Prison Term Set In Murder Case

A jury early Friday afternoon fixed punishment at five years in the state prison for Wayne Bryant, climaxing a weeklong murder trial in Sixth District Court.

Bryant, 21-year-old Paris man, was found guilty of murder with-out malice Thursday night by the same jury that on Sept. 3, 1967 fatal shooting of Hubert Alford, 20, of Bogata.

The jury heard pleas for a probation sentence from the defense Friday morning and listened to final pleadings of both the defense and state concerning punishment before adjourning to the jury room at 11:55 a. m. The non-probated sentence was returned about 12:45 p. m.

Jurors heard testimony from about 30 witnesses during course of the trial, which began Monday. Chief witnesses for the state were three Bogata youths who were with the victim at the time of the shooting incident north-east of Paris on a country road.

They were the victim's brother, Ray Alford, 17, Edward Tillman, 20, and Paul Ragsdale, 22.

Testimony revealed that the older Alford and Bryant had gotten into an argument during a pool game in a tavern across Red River in Oklahoma. It was decided that the two would come back to Texas to continue their fight according to the witnesses.

Bryant, accompanied by Stanley Helms, 21, also of Paris, followed the Bogata youths to a point about two and a half miles east of Highway 271 and south of the State Shoals road, it was told jurors.

There they testified that Bryant displayed a chain and a .22 caliber pistol. Alford was unarmed, it was brought out, and was shot as he approached Bryant. The two then scuffled for several moments after Alford had been hit in the left chest with the bullet, a .22 shot.

Alford was dead on arrival at a Paris hospital following the 3:45 p. m. shooting. Bryant and Helms were arrested at 9:45 p. m. in Paris.

Helms also was indicted in connection with the case. His trial has been set for Jan. 29.

Defense attorneys filed a motion for a new trial for Bryant and the defendant was allowed to remain free on the original bond until the court acts upon the motion in 30 days.

Austin. — Democrats will have at least a five-ring circus in the upcoming primary race for governor. In fact, there's a good chance that as many as eight candidates will toss their hats in the ring by February 5 filing deadline.

It will be a free-for-all, with the two best-known Democratic leaders, Gov. John Connally and Sen. Ralph Yarborough standing on the sidelines. For the first time since 1956 the incumbent governor will not be running for reelection.

Lt. Gov. Preston Smith, happy that his prediction that Connally and Yarborough would stand aside, continued his steady campaigning for governor as, one by one, other candidates got into the race.

Gordon B. McLendon, Dallas radioman, and Pat O'Daniel of Dallas, son of former Gov. W. Lee O'Daniel, were the first to follow Smith in the filing.

Then came former Attorney General Waggoner Carr. Secretary of State John L. Hill of Houston lined up at the post Monday for a running start to become No. 5.

Don Yarborough of Houston, who ran against Connally in 1962 and 1964, was in chute No. 6.

In chutes Nos. 7 and 8 were two Texans who have been serving as ambassadors. These are Eugene Locke of Dallas, who has been in South Vietnam, and Ed Clark of Austin and San Augustine, who has been in Australia.

Decisions by Sen. John Tower and U. S. Rep. George Bush of Houston to stay out of the Republican primary for governor leaves that race open for the moment. Albert Fay of Houston is mentioned most among the GOP as their standard bearer against the winner of the Democratic donnybrook.

JUNIOR COLLEGES TO 'OPEN DOORS' — Junior college admission for anybody who wants to "succeed or fail on his own effort" is part of the policy of the public junior college master plan adopted by the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System.

Senior colleges and universities are getting more and more selective, and the Board felt there must be a place for the "late bloomer" — the student who demonstrates academic ability later than most, as well as the person whose employment ambitions require only two years of college, and the post-college age people who need continuing education.

There are 39 public junior college campuses in the state now, and the Board's plan envisions 73 within 20 years, with total enrollment of 305,000. Junior college enrollment is increasing at the average rate of 20 per cent a year, compared to a 10 per cent average increase for four-year schools.

Ironically enough, the plan adopted and labeled "emergency" was similar to one proposed by Rep. Jerry Sadler in 1955, but rejected as "too advanced."

ATTORNEY GEN. RULES — A member of the Texas Teacher Retirement System can "buy" out-of-state experience credit less than three years before he retires and draw corresponding additional benefits three years after payment, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin held.

In other recent opinions, Mar-

tin has concluded that:

- Texas Air Control Board must determine which plants processing agricultural products in their natural state (those which come to plants in substantially the same condition as they existed in nature) are under its jurisdiction.

- Members of Air Control Board also can serve on the advisory National Center for Air Pollution Control or as faculty members at state-supported universities.

- Junior colleges are exempt from standard floor space, type building, bond and number-of-instructors requirements for cosmetology training courses.

- Utility companies are responsible for costs of relocating poles and other facilities incident to widening of county roads where facilities are located on a perspective road right of way. Companies have no right to any portion if right of way due to long use.

TRAVEL TRAILS — Governor John Connally has designated 10 Travel Trail Areas in Texas. Each route is designed to help Texans and Texas visitors find some of the most interesting parts of the Lone Star State.

These include the Plains Trail in the Panhandle; the Mountain Trail in the Big Bend; the Pesos Trail in the region below San Angelo; the Forts Trail in the old Indian country from Menard to Jackboro; the Hill Country Trail in LBJ country; the Lakes Trail in the region of lakes above and below Dallas-Fort Worth; the Brazos Trail through Central Texas and the Brazos Valley; the Forest Trail through the Piney Woods and other parts of East and Northeast Texas; the Independence Trail through the Galveston-Victoria - San Antonio region; and the Tropical Trail from Corpus Christi down through the Lower Rio Grande Valley.

SMITH NAMES COMMITTEES — Lt. Gov. Preston Smith named four legislative council committees to undertake studies ordered by the 1967 Legislature. Committees also will make recommendations to the Council, and the 1969 Legislature.

To the Committee on Feasibility of Establishing and Operating an Academy of Science in Crime Prevention and Detection, Smith named Rep. Gene Hendryx of Alpine, chairman; Sen. Jack Hightower of Vernon; Sen. David Ratliff, Stamford; and Reps. Paul Floyd of Houston and James Slider of Naples.

To the Committee to Study Rules and Procedures of State Administrative Agencies, he appointed Rep. R. H. (Dick) Cory of Victoria (chairman); Sen. Barbara Jordan of Houston; Sen. J. P. Word of Meridian; Rep. Grant Jones of Abilene and Rep. Ralph Wayne of Plainview.

Smith picked Sen. Murray Watson Jr. of Waco to chair the committee to study the Fire Record Credit and Debit System. Others on this committee are Rep. Tommy Shannon of Fort Worth, Rep. Don Cavness of Austin, Rep. George Hinson of Minola, and Sen. Hightower.

Rep. Menton Murray of Harlingen, Representative Cory and Representative Jones will serve with Senator Jordan on the committee on Statutory Revision. Senator Word will chair that committee.

Change R. R. Co. Food Stamp Plan

A change in the issuance procedure for the food stamp program has been announced by the State Department of Public Welfare and the Red River County Commissioners' Court, joint sponsors.

Beginning in February, sale of the stamps will be made in Annona, Avery, Bogata, and Detroit, as well as Clarksville, in the hopes of encouraging greater participation among eligible citizens. At the present time, all purchasers must come to Clarksville for the stamp issuance each month.

The February schedule calls for the Clarksville office to be open on Tuesday, Thursday and Friday, Feb. 13, 15 and 16, and on Tuesday, Feb. 27, 8:30 a. m. to 4 p. m.

Other towns will be served on Wednesday, Feb. 14, and Tuesday, Feb. 22. The schedule is: Bogata (at City Hall), Feb. 14, 3 to 4:30 p. m.; Feb. 22, 11:15 to 12 noon; and, Detroit (at City Hall), Feb. 14, 1 to 2:30 p. m.;

Rebels Take Over First Place 15-AA

The Rivercrest Rebels took over sole possession of first place in District 15-AA boys' standings at Rivercrest Friday, but it took three overtimes for the Rebels to beat Commerce 64-61.

The squads were tied 52-52 at the end of regulation play, 56-56 after one overtime and 59-59 after the second extra session.

Rivercrest jumped out in front in the third overtime and never trailed. The win left the Rebels as the only undefeated team in the district standings.

Commerce and Rivercrest had been tied for the league prior to Friday's game, both with 3-0 marks.

The Tigers had held a lead over the Rebels during most of the regulation game, thanks to an effective full-court press. And at halftime, Commerce held a 37-34 lead. The Tigers led by as many as 10 points in the third period and were in front 48-40 at the start of the final period.

Levine Norman, Danny Collins and Amos Brown hit for the Rebels and tied the game 50-50 with 3:18 on the clock. It was tied 52-52 at the end of regulation play.

Minter put Rivercrest in front to stay in the opening seconds of the third overtime.

Rivercrest's Norman was the game's standout. He had 24 points for his team and dominated the boards on both ends of the court. Minter had 15 points and Brown ended with 11.

In the "B" game, Commerce took a 68-36 victory. Montgomery had 11 points for the Rebels.

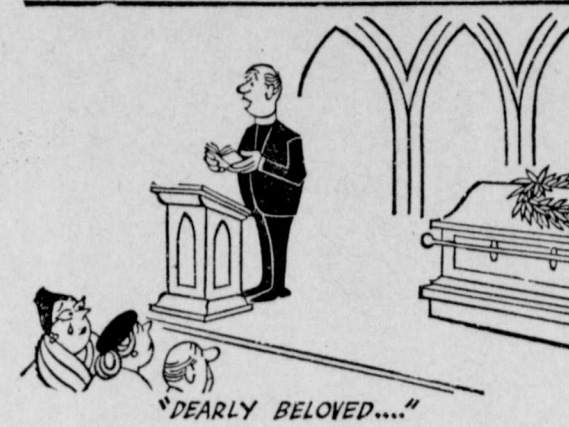
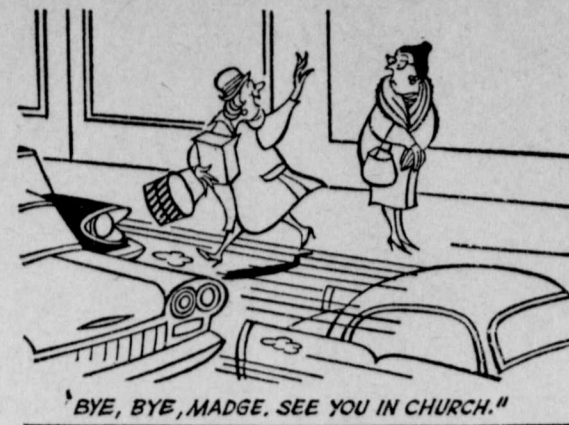

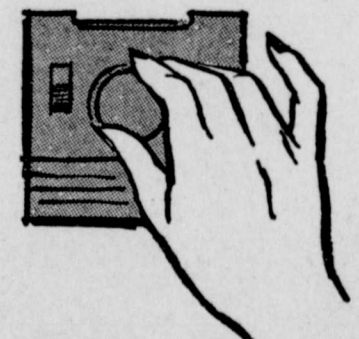
