The conservation farmer has received better than average yields from his crops resulting in a higher acre income. He is pleased to note the benefits received from the use of various conservation practices, such as cover cropping, crop residue management, strip-cropping, contour farming, terracing and other applicable conservation measures.

He rests assured that the use of a good balanced conservation program based on the needs of his land will result in continued soil

improvement and dollar income. The conservation rancher, likewise, enjoys an increase in yields in the form of more and better native grasses. Grass in Eastland County is the greatest single crop making possible the high livestock returns to ranchers. The good rancher recognizes the benefits and value of such range management practices and proper use, range deferrals, range seeding, brush control and adequate livestock water. Range deferrals have enabled many landowners to bring their better native grasses into a healthy and vigorous condition resulting in a much needed seed crop on some ranges.

Proper use to the conservation rancher means maximum safe use of his better higher producing grasses. He knows that "left over" grass is not wasted but that it serves as a litter to hold maximum rainfall in place and enables weaker plants to become higher producers.

Many landowners have planted winter cover crops for soil protection and grazing. Some of these crops are up and looking good. Peanut farmers with late peanuts plan to seed cover crops at the earliest possible date.

Horn Chosen As Scout Leader for U. S. Jamboree

One Troop of 37 Boy Scouts and Explorers is now registered to represent Comanche Trail Council at the fifth National Jamboree to be held near Colorado Springs, Colorado July 22-28, 1960.

"We are permitted two Troops with 74 campers and six scoutmasters and assistants and the deadline is approaching for registration of our quota. It is very important that those who are planning to attend register within the next few days so that they may be assured of a place," according to Dr. T. C. Graves of Goldthwaite, chairman of the Jamboree Committee.

The contingent will travel by chartered bus leaving this area on July 17 visiting scenic sights in New Mexico, Colorado and Texas arriving early at the Jamboree site, at the foot of Pikes Peak and near the Air Force Academy, and returning home July 30.

Bake Show Planned At Pecan Festival

The Eastland County Home Demonstration Council is sponsoring a bake show in connection with the Annual Eastland County Pecan Show, Dec. 11-12 in the Dawson Furniture Building in Cisco.

Everyone in Eastland County and adjoining counties is urged to enter pies, cakes, candy, cookies, nut breads (all containing pecans) and salted pecans in the show. The rules are as follows:

1. There shall be six divisions of products with a requirement for each:
 - a. Pies—must enter one whole pie.
 - b. Cakes—must enter one whole cake.
 - c. Candy—must enter at least 6 pieces.
 - d. Cookies—must enter at least 6 cookies.
 - e. Nut bread—must enter one whole loaf.
 - f. One cup salted pecans.
2. All entries must contain pecans.
3. Anyone, man or woman, from this county or an adjoining county may enter products in the show.
4. All entries must be entered and in place by 11 a.m. when the judging will begin (Dec. 11).
5. Judges will be trained home economists.
6. Score cards will be used to judge entries in all five divisions and cash prizes and ribbons awarded according to score.

Nuts Entered In Pecan Show Must Be Grown In '59

Entries for the Eastland County Pecan Show may be left at the Ranger Chamber of Commerce where J. M. Cooper will pick them up Friday, Dec. 8 and carry them to Cisco for the show.

Nuts entered in the Seventh Annual Eastland County Pecan Show to be held at Cisco, Dec. 11, must have been grown in 1959 by the person exhibiting them according to R. L. Ponsler, president of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce, who with the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association is jointly sponsoring the two day affair.

People who live in towns with only one tree are equally welcome to enter a quart of their pecans, the same as those who with large orchards or groves, according to Oscar Schafer, Cook Community, president of the growers association.

Over 70 different growers entered Burkett pecans in the 1958 show. Growers not only from Eastland but from adjoining counties as well are eligible and encouraged to show their nuts.

The show is held in the county annually for the purpose of focusing attention on the pecan industry, to recognize the tremendous potential possibilities of growing pecans in the area and to learn and compare varieties. The per capita consumption of pecans in the United States is a little less than one pound it was explained.

About 20 different papershell varieties and dozens of different natives or seedlings will be seen in the show. Burkett, Mahans and Western Schley usually have more entries in the show than do other thin shell varieties.

The bake show featuring pecan cakes, pies, cookies and candy under the supervision of the County Home Demonstration Council will be a featured part of the show.

A pecan queen contest will also be held in conjunction with the affair. Mrs. Peggy Gallagher, Cisco, is in charge of the contest.

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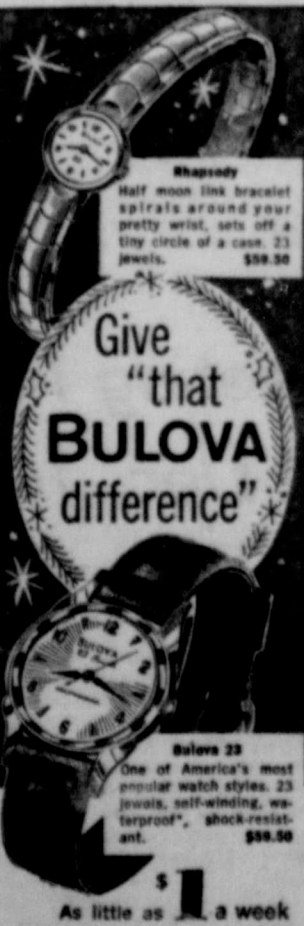

IT'S THE LAW
in Texas

AGENTS NECESSARY IN CONDUCT OF BUSINESS

Without the idea of agency, business as we know it would stop. Practically all business transactions of every kind depend upon the services of agents of one kind or another.

Your insurance man is an agent and so is the man who sells you real estate, or drives your bus. These are just a few examples and each under the law of agency, a somewhat different.

But each have in common the idea that, in some way or another, they represent or act for someone else. The person or corporation for which they act is known as the principal.

Generally speaking, there are

two broad classes of agents—special agents and general agents. For example, suppose you wish to sell your house and you engage a real estate man to handle it for you. He is a special agent who represents you in this transaction alone.

On the other hand, if you were to be absent from the city for a long period of time and have business affairs to be cared for, you might grant a power of attorney to your lawyer or a close associate of yours, to act in your stead as fully as if you were present.

He would be your general agent and could use his own judgment and discretion in conducting your affairs without consulting you as to what should be done with any old or new problems that might arise.

However, the principal is responsible for the conduct of his agent, either general or special, if the agent is in the process of doing what he has been hired to do.

Thus, if the agent is acting within his "scope of authority," and someone is injured through the agent's negligence, the principal is liable.

Very often difficult legal questions arise as to whether the con-

duct of the agent was within the "scope of his authority," and thus binding upon the principal.

For example suppose the grocer's delivery boy, while enroute to a customer's home and despite the grocer's instructions to stick to business while on deliveries, decides to go a mile or so out of his way to see his girl about a date that night. He drives through a stop sign and hits a pedestrian. Is the grocer responsible for this?

The law of agency is designed to regulate these relationships between principal and agent and third party and to protect the just and proper interest of each.

Though this is one of the areas of the law that can be very complex, at the same time it is one of the areas of the law where fairness, common sense and common understanding are most important.

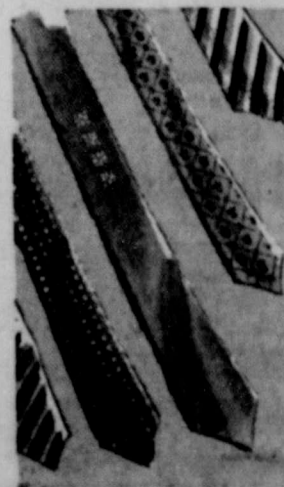

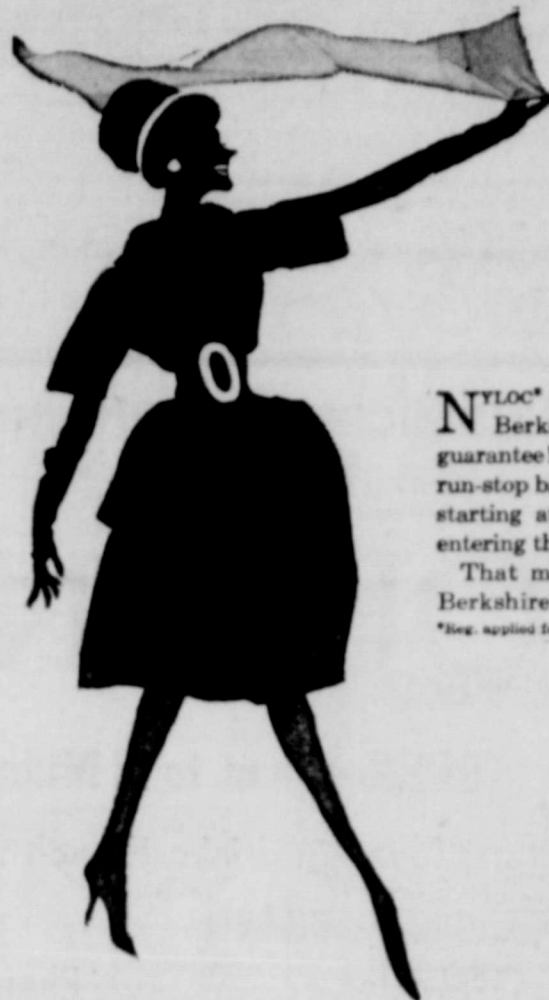

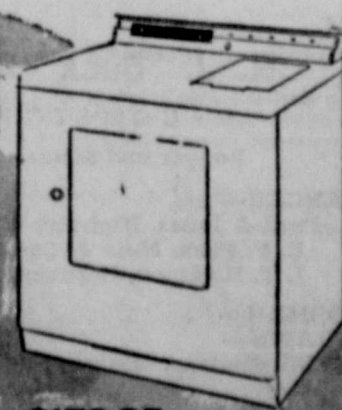

Freezing Lemon Pies . . . Make the crust as you would any pie whether you plan to freeze it or eat it the day it is baked. Cool the crust before placing the filling in it. Prepare the filling and pour into the cool crust. If you are making lemon meringue be sure to cook the filling as long as the directions indicate. When the filling is thick enough it will hold its shape. The meringue will be placed on the pie later, at serving time.

Wrap each pie separately for the freezer. Cover with a paper plate and keep it in place with sticky tape. Place in foil or moisture vapor proof or in a plastic bag; fasten securely. Each pie is protected and can be stacked in the freezer . . . Store at 0 degrees F. For the meringue . . . you can also freeze the egg

whites for the pie. Three egg whites frozen together make the right amount for one meringue pie. Thaw the whites for the meringue, taking from freezer about one hour before use. Bring to room temperature for beating. Be sure to beat egg whites thoroughly for a high, light meringue that will hold up. Spread meringue on the frozen pie, and bake in a 350 degree oven for about 15 to 20 minutes, or until browned evenly. For Cheese and Chiffon lemon pies, there's no use to heat. Simply remove from freezer and thaw.

Add to your fame with other easy desserts made with lemon pie filling from the freezer. All you do is freeze the filling in a covered bowl or jar . . . then thaw and use.

Shopping Begins At Home . . . A little planning before hand, helps us to use our time, energy and money more efficiently. Shopping can be simplified by using store services, such as telephone and delivery services, milk and bread routes, and local ads. There's more to shopping lists than just writing them down. Here are 10 steps which you might follow in planning a shopping list:

1. Plan your menu a week in advance.
2. Study the ads in the local paper.
3. Make the shopping list according to plan and food on hand.
4. Keep a pad and pencil for a "want list."
5. Organize the shopping list according to store or shopping center layout to avoid "backtracking."
6. Make shopping lists legible and clear to enable someone else to do the shopping.
7. Split up the shopping list among family members to speed up shopping and avoid "backtracking."
8. Take sample swatches of paint, paper, floor coverings and fabrics when shopping for home furnishings.
9. Keep a record of family clothing sizes in your billfold or purse.

I GIVE YOU TEXAS

When the original Casa Manana was held in Fort Worth, a State department, almost en masse, attended one week-end. When they checked up Sunday morning, one of the group was missing. Further checking revealed that he had imbibed freely, had given two officers a tussle and was now in the city jail.

So several of his colleagues, including two ladies, went to the police station to see him and to arrange for his release. When they were taken down the corridor, they peered through the bars into his cell. He was on the bunk, asleep. One of his friends called his name and the man aroused, blinked his eyes, saw the group on the other side of the bars and yelled, "Have they got you in jail? I'll get you out, right away."

A reporter's life in the old days—and I suppose that is still the case—was seldom dull. A few of the events which I reported during my service on the Fort Worth Star-Telegram were the Southern Baptist Convention; the recovery of the bodies of three men, victims of murder, from the Trinity; directing the activities of a six-man staff during two runs of the Pat Stock Show and the murder of two State highway patrolmen by Clyde and Bonnie.

Another little assignment which was handed me was to get the names of all who attended a dinner signaling the opening of the Texas and Pacific Railway Station. How did I try to do it? Posted myself at the door and stopped the guests long enough to jot down the names. There were over 300 I got 'em, too.

Perhaps this is just a legend. The story goes that, many years ago, three men held up a train. Besides seizing the valuables in the express car, the bandits lined up the crew and passengers, some 50 or more, and robbed them, too.

The three were caught and the prosecuting attorney persuaded the grand jury to indict the robbers—not once each but 50 times, making the robbery of each person a separate offense.

Then he tried them on one charge, got a conviction, permitted them to plead guilty in the other 49 cases with the terms to run concurrently—and, though conducting only three trials, he collected a fee for 150 cases! It's just a legend—maybe.
