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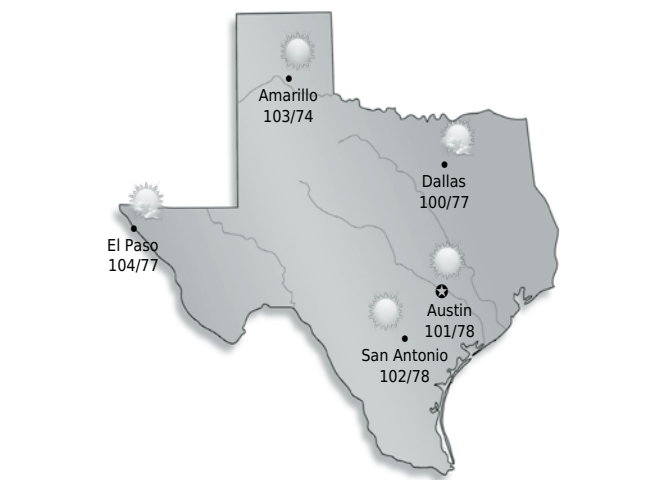

prominent Democrats backing her campaign. Along with Clinton and her eventual vice presidential pick, there are sure to be speeches from President Barack Obama, Vice President Joe Biden, first lady Michelle Obama and, of course, the candidate's husband, former President Bill Clinton. There's also Massachusetts Sen. Elizabeth Warren, a favorite of progressives and one of Trump's fiercest critics. Warren is on Clinton's running-mate shortlist but will surely be slotted for a prominent convention speech even if she's not selected.

By necessity as much as preference, Trump's team is crafting a far different lineup. Former House Speaker Newt Gingrich, one of the likely speakers, praised Trump's plan to use his celebrity connections to reach a broader audience.

"Trump understands

that if he can appeal to consumer America, he drowns political America," Gingrich told The Associated Press. He said he had little idea of what kind of show to expect, but recalled a recent conversation with a Trump family member who confidently told him, "We know how to do conventions."

"My children are all going to be speaking: Ivanka, Tiffany, Don, Eric. They're going to be speaking," Trump said Friday during an appearance at the Western Conservative Summit in Denver. "My wife is going to be speaking at the convention. We're going to have a great time."

Trump's campaign has also been in touch with aides to chief primary rival, Texas Sen. Ted Cruz, who has been trying to win a speaking slot. Other national leaders under consideration include former United Nations Ambassador John Bolton, West Virginia Sen. Shelley Moore Capito, Washington Rep. Cathy McMor-

ris Rodgers and Gingrich.

Some celebrities backing Trump have passed on the chance to be a part of the show. Among them: former Chicago Bears coach Mike Ditka, who told the Chicago Tribune last week, "I spoke with Mr. Trump this afternoon, and he invited me. But I don't think I'm going to go."

Clinton's speaking program, too, isn't without its uncomfortable riddles. There's no public sense yet of what role she'll give to Bernie Sanders, the Vermont senator whose surprisingly strong challenge in the Democratic primary has yet to officially come to an end. Sanders says he'll vote for Clinton, but he's yet to formally endorse her and is pushing for changes to the Democratic platform.

Ivanka Trump predicted in a recent radio interview the GOP convention would be "a great combination of our great politicians, but also great American businessmen and wom-

en and leaders across industry and leaders across really all sectors, from athletes to coaches and everything in between."

"I think it will be a convention unlike any we've ever seen," she said. "It will be substantive. It will be interesting. It will be different. It's not going to be a ho-hum lineup of, you know, the typical politicians."

And that will still leave room for complaints from Trump's Republican skeptics.

"Whatever you want to say about Trump,

Iraq: Death toll from weekend Baghdad attack reaches 175

BAGHDAD (AP) — As Iraqis mourned in shock and disbelief, more dead bodies were recovered Tuesday from the site of a massive Islamic State suicide bombing this weekend in central Baghdad, bringing the death toll to 175, officials said.

The staggering figure — one the worst bombings in 13 years of war in Iraq — has cast a pall on the Muslim holiday of Eid al-Fitr, which marks the end of the holy month of Ramadan and which begins Wednesday in Iraq.

An Islamic State suicide bomber struck Baghdad's bustling commercial area of Karada in the early hours on Sunday, when many residents were spending the night out, before the start of their dawn fast.

The bombing showed the IS capability for launching attacks beyond the front lines, despite battlefield losses elsewhere in the country.

Police and health officials, who spoke on condition of anonymity as they were not authorized to release the information, warned that there are still people missing and that the death toll could rise further.

Saudi Arabia names Pakistani man as suicide bomber in Medina

DUBAI, United Arab Emirates (AP) — Saudi Arabia on Tuesday identified the suicide bomber who struck outside one of Islam's holiest sites the day before as a Pakistani resident of the kingdom who arrived 12 years ago to work as a driver.

The suicide bombing Monday outside the sprawling mosque grounds where the Prophet Muhammad is buried in the western city of Medina killed four Saudi security troops and wounded five. Millions of Muslims from around the world visit the mosque every year as part of their pilgrimage to Mecca.

The governor of Mecca, Prince Faisal bin Salman, who is a son of King Salman, was shown on state television visiting security officers wounded in the blast and the site of the explosion, within hours of the blast.

No group has yet claimed responsibility for the Medina attack or two other attacks in the kingdom on the same day — one near the U.S. Consulate in Jiddah and the other at a Shiite mosque in the east of the country. The nature of the attacks and their apparently coordinated timing suggested the Islamic State group could be to blame.

An Interior Ministry statement issued on Tuesday identified the man as 34-year-old Abdullah Qalzar Khan. It said he lived in the nearby Red Sea port city of Jiddah with "his wife and her parents." The statement didn't elaborate.

Japanese bodies flown home, Dhaka officials search for clues

NEW DELHI (AP) — The bodies of the seven Japanese killed in a militant attack in Bangladesh returned home Tuesday as investigators in Dhaka searched for clues about the masterminds of the gruesome attack

that left 28 dead.

A Japanese government plane took the bodies back to Tokyo's Haneda Airport, where the boxes covered with white cloth were lowered slowly in pairs from the cargo bay of the Boeing 747 and lined up on the tarmac.

Japanese Foreign Minister Fumio Kishida, Bangladesh Ambassador Rabab Fatima and other officials laid bouquets between the boxes.

In Dhaka, authorities were still holding five of the 13 hostages rescued when commandos stormed the restaurant in Dhaka's diplomatic zone Saturday morning, killing six of the attackers and capturing one. All five are Bangladesh citizens.

Dhaka Police Commissioner Asaduzzaman Mia said Tuesday that authorities are still questioning some of the former hostages, including a former teacher at a private Dhaka university and the son of an industrialist. He declined to provide more details about the investigation.

Italian police arrest homeless man in death of US student

ROME (AP) — Italian police say they have detained a homeless man in the death of an American student whose body was found in the Tiber River.

Police identified the suspect as Massimo Galioto, a 40-year-old man from Rome. In a statement Tuesday, police said he was taken into custody because he was "seriously implicated" in the murder.

Police on Monday pulled the body of Beau Solomon from the Tiber River. The 19-year-old student from Wisconsin had last been seen early Friday morning at a pub, shortly after arriving in Rome.

John Cabot University, an English university in the Italian capital, confirmed his death on Monday evening.

Solomon had recently completed his first year as a personal finance major at the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Why Dump Trump effort faces likely defeat at GOP convention

WASHINGTON (AP) — Despite a continuing effort and lots of noise by a band of insurgents, Donald Trump and the Republican Party are on track to defeat rebels trying to head off his nomination at this month's convention.

Far from giving up, the "dump Trump" forces are seeking new supporters and spending money to run ads, hire staff and set up office space near the GOP convention site in Cleveland to try to prevent the real estate mogul from becoming the GOP presidential nominee. Here's why it will be hard for them to succeed: Numbers are stacked against the insurgents. Trump triumphed in the vast majority of this year's primaries and caucuses, giving him 1,542 delegates, according to *The Associated Press*. That's well above the 1,237 needed to clinch the nomination.

Clinton-related State Dept. records delays are mounting up

WASHINGTON (AP) — Just five

months before the presidential election, the State Department is under fire in courtrooms over its delays in turning over government files related to Hillary Clinton's tenure as secretary of state.

In one case, the agency warned it needed a 27-month delay, until October 2018, to turn over emails from Clinton's former aides, and the judge in another case, a lawsuit by *The Associated Press*, wondered aloud whether the State Department might be deliberately delaying until after the election.

"We're now reaching a point where there's mounting frustration that this is a project where the State Department may be running out the clock," said U.S. District Court Judge Richard J. Leon. The judge said he was considering imposing penalties on the agency if it failed to meet the next set of deadlines he orders. Leon wondered aloud at one point whether he might impose penalties for again failing to deliver records on time. He mused about "a fine on a daily basis" or "incarceration."

"I can't send the marshals, obviously, out to bring in the documents, at least they wouldn't know where to go, probably," Leon said.

Secretary of State John Kerry and other officials have said they are committed to public transparency, vowing that the State Department will improve its practices under the U.S. Freedom of Information Act. Last year, after an inspector general's audit harshly critical of the agency, Kerry appointed a "transparency coordinator," Janice Jacobs, and said the agency would "fundamentally improve our ability to respond to requests for our records."

Too dangerous to talk? Some cities explore 911 texting

NEW YORK (AP) — With gunshots ringing out just feet away, Eddie Justice hid in a bathroom in the Pulse nightclub in Orlando, Florida, and frantically texted his mother for help.

"Call police," he wrote. "I'm gonna die."

Moments later, he texted again: "Call them mommy. Now. He's coming."

Justice, who would later be confirmed among the 49 people killed in last month's attack, was among several victims who texted relatives to call 911, fearing they would draw too much attention by making voice calls.

None of them could text 911 directly because Orlando is among the vast

majority of U.S. cities that don't have that capability. But as active-shooter and hostage situations become more common, police departments are exploring technology that would allow dispatchers to receive texts, photos and videos in real time.

Working-class vote on EU reveals

Scotland-England split

MOTHERWELL, Scotland (AP) — Cooling towers, blast furnaces and coking coal. The grit and humor of steelworkers heading to early-morning shifts. That was Motherwell before the steelworks closed and the "Steelpolis" of Scotland became another tattered, post-industrial town trying to find its place in a service economy.

Had this been south of the border, maybe Robert Butcher, whose father lost his job when the Ravenscraig steelworks closed in 1992, would have channeled his resentment toward the European Union. But unlike many blue-collar voters in England and Wales, Butcher doesn't see how leaving the 28-nation bloc would benefit declining industrial towns like Motherwell that were once the backbone of the sprawling British Empire.

"Britain is not what it was. It thinks it is. But it's not. And it's as simple as that," said Butcher, a 52-year-old metal worker, fixing his car in the front of an abandoned home not far from the former Ravenscraig worksite.

In one of the defining splits of last week's EU referendum, all 32 council areas in Scotland as well as Northern Ireland went against their southern neighbors and voted for Britain to stay in the bloc. Even towns shattered by the demise of shipyards, coal mines and steelworks made the calculus that quitting the EU wouldn't turn things around for them.

"I think it's a lot to do with the Scottish independence movement," said Tasmina Ahmed-Sheikh, one of the 54 legislators representing the Scottish National Party in the British Parliament.

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NASA's Juno spacecraft enters Jupiter orbit

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — Braving intense radiation, a NASA spacecraft reached Jupiter on Monday after a five-year voyage to begin exploring the king of the planets.

Ground controllers at the NASA Jet Propulsion Laboratory and Lockheed Martin erupted in applause when the solar-powered Juno spacecraft beamed home news that it was circling Jupiter's poles.

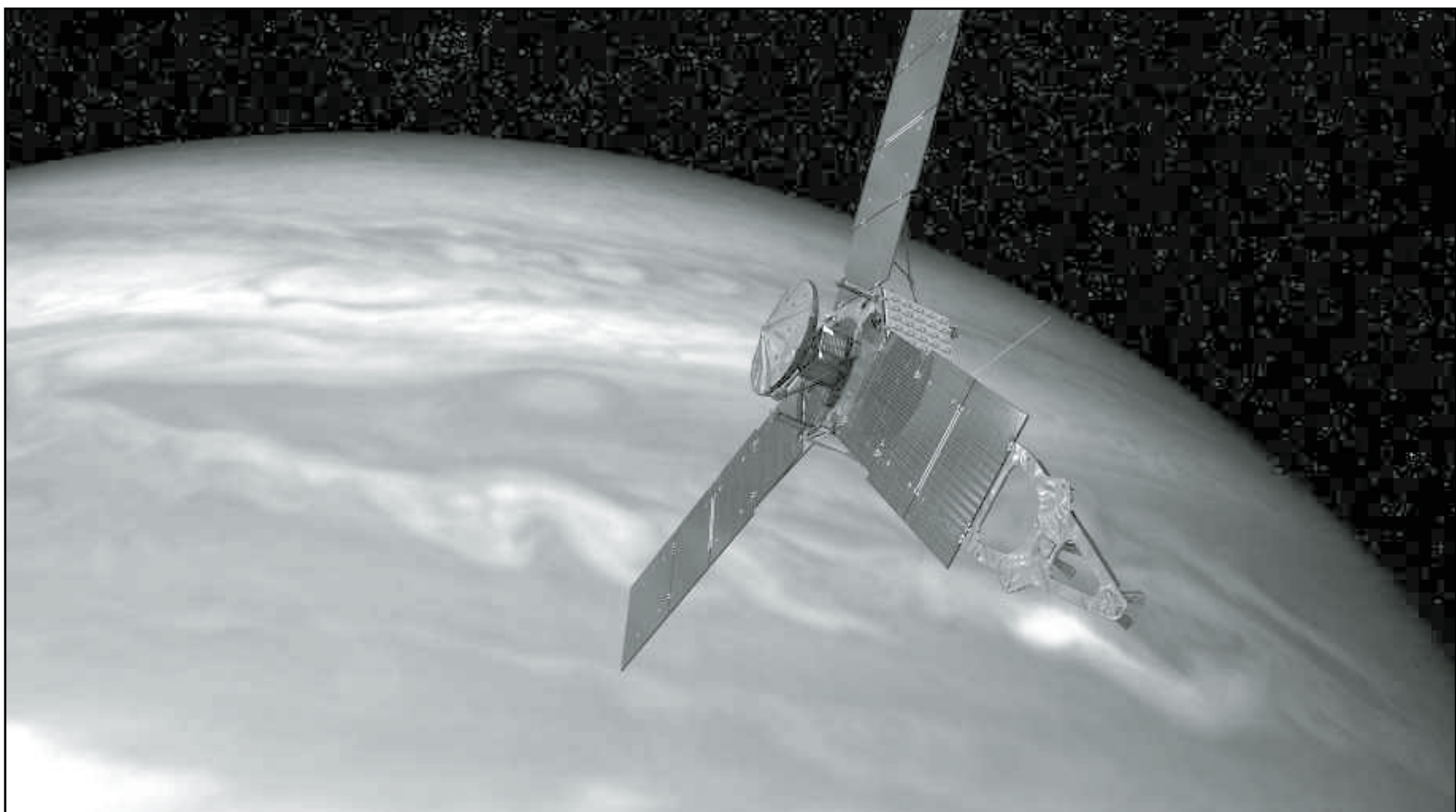
The arrival at Jupiter was dramatic. As Juno approached its target, it fired its rocket engine to slow itself down and gently slipped into orbit. Because of the communication time lag between Jupiter and Earth, Juno was on autopilot when it executed the tricky move.

"Juno, welcome to Jupiter," said mission control commentator Jennifer Delavan of Lockheed Martin, which built Juno.

Mission managers said early reports indicated Juno was healthy and performed flawlessly.

The spacecraft's camera and other instruments were switched off for arrival, so there weren't any pictures at the moment it reached its destination. Afterward, NASA released a time-lapse video taken last week during the approach, showing Jupiter glowing yellow in the distance and its four inner moons dancing around it.

The view yielded a surprise: Jupiter's second-largest moon, Callisto,

appeared dimmer than initially thought. Scientists have promised close-up views of the planet when Juno skims the cloud tops during the 20-month, \$1.1 billion mission.

The fifth rock from the sun and the heftiest planet in the solar system, Jupiter is what's known as a gas giant — a ball of hydrogen and helium — unlike rocky Earth and Mars.

With its billowy clouds and colorful stripes, Jupiter is an extreme world that likely formed first, shortly after the sun.

Unlocking its history may hold clues to understanding how Earth and the rest of the solar

system developed.

Named after Jupiter's cloud-piercing wife in Roman mythology, Juno is only the second mission designed to spend time at Jupiter.

Galileo, launched in 1989, circled Jupiter for nearly a decade, beaming back splendid views of the planet and its numerous moons. It uncovered signs of an ocean beneath the icy surface of the moon Europa, considered a top target in the search for life outside Earth.

Juno's mission: To peer through Jupiter's cloud-socked atmosphere and map the interior from a unique vantage point above the poles. Among the lin-

gering questions: How much water exists? Is there a solid core? Why are Jupiter's southern and northern lights the brightest in the solar system?

There's also the mystery of its Great Red Spot.

Recent observations by the Hubble Space Telescope revealed the centuries-old monster storm in Jupiter's atmosphere is shrinking.

The trek to Jupiter, spanning nearly five years and 1.8 billion miles (2.8 billion kilometers), took Juno on a tour of the inner solar system followed by a swing past Earth that catapulted it beyond the asteroid belt between

Mars and Jupiter.

Along the way, Juno became the first spacecraft to cruise that far out powered by the sun, beating Europe's comet-chasing Rosetta spacecraft. A trio of massive solar wings sticks out from Juno like blades from a windmill, generating 500 watts of power to run its nine instruments.

In the coming days, Juno will turn its instruments back on, but the real work won't begin until late August when the spacecraft swings in closer. Plans called for Juno to swoop

within 3,000 miles (5,000 kilometers) of Jupiter's clouds — closer than previous missions — to map the planet's gravity and magnetic fields in order to learn about the interior makeup.

Juno is an armored spacecraft — its computer and electronics are locked in a titanium vault to shield them from harmful radiation. Even so, Juno is expected to get blasted with radiation equal to more than 100 million dental X-rays during the mission.

Colosseum sparkles after renovation

ROME (AP) — The Colosseum has emerged more imposing than ever after its most extensive restoration, a multimillion-euro cleaning to remove a dreary, undignified patina of soot and grime from the ancient arena, which has been assailed for decades by pollution in traffic-clogged Rome. Footing the bill is shoe-and-luxury goods maker Tod's. In an act of modern-day cultural patronage, company founder Diego Della Valle responded to a

government call to the private sector to help Italy's chronically anemic coffers to care for its immense art and archaeological treasures. And buoyed by the brighter look of the Colosseum's restoration, which was officially unveiled on Friday, Italy's culture minister, Dario Franceschini, announced that 18 million euros (\$20 million) have been found to replace, by the end of 2018, the arena's long vanished floor with one that could support modern-day en-

tertainment, although monument-rocking rock concerts have been ruled out.

The stage would be used for "cultural events of the highest level," Franceschini said.

The exterior cleaning cost some 6.5 million euros (\$7.2 million). Tod's is paying 25 million euros for the entire project, whose next steps include constructing a visitors' center with a cafeteria and shoring up the bottom, where gladiators prepped.

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Durant chooses Golden State Warriors to sign Thunder star, Mavs get Bogut and Barnes

OAKLAND, Calif. — Kevin Durant decided his best chance for “growth” means leaving his beloved Oklahoma City behind for a big move out West to join the star-studded, record-setting Golden State Warriors and play alongside Splash Brothers Stephen Curry and Klay Thompson.

In the most anticipated move of the NBA offseason, Durant announced his decision Monday on The Players’ Tribune. His contract is for \$54 million over two years and includes a player option, a person with knowledge of the deal said Monday, speaking on condition of anonymity because details weren’t made public. Durant’s move will become official as soon as Thursday, when free agents can sign their new contracts.

Independence Day, indeed.

“The primary mandate I had for myself in making this decision was to have it based on the potential for my growth as a player — as that has always steered me in the right direction,” Durant said in the article.

“But I am also at a point in my life where it is of equal importance to find an opportunity that encourages my evolution as a man: moving out of my comfort zone to a new city and community which offers the greatest potential for my contribution and personal growth. With this in mind, I have decided that I am going to join the Golden State Warriors.”

And the 2015 champion Warriors, who squandered a 3-1 NBA Finals lead to lose to LeBron James and the Cavaliers last month, know how tough Durant is in any lineup: They rallied from down 3-1 to beat Durant and the Thunder in a seven-game Western Conference Finals.

Golden State applied a full-court press to land Durant. On Friday in the Hamptons, the Warriors sent owner Joe Lacob, general manager

Bob Myers, coach of the year Steve Kerr, Curry and Thompson to meet with the 6-foot-9 superstar.

Also Monday, the Warriors reached a one-year agreement with unrestricted free agent center Zaza Pachulia, a person with knowledge of the negotiations said. He spent last season with Dallas, averaging 8.6 points, 9.4 rebounds and 1.7 assists.

Durant, the 2014 MVP and four-time scoring champion, led the Thunder to the NBA Finals in 2012 and to the Western Conference finals in four of the past six years — and he’s only 27. He recovered from a broken bone

in his right foot that cost him much of last season to post one of the best years of his career.

Durant met with the Thunder, Warriors, Los Angeles Clippers, Boston Celtics, San Antonio Spurs and Miami Heat once teams could begin negotiating with free agents.

With the addition of Durant, the Warriors become the league’s latest team to add a superstar chasing a championship to a lineup of All-Stars.

James made the move from Cleveland to Miami in 2010, joining a lineup that featured Dwyane Wade and

Chris Bosh. They reached four NBA Finals as a group and won two championships.

“I’m from Washington, D.C. originally, but Oklahoma City truly raised me. It taught me so much about family as well as what it means to be a man,” Durant said.

“There are no words to express what the organization and the community mean to me, and what they will represent in my life and in my heart forever. The memories and friendships are something that go far beyond the

Cowboys’ Romo, Bryant not worried about their timing as camp nears

IRVING — Tony Romo and Dez Bryant planned to spend some time together throwing and catching during the break between offseason workouts and training camp.

Now that it’s been four years since the last offseason together for the Dallas quarterback and his top receiver, logic says they’re trying to make up for lost time after a lost season marked by major injuries to both.

Romo says otherwise.

“Timing and everything is going to be fine,” Romo said on the final day of minicamp in mid-June. “It’s just a matter of him feeling comfortable with the nuances of the game that really separate someone like Dez from others.”

The 36-year-old Romo just enjoyed his first full offseason since 2012, talking confidently about being another year removed from a series of back issues — despite missing 12 games

last year with a twice-broken left collarbone that was the biggest reason the Cowboys slid from first to worst in the NFC East.

But Bryant missed all the significant offseason work for the second straight year since his 2014 All-Pro season that helped Dallas to the division title and its first playoff victory since 2009.

Last year, he was out because he wanted a long-term contract instead of the one-year deal that came with the franchise tag. This year, the Cowboys took a cautious approach with the right foot that Bryant broke in the 2015 opener, ultimately sidelining him seven games and leading to a pair of surgeries, along with career lows in catches, yards and touchdowns.

As he watched an offseason practice alongside a few reporters last month, Bryant was asked if he expected to be at full speed for the opening of camp July 30 in Oxnard, California. With a nod toward associate athletic trainer

Rangers sliding, fall to Red Sox 12-5

BOSTON (AP) — The Texas Rangers have hit a rough stretch. Injuries to three of their starting pitchers is starting to catch up.

Brock Holt homered, Sandy Leon had three of Boston’s season-high nine doubles, and the Red Sox pounded Texas’ pitching for 13 extra-base hits in a 12-5 victory over the Rangers Monday.

“We’ve got to be better,” Rangers manager Jeff Banister said. “We’ve got to find a way to pitch. It is a challenging time when

these days do happen.”

The Rangers are minus starters Yu Darvish, Derek Holland and Colby Lewis — all on the disabled list. Darvish looks closest to a return. He’s scheduled to make a rehab start for Double-A Frisco Monday.

Rougned Odor hit a solo homer and two-run single for the Rangers, who have lost five of six.

Nick Martinez (1-2) gave up six runs on 11 hits in 4 1/3 innings. The righty was making his third start in Darvish’s spot.

“Got away from the game plan a little bit in the first

inning and then got back to the game plan and then fell behind guys as the game went on,” Martinez said.

Bannister had a simpler answer what went wrong.

“It was a tough day for Nick,” he said.

Mookie Betts hit a two-run homer, Travis Shaw and Dustin Pedroia each added a solo homer for Boston, which equaled the most extra-base hits the Rangers have ever allowed. The Red Sox also put up 13 against them in Fenway Park in 2013.

HOUSTON (AP) — Of all the good things Astros starter Lance McCullers did on Monday, manager A.J. Hinch was most impressed with the poise the 22-year-old showed in escaping a couple of jams.

not pressing too much in those situations. ... It’s a good sight to see as he’s developing.”

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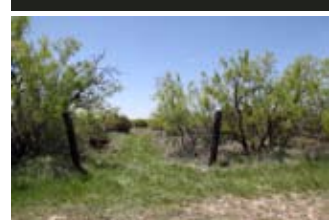

Over the long haul, a player will miss many more simple plays than complicated ones, if only because the simple plays occur far more often. Reducing errors in this area should be the primary goal of all players trying to improve their game.

Take this case where South failed to make four hearts after committing an error that should have been easy to avoid. West led the king of clubs

and continued with the queen, ruffed by South. Declarer cashed the A-K of spades and ruffed a spade in dummy, then led the ten of hearts and finessed after East followed low.

West won with the ace and had no trouble finding the proper return of the jack of spades. Declarer ruffed with dummy's eight, and East over-ruffed with the queen. East returned a club, and declarer later lost a diamond trick to go down one.

South missed his cue at the critical moment when he ruffed the fourth round of spades in dummy, knowing full well that East would be able to overruff with the queen. East could not have had another spade, and he was furthermore certain to have the queen of hearts, since dummy's ten had forced West's ace on the preceding trick.

Instead, South should have discarded a diamond from dummy when West led the jack of spades. This would have allowed him to trump a diamond in dummy later on and so would have greatly reduced the possibility of East's scoring a trick with the queen of hearts.

In the actual deal, the diamond discard from dummy would have been well-rewarded, and South's only losers would have been a spade, a heart and a club.

Today is Tuesday, July 5, the 187th day of 2016. There are 179 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On July 5, 1946, the bikini, created by Louis Reard (ray-AHRD'), was modeled by Micheline Bernardini during a poolside fashion show in Paris.

On this date:

In 1687, Isaac Newton first published his Principia Mathematica, a three-volume work setting out his mathematical principles of natural philosophy.

In 1811, Venezuela became the first South American country to declare independence from Spain.

In 1865, the Secret Service Division of the U.S. Treasury Department was founded in Washington, D.C. with the mission of suppressing counterfeit currency.

In 1935, President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed the National Labor Relations Act.

In 1940, during World War II, Britain and the Vichy government in France broke off diplomatic relations.

In 1947, Larry Doby made his debut with the Cleveland Indians, becoming the first

black player in the American League.

In 1948, Britain's National Health Service Act went into effect, providing publicly-financed medical and dental care.

In 1954, Elvis Presley's first commercial recording session took place at Sun Records in Memphis, Tennessee; the song he recorded was "That's All Right."

In 1962, independence took effect in Algeria; the same day, civilians of European descent, mostly French, came under attack by extremists in the port city of Oran.

In 1975, Arthur Ashe became the first black man to win a Wimbledon singles title as he defeated Jimmy Connors, 6-1, 6-1, 5-7, 6-4. The Cape Verde (VUHR'-dee) Islands officially became independent after five centuries of Portuguese rule.

In 1984, the Supreme Court weakened the 70-year-old "exclusionary rule," deciding that evidence seized in good faith with defective court warrants could be used against defendants in criminal trials.

In 1991, a worldwide financial scandal erupted as regulators in eight countries shut down the Bank of Credit and Commerce International. Actress Mildred Dunnock died in Oak Bluffs, Massachusetts, at age 90.

er Kenneth Lay, who was facing decades in prison for one of the most sprawling business frauds in U.S. history, died in Aspen, Colorado, at age 64. (As a result, Lay's convictions were vacated.)

Five years ago: A jury in Orlando, Florida, found Casey Anthony, 25, not guilty of murder, manslaughter and child abuse in the 2008 disappearance and death of her 2-year-old daughter, Caylee.

One year ago: Greek voters overwhelmingly rejected demands by international creditors for more austerity measures in exchange for a bailout of their bankrupt economy. The first pope from Latin America, Francis, landed in Ecuador, returning to South America for the first time bearing a message of solidarity with the region's poor.

game. Those invaluable relationships are what made this deliberation so challenging. “It really pains me to know that I will disappoint so many people with this choice, but I believe I am doing what I feel

is the right thing at this point in my life and my playing career.”

But the Warriors will have to move players to make room for Durant.

Golden State and Dallas have agreed on a deal to send center Andrew Bogut to the Mavericks, a person with knowledge of the deal told the AP.

Before Durant announced his

move, Bogut removed all references to the Warriors from his Twitter page, which afterward featured a photo of the 7-footer in an Australia jersey.

The Mavericks also will sign Harrison Barnes to a max four-year, \$94 million deal after Golden State renounces his rights and he becomes an unrestricted free agent, a person told the AP.

Britt Brown, he essentially said it was out of his hands.

A few days later, though, he dismissed the same question with a curt “of course” while surrounded by reporters at his locker.

“Can’t wait. But I have to be patient,” said Bryant, who got his big contract at five years and \$70 million just before camp last year. “As soon as training camp comes, you’re going to see the big smile running on the field, ready to go. Get to do what I love. Can’t wait.”

Romo missed the off-season in 2013 because he was just a few weeks removed from back surgery. He was limited again a year later after another surgery when he injured his back late in the season against Washington. Then no Bryant in 2015, and a limited Bryant this year.

“The hard part is having the defensive back right in front of your face and dealing some of those other little things,” Romo said about Bryant. “But he’s played the game long enough that it won’t take him much time. We just need him healthy. And when he’s healthy, that stuff comes very fast.”

Offensive coordinator Scott Linehan tends to take the optimistic view of such absences. When Romo was mostly on the sideline in the spring of Linehan’s first year with Dallas in 2014, the former St. Louis coach spoke of valuable time for then-backup Brandon Weeden and others.

With Bryant mostly watching this spring, Linehan liked to speak of No. 2 receiver Terance Williams, diminutive slot specialist Cole Beasley, and others. Plus, Linehan sees a difference between what amounted to a holdout from Bryant last year and the presence this year of someone eager to regain his All-Pro form.

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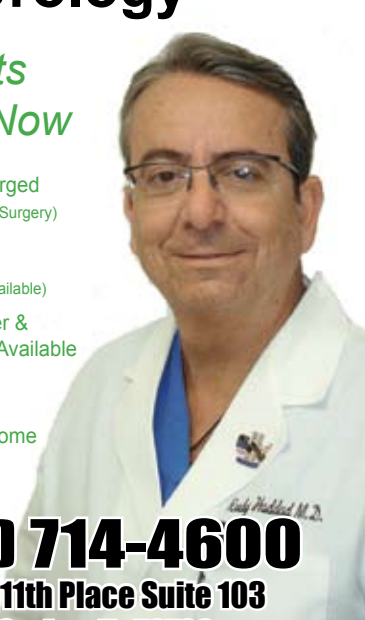
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
