Texas Auto License Plates to be Placed On Rear of Vehicle

New Numbering System Eliminates One-Half of Numerals

Under the authority conferred upon them by House Bill 273 of the Forty-eighth Regular Session of the Texas Legislature the Texas Highway Commission has passed an order stating that the legal motor vehicle registration insignia for the 1945 registration year will consist of one full-size metal license plate to be attached to the rear of all series of vehicles with the exception of truck tractors, which are to have the plate attached to the front. All plates have black numerals and letters on a gold background.

At the time the order for manufacture of the 1945 license plates was placed with the Texas Prison System, rulings of the War Production Board prohibited any State from the issuance of more than one full-size metal license plate per vehicle for the 1945 registration year. The Texas Highway Department not only conformed with the War Production Board ruling but went even further in effecting a saving in metal and paint by reducing the length of the plate from thirteen inches in 1942 to ten inches in 1945, or a reduction of approximately twenty-five per cent in area.

A new numbering system is used whereby four numerals are the most used on any one plate and these are preceded by two control letters; for example A over A 18 and A over D 9999. Under the old system of numbering, each hundred thousand over a million was identified by a letter of the alphabet and it was necessary to use seven or eight letters. Under the new system, in each ten thousand registrations or each time a control letter changes, there are hundreds of plates with three numerals or less. For all series of plates except passenger, the type of series is embossed on the plate.

The order passed by the Highway Commission also requires the removal of all registration insignia for previous registration years.

NEW TAX FORM MAY BE USED IN LIEU OF RETURNS

"The fact that salaried employees may use Form W-2 (Rev.), Withholding Receipt, in lieu of regular Income Tax returns if the employee meets the test printed on the form is a striking feature of the present Income Tax Law," said Frank Scofield, Collector of Internal Revenue for the First District of Texas.

Most Wage Earners may choose simply to answer a few questions about income and exemptions on a Withholding Receipt, Form W-2 (Rev.), attach to all other Withholding Receipts for the year, file it as an income tax return, and have the collector figure the tax for them.

The original copy of form W-2 (Rev.) Withholding Receipt, is the only copy that may be filed with the collector as outlined above. Care should be taken by the employer to see that the original and duplicate copies of Forms W-2 (Rev.) are given to the employee and the TRIPPLICATE copy filed with the employer's annual Reconciliation report to the Office of the Collector of Internal Revenue.

In many cases the employer is forwarding to the office of the collector the original and duplicate copies of Form W-2 (Rev.) which should be given to the employee. This causes much confusion and delay in the processing of these returns and in many cases will eventually result in a delay in a refund reaching the employee. Delay is also caused by the omission of the name, complete address and Social Security Number of the employee from the Withholding Receipt when issued.

If salaried employees do not desire to use Withholding Receipts, Form W-2 (Rev.), as their return they may file on a regular Form 1040. To expedite the handling of such returns, it is very essential that all original Forms W-2 and W-2 (Rev.) received by the employee be attached when Form 1040 is used. If an employee has been issued more than 1 Form W-2 and one of these forms has been lost Form 1040 must be used in filing a return.

Great International Park Seen For Big Bend Area

Mexico President Told of Acceptance Of Deeds to Lands

A great international park, based around Big Bend National park, is foreseen by Congressman Ewing Thomason as one of the proposed projects for the Southwest after conclusion of the war.

President Franklin D. Roosevelt has formally notified President Manuel Avila Camacho of the Republic of Mexico of the acceptance from the state of Texas by the United States of the deed to the land for the Big Bend National park.

The views of the Mexican government with respect to the development of the park area on each side of the boundary in the Big Bend region was solicited by President Roosevelt of President Avila Camacho.

"When the war is over, we will all get busy and have a great international park," Congressman Thomason said in releasing a copy of a letter from Secretary to the President William D. Hassett to Congressman Thomason.

Reference to the future development of the Great Bend project arose over a query made by Glenn Burgess, manager of the Alpine chamber of commerce.

"I note Mr. Burgess' statement that it was desired to have the President write directly to President Camacho of Mexico, expressing his interest in the Big Bend National park with a view of having an adjoining park established in the states of Chihuahua and Coahuila," Secretary Hassett wrote Congressman Thomason.

"I am glad to inform you that last October the President wrote such a letter to the President of Mexico. In that letter he advised President Camacho of the acceptance by the United States government from the state of Texas of the deed to the land for the Big Bend National park.

"The President also expressed the hope that he might have an expression of the views of the Mexican government with respect to the development of the park area on each side of the boundary in the Big Bend region."—Alpine Avalanche.

Dime March Under Way; Letters for Donations Mailed

Dime Boxes Placed In Local Business Houses for Donors

W. W. Sudduth, Terrell County chairman of the March of Dimes, announced this week that letters have been mailed out to citizens requesting donations to the March; and dime boxes have been placed in business houses in town as handy receptacles for donations. He urges all those who have been contacted by mail to make speedy replies with their donations. Many letters have already come in with gifts in answer to the request. If a name has been overlooked in the mailing list of the local March, the person may make his donation to Mr. Sudduth at the Royal Cleaners or place it in any of the dime boxes scattered around town.

Mr. Sudduth declared that the 1944 epidemic of infantile paralysis was the second worst outbreak of the disease in the history of the U. S., adding, "Fortunately through funds from last year's celebrations, we were prepared to meet that attack in all parts of the nation. More than a million dollars—or ten million dimes—contributed by the American people were spent by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis to provide the best modern treatment for all victims of the epidemic. Since no one knows where, or how hard, polio may strike in 1945, we must again be ready to meet the attack wherever it may come, as well as continue the prolonged treatment still necessary for 1944's victims.

Participation in the annual March of Dimes and birthday celebrations is our assurance that no victim of infantile paralysis will go uncared for, regardless of age, race, or creed."

The local Birthday Ball will occur Tuesday, January 30. Funds from the 1945 celebrations will provide treatment for local children crippled by the disease, and will also help finance national research to discover the cause of the disease and preventive measures against it. Whatever one feels is his share of dimes in the current March will help immensely.

FOR PEACE

Prosperity in America is the FIRST step in the direction of a lasting peace. This prosperity ought to spread, as fast as it can, to other countries. It is in America, however, where men have the key to prosperity and the United States must lead the procession to high standards through open competition. . . . the only way to obtain a more abundant life, for ourselves or others.

At first thought, some people may not agree that prosperity has anything to do with peace. But they will convince themselves if they will think back. Troubles that built up to this present war were economic troubles. Hitler and Mussolini both climbed to power over ruin; ruined fortunes, ruined hopes, ruined lives. They got a following by promising people relief from misery.

Want is Serious

People will be patient and content themselves to wait for solutions to ordinary political problems, but they will do desperate and violent things when hungry; when their families need food. Prosperity helps to maintain peace, and (as I said in the first sentence) prosperity in America is the FIRST step. The reason is plain. Uncle Sam is the world's best customer.

When we think about the importance of the United States in world affairs, these simple figures stand out boldly: We have only 7 per cent of the earth's population and yet we buy 40 per cent of all the raw materials in the world from which manufactured goods are produced. When wheels are turning in America, markets get active to the four corners of the earth.

Looking to America

When American smokestacks are warm, and American factories hum, the tin mines of Malaya get busy, the rubber plantations of Sumatra swarm with workers, and Caribbean countries commence shipping coffee chicla and bananas. Our prosperity is the world's prosperity and the key to world peace. But why discuss it unless we can do something about it? I hasten to say we can!

Foreign lands prosper when they sell freely to America. They sell to America when jobs are plentiful and good here, when most Americans have money to buy what they want. Jobs are plentiful and good, and workers prosper, when business is expanding. Business expands when investors see possible returns from investments. They could see such opportunities now if they were not afraid of taxes.

Uncertainty Kills

Very few business men in the United States have any idea today that they will be able to expand in peace-time pursuits. Most of them know they can't afford to expand if the present-day 95 per cent excess profits tax remains in force. It was enacted as a war emergency measure. Nobody thinks it ought to be repealed this hour. But we ought to make certain now that it will not outlive the war.

Revenue measures are the hardest of all laws to repeal. Taxes rarely get smaller. But unless taxes on business get smaller after the war, investors would be insane to spend a few billions for expansion. Business men want to plan peace-time sales and employment now. When Congress makes a reasonable tax law to become effective with victory, world peace will have its FIRST guarantee. It will have to be done this year.

Ozona Stockman—Inauguration of cross-country airplane service, for the transportation of passengers and freight, was announced this week by Ralph Jackson, flight instructor, who is operating two planes from the Ozona Airport, five miles west of Ozona.

The cross country service is being launched in addition to the flying instructions being given by Mr. Jackson to a class of about 15 Ozona fledgling fliers.

Fort Stockton Pioneer—The Pecos County Livestock Protective Association Monday elected new officers and voted to appoint a committee to investigate applicants for the job of special livestock officer for the county, and to refer their recommendations to the Sheriff's department and the commissioner's court for action.

The post of livestock inspector has been unfilled since the death several months ago of Bob Sumrall. A committee composed of J. T. Baker, Marsh Lea and Frank Hinde was appointed to consider applicants, with the indication that a man from outside the county would probably

be chosen after careful investigation. At present members of Sheriff Ben R. Hilger's deputy staff are dividing among themselves the duties of livestock inspector.

Uvalde Leader-News—A slow rain which fell between 4 a. m. and 1 p. m. Wednesday totaled 1.18 inches, according to Harry E. Carper, weather observer and reports from surrounding areas indicate that the rain was fairly general in this part of the state.

The rain fell slowly but steadily throughout the morning and coming in that manner will be of maximum benefit to oat crops and ranges alike.

Reports received by local ranchmen from their countrymen ten to thirty miles from Uvalde indicate that about the same amount of rain fell in those areas as was recorded here.

Additional rain fell Wednesday night totaling 1.02 inches, making a total of 2.20 inches.

Del Rio News-Herald—Five hundred new books from the Texas State Library at Austin have been received in the County Library, a report from the library committee for November and December indicated.

The books include fiction and non-fiction volumes.

During the two months, 130 volumes of children's books, classics, westerns and other types of books have been donated to the library.

Giddings Star—Machinery for translating the agricultural phases of the GI Bill of Rights from promises into actual operation will be set up in Lee County and throughout Texas within the next few weeks, according to Carr Smith, Farm Security Administrator supervisor.

Mr. Robert K. French, District Supervisor, at Dallas, has called a meeting of supervisors in the eleven counties comprising his district at Bryan, for January 23rd, where he will outline how the government farm loan guaranty will work. Mr. French, has just returned from Oklahoma City where regional, state and district officials from Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico heard from R. W. Hudgens, Washington, FSA Associate Administrator, of the part FSA will play in the GI program.

BUTTER SHOWS BIG
DROP IN 1944

Texans can readily understand the lack of creamery butter on the market, for production in November, 1944, fell off 19.3 per cent from October, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reports.

Over the 12-month period from November, 1943, to November, 1944, the decrease in production was 29.9 per cent. This means that in November, 1944, in the state 1,549,000 pounds were produced, and in November, 1943, 2,210,000 pounds produced.

The manufacture of butter from January 1944 to December 1944, shows a decrease of 10.1 per cent, as compared with the period January to December 1943.

Other Texas dairy products, such as American cheese, ice cream, showed a gain in production, as compared with November 1943. American cheese increased production 1.1 per cent.

In pounds, Texas produced 869,000 pounds of cheese in November, 1944, as compared with 1,680,000 gallons of ice cream.

Bill Seeks Proper Education for Texas Crippled Children

Will be Presented To Legislature During Present Session

Provisions for the education of thousands of Texas children whose physical handicaps at present prevent their attending public schools are sought in a bill which will be presented to the coming legislature at the instance of the Texas Society for Crippled Children. Dr. Sam H. Whitley of Commerce, president of the society, says that G. C. Morris of Greenville will sponsor the bill in the Senate and Representative Will Smith of Beaumont in the House. The bill seeks to create a Division of Special Education in the State Department of Education.

"The laws of Texas overlook the needs of the handicapped children of this State," Dr. Whitley says. "Twenty-one other States recognize their responsibility to their handicapped children and the bill which will be introduced is a humanitarian measure which we believe will be adopted. So far handicapped children have received education in Texas merely through the generosity of private enterprise and charitable organizations but these cannot reach every handicapped youngster who is entitled to an education. Thousands with educable minds are being neglected and overlooked."

"We are asking for a law which will provide proper education for children who are handicapped through defective hearing, vision, speech or other physical disability in such a measure as to prevent their attending the regular classes in our public schools. Such a law would permit the establishment of special classes for these children where five or more may be found in any school district and will provide them with transportation to school when needed. Where there are not sufficient numbers for special classes such children may be entered in classes in other districts or provided with home teachers or corresponding courses approved by the Division of Special Education. Children who are without hope of independence or education will be thus afforded a chance in life and many of them will prove to be useful and happy citizens rather than become charges of the State in years to come."

PELLAGRA TAKES YEARLY TOLL OF HUMAN LIVES

Pellagra, although not a communicable disease, is one of great concern to public health officials in Texas for many people die of pellagra in this state every year. The disease is caused by the lack of certain essential foods, and as it comes on slowly may not be recognized until the victim begins to have the more serious symptoms such as sore mouth, stomach trouble, and reddening and scaling of the skin.

"When these symptoms appear, the disease has been present for some time," states Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. "The longer an individual has pellagra the harder it is to cure. It is advisable, therefore, to watch for the early symptoms such as nervousness, indigestion, and burning of the hands and feet, and if these symptoms appear, treatment should be instituted at once. In its advanced stages pellagra may become so severe as to not only cause physical suffering but seriously affect the mind."

Pellagra is not contagious, Dr. Cox pointed out, and he emphasized that it can be prevented entirely by including the right kinds of foods in the daily diet. These essential foods include milk, fresh meat, whole wheat products, brewer's yeast, salmon, tomatoes, and other fresh fruits and vegetables. The inclusion of these foods in the daily diet will prevent pellagra, and as in the case of any disease, it is better to prevent it than to try to cure it.

ROY HOLLIS HALEY

Was born October 22, 1916, in San Angelo, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy H. Haley. The family lived for several years in Sheffield before moving to Terrell County in July of 1929. Hollis attended grammar school and high school here in Sanderson, graduating with the class of 1934. He took a post graduate course in the high school in 1935 and then enrolled in Sul Ross, at Alpine, where he studied for two years. Motorists Warned To Take Proper Care Present Auto Tires

Tire Situation For Civilians Predicted To Be More Acute

Nylon suits for men with permanent "creases" in the trousers, curtains which can be laundered but need not be ironed, transparent food containers which can be vacuum packed like tin cans, all lie ahead for consumers in the post war years, members of the Texas A. and M. Extension Service staff were told at a recent conference by Miss Gertrude Dieken, home economics consultant for a chemical research concern at Wilmington, Del.

The speaker, a former Extension worker, said the public should not expect overnight "a brand new world paved with plastics," but science under the pressure of war is making many new discoveries which will "lighten the routine of house-keeping and leave more time for homemaking."

Chemical research, in addition to developing synthetics and plastics, also is finding ways to give new characteristics to natural fibers, Miss Dieken said. Junior's coveralls can be treated so they will be unaffected by splashes of mud, spilled orange juice, or upset bottles of ink. In addition, cotton materials can be treated so they will be fireproof, mildew resistant water repellent and, by a layering process, as warm as wool.

A number of interesting exhibits were shown to the Extension group by the speaker. Among them were a section of nylon tow rope with "stretch recovery" which is used for pulling gliders; plastic for use in out-door furniture which will not fade, warp, or weather; nylon capes which offer protection from poison gas and nylon fabric screen which protect fighting men in the Southwest Pa-

cific from mosquitoes and other pests.

Clothing made of acetate rayon need not be sewed, she said for heat will weld or fuse the seams permanently. When production can be turned to peacetime purposes, there are enough facilities for every woman in the country to have a dozen pair of nylon hose, she predicted.
