Election of officers was held with Rev. Charles W. Estes of Eastland named as chairman. Rev. Mr. Estes, who is also president of the Denton County Jersey club, will be assisted by a vice chairman, J. T. Munn, Rising Star; H. C. Davis of Eastland was elected secretary-treasurer.

Aims of the club are the promotion of more interest in Jersey cattle. Organization of boys and girls clubs maintenance of a co-operative selling system for cattle, and sending of exhibits to the state fair. Membership will be confined to owners of registered Jersey stock. It was indicated, County Agent C. Metz Heald presided at the meeting.

TREASURY DEPT. SOLICITING SITE PROPOSALS FOR FEDERAL BUILDING IN EASTLAND IN AD

The treasury department, procurement division, public works branch, Monday solicited in an advertisement proposals for a site for a federal building at Eastland. The bid proposals will be opened publicly at the postmaster's office Sept. 5 at 9 o'clock, the advertisement stated.

Approximate dimensions were given as follows: Corner lots, 120 foot frontage, 180 foot depth; interior lots, 145 foot frontage, 180 foot depth.

Sites having different street frontage dimensions will be considered provided the area is approximately the same.

"In all cases where possible bids should be submitted by actual owners of properties and not by agents. Documentary evidence of agent's authority must be attached to proposals," the advertisement stated.

"Upon application, the postmaster will supply prospective bidders with proposal blanks and a circular giving particulars as to requirements and instructions for preparation of bids and data to accompany same."

CONGRESS MAY ADJOURN BY LATE TONIGHT

WASHINGTON, Aug. 24.—President Roosevelt and senate leaders toiled at the White House today over plans to end an agrarian revolt and send congressmen home tonight.

With adjournment blocked by the senate cry for government loans on cotton and wheat, the president backed the house opposition and conferred with Joseph Robinson and others including those wanting the loans.

The senate stood in recess until 5 p. m. to prevent raising of other issues which might delay adjournment.

The house, determined to block the loan demand, laid its strategy to force the senate to act. It appeared a compromise putting the loan issue over would result.

A new adjournment resolution to end congress by midnight tonight was passed in the house after Rep. Carl Vinson, Dem., Ga., moved to table the resolution and the vote was ordered.

Senators meantime were told informally that there was a change of adjourning tonight.

The adjournment resolution must be approved by the senate and it was there the key to the situation rested.

The house also strengthened its hand in a determination to force the senate to back down on the cotton and wheat loans. The third deficiency appropriation bill, carrying the senate loan amendment was sent back to the house appropriations committee by Speaker Joseph W. Byrnes.

Texas Farmers Got \$46,074,000 From Government

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26.—Figures released today by the agricultural adjustment administration revealed \$46,074,000 was paid to Texas farmers in the form of cotton, wheat and corn-hog reduction benefit payments from July 1, 1934 to July 1, 1935.

Cotton benefit payments, totaled \$36,000,000; wheat \$5,375,000; corn-hog payments \$5,000,000.

Counties in the half million dollar class for cotton payment included Ellis, \$731,000.

TERRITORIAL TREATIES TO BE TESTED

LONDON, Aug. 26.—Great Britain's diplomatic activities in the Ethiopian dispute are aimed at forcing a supreme test of treaties guaranteeing territorial integrity, it was indicated today.

The immediate diplomatic activity is to find out where France will take its stand as between Great Britain and Italy and to seek in the league of nations world support for inviolability of territorial treaties.

Militarily the immediate task is to strengthen defenses on the route to India on Australia and New Zealand by way of Gibraltar, the Suez Canal and the Red Sea.

To this end after ordering a "summer cruise" which will put the fighting ships of the Mediterranean force at points calculated to be of strategic importance. The war office is sending 2,500 soldiers to the Malta garrison and will increase the garrison at Aden, its protectorate to the southern entrance of the Red Sea.

Bank Liquidation Expenses Okehed

Expenses of \$274.30 incurred during July for liquidation of the Texas State Bank of Eastland were approved Monday by 88th District Court.

An itemized account as submitted by E. C. Brand, banking commissioner who is in charge of the liquidation, showed the following expenses:

W. B. Collie, attorney, commission 10 per cent commission on collections, \$117.52; P. L. Crossley, district clerk, court costs, \$9.05; Earl Bender, insurance on bank property, \$147.73.

Total expenses previously reported and approved are \$42,491.07.

Kidnap Suspect Seen In Baltimore

BALTIMORE, Md., Aug. 26.—A man, suspected to be William Mahan, wanted in the Weyhaeuser case in Washington, was sought today in Baltimore by state and city police.

The man was reported seen at a filling station this morning. He was in a car bearing Ohio license plates.

Joseph O. Logue, station attendant, who attempted to question the man, told state police he drove toward Baltimore at high speed. Baltimore radio cars began a search.

BUCYRUS, O.—Police found 12-year-old Wayne Greenfield asleep in an abandoned barn two days after he ran away because, he said, he had broken a promise to his mother and was afraid to return home.

LEGISLATORS BEING ASKED FOR OPINIONS

Attorney General to Rule On Status of Wet and Dry Counties

AUSTIN, Aug. 26.—Saturday's vote to repeal state prohibition will have no effect until the returns are officially canvassed, (probably Sept. 9) Attorney General William McCraw said today.

Then counties that were previously dry under local option will continue dry and the lid will be off in counties that were wet under local option when state prohibition became effective in 1919.

After a conference with McCraw Governor Allred called upon legislators to telegraph him when they thought a special session of the legislature should begin and what form of liquor legislation they thought advisable.

McCraw said he would issue a formal opinion late today going to all phases. The governor asked him to reveal, when the amendment will be effective, what will be the status in (a) counties where sale of intoxicating liquor had been prohibited by local option elections in 1919 and (b) in counties where sale of intoxicating liquors had not been prohibited.

His opinion, McCraw said, will be in effect that counties previously dry will continue dry with the Dean law penalties in effect until machinery is provided by the legislature to change the status of the county, or until the legislature modifies the liquor penalties. Wet counties will be wet without any regulation, restraint, tax or legal inhibitions from the time the results of the election are announced officially and until the legislature makes same regulation.

AUSTIN, Aug. 26.—Representative George Moffett, Chillicothe, dry leader, in the Texas House of Representatives, said today a fight will be made for a state dispensary system as a result of Saturday's election.

The dispensary will produce most revenue for the state and will best regulate traffic, Moffett said.

Flags and bunting decorated beer taverns in Texas cities today as they showed schooners of "extra strong" beer across the counters.

The enthusiasm of hard liquor sellers was chilled, however, by the Attorney General's warning that repeal Saturday of state prohibition was not yet effective.

Results of Saturday's election, tabulated at noon today showed repeal still holding a lead of 54,000 votes. The tabulation accounted for 240 of the state's 254 counties, including 53 complete.

RUSSIAN AND U.S. RELATIONS ARE STRAINED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26.—The United States and Soviet Russia stood today at the parting of the ways in their official relations. A series of broken promises serve as milestones marking 22 months of troublesome relations.

In what was considered one of the most sharply worded diplomatic notes sent from Washington since the United States broke off relations with the central powers in 1917, this government warned that the "most serious consequences must result unless Moscow smoothes activities of the communists international organization in so far as it affects the United States."

The warning and demand were contained in a protest to the Soviet foreign office by William Ballitt. It called attention to activities of the Soviet communist organization and to promises made on Nov. 16, 1933 by Maxim Litvinoff, Soviet commissar for foreign affairs, for the basis on which diplomatic recognition was accorded the Soviet.

Peace Sets Its Price
In Great Sacrifices

For a people so anxious to keep out of war, we Americans do singularly little thinking about the price of remaining at peace.

We talk as if war were something that nations went into absent-mindedly. We assure ourselves that since the overwhelming majority of Americans don't want another war, we shall be able to stay out of it simply by an exercise of the will.

By talking and acting that way, we help to pave the way for a repetition of what happened in April, 1917.

What we need to understand is that peace has its price. It isn't something you can have by just wishing for it, in this modern world. You have to prepare for it, plan for it and make sacrifices for it.

George Soule, editor of the New Republic, discusses the price of peace in a recent issue of his magazine. He points out that sales of American goods to warring nations, visits of American business agents to war capitals, loans of American money and the presence of American ships in war zones got us into the last war and would almost certainly do the same thing in the next.

The one remedy, therefore, he adds, is to follow a different course.

"If we give up the old conception of the 'freedom of the seas' and do not try to protect our ships or goods they may bear to the belligerents," he writes, "if we do not attempt to guard the interests or lives of our citizens in the war zones, and if above all we prevent the growth of war trade with the belligerents by embargoing all loans and all shipments of contraband to them, most of the economic complications that entangled us in the last war will not be given a chance to weave their fatal web."

There, then, is the formula; simple, but expensive. Shall we have the nerve, as a nation, to apply it when that next European war breaks out?

It would mean, for instance, depriving our south of a market for half of its cotton, and out northwest of a market for half of its wheat. It would mean depriving our great industrial districts of the chance to grow rich and prosperous—the chance, also, to end our unemployment problem—out of war orders. It would mean refusing to let all the idle ships in our harbors go back to gainful employment.

In simple English, it would mean turning our back on the certainty of a year or more of top-speed prosperity.

It can be done—if we want to do it badly enough. It can't be done at all, however, if we fail to count the cost in advance. Unless we realize that remaining at peace in a world that has gone to war will call for sacrifices right out of the old pocketbook, we shall get into the next war just as we got into the last one—and for the same reasons.

Black's 30-Hour Work Week
Labor Bill Sidetracked

Senator Hugo Black of Alabama was responsible for a 30-hour week bill. Well, it has been sidetracked. The senate refused to substitute the bill for an administration sponsored measure "to fix wages and standards on government contracts." The Black substitute was defeated 61 to 33. It is important that a short time later imposition of code wages and hours on any industry dealing with the government "or operating with government money" was provided in a bill passed by the senate and sent to the house, where it is certain to receive an overwhelming majority report. Leaders of organized labor had declared its opposition to substitution of the Black bill for the Walsh bill "requiring government contractors to observe NRA labor standards."

The congress has voted billions to take labor from the dole, many huge projects are outlined in the program all for the benefit of labor and to provide jobs for those who are without jobs. All the American people are interested in the success of these projects, including highway building and all other government works. They are interested for the reason that they are the taxpayers of the republic and are willing to do all in their power with their influence and their pocket books to reduce the number of the unemployed in the United States.

All men who are able to work should be taken from the relief rolls. They should be glad of the opportunity to assist a patriotic and humane administration in bringing about the greatest of recovery programs and in the reducing of the army of the idle from the dole list to the salary list.

It required three republican administrations, beginning with Harding and ending with Hoover, to create the greatest army of unemployed known in American history or the history of any other nation.

It is sound business deduction that the great stumbling block to the development of some cities resolves itself down to just the lack of confidence between its citizens. Without the understanding of their city, its resources, its ambitions and an understanding of each other, how can they build for the future?

There are still a lot of gullible people in this world.

Big Benefit to
Farmers of Texas

STEPHENVILLE, Tex. — The importance of simple holes in the ground for wringing the greatest possible benefit from the huge Texas feed crop received emphasis from E. R. Eudaly, extension dairyman of Texas A. & M. College, in a talk to vocation agriculture men gathered at John Tarleton College from thirty-two Texas counties.

These holes in the ground, otherwise known as trench silos, are inexpensive and easy to construct. Properly made and used, they will

preserve feed for about seven years, at the end of which time they will yield twice as much food value as would the same feed six months after harvesting if used in the form of hay. It is more palatable than hay, and keeps free from dust and attacks from rats. Every farmer, Mr. Eudaly urged, should have a trench silo even if he has only two milk cows to feed, and has to cut the feed with a butcher knife.

In selecting the location for the so-called hole in the ground, it is wise to look around to see if erosion has not left a likely ditch somewhere on a gentle slope. If so, the farmer doesn't even have to dig. He can just manure the sides of the ditch to the proper slope, put the feed in, and cover it with water so that all air will be excluded. Then, after shoveling on

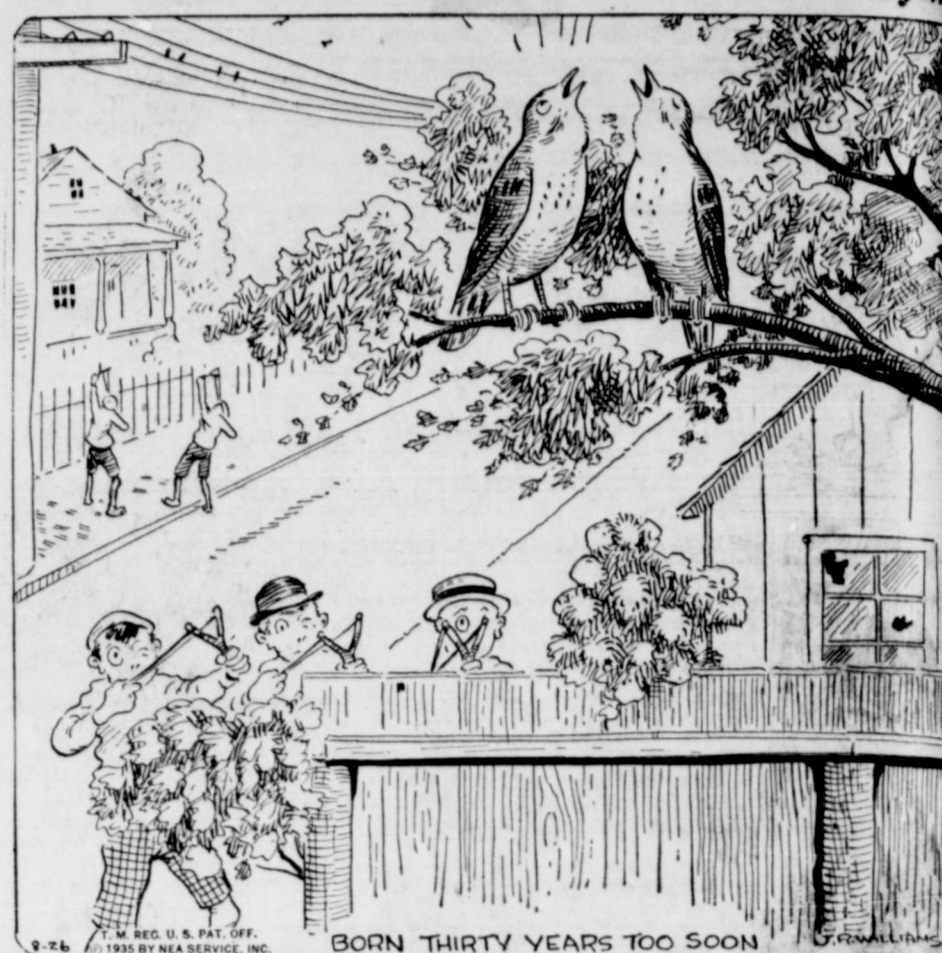
a very thick topping of dirt, he has some canned pasture ready to give his stock when the fresh pasture gives out.

In case it is necessary to dig the trench and it probably will be, it should be located on the slope of a hill and near water. The size of the trench will be determined by the size of the herd, since when it is once opened it is necessary to take off a slice of feed every day. For that reason, the width and depth should be that which will afford an adequate day's ration for the number of cattle to be fed. The length of the trench makes no difference.

Helpful hints Mr. Eudaly gave include these: Be sure to replace ALL the air with water, and to pile on so much dirt that no air can get in. Round up the top. Make future feeding easy by putting a

post at the top and bottom of the trench (which should be on a slope remember), and throwing over them a block and tackle cable equipped with tubs. Then the heavy lifting and carrying can be replaced with relatively negligible work.

Use only ripe feed for silage. Its sugar is its greatest value, and ripeness develops the sugar.

Provide an ample supply of silage. Then when feeding it, don't be stingy. Give the stock generous rations, and watch for improved production.

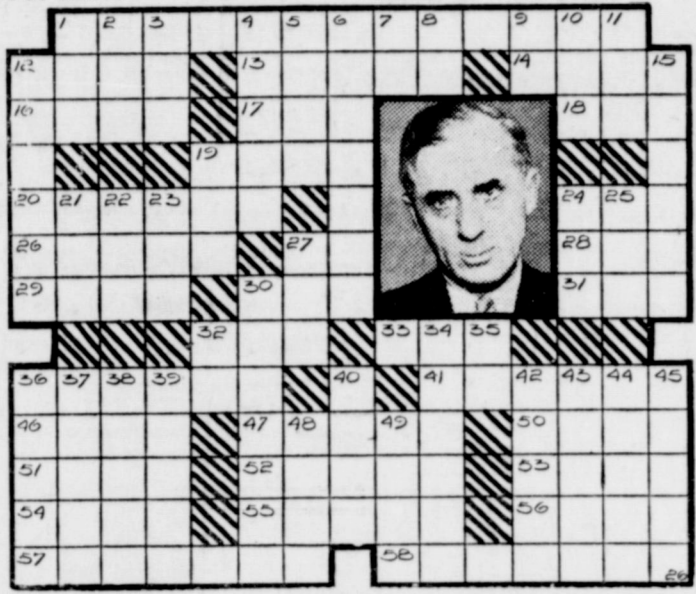
"But what are you going to do? I know you've got to have saved any money on you haven't been paying you."

TEXAS TOWNS ARE URGED TO GET IN WPA PROJECTS AS SOON AS POSSIBLE

SAN ANTONIO—Texans today face the challenge of President Roosevelt and of 147,387 of our own destitute citizens.

"The federal government must and will quit this business of direct relief," President Roosevelt has declared.

"We are tired of living on the dole. All that we ask is a chance to earn a livelihood." Certainly, that would be the sentiment of the vast number of Texans now being given relief allotments in lieu of work were their numbers polled today.

Works Progress Administration has been organized and has started operation in Texas for the essential purpose of giving jobs to every employable man and woman now registered on the relief rolls of the state. We have been allocated more than \$50,000,000 to expend toward wrecking the dole in every county and city in Texas.

That vital task has been placed squarely before WPA by the national administration. Our responsibility is yours in the counties and towns of Texas. We have the money to spend, you have the needed work projects and yours are the men and women who must have work.

Your task, and it is one which must be performed at once, is to decide how money may be spent to provide jobs for the largest possible number of unemployed in your district. The double incentive of providing work for the jobless and of securing needed public improvements of permanent benefit to your community is offered by WPA.

Procrastinate and you will hazard your own chances for reaping the benefits of worthwhile public improvements and you will be ignoring the plea of your destitute neighbors who await an opportunity to remove themselves from the morale-shattering influence of the dole.
