

Snooter Knows

ONE THING CAN BE SAID OF Fort Worth over Dallas. Fort Worth sees the importance of preserving a gift which has performed valuable service to the people of Texas—in fact, so valuable has been the service that because of its existence it has built "mountains out of molehills." Cities have developed where only a log camp existed before. This gift of which we refer Fort Worth excelled Dallas, is the locomotive which provided the power to operate trains over the countryside.

We are indebted to the Texas & Pacific Railway Topics for March, for the story of the feat in which Fort Worth excelled Dallas. When the T&P became 100 per cent dieselized the locomotives were consigned to the scrap heap. T&P President V. G. Vollmer, decided to make the Dallas Fair a gift of No. 638 locomotive to preserve for inspection by future posterity. As Topics said, "It was felt that there, literally millions of persons annually—especially youngsters and generations yet unborn—would be able to get a close-up view of a romantic symbol of a fast-vanishing era of transportation." That was on Dec. 22, 1949, that President Vollmer made the presentation of the locomotive to the Dallas State Fair.

The cost of these locomotives when new was \$117,000.

After five years on exhibition at the State Fair, Topics said: "Vandals began taking off small levers and gauges, breaking out glass in cab windows, hacking and marking and defacing both the inside and the outside with pencil, paint, chalk and lipstick." The Fair finally sold No. 638 for scrap which brought \$2,500.

Topics pointed out that "A little less than a year later," after the Fair was given No. 638, President Vollmer presented No. 610 locomotive to the Fort Worth Southwestern Exposition and Fair. It was named the "Will Rogers" in honor of the famed cowboy humorist.

"Fortunately," continued the Topics story, "this companion locomotive to No. 638 was inclosed with a high fence, topped with vandal-stopping multiple strands of barbed wire. When it is on public exhibition from 4:30 to 6 p.m., daily, it is guarded by a vigilant watchman. The City of Fort Worth spent \$500 last year alone sprucing up the locomotive."

The Dallas News joined in the dirge; and stated editorially: "Over at Fort Worth, you can still see its sister locomotive. Not because of less rain and rust and fewer vandals, but because of better care. The storied past cannot survive without its curator. Here in Dallas, we lacked ours."

The generations to come who read in the history books of the pioneer days when the locomotives or steam engines are mentioned they will have to spend a day in Fort Worth to see the original of the "iron horses" pictured in these history books as they pilot trains across the country and behind which great cities are building in their wake.

At any rate, McMorries was reported back in prison, and excitement caused in Stanton and Martin county by his sudden re-appearance Friday, March 11, was beginning to subside somewhat. He reported to Morgan Hall, county parole officer, when he arrived, and Hall said his papers showed that he was to report back to Ramsey Prison Farm No. 1 at Sugarland.

McMorries was sentenced to three years in prison after his plea of guilty to theft of Martin county funds, in district court at Sweetwater. He had entered the prison February 6.

Brothers Held In School Thefts

Two brothers who formerly lived in Stanton are held in jail at Lamesa and Hobbs, N.M., and charged with the burglary of the high school in which \$50 and an adding machine were stolen. Carroll Wayne Follis is held in jail at Lamesa and Kenneth D. Follis is held in jail at Hobbs, N.M.

Two burglaries had occurred at the high school, the first one the night of February 9, and a Houston man was arrested recently in Camden, Ark., and charged with that theft. Then, a few nights later, the high school was burglarized a second time, and the two brothers have been arrested and charged with that burglary. Carroll Wayne Follis made a confession of his part in the burglary last week.

The brother in jail in Lamesa will remain for a while, as charges are pending there against him, according to Sheriff Dan Saunders. The other brother may be extradited from New Mexico shortly.

Juvenile Problem Could Be One of Facilities

Could it be possible that Stanton is riding along in the same boat over the turbulent waters created by finding a solution to the problem of stemming the invasion of juvenile delinquency as that which the people of Alpine are faced?

James Glasscock, editor of the Alpine Avalanche, published in a recent issue of his newspaper, the report of the Brewster County Grand Jury, "urging a volunteer curfew," according to the Avalanche.

Repercussions from the jury's report was forthcoming from some of the Alpine citizens. They wrote their answer to the problem, but failed to sign their names to the communications.

According to Glasscock, as usually the case, anonymous communications are assigned to the wastebasket. But in this instance, the matter contained in one writer's communication "provided basis for some thought", and the Alpine editor broke down the barrier of refusing to publish any communication not signed by its author.

Here is what the writer said and it so clearly defines the position in which Stanton finds itself, that we give it space. Let The Reporter reader decide if the anonymous author of the communication doesn't pretty well reveal the situation as found in Stanton.

Here's the Alpine writer's position involving the teen-age problem:

"Just what is there in the entire city of Alpine for teenagers to do for recreation or entertainment? How about on dates? Either to the movies (one of three) or 'just riding around.'"

"Alpine also has problems with children younger than 'teen-age.' These younger children need some type of recreation, too, besides just the movies.

"Alpine has no public swimming pool, no city park, no public bowling alley, no skating rink, very few dances, no amusement centers. . . . Whose job is it to furnish these?"

"Juvenile delinquency problems are not overcome by curfews nor entirely by chaperoning, but rather by giving juveniles more and varied interests in the form of recreation and entertainment."

"What happened to the playground and city park that was started some months ago and never completed?"

And this writer takes the opportunity to ask the citizens of Stanton what was their answer recently to projects that had for their purpose to provide entertainment and recreational facilities to the teen-agers here, but was turned down by a majority vote of the legal voters of Stanton?

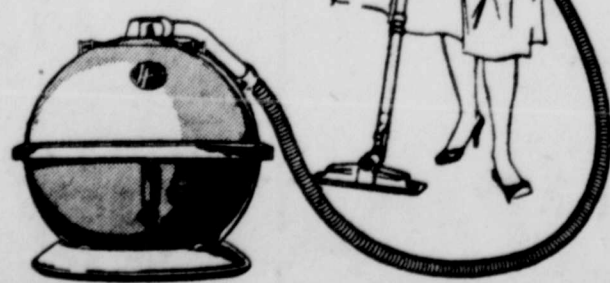

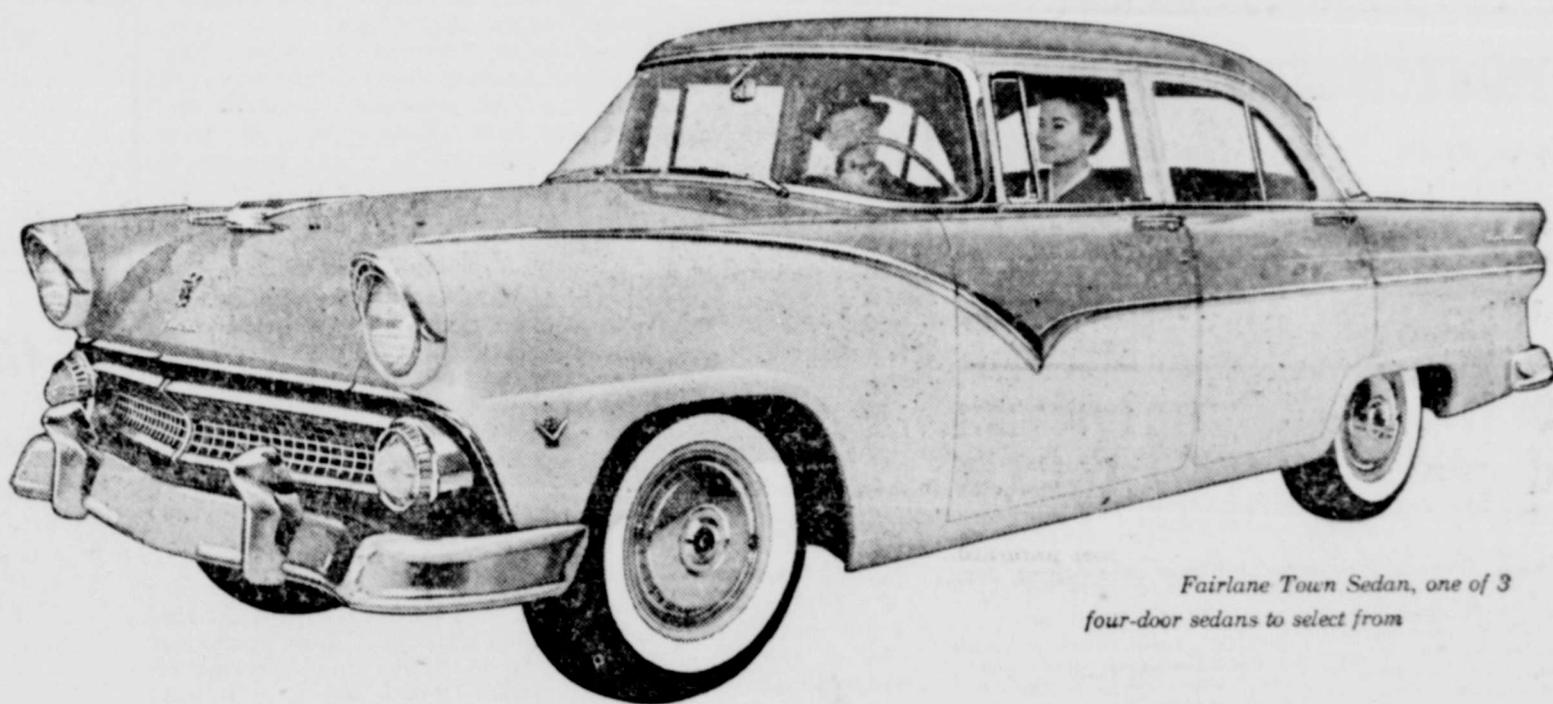

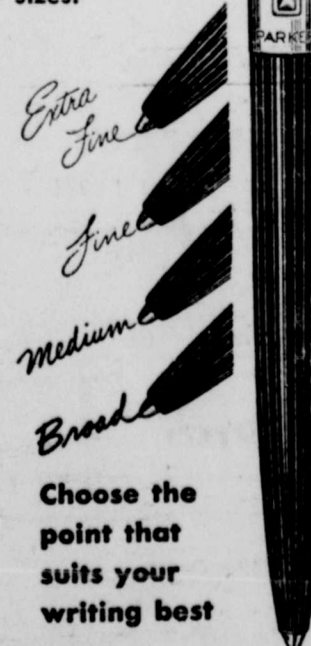

For instance you may find frayed electric cords—possibly a cord that has lost its insulation, having exposed a "hot" wire. In such event, a blaze may start and if not remedied in time, it will become a cause of an onflamation that will destroy your home.

There may be too few ash trays handy—or the ash trays too small, or the kind that tip over easily. You may notice that kitchen curtains are hanging dangerously near a gas burner.

After all hazards have been corrected you may think the campaign is over—but instead, it's only the beginning. Fire plays tricky roles. It can be your friend so convincingly you may forget how easily it can become your enemy if you lower your guard.

Only by carrying on the campaign against fire, day after day, year after year, can you hope to win out over it.

A VERY NEAT AND ATTRAC-

In an effort to assist and stimulate travel in Texas, Greer reported that the Department published and distributed over 500 thousand Official Travel Maps in 1954, and in addition, published a Road Bulletin, Calendar of Vacation Events, and other tourist material.

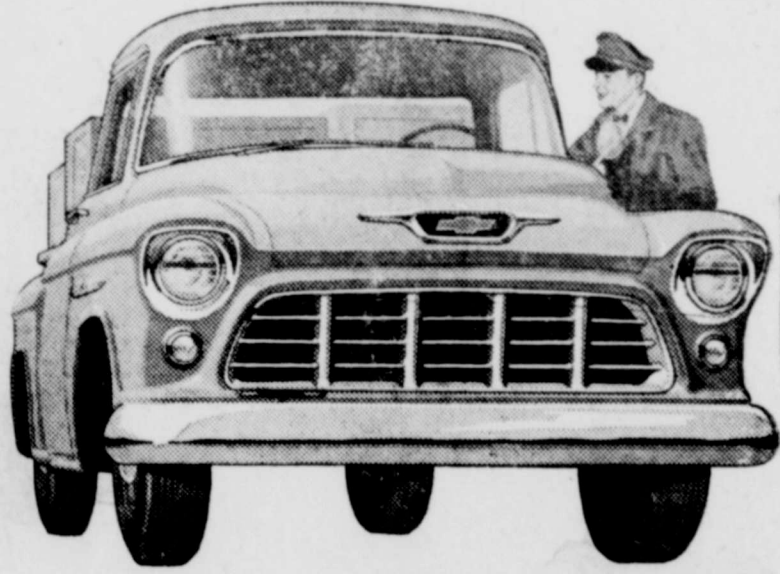
