND TEN
There were more warnings for the fighters from the referee before the gong opened the last round. They came out jabbing carefully again. The sailor moving steadily while Stribling danced about on his toes and evaded almost every punch Sharkey threw at him. Jack finally caught the Southerner and pinned him to the ropes with a left to the body and a right to the head but smeared Stribling's face with blood.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—Efforts of its leaders freed the senate from a one-man filibuster early today after hours had been spent in trying to defeat a comparatively small item in the second deficiency appropriations bill.

Held at virtually a standstill until 2:30 a. m. by Senator Dill, democrat, Washington, who objected to a provision of \$150,000 for a survey looking toward the construction of a canal through Nicaragua, the senate accepted an agreement proposed by its leaders to stop the talk for the night and vote on the measure this afternoon.

When the hour grew late and fewer and fewer senators remained on the floor, the senate was forced to issue warrants for the arrest of the absentees, but this method of forcing attendance was not used as the number necessary to transact business finally struggled in and tired and thoroughly weary, all agreed to recess till later in the morning, after receiving the quiet assurance of leaders that the fight against the filibuster would be brought to a finish.

Numerous roll calls, reading from magazines, sharp words and a good deal of good natured byplay upheld the traditions of senate filibusters not uncommon as a short session of congress is drawing to its close.

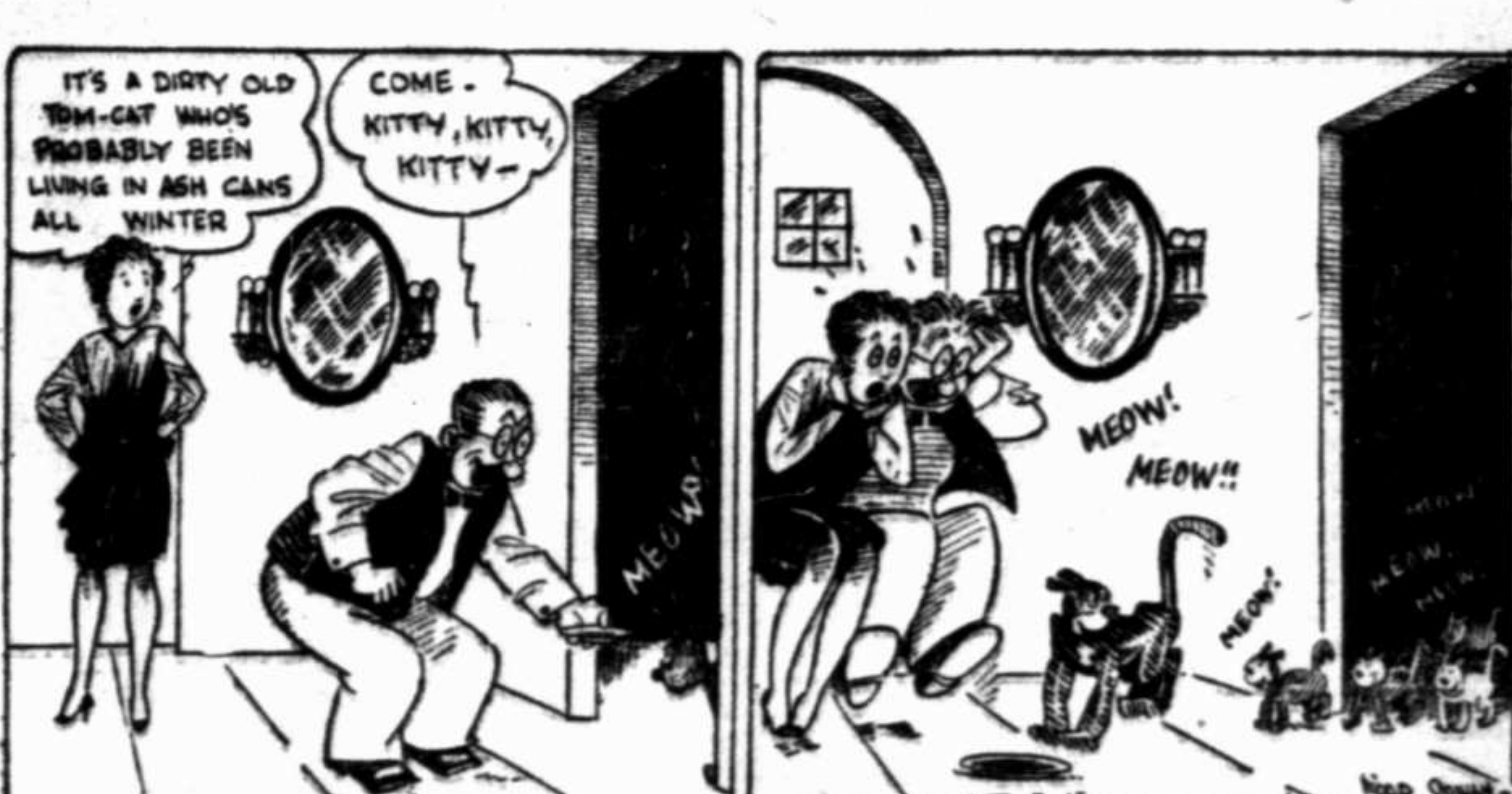

STRONG TONE GIVEN STOCKS

HEAVY ACCUMULATION OF BUYING ORDERS AT OPENING

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, Feb. 28.—A heavy accumulation of overnight buying orders imparted a strong tone to prices at the opening of today's market. Goodyear Rubber opened 4 points higher and Woolworth opened with a block of 5,000 shares at 34-7/8, up 3 and new high record. Union Pacific opened 3 points higher and Johns Manville, International Harvester, U. S. Rubber, Ohio Elevator and Bethlehem Steel showed initial gains of a point or more. Coppers again gave one of the most impressive demonstrations of group strength as a result of the two increases in prices yesterday. New high records were established in the first hour of trading by Anaconda, Andes, Kennecott, Nevada, Inspiration and Calumet and Arizona, the gains running from 1 to 3 points. Steels also attracted a large outside following on reports that the industry was operating at better than 90 per cent of capacity. U. S. Steel Common, Bethlehem Steel, Inland and Colorado Fuel moved up a point or more in the early trading. Motor and accessory shares, in which there is reported to be a large short interest, rallied briskly under the leadership of Packard, which quickly added 3 points to its 1-8 point gain of yesterday. Timken Roller Bearing attained a new top. Adams Express jumped 1-2 points to a new high record at 509. Wright Aeronautical was marked up 5 points and Curtiss, National Cash Register, Lambert, International Combustion, American Railways Express, National Lead and Commercial Solvents showed early gains of 2 to 3 points, the last named touching a new top. Foreign exchanges opened steady with cables 1-3/4 of a cent lower at 94.85 9-32.

'Stationary' News From Foch Bedside

PARIS, Feb. 28 (P.)—The condition of Marshal Foch, waging a desperate fight for life against disease, was said by his physicians today to be "stationary."
 This information, with the notation of a slight drop in temperature, was conveyed in the official communiqué issued after their visit. Privately they said his illness was most grave, and that on his vitality alone did there rest the slightest hope for improvement.

Ice Jam Dynamited, Flood Waters Down

MONROE, Mich., Feb. 28 (P.)—Aided by the dynamiting of the ice jam at the Winchester Street bridge flood waters of the river Raisin appeared to be slowly receding today. The dynamiting was carried on throughout the night and early today in an effort to open a way for the ice and waters to flow into Lake Erie. The flooded area, which yesterday extended along a 15 block section paralleling the river and for from two to three blocks on either side of it, had narrowed down considerably this morning.

AUSTIN, Feb. 28.—Judge W. S. Simkins, 86, credited with having fired the first shot in the civil war at Fort Sumter, S. C., and with the University of Texas law faculty for 30 years, who died yesterday, will be buried in Dallas tomorrow.

Funeral services will be held here this afternoon and the body will then be sent to Dallas.

Judge Simkins was born in Edgefield, S. C., on August 23, 1842. Besides his career as a professor in the university law school, Judge Simkins devoted considerable time to writing and is the author of a number of law books, which are widely used and recognized by lawyers of Texas and the nation. Foremost among those volumes and the first he wrote is Simkins on Equity, published in 1903.

Surviving are two daughters, Mrs. Harris Masterson of Austin, and Mrs. W. H. Lawther of Dallas. Professor Simkins was a sixteen year old senior in South Carolina Military college when the trouble between the states approached open hostilities. With his whole class he joined the army of South Carolina, and while stationed at the entrance to Charleston harbor, discovered the steamer, "Star of the West," attempting to creep into the harbor to reinforce Ft. Sumter. Later, as gunner in charge of the first gun in a battery trained on Ft. Sumter, he fired the signal for the bombardment of the fort.

After practicing law in Florida, Colonel Simkins came to Texas and lived for a time in Dallas, before coming to Austin in 1899 to become professor of law. He served in this capacity for 25 years and was one of the most popular teachers, among the students, the university has ever known.

His classes made it a tradition that he should be greeted with a demonstration upon his entry of the class room. As he walked in the door the students would stand and cheer until Prof. Simkins acknowledged the ovation with a bow.

now believed, because a mechanic greasing it had failed to refasten the cotter key which held it to the axle.

Studied Precipitation.
When he was flying back to Valbuena field, Colonel Lindbergh's thoughts were on his predicament, and how best to emerge from it. Finally he reached over to Miss Morrow, seated at his side, and told her, above the roar of the motor, they probably would turn over when they landed.

He showed her how to take the cushions from the plane's seats and pack them around her body, with others about her head so that the shock of the crash would be lessened. Then, to guard against explosion of the gasoline when the plane turned over, he maneuvered back and forth over the field until all but the dregs in the tank were exhausted.

Plane Topples Over.
He waved to army mechanics and officers below, pointing to his damaged landing gear, and then shot out of space onto the land, lighting gracefully on one wheel and the tail skid. It seemed for a moment the plane would come to rest without mishap, but the loose end of the axle struck the ground and it careened forward turning over, first on its nose and then on its back.

Field attendants helped the aviator and Miss Morrow, obviously badly frightened, through its windows to the ground. His first words turning to her were, "Are you all right?"

Shoulder Dislocated.
At the Morrow home Dr. Sydney Unfelder discovered the colonel's shoulder was dislocated. An effort was made to administer an anesthetic at the Morrow home, but when this failed the aviator was taken to the Laly Cowdry hospital for the operation.

Within two hours he emerged, his right arm and shoulder bandaged heavily and shrouded in a gray overcoat, and insisted on driving an automobile with Miss Morrow and her sister Elizabeth to Valbuena field to inspect his plane and the damage done to it.

The sight of the plane, propeller twisted, one wing smashed, and landing gear gone, brought a frown to his face. Then he smiled, gave some instructions looking to his repair, and brushing aside would-be questioners, went back to the Embassy.

The plane which crashed was the four passenger Travelair monoplane City of Wichita, borrowed last week by the aviator for his flight here to visit his fiancée. At the field it was believed repairs could be made without too great difficulty.

to persuade his personal friend, William J. Donovan of New York, to take over the important post of Governor General of the Philippines.

Falling to find a place in the cabinet for the now assistant to the attorney general, the president-elect sought with somewhat unusual persistence to prevail upon him to succeed Henry L. Stimson, the new secretary of state, as Governor General of the Philippines.

Donovan was prevailed upon to come here from New Mexico to discuss the whole situation and in the three conferences held at the insistence of the president-elect there was some talk about the war portfolio, which Donovan was willing to accept, although naturally he preferred promotion to the attorney generalship.

While the discussions were friendly in character, the next president found his friend obdurate and so they parted with Donovan wishing Mr. Hoover success in his administration and tendering his services as a private citizen, which he will become on March 5, if they could be found useful during the next four years.

Gurn said his wife occupied the suite with him.

In a "showup" at detective headquarters following the arrest McGurn was picked from a line of 20 by two witnesses and identified as one of the killers.

David Stinsbury, directing the slayer search for the State's attorney, said:

"The crime has now been solved. There is no question about it. The prisoner has been viewed by witnesses who declare positively that he is one of the killers. I also know the motive—and have known it for two days."

"McGurn will set up an alibi, using as his witness the young woman with whom he was arrested. But the alibi will not stand. All we want now is five more men. We shall have them soon."

The prisoner denied having had any part in the crime.

Raps Hill Testimony
"I refer particularly," he said, "to the testimony of Lloyd E. Hill of Fort Worth, Texas, a disappointed seeker after the Fort Worth post-office, and who, under oath, admitted he had endeavored to purchase an office."

"Hill was permitted to testify that a prohibition agent by the name of P. V. Petty had told him seven years ago that a bell boy in a hotel in Fort Worth or Dallas had told Petty that the hotel was protected by me against raiders."

Creager continued, "Such hearsay testimony, twice removed would not be admitted as evidence by a justice of the peace anywhere in the United States."

"I do not recall ever having seen or previously heard of P. V. Petty, who, according to Hill acted as intermediary in transmitting this scandalous matter from the unnamed Bell boy to Hill."

Refutes Charges
"Testimony of this character should not be dignified by reply, but since this committee has seen fit to admit it in its records, I now say to you gentlemen that this scandalous and malicious piece of gossip is false in its entirety. I have never directly or indirectly sought to 'protect' any hotel in the state of Texas or elsewhere against raids by prohibition enforcement officials or others."

"Hill further testified that it was the 'understanding' that each office holder paid to the Texas republican state organization ten per cent of his salary and that it was the general understanding that federal offices were for sale in Texas. These statements are as malicious and false and slanderous as the balance of his testimony."

"In 1921 I became the republican state chairman of the state of Texas. In 1923 on the death of Hon. H. P. McGregor of Houston, which position I still hold, I now state that during this approximately seven year period, no indorsement by me or by any other responsible head of the organization in Texas, ever been given conditioned in any manner, directly or indirectly, upon the individual indorsed contributing financially to any individual or to any political organization."
