County Cotton Scene Improves

SBA Declares Mitchell Disaster Area

The farm picture in Mitchell County is beginning to brighten somewhat with farmers now eligible to apply for Small Business Administration loans.

Thursday Congressman Omar Burleson announced that the SBA declared Mitchell, Haskell, Throckmorton and Young Counties eligible for a federal disaster assistance because of physical damage caused by natural disaster.

Mitchell County suffered losses from drought from Oct. 1, 1977 to Aug. 24, 1978.

Haskell County's drought loss was from March 21, 1978 to Aug. 2, 1978. Throckmorton was

from Jan. 1, 1978 to Aug. 3, 1978 and Young County was from Jan. 1, 1978 to July 19, 1978.

Since Mitchell County was declared a drought disaster county, the adjoining counties of Scurry, Fisher, Borden, Howard, Sterling and Coke are also eligible for SBA loans.

Crop losses considered to be eligible for the SBA disaster loans include any crop loss resulting from a physical disaster, including corn, milo, soybeans, oats, wheat, rye, barley, hay and pasture.

The amount of physical loss to each crop is computed by the acres planted times the established nor-

mal yield times the percentage of loss times the market price.

From that figure, any insurance collected, any Agriculture Stabilization Conservation Service disaster payments or recoveries from any other source are subtracted.

Necessary collateral to secure an SBA loan includes liens on crops, machinery, equipment, livestock and real estate, subject to existing liens.

Loans may be verified by ASCS, Farmers Home Administration, other United States Department of Agriculture or an SBA verifier.

Application for loans can be made at the SBA offices in the old Taylor County Courthouse in Abilene, according to Mitchell County Judge Bill Carter.

Filing date for loan applications are authorized until March 6, 1979, for physical damage and until the close of business on June 9, 1978 for economic injury.

Thursday Mitchell County residents were given an

opportunity to get a first-hand view of the farm picture in Mitchell County at the Annual Farm Tour.

In the course of the Farm Tour, 95 people surveyed the various grain sorghum and cotton demonstrations across the county.

At mid-morning, a watermelon break was held at Custom Ag Services with watermelon provided by Travis Turner, County Extension Agent.

Commissioners To Appoint Librarian

Appointment of a librarian for the Mitchell County Library will be the main item of business transacted at the regular monthly meeting of the Mitchell County Commissioners Monday.

At the 1 p.m. meeting, the commissioners will also appoint library board members.

The meeting will be held at the Mitchell County Courthouse.

Bob Benson noted that not as many people attended the tour this year as did last year, but he said it was probably because "the crops this year are not as encouraging as the crops were last year."

Some 115 people were on hand at the Farm Tour luncheon to hear Dr. Jarvis Miller, keynote speaker.

Dr. Miller, president of Texas A&M University, informed the group that energy and food are the two major crisis facing the world.

"We have a hungry world," he said, "noting that we have a 60 day supply of food. That 60 days stands between us and starvation."

Noting that population growth was a problem, Dr. Miller said, "We must double our food production within the next 22 years to keep even with today's level of consumption."

Dr. Miller concluded his presentation by saying, "At no time in our history has agriculture played a more vital role. We have the basic resources that we need. What we do need is leadership, motivation and determination."

Prior to the luncheon, those in attendance were afforded the opportunity to guess the number of cotton bales Mitchell County will produce this year.

Last year, Jack Green won the contest by estimating that 69,742 bales would be produced in the county. Official count saw 71,421 bales produced. Mrs. L. B. Elliot guessed 68,393 last year and Jerry

Grant was next in line at 68,000.

This year estimations ranged from 18,000 to 48,000, with an average bale count of 29,612.

Various estimations this year were Judge Bill Carter, 23,333 bales; D. M. Smith, 24,000; Jim Dockrey, 23,958; Frank Brownfield, 24,567; C. W. Cox, 25,000; Travis Turner, 25,001; Maggie Hamrick, 26,330; Wayne Oliver, 26,687 and Jerry Putman, 31,500.

Other estimations were Benson, 26,800; Soil Conservation Service Director Van Mills, 27,138; County Entomologist David Kat-

Slaton Defeats Wolves 20-13 In Season Opener

Slaton's Tigers took advantage of miscues by Colorado City Friday night to come from behind and score with 1:17 left in the game to down the Wolves 20-13 before a large crowd.

The Wolves fumbled four times in the second half and the final half of the game was played on the Wolves' half of the field. One other time, the Wolves punted to Slaton in the second half and out of five possessions, the Wolves stopped the Tigers three times but twice Slaton got in to score to overcome a 13-6 first half deficit.

Ironically, it was a Slaton mistake at the end that probably helped the Tigers win the game. With less than two minutes left in the game, Slaton had the ball at the Wolves five. Three plays later, the Tigers were at the Wolves 2 1/2. On fourth down as the Tigers snapped the ball, an official blew his whistle but the play continued to develop and the Wolves had the Tiger quarterback stopped for a loss and it looked for a minute like the Wolves had the game in the bag.

However, officials called Slaton for delay of game and backed the ball up to the seven so the Tigers got to play the fourth down over. Then a pass play into the end zone gave Slaton the lead and the victory with only 1:17 left in the contest.

Slaton got the opening kick-off and marched from their own 38 to score with the Quarterback Ricky Davis going the final 24 yards after he went back on a pass play and couldn't find a receiver open. The try for extra point failed on a bad snap from center and the score was 6-0 with 8:39 left in the first quarter.

The Wolves got the kick-off to their own 26 and on the first play Slaton got the ball back on a fumble at the Wolves 24 and things didn't look good for the home town team.

However, Slaton was backed up by a tightened Wolf defense and Wolf Jay Feaster caught a sliced Slaton punt and ran to the Wolves 49.

The Wolves were unable to move the pigskin and punted to Slaton. A few plays later, the Wolves' Martin Molina hopped on a Tiger fumble at Slaton's 20. The Wolves got to Slaton's four, then got backed up on a penalty to the 22.

However, on a pass attempt from Quarterback Gene Carter to Tight End Russell Noel, interference was called at the one and the Wolves had new life. Wolf Fullback Gary Hulme carried it over on the next play for the score and Ruben Garcia added the extra point to give the Wolves the lead with 2:21 left in the first period.

After that the two teams exchanged fumbles with the Wolves getting the ball on their own 31. In a time consuming drive, the Wolves went in for a score with a critical fourth down being converted on a pass from Carter to David Rivera who went from Slaton's 16 to the three and set up the one-yard plunge three plays later by Hulme. Try for extra point was wide and gave the Wolves a 13-6 lead with 2:24 left in the first half.

The second half started as bad as the first half for the Wolves as the kick-off was fumbled on the return and Slaton got the ball at

the Wolves 27. They were stopped on a pass interception by the Wolves Jay Feaster.

Then Slaton got the ball on a fumble at the Wolves 22 and the Wolves held again. Slaton got the ball on a punt on their own 46 and again the Wolves held. Then Slaton got the ball back on the Wolves 43 and drove in to score with Halfback Michael Whaley going the last 12 yards to score with 6:33 left in the

fourth quarter. Try for two points failed.

Slaton got the ball back three plays later on a Wolf fumble at Colorado City's 28 and drove in to score on the fourth down pass from Davis to Darryl Heinrich.

In the second half the Wolves ran only 15 plays, one of which was a punt, four resulting in fumbles and three in desperation with less than a minute left in the contest.

Two standouts in the

game were Fullback Gary Hulme who rolled up 68 yards on 20 carries and Tight End Dwayne Staats who caught four passes, one nullified by an ineligible receiver, with the three passes allowed resulting in 41 yards gained. Wolf Martin Molina had two fumble recoveries and Feaster intercepted one Slaton pass.

The Wolves, who'll face Sweetwater here next Friday, came out of the game

without any apparent serious injuries. Quarterback Gene Carter suffered an apparent mild concussion on the next to last play in the game but is expected to be all right.

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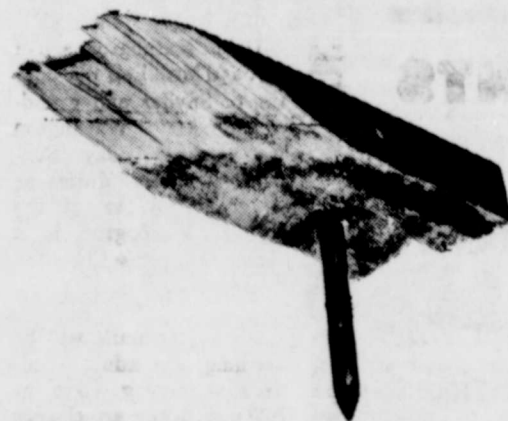
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Association To Focus On Sunday School
