R-O James Estes Gets 2 Year Science Grant At Oregon



James Estes, son of Mr. and Mrs. Dow Estes of Burkburnett, has recently received notification that he is the recipient of a two year National Science Foundation graduate fellowship. Estes, who is currently a research assistant in botany working with Doctor K. L. Chambers on Cytogenetics of Micro Seris, will continue his studies at Oregon State University. He intends to obtain a degree of Doctor of Philosophy in plant systematics and minor in genetics and plant physiology.

Estes was valedictorian of his Burkburnett High School graduating class. He attended Midwestern University and received a degree in biology in 1959. While at MU he served as Student Senator, member of the Student Court, and one year as Student Body President. A member of 2 scholastic honorary societies, Beta Beta Beta and Alpha Chi, Estes also was selected for membership in Who's Who on Campus and in American Universities and Colleges.

Commissioned a 2nd Lieutenant in the U. S. Army, he served as field artillery officer with the U. S. Armed Forces in Europe for 2 years. Upon his return to Texas he taught biology in the Burkburnett School system before moving to Oregon.

Estes and his wife, the former Nancy Arnold, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Arnold of Wichita Falls, currently reside at 853 Jackson Street, Corvallis, Oregon. Mrs. Estes, who was also a Midwestern student is currently an assistant librarian in the Corvallis-Benton County Public Library.

The couple will be visiting the homes of their parents for a period of two weeks commencing the 12th of June.

Witnesses Abilene Training Program Ended Sun, May 9th

Jehovah's Witnesses three-day training program in Abilene was concluded Sunday, when H. A. Fetzik, district supervisor, spoke on the subject, "The Moral Breakdown—What Can Be Done About It?"

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THE CREATORS

The Indianapolis Star, in an eloquent editorial, expresses its agreement with President Johnson's statement that his Great Society would not "flower spontaneously from swelling riches and surging power. It will not be the gift of the government or the creation of Presidents."

Americans who have a knowledge of the world, says the Star, "... know that Presidents and governments did not create the skyscrapers, jets, homes, farms, cars, industries, missiles, space vehicles, nuclear submarines, nuclear weapons, music, drama, sports, literature, schools, universities, medicine and scientific achievements that are measures of our power and abundance.

"Nor did they create our free institutions or our love of liberty."

What, then, has been the wellspring for our greatness and our achievements? The Star's answer is the one that almost anyone with a knowledge of the forces of history would give and it takes only two words — individual initiative. It was this that discovered this country, explored it, developed and protected it from enemies within and without and looked always ahead to greater days and finer times.

Presidents and governments can help, but they cannot create. That is done by individuals — free individuals — in their infinite numbers.

WE CAN LEARN

Poverty, with all its concomitants—substandard housing, inadequate educational and recreational facilities, absence of cultural opportunity, and the rest — is commonly considered a major cause of juvenile delinquency. And there can be no doubt that environment is an important factor. But, perhaps, we tend to exaggerate its weight.

For example, most of the Chinese living in this country — even in such famous Chinatowns as San Francisco's live in poverty. Yet, while seven per cent of America's juveniles will be in trouble with the law, this year, not one of them will be Chinese!

Paul Harvey makes that statement, in a column appearing in "The Suburban & Lawrence Journal of Indianapolis."

Why is it so? He quotes one Chinese leader as saying: "We keep a tight rein on our children until they are really responsible." Another says: "Our children just naturally respect and obey their parents. A boy or girl would not bring shame on his family or his family name."

It looks as if we can learn something from the American Chinese — including those whose lives are spent in grinding poverty.

FACT AND OPINION

FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover says: "A national police force is a tool of tyranny. I abhor the implications of the term, and I refuse to let the FBI be forced into practices which smack of police state actions, regardless of the circumstances. Some individuals, in their effort to secure the fundamental guarantee of the Constitution for all citizens, have criticized this Bureau for not exceeding its authority and for not assuming responsibilities belonging to local and state police. The FBI fully appreciates the grave responsibility inherent in the investigation of alleged violations of Federal civil rights statutes. As I have stated many times, we are meeting these obligations without apology. Our role, however, is that of an investigator—not an accuser, prosecutor, jury or judge."

The Portland, Oregon, Traffic Safety Commission points out that more accidents occur between 4 and 6 in the evening than during any other period of the day. So, it urges, as you drive home during critical hours be alert, always expect the unexpected from other drivers—and give yourself an extra margin of safety by conforming to all traffic regulations.

It is the view of the President of the Association of American Railroads that America cannot achieve the kind of Great Society projected by President Johnson without clearing the way for "great railroads" in a refurbished national transportation system. He states, "With 40 million more people expected by 1975 and production and freight volume growing at 3 to 5 percent each year, the nation will be imposing huge new loads on its whole transport structure, and it will become imperative to get these handled smoothly and at the lowest possible total cost."

The Pharmaceutical Manufacturers Association reports that the industry's research spending on medical products is almost nine times more than it was in 1950, increasing from \$39 million then to \$346 million in 1965.

IT'S A FACT!

You may think we see a lot of "Made in Japan" labels on the products we buy, but only last year, every Japanese spent over twice as much for American exports as each of us spent for theirs. Figuratively speaking, that's a lot of "Made in America" labels, too! The fact is that, with the exception of Canada, Japan is our best customer.

According to the U.S.-Japan Trade Council, Japan buys a host of items from us, like machines, oil, logs, even skins and hides, and together their sales to Japan accounts for almost 200,000 American jobs in all 50 states—on our farms and in our factories and forests. The U.S.-Japan Trade Council expects this figure to rise as Japan continues to buy American in greater quantities.

Of the \$1.7 billion in commodities the U.S. exported to Japan in 1963, cotton is our largest agricultural export item. Today, Japan buys one out of every four bales we export.

John Martino, an American businessman, went to Havana on business for a few days on July 23, 1959. Twenty minutes after he arrived he was arrested and falsely accused of being a pilot engaged in arms running, counter - revolutionary activities. He spent 40 months in Castro's dungeons, while the United States government turned its back on him.

On his fourth day of imprisonment, Martino had his first contact with the American Embassy—by accident. An American official of "our" Embassy, Mr. Gilerist, happened to be at the prison and Martino called him over to his cell. Gilerist claimed that they had not known where Martino was, and that he would try to help Martino although he didn't speak Spanish every well! The next day another official from the American Embassy, Mr. Kessler, came to talk with Martino. He told Martino that they would have to let Cuban law take its course. Martino informed Kessler of his chronic and critical kidney condition. (Martino passed 17 kidney stones during his 40 month imprisonment, without any medical attention. He became virtually a skeleton, weighing 93 pounds.)

From his vermin-infested toiletless cell in Castillo de Atares, Martino was able to see and hear Russians as they went about their feverish fortification of the island even as our leftist press was still telling the American people that Castro was "The George Washington of Cuba," not a Communist. The Russians had a secret telescope radio antenna in operation at this prison. When Martino was finally permitted to talk to someone at the American Embassy, he informed Gilerist about this. Gilerist's reply was "My God, Martino, don't talk like that! They might have a tape recorder in here. I don't want to go to jail!"

In October of 1959 Martino was taken before a "judge" who told him that if he didn't sign a confession admitting the things of which he had been charged he would be charged with something worse. Martino called Kessler at "our" Embassy asked for help and was refused. Kessler told him that his only duties were the welfare department and that he couldn't be expected to come down and "play nursemaid" for Martino.

An astonishing thing then happened, Martino reports. Mr. Medina, chief of the jail took pity on him because of his illness and wanted to get him admitted to a hospital. So Medina took Martino to the American Embassy, on which ground Martino was technically a free man! Consul General Brown, Kessler, Gilerist and the rest of the officials at "our" Embassy were horrified when they saw Mar-

tino. They demanded to know why he had been brought there. They told Martino that they

were cooperating with Dr. Castro and did not want to cause trouble for Castro's government and could do nothing to help Martino. Consul General Brown even refused to talk on the telephone to Martino's "judge" and pleaded with Martino to leave the American Embassy and go to prison. Brown promised Martino that the next day he would either go free or go to a hospital. So Martino walked out of the American Embassy and spent the next 14 months in a cell with 17 other men caged like wild animals with no sun, little water, and countless bugs.

The American government and State Department had absolutely nothing to do with Martino's final release. Martino has written a book and made many speeches about his Cuban nightmare. Robert Murphy, a high State Department official, made a special trip from Washington to Miami to warn Martino to quit talking. "It is not patriotic to criticize our government," Murphy advised. "This only helps the Communists."

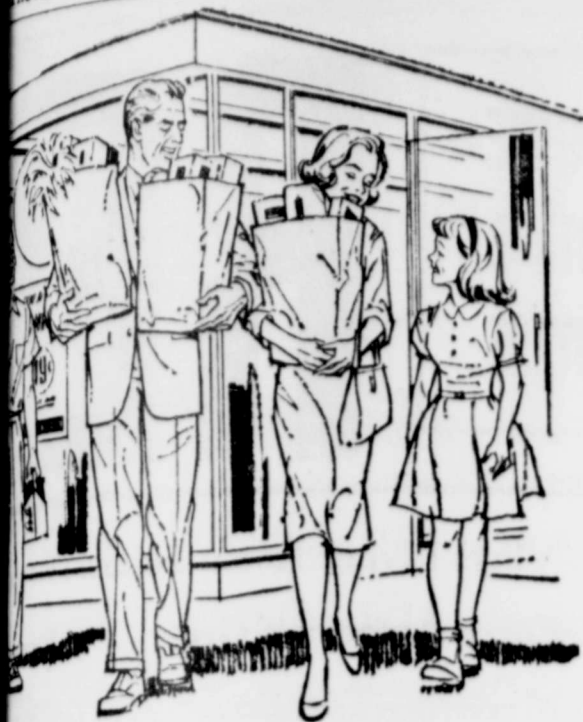

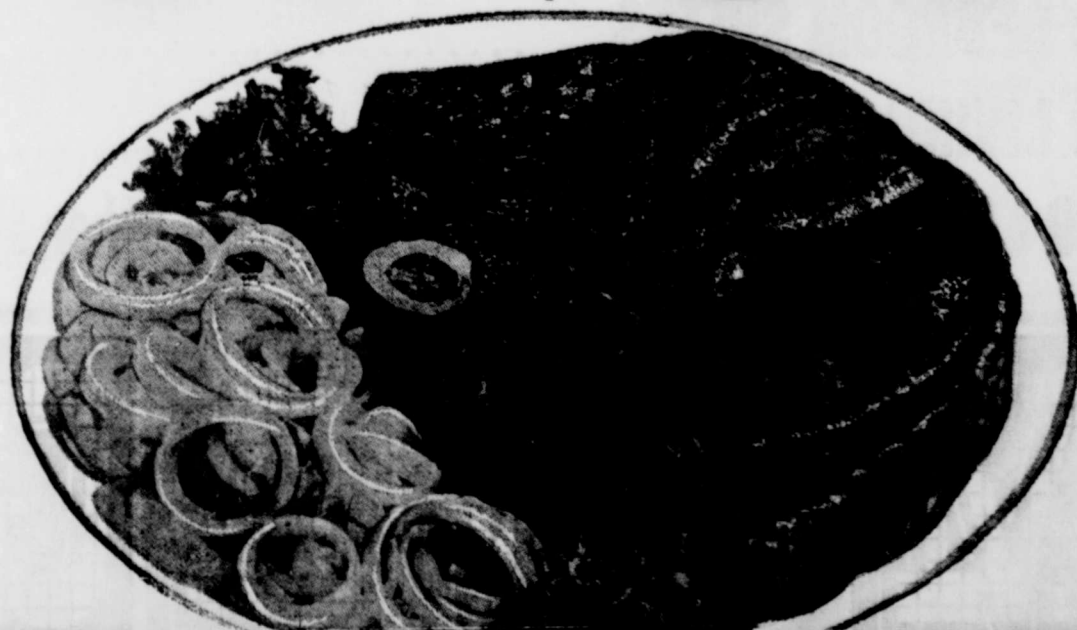

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News From The County Agent

There will be a 4-H Horse Clinic at the Sheriff's Posse Arena on May 15th at 9:00 a. m. All Junior 4-H Horse Club members are urged to attend. The 4-H Horse Play Day will be held on May 22nd at 1:30 p. m. at the Sheriff's Posse Arena. All members are urged to bring their horses and attend the play day.

The District 4-H Elimination Contests will be held at Midwestern University in Wichita Falls on May 8th. 500 hundred boys and girls from District III will participate in various contests.

The Wichita County Broiler Show will be held in the 4-H Barn on Saturday, May 15th. All broilers are to be in the barn by 8:00 a. m. Bill Cawley, Poultry Specialist from A and M University, will judge the show.

Deferred grazing is one of the best practices available to stockmen for improving the condition or ranges. It is nothing more, explains county agent B. T. Haws than the removal of grazing livestock from a pasture for a part of or preferably the entire growing season to allow the forage plants to re-supply food reserves in the root system, make top growth to produce food, and produce seed for natural revegetation.

Ranges in the county have declined in condition during the past two growing seasons due to a lack of moisture, the county agent said. Most ranges forage plants need an opportunity now to reestablish themselves and deferment will give them that chance, the county agent added.

Coupled with deferment, attention should be given to the balancing of livestock numbers with the forage. Proper use of the forage results in an accumulation of litter on the soil surface which is not wasted forage but an aid to more efficient water use, soil stabilization and improved soil fertility.

The county agent said that publications are available at his office on this subject.

A properly managed farm pond can provide excellent fishing and recreation and income to farmers and ranchers says the county agent.

However, most ponds should be fertilized for maximum fish production just as cropland often needs to be fertilized for maximum crop production. Fertilizer increases the supply of plankton, which is the main food supply for small fish and water insects.

Early in the spring, when the water temperature reaches 60 degrees F., is the time to begin your fertilization program.

Most Texas waters respond to an initial treatment of 100 lbs of 20-20-5 analysis fertilizer per surface acre, followed by successive treatment of 20 to 40 pounds per acre at 2 week intervals until a desirable bloom has been reached. In water surrounded by soils with ample potassium such as the blacklands, 16-20-0 gives good results.

on can index a scrapbook and it's a perfect holder for paper-doll clothes. Just add tabs indicating where dresses, coats, hats and such are kept. The doll clothes stay flat and available when needed by a paper doll family.

Scrapbooks are ideal for mounting report cards and school mementos — prize essays, gold-starred arithmetic exercises, drawings, or programs of school plays.

A scrapbook is a fine photo album too. A set of five scrapbooks marked by years or months can hold a wealth of pictures.

Scrapbooks are good for mounting pressed flowers, collecting plant specimens, keeping seeds in packets — for 4-H, hobby work or school projects.

"A scrapbook may also serve as a sketchbook," points out Dorothy Joslyn of Whitman Publishing Company of Racine, Wisconsin. "When a child wants to draw he may use his crayons or paints directly on the scrapbook page. This his drawings are not scattered around and are all kept safely in one place. Also, he may like to make a series of drawings that will tell a story."

Kindergartners like scrapbooks to paste up special projects of any kind, using bright pictures cut from a magazine. Any child likes to make a garden page, or a page of boats, or pictures of toys, or pictures of food. Often these serve as storybooks, and plots can be made up to connect the pictures. Paste work on a rainy day keeps preschoolers absorbed and happy.

A boy may be interested in skin-diving, or in firemen. For months he may paste up pictures connected with his interest, then switch to a new hobby. He gains knowledge as he plays. Girls often like to paste up pictures of houses and furniture or, in grammar school, years, collect simple recipes.

Scrapbooks also make good friendship books. A youngster can paste up his valentines, his birthday greetings and letters he receives. Years later he'll enjoy recalling the sender and the events.

Respiratory Illnesses

Washington, D. C. . . . President Johnson's recent hospitalization has dramatized to the public a little understood health hazard in America: The terrible toll of suffering and days lost caused by respiratory illness.

The most common respiratory illnesses are the common cold, influenza, pneumonia, bronchitis, and sore throats. Often, a victim will suffer from one or more simultaneously. Or, a siege of one illness may lead to another, more dangerous one. This happens with influenza patients who develop pneumonia.

Staggering Statistics In numbers alone, the havoc wrought by respiratory illnesses annually in America is staggering. In 1959, for example, there were an estimated 210 million cases of respiratory illnesses in the United States. This at a time when our population was only 177 million. An incredible 688 million days were lost from work, school or other normal activity.

Unfortunately, many people let down their guard against respiratory illnesses as the warm spring weather approaches. Yet, statistics show that respiratory illnesses occur with great frequency from April to June. In fact, using 1959's statistics, there was a mere 10% decrease in estimated cases during April-June compared to the cold months of October through December.

Symptoms and Treatment The symptoms of respiratory illnesses vary. However, fever, muscular aches, chills, malaise, "tightness" or pain in the chest, cough and severe sore throat should be warning signs for you to call your physician.

A new medication, a non-prescription, oral solution called Chlorazepate, promptly relieves the pain and irritation of a minor sore throat, which often accompanies respiratory illnesses. Of course, if throat soreness lingers or is accompanied by a high fever, this, too, requires professional attention.

FISHING LINES

By DICK WOLFF

Many times, no doubt, you have felt that about half of the 20 million anglers fish your favorite lake or stream. The men will continue to be quite successful. Why? Because the above average fishing savvy and probably know many tricks. Here are some hints which could help you catch many more fish.

First, develop fine casting accuracy. Cast to areas around bushes, lily pads and other "tough spots" that other anglers up. Many times you'll find unfished water even in "heavy" lakes or streams. To prevent snags, keep a supply of weedless lures such as the ABU-Reflex weedless, in your tackle box. You'll be pleased at the number of fish lurking in rough-to-reach areas.

Like to bottom fish from shore? Many times fish will be when they feel a sinker. You can fish with an unweighted line a loop near the end of your line and slide it through an old hexagonal nut. Place a lump of sugar through the loop, then pull the loop tight. Cast. The sugar will melt in the water, the nut will fall off, and presto, your bait is in deep water with no fish-scaring sinker on the line.

Had trouble catching that lunker trout under a log or rock in a stream? Upstream from your quarry, slash a bank of grass and soil around. As the soil particles reach your fish, toss out a worm and get set for results.

Spend a couple of hours reading the 1965 Garcia Fishing Almanac. It's loaded with the fishing secrets of experts. The Almanac is available on newsstands or direct from Garcia, 323 Alfred Avenue, New York, N. Y. for 50 cents.

When you hook a fish, make a note of the depth, because you'll find more fish at that depth.

If fish are particularly squeamish, try an especially light lure. A tiny lure or spinner like the 1/4-ounce or 1/8-ounce Veltic will get fish which pass up larger offerings.

When fishing from a boat, avoid banging oars, tackle box against it. Vibrations really do scare fish.

A final trick — stop look and listen. Keep an eye on the who consistently brings home the fish. Somebody is always up with a new fish-getting gimmick.

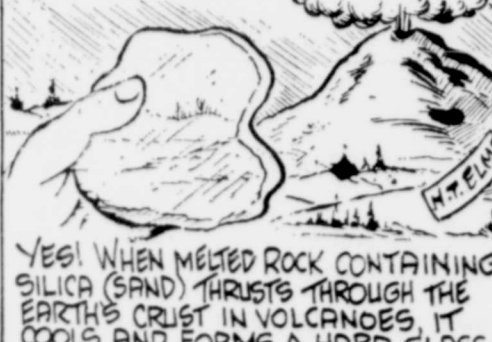

Gracing the spring scene are all type of beautiful fabrics — in colors ranging from coral pinks to mint greens, and a wide range of blue and other colors.

Before buying a garment, check it over carefully to be sure that you are getting quality.

A wise shopper always checks the construction of a garment carefully to see if the seams are at least one-half inch in width and that the stitches are close together.

There are many kinds of fiber used in making the interesting materials, so be sure to read the labels and hang tags carefully to know what the fabric is made of and how to care for it.

Correct care is important to keep the new garment looking new. Professional laundries and dry cleaning assures that your garments will stay new looking with proper care by experts in the fabric field.

A child is never too young to learn habits of good grooming and good clothes care. Parents have a responsibility, however, to teach and provide physical conditions that make good clothes care easy for children.

A child can be frustrated because the hooks or rods in his clothes closet are too high for him. If he cannot reach the hook or hanger to hang up his clothes, he may soon become discouraged. Thelma Wirges County Home Demonstration Agent says.

"Select properly sized hangers for your child's clothes. Stores offer colorfully designed hangers for children," the agent adds.

Teach your child how to put his garments on the bed, insert the hanger into the sleeve, button or zip the garment closed and then hang it in its proper place in the clothes closet. This takes a little time—but parents will be happier and so will the child.

Children can't learn proper

clothes care if adults do not provide them with the proper hangers and teach them that hangers enable their garments to hang free and retain their shape the agent says.

Consumers are spending an average of \$22 a year on leather shoes, and an additional \$7 annually on other leather goods. Non-leather items are not included in this national average.

Compare these figures with your individual expenditures. If your shoe cost is higher than you think it should be, you may need to check your present shoe management, says Thelma Wirges, county home demonstration agent.

The management practices include the selection, care and repair of shoes. Selecting the right style, color and material, plus the proper care and upkeep are all important in the total shoe cost, the agent says.

For consumers who wonder where their shoe dollars go, here's a breakdown by U. S. Department of Agriculture economists, who have studied costs involved in a pair of shoes which retail for \$9.95.

It takes about three square feet of leather to make a pair of shoes. The raw leather costs about 50 cents. By the time the leather is tanned and gets to the factory, the cost is about \$1.50. Add \$1 for materials for soles and linings, and another for labor which is about \$3. profit overhead and the manufacturer prices the shoes at \$5.50. At the shoe store, add \$2 for salesmen and \$2.45 for overhead and profit. The price to you is \$9.95.

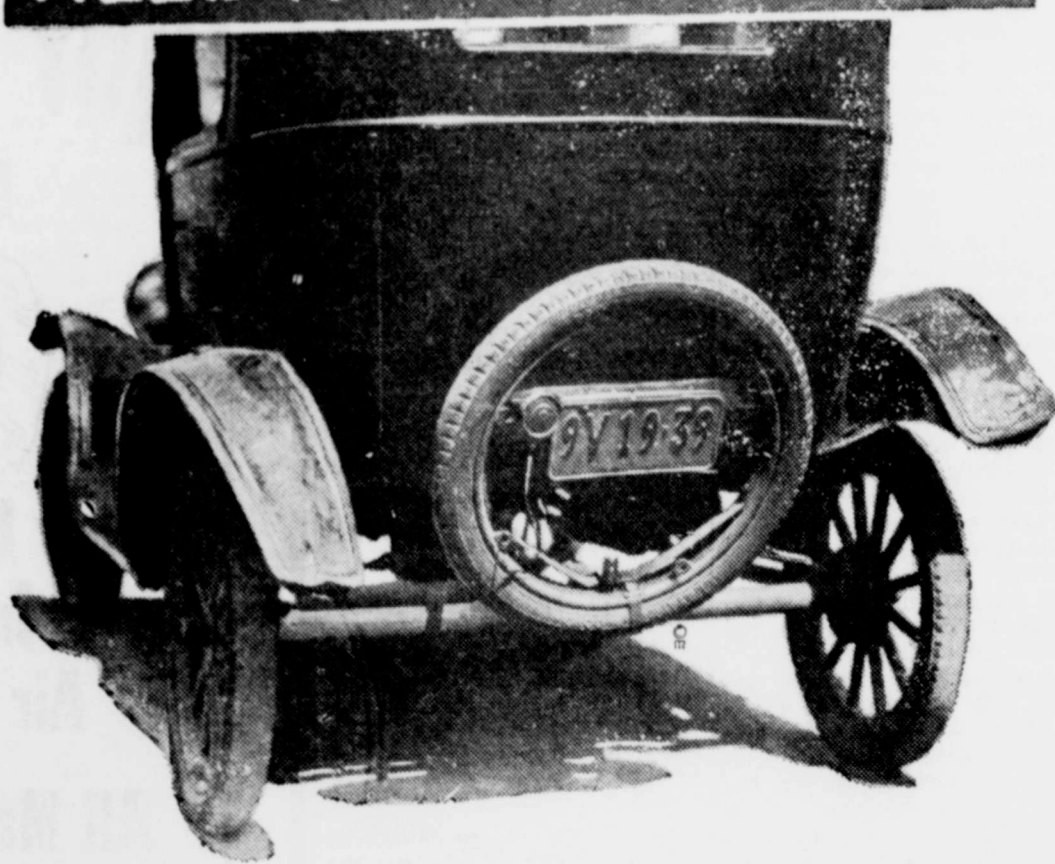

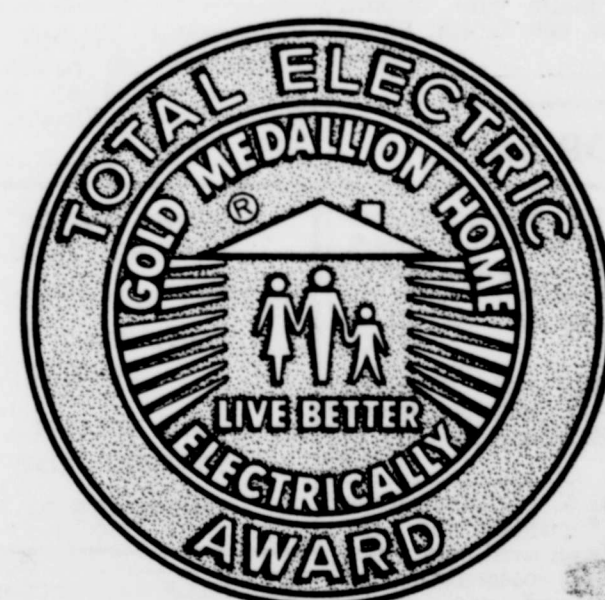

Applying a complete fertilizer to lawns soon after spring growth begins has many advantages, according to Thelma Wirges, County Home Demonstration Agent.

Spring lawns should be fertilized. Fertilization encourages early growth and early green color, improves water-use efficiency and increases hardiness and drought resistance because fertilization helps the grass to develop a stronger, deeper root system.

Complete fertilization are those that contain nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium. A good example is 16-20-0. The numbers represent the pounds of the nutrients to each 100 pounds. Fertilizers should be bought on the basis of its guaranteed analysis.

The rule of thumb in applying fertilizer to lawns is to use 1-2 to 2 pounds of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet, according to the agent. With the complete fertilizer recommended for early application, the other two nutrients will naturally be applied at about the same rate.

As an example, Miss Wirges says a fifty pound bag of 16-20-0, which would contain five pounds of each of the nutrients would be just right for the spring application on 2,500 square feet. Since our soil does not need potassium, our best formulas call for none. During summer an application of fertilizer that is high in nitrogen should be made every eight to ten weeks.

Select plants for the outdoor living area with the same care and finesse that is used in selecting a fine piece of furniture for the interior living area.

Too often, Miss Wirges says, plant purchases are limited to impulse buying with no thought of where the plant will be used, or what its ultimate size will be. The urge to use plants that will give a quick effect will usually result in an outdoor living area filled with plants which soon outgrow their assigned space.

Over planting is another tendency possessed by many home

owners who are trying to secure a quick effect. This is fine if one has the fortitude to throw out the surplus plants as soon as they begin to crowd each other.

But for the best effect and to insure lasting enjoyment, the homeowner should realize that a well landscaped area requires planning and time to develop. Frequently the landscaping of the home must be done on a limited budget. This can be done very easily by breaking down the development into projects extending over several years. Advises the home demonstration agent.

Priority should be given to the establishment of the trees and lawn. Once these are established, shrubs and flower beds can be added as funds and time become available.

Mrs. Ruth Golleher a yard improvement demonstrator for the Ray Home Demonstration Club has made plans for organizing her landscape. This same plan would be a help to many homeowners with an established landscape. Mrs. Golleher loves flowers and year around color in her yard. Her new goal is to select evergreen plants for the front yard, more flowers in the back and group them as planned. This will eliminate spot planting and unsightly areas in the yard. It will also make for easier care and maintenance.
