

Carr Goes On Stand In Schine Case

WASHINGTON (AP)—Francis P. Carr testified today that Secretary of the Army Stevens talked last October of using G. David Schine as his personal observer at Army intelligence schools, reporting directly to him.

Carr, chief of staff of the McCarthy Investigations subcommittee, said Stevens volunteered this idea at a conference last Oct. 2 at the Pentagon with him and Roy M. Cohn.

Schine, wealthy unpaid consultant to the McCarthy subcommittee, was then faced with imminent drafting into the Army. Efforts to get an officer's commission for him failed.

Carr was called to the witness chair at the McCarthy-Army hearings as a temporary replacement for Sen. McCarthy who, it was explained, was resting after a strenuous speech-making trip over the weekend.

A round-faced, heavy-set, ex-

FBI agent, Carr backed up previous testimony from McCarthy and Cohn, chief counsel to the subcommittee, on point after point.

Carr swore:
1. That on at least three occasions Army officials combined efforts to sidetrack Sen. McCarthy's investigation of Reds in the Army with promises of special Army treatment for Schine.
2. That Secretary of the Army Stevens suggested the McCarthy subcommittee "take the heat off" the Army by looking into security risks in defense plants, the Air Force and the Navy. Stevens has denied this.

3. That Army Counselor John G. Adams, after failing in repeated attempts to get the McCarthy subcommittee to drop its investigation of the Army, claimed he was taking "some control" over Army assignments for Pvt. Schine.

Carr cited several occasions in which he said Stevens and Adams tried to persuade McCarthy to drop his investigation of alleged subversion at secret radar laboratories at Ft. Monmouth, N.J., and let the Army itself take over the inquiry.

On one such occasion, Carr testified, he and Cohn had dinner at Cohn's New York City home on Oct. 21 and then went to a prize fight with Adams.

Carr testified Adams "stated he wanted the hearings on the Monmouth situation ended... he thought that it would be helpful to him and to Mr. Stevens (secretary of the Army) if we could drop these hearings."

Carr said Adams "suggested there had been enough in the way of hearings, enough in the way of publicity," and the subcommittee should turn the investigation "over to them."

At the same time, Carr testified, Adams reported he was taking over some of the control of assignments for Schine.

Carr said Adams explained that prior to that time, "the Schine matter" was being handled by Army personnel but that now he (Adams) "was taking over."

Testifying about the Oct. 2 conference he and Cohn had with Stevens, Carr said Stevens brought up the subject of Schine by saying the millionaire committee consultant was not going to get an Army commission.

Carr related that Stevens said he would make arrangements, once Schine was drafted, that would be both advantageous to Schine and the Army.

Carr quoted Stevens as saying he was not satisfied with Army intelligence personnel and would place Schine in various intelligence schools "to observe" and report his observations directly back to the secretary of the Army.

Carr said he thought Cohn felt Schine was drafted, that would be "perfectly all right with him."

Carr said the Oct. 2 conference at the Pentagon was primarily to discuss Maj. Gen. Richard C.

Hunt Continues For Ransom Cash In Arizona Mountains

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP)—Daniel J. Marsin, 41, charged with kidnaping the wife of a wealthy industrialist for \$75,000, sat silently in jail while officers resumed a search today for the missing ransom money.

Somewhere in the Superstition Mountains, police believed, were hidden the marked bills paid for Mrs. Evelyn Ann Smith's release by her husband Herbert.

The rocky, cactus-strewn foothills were combed by a small force of officers. They worked doggedly, moving small boulders, brush and dirt in the belief the loot had been buried.

Two days of hunting failed to turn up any clue. The search today

was extended into abandoned mine shafts.

Police also were hunting a rifle, a pistol and a pair of binoculars which the Smiths said they had seen the kidnaper use.

There were other unanswered questions. Mrs. Smith said she had overheard a second man after being locked in the trunk of her car. She said he discussed killing her.

When she arrived at the Superstition late Wednesday, she said, only one masked kidnaper was with her.

Investigating officers, who had hidden along the road to the payoff spot to which Smith had been ordered, asked openly why Smith drove his wife back to Phoenix without stopping to report that she was safe.

That delayed the search for the kidnaper by more than two hours, one officer said.

Marsin, seized near a ranch house four hours after Mrs. Smith was released Thursday night, was not taken to her for identification until the next afternoon.

At that time, it was learned, he was taken to her home to be identified several hours before she picked him from a lineup of masked persons. He was charged Saturday with kidnaping and placed under \$50,000 bond.

Marsin's hand-picked lawyer John J. Flynn, who prosecuted many successful cases as deputy Maricopa County attorney, sharply criticized the methods used by police and added, "That was practically no identification at all."

Flynn said the first description given officers by Mrs. Smith said her kidnaper had bright green eyes and curly hair.

"This man is almost bald and has eyes as brown as mine," said Flynn.

"We've got an answer for everything," Flynn said. "We'll give it at the proper time and place."

Work Will Begin Soon On Extension Of East 2nd Street

The cut will be made from the hill just as soon as the right-of-way necessary is obtained by the city.

Deputy Sheriff Bobby West said a 1953 Cadillac operated by William McFadden of Victoria struck the posts. Averill told West he pulled off the roadway to avoid another car. The mishap occurred about 8:30 p.m.

Young Indian Held In Sooner Sheriff's Ambush Slaying

STILLWELL, Okla. (AP)—An angry, muttering crowd milled about the Adair County Courthouse yesterday after officers said a 21-year-old Indian signed a statement confessing he shot Sheriff Henry Buckner to death Saturday night while in a drunken rage.

But Chester Lee Gonzales, full-blooded Cherokee, wasn't there. He was whisked away to an undisclosed jail for his own protection.

Gonzales was quoted as saying he was so drunk "it's all like a dream."

Police said the statement told this story: Gonzales returned home to the Fogg Hollow community, an Indian settlement, drunk and disorderly. His sister phoned Sheriff Buckner for help.

Gonzales grabbed a shotgun and ran from the house before Buckner arrived, the statement went on. He lay in wait in the bushes nearby.

Demos Take No Morrow Action

AUSTIN (AP)—The State Democratic Executive Committee will take no action on the disputed status of National Committeeman Wright Morrow of Houston, Chairman George W. Sandlin said today.

Morrow, here for the executive committee meeting, told reporters that he would ignore a statement made in Temple yesterday by Byron Skelton, who said the committee would "turn its back on" Morrow.

Sandlin said that the committee, which had confirmed its backing of Morrow in 1952, had taken the only action it could take in the matter and nothing was in prospect for today's session. But Sandlin told reporters he would have comment on Skelton's statement at an afternoon meeting of the committee.

The committee met briefly this morning, then recessed for subcommittee meetings on such routine matters as making up the ballot for the July 24 Democratic primary and the selection of a convention city for the September party meeting.

Mineral Wells was the only city bidding for the job.

Morrow offered his resignation as Democratic committeeman from Texas to support Eisenhower's campaign in 1952. The National Democratic Committee accepted his resignation. The state committee turned it down. Now the national committee refuses to recognize Morrow as committeeman.

Skelton, a leader in the Loyalist group of Democrats, said yesterday he had heard the state committee today planned to "turn its back on Wright Morrow."

Skelton said in a statement: "It is rumored that Gov. Allan

Shivers is preparing to have his Republican-dominated State Democratic Executive Committee turn its back on Wright Morrow at a meeting of the committee in Austin Monday and select someone else as its Democratic national committeeman."

Gov. Shivers said yesterday at his home in Woodville that "I know nothing about the rumor Mr. Skelton is creating and refuse to help him spread it."

Shivers said the Morrow matter might not even come up at the meeting. He called Skelton "a sour grape guy," an apparent reference to Skelton's own candidacy for the national committeeman post several years ago.

Skelton said that to throw Morrow overboard would be a "desperate effort on Shivers' part to gain favor" with the national group.

Skelton is chairman of the Executive Committee of the Texas Democratic Advisory Council—the group with which Stephen Mitchell, National Executive committee chairman, is dealing on Texas Democratic matters. Mitchell has ignored the State Democratic Executive Committee since it began supporting Eisenhower.

Hugh Frasier Jr., a Democratic state committeeman from Dallas, indicated a belief, in advance of the meeting, that the group would reaffirm its support of Morrow.

Skelton said Morrow "is not entitled to any sympathy from any group with which Stephen Mitchell, of the Democratic party along with Allan Shivers in 1952" but that it would be the "basest sort of ingratitude" to "now throw Morrow

Mendes-France To Try To Form Cabinet In Paris

PARIS (AP)—Pierre Mendes-France, who wants to negotiate with Ho Chi Minh to end the war in Indochina, agreed today to try to form France's 20th postwar Cabinet.

Many political figures doubted whether the 47-year-old economic and financial expert could get a majority in the divided National Assembly to go along with his policy, which calls for cutting down expenditures in Indochina and slowing down France's military buildup in Europe.

Mendes-France was nominated last night by President Rene Coty to succeed retiring Premier Joseph Laniel, defeated Saturday in a National Assembly confidence vote. The President also accepted Laniel's resignation.

Mendes-France is a leader of the Assembly's Radical Socialist (moderate) bloc, which was credited with bringing down the Laniel government. Following normal procedure, he was the first person called on to try to form a replacement.

Coty delayed accepting Laniel's resignation for a day. It was believed he did not want France to be without a government over the weekend in case important decisions were needed concerning Indochina.

Mendes-France's acceptance was announced a few minutes after he called on the President today at the Elysee Palace (France's White House). He had conferred with Coty at length last night on the political situation.

The new Premier-designate now must consult various party leaders in an attempt to rally sufficient support to ensure his confirmation by the Assembly. He failed by 13 votes to gain confirmation as premier during last summer's 37-day government crisis. That crisis was finally resolved by the selection of Laniel, who served just two weeks short of a year.

Mendes-France has been a sharp critic of the Laniel administration. He has insisted that France must take the best bargain possible with the Communist-led Vietminh in Indochina and concentrate on building up her strength in Europe.

He also is a staunch advocate of cuts in military spending and government economy as a way to get the nation back on her financial feet. He insists that only after France has a healthy economy can she make her full contribution to Western defense.

In seeking Assembly confirmation as premier last year, Mendes-France said he would support the European Defense Community Treaty. French ratification of the pact, which would rearm West Germans in a six-nation army, has been stymied by heavy opposition from many quarters in the Assembly.

Until confirmation of a new government, Laniel and his ministers run their departments on a caretaker basis.

Foreign Minister Georges Bidault planned to return to Geneva to carry on negotiations for peace in Indochina, even though he has no backing from the Assembly.

The task of forming a new cabinet which could win Assembly approval appeared formidable. Any such government would have to be a coalition, like all others since the war. Support would be needed from at least six parties, none of whom see eye to eye.

Almost any possible coalition would have to include both the Popular Republican Movement (MRP) and the Union for Republican and Social Action (URAS). But the MRP strongly supports the European army while the URAS is bitterly opposed to the plan.

There seems no way for any government to obtain a majority in the Assembly without these two parties. The Socialists and the Communists have almost 200 votes between them. None of the parties will work with the Communists. The Socialists say they prefer to remain outside the government.

Most of the other parties have little or no discipline and a full quota of votes cannot be depended upon.

Wins Rail Fight

Count Shows Young Winner

ALBANY, N. Y. (AP)—Financier Robert R. Young was officially certified today as the winner of the bitter war for control of the New York Central Railroad.

The election inspectors announced that the 15-member slate of directors put up by the Young forces had won by a margin of 1,064,188 over the Central management's present board, headed by President William White.

The Young group received an average of more than 3,407,000 and the management group slightly less than 2,340,000.

White, who presided at the convened session of the annual meeting of the stockholders, announced that "I will not remain as president of New York Central. I will nevertheless cooperate with the new group in effecting an orderly transition."

White, who received a salary of \$120,000 a year, was asked by a reporter whether he intended to resign. He replied, "Do you think that is necessary?"

He obviously was referring to a prior announcement by Young that the new slate of 14 men and one woman would meet in New York City late this afternoon and elect a new president.

Young's choice is expected to be Alfred E. Perlman, executive vice president of the Denver and Rio Grande Western railroad.

A calm, reserved man of medium height, with blue eyes and thinning grey hair, Perlman joined the N.Y.C. in 1935 on loan from the Burlington. The loan was to be for two years but has stretched to 18.

Western Envoys Write Off Meet

GENEVA (AP)—The Geneva conference appeared near its end today after a series of high-level diplomatic talks.

Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov and British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden met almost an hour. They agreed the Indochina group would meet this afternoon and the Korean conference tomorrow.

The Indochina session was to be secret.

Some diplomats thought the Korean meeting might be the last fruitless effort at breaking the deadlock on the problem. They expected a few more sessions on Indochina, but the Western delegations frankly said the conference had failed.

Eden as spokesman for the West was understood to have told Molotov frankly there was no point in going on with the conference unless the Communists are ready to change their position.

While the two chairmen were

meeting, the 16 nations represented here which fought under the U. N. flag in Korea discussed plans for ending the Korean phase of the conference. They were reported fully agreed that further talks with the Communists at this time are useless.

The Western Powers were moving more cautiously on the Indochina problem because of several factors.

One was the uncertain political situation in France. The United States and Britain were reported hesitant to break off the talks unless there was a government which could speak with authority for France. For this reason, the decision here awaited what might happen in Paris during the day.

Another factor was the military talks in progress here between representatives of the two high commands in the Indochina fighting. Informed sources said they now had reached the stage of exchanging concrete proposals on cease-fire lines. These proposals could have an important bearing on whether the Indochina conference goes on.

The Western Powers agreed in talks over the weekend, however, that the chances of settlement on either Korea or Indochina were virtually nonexistent.

Four Sentenced In East German Riot

BERLIN (AP)—Four Germans charged with leading the June 17 revolt last year against the Soviet zone Communist government were sentenced today to long terms at hard labor.

The East German supreme court imposed 15 years each on Wolfgang Silgrat and Werner Mangelsdorf, 10 years on Hans Fiedler and 5 years on Hans Gassner.

The state charged that the four were the main organizers of the widespread rebellion and that they were on the payroll of Western espionage networks.

The 1953 uprising grew out of workers' resentment over increased work norms and substandard living conditions. It spread through dozens of cities, enlisting an estimated two million workers. Scores were shot and hundreds imprisoned after Russian tanks quelled the rioting.

Rebel Terrorists Strike In Tunisia

TUNIS, Tunisia (AP)—A hundred rebel-terrorists yesterday killed a 73-year-old French farm owner, Jean Piek, at Ebba Kasour and kidnaped two other farmers and a French soldier.

The raid was one of a series of incidents along the North African front, where disturbances aimed at promoting independence from France have increased steadily the past two months.

Handsoff Policy Of Democrats Seems To Doom Flanders Move

WASHINGTON (AP)—A handsoff policy adopted by the Senate Democratic leadership today apparently all but doomed a move by Sen. Flanders (R-Vt.) to strip Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.) of his leadership chairmanships.

Sen. Knowland of California, the Republican leader, has already made it abundantly clear that—as a representative of the GOP administration—he does not want to move against McCarthy in the way Flanders suggested on the floor of the Senate last Friday.

However, a remaining key factor, in a Senate where Democrats actually outnumber Republicans by members of the minority 48-47, was the attitude to be taken party.

While Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas, the Democratic leader, would make no public statement on the issue, he was reliably reported today to have told party colleagues he regards McCarthy as a "Republican problem."

Apparently Johnson is advising Democrats not to give any encouragement to Flanders, who has said he will move by mid-July for action on a motion to strip McCarthy of his chairmanships unless the Wisconsin senator answers questions raised in 1952 by a Senate elections subcommittee about his financial affairs.

The Flanders motion, which could be called up by any senator at any time, would remove McCarthy as chairman of the Gov-

ernment Operations Committee, as well as head of its Investigations subcommittee. Such a step is rare in Senate history.

McCarthy termed Flanders' criticism of him a "smear" and said the Vermont senator may be senile.

So far only one senator—Cooper of Kentucky, a Republican—has publicly lined up behind Flanders' move.

Sen. Hennings of Missouri, a Democrat, yesterday issued what was regarded as an attack on McCarthy in a speech criticizing "outrageous conduct" of "a public official." He declared at Valley Forge, Pa.:

"The American people can no longer write it off as 'just politics.' The Democrats in the Congress cannot shift the responsibility to the Republicans on the grounds that it is solely their problem. And the Republicans can no longer indulge in the luxury of apsement at any price."

Whether this foreshadowed any general Democratic movement to support Flanders remained to be seen, but immediate indications were such would not be the case.

Democratic leaders were said to feel that any time the Republican leadership wants to try to chastise McCarthy it can have Democratic help. But many Senate precedents and customs are involved that the Democrats don't want to upset for fear that if or when

they return to control of the Senate they might face a challenge to their own organization control.

One of the customs is that the majority party shall control the chairmanships. With only one exception when a chairman has been removed in the past it has been done on the initiative of the controlling party.

The exception came in 1924 when Progressive Republicans revolted against their party's leadership and eventually forced a floor vote in which the late E. D. (Cotton Ed) Smith, South Carolina Democrat, won out.

Flanders' motion also is regarded by many of the Democrats as failing to capitalize on the current televised controversy over "pressure" and "blackmail" charges exchanged between Secretary of the Army Stevens and McCarthy.

When someone says that a thing is "as light as air," he means it has very little weight.

Air does have some weight, and this fact is important in aviation. A balloon rises because it has a bag with gas which is lighter than air.

Let us suppose that we have a gas bag in the shape of a hollow ball, 50 feet in diameter. The air needed to fill it would weigh about 4,600 pounds. If we filled the bag with gas weighing one fourth as much as air, the difference, or lift-

ing power, would be about 3,500 pounds.

The lifting power would pull the bag and basket upward. In addition, the balloon could lift a dozen human beings.

If air weighed nothing, the power of gravity would fall to hold it around the earth. No man or plant or beast could live without air, or something like it.

Air is needed to support the wings of airplanes. There are heights which airplanes never reach because the air is too thin. Rockets, on the other hand, should be able to travel far beyond the limits of the earth's atmosphere.

Air at sea level has a pressure of 14 pounds and 11 ounces to the square inch. To estimate the total weight of the atmosphere, we need to find the number of square inches on the earth's surface. Then we multiply the figure by the average air pressure. The earth's air weighs about 60 million billion tons.

The height of the atmosphere has been learned by measuring the altitude of the northern lights. Very thin air appears to exist as much as 600 miles above the ground. Tomorrow: Oxygen.

If he does show just how little

he cares about you by blowing his top, it's better to make him mad than let an ill reasoning, ill-mannered boy risk your life for you.

But, of course, you like him, so your task is to do an A1 job of selling a sensible idea to this "accident that's looking for a place to happen."

Begin subtly with a little teasing such as, "Where's the fire?" "When do we break the sound barrier?" "Are you trying to collect on your insurance?"

This should lighten his foot on the accelerator. When it doesn't, try the psychology treatment. "Johnny, do you have an inferiority complex?"

He'll look puzzled and probably say, "Heck no. Why?" You reply, "I think you do. I can tell by the way you drive. You're trying to impress me with the fact that you're grown up by driving recklessly. But why? Do you NEED to prove it?"

This should get results, but whenever possible it is always better strategy to discuss your opinion of "those childish immature kids who don't know how to drive a car sensibly" before you ever climb into a car with him. This can help you avoid the problem before it even starts.

Write to the Texas Department of Public Safety at Austin and ask for some of their free booklets on "teenicide" that explain a few of the facts of life—and death. Give them to him.

A boy who is still uncooperative can be handled just one way. Refuse to ride with him, let him know you mean business, and stick to it. If enough people would give him the same treatment he'd catch on that dare-devil driving just isn't smart or admired.

Many teen-age girls have wound up in the morgue because they were more afraid to protest to their boy friends than gamble with a ride in the death seat. Sometimes it takes more courage to live than to die. What kind of courage have you?

600 Wetbacks Are Netted In California

SAN FRANCISCO (U)—With the big drive still to be launched Thursday, Border Patrol officers picked up 600 wetbacks over the weekend in raids in Northern California.

Edwin Dorn, chief inspector of the Border Patrol for Utah, Nevada and Northern California, indicated search planes will be called into use this week in a renewal of the raids.

By order of Atty. Gen. Brownell, a concentrated drive on the wetbacks—Mexican nationals illegally in the United States—is to begin in Western states Thursday.

Young Ex-Convict Admits Robberies

DALLAS (U)—A young ex-convict who said he was a "back-sider from Alcoholics Anonymous" told a reporter last night he was the man who has been robbing lone women shopkeepers in Dallas. He identified himself as Raymond Edward Stevens, 27, an unemployed bookkeeper.

He was arrested in a theater after fleeing from the scene of a robbery, where a Marshall, Tex., couple saw a man hold up a candy store. The couple, Mr. and Mrs. T. C. Sallman, gave the alarm.

Soil Experts Set Conference At Amarillo On Wind Erosion

AMARILLO (U)—Soil experts of the six states hardest hit by drought in the past three years will meet here tomorrow to talk about chances of permanently stopping wind erosion.

The meeting was called by the National Assn. of Soil Conservation Districts. Asst. Secretary of

Agriculture Ross Rixley will attend.

Governors of Texas, Kansas, Colorado, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Nebraska also are invited. Gov. Allan Shivers of Texas is to speak at 10 a.m. Wednesday, but governors of the other states apparently intend to send their state farm commissioners.

Texas Agriculture Commissioner John White said in advance of the meeting that a long-range program of converting burned-out crop lands back to grass is needed to end erosion.

He said emergency measures such as listing and chiseling the soil with special plows to turn up wind-resisting clods are good only for a few days or few hours. Colorado has passed a state law requiring this kind of tillage.

The soil experts are meeting at a time when the Southern Great Plains are in their best shape in three years of drought.

Colorado and New Mexico still report critical drought conditions. But agriculture experts in Oklahoma have declared the drought is

broken in that state.

And Texas, Kansas and Nebraska all report vast improvement from spring rains.

However, farmers in the El Paso area still need rain badly. The Rio Grande project allotment of five inches of water per acre allows just enough irrigation to get through the planting season. Farmers who have dependable wells will do all right, although many wells have had to be abandoned because of high salt content. Many others, including most of the small farmers around El Paso, will not have a crop this year unless heavy rains swell the Rio Grande.

Velde Thinks New Hearing In Seattle To Be Important

SEATTLE (U)—Chairman Velde (R-Ill.) said he expects a four-day hearing starting here today to be "one of the most important and revealing" ever held by the House Un-American Activities Committee.

He attached particular significance to the hearing because it will be the first congressional investigation of Communist activities in the Pacific Northwest—a key industrial, maritime and agricultural area.

For the first time, a Communist convicted of conspiracy under the Smith Act will have appeared as a "friendly" witness.

First of an expected 40 or more witnesses will be slight, respected Mrs. Barbara Hartle, who renounced communism after she and four other Northwest Communist leaders were convicted last October.

Turkey, Pakistan To Launch Talks On Military Pact

ANKARA, Turkey (U)—Turkey and Pakistan plan to launch military talks immediately to put more teeth in their alliance.

A communique issued yesterday at the conclusion of talks here between Pakistan Premier Mohammed Ali and Turkish Premier Adnan Menderes said the two nations would make their pact more effective by "searching the possibilities and determining the extent of defense cooperation in case of a nonprovoked attack coming from abroad and directed against one or the other country."

The communique said experts of the two nations' general staffs would begin talks immediately to establish defense plans, exchanges of information, and plans for filling the two countries' arms and ammunition needs.

France Losing Hold On Colony In India

MADRAS, India (U)—France, fighting to hold her place in India, was reported today losing her grip on one of her tiny footholds in India.

Press reports from the small French colony of Yanaon, on India's west coast, said about 200 pro-Indian demonstrators in the town of 5,800 persons had seized all public offices, hoisted the Indian flag and proclaimed French control at an end.

The report said a six-man administration council was nominated and four ministers named. Indian Prime Minister Nehru has been demanding determinedly that France withdraw from Yanaon and her three small colonies on the Indian coast, Pondichery, Karikal and Mahe. Indian-French talks on the subject broke up earlier this month without agreement.

Ex-State Orphans Home Students To Fight Any Change

CORSICANA (U)—Ex-students of the State Orphans Home here have named a 5-man committee to carry out their opposition to proposed abolition of the home.

The committee, which will appear before the Texas State Hospitals and Special Schools Board, also will make known the exes' position against proposed transfer of the school to the State Welfare Department and a proposal to put the children into foster homes.

All three proposals were made several weeks ago by the Texas Research League.

At their annual homecoming yesterday, the exes adopted a resolution introduced by Texas Supreme

Crowds In Jordan Stage Demonstration

AMMAN, Jordan (U)—Street crowds demonstrated in Amman yesterday against the United States, Britain and the Jordan government.

The demonstrations broke out shortly after the arrival of Saudi Arabia's King Saud, who came here by plane for military talks with King Hussein and other Jordan leaders.

The 20 mm antiaircraft shells were to have been sent to Guatemala in a German ship, but the West German government intervened at the request of the U.S. High Commission and the shipment was detained in Hamburg, an American official said.

Swiss Shells On Way To Guatemala Found

BONN, Germany (U)—Six tons of Swiss antiaircraft ammunition being shipped to Guatemala has been held up in Hamburg, the U.S. High Commission announced here today.

Nationwide Civil Defense Test Scheduled In 54 Cities Today

WASHINGTON (U) — "Enemy" planes shoot across the high skies of the United States today, dropping make-believe deadly bombs on 54 American and Canadian cities in this country's first nationwide civil defense exercise.

Every target city will be "substantially destroyed" and millions of citizens will be "killed" and "wounded" by a hypothetical onslaught under assumptions drawn

up by the Federal Civil Defense Administration (FCDA).

Whether your town holds a drill in the simulated, but serious, trial has been left up to state and local civil defense organizations. Washington, New York and Philadelphia are among the larger cities in which the public will take part.

At Mobile, Ala., a test evacuation is scheduled during which some 25,000 persons are expected to walk and ride out of an area of 450 blocks in the main business district.

Officially the nationwide exercise—called "Operation Alert"—starts at 10 a.m., EST, and runs for 24 hours.

Federal civil defense officials said, however, that where there

is public participation the time for the air raid drill has been left entirely up to local authorities and likely will come before lunchtime.

In Washington the drill officially was called for an hour before the nationwide exercise. All street traffic must stop and occupants of buildings will go to shelter areas. Only the Capitol and the Senate and House office buildings will not take part.

In New York, three A-bombs will supposedly shatter Manhattan, Brooklyn and the Bronx, killing 2,175,000 people and injuring another 800,000.

The exercise is based on the hypothesis that 41 target cities in the United States, 8 in Canada, 2 in Alaska and 1 each in Hawaii, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands are attacked by atomic and other weapons.

Its aim is to boost the effectiveness of all civil defense organizations, test communications facilities and provide realistic training for civil defense workers.

Weekend State Death Toll 24

Violent death came to 24 Texans during the weekend. As usual, traffic accounted for the most deaths, 13. Five persons died by gunfire, four drowned, one was stabbed to death and a plane crash took one life.

Some of the latest reported deaths:

William Richard Law, 41, San Antonio cement finisher, was found shot to death at his home Sunday. A pistol and a note to his wife were near the body.

Victor Calvillo, 25, of Charlotte in Atascosa County, died Sunday in a San Antonio hospital after being stabbed in a fight at his home Saturday night.

Purdie Sonny Hardin, 39, Dallas, was slashed in a tavern brawl Sunday and then shot down as he ran from the tavern.

Nicholas Casares, 40, of Clarkwood in Nueces County, was shot and killed early Sunday by a special deputy during a fight outside a Clarkwood dance hall.

Emory Jacks, 13, of Evadale in the Beaumont area was killed Saturday night when a car hit the corner of a bridge and bounced head-on into a car carrying young Evadale people.

Newton Baird, 42, was shot to death Saturday night in the Houston suburb of Alameda when he and five brothers met to divide receipts from a trucking business.

Billy Dean Roche, 5, drowned in a Dallas swimming pool Saturday night.

Raymond Davis, 16, of Smithland drowned Saturday night when a boat he was operating to take people to a dance barge overturned on Caddo Lake near Marshall. Three couples in the boat escaped death—two by clinging to the boat and one couple by swimming to shore.

Court Battle In Hayward Divorce Due

BURBANK, Calif. (U)—Actress Susan Hayward and actor Jess Barker go to court today for the final round in their hotly contested divorce battle.

Big issues in the divorce trial, expected to last from two days to a week, are the division of property and custody of their twin boys, Gregory and Timothy, 9.

Slappings, a spanking and a near nude dunking of the red-haired Miss Hayward have been related in previous court appearances.

The shapely actress, who charges mental cruelty, returned from a movie location at St. George, Utah, yesterday. Married on July 23, 1944, the couple separated once before, in 1947, but later resumed their married life. They separated again last year.

Miss Hayward, 33, who testified earlier that her income is \$17,000 a month with \$240,000 in assets, told the court Feb. 25 that Barker, 39, refused to work. She said he once termed her "a good meal ticket."

She wants the court to rule her two-million-dollar movie contract and other assets belong to her and are not community property. Her attorney, Martin Gang, has introduced a document he said both signed before their marriage and which stipulates that Barker shall not share in her earnings.

Retail Grocers Told Government Is Too Large For Britches

WASHINGTON (U)—The president of the National Assn. of Retail Grocers today pictured the federal government as "a big brother whom you love and respect but who sometimes gets too big for his breeches."

Vincent L. Browner of Des Moines, Iowa, said that, for example, the government runs 162 ice cream plants.

In reporting to the group's 55th convention, Browner said he views "big government" as a greater threat than the hydrogen bomb. But he added:

"... Now is not the time to go all out in our efforts to cut government down to its proper size." He said consideration of "measures, including premature tax cuts, that will interfere with the efficiency and effectiveness of our common defense" should be deferred.

"But we must seek prudence," he said, "for other reasonable economies and opportunities to start cutting off some of these grasping, socialistic tentacles of federal government."

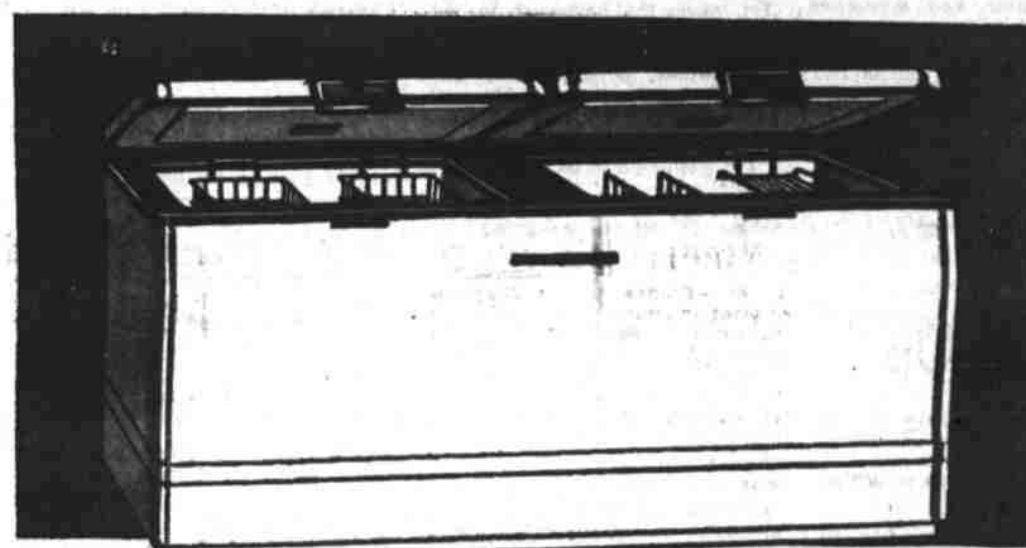

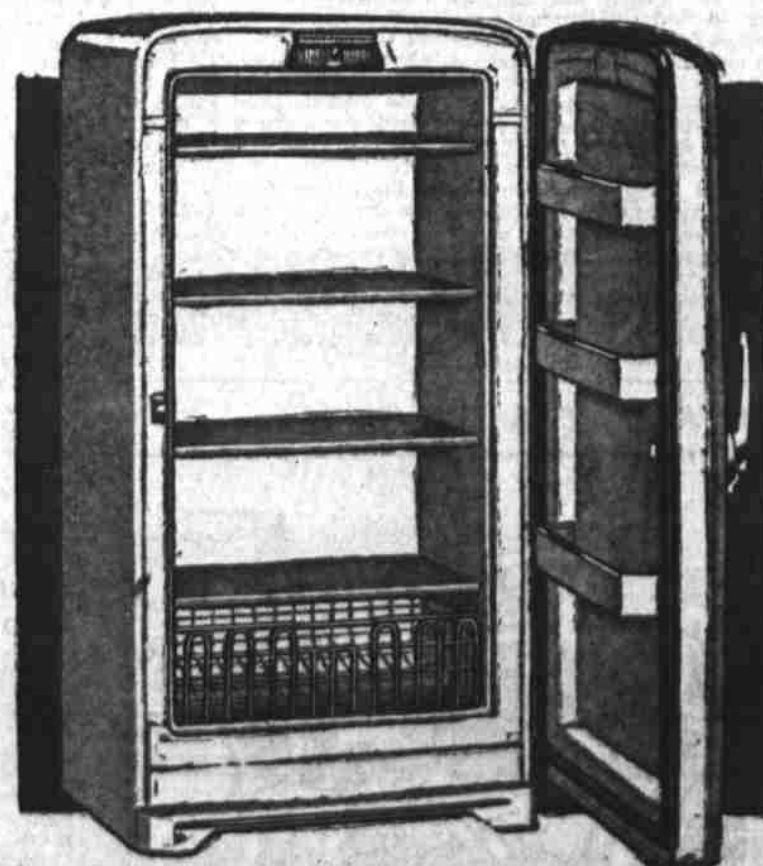

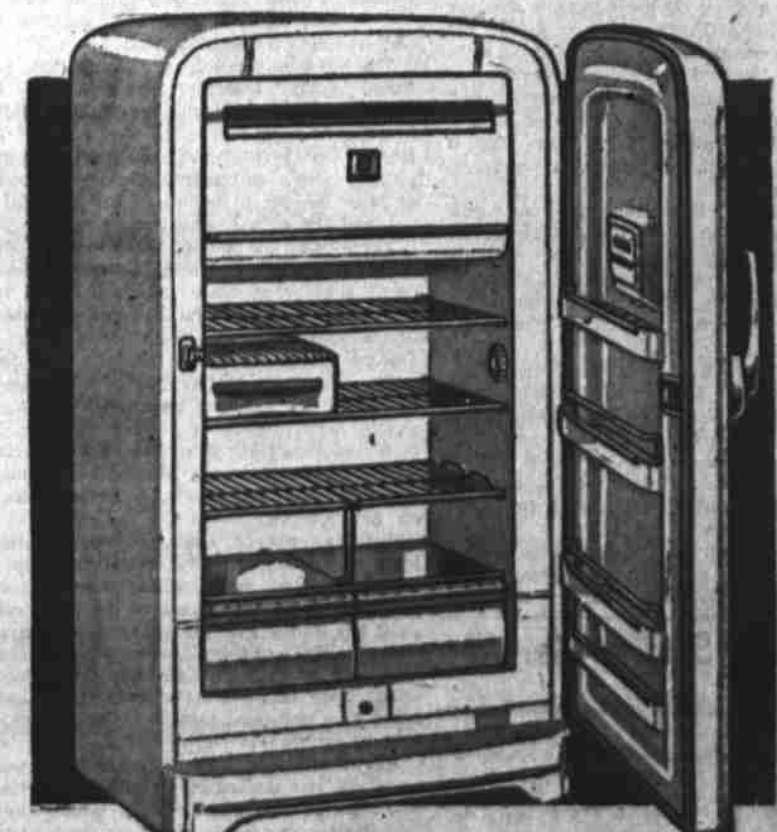

Maybe It's Gilding The Lily, But Knighthood Accentuates Gratitude

Shortly after defeat of his Conservative Party in 1945 Winston Churchill begged leave of his King, George VI, to receive a proffered knighthood in the most distinguished company in the British Empire, the Most Noble Order of the Garter.

No explanation for this rejection was ever publicly made by Churchill himself, but at the time a most Churchillian remark was attributed to him: "How can I accept the Order of the Garter from my sovereign when his people have just given me the Order of the Boot?"

The other day in St. George's Chapel at

Windsor the Old Man received the full investiture of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, with the Queen presiding. There was the Garter itself—a gold-edged band of blue velvet bearing the Order's motto which translates from the Latin as "Evil to Him Who Thinks Evil." The remark was attributed to King Edward III 600 years ago, as he retrieved a garter that had fallen to the ballroom floor while courtiers snickered, and returned it gallantly to its owner as a rebuke to the ill-mannered.

All this fuss-and-feathers may seem like gilding the lily to most people, since it cannot increase Sir Winston's stature in history by so much as one iota, but it belongs among the amiable and rewarding customs of a highly civilized people. Certainly if any British subject ever deserved the tribute on sheer merit, Winston Churchill is that man.

Fold-de-rol and foolishness? Fish-tush. Aren't we Americans more given to the wearing of badges and emblems than any people on earth?

Natural Fibers Can Survive But They Must Make A Fight For It

One of the nation's fastest-growing enterprises, the plastics industry, expects to make a billion dollars' worth of products this year, supplying makers of "everything from baby pants to automobiles," to quote an AP dispatch.

And there seems to be no limit to the infant industry's ability to get around and make itself useful. Plastics have already spanned half a dozen major industries undreamed of a dozen years ago, and the surface has hardly been scratched.

What effect will plastics and synthetics have eventually on American agriculture in particular? What happens to cotton, wool and mohair? Will they be able to maintain their present place of importance in our economy?

Yes, but they will have to fight. They will have to accept the challenge and give the enemy as good as he sends.

There are no substitutes for many of the things these fibers can do, but it will be necessary to carry on diligent research to discover and promote more uses to

which they can be put in this highly competitive age. Texas alone could afford to spend many millions of dollars to build and maintain a research laboratory on behalf of its fiber crops—finding new uses for them, improving their quality, discovering short-cuts and improved methods of production, ferreting out ways and means to insure economical procedures.

How much money is Texas spending on such researches now? Not much, in any case. Is it going to sit on its hands and let the challenge of the new synthetic drive its cotton, wool and mohair out of the world's market?

It is a cliché we can't stop progress. We can't stop plastics and synthetics with hard looks and harsh words. But we can fight them in the wide-open field of competition. We can make our natural fibers a continuing factor in industry and in some fields indispensable.

We hope the next session of our Legislature wakes up to the realities of existence, and lays out a fighting program.

Washington Calling—Marquis Childs

Our Foreign Service Stands Up Well Under Treatment It Gets

WASHINGTON — The foreign policy of the United States depends in the last analysis on the integrity and the ability of several thousand Americans scattered around the world who carry on the day-to-day business of diplomacy. On their reports of what is happening the top policy-makers must base their decisions. Their negotiations from week to week and month to month with cabinet ministers and lesser lights have a great deal to do with America's relationships with other nations.

The suddenness with which the Indochina crisis exploded in sensational headlines is one more piece of evidence that all is not well. Presumably if diplomatic reporting had given a realistic picture of the political deterioration in France and the military deterioration in Indochina beginning a year or more ago, Secretary of State John Foster Dulles would not have been compelled to undertake an eleven-hour "united action" rescue operation. Far too often events have seemed to steal up on those charged with formulating policy, confronting them with a desperate situation in which time has already run out.

There are at least two good and sufficient explanations why the American foreign service has suffered serious impairment in recent years. One is McCarthyism and the growing tendency to blame the diplomatic reporter for the bad news he reports.

A second explanation is the demoralization growing out of political interference of another kind. The prize diplomatic posts become political rewards, and career officers who have spent their lives fitting themselves for such posts see them go to fat cats who have contributed to party campaign coffers.

A third reason is the economy of the past two years which has curtailed perquisites and privileges, thereby seeming

to break commitments on which career officers had planned their lives.

To one who has talked with American diplomats in a half-dozen countries the wonder is not that the demoralization has gone so far. It is that so many able and conscientious men and women are still trying to do as good a job as possible.

The fat-cat ambassador has long been an American phenomenon. Up until the introduction of a civil-service system in the foreign service virtually all diplomatic posts from vice consul on up went as political prizes.

Even if the American allowances were sufficient to enable the career officer without a private income to serve in the top posts, there would be justification now and then for sending a non-career ambassador. Reasons of prestige or special knowledge would dictate an exception to the career civil-service rule.

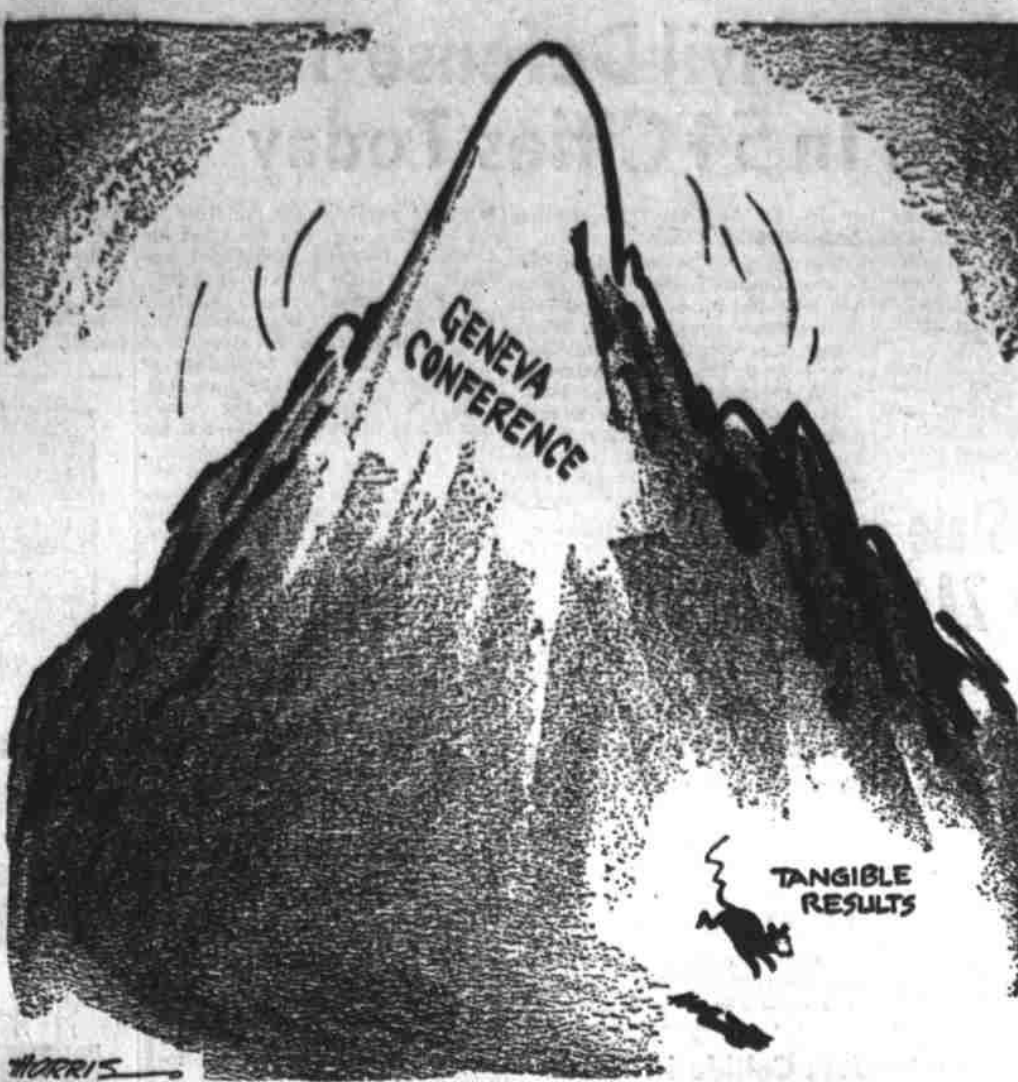
There is unhappily no sign of any reform. In fact, the blight seems likely to spread. To government servants in ticklish jobs the meaning of the case of J. Robert Oppenheimer can only be that the penalty for a judgment held in the light of later events to be mistaken is dismissal and, in effect, disgrace.

Therefore, the tendency is toward the lowest common denominator of caution—don't stick your neck out and report information that may be unwelcome. Some of the ablest foreign service officers, with energy and imagination, were among the first victims of McCarthyism. The result of this blight may not be apparent tomorrow or next month or even next year. It is bound to show up as the raw material on which increasingly difficult decisions must be based is seen to be either faulty or non-existent.

But this reporter, having observed American diplomacy at first-hand in a half-dozen countries must repeat that the surprising fact is that it has held up as well as it has under the bludgeonings of demagoguery and politics. Under both the Truman and Eisenhower Administrations many able citizens have been recruited, often at a personal sacrifice, for jobs that had to be done.

Again and again the traveler finds private citizens dedicated to building better relations in the countries in which they live for reasons of business or profession. An outstanding example is Mrs. Margaret Biddle in Paris who devotes an extraordinary amount of time, energy and money to trying to bring a clearer understanding of the attitudes behind the problems France and America are trying to work out together.

But the fact remains that so long as our public servants are made to feel that they are culprits or stoical cookie pushers, just so long will we weaken what should be the principal buttress of American responsibility in a world in revolutionary upheaval. It has the look of a piece of willful self-destruction that defies the reason so urgent and so immediate to use every resource that can contribute to stability and security.

Republican Vote To Keep Pvt. Schine From Testifying Extraordinary Action

WASHINGTON — Nothing is more extraordinary, in the extraordinary hearings on the Army-McCarthy fight, than the sudden hood of silence pulled down over Pvt. G. David Schine.

The Republicans won't call him to testify or be cross-examined. Yet, unless that happened, the public could not possibly learn the whole story of the fight. It can't be learned now, unless Schine formally asks to testify or the Republicans on the hearing subcommittee change their minds.

The Republicans on the subcommittee outnumber the Democrats 4-3. They voted solidly, 4-3, to keep Schine off the witness stand.

Their reason? They said they wanted to limit the number of witnesses in order to speed up the hearings and get them over, perhaps this week. The Democrats protested but were outnumbered.

Schine, 27-year-old president of his father's hotel chain, was at the very center of the cyclone which has twisted the Republicans in knots for months.

Army officials charged that Sen. McCarthy and his aides sought to pressure the Army into giving special treatment to Schine before and after he was drafted last Nov. 3.

The McCarthy aide counter-charges the Army tried to use Schine as a hostage to blackmail Sen. McCarthy's investigating committee into abandoning its search for Communists in the Army.

The McCarthy side has described Schine as a specialist on communism, with such zeal in fighting it that he gave his services to the McCarthy staff without pay.

Now the public will get no chance to find out through questioning of Schine himself just how much he knows about communism or how he developed his interest and his desire to combat it.

He was brought into the subcommittee staff by his friend, Roy M. Cohn, chief counsel of the staff and one of the principals in this case. Last spring Cohn and Schine visited Europe together to investigate the government's overseas information program.

And it was Cohn who repeatedly asked for passes for Schine to help, he said, the McCarthy staff clean up some unfinished business her off.

on which Schine was specially informed. Both Cohn and McCarthy praised Schine.

What are the facts about him? Neither the seven senators on the subcommittee which must judge this case nor the public watching it on television can form their own opinions—based on first-hand, detailed information brought out in direct questioning of Schine—on such obvious questions as these:

What preparation did Schine have for this job with McCarthy's subcommittee which gave him the right to dig into the operations of

the government and its employees? Were his knowledge and his ideas sound? Or was he just a sophisticated busybody who thought he had some answers?

That he thought he had some answers was made clear enough by the fact that he offered the State Department—before joining McCarthy's staff last year—a long-range plan for psychological war on communism.

The State Department rejected it. And McCarthy himself said he had never seen the Schine plan until it was introduced in evidence at the hearings last Friday.

Kidnaping Of Women Nothing New In Russia

MOSCOW — See a gal that strikes your fancy?

Well, don't go wastin' time a-courtin' and asking her consent. Just gallop out and carry her off.

If you need help, because she isn't alone, just whistle up a pack of your buddies.

That's the way the hillbillies of the Soviet Union (down there in the Caucasus Mountains) have been doin' it for generations.

But the Communist press in Moscow says it's got to stop — the gal should be courted right and given a chance to say yes or no.

Now take the case of Tamara, reports Komsomol Pravda, which often criticizes what it calls primitive practices and conditions in the United States. Tamara was a teacher in the mountain village of Malka, in the Kabardinski autonomous republic. And a fine lookin' school marm she was, too.

So fine looking, in fact, one of three "brave and bold" brothers of the village fancied her for a wife. So he called a family council at which it was decided his was a wise choice.

When Tamara took a walk long a mountain path with her sister, the brothers — with two pals — rode out in a coach and carried her off.

All this information came to sister, who was left on the trail. Indignantly she wrote the paper, which prodded the local prosecutor's office until he sent a representative to find what was up.

According to this investigator, says Komsomol Pravda, Tamara's reply to his inquiries was: "Well, after I was kidnaped I agreed to marry him." The prosecutor decided to take her at her word.

But here's what really happened, the paper quotes the un-kidnaped sister: "Tamara was kidnaped because she became afraid for the future and agreed to marry him."

The paper cites the case of two other recently kidnaped brides, and says "the girls in the mountain areas live in constant fear of being kidnaped. And once they are thus forced to marry the man their life is ruined."

Of the brothers who kidnaped Tamara, it says they committed "a heinous deed typical of the feudal mode of life of pre-revolutionary Kabardinski."

"Why is the work of the public prosecutor's office not so organized as to defend the honor of Kabardinski and its women? Why does it not punish those who violate the law — who kidnap people? And who does it not protect those who need protection?"

But the most unkind blow of all is delivered by that sister left on the path. She writes: "If my sister Tamara agreed to marry this man, I will say to everybody that she is unworthy of the principles a Komsomol member. She victimizes herself for the sake of her feudal survival."

Poor Tamara.

Injured Texas Farmer Is In Good Condition

BRISTOL, Tenn.-Va. — Axel Holm, a Tex farmer who was shot and wounded by a hitchhiker Friday, was reported resting in good condition at a Bristol hospital. Holm, 62, and his wife, 65, were abducted at a roadside park by a gunman who forced them to drive toward Bristol.

As the car approached the city, the two men scuffled. During the fight, the woman was killed and Holm wounded in the face. The gunman fled.

Charles Stubbs of Rochester, N. Y., was arrested a few hours later at a roadblock and charged with murder, kidnaping and attempted murder, a Texas farmer who was murdered.

Europeans Are Eating Better; At Least They're Eating More

Are our friends, the Turks, a nation of champions?

Judging from the amount of cereal the average Turk consumes a year, and blending that with the propaganda some of the cereal manufacturers turn out, you'd think so.

The average Turk, according to recently released figures, eats 156 pounds a year, which is considerably more than I do, even with the inducements double-box top days offer.

The eating preferences of many of the peoples of Europe might surprise you.

Irishmen eat the most potatoes among Europeans—224 pounds yearly of the spuds which were named after them but which grow more prolifically in Idaho and Maine than they do on the Emerald Isle.

The sons and daughters of Old Erin also hold another distinction when it comes to food consumption—they feast on more sugar than any other race "over there." The average consumption of sugar among the Irish is 106 pounds each year.

The Irish can also lay claim to eating the most butter—35 pounds per person annually. In this country, the people ap-

parently have been sold on the idea that butter is better but also is cheaper.

You might think Americans are the biggest meat eaters of them all, and you might be right. The Argentines would probably be the only people running them a close race. In Europe, the biggest meat eaters live in one of the smallest countries, however—the Danes. They consume 178 pounds per person a year.

Norwegians are the greatest milk drinkers—among Europeans—55 gallons a year each, on the average. They also eat the most cheese—39 pounds—which is a lot of cheddar.

Frenchmen eat the most vegetables—229 pounds per head every year while the Swiss—who have always had plenty of everything—consume the most fruit. Their consumption is 202 pounds yearly for each.

Eating was practically a lost art with many Europeans during World War II. One of the reasons American magazines sold so well during those years was the gorgeous food ads they ran. The hungry Europeans were at least allowed to dream. Eating is again in fashion "over there," apparently. May it always be thus.

Because Life Is Cheap In China, The Threat Of War Is Greater

General Omar Bradley made a point about the present nature of war which seems to have been missed in most discussions. He said:

"... I feel that the war-by-satellite technique which Communism has adopted is the most irritating, frustrating method they could choose. It causes the free nations of the world to expend lives and resources without getting to the real cause of trouble or the fundamental source of Communist power."

What war by satellite means is that while the Soviet Universal State is capable of having a limited war burst forth at any place or any time, it is never necessary to employ Russian troops. The Russian people live in an atmosphere of peace with no disruptions in their private lives while the Russian government directs wars that have for their major purpose the involvement of American armed forces and the disruption of the American society. In the Korean War, for instance, the United States suffered 142,118 casualties, whereas Soviet Russia suffered none so far as we know. The disadvantage to the United States of this technique is obvious.

China has, for at least a century, suffered grievously from surplus population. By surplus population is meant an excess of human beings over the capacity of agriculture and industry to give them employment. This condition led to banditry, the peoples of the hill and desert areas seeking to move into the high standard of living valleys and the delta lands of the great rivers. Banditry produced civil wars either because such bandit chiefs as Chiang Tso-lin sought respectability by conquering areas which they organized into satrapies or because generals and governors found it expeditious to own private armies to enlarge their territories and powers. The Tsinans, as these local monarchs were called at one period, found that the possession of such privately-owned armies was not too costly and could be financed out of taxes or by control of such commodities as opium which passed in ordinary commerce.

Despite a comparatively large increase in industrial commerce, Red China still has a surplus population and is able to maintain large armies which are no longer privately owned. Were these enormous

armies to remain permanently in one area, doing virtually nothing, the ownership could again become local and private, and civil war would be bound to ensue.

It is therefore political and administrative wisdom to keep these armies on the move. This encourages war. Perhaps it is difficult for Americans to understand that a government would deliberately make war to keep its armies moving but in China, human life is cheap because it is excessive and the habit of forming private armies is usual and therefore needs to be attacked by government all the time. Perhaps Chiang Kai-shek's greatest weakness has been an inability to destroy the private army. It could be Mao Tse-tung's greatest difficulty too, but he intervened in the Korean War and he is now intervening in the Indochina War and, if unconfirmed reports are true, he is sending labor corps to work in the Karakum desert operations. In a word, he is reducing the surplus population problem of his country by exporting men in the interest of the Soviet Universal State.

This can go on indefinitely because China can well afford to lose as many as 100,000,000 men or more without feeling any economic effects or any shortage of manpower. When I lived in China, it was vaguely estimated that China lost between 1,000,000 and 2,000,000 men a year through civil wars and banditry. As nobody had any figures, no records being kept, one guess is as good as another, but what is significant are the dimensions of the guess. When the United States lost 31,040 dead in the Korean War, it shocked the country; in China it was possible to accept these enormous guesses without a tremor. Life is cheap in Asia.

Red China, as a part of the Soviet Universal State, offers to its fellow-satellites its enormous expendable manpower to be employed in war against the United States. Soviet Russia, Czechoslovakia, Poland and East Germany can provide arms and equipment. The Communist government of North Korea reports gifts of entire factories from these countries.

These are factors that must enter into any calculation of the nature of our prospective wars. Without an understanding of these circumstances, it is impossible for us to move correctly.

All-Time Peak Seen In Building This Year

WASHINGTON, (U-A) — A government report, based upon a new look at the thriving construction industry, predicted today that spending for new construction would set an all-time record of \$6 1/2 billion dollars, the peak year so far.

The new prediction, after five months of record-setting construction activity in this year, reversed the earlier forecast made by the Commerce and Labor departments. Last November the two government units estimated construction this year would fall about 2 per cent under the 1953 record level. The dollar total predicted last November for 1954 was 34 billion dollars, 2 billion under the new forecast.

The more optimistic outlook, the report said, was based mainly on the high level of new home building so far this year. However, most other major categories of construction, with the exception of federally financed building, also showed predicted gains over 1953.

The construction forecast was particularly significant in that it pointed to no slackening of employment in this major field of jobs during the balance of this year. Today's report included these details:

1. Current indications are that 1,080,000 new, private nonfarm dwelling units will be started this year. It was estimated that new, nonfarm residential building, along with spending for additions and alterations, would account this year for \$12,125,000,000 or 2 per cent more than the record in 1953.
2. Outlays for new commercial construction of all types are expected to exceed two billion dollars for the first time.
3. Religious building and private educational building will also set new records at about 525 million dollars each.
4. Spending for private industrial construction such as factories, which is on a long-term downturn, was expected to drop 13 per cent to \$1,850,000,000 from the 1953 rate of \$2,229,000,000.
5. Outlays for new public construction were expected to rise by 4 per cent to a total of \$11,850,000,000.

Sen. McCarthy Expects Split Report In Probe

SIOUX FALLS, S. D. (U-Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis) says he doesn't see how only a single report can come from the subcommittee conducting the hearing into his hassle with the Army.

"Every vote on every important question that has arisen so far has been along party lines and I expect that formula will hold when the final report is made," he told a newsman after his talk here to some 1,700 veterans yesterday.

His comment came after he was shown newspaper stories quoting Sen. Mundt (R-SD), subcommittee chairman, that he hoped findings could be embraced in one report. McCarthy told the annual convention of the South Dakota American Legion to ask every candidate running this fall, either Republican or Democrat, "if he's going to Washington and work to stop the indecent blood trade between American allies and the enemy."

"The head of the foreign aid division came home recently and said we have won a great victory," McCarthy said. "We were told that we are going to continue to give U. S. dollars to allies, and in return allow these allies to ship industrial goods to the enemy."

"In other words, they are going to take your dollars and ship the sinews of strength to the enemy, dollars that are directly fashioning bullets which may well cause death for some of the young men in this audience."

Although he did not mention him by name, it was an obvious reference to Harold E. Stassen, director of the Foreign Operations Administration, the subject of other recent criticism by McCarthy.

McCarthy's off-the-cuff speech here came after he told the Wisconsin Republican convention in Milwaukee Saturday that President Eisenhower would have his support if the general were running for office today.

Siamese Twins Die, Third Baby Living

ST. BONIFACE, Minn. (U) — Siamese twin boys, born to the wife of a local railwayman Thursday as part of a triple birth, died yesterday. The infants had a common pelvis and shared a number of vital organs.

The third baby, also a boy, was normal and healthy at birth and was reported in "very good condition." The babies were several weeks premature.

They were born to Mrs. Yvonne Mousseau, 29.

Danny Kaye Arrives In India With Cold

NEW DELHI, India (U) — Movie comedian Danny Kaye arrived in New Delhi today with a bad cold and complaining that the plane flight from Bombay had affected his ears.

The Hollywood star said, however, his ailments would not affect his plans to make a film of Indian wars here for the U.N. Children's Emergency Fund.

Duck Quacks Save Little Rock Baby

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (U)—Ducks' quacks saved the life of a 19-month-old Little Rock baby.

Tiny red-haired Beth Cook, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wheaton Cook, fell into a private lake Saturday and was discovered moments later by her mother.

The mother's attention was called to the spot when several ducks sounded a "quacking" alarm.

Artificial respiration and the use of a resuscitator by the Little Rock fire department revived the girl.

Adm. Carney Gives Support To Line Barring Red Gains

WASHINGTON (U)—Adm. Robert J. Carney voiced support today for the idea that a line should be drawn beyond which the free world should not allow further Communist aggression.

Noting that there is a limit to the world's total human and material resources, the chief of naval operations said every gain scored by the Soviet orbit "is not only an addition to their potential, but it's a double addition, because something comes out of our

hide . . . every time that that happens."

Carney was asked in a copyrighted interview in the magazine U.S. News and World Report: "Must a line be drawn beyond which we won't permit the other side to make gains?"

"That's a tough question," he replied, "but the alternatives, as I see it, if this continues, are the possibility of a measure of defeat or taking a stand to prevent that

defeat with timely action.

"Now, that's not warmongering or a bellicose statement or anything like that. It's a simple statement of fact in support of what I said that if these accretions of power continue, each one at our expense, the time will come when we are in a position so inferior that our very existence, and certainly our existence as a major influence in the world, will be in the gravest jeopardy."

Discussing any possible Navy role in Southeast Asia, the Navy chief said sea blockade could be an "important part" in a military action there. In referring to Indonesia in particular, however, he conceded blockade might not be

"a major part" of an over-all effort there. "We would just be closing up ratholes," he said.

Carney also said:

1. Russia's initial post-World War II emphasis on building submarines has given way to a trend toward "a balanced seagoing naval force" rounded out with cruisers and destroyers, but not aircraft carriers. The Reds have no atom-driven submarine "that I know of."
2. There is no question about the practicality of using atomic power to drive many kinds of Navy vessels.

Phillips Completes Producer North Of Good Pool In Borden

Phillips No. 1-B Clayton was completed in Southwest Borden County today as a Canyon Reef discovery. Located about four miles north of the Good field, the project made potential flow of 83 barrels of oil.

Another completion was logged in the Oceanic field, and two wildcats were spotted in Howard. Finished was Seaboard No. 1 Simpson, north extension to the Oceanic pool which made a 207.23 barrel potential.

Texas Pacific Coal and Oil No. 1 M. C. Hyden is a prospect about a mile north of the Luther Southeast field. The other wildcat is Lone Star No. 2 Mittle Waters, north of the Moore pool.

Phillips No. 1-B Clayton, C NW SE, 17-34, T&P survey, has been finished in the Canyon Reef for a 90 barrel discovery well. Potential was taken from plugged back to total depth of 8,250 feet and recovery was 2 per cent basic sediment and water. Gas-oil ratio was 832-1, and gravity of oil measures 44.2 degrees. This wildcat is located about 12 miles southwest of Gall. It is about four miles north of production in the Good field.

Phillips No. 1 Quartz, C NW SE, 15-32-40, T&P survey, had recovery of 20 feet of slightly gas-cut mud on a drillstem test from 5,354 to 5,394 feet. The tool was open an hour, and there was a very slight blow of air. Flow pressure was 50 pounds, and the 15-minute shut-in pressure was 740 pounds. Total depth is 5,394 feet, in the San Andres lime.

Oceanic No. 1 McDams, C NE NW, 25-32-30, T&P survey, hit 5,410 feet.

Seaboard No. 1 Simpson, 3,105 from south and 487 from east lines. 24-33-30, T&P survey, was completed for a calculated 24-hour potential of 207.23 barrels of oil.

HAMBONE PEA SOUP

Ingredients: ½ cup quick-cooking green split peas, 1 hambone, 2 small carrots (sliced), 1 stalk celery including leafy top (sliced), 1 medium-size onion (cut in thin strips), few sprigs parsley, 5 cups water, salt and pepper.

Method: Put peas in strainer and wash in cold water; drain; turn into soup kettle. Place hambone on top. Add carrots (there should be about ½ cup), celery, onion (there should be ½ to 1 cup), parsley and water. Bring to a boil quickly; reduce heat and simmer, stirring occasionally, until peas are cooked—about 45 minutes. Remove hambone. Put soup and vegetables through strainer or food mill—if strainer is used, press through vegetables. Reheat adding salt and pepper to taste. Makes 5 cups for 4 servings. This goes well with the following menu.

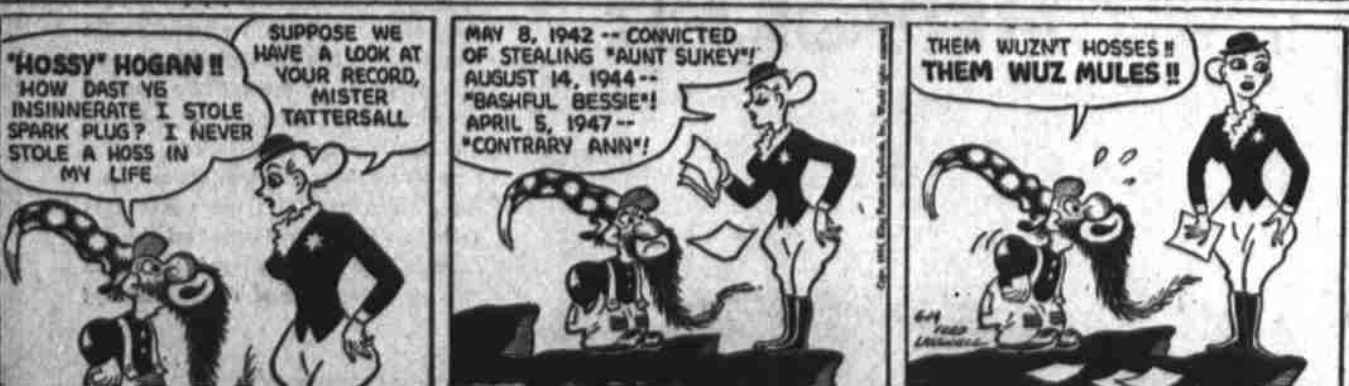

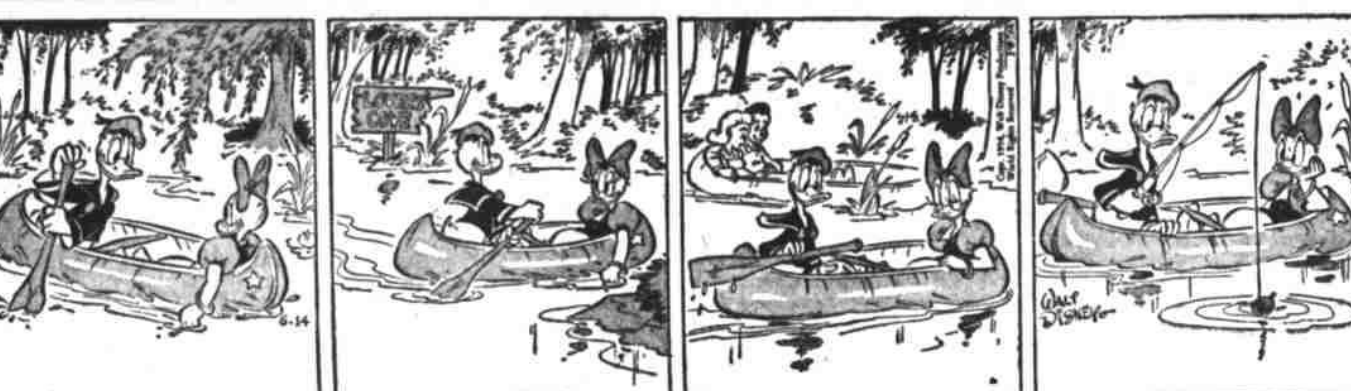

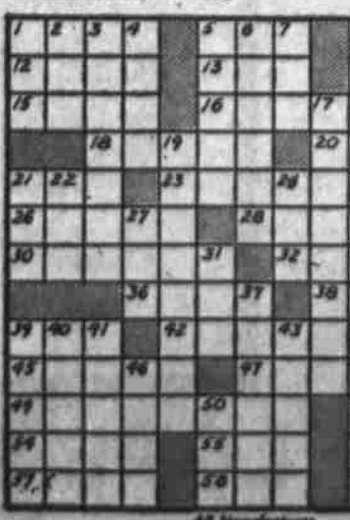

Nichols Against Dr. Oppenheimer

NEW YORK (U)—The New York Times said today that Maj. Gen. Kenneth D. Nichols, general manager of the Atomic Energy Commission, has drafted his recommendation in the Oppenheimer security case.

"It supports the Gray board's finding that Dr. J. Robert Oppenheimer is 'loyal' but should not be retained as a consultant to the commission," a Washington dispatch to the Times by James Reston said.

"Thus, the famous atomic scientist has lost another round — the next to the last — in his long fight to be restored as a reliable servant of his government."

The story also said:

Nichols' recommendation has not been delivered in final form to the members of the AEC, but this will be done later this week when the five-man commission will begin the final step in the proceedings. Nichols has discussed his recommendation with commission members.

It is understood that Nichols' letter to the AEC is more critical of Oppenheimer than the majority finding of the Gray board — a three-member special Atomic Energy Commission security board.

The board — headed by Gordon Gray, former secretary of the Army and now president of the University of North Carolina — recently found unanimously that Oppenheimer is a loyal citizen and it praised his discretion. The board voted 2-1, however, that under the administration's regulations Oppenheimer must be classified as a security risk.

Trade Union Group Opposes Bracero Use

WASHINGTON (U)—Border recruiting of Mexican nationals for work in the United States was opposed in a statement yesterday by U.S. members of the U.S.-Mexican Trade Union Committee.

The committee, composed of labor union representatives from both nations, held a meeting last month in Nuevo Laredo, Mexico, on the subject.

The U.S. members urged Atty. Gen. Brownell to use his influence to have public hearings held on the need for importing Mexican nationals and what they should be paid.

MILAN, Italy (U)—Luigi Montemante, noted Italian baritone died here yesterday. He was 68.

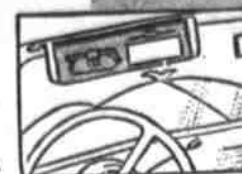

Texas Republican Executive Committee Has Meet Today

DALLAS (U)—The Texas Republican Executive Committee met here today with the national committee predicting a large GOP vote in the July Republican primaries in Harris and Dallas counties.

The committeeman, Jack Porter of Houston, yesterday said he believed Bruce Alger, the GOP candidate for Congress from Dallas county, can be elected.

A major job of the committee will be naming of a state GOP chairman to succeed Alvin H. Lane of Dallas, who has resigned.

John Q. Adams of Harlingen was a leading candidate.

The Republicans will be required this year—for the first time since 1936—to hold primaries. Previously, candidates have been named in convention. Porter said the party plans to hold primaries in about 150 of the more populous counties.

State GOP candidates who have filed for office are Todd R. Adams of Crockett for Governor, Carlos G. Watson of Brownsville for U.S. senator, Thomas Nolan of San Antonio for congressman at large and Harry W. Linderman of Houston for commissioner of agriculture. All are unopposed on the Republican ballot.

The committee today was to select a site for the Sept. 17 state convention of the party.

Two vacancies on the committee will be filled. E. S. Mayer of Sonora is expected to succeed Hobart K. McDowell, San Angelo, new federal marshal for the northern district of Texas; and Mrs. Joe Kennedy of Fort Worth is in line to succeed Mrs. Jack Brownfield of Fort Worth, resigned.

Ex-French General Returns From Exile

PARIS (U)—Former Gen. Auguste Nogues, who led a five-day French resistance against the Allied landings in North Africa, returned to Paris today from exile. He faces a 20-year sentence imposed by a postwar court.

Nogues went into exile in 1943 in Portugal and remained there until yesterday. Now 78, he presented himself to the court today, heard the order for his arrest, and was taken off to Sante Prison.
