MOST HOUSES TO SHUT DOORS AT 7 O'CLOCK

Grocery Men Will Not
Do Business After
8 p. m.

New Regulations Are
To Be in Effect
to April 1

Earlier closing hours for local stores will go into effect next Monday, following the circulation of agreements yesterday in allied lines of business.

Grocery stores have agreed to close at 8 p. m., daily except Saturday, and on Sunday at 9 a. m. Other stores, excepting drug stores, filling stations, and restaurants, will close at 7 p. m., daily except Saturday. Lumber yards have been closing, and will continue to close at 6 p. m. Midnight will be the closing hour on Saturdays, no change being made for that day.

It is believed the earlier closing time is in keeping with the character of city Pampa has become, and the new regulations will be tried until April 1.

The movement to close earlier got under way definitely when the Pampa Business Men's association recently went on record as favoring it. Trade Day members endorsed 7 p. m. for the closing hour. The following agreement was drafted and circulated yesterday.

"We, the undersigned merchants of Pampa, Texas, agree to close our place of business, and not sell any merchandise, after 7 o'clock, beginning Monday, Jan. 16 with the exception of Saturday nights, and no merchandise is to be sold on that day after 12 p. m., this being a trial for three months, ending April 1.

Postal Receipts for 1927 Increase Much Over 1926 Figures

With an increase of \$16,361.04 over the receipts of 1926, the Pampa postoffice has completed its most successful year. The Christmas rush was the largest ever handled here and necessitated the leasing of a building for the sub-station.

The total receipts for 1927 were \$36,695.07, while 1926 totaled \$20,334.03. In 1925 the receipts were \$7,518.12 and in 1924, \$7,012.06. The December money order receipts amounted to \$30,130.46 as compared to \$28,487.37 in November. The postal receipts for December of this year totaled \$4,392.44 compared to \$4,076.00 in December 1926.

A check shows that 93,436 two-cent stamps were sold during December and that 72,000 letters and cards went through the cancelling machine from December 15 to 30.

Honor Flag Given Local Red Cross

An honor flag, signifying that Pampa's Red Cross chapter met the goal assigned in the eleventh annual roll call, has been received here by the Rev. Tom W. Brabham, chairman. With it came a letter acknowledging receipt of the National organization's share of the membership fees.

Establishment of a Red Cross nursing service here will likely be perfected during this month. Owing to the fact that the Midwestern branch of the Red Cross had no approved nurses available, the applications of other nurses, some of them local, are being considered by the nursing division. Establishment of the service has been delayed while the credentials of the nurses are being investigated.

Pampa Baptists last night voted to employ Tom Ed Vaughn of Panhandle as educational director of the local church. Mr. Vaughn will take up his duties at once.

The new worker comes highly recommended. He is now educational director of the First Baptist church of Panhandle. Besides being well educated and trained in Baptist procedure, he is a singer of much ability, and also teaches voice. Mrs. Vaughn is excellent pianist, and ends valuable assistance in her husband's work.

The local church also voted last night to purchase two pianos for the Sunday school department.

A Gray county automobile show, sponsored by the Pampa Automobile Dealers association and the Pampa Daily News, will be held in Pampa January 27 and 28.

Automobile dealers of the city and representatives of the Pampa Daily News met at the Schneider hotel Friday night to discuss ways and means of holding the first automobile show in Pampa. P. F. Smalling was elected temporary chairman of the meeting and T. K. Underwood secretary.

C. H. Sharp, local building contractor, who stated that he was "with Pampa, for Pampa, and behind the automobile dealers in the city," offered his new building on North Somerville street which is nearing completion and told those present that they might have the use of his building for the show.

He said that in his opinion it would be a great thing for Pampa and Gray county and that he was delighted to see the automobile dealers of Pampa getting together.

The dealers were unanimous agreeing to organize a permanent organization at a later date, and to invite the accessory men of Pampa to join the association.

A committee composed of Dyke Cullum, chairman, F. M. Culbertson, and Biggs Horn was appointed to make all arrangements for the big automobile show. Another meeting will be called for next Friday night, when the committee will make its report.

Each of the ten automobile agencies in Pampa will be allotted a space for the two-day show, with the condition that they may invite accessory men to share their space or some additional space. Entertainment will be furnished by local and out of town artists at each show.

F. M. GWINN OF CROSS PLAINS LOCAL CHOICE

Will Assume Duties
Here On or About
January 23

SUCCESSFUL AS
CIVIC WORKER

Has Good Record in
Activity Similar to
Pampa's

F. M. Gwinn, mayor of Cross Plains and secretary of the Chamber of Commerce there, was chosen city manager of Pampa at a special meeting of the city commissioners this week. Mr. Gwinn will assume his duties about January 23.

The new city official will take office under the terms of the charter and will receive a salary of \$4,800 a year, although no contract exists subject to discharge at any time.

Mr. Gwinn is 40 years old, of pleasant appearance and bearing, and is a successful business man and executive. Formerly of Wichita, Kansas, he has been at Cross Plains for eight years. He engaged in general merchandising for a time, but his interest in public affairs drew his attention from private business as oil development increased Cross Plains to a city of nearly 5,000 people. He is now president of the school board, and this office, with his other duties, has given him a position of unusual leadership in his city.

Cross Plains has had a development similar to that of Pampa, and has voted school bonds, paving, and water and sewer extensions. According to John Westerman, one of the Cross Plains city commissioners who accompanied Mr. Gwinn here, every department of that city has paid its own way in spite of the acute demands of the year, and all civic affairs are in an excellent condition. He declared that a man of the ability of Pampa's new city manager can save many times his salary during a year by shrewd management.

Mr. Gwinn was selected from a list of fifteen applicants. His business experience, engineering skill, civic leadership, and evidence of good character lead the city commission to employ him. He was highly recommended by the Rev. Tom W. Brabham, formerly pastor of the Cross Plains Methodist church, who said that expert management enabled Cross Plains to reduce the tax rate despite bond voting for public improvements.

Mr. Gwinn's family consists of his wife and two daughters. One daughter will be graduated from Cross Plains high school in June, and likely the mother and girls will not come to Pampa until after commencement time.

Phillips Company Is Granted Permit for Carbon Plants

Word has been received from the railroad commission at Austin that the Phillips Petroleum company has been granted permission to erect three carbon black plants in the Panhandle.

Construction will commence immediately and the plants will be in operation within six months.

Plant B will be situated in the Bowers area of Gray county in section 87, block B-2, on the Myrtle Davidson lease. This plant will be completed as rapidly as possible and will have a maximum capacity of 25 million feet and a minimum capacity of 10 million feet.

NEW TEACHER IS EMPLOYED

More Buildings Will Be
Needed as the
City Grows

Miss Pauline Roach, A. B. graduate of Texas Tech, this week was employed by the school board to take the third grade work in the local schools. She has been teaching in Roberts county, where recently the enrollment decreased until she was no longer needed.

The board endorsed Mrs. B. F. Kirby as an instructor in expression.

After studying the financial condition of the district, board members found that for the first time since the independent district was formed it appears that current taxes will pay all bills, complete this school term, and finance the next term until new taxes are collected.

Last year, owing to the increase in enrollment without corresponding increase in taxes, the term's end showed a deficit of nearly \$30,000. The new, high valuation total in the district, however, has wiped out this debt, and the assessed taxes for this year total \$137,000.

According to Joe Smith, business manager of the system, the annual expense of the district should approximate from \$93,000 to \$98,000. This would leave an ample surplus for retiring outstanding bonds, paying the interest, and meeting any incidental expenses which may arise.

Building of temporary cottages, employment of additional teachers, and voting of a \$150,000 bond issue for the Baker and Central ward school buildings comprise the efforts which have been taken in a financial way to care for the new needs of the district. The bonds were voted without raising the tax rate or the assessments. This method was used in order to make the increased valuations care for the bigger demands.

When the new buildings were voted it was intended that the cottages should be sold. The enrollment has so continued to increase, however, that all but two of the cottages are needed and further buildings will be necessary if Pampa grows during the coming months.

PRODUCTION IS 40 BARRELS AN HOUR TODAY

Flow Starts From Much
Higher Pay Than
Expected

NEW LOCATIONS ARE REPORTED

Shamrock Well Is Not
as Large as
Stated

The Bowers pool in the South Pampa field furnished another oil surprise Sunday morning and added another large well to the Gray county production.

The Texas company at No. 1 J. B. Bowers in the southeast corner, of the northeast quarter of section 89, block B-2, was preparing to set 5-inch casing at 2,855 feet when the 14,000,000 million cubic feet of gas which the well had been making ceased and oil commenced to spray.

It increased at every minute and before long was flowing at the rate of 50 barrels an hour. It is holding at 40 barrels an hour today.

The Bowers pool is just as erratic as all other granite wash pools in the Panhandle, and this well is another surprise.

It is offset by wells of the Danciger Oil and Refining company, Gulf Production company and Operators Oil company.

The Rensaul Petroleum company has made four locations on its M. Huseby lease in the south half of section 55, block 25, in the southeastern section of Gray county. The company only plans to drill on one

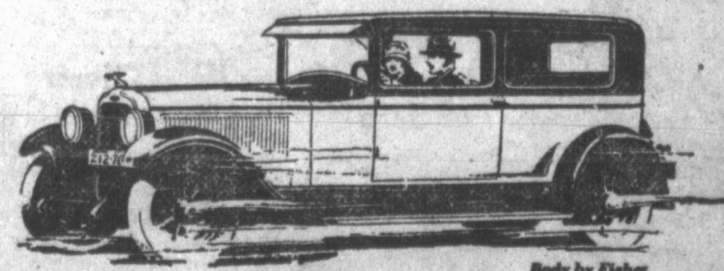

Cold Spell Cuts Down Panhandle Crude Oil Production—Gray Falls But New Wells Will Soon Be In

Owing to the continued cold, oil production in the Panhandle continued to drop last week. Gray county showed the largest decrease during the past week, but is expected to skyrocket again next week on account of two large wells in the Bowers pool which were brought in recently. Other wells are topping the pay.

Daily production by counties:
Carson—7,630 barrels last week, 7,640 this week, a loss of 90 barrels.
Gray—18,555 barrels last week, 16,650 this week, a loss of 1,905 barrels.
Hutchinson—52,740 barrels last week, 51,300 this week, a loss of 1,440 barrels.
Moore—No production.
Potter—30 barrels last week, 25 this week, a loss of 5 barrels.
Wheeler—1,260 barrels last week, 1,155 this week, a loss of 105 barrels.
The Panhandle total—80,235 barrels last week, 76,560 this week, a loss of 3,675 barrels. This production was from 1,406 wells.
The Howell Oil corporation, with head offices at San Antonio, has taken over the Archer Blake test in section 111, block B-2, southwest Gray county, and will drill in without delay.

Archer Blake drilled the well to 225 feet and shut down. This area is strictly wildcat.

The drilling of this will be the first operation of the Howell Oil corporation in the Panhandle field.

The Prairie Oil and Gas company is plugging its No. 1 Combs-Worley in section 37, block 3. This test was one of the first in the Gray county pool, and only recently ceased flowing.

Drilling at 3,245 feet, the Guernsey Oil company's No. 1 McKinney in section 163, block 3, about four miles west of town, is spraying every time the bit is pulled. First show of oil was encountered at 3,164 feet, second show at 3,180, and the slight spray at total depth.

The well is logging perfectly with the Archer well which came in for more than 800 barrels. Drilling in is expected tomorrow.

FOR RURAL BOYS—Gray county wants and needs a county agent. There is a strong demand, and there is an excellent opportunity for increasing that demand.

It is pertinent, therefore, to take some notice of what is being accomplished by county agents in West Texas. Lubbock county furnished an excellent example. Country club boys, under the direction of the Lubbock county agent, furnished the state president of Texas Boys' clubs, the winners of trips to Chicago and Washington, the winner of the Texas Farm Journal prize, the state winner in the baby beef contest, and the highest point boy in the grain judging contest at the A. & M. short course.

D. F. Eaton, county agent, has fifteen clubs of rural boys—surely a big task in itself. More than 200 boys are doing worthwhile work under his direction. They are following a definite program outlined by Mr. Eaton. The work is closely affiliated with rural schools and churches, and is definitely a big part of community development.

These boys' activities were diversified. One made a net profit of \$315.10 from five acres of cotton, one a net profit of \$352.78 in a ton-litter contest, one netted \$153.61 in baby beef work, one made \$200 on turkeys, and another raised nine tons of milo on five acres. Profits in terms of knowledge and interest amounted to infinitely more.

Gray county boys likewise can be greatly benefited through the help of a county agent, who can give them personal attention and intensify

their interest by having them work in groups.

That local boys are eager to take part in such projects was recently well shown when the Rotary club distributed high grade gilts. Prof. Lester, teacher of vocational agriculture at Central high school, is limited in his accomplishments along this line only by the teaching demands of his work. His boys are highly enthusiastic.

Work with boys is but one of the many activities of a county agent. In fact, the agricultural man can create as much demand as he is able to meet, simply by taking an interest in the people of his county. It is being done elsewhere; it should be done here.

SEEING THINGS—Radio has brought the sound of the football cheering section to the millions of people who cannot sit on the sidelines. Breathless announcers have conveyed vivid word pictures. Visualize millions of people letting their imagination form the scene from the sounds and ideas, and you have a modern miracle.

Tomorrow, we are promised miracles far greater than this. Radio offers two alternatives: television and remote control of miniature objects. The latest idea in radio relates to the latter. Imagine a miniature race track upon which are rails bearing toy horses. Miles away, an actual horse race is getting under way. The starter sends the steeds on their way. A broadcasting station a n o u n c e r instantaneously speaks into his microphone. His assistants manipulate a small electric board. Impulses are sent out. The toy horses shoot forward. They are numbered to correspond with those of flesh and blood. Their positions are those of the racing animals. As the announcer supplies the "color," the miniature horses supply the visual stimuli. The possibilities in remote

control are practically unlimited, in amusement and industry, peace and war.
