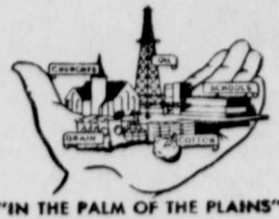

Mitchell, a 231-pound Senior, was selected to the team as a guard. He was the only member of the New Deal squad to make either the first or second team. Mitchell, a spark plug on a team that posted a 6-4 season mark, was named to the All-South Plains second team last year as a Junior and was one of two returning to make the first team.

A strong link in the New Deal defense, Mitchell was in on 80 tackles during the 1965 season. His offensive play at tackle was strong and opened many holes for the Lion backfield.

AHS Antelopes On All-South Plains Squads

Terry Barton and Lane Wade, two Senior standouts for the AHS Antelopes, were selected to the All-South Plains AA squad last week. The team, chosen by the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal each year, is composed of stars from Districts 3-AA and 4-AA. Two other AHS Seniors, Jim Barton and Mike Franklin, were selected to the second team of the stellar squad.

Terry Barton started his varsity career as a halfback, but was later switched to linebacker and guard. As a Junior, Terry was selected to the All-District first team as a guard and was one of two Juniors named to the All-South Plains squad. The familiar number 62 was all over field on defense this year. Terry was leading tackler for the 'Lopes. From his pulling guard position, Terry cleared many paths around the end and up the middle for the 'Lope backfield. He was named to both the offensive and defensive all-District AA teams this year.

Wade started off the 1965 season with a bang, but was slowed down in the third game when he received a severe injury to his knee. Wade grabbed 26 points in the opening game against Frenship and then against Petersburg had his best night of the season. Although he carried the ball only five times, Wade tallied 20 points and 255 yards rushing. Wade ended the season with a total of 76 points and was the fourth leading AA scorer in the area.

Jim Barton and Franklin are both relative newcomers to the 'Lope squad. Jim grabbed a starting position at right end at the start of the season and held on. He was named to the District 3-AA stellar squad as a first team offensive end recently. Franklin participated in his first year of football this year for the 'Lopes and the 215-pound center took his place admirably. He was also named to the All-District 3-AA squad recently.

Coach Don Williams, in his first year at the helm at AHS, was nominated for Coach of the Year, but was narrowly defeated by Don Light of Friona, the 3-AA champs. Williams led the 'Lopes to a 7-3 season record compared to a 3-7 mark last year.

Denver City placed four on the first team and one on the second team to dominate the all-star squad. Abernathy was a close second while Friona had two on the first team and one on the second. Joe Priest of Olton was the only other representative from 3-AA on the first team. Post and Morton each had one on the first team.

It was announced later last week that Wade was chosen to the second team of the South Plains Dream Team, which is also selected by the Avalanche-Journal. The 180-pounder was listed as a back on the squad that listed 33 players from B, A, AA and AAA schools on the South Plains.

A two-car collision at the underpass in South Abernathy later Sunday afternoon did not result in injury to drivers or passengers, reports said.

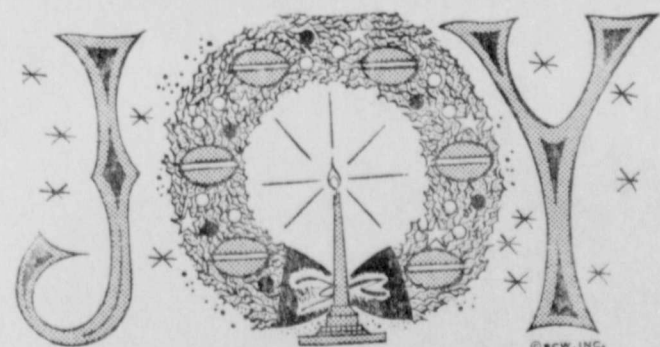

Grim Reaper Will "Work" On Holidays

AUSTIN — Past experience indicates some 110 persons will be killed in traffic accidents during the 10-day Christmas-New Year's holiday period. It was reported by Col. Homer Garrison, Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Garrison said in addition to the grim traffic death projection made by DPS Statistical Services, it is also estimated that there will be 43 homicides and suicides and 42 deaths from ac-

cidents other than traffic, for a total violent death toll of 195.

"We would like to appeal once again to the driving public to join us in an all-out effort to cut down on this terrible toll, particularly in traffic where observance of traffic laws and rules of safety can actually do something about it," the DPS director said.

In an effort to call attention to the dangers involved in holiday travel, the DPS will conduct its annual "Operation Deathwatch" during the 10-day period, from 12:01 a.m. December 24 (Christmas Eve) through 11:59 p.m. January 2, violent deaths will be tabulated and the totals announced three times

daily from the Department headquarters in Austin.

"We will also have every available patrolman on duty," Garrison said. "These men are on the road to protect and serve the citizens of this state. In addition to the highway patrol, there will be some 150 extra patrolmen from other DPS uniformed services on duty."

During last year's Christmas-New Year's holiday period, a total of 228 persons died violently. Of these, 128 were killed in traffic.

This year's estimate of 110 holiday road deaths means an average of 11 per day, which is considerably greater than the normal daily average of traffic

Post Office Sets Christmas D-Day

Wednesday is D-Day, Postmaster Herman Lambert warned.

That's the last day out-of-town Christmas gifts and greetings should be deposited in the mails to be 100 per cent sure that they are delivered on time.

Mail volume nationally has been breaking all records. To date, the Abernathy Post Office has handled 168,000 pieces of mail. This compares with last year's total of 161,000.

He estimated that mail volume to date is running about 12% above, last year during the same period.

So far, 20,000 Christmas stamps have been purchased.

Each of these attractive "special" stamps depicting the Angel Gabriel offer first-class mail privileges for Christmas cards. The use of the Gabriel stamp or any other five-cent stamp will provide forwarding service if the recipient has moved. First-class services allows for returning of the cards if they are undeliverable provided a return address is on the envelope. It also means they receive priority in handling and delivery.

The postmaster is asking that all outgoing mail include the local ZIP Code in the return address (where practical, indicate the code number).

"This is the best time of the year to up-date mailing lists. Remember to check the ZIP Codes on all incoming mail and add them to your address book."

"Last year, ZIP Codes were a great help in speeding mail delivery. In fact, they were largely responsible for the outstanding record of on-time delivery chalked up across the nation during the Christmas rush," he said.

It has been published countless times in magazines, newspapers, anthologies. But it never grows old; and we count it a privilege to be able to bring it to our readers.

One Solitary Life

Here is a young man who was born in an obscure village, the son of a peasant woman.

He grew up in another village. He worked in a carpenter shop until he was thirty, and then for three years he was an itinerant preacher.

He never wrote a book . . . He never held an office . . . He never owned a home . . . He never had a family . . . He never went to college . . . He never put his foot inside a big city . . . He never traveled 200 miles from the place where he was born.

He never did one of the things that usually accompany greatness. He had no credentials but himself.

While he was still a young man, the tide of public opinion turned against him. His friends ran away. He was turned over to his enemies.

He went through the mockery of a trial. He was nailed to a cross between two thieves. While he was dying, his executioners gambled for the only piece of property he had on earth, and that was his coat.

When he was dead, he was laid in a borrowed grave through the pity of a friend.

Nineteen centuries wide have come and gone, and today he is the central figure of the human race and the leader of the column of progress.

I am far within the mark when I say that all the armies that ever marched, and all the navies that ever sailed, and all the parliaments that ever sat, and all the kings that ever reigned, put together, have not affected the life of man upon this earth as has that one solitary life.

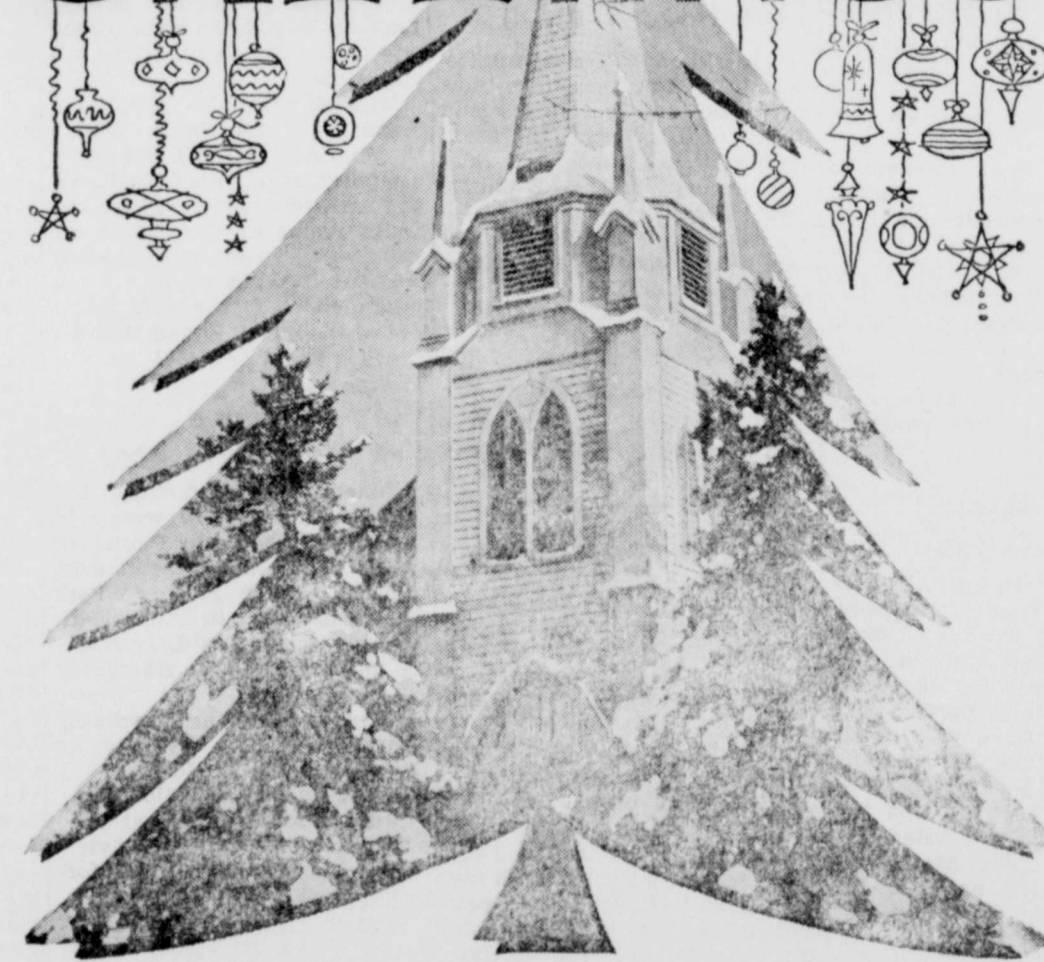

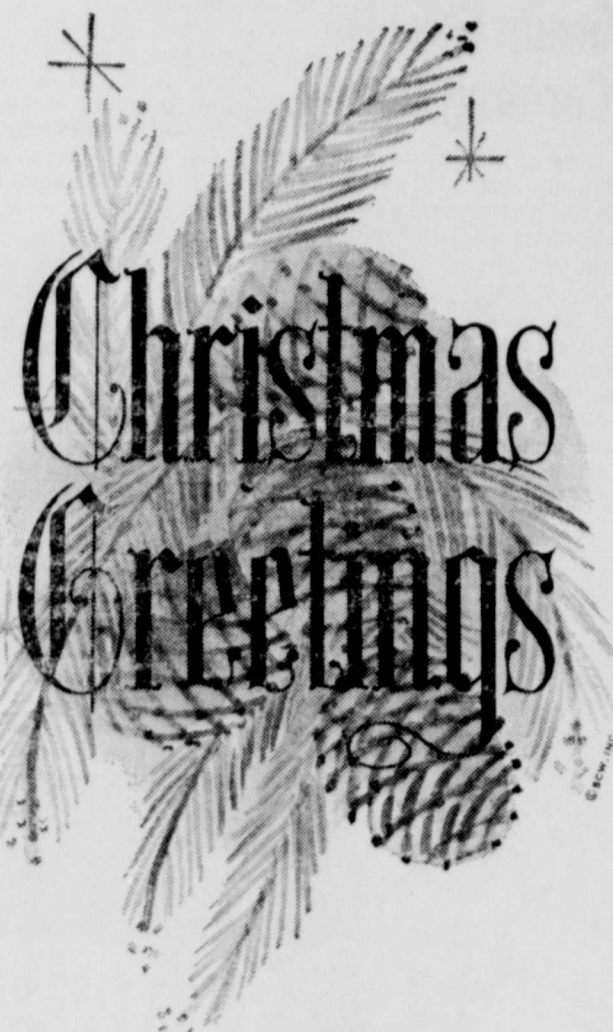

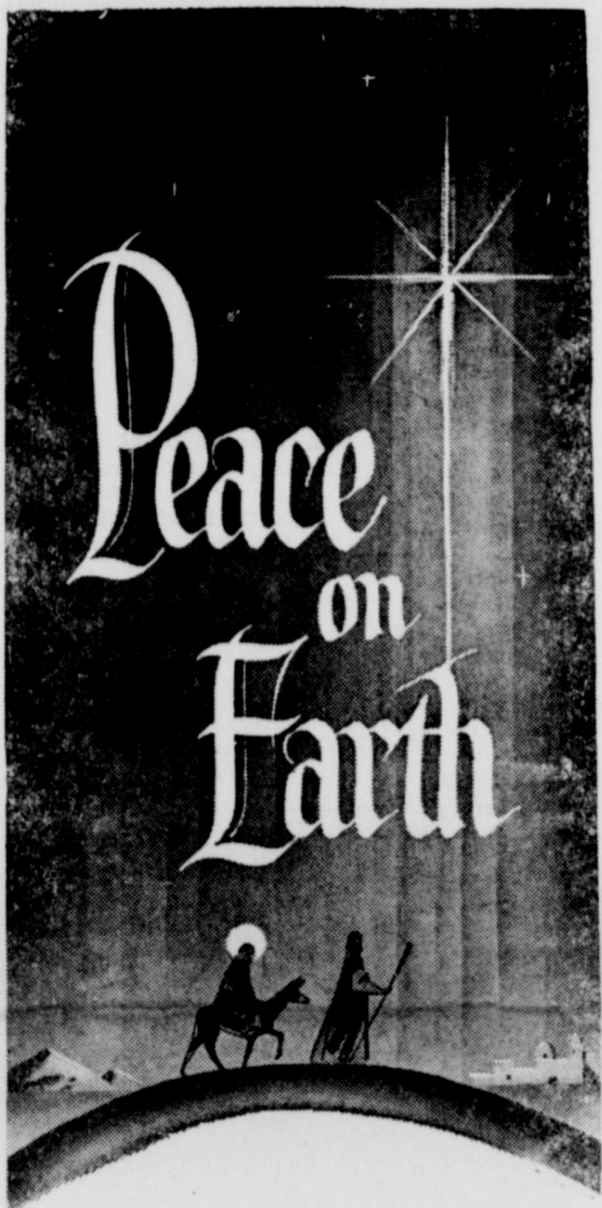
