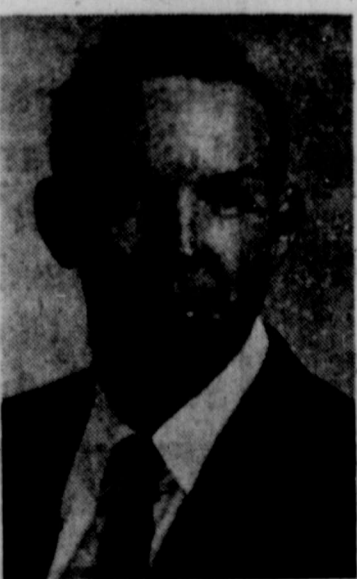

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Dorn Chapel Sanctuary

'No spot is so dear to my childhood' means this little Dorn Chapel sanctuary near Lake Colorado City, to early-day residents of the Dorn community and to members of the J.M. Dorn family in particular. Here in this chapel of the church, known also as Dorn Methodist Church, members and former members will celebrate their 75th anniversary as a church body, Sunday, May 22. The Rev. Bobby McMillan is pastor.

Dorn Chapel To Observe Birthday On Sunday

Homecoming Day at Dorn Methodist Church will mark the seventy-fifth anniversary of the organization of the church Sunday, May 22. Celebration will begin next Sunday morning with a worship service at 11 a.m. in the little country church sanctuary.

Dr. Hubert Bratcher, district superintendent of the Big Spring District, will be the speaker. The Rev. Bobby McMillan is pastor of Dorn church. He is also resident pastor at St. Luke Methodist in Colorado City.

Former members of the 75-year-old church body, friends of the church, descendants of early-day members and Dorn community families are all invited to attend the anniversary day.

Dinner on the grounds will follow the morning worship hour. Families are to bring covered dishes with enough food for their families who attend. Dorn Chapel members have announced.

Early in the afternoon there will be an informal fellowship period with former members to be given an opportunity to

share their memories of the church history. All living former pastors of the church have been invited to participate in the remaining session. Singing will be added to the sharing of long-ago experiences and the session for sharing church history.

History of Dorn Methodist Church is one worthy of being recalled on the special occasion.

The little church, which sits west of the shoreline of Lake Colorado City, was first organized late in March, 1891. Founding father was the late John Mevin Dorn who moved to Dorn community from Falls County in 1890, arriving Nov. 18, 1890 with his wife, their 10 children and 16 head of cattle, after traveling for three weeks by covered wagon.

After Mr. Dorn and his sons cleared the land and pitched a tent as temporary home, he said "Let's start living," according to an account by his daughter, Mrs. Ruby Hart. "Living" to the Dorn family, included two important things - going to school and going to church.

With the help of two neighbors, George Richardson and Jones Green, lumber was hauled in for the building of a school house. Started just after Christmas, 1890, the school was completed in March of the next year.

As soon as it was finished, Mr. Dorn rode into Colorado City to "get a preacher" for his flock and his neighbors. The late Rev. R. D. Belton was then pastor of First Methodist Church here, and J.T.L. Annis was presiding elder of this district. One of those two churchmen (Mrs. Hart can not recall which one) helped to organize the church at Dorn, to meet in the new school building.

Ten charter members were enrolled. Through deference to several Baptists who were charter members, the church was first called "Union Church." Later the name was changed to Dorn Chapel to honor the founding family. A Sunday School was organized and had J. M. Dorn as first superintendent. He served until 1925. His son, M. P. Dorn, Sr., then served until 1965 when he retired as superintendent. James

Jarratt is now superintendent of the Sunday school which still meets every Sunday.

Worship services were held in the school house until 1930 when the present building was erected. The Rev. Marcus Freeman was pastor at that time. The Rev. J. T. Griswold, presiding elder, Bishop E. E. Fross, came out from Dallas to conduct the dedication in October, 1965.

In 1963, the building was moved just far enough from its original site to pour a new foundation. The building was renovated, remodeled, ceilings lowered, wood paneled and fresh paint in light ivory applied. Last annual homecoming was in July, 1963, to celebrate the remodeling.

During its 75 year history, Dorn Chapel has never "had a lapse." According to Mrs. Hart "a lapse" was quite common in early days with some small churches closing down for the winter and resuming services with spring weather. Dorn Chapel has had services all year-round since its organization in 1891.

Dorn has Sunday School every Sunday morning. Twice each month worship services are conducted by the pastor, Rev. McMillan, at 9:30 a.m. Former pastors who have been invited to the Homecoming Day worship, dinner, and afternoon fellowship are the Reverends C. A. Long, Earnest Brown, Richard Payne, J. Lennel Hester, J. Edmund Kirby, Bruce Parks, William McReynolds, Max Browning, L. Kiel Quessenberry and C. T. Jackson.

Only living charter member of the church is Mrs. T. J. Coffey, now of Loraine. Mrs. Coffey is the oldest of the Dorn daughters, formerly Miss Hannah Dorn. Farmers Set Balloting Period

Cotton farmers in Mitchell County will vote this month to decide whether they want to be able to sell or lease their cotton allotments outside the county, Curtis Latimer, chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, has announced.

The referendum on the question will be conducted by mail during the period May 16 through May 25. Ballots may

also be delivered by hand to the ASCS county office. The only question to be decided by the balloting is whether upland cotton allotments may be transferred during the next 3 years to other farms outside the county which are owned or controlled by some one else. Such transfers may be made by sale or by lease. In no case may transfers be made outside the State. An affirmative vote by at

least two-thirds of the county's cotton farmers who vote will permit such transfers for the next three upland cotton crops, 1967-69. A referendum on the same question was conducted last fall, throughout the Cotton Belt, and growers in 349 counties at that time approved the allotment transfers. The vote this May will be held only in counties which disapproved such transfers in last fall's

vote. The upcoming vote by mail marks a first in program administration, according to Latimer. Farmers previously have been able to vote by mail in annual ASCS-committee elections, but the method has never before been used in a commodity program referendum. Latimer said, "It's easy to vote by mail, and we hope all producers will vote. The vote should be fully representative

of the wishes of cotton farmers in our county." The chairman said that copies of the ballot are being sent to all cotton producers of record in the county, together with information describing the program's purpose and operation. Any cotton producer who has a question about the referendum or about who is eligible to vote, is urged to get in touch with the ASCS county office.

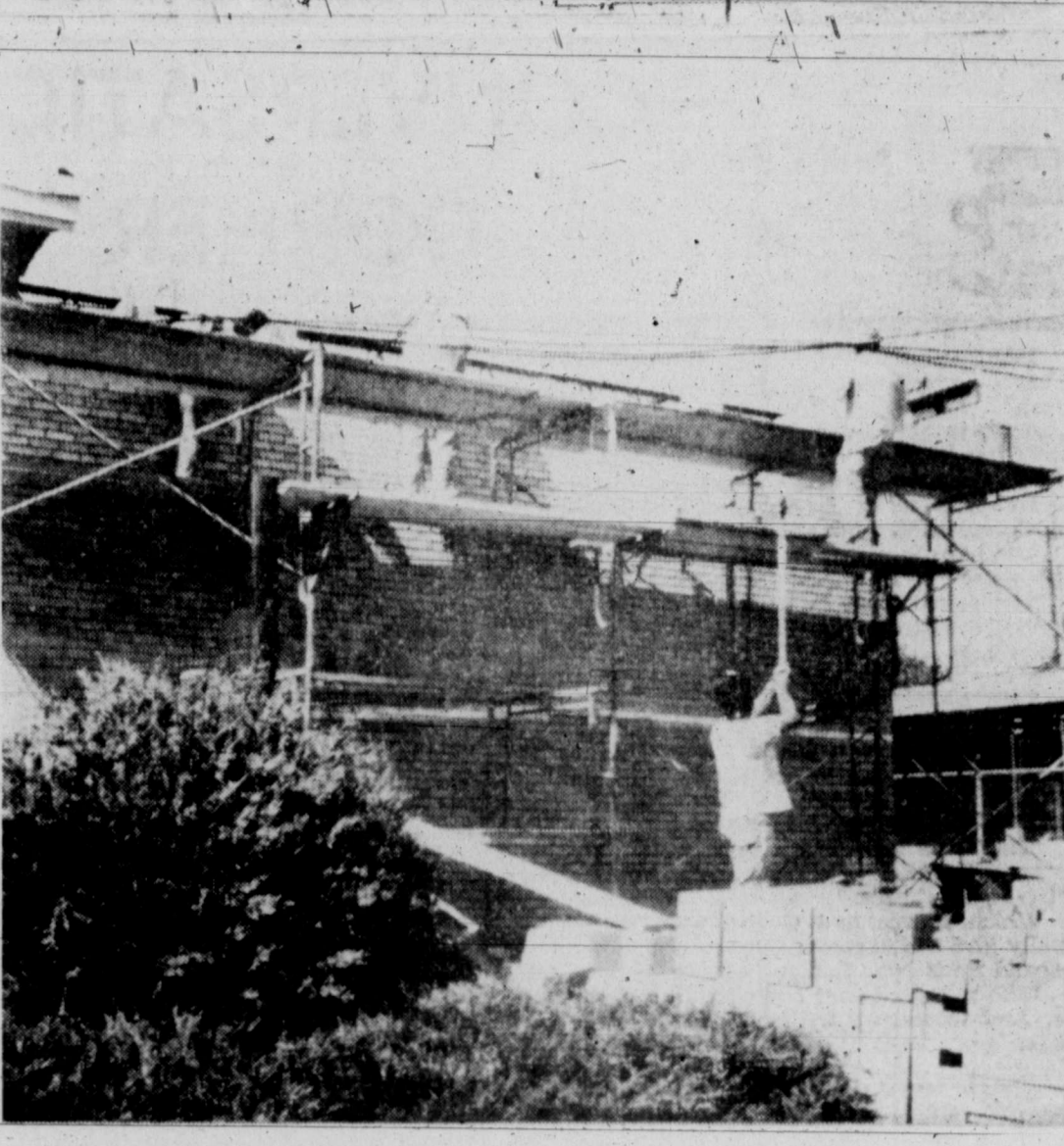

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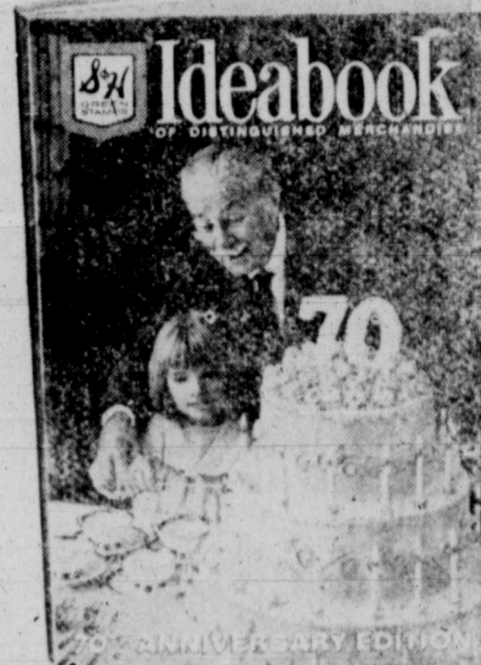
