HOME TOWN TALK

Several citizens have lately asked whether there is any reason why right-hand turns should not be allowed on red signals at downtown intersections; whether that change in the existing rule, which enforces a stop until the green light flashes, would increase danger to pedestrians or cause any further tangle in motor traffic.

Let us right here commend the decision to install six additional traffic signal lights at busy intersections.

Some cities have found the right-turn-on-a-red-light rule practicable. However, they require vehicles to come to a stop before taking a right turn facing the red.

Big Spring traffic is thicker, block for block, than any town its size in the state, we venture. Traffic control is highly important. Our natural topography, with several nice, slanting paved streets, offers strong temptation for some folks who have little regard for the lives of others, or themselves either, to attempt speed records on city streets.

They ought to be fined plenty.

As we have said before, there will have to be motorcycle officers sooner or later. Some of our people dread the idea. Just why, we cannot say, unless they like to speed or have friends who like to. This idea that a stranger in town ought not to be called down for violating traffic regulations, including the speed limit doesn't carry much weight. Officers ought to use common sense with them. If there is anybody in the world who needs a lot of common sense it is a police officer. Their task is not to be able to butt into as many chances of using their guns or billies as possible but to have enough tact, diplomacy and forethought to be able to handle every situation without using those weapons.

It's a lot more difficult to know when to use a billy or a gun than to learn to shoot straight with one.

Strangers ought to be accorded courtesies. The city or society gains nothing by running a visitor or a tourist in for a minor infraction. We have, by the way, heard no complaints of late concerning handling of traffic cases. Of course once in awhile some good guy gets slightly brewed and runs a red one, and then feels that he has been wronged to the tune of two or three dollars. We've all felt that way. Who ever laughed when handed a ticket?

If you want to get a good lesson in just what you can do with some care and a little money take a look at the "front yard" of the high school building. A year ago it was an eye sore of there ever was one. Now it is a restful, beautiful sight, with a fine terrace, new walks and an almost solid carpet of grass, well kept.

The City Park, the improved scenic drive, beautification already given the Court House square, and the high school improvements are sure and pleasing signs that we're paying more attention to how we look.

EXPLORER HOME FROM CONQUEST

Metropolis Outdoes Itself; Becomes "Doctor" Byrd

NEW YORK, June 19 (AP)—Aerial conqueror of both ends of the earth, Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd set foot again today at 10:40 a. m. (EST) on the turf of lower Manhattan, from which he sailed 20 months ago on a pilgrimage of exploration into the white wastes of Antarctica.

Roaring Welcome
Surrounded in sea and sky and on the land by a roaring welcome in which planes and harbor craft and cheering thousands joined, he debarbed from the city welcoming tug Macon to receive greetings from the city of New York the third and by far the most boisterous greeting it has tended to him for his achievements of exploration by air.

Streaming along behind the Macon were fifty or more harbor craft of all descriptions, as spectacular a marine demonstration as New York had seen since Colonel Lindbergh came back from Paris. As the parade passed Governor's Island, salute guns roared thirteen times.

Whistle and siren handles were tied down on passing tugs, and big liners on both the Brooklyn and Manhattan shores added their deep throated salutes. Fire boats played streams of water into the air, their thin white spray, touched by the sun, making a back drop of rainbows.

As the Macon nosed into Pier 4, the crowd on shore added its voice to that of the harbor craft. The admiral stepped ashore at 10:40.

Bands
A moment later he and his party were in automobiles and swung out of Battery Place, preceded by bands and a military and police escort, into the canyon of Lower Broadway.

As far up the street as the eye could see a solid wall of people closed in, leaving only a narrow passageway. Admiral Byrd had boarded the Macon half an hour before from his barque, the City of New York, at quarantine. The first person he greeted was his mother, whom he held in a warm embrace for a moment, then turned to other relatives and friends.

"It's good to get back again," he said smiling, as he greeted the city from the radio telephone aboard the Macon. "It's good to have this reception."

To Reporters
Then, turning to the reporters, he spoke of the serious business which took him to the Antarctic and of what his expedition had accomplished there.

First, he said, they had discovered and explored 125,000 square miles of land, existence of which had only been surmised before. They found rock formations indicating great coal deposit, of commercial significance. They photographed miles on miles of ice covered terrain and they definitely established the need in Antarctica of a permanent weather station.

The thing for which he was most thankful, he said, was that he had brought his expedition all safely home.

"All my men have come back safe," he said feelingly, "for which we must thank providence."

The admiral said he had no future plans and would not undertake further expeditions until a \$100,000 debt remaining from this expedition was cleared away.

"There's not much left to explore there?" he was asked.

More To Find

"Oh, yes," he answered quickly. "There are thousands of miles of unexplored lands in South America and Antarctica and as long as there is land no one has seen, man will continue to seek it."

Mrs. Byrd, who was prevented by high seas from boarding the City of New York last night from a specially chartered tug, was not down the bay today to meet her distinguished husband.

Relatives said she had not returned from the futile trip out to Antarctica.

Davidson Quits Governor's Race

HOUSTON, June 19 (AP)—Lynch Davidson, Houston lumberman, today announced that he was withdrawing as a candidate for the democratic gubernatorial nomination.

Mr. Davidson never formally announced his candidacy but friends "drafted" him, placing his name on the ticket. At the Austin meeting of the state democratic executive committee he did not ask to be left off the slate and accordingly was certified as a candidate.

Mr. Davidson's statement announcing that he would not run called upon the people to vote for better government "and no more taxes."

"I wish I deemed it wise," said the former lieutenant governor's statement, "to accept the 'draft' of my friends and others who paid their own \$100 to place my name on the ticket."

"I did not withdraw my name from the ticket at the state executive committee meeting, believing it was better to view the situation further before making a definite decision. In my judgment, most of the many number who are now contesting for the governor's office are professional politicians, seeking the office solely for selfish reasons. The election of Love, Mayfield or Ferguson would be a great drawback to the interest and welfare of Texas. If my remaining on the ticket would assure their defeat, I should not hesitate to do so for a single moment. On the other hand, it is possible my remaining on the ticket might further scatter the votes and serve to bring about their election. For the good of Texas and for that reason only I have decided to withdraw my name from the ticket, believing Texas may probably thus be best served."

Abilene Suicide Puzzles Friend

"A fine fellow, university graduate, faithful member of the Sigma Chi fraternity—a soldier of fortune."

That was, in brief, the description of W. P. Patmore, Los Angeles, who shot himself near Abilene Tuesday as given by Elmer Dink of Long Beach, who visited here Thursday and talked with Patmore, his friend of several years. Patmore met his death a few hours before he died. Dial said he could not understand why Patmore would take his own life.

Dial said Patmore had always had money, and a luxurious wardrobe. Meeting him accidentally after four years, Dial said the dead man chatted amiably, said he was "getting along fine" and said before going to his room that "I'll see you down here in the lobby in the morning. I'm going to clean up and get some rest."

Abilene, Texas, June 18 (AP)—Without funds and too chivalrous to borrow from women traveling companions, was the motive adopted by police today for the suicide yesterday near here of Walter P. Patmore, Los Angeles, Calif., world war veteran.

Patmore and Mrs. Beryl Polley and her daughter, also of Los Angeles, traveled together from California to Oklahoma City, where Mrs. Polley met her husband. After a visit Polley left for the east on a business trip and Patmore departed with the women in a car for the return journey to California, police said. Patmore attempted to leave the party in Dallas, saying he desired to visit his mother in Quebec, Canada.

Urged by the women to continue the trip he came with them to Abilene Monday night. When they were unable to find Patmore Tuesday morning, Mrs. Polley and daughter believed he had gone to his mother, and left by bus for their home. They were stopped at Pecos and returned, after Patmore's dead body was found in a pasture off an isolated lane near here. He had been shot through the temple with a .22-caliber pistol.

According to attendants at a garage, Patmore paid his last \$50 there for storage of his automobile.

Saturday Elbow Contract Date

Contract for the construction of a new school building in the Elbow community will be awarded Saturday, June 28, it was announced today by Miss Pauline Cantrell, county superintendent.

DEATH TO BE ASKED BY STATE

Precautions Against Violence Taken By Officers

(Special To The Herald)

LAMESA, June 19.—Lines of questioning of veniremen by counsel in the trial of Ira McKee, former Ranger man, charged with murder, indicated the probable defense as insanity and self defense. The case was called this morning in the 106th district court with Judge Gordon B. McGuire of Lamesa presiding.

Fourteen veniremen of the special panel of 113 had been examined at the noon recess. Of these the defense had excused four, the state three and five excused by the court.

Two jurors, E. L. Sorrels, a lumberman of O'Donnell and Karl Kelley, a farmer, had been sent to the jury room as members of the jury.

Thomas L. Price, Tahoka, district attorney, announced at the opening of the trial that "the state will demand the death penalty in this case." Mr. Price conducted the examination of veniremen for the state.

H. J. Sheard, of Hobbs, N. M., former Fort Worth attorney, head of the defense staff, examined the veniremen on behalf of the accused, from his line of questioning of jurors, he indicated that McKee would plead that he had shot W. R. Billingsley, the slain man, in self defense because the Sparenberg merchant had appeared at the moment of the alleged holdup armed with a shotgun.

J. C. Billingsley, brother of the slain man, sat with the prosecution. He assisted in the selection or rejection of members of the jury.

Seated between counsel for the defense, H. J. Sheard and J. C. Williams, the latter also of Hobbs, was McKee. For a good part of the morning he held his little niece, daughter of his sister, Mrs. Nell Johnson of Breckenridge, on his lap. He sat with his back to the jury box and the witness stand, where the members of the jury panel were placed for questioning.

Of the original 125 members of the panel, twelve were excused from service by Judge McGuire for one reason or another.

The court room was filled at the opening of the trial. When 112 members of the jury had left the room there were some seats left for a time, but within a short time all had been filled.

Chief Deputy Sheriff Buck Bennett and his aides searched all the men entering the court room for firearms. Mrs. Joe L. Ray, sheriff, and her sister, Miss Irma Sprawl, searched the women.

LAMESA, June 19.—Change of venue is to be asked by defense attorneys in trial of Ira McKee, charged with murder for the slaying of W. R. Billingsley, a store owner at Sparenberg; it was indicated as the case opened in district court Thursday morning.

A. T. Fares Will Be Hiked

NEW YORK, June 19.—Closely heels of announcement by Madison Air Lines that fares on routes would be changed basis of 7c per mile comes news by F. G. Coburn, president of American Airways, Inc., transportation subsidiary of the American Corporation of which Eastern Air Transport is a unit, that fares of that system will be hiked to a similar basis effective July 1.

"If action is necessary," he said, "it will be because of lack of patronage for our planes have been load-capacity in most instances. It has been necessary frequently to request passengers to take trips until the following day, especially since the drastic reduction—from 10c and 12c to 5 1-2c—made in fares of this year, when our passenger business increased from 400 per cent. However, even present loads and equipment not possible to carry passengers at a railroad-plus-pullman fare at severe loss. The new basis will permit us to come breaking even, and we do anticipate any material falling in the number of passengers carried. It is entirely possible, with conditions throughout the year as they are during the summer months, the large amount of travel, and the increased popularity with plane travel has been brought about through experiments, that it will be. This is borne out by evidence of two of our lines. The division of New York-Boston has been doing a fine business on a fare of 8 1-2c per mile. When Embury-Riddle, operating in Chicago, Indianapolis and Miami slightly increased its fare May 10, the business still continued its steady growth. While the increase is not substantial to the individual traveler, amount in the aggregate will be as far as our income from passenger operations is concerned. In conjunction with probable fact that all air mail operators receive through passage of McNary-Watres bill, which method of compensating port companies for the carrying of mail, it should materially increase our ability to maintain, perhaps expand, our service to the public."

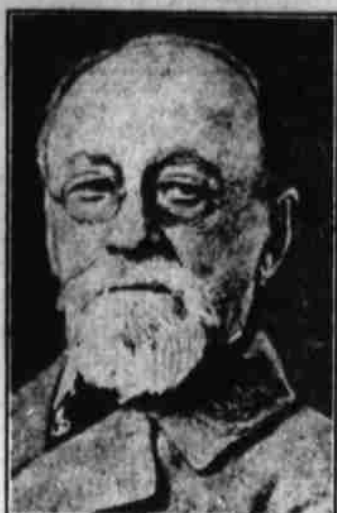

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Forward Protests Against New Rates

WASHINGTON, June 19 (AP)—All foreign protests against rates in the Smoot-Hawley tariff bill will be forwarded by the state department to the White House and the tariff commission.

The last communication was received by the department and forwarded to congress on June 2. The French government then submitted data relating to rates on imitation pearls, silks and silk stockings.

Department officials said today that while all communications received previous to the enactment of the tariff act had been sent to congress, the law now was in force and protests regarding it no longer would be needed at the capital but would be turned over to the tariff commission, which will deal with rate changes.

FRANCE PROTESTS

PARIS, June 19 (AP)—The committee on customs of the chamber of deputies in an order adopted today unanimously requested Premier Tardieu to make representations to the United States government against enforcement of the new tariff bill, and, failing to obtain satisfaction, the committee recommends suppression of the most favored nation clause between the United States and France.

Submit Report of Senate Lobby Body

WASHINGTON, June 19 (AP)—The report of the senate lobby committee on its examination of Bishop James Cannon, Jr., was submitted to the senate today by Chairman Caraway.

It consisted of a transcript of the bishop's examinations which showed he refused to answer questions about his 1928 anti-Smith activities. The committee agreed not to compel the Southern Methodist churchman to answer.

Senator Blaine, republican, Wisconsin, has contended that when the report was presented to the senate, Vice President Curtis was required by law to cite the bishop to the United States attorney for possible contempt proceedings. However, Chairman Caraway and at least one other committee member have disagreed with Blaine. They contended the bishop had not legally refused to answer because the committee decided it had no authority to question Cannon about his political activities.

Florence said the money was not taken in cash but was handled through an account and withdrawn after Dillard left.

The plaintiff seek to have judgment in a suit settled in 1926 set aside and cancelled.

On March 31, 1926, R. C. Oliver was awarded judgment against Jewel Whittinghill and husband, J. C. Whittinghill, in the amount of \$3,115. Mrs. Whittinghill was the daughter of Oliver's wife. The suit was lodged by Oliver seeking judgment for equity in jewelry in possession of his wife at the time of her death.

To satisfy the judgment certain land passed into possession of Oliver.

In the suit filed today in district court, the plaintiffs, Alvina Whittinghill and husband seek to have the judgment in the initial cause set aside, ask that writs of attachment issued in the cause be quashed and vacated, seek cancellation of sheriff's deeds executed to R. C. Oliver by Howard and Scurry county sheriffs, plead that plaintiffs in the original case take nothing for their judgment, and request that

plaintiffs in the latter case recover title to and possession of interest in the property involved in the litigation. R. G. Hughes of San Angelo represents the plaintiffs.

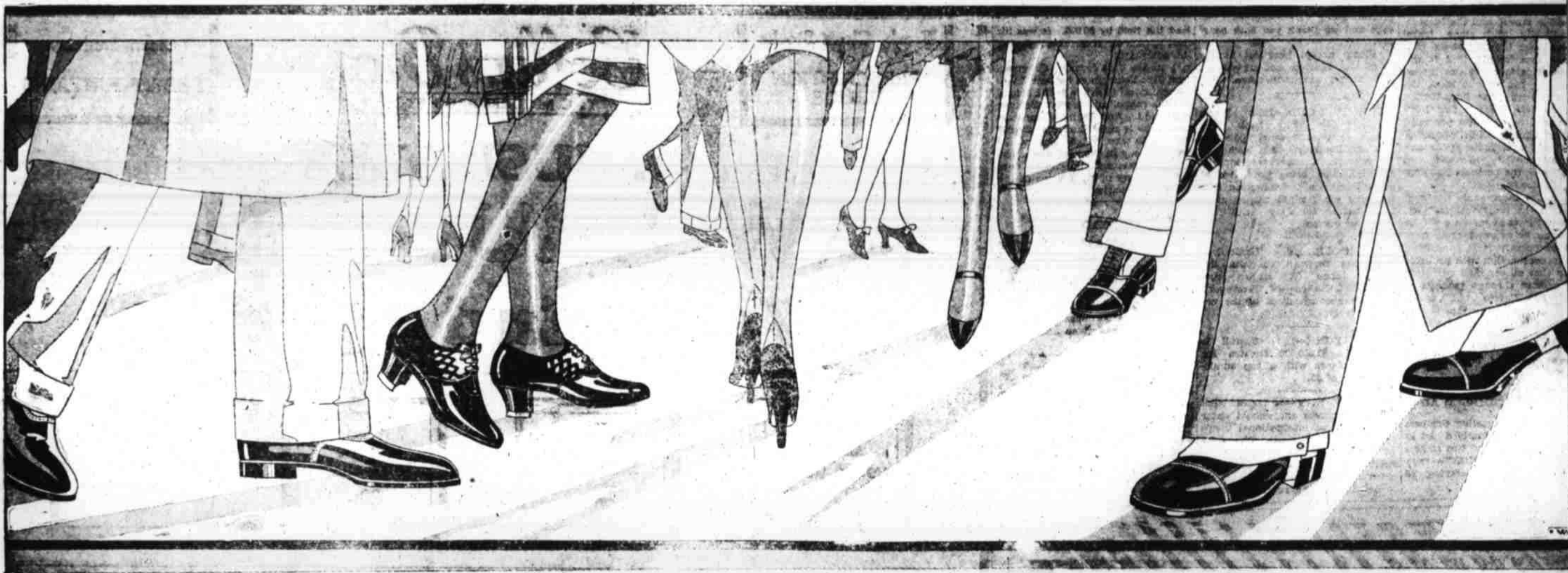

CLARA BOW IN DENIAL THAT SHE 'SETTLED'

DALLAS, Texas, June 19 (AP)— Southern hospitality was the lure that brought Clara Bow, red-haired movie actress, to Dallas for a two weeks' rest, she told two Associated Press staff men in an early morning interview today.

Desiring a rest period between two pictures, Miss Bow said she sought a quiet place where she could get away from Hollywood. "I'm tired of it all," she said. "We had so many friends here who had begged us to try some southern hospitality we decided on a moment's notice to go to Dallas and many of our closest friends didn't know it."

Miss Bow and her secretary, Miss Daisy Devoe, arrived in Dallas Sunday afternoon from the movie colony unannounced and unheralded. They registered at a prominent downtown hotel under assumed names and remained incognito until late Sunday night when a Dallas theater man recognized Miss Bow.

The "it" girl and her secretary had just returned to their suite in the hotel from a dance on the roof garden when they were interviewed by the newspapermen.

Miss Bow took occasion to deny that friendship with a Dallas professional man, whose acquaintance she had made in Los Angeles, had brought her to Dallas. She professed ignorance of recent reports that she had made a \$30,000 settlement of a \$150,000 alienation of affection suit brought by a Dallas woman.

"I didn't even have the money to pay such a thing," Miss Bow declared. "My money is tied up in a bonus trust fund which the studio inaugurated and it can't be touched by anybody. I can't get it nor can anyone else until my five year contract expires."

She exhibited a telegram received last night from a Hollywood man with whom she said she was in love and was thinking of marrying, but added "this terrible thing had to come along" and "might blow up my romance in California."

Coming to Texas to seek absolute rest and quiet, Miss Bow said she had hoped to recuperate quickly from the strain of recent films and by the time her two weeks' vacation, granted by the Hollywood studio, was over, an injury to her left hand, suffered in one of her latest pictures, would have healed.

Asked concerning forfeiture of a \$25,000 "morality" bonus in her contract, Miss Bow said, "there never was such a clause in my contract. The only thing that might void my contract would be for Will Hays to bar my pictures from the screen." Will Hays is supervisor for all Hollywood films.

Miss Bow and Miss Devoe were attired in evening clothes, the former in a pale yellow lace evening gown with silver slippers. Miss Bow talked fluently of her visit to the Lone Star state.

"We had planned to stay until the 29th but if they keep bothering me, we may leave in two or three days," the actress said. "The studio wired me last night to leave at once, but that will be impossible. We couldn't get ready to leave inside of two or three days."

This was indicated by Harvey B. Shear and J. P. Willis, of Hobbs, N. M., defense attorneys, who said they intended to question all members of the special venire of 125 jurors as to whether they participate in the offer of a reward of \$500 raised by Lamesa and Dawson county citizens.

Feeling against McKee is running high here and the defense is expected to take advantage of that to secure a change of venue.

What the attitude of Judge Gordon B. McGuire, trial judge, on the expected request is not known.

When McKee was arraigned before Judge McGuire Monday morning there were about 15 peace officers from out of town in the courtroom in addition to local officers. They included four rangers, headed by Captain W. L. Wright. He, with the others, J. W. Smith, W. E. Young and Thad Tarver had been summoned as witnesses.

Officers

Other officers on duty in the courtroom and also witnesses included: Gib Abernathy, Palo Pinto; Jess Slaughter, Big Spring; Audie C. Francis, Midland and W. F. Caton, Post, all sheriffs; B. L. Parker and George Lightfoot, O'Donnell, officers; O. B. Conley, deputy sheriff at Lubbock; Jack Reeves, highway patrolman at Lubbock; John Keller, highway officer at Lubbock; Charles Laird, deputy sheriff of Palo Pinto; D. O. Dunn, deputy of Big Spring and G. J. Wolf, member of the police department of Ranger.

These officers were all expected to be on duty Thursday morning and to remain throughout the trial.

In addition Mrs. Joe L. Ray, the only woman sheriff in Texas, with her deputies, A. M. "Buck" Bennett, chief, and Granville Wyatt, deputy, and A. L. Boyd, Lamesa chief of police, and E. P. "Andy" Anderson, former chief and now at Midland, were to be on duty.

Sheriff Ray has announced that all persons entering the courtroom during the entire trial will be searched for firearms every day during the hearing. Mrs. Ray and her sister, Miss Irma Spaw, a court house clerk, were to search the women.

To Be Searched
Deputy Bennett and his force were to search the men. Guards were to be posted at all stairways leading to the courtroom and no one except those connected with the court, were to be permitted to enter the room without being searched. A special venire of 125 jurors had been called for the case.

McKee, who was being held in jail on the top floor of the courthouse, was not to be brought into the courtroom until the last minute before trial. He will be the first one to be taken from the room. This is to be done in order to avoid any possible trouble.

The case is attracting wide attention here. Hundreds of people from all over the county were in court for the arraignment. A still larger number was expected for the actual trial.

The slaying occurred at Sparenberg, ten or twelve miles south of Lamesa, the night of May 1.

A filling station, owned by Mrs. Mary Bryce and operated by her son, Jack, was held up by an unknown man, who used a gun to enforce his demands to "handover your money." Jack was alone in the building.

Verna Bryce, sister of Jack, started to enter the building but saw what was going on. She ran across the street and entered the store of W. R. Billingsley.

"Mr. Billingsley, somebody is holding up the filling station," she blurted out. At once the man reached for his shotgun and left the store.

As Billingsley rushed across the street the man who had held up the station, left, carrying \$250 in money, a hat and a shotgun. The two men saw each other about the same time.

Billingsley was unable to get his shotgun to work. He clubbed the gun and knocked McKee down.

According to eye witnesses McKee shot Billingsley three times, in the right chest, abdomen and left arm. As his victim fell, the man arose and rushed to a waiting Ford and made his getaway.

Billingsley lived until 4 o'clock the afternoon of May 2, when he died.

Citizens of Lamesa offered a reward of \$500 for the capture of the alleged murderer. Governor Dan Moody offered a reward of \$250 and the brother of the dead man a \$200 reward.

On May 4 Mrs. Emma Mayhall, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Pace of Ranger, was arrested. She was said to have been in the car with McKee.

It was through her arrest that McKee's name became known. He had forced her, she claimed, to accompany him on an automobile trip. Mrs. Mayhall claims that McKee told her he had some business with

a man in the filling station and that she did not know he intended to hold it up.

McKee was arrested May 23 in a house near Athens, Texas, after a long chase. He was taken to the Lubbock county jail because of feeling in Lamesa against him.

Ambrose Light until 3 a. m. this morning and had decided to postpone her greetings until later. She was expected to join the admiral after the reception at city hall.

As the open car carrying Admiral Byrd swung around Bowling Green Park and into Broadway the ticker tape, which had been floating down in small streamers for several minutes, came down in a regular paper snow storm.

Police, arms locked together, made a living wall barely wide enough for the cars to creep through.

Like a great wave rolling in from the sea, a continuous roar of cheering swept through the massed thousands in the street as the admiral's car rolled up the "glory trail" to City Hall.

Wife At Pier

Mrs. Byrd was waiting at Pier A and greeted her husband there. They had time for only a word and then were parted, the admiral entering one car and Mrs. Byrd another.

As the admiral's car turned into City Hall Park, surrounding office buildings were almost hidden by the storm of torn paper and ticker tape which floated down.

The Richmond, Va., light infantry blues, which had arrived a moment before, drew up in a guard of honor in front of the southern grand stand and facing the steps of City Hall.

Admiral Byrd, escorted by Grover Whalen, climbed out of the car and ascended the steps to where Mayor Walker was waiting with outstretched hand.

Mayor Walker escorted Admiral Byrd to the front of the reception stand, erected on the steps of the hall.

As the crowd recognized the admiral, conspicuous in his white duck uniform, and its golden caplets, it let out a great cheer.

The mayor hailed him as a great scientist and a still greater human being.

"You're a great scientific achievement," he said, "but your humanism in the care of your men is even greater. You are one of the finest human beings alive in the world today. Welcome home forever."

"I stand here as a spokesman for 70 old men," Admiral Byrd said in reply. "I wish to give to you our sincere gratitude for this greeting. I know of no other man who could make me feel so graciously welcome as Mayor Walker."

"Doctor" Byrd
Chancellor Elmer Ellsworth Brown of New York University then conferred on Admiral Byrd the honorary degree of doctor of engineering. When he addressed him as Doctor Byrd, the crowd roared.

The ceremonies over, the admiral, was escorted back to his automobile and left for the New York Advertising club on Park Avenue for a welcome home luncheon.

GIANTS COP CLOSE FRAY, BEGIN TOUR

Indians Miss Chance To Defeat Athletics

To a disinterested observer it would appear that the scene of a ball game should not make much difference in the result where such seasoned campaigners as major league players are concerned, but it does not always work out that way.

The National League clubs of the east, which are just opening their second western tour, found surprising success at home, but it is rather doubtful whether they will continue it on the road.

The New York Giants, who routed their intersectional opponents to the tune of nine victories in 12 games at the Polo Grounds, had a large amount of trouble yesterday in taking their first game of the tour from the Pittsburgh Pirates, who won but four out of 13 away from home. The final count was 4 to 3 for New York, and it took a sparkling unassisted double play by Hugh Crite to end the game before the Pirates had tied the score.

Hurlers Duel
An injury to Bill Walker, Giant southpaw, and a sudden weakening of Heinie Meine broke up a pitching duel in which the Giants led 1-0 for six innings. Meine led down in the seventh and gave three runs on four hits. Pittsburgh promptly replied by collecting a run in the last three frames. They had the tying counter on second when Crite grabbed Paul Waner's liner and doubled Grantham off the keystone sack.

Other National League clubs do not start the second half of the east-west test until today, but on the basis of form shown in the games since June 1, the eastern clubs have all the advantage. They won 34 contests while the west took 18, with only the hard fighting Chicago Cubs getting better than a .500 average. Every eastern club won more games than it lost.

In the American League, the struggle was somewhat closer as the east's leading pennant contenders held their own although they were pulled down from the heights they had reached before they invaded the western half of the circuit. The east came out ahead, 26 games to 25, due principally to the activities of the New York Yankees, who won nine and lost three. The other eastern clubs came out just below the .500 mark but their western rivals, with the exception of the Cleveland Indians, were in the same vicinity. Cleveland won eight out of 12 games.

Indians Lose
The Indians, after pushing up to within striking distance of the league lead, found when they came east again yesterday that the Philadelphia Athletics have a real championship team despite eight defeats in 14 games. Cleveland had a chance to oust the world's champions from first place, but even their pitching ace, Wes Ferrell, could not stop the Athletics in a crucial moment. The A's made a dozen hits, most of them in two big innings, and equalled an American League record for home run hitting in winning a 7 to 2 decision.

Al Simmons, Jimmy Fox and Ring Miller connected with Ferrell's delivery in the fifth inning for three successive home runs, a feat that had been performed only twice before in American League history. The Indians led 3 to 0 in the fifth, but the Athletics made three runs in the first on a bunch of three hits, while Roy "Speed" Mahaffey, youthful right hander, pitched effectively all the way.

Sheep Cause of Civil Suit Here

Seeking damages of \$1,424 from the Texas & Pacific Railway Co., for death of and injury to a number of sheep, John Ringer and J. H. Hewitt, Tom Green county, have filed suit in district court here.

The plaintiffs alleged a shipment of 623 head of sheep was turned over to the Abilene & Southern Railway, a branch line of the Texas & Pacific Railway, at Ballinger. The sheep were brought to Abilene, and then to Comanche over the Texas & Pacific line.

It is alleged in the petition that seven of the sheep were dead when the car was unloaded; 53 more died in two days after they were unloaded; and 53 additional ones died at later dates.

The deaths were caused by negligence of the railroad in providing sufficient bedding, and in handling the car roughly, it is alleged by the plaintiffs. They seek damages of \$904 for the 113 dead sheep, at the market price of \$8 per head. They also ask \$1 a head damage for 520 sheep, alleging injuries received while in transit lowered their market value in that amount.

UZZUDUN AND RISCO CLASH AT DETROIT

DETROIT, June 19 (AP)—Paulino Uzcudun and Johnny Risko today awaited the gong which will send them to the center of the ring to fight in a ten round match which is expected to have an important bearing on the selection of an opponent for Max Schmeling next fall or winter.

It will be their second meeting. In the first match, Risko was awarded a decision which still is protested by the Baque woodchopper and his adherents.

THE "MAYBE" BOLT

CHICAGO, June 19 (AP)—The off again again heavyweight match between Otto Von Porat and W. L. "Young" Stribling, now scheduled for the Chicago Stadium tomorrow night, had the fight fans, state boxing commission and even the promoters guessing today.

Stadium officials were determined the 10 round battle would be held on schedule but the fight fans were skeptical, claiming neither fighter wanted to meet the other, and fearing a last minute "run out."

Originally, the match was billed for June 17 by verbal agreement with the fighters. Von Porat and his manager, Ed Stevenson, later declined to sign, however, until the commission suspended them for 60 days and redated the match for June 18. Tuesday, Stribling requested the match be postponed, complaining he had injured his left hand in training. The commission's physician said he could detect nothing radically wrong with the hand but the fight again was postponed until Friday night.

Yesterday Stribling refused to do any boxing, complaining his hand was sprained. Stadium officials, however, said they were convinced he was in condition to go through with his engagement.

Sidney Strotz, head of the Chicago Stadium Corporation, admitted he was puzzled by events.

"The physicians have proved Stribling's hand is not injured," Strotz said. "I do not know why Stribling, with his record, should be afraid of Von Porat unless thoughts of the \$700,000 which Schmeling and Sharkey, rival heavyweights, drew in New York, induced a desire to pass up his 25 percent tomorrow night in hope of a bigger chance."

Meanwhile, Von Porat is doing some chuckling and training hard for the fight.

Senate Seeks Adjournment

WASHINGTON, June 19 (AP)—Wearily and hopefully, senate leaders looked forward today to adjournment some time next week and gave their backing to efforts to make this possible.

The first step was the negotiation of agreements for votes on the world war pensions bill and the rivers and harbors measure. They were confident these would be disposed of by the end of the week, with the close of the session to follow shortly thereafter.

It was arranged that the veterans measure be given first attention today, provided an agreement for a vote could be reached. It had widespread support, and there was every likelihood of passage by night fall.

Next on the program, Chairman Johnson of the commerce committee intends to press to a speedy termination the controversy over the rivers and harbors measure which centers around the amount of water to be withdrawn from the great lakes for the Illinois waterway project.

Senator Glenn, republican, Illinois, will make the final appeal for his state against the amendment of Senate Bill 1, republican, Wisconsin, which proposes to restrict the quantity of water which may be diverted.

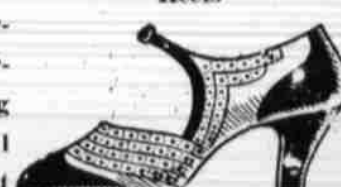

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Starting a Long Cruise

ANY AMERICAN who tries to figure out just what the shooting is all about in connection with the London naval treaty can be pardoned for getting dizzy and giving the thing up as a bad job.

The most noticeable thing about this treaty is that the big-navy men in each of the three chief naval powers are assailing the thing with every gun they can bring up.

In Japan, the navy men complain that the treaty leaves the Mikado's kingdom comparatively defenseless for attack by this country. One high naval officer has even committed hara-kiri because of his despondency over it all.

In England, staunch patriots like Winston Churchill insist that the British navy will have no chance at all against the American navy if the treaty is accepted. Britain, far from ruling the waves, will have to ask permission to go in swimming unless the treaty is killed.

And in America our big-navy men are telling us that the treaty can't make each of three nations inferior to the other two. What is biting all of these admirals, senators, sea lords and statesmen, anyhow?

If you study the situation a while you begin to understand. What all of these people are objecting to is not the particular provisions of this particular treaty. It is the mere idea of naval limitation. These three big-navy groups—in England, in Japan and in America—cannot stand the thought of any sort of treaty that limits the size of navies. For them, nothing but the sky can be a satisfactory limit. You could not possibly devise a naval treaty that would satisfy them.

Looked at in that light, the thing becomes more clear. These admirals and jingoes understand the naval treaty better than we do. Of course it is a weak document, a compromise—but it is a first step toward disarmament. It sets a precedent. It will be followed by more treaties as time passes, each one more stringent than the one before. The battle fleets of the world are starting on a long cruise from which they'll never come back—and the admiral also don't like it.

That's why the treaty is under attack simultaneously in three countries. And—if you stop to think about it—you'll see that those attacks are the very best recommendation the treaty has yet had. It is a more effective instrument, a better step toward peace, than we had supposed. If it weren't it wouldn't fit the big-navy crowds so.

OPINIONS OF OTHERS

Henry Ford Advises

Dallas News: HENRY FORD is now telling the farmer what to do. He is for mass production; plant down everything and force the crop to its utmost. Overproduction? According to Mr. Ford there is no such thing; get the cost down and turn the goods out.

As a matter of fact, Mr. Ford doesn't do that himself. He could make many more cars than he does, and he can control his output as millions of farmers could never get together and do, even if the weather and the insects were obliging.

There is a limit to the number of automobiles a man will buy, though Mr. Ford and his competitors are not as near to it as the American farmers are to the limit in wheat products, which a man will eat, for example. The more efficient wheat farmers are the more the wheat surplus, and the bigger the surplus

the more ruinously low the price. Mr. Ford knows that, but he says that chemistry is crying for more raw material. Maybe so. But the farmer doesn't feel optimistic about the wheat produced at a loss on the farm. At the moment chemistry seems a bit timid about taking over the wheat surplus. Even cotton is sagging in the market. It may be that farming economics is another thing that Mr. Ford is not expert on. It is possible, you know.

INJURIES

The Chinese have a proverb which runs: "Man stumbles over mole hills; never over mountains."

Not infrequently this applies to injuries. The more serious ones receive immediate and competent attention, while the lesser ones are overlooked.

A good example of a minor injury frequently neglected, and often causing serious consequences, is the splinter wound.

In itself, a splinter is but a sharp piece of wood penetrating the skin. The injury is not great and the pain is insignificant.

A needle point or pair of tweezers may be all that will be required to remove the splinter.

And yet, riding on the splinter may be a variety of germs, some very dangerous. Though the splinter is removed these germs may be left behind to start their destructive work.

Of course, if an antiseptic is applied to the wound, the germs may be destroyed. But the wound caused by the splinter is of the puncture type, that is long but narrow. A deep and tight channel is formed. The antiseptic fluid does not readily penetrate to the depths of the wound, hence the germs may not be destroyed and may instead find a fine developing ground.

Much of the danger in puncture wounds could be avoided. If bleeding were encouraged, in the case of a splinter, as soon as it is removed, the tissue about it should be massaged so as to stimulate bleeding.

The bleeding tends to wash out whatever germs may have gained entrance. Tincture of iodine should then be applied, and the process repeated once or twice.

The wound should be watched for evidences of infection and pus formation.

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EVERYDAY QUESTIONS

Answered By
Dr. S. Parkes Cadman

Questions from readers are answered daily by the Rev. Dr. S. Parkes Cadman, Radio Minister of the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America. Dr. Cadman seeks to answer inquiries that appear to be representative of the trends of thought in the many letters which he receives.

Roanoke, Va.
Can you furnish me with the name of a book which gives a full account of the beliefs of the Greek Orthodox churches?
The articles on the Greek Church in various encyclopedias, particularly in the fourteenth edition of the Encyclopedia Britannica, contain ample material on this matter. Dean Stanley's lectures on "The History of the Eastern Church" are also interesting and instructive, and Professor Frank G. A. of the General Theological Seminary, New York, has written a masterly volume entitled "Some Aspects of Contemporary Greek Orthodox Thought."

How do you analyze the prevalence of a lack of a worshipful attitude in many of our churches today?
Worshipfulness is primarily a matter of the inward spirit in which bodily attitudes and outward forms play a subordinate part. Yet these attitudes and forms react upon the soul itself. The reverent heart is manifest in a reverent demeanor and a reverent demeanor in turn helps to produce the reverent heart. The condition to which you refer has its origin in a lack of reverence.
Much can be done by the officiating minister to remedy the situation. But he should not be charged with the whole responsibility for a very real and sad defect. Too many people seem to be wholly lacking in what may be called "church sense." For them the church is simply a building and the service a

superior performance. Their misapprehensions cannot be traced to any common factor, since there are other people who exhibit an entirely different bearing in worship. The question is largely one of early training, resulting in a clear perception of what the act of worship involves.
Architecture, music, seating, lighting and other accessories bear on the question. But they are merely external aids. Some of the most inspiring religious services I have known were held in the modest churches of rural parishes. People will bow in silent awe and adoration when they are in the immediate presence of God. Where there is a sense of that presence the plainest Quaker Meeting House is filled with the glory which enveloped Israel's Temple of old, so that even the priests could not minister.
All worshippers should behave in offering their sacrifices of praise and thanksgiving as those who are unfit to offer any sacrifice except through the mercy of Him who receives it.

Do you not sometimes honestly feel that after all life is a lane leading to a dead wall? This is my present conviction after considerable thought.
I have been very fortunate in having had an opportunity to see life from different angles. Commencing as a youngster not twelve years old, I worked in an English coal mine, where I prepared myself for college as best I could. Then came a college education, later a rural parish, and finally a city pul-

pit. Two nations have permitted me to share their varied social experiences, and in my later years two continents have graciously opened their doors to me. As a result I have always felt that whatever the situation might be from time to time, the one thing to do was to forge ahead with all the courage and intelligence one could muster.
Life in a coal mine seven hundred feet below ground early enforced on me the lesson that human existence is precarious at best. Nor are the physical and moral casualties materially reduced in life outside the coal mine. Yet what is the good of being abashed before these contingencies? They are the common fate of all men. Surely we can welcome that which keeps us in touch with our fellows, strengthens our associations with them, and deepens our sympathy for them.
Some philosophers may insist that life is a vain show, a vapor, a delusion woven of dream stuff. But even the invalid almost inside a hearsie challenges those pessimistic definitions. Many bedridden people within my own circles are too steadfast to have their peace of mind and heart paralyzed by the terrors of pessimism. The dying have whispered in my ear that life is sweet since it is continuous, and because there is always more life beyond. In this faith the race were knocked down for \$27.

If you would be well equipped for the future, do not daily in maddening regret over the past. Robert Louis Stevenson urges that "a frank and somewhat headlong carriage" stamps the prepared character of a man or woman. Youth's fiery boldness should not be utterly extinguished by the cold caution of maturity. There is in the very nature of things an ally which favors the brave heart and makes difficulties melt before its courageous activities.
