(Editor's note: Following is a letter written by Corp. Travis E. Lutrick to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Lutrick. He recently was transferred from Camp Bowie to Camp Blanding, Fla.)

Camp Blanding, Fla.
February 22, 1942

Dearest Folks:

I can't tell you much about Florida, but maybe I can give you a description of the trip that took us through five states. Saw nothing of interest in Louisiana except in the eastern part. Some pretty homes and lots of swamps. They really have a bridge across the Mississippi river. The highway and railroad run side by side on the long bridge. The town of Vicksburg, Miss., is pretty along with being an historical place. They still have the cannon that were used in the civil war, placed around in the fortifications they used.

Of course, you can't see much from the back of a G. I. truck, but what I did see was pretty. From the Mississippi line to here, you see lots of the old, beautiful Southern mansions—I mean the kind you see in the picture shown. But, the strangest thing to me is you don't see one white man to every 100 negroes.

The palm trees really are beautiful, nothing as you would imagine, but pretty just the same.

We are 32 miles from the coast and 38 miles southeast of Jacksonville. The swamps are very close together. Don't get the idea that the palms cover this country, because most of it is pines and sand. The sand is just as white as snow, and about knee deep and if it ever gets dry it will be so deep and shifty that you can't walk in it.

I still say you can travel Texas and say you have seen most every sight the whole nation has to offer.

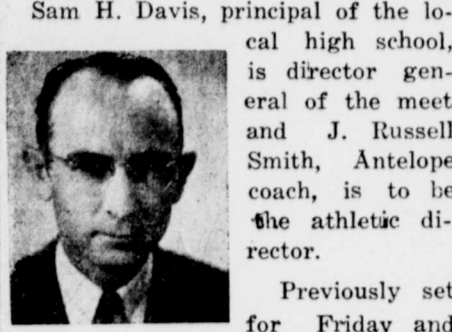

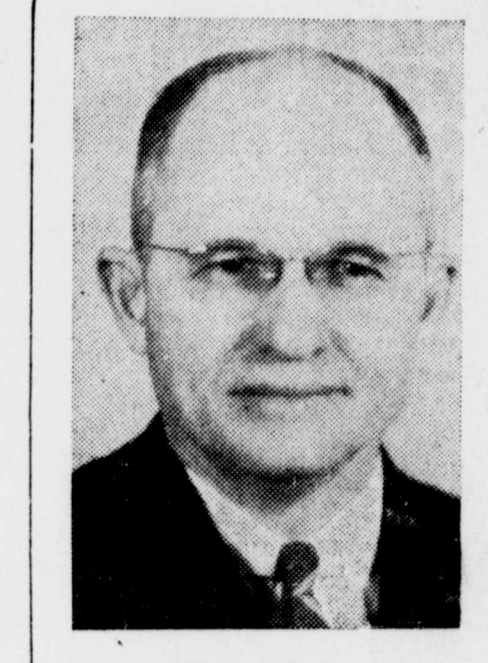
