Deposits, Loans Up Up Up

Gains Reflect Healthy Local Economy

Mitchell County bank deposits soared to unprecedented heights in 1972 with City National Bank of Colorado City and First State Bank of Lorraine reporting higher than ever before deposits and loans.

The two banks' reports are the best indicators of a strong and prosperous economy here.

A call date comes about once

each quarter when the U.S. Comptroller of Currency and the state banking commissioner call for conditions of all banks.

Amounts loaned by both Mitchell County banks was also at a mark higher than ever before.

Here are the figures on loans and deposits for Mitchell County for the period that ended with the call at the close of business in 1972.

"Key 73" Broadcast Set Today

It is more than obvious that something needs to be done about the lights. We have indeed been fortunate that no one has been killed or seriously injured because of the way the stop lights change without warning.

There also seems to be an obvious solution to a large part of the problem: Eliminate all stop lights on Third Street as well as the stop light at Oak and Second Street and replace them with stop signs.

There is no need for the stop lights on Third Street or the one at Oak and Second and their elimination would not only prove safer, but would, it seems, also save the city considerable money on maintenance.

The elimination of those lights also would seem to facilitate the flow of traffic on Oak, Walnut and Elm as well as on Second St.

State aid should be sought for improving the remaining lights on Second Street and the one on Hickory at 12th Street. The state currently maintains the light at Hickory and Second St.

Since all of these lights are on state and U.S. highways, it seems only fair that the state should pay part if not all, for their improvement and upkeep.

The deposits and loans at the close of business Dec. 29 for

City National Bank and Dec. 30 for First State Bank also show a substantial gain when compared to the October quarterly report when the report was made for the July through September period.

The report made this week

covers the October through December quarter.

It was in the October quarter that City National reported for the first time deposits totaling more than \$13 million. That amount has now almost reached the \$13.5 million mark.

Bank officials believe that the strong showing on gains of deposits and loans reflects the good year that farmers are having.

Not only is there a bumper cotton crop being harvested and sold at higher than expected prices, but also cattle prices have remained high throughout the year and pastures and small grains have been good to provide needed grazing for livestock.

Inflation is said to be one factor in the gains but the increases in deposits also reflect a healthy business climate, several bankers have indicated.

Another factor which has helped deposits in both banks is an increasing number of customers, indicating more new county residents and an increase of jobs in the county.

103 Points

Wolves Over Lakeview

The Colorado City Wolves trounced the Lake View Chiefs here Friday night as they built up a score surpassing the 100-point mark before an ecstatic crowd that gave the team a standing ovation when the 100-point mark was passed.

And it was the team's leading scorer and team leader, Melvin Jackson, who scored the two points to boost the score to 101 points.

The two points were two of 42 scored by Jackson in the game.

Final score in the game was 107-73.

The Wolves led all the way scoring 19, 27, 29 and 28 points in each of the four quarters.

The hapless Lake View Chiefs were in no shape to stand up to the run and shoot type game played by the Wolves.

At the end of the first quarter, the Wolves led 19-11; at half, it was 46-29; at the end of the third quarter, the score was 75-45. At one time, the Wolves led by 34 points.

The Wolves played outstanding defense, making 20 defensive plays and eight steals in

the first half, Coach Dean Ingram pointed out.

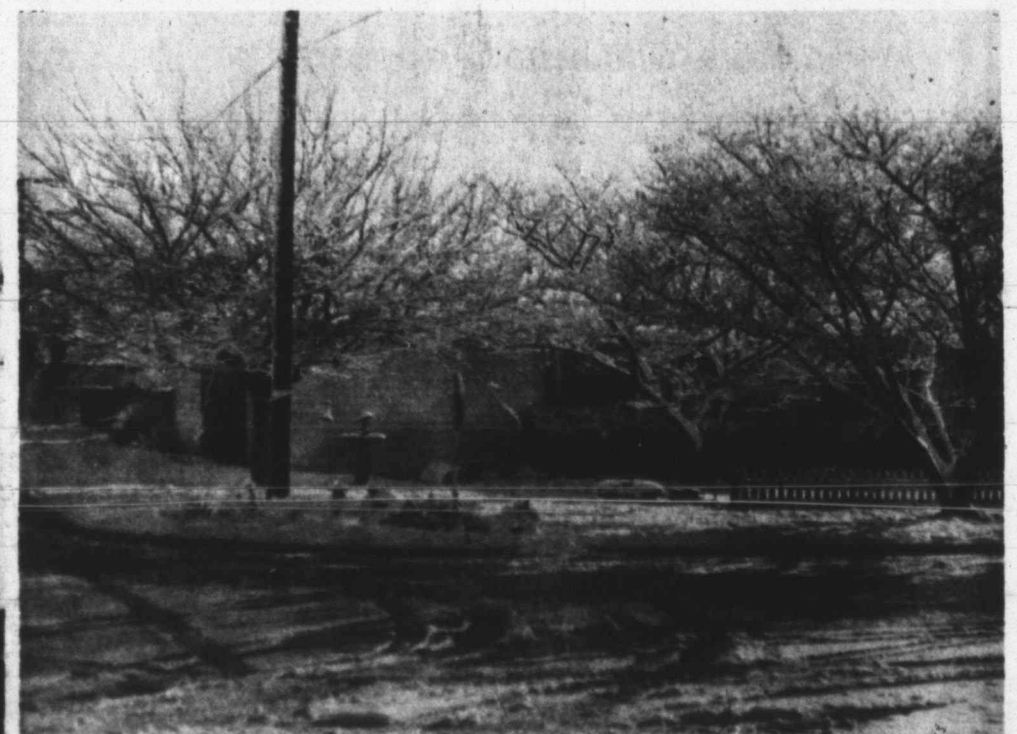
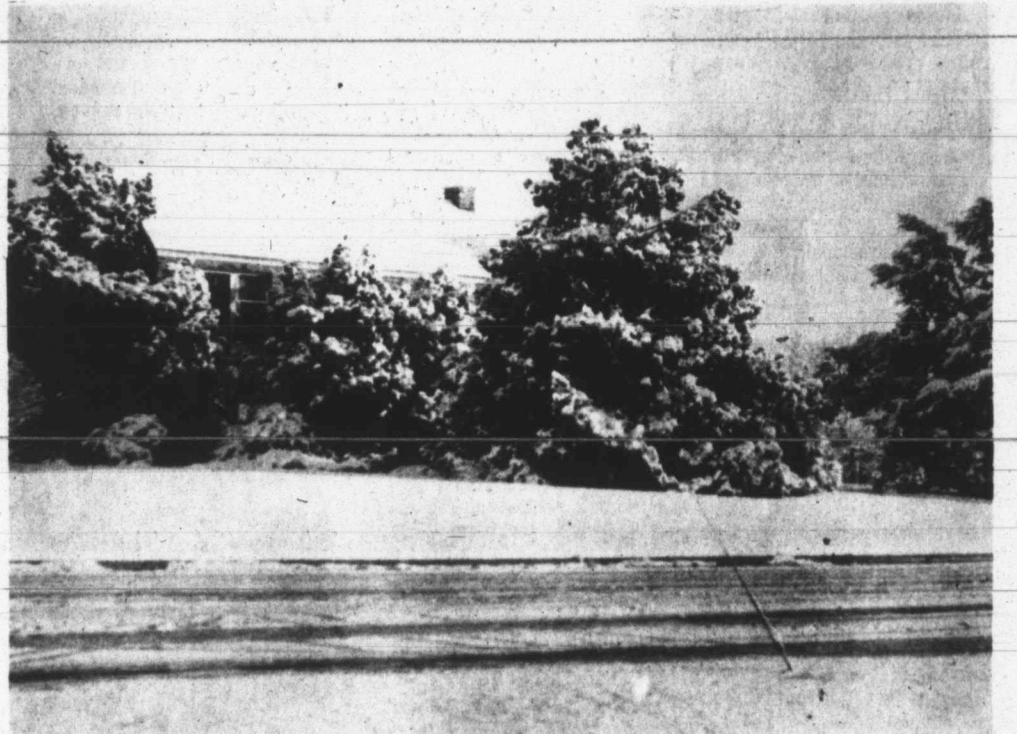
