Thens May Ship 100 Carloads of Black Eyed Peas

ATHENS, Texas.—Shipments of black-eyed peas from Henderson this year are expected to reach a total of 100 cars, approximately double the shipment of last year. Buyers here estimate as much as 100 cars of peas are being prepared for shipment. Successful canning of black-eyed peas last summer opened a market of great potentialities for the Texas pea grower and the Centennial is expected to stimulate the demand for peas this summer. Although some few growers already have seed peas in the soil, the major part of the planting will get under way until April 15. Great acreages this year will be in the eastern half of the county. Landowners have contracted with Dallas packing firms for thousands of pounds of green peas to be canned. Extensive planting of the dried pea market will be in the south of Athens on soils which have long been planted to crop.

Eastland School Survey Completed

Miss Opal Gilstrap of Brownland, deputy state school superintendent, completed an inspection of the Eastland school system on Tuesday, Supt. P. B. Bittle stated today. The representative of the state department expressed favorable comment on the system. Bittle said Miss Gilstrap will make her report to the school board next month.

FATE CAMPBELL MEETS BOND IN CISCO CHARGES

Sheriff Virge Foster reported Fate Campbell, 37, charged in connection with the last week death of Buford Jack Tarver, 27, at Cisco, made \$10,000 bond Friday morning and also executed \$500 bond on a "possession of whiskey still" complaint. Campbell is the second of three persons to make bond in the Cisco cases. Jim Elliott, 40, was placed at liberty this week after executing \$500 bonds on a murder complaint and still possession charge. Bond of Bert Bradberry, 25, also accused, has been set at \$500 in both cases. Sheriff Foster stated the body of Tarver was found behind his automobile, lights of which were on and the motor running.

Johnson Pleased With Selection of W.H. Richardson

DALLAS, April 10.—Albert Sydney Johnson, chairman of the Texas Public Safety Commission, expressed satisfaction with Governor Alfred's appointment of W. H. Richardson of Austin as a member of the commission. "I have known Mr. Richardson many years, have been associated with him in ex-student activities, and know we will be able to work together harmoniously on the commission," Johnson said.

AUSTIN, April 10.—W. H. Richardson, Austin hardware dealer, will be sworn in today as a new member of the state safety commission. Richardson will fill the vacancy caused when D. D. Baker resigned after L. G. Phares was made director of the department by vote of the commission's two younger members.

Richardson, like Baker, is a successful business man. He is a graduate of the University of Texas.

Governor Alfred said that he consulted none of the various factions in the dispute over safety commission policies. "I discussed it with no one but Mr. Richardson and I had a hard time to convince him that it was his duty to accept. He was truly drafted for the place. The appointment is news to everyone but him and me," Governor Alfred said.

BRITAIN WILL INSIST UPON NEW PENALTIES

GENEVA, April 10.—Great Britain, ignoring Italian talks of war, announced today she would seek new penalties against Italy for its war on Ethiopia if a final peace effort fails. Anthony Eden, British foreign secretary, made the announcement. The committee of 13 which is the league council without Italy, met to consider the situation. It was a showdown between Britain, which wants to make sure Italy stops its war at once, and France, eager to have Italy back in the united front, against Germany in the Rhineland dispute. The committee decided to adjourn to April 16 so its chairman could make a last effort at a peaceable settlement of the dispute in a conference with Italian and Ethiopian delegates. Eden threatened if the chairman's report of his conference was unfavorable, to seek convocation of the league committee of 18 the next day to vote new penalties against Italy.

Roosevelt Finds Political Fires Are Burning Brightly

President Roosevelt returned to the nation's capital today to find political fires burning brightly. Mr. Roosevelt stopped to speak briefly at tornado-stricken Gainesville, Ga., en route from his fishing vacation. Chief political controversy centered on the \$4,000,000,000 WPA, under attack by Republican and Democratic partisans in several states. Bringing WPA problems home close to legislators were some 900 stranded delegates of a "hunger march" organized by the Workers Alliance without funds. They demanded food and lodging while pleading for a wider program of work for the idle.

Italians Advance On Eastern Front

ADDIS ABABA, April 10.—Italians have opened an offensive in Eastern Ethiopia and a fierce battle is raging, private reports from the front said today. The attack was directed against Sasa Baneh on the way northward to the Jijiga-Harara area, while the Italian left wing was attempting a flanking movement in the Sasan river valley. It was assumed the fighting meant the drive for Harara and the Addis Ababa-Bjout railway had started.

Road Projects to Be Bid Upon Apr. 28

AUSTIN, April 10.—Road projects approved by the office of the district engineers of the federal bureau of public roads, Fort Worth, will be bid upon here, it was announced today and the bidding dates set for April 28 and 29. Included were: Eastland county, grading, drainage, base work and a triple asphalt surfacing, in and near Cisco. Grading, drainage and a limestone base will be provided for a feeder road in Palo Pinto county from Highway 66 to Oran.

Bloody Cult Will Terminate Ceremony With a 'Crucifixion'

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., April 10.—Good Friday dawned on New Mexico with followers of the Penitente Brotherhood of religious fanatics resuming their strange torture that will culminate tonight with "crucifixion" of an "honored" member of the cult. All last night the small group, who live a secluded life near here, staggered many miles over rocky land to their "Calvary," scourging their backs to a bloody froth in belief the cruelty purged them of sin.

Nun Spends Twelfth Good Friday In Religious Ecstasy

CONSENZA, Italy, April 10.—Surrounded by doctors, priests and Catholic Sisters, the nun, Elina Aiello, lay in religious ecstasy on her cot in the orphanage here today, as for the 12th consecutive Good Friday, blood streamed from her face and forehead. The nun, according to doctors, does not seem to suffer. She smiled as the blood stream increased, soaking pillow after pillow.

Early Rising Star Oilman Succumbs at Pennsylvania Home

RISING STAR, April 10.—Friends here learned of the death of O. E. Latah, one of the early oil operators in this section, who died suddenly at his home in Pennsylvania Tuesday, according to a message received by Mayor W. E. Tyler. Latah was the operator on the Bob Jackson well and others of the first wells drilled here. He was 82 at the time of his death.

FORMER PRESIDENT CALLES OF MEXICO SEIZED AND DEPORTED TO UNITED STATES

BROWNSVILLE, April 10.—Former President Plutarco Calles of Mexico and three companions arrived here by plane from Mexico City at 12:50 p. m. today.

MEXICO CITY, April 10.—Plutarco Calles, deposed dictator, was seized by armed government forces in his home today and deported to the United States by airplane, apparently as an aftermath of the recent dynamiting of the Vera Cruz-Mexico City express.

Three of his supporters, Luis Morales, former secretary of labor, Luis Leon, former secretary of agriculture and Melchor Ortega, former governor of Guajaluto State, were deported with him. Calles was seized suddenly at the Santa Barbara ranch, 17 miles from the city, by nearly 100 soldiers and detectives who appeared at midnight. It was this property of Calles that was seized and held for 48 hours by communist women recently.

Morales was arrested on the road to Acapulco, Leon at his palatial residence in Chapultepec Heights, and Ortega at Tehuacan. They were held under guard all night and at 8:10 a. m. placed in a plane bound for Brownsville. President Cardenas, who smashed the political power of Calles, ordered the deportation. For months he has resisted the demands of advisors that Calles be removed, contending he had nothing to fear from him. The train dynamiting and renewed anti-government propaganda the past week, however, caused him to issue the order.

The arrests were made on orders of Cardenas "because conditions in the country demand it."

Calles was in bed reading Adolf Hitler's book, "Mein Kampf," when the general entered with soldiers.

Calles said, "I am at your orders, sir."

General Calles, wan and haggard, sat on a bench in the waiting room of the Brownsville airport. He looked anything but the part of the "strong man" who ruled Mexico for years.

The situation is aggravated, he said, because the present government is communistically inclined.

He denied emphatically that he had any knowledge of or connection with the bombing last week of a Mexico City-Vera Cruz train, or recent disorders in Nueva Laredo, where a mob stormed the city hall and forced the mayor to flee to the federal garrison for protection.

General Calles chartered a plane to take his party from Brownsville to Fort Worth, to leave here at 3 p. m. CST. The journey should require slightly more than three hours.

Karkalis, "To the Supreme Council, 33rd Degree and the Sovereign Grand Commander, John H. Cowles," E. E. Solomon, Breckenridge, "To the Sovereign Acting Grand Inspector General in Texas, Walter C. Temple," W. D. McWhorter, Albany, "To the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of Texas," C. B. Frost, Abilene, "To All Masons and Masonic Bodies of All Rites and Degrees Over the Surface of the Earth."

To the Memory of Those Brethren Whose Labors Have Ceased was observed in silence. W. B. Hamilton, Wichita Falls, delivered the principal address of the evening.

Bombs in Mail Spread Terror in Wilkes-Barre, Pa.

WILKES-BARRE, Pa., April 10. A flood of infernal machines sent through the mails as Easter packages spread death, injury and terror in the Wyoming Valley today. The bombs killed one man and injured four others. Six bombs have been accounted for to date. They were mailed in a package box in the central part of the city last night. Two have exploded, four were found unopened.

Zeppelin Lands In Friedrichshafen

LONDON, April 10.—The Zeppelin Hindenberg landed at Friedrichshafen at 6:45 a. m. Central European Time, the Exchange Telegraph reported today. While flying over France the dirigible had reported itself in trouble, bucking headwinds with only two of its four motors functioning.

FLOOD MENACE OVER TORNADO AREA ARISES

Flood menace replaced the terror of tornadoes in the South today, as rivers fed by relentless rains spread over lowlands and forced thousands from their homes.

Five hundred families were driven from their lowland dwellings near Ridgely, Tenn., and other refugees were reported in Dyer county, Tennessee.

Back waters from streams pouring into the swelling Mississippi river inundated thousands of acres of Arkansas land.

About a dozen families left their homes in Montgomery, Ala., as floodwaters of Alabama rivers swept over lowlands and in streets of several cities.

The Coussa river was menacing Gadsden, Ala.

West Point, Ga., again was harassed by rising waters of the Chattahoochee river.

\$10,000 Bond Set Former Rising Star Resident

FORT STOCKTON, April 10.—Wilbur Garton, accused of slaying his wife and her daughter and dumping their bodies in the murky Pecos river six years ago, waived examining trial on two murder charges here Thursday.

Judge C. E. Casebier set the Corpus Christi liquor dealer's bond at \$5,000 on each charge and remanded him to jail while he was trying to arrange for bail.

Garton, arrested in Corpus Christi a few days ago, was brought here from the Ozone jail. Sheriff Will Rooney and Texas rangers had been questioning him there since Tuesday.

The sheriff quoted Garton as saying he had last seen his wife, Mrs. Letta Bell Garton, 27, and her daughter, Joyce Lynn Roberts, 10, alive before leaving on a trip from Wink to Oklahoma a short time before their disappearance. Garton, the officers said, made no other statement.

Bodies of the woman and girl were fished from the Pecos in Pecos county, 35 miles from Fort Stockton, Feb. 21, 1930, and were identified by Mrs. Mary Dameron of Rising Star, mother of Mrs. Garton. The girl was Mrs. Garton's daughter by a former marriage.

Garton's attorney went to Wink Thursday afternoon to collect evidence in the case. He intimated his findings might result in a habeas corpus action.

RIISING STAR, April 10.—Many Rising Star folk were interested in reading in the daily press a story telling of the arrest of Wilbur Garton at Corpus Christi on a charge of the murder of his wife and her daughter by a former marriage, near Fort Stockton six years ago. Mrs. Garton is a daughter of Mrs. Mary Dameron, of this city, who assisted in unraveling the six-year-old mystery by identifying clothing and jewelry worn by her daughter and her 10-year-old granddaughter, when their bodies were taken from the Pecos river near Fort Stockton. Clothing and jewelry were brought here by officers last May to be identified, but Mrs. Dameron was requested to say nothing about it and nothing was known of the case locally until the arrest was made Monday.

Mrs. Garton was born in Rising Star in 1902 and was married here when grown to Walter Roberts, who was the father of her daughter. The couple were divorced some years later and in 1928 she was married to Garton at Fort Stockton.

Mrs. Garton and her daughter were well known here, having visited in Rising Star on numerous occasions.

Two of the Wendel Kidnapers Known

NEW YORK, April 10.—District Attorney William Geoghegan of Kings county said today he had identified two of four "kidnapers" of Paul Wendel, disbarred New Jersey attorney, who confessed and then denied he kidnaped the Lindbergh baby. One of the men is under observation, he said. The other was said to be an ex-convict, recently arrived in New York from a mid-western state.

Denton Students Get Meals From Society

DENTON.—Ninety-three children in the Denton public schools are being provided meals through the United Charities Association. Necessary school supplies also will

be given those who are financially unable to buy them. The board of directors has gone on record not to sponsor any project to raise funds, other than the financial campaign now under way. A municipally owned tract of land is to be planted in vegetables and will be used to feed the needy.

New Program Is Planned at A.&M.

COLLEGE STATION.—The assembling of personnel and arrangement of facilities for handling work of the government's new agricultural program, expected to be announced by the Department of Agriculture shortly, is going on with as much dispatch as possible at state headquarters here, H. H. Williamson, director of the Texas Extension Service, has announced.

Williamson estimated that the combined personnel in the various units here would within the next three or four weeks reach a peak of approximately 350 people. Clarical activities at headquarters in the new program will probably not begin for some six or eight weeks, however, Williamson said.

"It will be necessary for producers to be supplied with the necessary application forms and county offices equipped with supplies before there will be need for work in the state office," he said. The college is completing a temporary building to house activities of the new program. The structure will have 20,000 square feet of floor space. Additional space in college buildings will give the federal workers here a total of approximately 35,000 square feet of floor space.

NEW YORK.—Jim Braddock wants no outside help in preparing for the defense of the heavyweight championship against Joe Louis in September, least of all any which Jack Johnson might provide.

So Joe Gould, manager of the former Jersey stevedore, told 600 persons who gathered at a dinner and dance tendered John T. McNeill, who has retired as a deputy of the New York State Athletic Commission after years of public service.

"Jim and I never even thought of having Johnson in our camp," said Gould when questioned in regard to the report that the old Galveston black would have a hand in training the Irishman. "Even if Johnson has a line on some weakness of Louis, as is claimed, neither Jim nor I would be interested in accepting his aid."

"Doc Robb and his staff, who were good enough to condition Jim to win the title, will be good enough to condition him for the defense of it."

"Hard work never hurt anybody," Braddock told me at Miami Beach when I asked if he really was returning to the Weehawken wharves to harden up for the Louis engagement.

BRADDOCK claims to have developed his left hand unloading railroad ties from lighters and putting them on gondola cars.

"You pick up ties with a hook," explained the North Bergen Mick. "My right hand was broken, so I had to use my left to stick on the payroll. The first thing I knew I could whip this left hand around like Lefty Grove."

Braddock expects to work on the docks for about three weeks. Then he's going into the mountains for the remainder of the spring and summer.

Naturally, Braddock anticipates a good tough fight. He expects to get hit by many a good hard punch, but professes to believe that he will retain the crown.

Braddock, now 29, was a much more formidable warrior last summer than he was when he boxed Tommy Loughran for the lightweight leadership in 1928.

"The only time I used my left hand in 1929 was at the dinner table," he beamed.

BRADDOCK now weighs 210 pounds and is still filling out.

"They gave me a dinner shortly before I boxed Max Baer last June, so I had to climb into a tuxedo," he said. "It fitted me perfectly then. I put it on again the other night and what do you think? I couldn't even get into it. You see I'm filling out around the shoulders where it will do me the most good."

Braddock intends to attempt to go along with Louis just as he did with Baer.

"I'll keep a left hand in his face, try to keep him off balance, and will keep moving," he asserted. "If I find that I have to change my style, I can do that too."

"Carnera, Levinsky, Baer, Paulino, and Retzlaff were scared stiff when they got into the ring with Louis. You know me, I won't choke up. When I get in the ring I get in there to fight. It's either me or the other fellow. When I land on the floor I get up and fight harder. If Louis drops me, he'll find that out in a hurry."

AUSTIN.—The chance to vote on the New Deals six amendments to the state constitution, state officers, and local political heads all for the price of one is proving attractive to Texas voters, whose poll tax payments indicate a near-record vote for 1936.

Poll tax experts of the state comptroller's office believed 1,350,000 would be eligible to vote. Largest number of voters in Texas was in 1924 when approximately 1,350,000 were qualified.

Normally Democratic Texas will be closely watched for its reaction to the New Deal, since its 1928 vote for Republican Herbert Hoover. More important locally is the Nev. 3 constitutional election when amendments to establish a state monopoly liquor sales system will be considered along with increases in salary for most constitutional state officials.

The gubernatorial race with incumbent Gov. James V. Allred against the field will give voters a chance to express their views on the sales tax, increased natural resources taxes and other forms of revenue. The current 44th or the 45th legislature which takes office next January will be called upon to choose some tax to raise money for paying old age pensions.

First statewide election will be July 25 when the first Democratic primary is scheduled. The second party primary will be Aug. 22 with the national and final state election set Nov. 3.

An unusually large turnout of voters past 60 years of age is expected in the state elections, in view of the interest in old age pensions. Voters past 60 may vote without poll tax payment, and those living in towns of less than 10,000 population need not even be reported to the state comptroller's office.

Tabulations from 237 of the state's 254 counties on March 20 showed 995,983 paid poll taxes. Supplementary reports plus the totals from the 17 counties still uncounted were expected to swell the paid poll tax number to 1,175,000. The long-standing method of figuring exemptions is to add 15 percent to the poll tax total, making about 1,350 qualified voters in Texas this year.

Counties still "out" include El Paso and Bexar, two of the five largest. Others whose collectors have yet to report pre-February payments are Kaufman, Smith, Eastland, Limestone, Nueces, Brazoria, Bee, Briscoe, Henderson, Hidalgo, Limestone, Navarro, Starr, Titus, Willacy, Victoria and Duval.

Largest number of paid poll taxes reported was Harris county with 83,556. Dallas county had only 62,364 and Tarrant 46,000 at the first report.

Robots Become Light Keepers

HONOLULU.—Makapuu lighthouse, on Makapuu Point, Hawaii, has become typical of the new science that is guiding sea navigation by water and by air.

A ship plows through the Pacific. A plane soars through the night above the water. Guiding them are expert navigators. But the best navigator may make mistakes. Many conditions may affect their instruments. So modern science has surrounded them with safeguards, enlisting even the ether waves in man's long battle for safety at sea.

From the lighthouse at Makapuu, radio beams send clear tones every three minutes, providing a track that ship and plane can follow unerringly. With such protection, shipwrecks have become exceedingly rare.

But mechanical devices, electricity and radio are changing the lives of the men who watch over the lives of the travelers at sea. Kaula light, on a barren rock off the coast of Kauai and Niihau, has no keeper. The sun turns it on at sunset and off at sunrise, through a photo-electric valve.

Nevertheless, these marvels of ingenuity have to have human supervision to keep them in order. The automatic signal station at Kaula Rock has to be visited occasionally by maintenance men.

Radio beacons, too, and the electric light that flashes through the largest lens in the U. S. lighthouse service, at Makapuu, still are tended by human hands.

Invention has taken the drudgery out of the work, but men like Manuel Ferreira of Makapuu and his two helpers William Nihou and John Enos, stand guard to see that everything works properly. They even listen in, on their own radio set, to check the radio beacon signals, making sure these are broadcast at the right time and in the correct tone.

Romance has not gone from the lives of the men who keep the lights burning for those at sea. It has only changed.

Manuel Ferreira knows that. He has been in the service 28 of his 51 years. He was there when Makapuu was reached only by a dirt road over which supplies had to be hauled by mule. He kept the signal lighted when it was only an oil lamp and went out into the dark and wind and rain many a night to call the naval authorities to send aid to ships.

Now Makapuu light is only a mile from the main motor road. The light is electric, generated by Diesel engines, though an oil system is also maintained for emergency use in case of power shortage.

The radio beacon, installed in 1927, has made it almost impossible for any vessel equipped with receiver apparatus to get off its course.

Ferreira and his assistants are part of a big division of the lighthouse service for the 19th district which has headquarters at Honolulu. There are 33 aids to navigation in the district, including everything from small signal buoys and range lights to such modern lighthouses as that of Makapuu.

Lumber Business Shows An Increase

AUSTIN.—Lumber statistics in the South during March made favorable comparisons both with the preceding month and the corresponding month last year, according to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

Reports from the Southern Pine Association show an increase in average weekly production per unit of 12 per cent over the preceding month and 33 per cent over March last year; weekly shipments per unit were up 20 per cent from the month before and 37 per cent from a year ago; and unfilled orders per unit on March 31 were 8 per cent above the preceding month and 50 per cent above those of the corresponding date last year.

Capitalism Has Need For Popular Rule

If your memory is long enough to go back three or four years, you doubtless can recall that there was a time when well-fed Americans were fond of saying that what this country needed was a Mussolini.

It was more or less natural that some people should say this. When a large and steadily increasing part of the populace has no work and sees no earthly chance of getting work, and when an equally large and steadily increasing part of industry has no dividends and sees no chance of getting them, the institution of private property itself is in danger.

A strong man who could step in and take hold, start the wheels turning, disregard all the red tape of law and tradition, and bash in the head of anyone who objected—well, such a man was bound to look more or less attractive.

As of today, however, the picture is different. Signor Mussolini right now seems bent on making all the Americans who talked that way wish they had said something else.

By scrapping the last vestige of democracy in Italy, and dispossessing the owners of private industry, he has shown all of us, in an unforgettable way, just what you let yourself in for when you turn to a dictator for help.

For dictatorship in the modern manner does not exist for the preservation of private property. It is as heedless of that as it is of democracy. It serves its own ends and follows its own course, and it is as hostile to individualism in the realm of trade as in the realm of politics.

And that brings us to a point that defenders of the existing order of things in America too often overlook; that private capitalism and democracy go hand in hand. They are Siamese twins. If one dies, the other cannot long survive.

During the last half decade or so, we have had plenty of opportunity to learn that both private capitalism and democracy, as practiced in America, have grave defects. Capitalism often is selfish and blind; democracy often is inefficient and stupid. But if we remember that the two go together, we may be able to muster the patience to make the reforms which both need.

The ardent leftwing liberal who wants political freedom made broader and more secure should be a stalwart defender of capitalism; and similarly the capitalist moved by

a human desire to protect his own, should be one of the most vehement upholders of democracy.

It is some years since the Russians showed us that, when you set out to abolish capitalism, you have to abolish democracy as well. Now Mussolini is demonstrating that, when you abolish democracy, you wind up by doing away with capitalism.

Our job, as a capitalistic democracy, is to retain both—and to make, in each, the reforms and the necessary improvements if they are to work as they should.

Citrus Shipments Ahead of Last Year

MISSION, Texas.—The largest single cluster of citrus fruit recorded in the Lower Rio Grande Valley is no more.

The big cluster, believed to have contained 40 individual grapefruit, was dismembered when federal and state department of agriculture agents announced they could find no method of preserving the fruit on the original stem.

When the cluster was broken, a total of 54 fruits were found, all but 11 of them being of commercial size and the entire group weighing 94 pounds.

The cluster was found on a tree in the Oleander Hodge Farms near here, which are owned by C. A. Gates, Dallas, who had planned to preserve the branch and fruit for exhibition at the Texas Centennial Exposition in Dallas. Impossibility of preserving the unusual growth prevented the display.

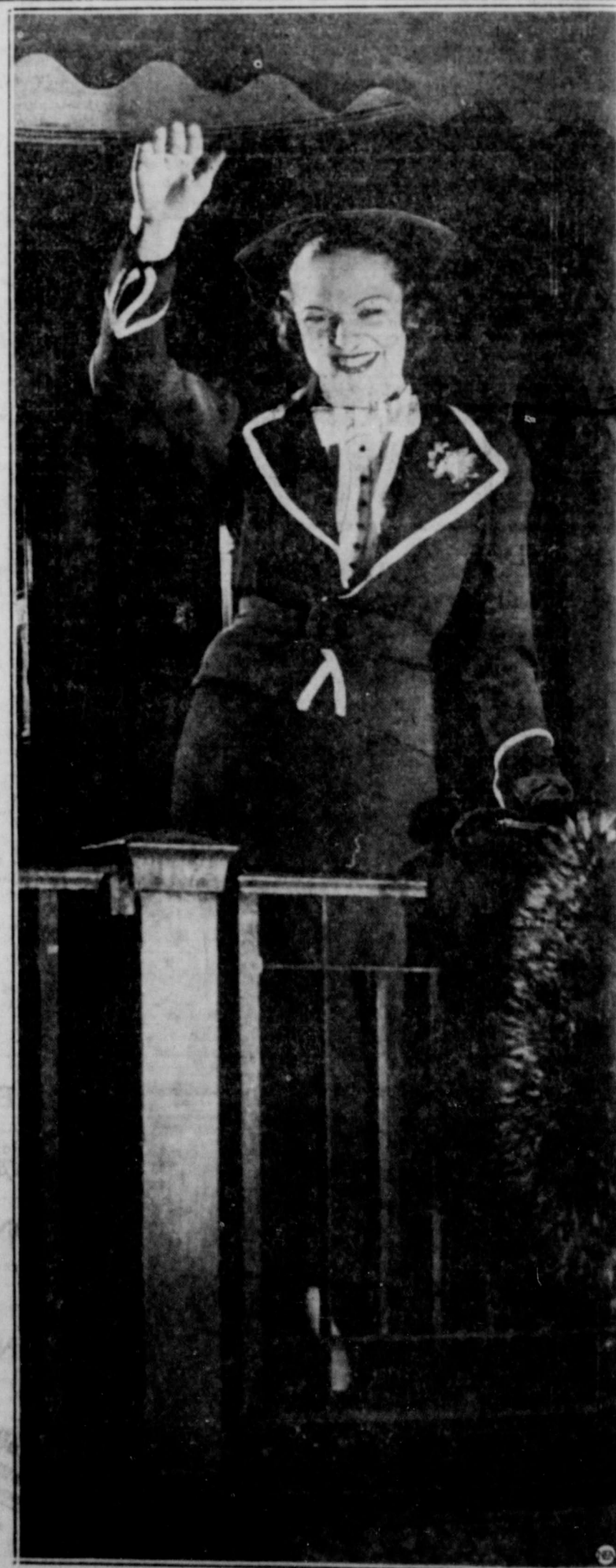

Reforestation Would Be Check To Flood Threats

WASHINGTON—Flood damage in the South, such as recently threatened the Tennessee Valley, could be more effectively checked at its source by increased reforestation by governmental agencies and private landowners, according to Joseph C. Kircher, regional forester in charge of the Southern Region of the U. S. Forest Service.

"Though the South is not a section of the country where the most destructive floods originate, large flood damage is caused from time to time by rivers rising in the Ozarks and the Southern Appalachians, and also the overflow of streams in the southern pine states ranging from North Carolina to Texas," Kircher stated.

"I know that a great many people take the stand that it requires so long for trees to grow that reforestation, though it has value, is not important in acute situations. This is not an accurate view. Soil experts freely admit that the roots of tree seedlings begin to function as effective agents in holding soil against erosion very soon after the plants begin to grow.

"There are now 2,338,600 acres of national forest land in Arkansas and Oklahoma which protect important watersheds to a certain extent, but to do this job adequately 2,365,000 additional acres of land suitable only for the production of forests should be purchased, at a cost of about \$7,500,000.

"In the southern pine states there are already nearly 4,000,000 acres of national forest land, but so distributed that another 4,000,000 acres should be added at perhaps a cost of \$15,000,000 to effectively combat the flood menace to future generations.

"In the Southern Appalachians we have 2,063,000 acres, which have been under protection for 25 years and have been a vital factor in checking floods in the rivers of Tennessee, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, and northern

Alabama. Here we should have an additional 6,040,000 acres of land that would probably cost about \$25,000,000.

"If steps were taken at the present time to acquire this land, it would not only be of prime importance in our national obligation to take measures to minimize the recurrence of floods that menace the welfare and happiness of thousands of persons each year, but it would have immediate relief possibilities."

New Manifest Form Is Now Being Used

AUSTIN.—Manifests upon which motor trucks will be allowed to haul gasoline and other petroleum products from the East Texas field will look like an enlarged form of the "transfers" generally issued by street car lines, combined with a meal ticket.

The form has been devised by C. L. Sullivan, chief of oil enforcement for the State Railroad Commission.

It is believed to be proof against changes or duplication.

Changes are made impossible by omitting many written notations. Date by month, day and the time of day all must be punched out. A manifest will not be accepted with more than one time designated by the punching.

Similarly punches will designate the number of gallons of gasoline or the other products loaded on the truck when it was checked out of the refinery.

The manifests will be in triplicate and will be numbered serially. They will be printed on water-marked paper like that used in railroad tickets and protected checks. Only the printer who is designated to furnish the manifests to the state will be able to purchase the paper with the particular marking.

Search for "Black Gold" Puts to Sea

HOUSTON.—The search for "black gold" has put out to sea.

Salt Dome Oil-California company's joint exploration of 60,000 acres of subsea land beneath Galveston Bay waters started when 10 boats, 17 seismologists and helpers, and a number of sailors, cooks and mechanics cast off at Barbours Cut.

The scientific party will "shoot" the 6,000 acres thoroughly.

"It may require as long as 18 months," said Kark Hasselmann, president of Salt Dome.

Hasselmann; Ken Regan, vice-president of Salt Dome; and Gaddis Bass, general superintendent of the state land commissioner's office, the Texas Agency which leased the land to California and Salt Dome, inspected the "floating shooting party" before its departure.

The geophysical exploration marks the active entry of California into the Gulf coast. Fisher Reynolds, president of the Seismic Explorations, Inc., will direct the geophysical work.

stay on Galveston Bay waters. It will put back into its base from time to time for provisions.

From this boat, the men will go daily in small motorboats, cabin powerboats and a barge to drill "shot" holes, load them with dynamite, touch off the charges, and take readings.

On a barge is a light drilling rig capable of going 1,200 feet, although no such depth will be attempted, Reynolds said.

Another boat, painted a bright red, is labeled "Dynamite, Danger." It serves as the magazine for the party's explosives, and is given as wide a berth as possible.

Two cabin powerboats are the "exploding" and "receiving" ends of the geophysical operation.

From one the "shots" will be exploded. Aboard the other, the progress through the earth of the seismic disorder set up by the "shots" will be received and traced.

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SISTER MARY'S KITCHEN

BY MARY E. DAGUE
Sister Mary's Kitchen

THE home-maker must certainly know her onions, for this pungent vegetable stands third among the truck-garden crops of the United States and is of high food value.

New onions come under the head of succulent vegetables. As a source of vitamins and minerals, they rank with the best of the leafy vegetables. The dry winter onions differ considerably in their food properties, although they are rich in mineral constituents and are a nourishing vegetable. The onion bulb is a mass of thickened leaves, but the tops are thin leaves full of the important nutrients found in such vegetables as spinach, chard and so forth.

Tops Furnish Vitamin A

The tops of spring onions, being an excellent source of vitamin A, should be used rather than thrown away. Carefully washed, crisped and shredded, they can be used with other vegetables to give an appetizing tang to the mixture. Minced onion tops combined with cottage cheese is a good combination to serve with fish.

The tender spring onions are much easier to digest than the strong juiced dry ones and are a good raw food for this reason. When cooked they naturally are less strong flavored than the winter varieties and therefore delicate and inviting cooked vegetables.

Green onions in a rich cream sauce on toast are the best yet. Cook them with two or three inches of the green top in boiling salted water until tender. Make a rich cream sauce, using a little of the cooking water, and pour over onion arranged on hot toast. If topped with poached eggs, this

makes an appetizing main dish for supper or luncheon. Grated cheese added to the sauce increases the protein content. Or sprinkle grated cheese over onions and sauce on toast and put into a hot oven long enough to melt the cheese.

New onions make good sandwiches, too. Cut the little onions in thin slices and spread evenly on thin slices of buttered bread. Sprinkle lightly with salt, cover with buttered bread, trim off crusts and serve.

Liederkrantz-Onion Sandwich Mash a package of Liederkrantz with a fork until soft and smooth. Add 2 tablespoons beer and blend to a smooth paste. Fold in 2 tablespoons of finely minced onion, chives or green tops of young onions, and spread on buttered rye bread.

Tomato catsup spread over the cheese mixture or plain cheese without onion is a satisfying sandwich, too. Garnish these with stuffed olives.

Serve these sandwiches some noon when the whole family is at home for luncheon. Begin with a clear tomato bouillon and finish with rhubarb tarts.
