

# Syncom Satellite Orbits, But Radio Contact Lost

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP)—A Syncom communications satellite rocketed into orbit today but loss of radio contact with the spacecraft prevented trackers from determining if it had become the world's first satellite to seemingly stand still in space.

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Syncom coasted up, gradually losing speed, until it reached a point about 22,900 miles high. Then a timing device ignited the small rocket at 5:42 a. m.

The firing was to take the satellite out of the elliptical path and shove it onto a circular course at that altitude.

"The motor fired successfully," the official said, "but radio signals stopped 13 seconds later. We regained a brief signal about 7 a. m., but nothing more. We may be in a beautiful orbit, but we're encountering transmission difficulties."

But he said the kick rocket

might have knocked the craft off course.

There was a possibility, he said, that temperature in the satellite was too hot, upsetting communications. As a possible means of solving such a problem, he reported, the spacecraft systems were turned off and will be restored by ground signal later.

The trusty three-stage Douglas Delta rocket, scoring its 15th straight satellite launching success, blasted off at 12:35 a. m. Eastern Standard Time and drilled Syncom into a highly elliptical orbit at 22,800 miles an hour. The mechanical marvel coasted upward for 3 hours and 7 minutes, until it reached near the 22,900-mile altitude. Then a small solid fuel rocket was fired by a timing device to change the orbit from elongated to circular at this height.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration announced that the two critical early phases of flight—the launching and the firing of the small rocket—had occurred.

But it said that several hours of tracking would be required to determine how successfully the ignition of the small rocket had been.

The firing occurred high above the equator between Madagascar and the East African Coast. During the long coast period, the satellite's speed had slowed to less than 3,000 miles an hour. The burst of power from its motor was aimed at increasing this to about 6,700 miles, equating the speed of the earth's rotation.

To make most effective use of ground communications stations, scientists want the satellite to hang like a star over the equator between South America and Africa.

Hydrogen peroxide gas jets, like those U. S. astronauts use to control the attitude of their spacecraft in orbit, were to be fired by ground command to help the satellite drift westward to the desired spot. A maneuver intended to take about two weeks. Once Syncom gets there, the gas jets would keep it there.

Limited communications experiments were scheduled to start about five days after launching. The satellite antenna was not to be properly oriented for continuous testing until the satellite was over the South Atlantic Ocean.

## U. S. Planes Circle Hijacked Freighter

CARACAS, Venezuela (AP)—U. S. Navy planes sighted and circled a hijacked Venezuelan freighter today about 200 miles due south of the Dominican Republic in the Caribbean Sea, the Venezuelan navy announced.

The freighter was seized Wednesday night by members of a Communist terrorist organization opposed to the government of President Romulo Betancourt, Communications Minister Pablo Miliani reported. Earlier reports said the terrorists had help from an unidentified warship.

The Venezuelan government declared the seizure an act of piracy and asked the navies of all nations to help in capturing it.

The Navy announcement said the U. S. Navy planes, presumably from Puerto Rico, were circling the ship.

The captain of the 3,127-ton Venezuelan freighter Anzoategui confirmed in a radio message to the government shipping company that a warship intercepted his ship on route to New Orleans, La., and a guerrilla hand took it over.

The government did not identify the nationality of the intercepting warship, but it was suspected here that it was Cuban.

Fidel Castro of Cuba and Betancourt are bitter enemies and the ships master, Capt. Oscar Pereira, said the hijackers identified themselves as members of the Communist-led, pro-Castro FAEL, the Armed Forces of National Liberation.

Pereira said he and his 35 crewmen were well.

The hijackers broadcast from the ship that they had seized it as a protest before world opinion against the present government in Venezuela.

Officials indicated two or more of Venezuela's five destroyers were searching for the pirated ship.

A high official said Betancourt's government would ask friendly countries to join in the search.

Capt. Pereira's message did not say where the freighter was boarded nor did he give its subsequent position.

The Anzoategui left La Guayra, the port of Caracas, on Tuesday for Houston, Tex., and New Orleans.

## Malaya Unity Plan Rapped By Sukarno

JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP)—President Sukarno has heightened the tension between Indonesia and Malaya, calling the plan to unite British territories in Southeast Asia an imperialist scheme to encircle his island republic.

It was Sukarno's first public denunciation of the plan to unite Malaya, Singapore and British territories in North Borneo in a Federation of Malaysia. The plan calls for inauguration of the federation on Aug. 31.

"We don't want Malaysia around us," Sukarno told 10,000 persons at a rally in Jakarta. "We know it is encirclement, Malaysia is to save imperialism."

Sukarno said he had told the armed forces "we still have a challenge to face."

He hedged an implied military threat, however, by saying Indonesia "will carry out political confrontation against the Malaysia idea."

"This will include economic confrontation as well," Sukarno continued. Apparently he was threatening to cut off the large Indonesian transit trade through Singapore and Malaya.

Sukarno reaffirmed his support for the revolt which sought to set up an independent state including Brunei, Sarawak and North Borneo.

Last December, a pro-Indonesian North Borneo leader, A. M. Azahari, led a revolt against the British, charging the people of the three territories never were given a chance to decide whether they wanted to join the federation. British troops flown in from Singapore crushed the revolt in a week.

The rest of Borneo is Indonesian territory and so-called volunteers have been reported assembling in the streets of Baghdad through the night.

## President Calls For Broad Youth Program

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Kennedy wrapped together in a single unprecedented package today all his proposals to aid the nation's youth. He sent it to Congress with word that "our youth deserve and require a better chance."

"We must afford them every opportunity to develop and use their talents," Kennedy said. "If we serve them better now, they will serve their nation better when the burdens are their alone."

Accordingly, Kennedy asked Congress for legislation and financing on a broad scale.

He bid for a "Youth Conservation Corps" to work in parks and forests. He urged creation of a sort of home town youth corps. He called again for a domestic peace corps—it would be named the National Service Corps. He asked that the existing Peace Corps overseas be expanded by nearly one-half.

And the President emphasized need for action on juvenile delinquency, family welfare, education and technical and physical fitness.

The total price tag for all the projects is obscure, even though

Kennedy has recommended all of them before in general if not specific terms.

Kennedy buttressed the plea for action with figures and arguments he has used many times. He spoke of the mounting birth rate, the over-crowding of schools, the growing proportion of unemployment among young people, the increase in juvenile arrests and delinquency.

"The future promise of any nation," he said, "can be directly measured by the present prospects of its youth. This nation—facing increasingly dependent on the opportunities, capabilities and vitality of those who are soon to bear its chief responsibilities."

As outlined in the message and by officials who would have some of the responsibility for them, the various corps would shape up this way:

Youth Conservation Corps — A present-day version of the Civilian Conservation Corps that built parks, trails, lakes and roads in the depression of the 1930s.

It would start with 15,000 boys and be allowed a maximum of 90,000 at any one time. They could enroll for six months originally and serve a total of two years by re-enlisting. Basic pay would be \$60 a month, plus travel and living expenses.

Home town youth corps — Both boys and girls could enroll for work in hospitals, schools, parks and settlement houses. The corps could hire up to 80,000 youngsters the first year and go up to a maximum of 50,000 later. The pay scale has not been determined.

"The conservation corps and home town corps would take in semi-skilled or unskilled young people 16 to 21 years old in an effort to boost the economy, cut unemployment and train young people who otherwise would be idle. Kennedy has included \$100 million for the programs in his new budget. State and local governments would have to supply an additional \$60 million.

National Service Corps — This would be open to both young and older persons on a volunteer basis. It is intended to attract persons with skills that could be put to use at once, under professional guidance, to provide needed service in hospitals, on Indian reservations, to families of migrant workers, and in social and educational institutions in slum or impoverished rural areas.

The corps probably would start with 100 or 200 volunteers, reach a maximum of 8,000, pay to be

day, and perhaps offer a bonus at the end of a year's service.

Overseas Peace Corps — Kennedy wants to raise the present limit of 9,000 volunteers to 12,000. He has included in his budget an increase of nearly \$50 million for an enlarged Peace Corps, which would almost double the present total.

The President asked that the present three-year federal-state program to combat juvenile delinquency be extended three more years.

He urged Congress to act rapidly on a week-old request for \$12.6 million to start immunizing children against diphtheria, poli and other diseases.

He nudged Congress to approve budget increases of nearly \$500 million—already submitted to Capitol Hill—to aid children through public assistance and child welfare grants and to try to reduce dependency.

And Kennedy again pushed Congress to push through his broad aid to education bill—a measure facing an uncertain fate.

## Search For Tanker Ends

NEW YORK (AP)—The American tanker Marine Sulphur Queen, which disappeared Feb. 3 with its crew of 38, has been added to the list of mysteries of the sea.

The Coast Guard said Wednesday night it was calling off the active search for the vessel, although all units have been directed to maintain a lookout for the missing ship during normal operations.

The Coast Guard declined to speculate on the ship's fate. But it noted that a 500-hour search of the Atlantic and Gulf of Mexico by 63 aircraft had failed to turn up a trace of her.

The 524-foot tanker, carrying molten sulphur, left Beaumont, Tex., Feb. 2 and was to have arrived at Norfolk, Va., Feb. 7. She was last heard from on the night of Feb. 3 when a crewman sent a personal radio message from a point near Key West, Fla.

## Iraqi Rebels Battling Reds

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP)—Forces of Iraq's new revolutionary regime battled Communist holdouts in the streets of Baghdad through the night.

Rifles, machine guns and, occasionally, heavier tank weapons were heard in the center of the city from about 9:30 p. m. until 5:30 a. m.

It was the heaviest in the Iraqi capital since Saturday night, the second night of the revolution that overthrew and killed Iraqi Premier Abdel Karim Kassem, Urged by clandestine Red radios to stage an armed uprising against the new anti-Communist regime, Iraqi Reds have held out in pockets in heavily populated sections of Baghdad. Troops and civilians have been moving in systematically to clean out the pockets.

Shabbib also promised the "strongest possible cooperation" with President Nasser's United Arab Republic, "based on the firm belief of the common destiny of the Arab people."

President Aref, said Kassem managed to reach him by telephone Friday night after the day-long siege of the defense ministry where the premier was dug in.

"He tried to bargain for time to use our old friendship to plead for mercy—but it was merely a trick," said Aref, 42. Kassem's partner in the 1958 revolution, Lutfi Aref was sentenced to death after a split with Kassem but was reprieved and allowed to live quietly in Baghdad.

Aref said Kassem reached him several other times during the night and tried to arrange a compromise. But he said he told him, "You must not be another Bab-

"We believe the Arab countries are all one," Shabbib declared.

"I am sure my government will be able to reach a solution beneficial to the peoples of the two countries."

"Iraq will welcome foreign investments so long as the economy of the country remains in the hands of the people," Shabbib added.

The foreign minister expressed hope Iraq will soon exchange ambassadors with the United States and offer millions whose envoys Kassem sent home because their

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## Santa Fe Asks To Absorb Two Units

DALLAS (AP)—President Ernest Marsh said today the Santa Fe Railroad is filing an application with the Interstate Commerce Commission to dissolve and absorb into the parent company two Texas subsidiaries.

These are the Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe, with headquarters at Amarillo.

Marsh said the action came because of technological advances and because expenses have grown faster than revenues due to a spiral of costs and successive rounds of wage increases.

He said that these reasons are coupled with a constant shrinkage of railroads' share of intercity traffic. He blamed subsidization of competing forms of transportation.

The president's statement said an estimated annual saving of over \$1 million will result from the proposed action.

The president said a merger of the two lines into the parent company will result in improved service, simplify the corporate structure and be in the long-range in-

terests of Santa Fe employees.

There now are two full general managers' organizations on the Santa Fe lines in Texas.

The proposed dissolution and absorption of the general manager's offices at Amarillo, Station Temple and Fort Worth, with absorption of their functions by existing similar offices elsewhere.

Under this arrangement, there would be one general manager's office of the operating department in Texas at Amarillo.

The four operating division headquarters in Texas would continue at Amarillo, Station Temple and Fort Worth. A part of the new plan contemplates enlargement of the forces in the division superintendent's office at Fort Worth by transfer of personnel.

All functions of the accounting and treasury—departments now performed at Galveston and Amarillo, together with most of the present personnel—will be transferred to the Topock office where the Santa Fe has a modern electronic data processing bureau capable of absorbing the new work load.

# Campus Life Rather Quiet For Negroes

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP) — Campus life seems relatively quiet these days for two Negro students who shattered tradition and ended segregation in public education in Mississippi and South Carolina.

There have been no open demonstrations at the University of Mississippi since James H. Meredith began his second semester recently, although some future remarks and obscenities still are hurled his way.

At Clemson College in South Carolina, reports indicate that Harvey B. Gantt has been accepted by most of the students, not socially perhaps but at least as a student entitled to be on the campus.

There were never any open demonstrations against Gantt, in marked contrast to the rioting at the University of Mississippi after Meredith's arrival more than four months ago. Two men were killed and many others injured, and federal troops finally were sent in to keep order.

Another Negro, Dewey Greene Jr., 22, of Greenwood, Miss., hopes to join Meredith at Mississippi, is awaiting court action on his bid to enroll.

After university officials rejected him as not qualified academically, Greene went into federal court at Hattiesburg, Miss. That court referred a ruling, telling Greene to exhaust all administrative remedies at the university.

Greene then asked the U.S. 5th Circuit Court of Appeals to order him admitted. A three-judge panel will hear the case in Atlanta Friday.

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# Well Digger Pulled Free In Wisconsin

LAKE TOMAHAWK, Wis. (AP) — A well digger buried up to his shoulders in shifting sand since mid-afternoon Wednesday was pulled free early today and appeared to be in good condition.

Raymond "Fuzzy" Fink, 31, was freed at 5:40 a.m. 14½ hours after he was buried in a cave-in of sand near this northern Wisconsin community.

"I'm okay, honey. I'm okay, honey," Fink said as he embraced his wife who had kept a night-long vigil.

Fink walked away from the pit with just slight help. He was taken to Lakeland Memorial Hospital in nearby Woodruff despite protests that he was all right.

Dr. Charles H. Fink, said at the hospital, "We'll keep him here to make some checks and take X-rays, but his heart and lungs are fine. He's pretty darned tough."

Dr. Flint was present when Fink was pulled from the ground. "I thought they brought him up through the hole he had been caught in," the doctor said.

Another source said Fink was pulled straight up after rescuers had dug a tunnel from his side.

A cheer went up from the rescue crew as he was drawn free. Fink rejected an offer of a stretcher and other help.

"I feel fine. I can walk. I can make it on my own," he said after embracing his wife, Bernice, he walked to a station wagon for the trip to the hospital.

The fight to free Fink had been made in a tiny forest clearing turned into a shallow amphitheater by the floodlight that illuminated police officers, prison camp inmates and others who worked side-by-side through the night.

# Long Battle Finally Won By Burn Victim

**EDITOR'S NOTE** - Paul Staples, Seattle newspaperman, has a long fight to regain physical and mental health after suffering severe burns in an accident near his home last June. Here, in the last of three special articles, he describes his triumph over fear, his small gains, and finally his recovery.

SEATTLE, Wash. (AP) - Several weeks after I received emergency treatment for severe burns suffered in a gasoline lawnmower accident last June, I was moved to a Veterans Administration hospital for rehabilitation.

I had made up my mind to overcome the depression that strikes all burn victims and now I was to start treatment under trained and skilled physical therapists.

I was still irascible, however. But my mind cleared as the days passed. The prayers, well wishes and offers of help, including many from blood donors, made me humble and ashamed.

Finally, the time came for my arms and hands to be unbanded for the first time.

The young doctor adjusted his instruments. He was a popular doctor with a warm smile for everyone he met on his rounds. Now I was not smiling.

"I'm going to be working on Paul's hands the next few minutes," he said.

# Culinary Treats From Nebraska

By LUCY DYSART

These recipes of Nebraska-born Jeannine Mrs. Carroll Goll are special treats for us, as it always is interesting to test particular favorites from various parts of the country.

Jeannine is well known and much admired in Snyder for her collection of unusual recipes for delicious foods. Her little helper is daughter Susan, who doesn't particularly appreciate the 11-year-old Mother spends creating the excellent meals the Golls enjoy.

**CHOPPED APPLE CAKE**

- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup hot water
- 1 teasp. cinnamon
- 1 teasp. salt
- 1/4 cup butter
- 1 cup chopped raisins

Mix the above ingredients in order and boil 3 minutes then cool and add the following:

- 1 teasp. soda
- 1 teasp. vanilla
- 2 cups flour (sifted twice)
- 1 cup chopped, pared apples
- 1/4 cup chopped walnuts

Mix all ingredients only until well blended. Bake in greased and floured pan about 9 x 13 inches in moderate oven (350 degrees). Serve warm, cut in squares, topped with whipped cream or lemon flavored sauce.

**CRANBERRY SALAD**

- 1/4 cups ground raw cranberries
- 1 cup chopped, pared apples
- 1 cup gran sugar
- 1/4 cup chopped English walnuts
- 1 pkg. orange flavored jello
- 1 cup hot water
- 1 cup cold water

Combine cranberries, apples and sugar and chill. Dissolve jellatin in hot water, then add cold water and chill till partially set. Add cranberry mixture and nuts to partially set jellatin. Chill again till partially set, then pour in hot water and mix. Chill till firm. Serve by removing salad from mold (dip quickly in hot water) and place on lettuce leaves. Fill center of salad with mandarin orange sections prepared as follows:

**SWEET POTATOES**

Mash cold, cooked sweet potatoes and put around whole marshmallows forming a ball about 1 1/2 inches around. Roll each ball in crumbled breakfast food, such as Wheaties. Place each ball on ungreased cookie sheet and place in hot oven (400 degrees) about 10 to 12 minutes. Serve immediately. Be careful not to overbake as marshmallow will then drain out of potato ball.

**ROAST DUCK**

Clean duck thoroughly. Rub inside and out with salt. Stuff with orange dressing. Brush outside of stuffed duck lightly with melted vegetable shortening. Wrap duck in tin foil. Place in open roasting pan, breast side up and bake in 350 degree oven. Allow approx. 20 min. per lb. Allow time to turn baste duck with pan drippings. Drain off any unwanted fat. The last few minutes open foil and allow duck to finish browning.

**ORANGE STUFFING**

- 3 cups dry, toasted bread crumbs
- 1/2 cup hot water
- 2 cups diced celery
- Wesson Oil for sautéing
- 2 cup diced orange
- 1/4 cup melted butter
- 1 beaten egg
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- dash pepper

1/2 teaspoon poultry seasoning

Soften bread crumbs in hot water. Sauté celery in Wesson oil (use just enough oil to cook celery until soft, do not brown). Drain off oil and add celery to softened bread crumbs. Then add last 5 ingredients in order. Combine lightly and stuff duck. (Makes enough for 5 lb. duck).

**FOLK CHOPS 'N' RICE**

- 4 pork chops about 1/2 inch thick
- 1 medium onion, diced
- 1/4 cup diced celery

# Hikes Are Ended By Secretaries

"Who knows—I might make 30 the next time," said Mary McCasie, 26, Washington, a secretary to Rep. Cornelius E. Gallagher, D-N.J.

Mary and Maria Jania, Detroit, secretary to Rep. Lucien N. Delaney, D-Mich., hiked 27 miles Wednesday, dropping out at an early finish—about 4 p.m.

But five others kept walking, walking and walking—until 4:15 p.m. They made 32 miles in a little less than 12 hours.

"But the secretaries didn't mind in mind home and a hot bath. Nobody was complaining of his legs. And they all admitted they had in mind home and a hot bath. The only casualty was a cut toe for Jackie McDonald, 23, of St. Louis, secretary to Rep. Richard Lohr, D-Mo. She stepped on some broken glass, which pierced the sole of her boot. # Crash Kills Dallas Man

COLLEGE STATION (AP)—

Businessman-pilot Frank Abel, 59, of Dallas died and a companion suffered grave injuries as a light plane crashed while trying to land Wednesday night.

Abel had advised the traffic control tower here a few minutes earlier that his engine was icing.

Barton Adams, 48, a Bryan city employee, suffered severe burns as the plane cracked up across the street from a church at Wellborn, 6 miles from here in Central Texas.

Adams was taken to a Houston hospital. Attendants said he suffered third degree burns over most of his body and his condition was critical.

The plane, a Mooney Mark 21, ripped out power and telephone lines as it went down. Long distance telephone service was crippled for several hours.

Traffic controllers last contact Abel after he advised the engine was icing and he planned an emergency landing. A search plane found the burned wreckage within a short time.

Abel owned a grain terminal in Dallas. Associates said he was en route home after a business trip to Corpus Christi and Houston.

# Little Effect On Oil From Iraq Change

NEW YORK (AP)—Overthrow

of the Iraq government has had little immediate effect on foreign oil companies operating in the petroleum-rich Mideast.

The Iraq Petroleum Co., a combination of international oil firms had its troubles with Premier Abdel Karim Kassem, who was deposed and executed in a military rebellion.

Kassem welcomed Soviet and British aid but showed hostility to the United States. He became a violent foe of President Gamal Abdel Nasser of the United Arab Republic.

Some oil company officials looked forward to better relations with the new regime headed by Col. Abdul Salam Mohammed

Asaf, an anti-Communist, but apparently wedded to Arab unity in some form under Nasser.

Shipment of oil by way of the Shatt Al-Arab river was interrupted over the weekend because, with frontiers closed by the rebel tankers were unable to get in or out. Shipments have been resumed.

Closing of the frontiers didn't interfere with movement of oil by pipeline from the Kirkuk and Ain Zalah fields in northern Iraq to the Mediterranean.

Reaction on the New York Stock Exchange to the Iraq crisis was mild. 50% of international oil companies declined only on the news of the rebellion.

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
