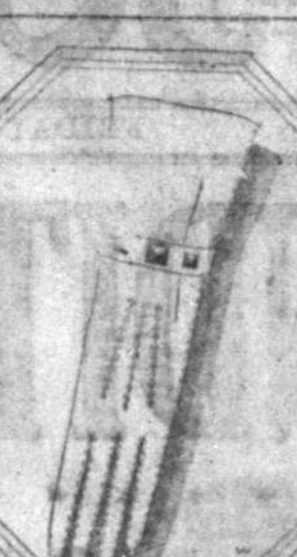
Rumania To Accept Kellogg's Proposal

MIRACLE SEEN AS ONLY HOPE FOR YANK LOSS

CLUB SAILS MERRILY ALONG ON TOP OF AMERICAN LEAGUE

There's mathematical proof that the New York Yankees have yet to clinch the American League pennant. But alleged contenders in that circuit are coming day by day to the realization that it will take a miracle to head off Babe Ruth and company from their third successive appearance in the world's series.

For a month the champions have done little better than break even yet they lead the procession by ten and a half games. Their closest competitors, the Philadelphia Athletics and the St. Louis Browns have done no better over the same period.

Increase Advantage
Although the Yanks have won only more games than they've lost during this period, they have increased their advantage by one percentage point over the second place Athletics and by 30 points over the Browns.

The Athletics lost a chance yesterday to cut deeply into the Yanks' lead when they split even with the Chicago White Sox while Detroit was noosing the Yanks at New York.

Three runs in the ninth spelled victory for the Tigers. Henry Johnson, the young right hander, hit a home run but offset this with no fewer than seven walks, most of which were damaging. Redfern's single scored Cassell, who had doubled, with the run that gave the White Sox a 4 to 3 decision over the A's in the first game. HOOVER FORCE STARTS PLANS FOR BIG DRIVE

MIDDLEWEST AS WELL AS COAST TO RECEIVE ATTENTION

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, July 13.—Although the situation in the east is slowly changing, the first consideration of Herbert Hoover's campaign for the presidency are finding time to prepare for a big drive in the middle west and on the Pacific coast.

Conferences are planned with the party leaders of each of these sections from states lying between the Alleghenies and the Rockies have been asked to attend the Chicago meeting. Chairman Work, who at that time will be on his way to California to be present at Mr. Hoover's notification, will preside. Under present plans two days will be devoted to a discussion of the middle western situation.

Goes to San Francisco
From Palo Alto, where the notification ceremony is to take place on August 11, Mr. Work will go to San Francisco to meet the committee of the Pacific coast. In announcing the two conferences, Mr. Hoover's headquarters said simply that they would be held for the purpose of planning the campaign for the states of those sections.

Mr. Hoover has been informed that "90 per cent of the so-called German vote" will support him at the polls in November. A statement was given out at the office of Chairman Work declaring that representatives of German-American societies had given assurance that they would stand behind the commerce secretary.

Arrangements are now practically complete for Mr. Hoover's western trip, which is to begin tomorrow night, an immediate he is clearing up his affairs at the commerce department, so that his desk may be turned over to his successor.

Vienna Chancellor May Be Forced Out

VIENNA, July 13.—Development of anti-Italian feeling in the Tyrol has interrupted an Italian war monument today threatened by Dr. Ignaz Seipel's hold upon the chancellorship. Dr. Seipel was unable to satisfy the voters of 200 towns in the South Tyrol who called to protest against the inscription and the action of Italy in closing its frontier against Austrians for six days. When the mayors left the chancellor's residence indignation was outspoken. The chancellor postponed a projected trip to Palestine, with the explanation that pressing national affairs made his presence necessary in the capital.

Two Insurgents in Mexico Are Taken

MEXICO CITY, July 13.—Dispatches from Puebla said Carlos Velaz and Jose Guadalupe Orozco, alleged leaders of insurgent forces, had been captured in a police raid on their homes. Large quantities of sedition propaganda was found. Police are secretive concerning the fate of the men but it is believed they will be summarily court-martialed. Numerous other arrests are expected since police found a long list of persons thought to be implicated.

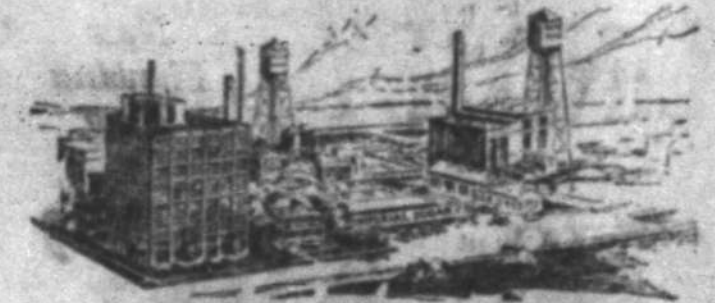

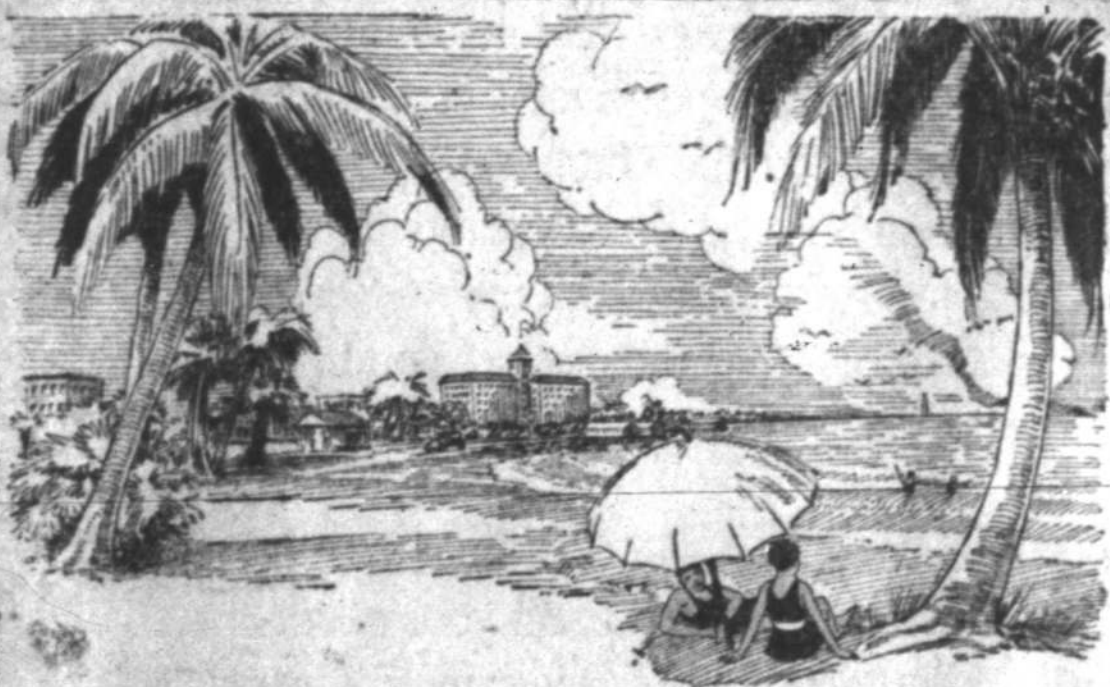

SOUTH PLAINS IS TOUCHED BY SPOTTY RAINS

SOME DAMAGE DONE TO PROPERTY IN CITY BY LIGHTNING

Although only touched by light showers in most places, Lubbock and the South Plains appeared in much fresher spirits today as a result of the sand, rain and electrical storms which struck portions of the territory late yesterday afternoon and last night.

Unofficial estimates placed the fall in several places as high as an inch but the gauge at the experiment station, 3 miles east of the city, only showed .28 inches.

Rain Not General
The rains were not general over the South Plains, reports received here today stated, although practically every portion received light showers. Brownfield to the south-west experienced a good rain, a report here said while Levelland slightly to the north only received scattering showers. Hale Center and Abernathy reported only light showers. Shamrock was included in the rain also. Points east were only touched by the fall.

All buses into the Union Bus Terminal today were running on time and drivers reported only slight difficulties in going over the roads.

The rains were preceded by a severe sand and electrical storm which wrought havoc in a number of points over the territory and throughout the city. Outbuildings were reported blown over and roofs damaged at several places. Hail was reported to have fallen at points about four miles north and west of the city.

The agricultural and machinery buildings at the Panhandle-South Plains fair grounds suffered slight damages. Several hundred square feet of the tin roofs of the buildings were blown off and sprinkled down the hillside in the county park. A telephone pole was also blown down at the grounds, falling across the fence and wrecking several yards of it.

Buildings Damaged
The electrical disturbances lasted approximately two hours and a number of buildings were reported damaged. The fire department answered three calls during the storm one of them when the brick chimney was struck on the roof of the Palace Theater, another when the shed of the Lubbock Cotton Oil Mill was hit and another at the rear of the Amarillo Furniture company when a fire broke out among some trash there.

On the way to the Cotton Oil Mill fire the car driven by Fire Chief W. E. Twitty slipped into a ditch just off Avenue H and turned up on its side. He was soon able to continue on his way, however, by backing out. As one of the department trucks returned to the station it struck a small coupe driven by a local man, considerable damage resulting to the smaller car. The driver thought that the truck was going to stop at the stop signal, the driver said.

mountain county had brought him there.

Dramatic Attempt Fails
Orlando Seymour, 21, Louisville, was the second. A dramatic attempt to obtain a stay for him last night had failed and he met his fate apparently in a stupor. When his attorneys succeeded in arranging an insanity hearing before the county judge here shortly after 8 o'clock he told his cell companions that he would at least get out of the prison once more. But the warden asked the court be held in the chapel and it was. The altar or speakers stand being used as a judge's bench. When the judge ruled he had no jurisdiction, Seymour sagged in his chair and did not speak again until the time for his execution when he confessed the murder for which he had been convicted, that of a Louisville merchant.

Hague Dockery, 21, Harlan, Ky., followed. Originally he had been selected to die first, but, just as the hum of the death chair dynamo filled the cell block he said that he wished to become a Roman Catholic. He was received into the church. Four hours earlier Dockery had sneered and flicked the ashes from a cigarette when Warden Chilton read the death warrants. Uttering no word, he dragged slowly into the chair chamber and, as the hood was adjusted, started mumbling prayers. He was charged with slaying two women and a man. Charles Paul Mittra, 23, St. Louis, Mo., the fourth, was executed in the murder of a grocer in Louisville in an attempted holdup.

He had been sentenced to death in three minutes without making any statement.

Negroes Die Calmly
The negroes, apparently crushed earlier in the night by the nearness and certainty of death, recovered their spirits to a greater degree than the white men.

William Moore, 45, Louisville, the first to die, said nothing. James Howard, also of Louisville, entered the chamber singing "Sweet Little of the Valley" and as he sank back in the chair waved his hand saying "Gentlemen, how are you all feeling tonight?" The last was Lawrence McQueen, 38, of Cynthia, who hummed a song and paid close attention to the manner in which the straps were adjusted.

Relatives of the executed men who had seen them alive for the last time shortly after the reading of the death warrants were permitted to take the bodies away today.

the nominee of that party has made prohibition the main issue in his campaign and he openly declares that he is the platform in himself and that under his banner they will continue to wage a fight to destroy the effectiveness of the 18th amendment, and by reason of his telegram of acceptance, in which he reiterated his adherence to these views, he and they have repudiated the Democratic platform, and have thereby released every Democrat from his obligation to support him as such nominee.

Gov. Smith has always been the friend of the repeal when it is not the enemy of prohibition since its enactment. The 18th amendment, he states, to help enforce the same state laws passed in pursuance thereof are props to the federal constitution.

Violated Oath Of Office
"By asking for the repeal of the only law upon the statutes of his state supporting the 18th amendment, he violated his oath of office as governor to support the consti-

tution and furnished good reasons for doubting any pledge to the public, or oath of office that he may take. His whole record indicates that his confessed hatred of the 18th amendment is his supreme guiding principle.

"This history of prohibition demonstrates that the one sure way, and the only way, to secure the repeal of prohibition laws is first to defeat their enforcement. The better the law is enforced the more popular it becomes. Those who forced the nomination of Gov. Smith have used every means at their hands in order to defeat the enforcement of this law. So successful have they been that now they believe their goal is within their reach, if only they may put their man in the office of president.

"This office has complete control of all enforcement machinery. Every ounce of power given to the president to enforce the law may be used by him to defeat its enforcement. If they are able this year to seize the office of president and place there one who 'hates' the 18th amendment, it will put them a long way on the road to the repeal of the 18th amendment, and the return of the saloon or something worse.

"In view of these facts, we call upon every true friend prohibition, regardless of party, to register his vote against the election of Al Smith.

Not Opposing Party
"In taking this stand, let it be thoroughly understood that we are not opposing the Democratic party, but are opposing only the nominee of that party. We will not be led into partisan politics, but will fight for the best interests of our nation. We recognize that our obligation to our government is higher than our obligation to party; and regardless of party affiliations true patriotism impels us to wholehearted and enthusiastic support of that great American and Christian gentleman, committed by principle and action to our cause—Herbert Hoover.

DEMO LEADERS READY TO SET OFF CAMPAIGN

ORGANIZATION IS GIVEN
APPROVAL YESTERDAY
IN NEW YORK

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, July 13.—Determination of the notification dates for the two standard bearers is awaited as the spark that formally will launch the democratic party into the presidential campaign.

With organization completed, the democratic camp today found itself fully prepared for battle, having worked up in perfect harmony the difficult problem of selecting those who will guide its destiny in the coming fray.

At a forty-five minute meeting and without a dissenting voice, John J. Raskob of Delaware, a leader in the business and industrial world, was chosen by the democratic national committee as its new chairman and he was entrusted with broad powers in mapping out plans.

Takes Positive Control
Hardly had this decision been announced last evening before Raskob took over with a positive hand the duties of his post. In a few minutes he had appointed five vice chairmen, including two women: Mrs. Nellie Taylor Ross, former governor of Wyoming and Mrs. Florence Parley, national committeewoman from Kansas, and designated a chairman for all of the sub-committees which will function in the campaign.

Raskob in his speech of acceptance he brought to the forefront questions of prohibition and farm relief as two of the issues that must be met on the voting line in the impending fight. In regard to the former he stressed the right of Governor Smith to work for a law that will absolutely prevent the return of the saloon, eliminate bootlegging, with its accompanying evils—graft, corruption and murder—and restore temperate life in our country, then all fair-minded men must admit his right, if not his duty as president, to promote such plan, and to advocate such changes in our laws and constitution as may be necessary for its adoption.

This statement was greeted with a burst of applause. A few minutes before Raskob had declared opposition to a mudslinging campaign and forcibly urged that party speakers devote their efforts to dis-

Dupont de Nemours company, adding that he twice had voted for Woodrow Wilson, and then supported the republican ticket.

He emphasized in addressing the committee that Governor Smith had announced publicly his approval of the farm plank in the platform drafted by the Houston convention and said that the New York executive is "experienced in this important problem."

Besides selecting Mrs. Ross and Mrs. Farley as vice chairmen to work with him in the campaign Raskob also picked Frank Hague of New Jersey, Governor Harry F. Byrd, of Virginia, and Scott Ferris of Oklahoma, as his other lieutenants.

He appointed Senator Gerry of Rhode Island, to head an advisory sub-committee created by the national body to assist in working out details of the campaign and among other things confer with the two nominees as to the determination of notification dates. This committee is expected to convene shortly to take up the latter question.

Raskob also picked Herbert H. Lehman, New York financier, to take the chairmanship of the finance committee which up to the present has been held by Jesse Jones of Houston. After choosing Raskob as its new head the national committee also unanimously re-elected James C. Gerard, of New York, as committee treasurer, and Charles A. Greathouse of Indiana, as secretary.
