## FISH SPECIALIST VISITS JUNCTION.

For several months the Eagle has been advocating the construction of a fish hatchery at or near Junction, and during the past few weeks has been corresponding with Superintendent Mark Riley of the San Marcos Government Fish Hatchery in an effort to secure all the information possible and to induce Mr. Riley to visit this section of the country and tell us whether we could successfully operate one here, give us data on the cost of construction, the probable number of fish that can be turned into the river each year from a small hatchery, and all other information necessary for properly considering the feasibility of the project.

Mr. Riley, some time ago, kindly consented to come here and look the situation over thoroughly, as soon as he could get away from the hatchery. About three weeks ago the Eagle editor made a canvass of a number of persons interested in this work and secured funds for paying Mr. Riley's expenses to and from Junction.

He arrived Monday afternoon and was very busy that afternoon and the following day, inspecting places, probably suitable for a hatchery, getting temperature of the different streams and looking into the vegetation along the streams that is necessary for food for small fish. E. A. Loeffler, John M. Hankins, C. W. Atchison and H. G. Perry made the rounds with him Monday afternoon, going along the South Llano to the dam; up Cedar Creek to the head springs. The temperature of the water and the vegetation were found to be ideal for the propagation of bass and some parts of the streams were also suitable for crappie.

The following morning Messrs. J. A. Heyman, E. A. Loeffler, Walter Beck and H. G. Perry took Mr. Riley up South Llano to 700 Springs and the river was examined in many places and several suitable locations for a hatchery were found.

The principal requirements for a location are: Ground that has enough clay to hold water well; high enough to be out of overflow; cheap supply of water for the ponds and good drainage. Such places were found on the Weaver H. Baker place on Cedar; the old Tom Taylor place; the A. O. Moran ranch, and the Price Camp Site on South Llano and the N. R. Skaggs farm on Main Llano just below town.

Mr. Riley gave the committee much information along the line of constructing and maintaining a small hatchery and states he will render us any further assistance possible. He was more than favorably impressed with the country and opportunities here for building a wonderful playground for Texas. He compared the possibilities here with a number of well known parks in the State, and said we have natural beauty spots here that can be made to surpass anything he has seen.

For more than twenty years Mr. Riley has been superintendent of the Government Fish Hatchery at San Marcos and is one of the best informed fish specialists to be found anywhere. He has recently supervised the construction of the new hatchery at New Braunfels and will also have charge of the work of constructing a fine hatchery at Medina Lake, which will remain under the supervision of the Bureau of Fisheries and be maintained by the Government.

## JUNCTION HIGH SCHOOL RETAINS CLASSIFICATION.

A number of rumors have been going the rounds to the effect that the Junction High School has lost its classification, secured last year, and that those attending school here will not receive credit for their work.

These rumors are without foundation. This classification would have been lost had the recent bond issue failed, as it would have been evident that the requirements of the Department of Education were not to be complied with. The following letter, received by Mr. Reid of the school board, is printed in order that there may be no question as to the matter:

President of the School Board, Junction, Texas.  
My Dear Sir:  
After careful consideration and consultation it has been decided to postpone action in the matter of withdrawing classification from the Junction High School until next year. This postponement is taken in view of the fact that the school district has recently voted a \$90,000 bond issue for school improvements with the total tax rate of 95 cents on the \$100 valuation, and steps are being taken to speedily provide adequate school facilities for next year. It is distinctly understood, however, that unless the Junction Independent School District maintain a full nine months' free term next year and provide adequate building and thoroughly sanitary regulations together with the minimum equipment requirements as set forth in the report of the visiting supervisor of February 19, 1923, classification will be withdrawn without let or hindrance.

It is the purpose of the Department of Education to lend a helping hand to schools that are really trying to help themselves and in the enforcement of the legal requirements to temper justice with mercy wherever the circumstances clearly indicate that the larger ends of education will thereby be subserved.

Trusting that the Junction School District will amply justify this lenient action and with best wishes for a successful and constructive years' program, I am,

made each year, the San Marcos Hatchery cannot possibly supply anything like the number that would be required to keep the streams of this county stocked, and the idea fostered by a number of local people, that the only thing to do is to build a small hatchery, was approved by Mr. Riley.

N. R. Skaggs has a very desirable place just east of town and has offered the ground necessary for the hatchery. The committee, of course, is in no position to take the matter in hand, but the proposition will be taken before the Chamber of Commerce, and the people of the county and an effort will be made to raise, by public subscription or otherwise, the several hundred dollars necessary for the initial construction of a small hatchery of an acre or more, that may be later increased in size. A pond of one acre properly cared for, will provide for about 100 brood fish that will spawn from 5,000 to 8,000 eggs per year. Mr. Riley states that something like three fourths of this number can be expected to live when turned into the rivers. This would provide several hundred thousand small fish each year to keep the rivers and creeks of this county stocked.

At the present rate of catching the fish in this county, the streams will be depleted in a few years, and it is very important that this hatchery be established. If the initial unit can be completed by December, brood fish can be secured and there will be a large number of small bass ready to turn into the river next spring.

This is a county-wide proposition that every one should take an interest in and should contribute something towards its construction.

## COMMITTEE VISITS M. E. ENCAMPMENT.

A committee from the local Methodist Church, composed of Pastor R. E. Parker, Joe Bissett, E. E. Knetsch and Jas. A. Miller went to the encampment ground on the C. P. Bruce place Wednesday night to discuss the matter of locating a permanent encampment grounds. The local church had been invited to send a committee and it was understood here that those in charge of the 700 Springs encampment were seeking a desirable permanent location, and the Junction committee was invited to present Junction as a most desirable place for such.

It was also thought that this encampment was a rather extensive affair and would need to be at a place easily accessible and near a town large enough to accommodate a considerable number of people, but it was found that there was present at this encampment a mere handful of people, mostly from Rocksprings and Caria Valley, and that the actual work of providing funds and interesting a sufficient number of people in the proposition was rather indefinite and probably a long way in the future.

With the understanding that they were to present Junction to those in charge of the encampment arrangements, as a desirable place, Mr. Knetsch and Rev. Parker, in short speeches, told of the advantages that Junction offered. After their presentation of the matter the discussion grew warm and the speakers of the encampment severely criticized the Junction speakers presentation of the matter and after many unkindly remarks, stated that they were not looking for a location, but had already decided on the 700 Springs location, and had made a tentative deal with Mr. Bruce for his ranch, which they were to turn into a hunting and fishing resort, as well as an encampment grounds, and that they had invited the Junction people there for the purpose of assisting them in this purchase of some 2,000 acres at \$11 per acre. According to the speakers, they only had a few hours in which to raise the bonus of \$1,000 necessary to hold the place until January 1st, when about one-fourth of the purchase price was to be raised.

After the above facts developed, the Junction committee was not in position to take any

further action in the matter. From a news report in the Edwards County Leader, it is learned that the deal for the encampment site has not been consummated, but that the matter is still pending.

## PERMANENT HIGHWAY MAINTENANCE ASSURED

News reached here the last of the week that the State Highway Department had definitely decided to take over the maintenance of the thirty miles of the highway in this county that had been built with State and Federal aid. This stretch of road running from the Kimble-Kerr County line to the North Llano river crossing six miles northwest of Junction has been completed during the past few years and not only traverses one of the most picturesque sections of the State, but is one of the most heavily traveled roads in the State.

Realizing the importance of maintaining this highway, that is used by so many thousands of the people of this and other states, the Highway Department decided to take over the work immediately rather than wait until the first of the year, as has been expected. This part of the highway is not only important as a section of the Old Spanish Trail running from coast to coast thru the southern part of the United States, but the fine climate, the beautiful scenery and the hundreds of running streams of the Hill Country have attracted so many thousands of people from all parts of the country that it was only natural that its importance be appreciated by the Highway Department, and provisions made for its proper maintenance.

Without a railroad, Junction is dependent on its good roads for an outlet and the people of this county have exerted every possible effort to finance the building of the splendid roads of the county. Besides the above mentioned thirty miles, ten miles more, connecting with the west end of the part now maintained, is under construction and will soon be completed.

John Braley, local road contractor, has been appointed Maintenance Superintendent, and instructed to secure the necessary equipment and the men to begin the work at once. Mr. Braley states that he has secured the needed equipment and some workmen for beginning the work this week and the road, which is needing repairs in several places, will be rapidly put in shape.

The maintenance of this road means more to Junction and Kimble County than can be estimated. Kimble County is destined to become the playground of Texas. It is conservatively estimated that over 25,000 people will spend their vacation here this summer. Many have already been here two or three times. Every visitor is a booster, and when they go home they send their friends, and it is not an unreasonable prophecy to say that there will be two or three times as many people here next summer as there were this summer. Junction is well on its road to become a city. Its natural resources, climate and scenic beauty are unsurpassed, and its people are awake to the possibilities before them.

### 'TECH' LOCATING BOARD NAMES LUBBOCK AS SITE

About the time this paper was closing its forms for last week's issue, the news reached here that the Tech. locating board had selected Lubbock as the location for the new Technological College.

The decision was made following several months' study of the briefs of the 36 applicant towns and a three weeks' tour of inspection over the territory. The locating board was in session 5 hours at the Texas Hotel, Fort Worth. The announcement was made by Secretary Nabours of the locating board Wednesday afternoon.

Lubbock was the unanimous choice of the six men on the board. It was selected on the first ballot of the board. Secretary Nabours left the Cactus Room on the roof at about 2 o'clock, and went to the first floor. When he alighted from the elevator the crowd in the lobby surged about him. He declined to make any indication as to the successful town. The scene was similar to the floor of a metropolitan stock exchange. As he moved towards the public stenographer, men followed after him and excitedly asked questions. He went to the room of a newspaper man in the hotel and made copies of the report, and returned to the conference room where the statement was signed. The crowd of observers by that time had gone to the roof, and heard the report finally read.

The report follows:  
"We, the members of the locating board for the Texas Technological College, in conformity with the law creating said college, having made a careful study of the original and supplementary briefs, having visited and inspected the sites offered by the 36 applicant towns, and having given consideration to the relative merits of the propositions submitted by the several towns, do hereby unanimously select and designate Lubbock in Lubbock County, Texas, as the official location of the Texas Technological College.

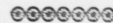

**TEXAS' GEOGRAPHICAL CENTER NEAR MERCURY**

Austin, August 3.—Where is the geographical center of Texas?

For many years this question has puzzled Texas laymen and engineers. And it was not until recently that many of them have had their minds settled on the proposition. J. H. Walker, chief clerk of the land office and for twenty-five years engaged in State land and engineering work, declares that the center of the State geographically, is located 20 miles northeast of Brady, McCulloch County.

Walker's basis for his belief is an extended survey conducted by the U. S. Geological Survey and completed recently. Many months were spent in conducting the survey, Walker stated, and it is believed the location will be generally accepted as the center spot of the Lone Star State.

The central location has been the subject of many arguments and disputes, Walker stated. Moreover, it has been involved in numerous land suits which have been brought in the State. At one time, Mr. Walker said, it was believed the geographical center was in Mills County. It is stated, however, that there is sufficient difference in the contour of the State since the early point was located to change the location from Mills to McCulloch County.

For those who care to try to locate the geographical center, Mr. Walker declares there is a simple method. It requires only a cardboard contour map of the State of Texas and a pin or other sharp instrument. The point at which the cardboard map will exactly balance on the pin is the geographical center, Walker said. The State Engineer declared this to be true because the geographical center coincides with the center of mass or gravity.

**MEXICO TO EXTEND ORIENT RAILROAD.**

The Mexican Government will finance and extend the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient railroad in the state of Chihuahua northward from Falomir, in that state, across the Concho river to within thirty miles of Presidio, Texas, thereby making retribution in part for the damage done Orient properties in Mexico during the years of revolution.

This was announced in San Angelo by W. T. Kemper of Kansas City, receiver for the Kansas-Oklahoma division of the Orient and president of the Texas system, here enroute home from Mexico City, where he obtained aid in conference with President Alvaro Obregon.

Extension northeastward of the Orient in Mexico will shorten to less than 100 miles the 161-mile gap between Alpine and the line in Chihuahua, the principal bar of fulfillment of the dream of Arthur E. Stillwell for a great transcontinental trunk line with a low grade and 300 miles shorter than other.

The grade and bridges already built on the new extension toward the Rio Grande and the money advanced by Mexico will be used for laying steel and doing a small amount of work on the fill, Mr. Kemper said. With the Conchos crossed, a highly productive valley will be made available for agricultural development. Its products can then

be shipped over the Orient to Chihuahua City and on to Mexico City and the increased revenue will hasten the day when the line can be constructed south from Alpine, the present terminus, through Presidio County, across the Rio Grande.

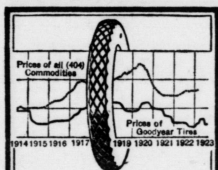

### HOSPITAL TO RECEIVE 100 MORE PATIENTS.

Kerrville Mountain Sun: U. S. Veterans' Hospital No. 93 will be ready to receive 100 additional tuberculosis ex-service men beginning next Wednesday, August 15th, according to Dr. R. L. Cook, Medical Officer in charge of the institution.

This contingent will be composed of all ex-service men in this section who have been waiting for the official opening of the hospital. Dr. Cook states that if there still remain any accommodations after these men have been taken in, a number sufficient to fill out the 100 will be sent from other places by the Veterans' Bureau.

It is thought that henceforth accommodations will be completed much faster for the reception of additional patients and every effort is being made by Dr. Cook and his corps of assistants to rush this work to completion. It is thought that contingents of patients will be received in close succession shortly after September 1, and that the sanatorium will have its full capacity filled within a short time after that.

Work is now progressing rapidly with the grounds. Leveling and sodding of the earth around the buildings and the landscape work is being given careful attention and when finished the institution will take its place among the greatest and most beautiful of its kind in the country.

A large passenger bus, called a "Big Bertha," has been received at the sanatorium and will be used as a pleasure bus for the patients when taken on

picnics or similar outings and to convey local people to the Legion for the entertainments in which they take part.

### ROCK SPRING NEWS.

A lumber yard, starting with a stock of about \$3,000 is being considered by Bryan W. Babb, Rocksprings hardware dealer, recites the Edwards County Leader, stating that such an industry there will be a great convenience to builders in that section. Mr. Babb expects to employ a man to assist him in the business.

By a vote of 80 to 7 on \$15,000 school bonds and 86 to 2 on a 60 cent maintenance tax, Rocksprings last Thursday made possible to have a new school building, according to the Edwards County Leader. ### TEXAS TEXTBOOK CONTRACTS VOID.

Austin, Aug. 14.—Judge Duval West, in Federal Court, late Tuesday held invalid, null and void the textbook contracts made last December by the Textbook Commission with the American Book Company in the case of the American Book Company, against S. M. N. Marrs, State Superintendent of Public Instruction.

The temporary injunction heretofore granted the book company, restraining Marrs from using the old books and to recognize the new contracts, was dissolved by the court and he denied any further injunction. The court held that the book company had failed to prove it had a valid contract.

State Superintendent Marrs said Tuesday evening that he will accordingly order the necessary number of the old geographies now published by the McMillan Company for the Texas schools and that he will follow the request of the Legislature and ignore all contracts.

This means that Marrs will not recognize any of the new contracts and will ignore the instructions of the State Board of Education which directed him to recognize the new contracts as being valid and legal.

"The opinion of the court, I believe," said Superintendent Marrs, "is higher than that of the State Board of Education, and I will accordingly follow the decision of the court."
