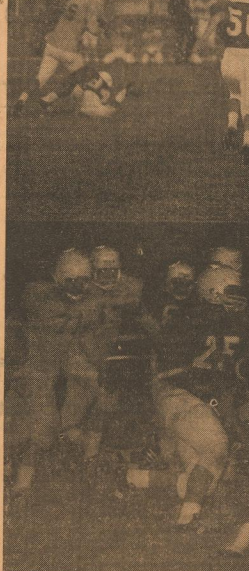
Evant scored on a good drive which featured a good number of passes in the second period. The score came on a pass play as did the 2 extra points. At this point Evant led 8-6.

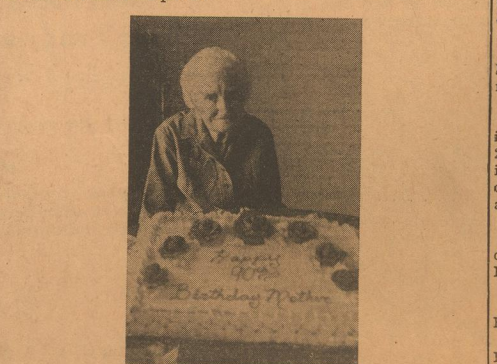

Vote Urged For Amendment No. 3 On November 3rd

The following is a preliminary report of the Agricultural Land Assessment Study Committee following a series of hearings and a concentrated study held by the fifteen member group.

In 1966, the voters of Texas, recognizing that unrealistic and unreasonable taxation of agricultural land was forcing many farmers, ranchers, and other agriculturists to abandon their homes and businesses, adopted an Amendment to the Constitution to provide reform and relief. Unfortunately, due to technical difficulties, this Amendment has proven to be unworkable and totally ineffective. In 1969, the Legislature, impressed by the urgency and importance of this problem, submitted Amendment No. 3 to be voted upon by the people on November 3, as a fair and reasonable solution. This Amendment simply authorizes the Legislature:

"to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm, and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops."

The Legislature also created a joint study committee composed of members of the House of Representatives, the Senate, and leading public citizens, to ascertain the best method of taxing agricultural land. The Committee held hearings throughout the State and heard testimony from expert witnesses and interested citizens. Based upon this testimony, and extensive additional study, the Committee finds that:

1. There is uniform agreement that our present laws relating to the assessment and taxation of agricultural land are unduly complex, unrealistic, unreasonable, and unfair; and

2. That our present policies of agricultural land taxation unfairly discriminate against the small farmer and rancher that have contributed so much to our historical and social heritage; and

3. That if the present trend of ever-increasing costs of production and rising inequitable property taxation continues, we will soon see the end of the family farm and the small town which have contributed so much to our historical and social heritage; and

4. That concentration of farm and ranch land in the hands of a few producers could possibly lead to monopoly market conditions and thereby an increase in cost to the consumer; and

5. That farmers and ranchers are not seeking exemption from property taxes, but rather a fair and reasonable method of computing such taxes in accordance with the ability of their land to produce income.

As a result of these findings, the Agricultural Land Assessment Study Committee will upon the passage of Amendment No. 3 at the General Election on November 3, recommend to the 62nd Legislature in January, 1971, the following recommendations:

1. That agricultural land be assessed for ad valorem taxation on a capitalized net earnings basis, which is one of the three accepted tax assessment procedures presently used by local taxing authorities to establish the ad valorem values on other property; and

2. That the administration of property tax assessment and collection remain with authority in local hands as is presently embodied in the Constitution (Article VIII, Section II), and that the Legislature provide the local taxing authority with explicit guidelines for administrative purposes; and

3. That agricultural land be defined to mean "the raising of livestock or the growing of crops, trees, or other products of the soil under natural conditions as a bona fide business venture for profit"; and

4. That land which has not been designated and used as agricultural land for a period of 5 previous years shall not qualify as agricultural land; and

5. That a deferred tax be levied upon any agricultural land that is diverted to some other use.

WASHINGTON, D. C. - THE ORGANIZED CRIME CONTROL BILL cleared the House of Representatives last week and it is hoped that it will shortly become law. This measure has been tied up in the Judiciary Committee for months where it was opposed by the Chairman and other members of the more liberal persuasion.

OPPONENTS OF THE MEASURE HAVE COMPLAINED long and loud that it restricts personal liberty. As a matter of fact, it does give law enforcement powers never before provided but this is not proof that it is repressive. Such measures were never before as necessary as they are today. Law enforcement continues to be essentially a local matter but local officers cannot cope with nationwide organized crime as is the case today and which is steadily increasing. The lawless are organized and criminals have invaded legitimate business to prey on the public.

WITH NEW TOOLS IN THEIR HANDS, Federal law enforcement may be able to deal with this serious and never before experienced situation in our Country - guerrilla warfare, bombings, arson and wanton attacks on police officers.

IN ADDITION TO WIDER JURISDICTION, which this measure provides for Federal law enforcement, there is now before the Congress a Bill authorizing the expenditure of over \$3 billion dollars during the next three years for law enforcement grants to the states and localities. Further efforts are being made by a Senate Investigating Committee to identify and expose the organizations and influences which are waging guerrilla warfare in this

TESTIMONY BEFORE THE Country against law and order. SENATE COMMITTEE strongly indicates that not only is there propaganda designed to portray local policemen, state troopers and national guardsmen as brutal and dangerous but at the same time many vicious attacks have been made on the police for no cause at all.

THESE DELIBERATE ATTACKS ARE TOO WIDESPREAD, instances too numerous, the methods used too similar, not to be organized. It is intended to undermine the pillar of law and order from one end of this Country to the other.

THE U. S. "The wave of senseless attacks on our police officers must be stopped. We will find a way to do it," said the Attorney General testifying before the Committee.

POLICEMEN ARE NOT ONLY BEING HAMSTRUNG by permissiveness, they are being murdered by militant terrorists who are striking at the mainstay of lawful authority.

CONNECTED WITH THE OVER-ALL CHALLENGE to law and order is the need for better legal machinery to bring violators to justice in the courts. Delays and technicalities are hindering the courts and generally the courts themselves have seemingly had a greater concern for "justice" for the criminal than justice for society.

ONE OF THE CONCERNS OF THE SENATE investigation is whether the conspiracies believed to have been established are financed by foreign sources. This is a dimension which will require intensive and wide inquiry.

SIMILAR GUERRILLA WARFARE is being carried on in other parts of the World. In a number of aspects what is happening here bears strong resemblance to tactics used to create disorder in other Countries. Not only does this type of organized crime exist in this Country but it may be on an international scale.

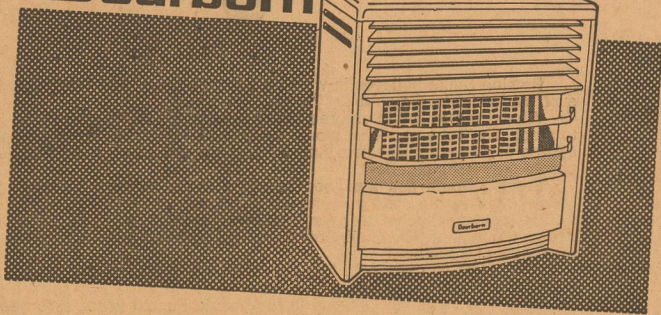

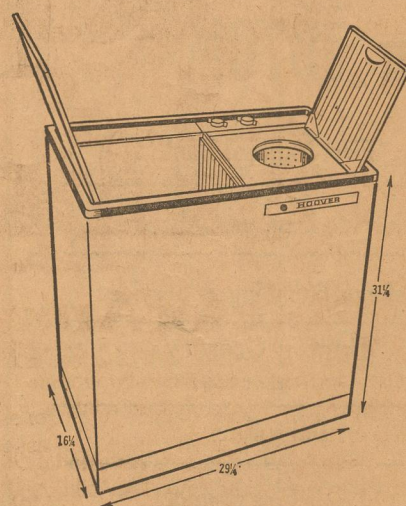

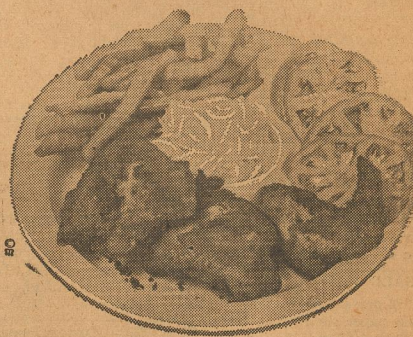
