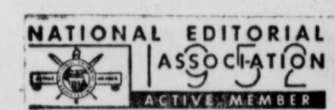

Persons wishing to file retirement claims or survivor's claims under the Social Security Act are invited to call at that time.

The social security office is receiving quite a few inquiries from persons over 65 asking whether they are required to pay the social security tax. Mr. McNatt states that there is no age limit in connection with social security taxes. Every person who is employed on a job coming under social security pays his social security tax and receives credit on his social security account regardless of how young or how old he is. The same is true of those persons who are now under social security because they are self-employed.

Electric Wires Cause Near Tragedy

Two Loraine men had an accident last Wednesday that came near being a tragedy. Earl and Travis Hallmark both took an electric charge of 2200 volts at the East Gin and lived to tell of the experience. Earl suffered burns on the hands and legs and shock but Travis only suffered shock and some bruises caused by a fall.

The accident happened Wednesday morning. Travis Hallmark, who is manager of the East Gin, and Wade Preston went to the gin to repair a tin roof over the engine room of the gin and were on the roof making repairs, when Earl Hallmark, father of Travis, came along the Highway and saw them working. He stopped and went to the gin and in order to get closer to them to talk, climbed up on a large tin pipe that carries trash out of the gin which is ten or twelve feet off the ground. While standing on the pipe he caught hold of an electric wire that was suspended over his head. When he touched the wire he received a shock and yelled but he could not turn the wire loose. Travis, seeing the plight of his father, jumped from the roof to the pipe and pulled him loose from the wire and in doing so received the electric shock. After getting his father loose from the wire he laid him down on the pipe and fell to the ground. He then got up, climbed up the ladder and carried his father, who outweighs him 40 or 50 pounds, down the ladder to the ground and was applying artificial respiration when Wade Preston arrived on the scene. Wade took over the artificial respiration and had Mr. Hallmark breathing in a short time but he kept up the treatment until they arrived at the hospital with him in a pickup. Mr. Hallmark remained unconscious for about an hour after arriving at the hospital. He remained in the hospital until Saturday.
