GREEKS AGAINST DEPOSED KING

ATHENS, Greece, Nov. 15.—Victory in Greek elections yesterday were claimed early today by Premier Venizelos. Actual returns however, are meagre. The return of former King Constantine to the Greek throne was the issue in the campaign.

Constantine was deposed during the world war. His throne was offered to his younger brother, Prince Paul, following the death of King Alexander three weeks ago. Prince Paul answered that only in the event that the people decided against Constantine would he consider accepting the Greek government's offer. Premier Venizelos lead the forces opposing the return of Constantine.

BLUE NORTHER DRIVES AWAY RAIN CLOUDS

Tonight fair, freezing. Tuesday fair, not so cold.

A stiff wind coming direct from the North pushed the clouds away Sunday night and Monday broke clear and cold weather. The temperature which dropped to freezing last Friday continued low, and while the clouds have rolled away, the low temperature prevents cotton picking.

The winter weather covers Texas, the storm being the worst in many years on the lower Rio Grande valley. Further North considerable snow fell, while in East Texas the ground was rain soaked preceding the big drop in temperature.

NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—A crusade for the stricter enforcement of the city ordinance forbidding tickets to minors unless accompanied by their parents or guardians, was started today by the police as the result of a panic in the lower East Side last night when six children were trampled to death in a mad rush following a false fire alarm.

The proprietors and janitor of the theater were arrested after the tragedy on charges of manslaughter. Early today the charges were changed to criminal negligence. They are being held without bail for arraignment later in the day.

Twelve other youngsters were seriously injured in the stampede and are said to be in a critical condition. The panic occurred when some patron noticed curling shadows cast on the screen and smelled the odor of smoke, yelling fire. A janitor starting a fire in the furnace caused the smoke, and there was no danger of fire.

When the patron of the show yelled fire all dashed for the outside and the children were knocked down and trampled upon in such a way as to cause almost instant death.

SHIP CREW LOST IN LAKE SUPERIOR

SAULT STE. MARIE, Mich., Nov. 15.—The tug Iowa is fighting its way early today through the storm tossed waters of Lake Superior trying to make its way toward the Panake shoals to rescue part of the crew of the steel freighter Francis Willard, which was wrecked during one of the most severe storms in the history of the great lakes.

Capt. Arthur Forbes, in command of the stricken ship and some members of his crew were picked up last night by the steamer Livingston, and it is feared that others have been lost.

\$18 PROFIT ON 2 DOLLAR BILL

"It's don't has to work, I's got plenty money," is about the way a negro expressed it as he handed his colored landlady a twenty in settling his board bill amounting to \$18.50 and received \$1.50 in change.

The colored landlady used the "frog-back" to pay for groceries to feed her boarders on and the groceryman used the bill in swelling his bank account in order that he might check on the account and buy more groceries to sell.

The twenty, however, failed to get by the bank, and now the Federal officers are hot on the trail of the negro who added the cipher to the two which made the "20" and which netted him \$18 profit.

According to the colored landlady the negro was well fixed with tens, twenties and fifties, and she observed that he had been remaining up in his room late at nights, and it is presumed that he was today the paste brush in sticking on the naught figures, clipped from some catalogue, which when placed by the side of the one, two or five, apparently increased the value of the bill, ten times.

Deputy United States Marshal Crawford is due to arrive here today from Abilene, and he will soon have the negro in the lock-up, and if the evidence in the case comes up to what it is expected to do, the negro will soon be doing service in Uncle Sam's prison at Leavenworth.

2 ACTRESSES MURDER VICTIMS

CHICAGO, Nov. 15.—Two pretty young actresses are lying dead in a morgue while the police are in search for clues for their mysterious death in Grant Park within a few hundred feet of the skyscraper buildings lining Michigan Boulevard.

Circumstances indicate that the girls were murdered. A mysterious telephone call notified the police that the bodies were lying on the lake front near the Chicago Yacht Club building. The police responded to the mysterious call and found the bodies as reported.

TEXAS WOMAN ON RELIEF COMMIT.

HOUSTON, Nov. 15.—Mrs. Florence Floore, of Cleburne, has accepted the appointment from Herbert Hoover general chairman of the American Relief Administration, as associate chairman for Texas, serving with E. A. Peden, of Houston, as state chairman, in directing the appeals for contributions, amounting to twenty-three million dollars, the national fund now being raised, and to be completed by the next harvest.

BLANTON HERE ON BUSINESS

Congressman Thomas L. Blanton spent Saturday night in Ballinger and conferred with a number of friends here on matters of local interest.

Mr. Blanton was en route to the deer field on his annual hunt. He arrived here from Abilene late Saturday afternoon, accompanied by Lloyd Thomas, an Abilene news paper man, and Dr. L. W. Hollis of Abilene, and Sam Webb, an uncle of the congressman from Albany, Texas. The party expects to spend a week in the Rock Springs country.

The congressman stated that he had been in Washington since the primary election, with the exception of the time he was on the stump for the Democratic ticket, checking up the various departments and preparing to carry on his campaign against government extravagance.

When a friend remarked to Mr. Blanton that "the Republicans now have you down and you can't do anything," the congressman stated that he "would always be found on the floor of the House, prodding them for failure to keep promises made during the recent campaign. And," said Mr. Blanton, "did you know that there never has been a Democratic majority in the House since I went to Washington."

Mr. Blanton stated that President Wilson had sacrificed his life for his country, and that if he lived to serve out his term he would go out of the White House a physical wreck. According to Mr. Blanton the president's mental vision is as clear as it ever was, but that his hair was white and the strain brought about by his devotion to duty could be read on the face of the president even at a distance.

GIN MAN IN SERIOUS CONDITION SUNDAY

BOLSHEVIKI TAKE SEBASTOPOL CITY

REV. CURRY GOES TO CLEBURNE

Rev. J. B. Curry, for four years pastor of the Methodist church here has been assigned to a church at Cleburne, and is en route home to begin arranging to move to his new charge.

This information came in a phone message from Rev. Curry to friends Monday morning. He was enroute home, expecting to get here Monday noon to fill engagements which he had here for Monday afternoon, but missed connections at Brownwood, and had to remain over there until Monday night.

Rev. C. E. Simpson will succeed Rev. Curry as pastor at Ballinger, according to the phone message. Up to noon the assignments made for the Brownwood district had not been received at Ballinger, further than the above local appointment.

Rev. Curry came to Ballinger from a church in Fort Worth four years ago, and his work covering a period of four years here was crowned with such success, as to cause the board of stewards of the local church to ask that he be returned here, but holding to the rule which is seldom broken, the conference did not see fit to return Rev. Curry for the fifth year, and he goes to Cleburne with the best wishes of many friends here.

Rev. Curry will probably begin packing up as soon as he arrives at home, and will leave for his new field the last of this week, and it is expected that the new pastor will be here for the services next Sunday.

TRAPS SEVEN FOOT EAGLE

A McClelland, who works on the Zappo farm West of Ballinger, trapped a monster eagle last week. The eagle had been seen a number of times in that vicinity, and Mr. McClelland set about to trap the big bird and his efforts were crowned with success when he went to the trap and found a bird which measured seven feet from tip to tip.

NEW PRESIDENT CAUGHT IN STORM

POINT ISABEL, Tex., Nov. 15.—President-Elect Harding's vacation was broken up and all roadways leading to the outside world temporarily blocked by one of the worst storms in the history of this section of the Gulf coast.

Mr. Harding planned another attempt today to get into Brownsville in comfort for his remaining two days, visit to Texas. He had already said good bye once to the frail seaside cottage which housed him thru the three days wind and cold, but his efforts to get away came to grief when a special train on the narrow gauge road, propelled by gasoline motor, broke down just outside Point Isabel. After a dismal four hours on the wind swept prairie, Mr. Harding returned to the cottage after dark last night. The train was held for another try out about noon today. It offers the only avenue of departure from Point Isabel and all roads are impassable for automobiles.

PARIS, Nov. 15.—Sebastopol has fallen. The Russian bolsheviki occupied the city last night, according to unofficial information received from the French foreign office.

ATHENS, Greece, Nov. 15.—Thirteen thousand refugees arrived here from Sebastopol today, but because of the city's lack of accommodations they are still aboard the ships, which are moored in the Bosphorus.

It is understood that thirty thousand have been permitted to take passage from the Crimean city. It was found impossible to provide ships for the entire population of 80,000.

2,000 wounded men also arrived here and have been distributed to the French and Russian hospitals. General Wrangel, the "white army" commander, is declared to be without hope, but he is remaining calm and directing the work of removing the civilians and wounded soldiers from Sebastopol.

SEBASTOPOL, Nov. 15.—Mutinies in General Wrangel's army brought about his sudden defeat, it was learned here today. The French warship Waldeck-Rousseau is in port to embark Gen. Wrangel who is here.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 15.—The army of Gen. Wrangel, the anti-bolshevik leader in South Russia, has been wiped out and a number of its generals have committed suicide.

A mob in Sebastopol has pillaged the American Red Cross stocks.

The American torpedo boat destroyers at Sebastopol are evacuating officers and their families. The American destroyer Humphreys, has gone to Yalta to take off the Red Cross supplies.

The United States transport Faraly has arrived here with 300 sick and wounded who were cared for by the American Red Cross. It is said that the Reds were joined by some Ukrainians in spreading terror among the population in Crimean Russia.

TEXAS CHAMBER OF COMMERCE PLANS A BIG BUILDING CAMPAIGN

DALLAS, Nov. 11.—An organization to relieve the house shortage in every part of Texas is being planned by the Texas Chamber of Commerce, according to an announcement of Stuart McGregor, who it at work on the plans. Mr. McGregor says that to attain this end ten of the largest building and loan companies in the state have already joined the Texas Chamber of Commerce. In addition, he declared, valuable advice and information have been received from national housing bureaus and building associations.

Statistics received from 51 towns in Texas show that 12,625 houses are needed at present. These towns comprise practically one-fourth of the population of Texas and the reports are only from the larger cities; it is estimated that at least 50,000 houses are actually needed in the state.

DR. PHILLIPS LINGERS LOW

Dr. R. T. Phillips, pastor of the 8th Street Presbyterian church, continues very low with apparently no change for the past several days. He was removed from one room to another Sunday afternoon. Dr. Phillips has been ill nearly four months, and was occupying a room where it was more comfortable in hot weather, but the change in the weather made it necessary to move him.

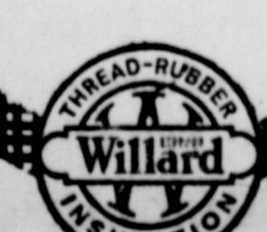

BUZZARD TRAP GETS 225 BIRDS

A record of 225 buzzards captured in a trap built by him on the Lewis Brook pasture, 9 miles East of Brady, was hung up by W. H. Caldwell, who is employed with Jamie Brook in operating the ranch. Not only this, but in the three weeks that the trap has been in operation a total of 400 birds have met their doom as a result of the device. At one time the buzzards enjoyed the protection of the state laws, because they were considered the scavengers of the air, and therefore a benefit to the country. In recent years, however, it has been asserted that the buzzard is one of the causes for the spread of charbon. Also it is proven that these monsters of the air will kill pigs, young calves and lambs, several losses of this sort having occurred on the Brook ranch.

In designing the buzzard trap, Caldwell used 6-ft. high poultry netting, enclosing and covering a space 15 feet square. The opening to the trap was made 18 inches high and 14 inches wide, and was made four feet long, running to the center of the trap, the opening tapering down to about 12 inches. A cage for the bait was placed in the center, and when food or a carcass is placed in this cage, the trap is ready for business. After entering the converging opening and getting inside the

trap, the birds become confused and are unable to find their way out.

While the trap has rendered highly efficient service in the past three weeks, its usefulness is not yet ended, and stray buzzards continue to meet their doom in the simple device. —Brady Standard.

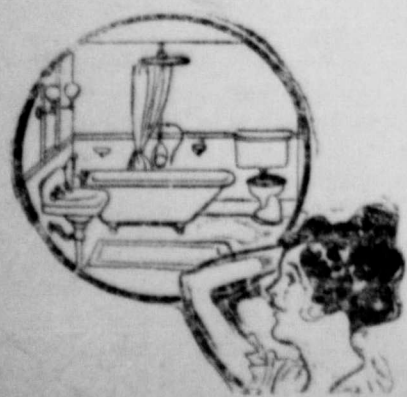

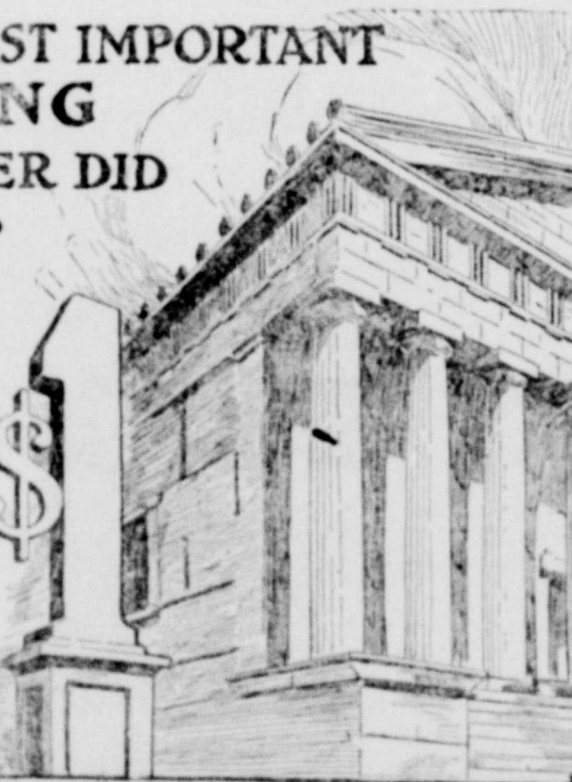

ICE PLANT TO GO OVER THIS WEEK

The local ice plant proposition is receiving special attention this week, and those behind the work say it will be put over, or will be abandoned and the people left to suffer through many another summer. We feel safe in saying that the deal will go through, because the need of such an institution is so keenly felt here.

L. Cohen has interested himself in the proposition and subscribed for a nice block of the stock, and in all probability will accept a position with the new company. Mr. Cohen sold his picture show business here some time ago, and has been prospecting since. He has made a careful investigation and study of the ice making business for the past many months, and declares that he sees the real opportunity for investment in the company being formed here and he has stepped in and will do what he can to put the proposition over.

"We will devote special attention to the ice plant this week," stated Secretary Williams of the Young Men's Business League, Monday morning, "and will make it a go or call off the hounds." About \$32,000 has been subscribed, and in order to give the city a modern plant with a capacity for handling the business of the entire trade territory, the capital stock will be fixed at \$50,000, it is stated at the Y. M. B. L. offices.

The promoters have gone so far as to secure a 99-year lease on a location for the plant on the Santa Fe railroad right-of-way, and have quotations on machinery, and many of the preliminaries have been looked after and no time will be lost in calling a meeting of stockholders and perfecting the organization by the election of a board of directors, as soon as the stock is subscribed, and that must be this week.

Parties who subscribed to the issue have volunteered to take stock in larger blocks, but it is the purpose of the promoters to distribute the stock to as many ice consumers as possible, and thereby gain the support and influence of the entire citizenship. The company will consist entirely of local capital, people who are interested in the development and welfare of the city, and with the good field and demand for an ice plant here, the business should pay a good return on the investment.
