There was no rainfall south of Lamesa, where the feed is beginning to damage from extreme dry weather. It is thought that the rainfall received will be of considerable benefit to feed and cotton crops.

A general rain in Dawson county would be of untold benefit at this time. Most of the cotton seems to be standing the dry weather fairly good, but feed crops are damaging rapidly.

Sgt. Fain Tech. Inspector At Local Glider School

Tech. Sgt. Raymond S. Fain, a native of San Antonio, Texas, is our Government Technical Inspector. Sgt. Fain is a graduate of Brackenridge High School, San Antonio, Texas, where he lettered in all four major sports and was a commissioned officer two years in the R. O. T. C.

Sgt. Fain first joined the U. S. Air Corps in 1933, where he was assigned to a Bombardment Squadron, working on airplanes of the old Keystone Bombers, which were very slow in comparison to our latest Keystone's, Douglas and Martin Bombers.

After leaving the service Sgt. Fain went with the St. Louis Browns and stayed in organized baseball for two years. He then went to work for Humble Oil and Refinery at Houston, Texas.

On Dec. 27, 1941, just twenty days after the unmerciful attack upon Pearl Harbor, Sgt. Fain was again called to the colors to help defend his country. Due to his previous training he was immediately sent to school for additional training and after three months was rated an Aircraft Inspector, assigned to Victoria Field, Victoria, Texas. Here he served nine months and from Victoria Field, was sent to Lamesa Field to help activate this field.

Sgt. Fain is our Government Technical Inspector, whose duty is to inspect aircraft before they go to the flying line, checking to see that they are mechanically perfect. In addition to this duty Sgt. Fain must recommend, advise and supervise the repairing of gliders to meet Government specifications.

CAIRO — I was walking down a Cairo street when I met them. The larger object which approached looked like a South African private. The smaller looked so much like a monkey that it was a monkey. A little grey one, with a black face.

There must have been someone behind me; for the soldier saluted, and as he did so the monkey dived down from its perch on his shoulder into the open neck of his shirt. "Stop," I said. "This has gone far enough. Let's the three of us have a drink."

Kaffir, The Life-Saver
The South African, his name was Martinus Pelsler, told me the story of his monkey pal, whose name was Kaffir ("How d'you do, Kaffir. Have a sip of my beer." "Thanks. I don't mind if I do.") Martinus, talking with that fascinating lilt which is common to Afrikaans - speaking South Africans when using English, told me he owed his life to Kaffir, and Kaffir owed his life to him.

Martinus found Kaffir when he was a tiny baby, abandoned by his frightened mother, on the Pelsler farm near Durban. That was three years ago.

Now Kaffir has grown to be quite a big chap and when his master decided that he would away to the wars, the monkey made up his mind to come, too.

They enlisted together to fight beside the British. They went through Ethiopia together and took part in the battle of Sidi Rezegh, in November 1941. They are fighting in the current action, too. Martinus, who is a truck driver, was down on a Cario job when I met him.

"Kaffir saved my life three times," said Martinus. "It's always with airplanes. Kaffir can hear them long before any of us, and I believe he sees them, too. The only thing is that he doesn't know whether the planes he hears are our own or the enemy's. So he tells me about it

Then he tossed it all aside and became a buck private in the Marines.

when he gets the first indications, and I tell the boys and we all watch out.

It Was a Stuka
"Once I thought I had lost him, and was worried about it when suddenly he came leaping from nowhere and dived into my shirt, which is his way of letting me know something's up. I turned to my officer and said: 'A plane's coming at us, Sir.' At first he didn't believe me, but I dashed under a rock and he followed. Sure enough, a few seconds later a Stuka zoomed down like a rocket and let loose. The bomb exploded right where we would have got it nicely a moment earlier. The Jerry had come down out of the sun, so I don't think Kaffir saw him. He must have heard him."

Kaffir's favorite position in the truck is on the steering wheel. He sits on the bottom edge of the rim and hangs on round the top.

That's what became of that crusty professional fighting man who—three years before MacArthur and in the direction of Maj. Gen. Leonard Wood — organized the nucleus of America's army of the Philippines.

Davis now is chief gunner with a Marine detachment stationed here—as happy with his non-com rating as when he was a high-ranking army officer.

He resigned his commission in 1927 when the Marines went into action in Nicaragua and the army stayed behind. The Marine corps wouldn't have him as a commissioned officer because of his age, so he went as an enlisted man.

Now he wants to sic "my babies"—machine guns — on the Axis in the new war.

"I've got a dividend to pay to Uncle Sam," he says. "I'm 55,

strong and full of fight. I know war and how it is fought. I hope I get machine guns (on a fighting assignment. They're my babies."

Davis went to the island of Ceylon as deputy U. S. consul in 1909 and two years later joined the army in Honolulu. By the time he marched to the Mexican border with Pershing, he was a first lieutenant. He went to France, rose to a lieutenant colonelcy, won the DSC, Croix de Guerre and several other medals.

On his return he taught military science at the Universities of Cincinnati and Indiana, then went to Washington, where General Wood, as governor-general of the Philippines, requested his services in organizing a Filipino officers' training corps.

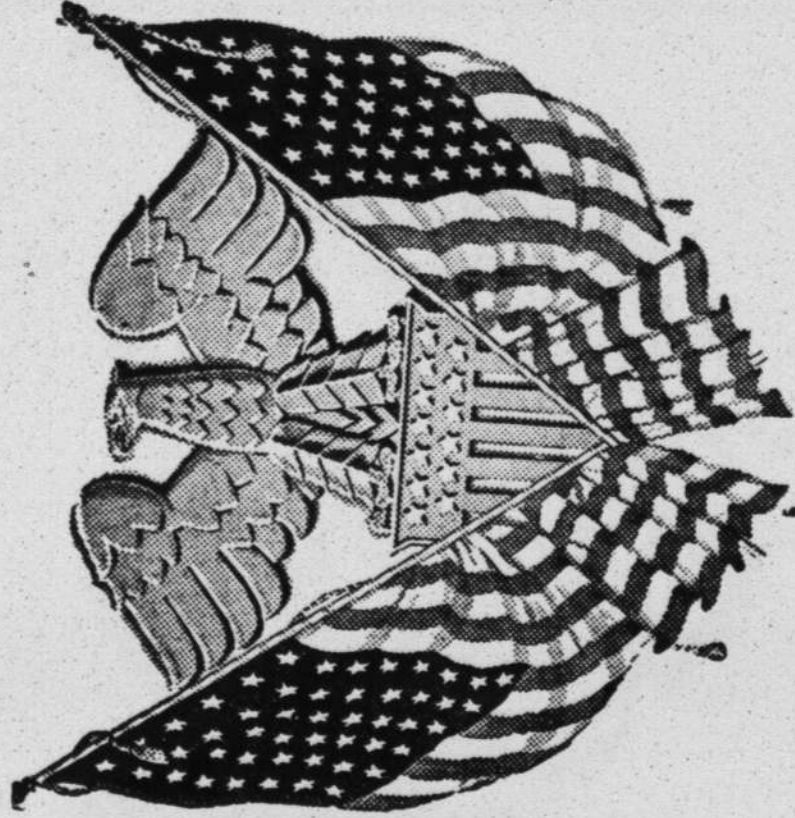

Wheat Farmers Get On Dotted Line

Texas wheat growers are falling in line with Federal all-risk wheat crop insurance.

Deadline for taking out insurance on the 1943 crop is August 31, according to Charlie L. Thomas, State AAA committeeman and wheat grower from Pampa.

New features of next year's insurance program include three-year contracts and reduced cost plan. Heretofore, insurance has been written on the 1943 crop, Thomas said.

Under the reduced plan, wheat growers who have built up premium balances in excess of losses will pay less for insurance. Purpose of the reduced cost plan is to distribute the cost of insurance more equitably by recognizing the smaller risk on those farms where few or no losses have occurred.

Insurance applications are being written in local AAA offices throughout the wheat area, Thomas said.

Texas Farmers Show Some Good Financial Gains

Texas farmers ranking third in the nation in production of eggs, ninth in hogs and tenth in milk are enjoying substantial benefits from huge government purchases of these and other commodities for Lend-Lease shipment and related distribution needs, Emmett McBryde, Austin AMA Acting District Supervisor and member of the Texas USDA War Board, said today.

"From the beginning of the program in April 1941 through June 30, this year, the Agricultural Marketing Administration purchased over \$248,000,000 worth of eggs, \$464,000,000 in pork products and \$262,000,000 in dairy products," McBryde pointed out. "These products represent only a part of the farm commodities purchased by AMA. Purchases of all commodities totaled more than \$1,296,000,000 for the period."

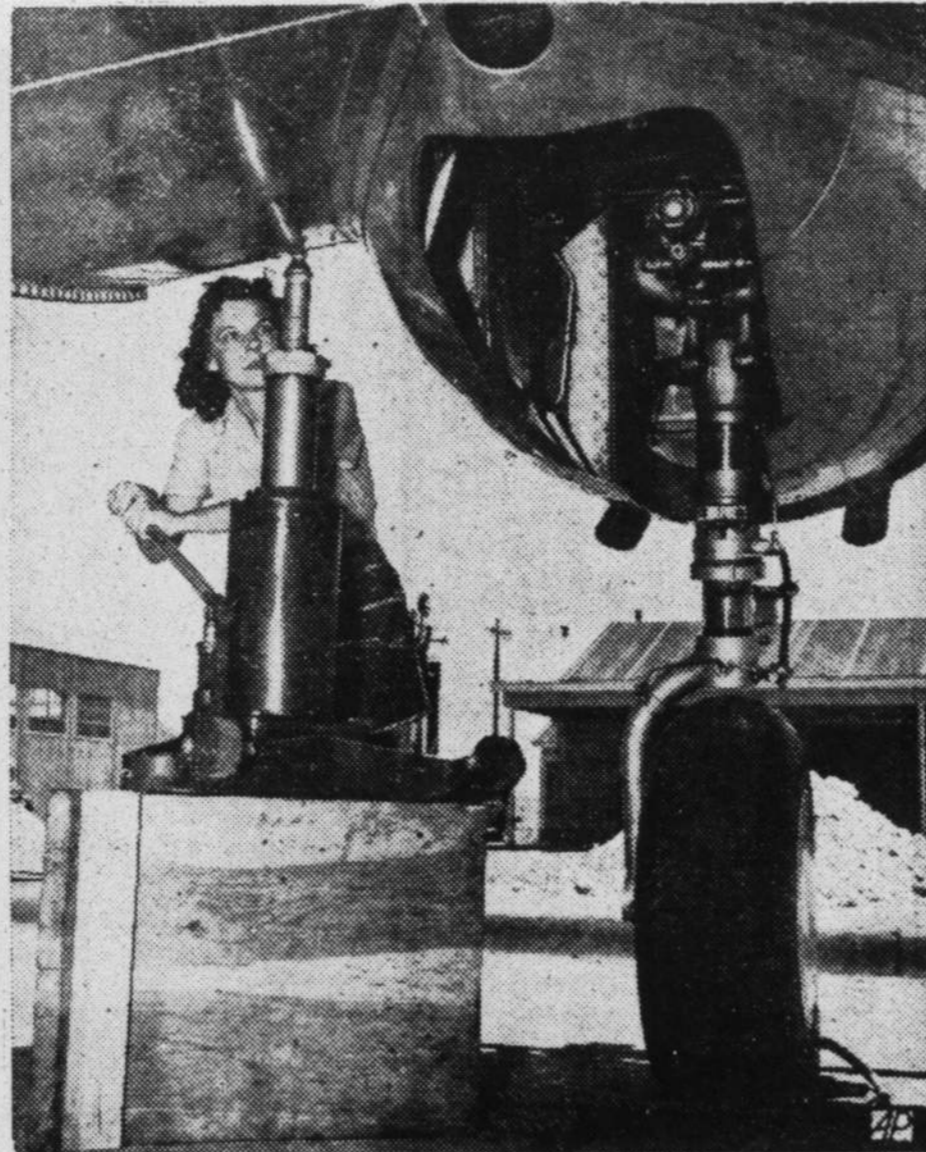

Rural Recreation Keeps Up Spirit In Communities

Although tire shortages are keeping rural Texans from driving long distances to movies and other forms of entertainment, planned recreation is keeping up morale and restoring the community and neighborhood in many localities.

Helen H. Swift, sociologist for the A. and M. College Extension Service, who works with rural women's organizations, cites these instances: Communities in Young County enjoy chicken barbecues, local talent programs, socials for young and old. One neighborhood sponsors a weekly party for the youngsters, and a woman's club provides a book review every two weeks, according to reports made to the County Home Demonstration Council.

The Farmers Valley Home Demonstration Club in Wilbarger County sponsors community recreation programs once a month. A party honoring a Navy seaman,

home for a 10-day furlough, brought a big community turnout in Montague County. The event was sponsored by a home demonstration club. In another Montague community, the Salona Club has made a school building into a community play center. Young and old enjoy folk dances and games two nights a month.

Need for organized recreation in Parmer County is great, since there is only one movie, one tennis court, and no swimming pools. To meet this need, a Friona homemaking teacher is devoting two afternoons each week to community recreation. Mrs. Will Nittler, chairman of the county home demonstration council, has organized a reading room in the basement of her home where girls may spend the afternoon. She obtained the books from the State Library. In Farwell a recently-organized Recreation Club is building a tennis court and soft ball diamond.

"Although cheese supplies at the present time are heavier than usual, we haven't too much cheese and we must keep right on making it without any let-up," B. F. Vance, chairman of the Board, said and urged consumption to encourage continued high production.

Vance pointed out that shipping schedules are being met and supplies for home use are high enough at the present time that the Department can urge consumers to eat more cheese.

During the two-week period, retail stores will focus consumer attention on the new Victory Food Special through advertising and displays.

For Best Canning Select Peaches Ripened On Tree

The best peaches are those which ripen on the tree.

Dispelling any doubt on that point J. F. Rosborough, horticulturist of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, then tells those seeking the best canning peaches to choose J. H. Hale, Elberta, or a similar yellow freestone species. These varieties hold their shape well when canned, have a firm texture, and a positive peachy flavor. Their skins are easily removed, and there is more flesh and less seed than with many other sorts.

An easy way to remove the skin of peaches preparatory to canning is to place them in a cloth sack and hold them in boiling water for a few minutes, or until the skin slips easily. Then dip them into cold water before peeling.

Frank is another variety which will be ripe soon. It is a yellow clingstone which Rosborough says, is excellent for desserts because of its sweetness. The Indian, a clingstone species with a red and white mot-

tled flesh, is suggested for peach pickles. Because of its firm texture it retains shape after pickling. Firmness is essential in any type of peach used in the canning method. For preserving, however, choose those which are soft when pressed with the thumb. They are a little sweeter and this flavor is imparted to the preserves. For ice cream, choose those bordering in softness.

Looking to next year's crop, Rosborough suggests removing all weeds and vegetation, now, and leaving the soil plowed and in the pink condition for the remainder of the summer.
