ENMU COACH LAMBASTS THOSE WHO DISCREDIT COLLEGE ATHLETICS; RAMSEY IS MOST VALUABLE

A defense of the athletic system in American Colleges today was offered by Coach Jim Richardson of Eastern New Mexico University, Monday night, at the annual Morton Football banquet at the Community Building.

Richardson's unexpected and effective attack on those who would discredit the college athletic scholarship picture was a highlight of the program.

Presenting of the Most Valuable player trophy and a gold football to Gerald Ramsey and presenting of all-district honors to Ramsey and Paul Cox, co-captains of the Morton team last year, was the other highlight.

Ramsey, a lineman for four years on the Indian team, won the nod over Cox who was named outstanding last year. The two men, according to Coach Walters, were the backbone of the 1954 team. All letters on the team were honored.

The Rhythmettes, a sextet composed of Ann Sanders, Geraldine Ramsey, Twana Cravens, Glenna Allison, Kay Doss and Gloria Nations, accompanied sang for the banquet guests.

Richardson, not an accomplished speaker in the usual sense of the word, opened with a few bragging remarks on Texas and their football emphasis, touched on the experiences of two Morton boys who played football for ENMU and the local coaches, both of whom attended ENMU, and then let loose a blast against those who would discredit the game.

"The recruiting and win at all cost idea isn't nearly as bad as it has been painted," he told the group of about 200 persons who attended. He went on to point out that only one small incident of actual bribery has been proved and yet people all over the country have condemned college athletics as a result.

He also lashed out at the joking emphasis that has been made against majoring in physical education reminding the audience that his easiest course in college was in journalism. Physical education courses are tough and the majority fits well with coaching, he reminded.

"If a boy can learn the complexities of modern football with all its various combinations of formations against different offenses and defenses," he said, "he's not dumb."

He was proud of ENMU's high scholastic ranking football team and said the days of collegiate recruiting are almost over.

Richardson came out in defense of athletic scholarships posing the question of why football players who devote more than six hours per day in uniform to football and athletics shouldn't earn a scholarship as well as anyone else. He pointed out that they had to pass the same exams and complete the same subjects with far less time to devote to the studying. He reckoned that many fans fail to see the deep feelings and sustained background that must go into becoming a successful grinder, just as would be required to become proficient in any other subject.

He promised that he'd never run into any of the "Cadillac driving paid football players you read about" and emphasized that if a boy was being paid to play college ball he'd soon be beaten out by another who played because he loves the game.

Richardson jarred the composure of some of his listeners when he avowed he'd rather have a boy who made a C-report card and took active part in interscholastic athletics than a A-card without any athletic activities. He valued the athletic training as something he could never go back and get out of a book later on.

His words of advice to young gridders were short. Pick a college they wanted to attend and stay there. "Move all your clothes with you," he warned. He was plainly disappointed in the large number who go to school away from home, are not prepared, and soon come running home and quit school. He said if a boy could get an athletic scholarship at one school, he could probably obtain help from the school of his choice if he simply went to the proper authorities, emphasized he wanted to attend that school and asked for some way to help himself through school.

CITY TO EXTEND LIMITS PASS NEW ORDINANCE

The residents of the area just south of Morton have voted to become a part of the City of Morton it was revealed at City Commission meeting, Monday night with the certification of a petition brought before the group by three men, all residents of the area.

The petition, constituting a vote of the people, listed 61 names of persons residents of the area. Of that total 45 were certified as qualified poll tax paying voters. A census of the area showed only 69 qualified voters. Thus by simple

majority, the petition gave the commission the right to annex the territory.

An estimated 225 persons live in the area which extends the city limits from Grant Street six blocks south. The original limits cut down Grant (the hospital road) straight across town from east to west. The new line is drawn from a point one block south of Walter Sandefer's residence in the south-west corner of town, east including houses on the north side of the road in front of the L. B. Childs residence, back north on Highway

214 to a point about directly across from the Truman Doss residence, then east one block behind the residence now included in the Slaughter addition, then angling back north leaving out a triangle of land where the hospital road meets highway 290 but including all of the homes in the John L. McGee addition, and adjoining the present city limits at the Merlin Roberts residence.

The Commission officially adopted an ordinance to annex the property with the City assuming obligation to furnish water, gas and

sewer lines and of course the residences assume the obligations of all city property owners.

The petition was certified by

Jack Loran, Andy Behrends and Lonnie Hanna. It certified that the territory annexed was not more than a half mile from the present city limits and that signature on it signified a vote in favor of annexation.

With the ordinance in preparation, all that remains is the official reading of it and publication of it to make it legal and final.

Only a very few of the resident landowners did not sign the petition and several of them were unavailable when the petition was circulated.

Just how long it would be before gas, water and sewer lines are to the new area was not known.

Tuesday, February 15th, is the final day that Cochran County ranchers and farmers can make applications for drought feed. Bob Cross reported this week from the Farm Security Administration office. Extensions may be granted later for those who have applied.

The FSA office is located in the new County Activities Building.

Jaycees Support City Enlargement

At their regular noon meeting Monday at the Eastside Cafe members of the Morton Jaycees officially endorsed a Jaycee committee report favoring annexation of additional acreage south of the present city limits.

The vote followed action taken last week when a committee composed of T. K. Williamson, chairman, Jack Loran, Andy Behrends, and Bill Glassford was appointed to investigate requests by residents of the area to enter the city limits.

Van Greene, city manager, was asked to outline a method whereby the area could be included within the city without undue costs to residents of the area or the city.

As passed, the Jaycee resolution states that the Morton Jaycees endorse and offer their fullest support toward city enlargement as outlined by the committee report.

Other action included a report on the polo drive by Ed Howell, MOD fund drive chairman; a report by S. M. "Smiley" Monroe on the Pampa tri-regional meeting attended by himself and Glassford; and a report by Glassford on last Wednesday's meeting in Levelland with Rocky Ford, state president, and attended by T. CITY WILL CONSTRUCT BUILDING FOR METER REPAIR and STORAGE

The decision to build a permanent building which will be used for meter repair and storage was reached Monday night by the Morton City Commission by a 2-1 vote.

The Commission accepted the low bid of Alton Burleson as contractor for the job. Cost will be \$2,600 and the building is to be completed within 30 working days after the start of excavation, if no complications develop.

Burleson's bid was low of four received, all from local contractors. His terms were also the best.

Blocking a unanimous passage of the decision came because of the question as to just how much the building will be worth to the City. One of the Commissioners emphasized he didn't feel like voting for the construction until he had satisfied himself that the building would accomplish its primary purpose, that of providing a place to repair gas and water meters and thereby saving the City of Morton, considerable amounts of money each year.

There was no debate on the issue, simply discussed. The other Commissioner was satisfied, he told the mayor and his fellow commissioner, that the building would be a good investment.

Under the present setup, he described, meters are being repaired by an out-of-town concern and have not been returned in satisfactory condition.

Local City employees have assured the City Secretary that they could repair the meters and put them in good service, if they had the place in which to carry the parts and do the work.

The building will be of cement block construction with steel doors and will provide plenty of storage room and a place to keep City Maintenance employees busy even in the most inclement weather.

The City Commission voted to hold up on the new engine they've been trying to sell. They were sure, in their own minds, that the engine which was purchased several years ago and has never been used, is worth much more than the \$150 they've been bid. They did not want to take a big loss on the brand new equipment.

Santa Fe Plans Showing of Newest Train

Residents of Cochran County will have the opportunity to see Santa Fe's newest streamliner, the train that will operate between Lubbock and Amarillo offering passenger service direct from Lubbock to Chicago, on a special tour of this area next Wednesday.

The train with a chair car, pullman and baggage car will appear at Bledsoe, Lehman, Whiteface and Levelland next Wednesday.

Plans are being made in Morton to get the school children and any interested persons out for the showing. The train will be at Bledsoe from 8:30 until 9 a.m. on the morning of February 16. It will arrive in Lehman and stay from 9:15 until 9:45. It arrives in Whiteface at 10 a.m. and will be there until 10:30 a.m.

The new streamlined diesel-powered passenger train which will provide the South Plains with first-class overnight service to Chicago, beginning Feb. 20, will be exhibited in 37 communities, towns and cities of the area on six trips which will be initiated Feb. 14 Santa Fe and Lubbock Chamber of Commerce representatives announced Saturday.

In order to acquaint all South Plains and Panhandle residents with the modern equipment which will maintain daily service between Lubbock and Amarillo, the train will be displayed in the 37 area towns and cities a week before the new schedule is slated to begin.

Open For Inspection

In each place visited, the train will be open for inspection by local residents. Representatives of the Commerce and area towns will be aboard the streamliner when it arrives at each stop.

The train will consist of a modern 2000-horsepower diesel locomotive, a streamlined baggage car, chair car and sleeper.

Continuing Report On Making Out Income Tax Form

Trade and Business Deductions of Employees

Salesmen and other employees often incur expense in connection with their occupation, such as travel expenses away from home, transportation expenses locally, entertainment, telephone, stationery, and others. Several income tax questions arise with respect to these expenses—principally, are they deductible and, if so, where on the return are they to be deducted?

In order to be deductible, the expenses must be in connection with the trade or business of the employee. In short, there must be business expenses. Any travel between a residence and a place of work is personal expense and, therefore, not deductible.

Once the expense has been determined to constitute a business expense and, therefore, an allowable deduction under the Code, then it must be determined whether the item is deductible in arriving at adjusted gross income, or in computing taxable income.

The deductions for adjusted gross income available to employees in connection with their employment include:

for travel and transportation: If your employer pays you an "expense account" or otherwise reimburses you for money spent for him in connection with your employment (other than "travel and transportation"), you should add these payments to your wages, and then subtract your actual allowable expenses of this type but not more than the reimbursement. Attach a detailed statement in explanation. Any allowable expense in excess of the reimbursed amount may be deducted as miscellaneous expenses on Page 3 of your return. If you itemize your deductions.

Out-of-town travel expenses: The law provides special deductions for the expenses of travel while away from home in connection with your employer's business. Traveling "away from home" means going away from the city or town where you normally work and remaining away at least overnight. "Travel expenses" means the cost of transportation fares, meals, and lodging, and includes porters' tips, hire of public stenographers, baggage charges, and similar expenses necessary to travel. Travel expenses do not include any entertainment expenses or any personal expenses such as laundry. Any amount paid to you to cover these expenses must be included in your wages. You can deduct your actual "travel expenses" from your wages before writing the balance of your wages in Item 2, Page 1.

Other transportation expenses: Even though you do not travel away from home, as explained above, you may deduct from your wages or other compensation before entering the balance on age 1, transportation expenses paid in connection with the performance of services for your employer. Transportation expenses include payments for actual travel or, if you use your own car, the business portion of the cost of operation, including fuel, repairs, and depreciation. Any reimbursement of these expenses must be included in your income.

Going out and from work: The law regards the cost of transportation between your residence and your principal place of employment as personal expense and does not allow you to deduct such cost, no matter how far you live from work, or how expensive the transportation may be.

Expenses of outside salesmen: The new law allows "outside sales-

men" to deduct all their ordinary and necessary business expenses from their compensation before entering the balance in Item 2, Page 1 of the return. This applies only to salesmen who are engaged full-time in soliciting business for their employers away from their employer's place of business. The term does not include one whose principal activities consist of delivery such as a milk-driver salesman.

Other expenses of employees: The expenses set forth above are the only ones which may be deducted from salaries and wages on Page 1 of Form 1040 by employee. You automatically receive an allowance for a deduction which takes the place of all other employment expenses and non-business deductions. On the other hand, if you itemize your deductions on a Long-Form 1040, you can deduct the cost of tools, materials, dues to unions, and professional societies, entertaining customers, and other expenses which are ordinary and necessary in connection with your employment. These items may be itemized and deducted on Page 3 under the heading "Miscellaneous".

Sickness and Disability Benefits: The provisions of the law relating to employer-financed health and accident plans are new. There are three principal types of exclusions.

The first type of exclusion is where you are reimbursed for medical care of yourself, your spouse, or a dependent. This type of benefit is not taxable except to the extent that you have taken a medical deduction for the expense. The second type of exclusion consists of payments for permanent loss of a member or function of the body, or for permanent disfigurement of you, your spouse or a dependent. The payments to be excluded must be computed with reference to the injury and without regard to the period you are absent from work.

The third type of exclusion is referred to in the new law as "Wage Continuation Plan". In general, this section of the new law provides that gross income does not include amounts paid to you if such amounts constitute wages or payments in lieu of wages for a period when you are absent from work on account of personal injuries or sickness. The amount to be excluded can never exceed \$100.00 per week. The benefits of this section vary depending upon the cause of your absence from work. If your absence is occasioned by injury sustained by you, the exclusion applies from the first day of absence. If your absence is caused by illness requiring hospitalization, the exclusion likewise applies from the first day of absence. However, if your absence is caused by illness and you are not hospitalized, the exclusion applies only after the first seven calendar days. The amount to be excluded is the amount received, but such amount may not exceed a weekly rate of \$100.00.

Feb. 15, 1955 is the deadline to apply for feed assistance under the drought program. Applications for hay and feed grain assistance under the emergency drought program will not be accepted after Feb. 15, according to the U. S. D. A. This is in line with previous policy announced to close this program as soon as spring pasture and forage becomes available.

Remember if you need additional feed, you can get a 60 day supply of hay and feed grain supply if you need it, to extend your supply to April 15. This can be done if your application is in the local FHA office by or before Feb. 15, the cut-off date.

The USDA announces that should acute drought continue in an area, the State Drought Committee can request continued assistance.

To date there are 127 Texas counties currently on the official drought aid list.

The feed program was set up to supplement the already existing hay program. Farmers Home Administration emergency loans and certain cost share assistance designed to help eligible farmers and ranchers maintain basic livestock herds.

The local FHA office has not handled very many emergency hay and feed applications to date, even though a dollar per hundred discount is given on grain in ration CERTIFIED SEED.

All farmers are urged to plant certified seed for higher profits. Guaranteed purity higher germina-

tion, and boosted crop yields await farmers who buy and plant certified seed this year. Germination and yields of course, are dependent upon available moisture, but farmers cannot afford to gamble with seed of questionable quality advises the county agent.

Certified seed are usually the best seed of a particular variety available. This seed with a "blue tag" comes from fields that have been inspected during the growing season, properly handled and harvested, cleaned and tested for purity and germination. Only after the seed has passed certain rigid standards does the state department of agriculture issue a "blue certified" tag for each bag.

Certified seed may cost slightly more, but the added cost is good insurance. All farmers should buy new planting seed for this year's crop. Seed supplies usually are adequate, but last minute shoppers may find local stocks depleted and forced to plant whatever seed is available. If the planting seed has not been chemically treated for seed borne and seedling diseases, farmers may find this practice profitable and added insurance against poor stands and plant losses during early growth. Also some plants get off to a slow start. Chemically treated seed may overcome this undesirable factor.

If you need any help on buying certified seed or to chemically treat it, see the County Agent.

4-H CLUB MEETINGS

Six 4-H Club meetings have been held in February with 240 attend-

ing. All these meetings were enhanced by good singing with leadership furnished by the club members themselves. A twenty two minute movie film entitled "Our U. S. Flag" was shown each group. This film is symbolic of good citizenship and showed the hardships that Americans have suffered in keeping our liberty. It gave the history, color and shape of all U. S. flags from George Washington to date.

Plans for the 4-H Round-Up have been issued. The Round-Up is scheduled June 7, 8 and 9 at College Station on the Texas A & M College Campus. Two delegates and one leader for boys, and two delegates and one leader for girls will be selected to go from each county. This is the county quota. This meeting will provide opportunities for the delegates to get training in leadership and to select subjects of their choice.

Research workers at the Pan Tech Field Laboratory have just released their latest findings on wheat pasture poisoning. The complete report is available from the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas. Ask for Progress Report 1739, "Wheat Poisoning in Cattle".

Research results show that the winter season is the ideal time for using chemical treatment for controlling undesirable hardwoods. Either 2, 4, 5-T or ammate, both nonpoisonous to man or livestock, are the recommended chemicals. Local county agents have detailed information on their use.

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS
FROM YOUR STATE CAPITOL

AUSTIN, Texas—Veterans' land scandals got the silent treatment last week.

Four witnesses refused to testify. The senate investigating committee took other testimony behind closed doors, silent so far as the public was concerned. And the House veterans' affairs committee stymied its own public investigation in a tangle of technicalities.

A House committee member, Rep. Bill Elliott of Pasadena, charged "organized pressure" to block further investigation of the issue.

Speaker Jim Lindsey had sent a separate House investigation resolution to a different committee, state affairs.

Ex-Land Commissioner Bascom Giles, head of the Veterans' Land Board until Jan. 1, invoked the Constitution and refused to testify as to his business dealings with several persons named in testimony about block deals.

C. O. Hagan and C. P. Ernsters, principals in much of the land-sale testimony, followed T. V. Ruffin in refusing to testify.

Insurance Hearings
HEARINGS STARTED in both houses of the Legislature on a long list of bills to "clean up the insurance mess."

Sen. Searcy Bracewell told a Senate committee his bill to firm up capital requirements was "tough." The committee put it in a "tenderizing sub-committee" for three weeks.

It would raise minimum requirements for future legal reserve life companies to \$25,000 capital and \$125,000 surplus, all in cash or bonds. Smaller existing companies would continue, but would be limited in size of policies and re-insurance, until they reached the minimum. Those with investments of minimum capital and surplus in office buildings or real estate mortgages would have three years to convert to cash.

The House Insurance committee heard the three state insurance commissioners and others propose corrective measures, including state regulation of the sale of insurance

securities.

Sheppard Wants 13 Laws

Attorney General John Ben Sheppard asked for legislation "to prevent another Duval County."

Speaking to 200 publishers at a Texas Press Association convention in Austin, Sheppard revealed that his legal skirmishes with Boss George Parr disclosed many shortcomings in Texas laws. He recommended 13 bills, and asked the editors to help effect passage.

Most of the bills would tighten control over county funds and call for annual published reports of expenditures.

Suggested Taxes

TAX PROPOSALS continue on the many basis set by Gov. Allan Shivers' program. His two-penny gasoline tax hike, good for \$60 million a year, was introduced earlier by Rep. Charles Murphy of Houston.

Rep. W. G. "Cotton" Kirklin of El Paso introduced the other Shivers' bill, the one-cent cigarette levy, good for \$15 million a year. Rep. Curtis Ford of Corpus Christi offered the familiar penny-a-thousand-foot natural gas deduction tax bill. He figured it would save \$33 million a year.

And, Rep. Jerry Sadler of Pecos dropped in a penny-a-glass, \$2.30 per barrel, beer tax, estimated to produce \$16 million a year.

All faced an ultra-conservative revenue and taxation committee. From Rep. Jack Bryan of Buffalo came a proposal to place a three per cent gross receipts tax on establishments engaged in storing or working motor vehicles.

APPROVED by the House of Representatives, was a bill to increase the pay of state officials. If acceptable to the senate, the pay scale will go to \$25,000 for the governor; \$20,000 for the attorney general; secretary of state, \$15,000; and the land commissioner, treasurer and comptroller \$17,500.

Sen. A. M. Aldin Jr. of Paris and Rep. Barefoot Sanders of Dallas are sponsoring a plan to provide \$45 million for new school building construction. It would let school districts vote higher bond

issues, up to 10 per cent of the assessed property values.

Two representatives, John T. Cox of Temple and Jack Welch of Marlin, have submitted a bill seeking the death penalty for second conviction under the Narcotics Code, and permitting conviction on uncorroborated testimony of an accomplice.

Sen. Doyle Willis of Ft. Worth has a bill to close beer taverns on Sunday.

A bill to limit the building of lodges in state parks was introduced by Rep. Ben Atwell of Dallas.

Sen. Kilmer Corbin of Lubbock wants to make Democrats out of Democrats. His bill is to prevent Texans from voting in the Democratic primaries and then voting Republican in the general election.

Sen. Carlos Ashley of Llano tossed into the hopper a joint resolution that would permit Texas to go after the tourist trade by advertising an amendment to the state constitution would be necessary to remove the old, old bar designed to keep the carnethabgers out of Texas.

WHILE the veterans' land problems rolled on, newly appointed State Land Commissioner and Veterans Land Board Chairman J. Earl Rudder borrowed Rep. Clark Diebel from the State Auditor's Department and named him executive secretary of the board.

Lawrence Jackson quit his new job soon after Rudder replaced Bascom Giles.

Gov. Shivers will have a new Secretary of State early in February. He appointed Al Muldrow, Brownfield farmer-rancher-businessman to succeed C. E. Fuldner who resigned to return to Lubbock. Like Rudder, Muldrow is a World II veteran.

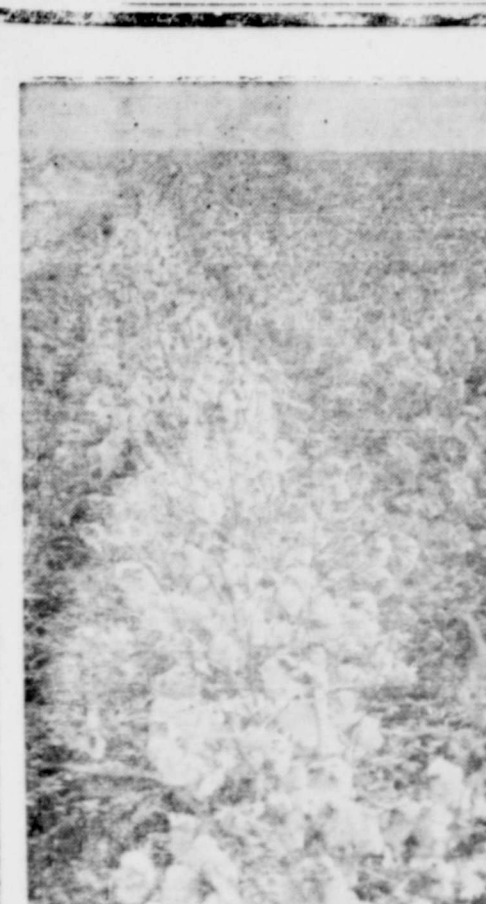

RESTORATION

At the time of the assembly mentioned in last week's article Alexander Campbell and none of the others had been baptized. (They had been sprinkled, but sprinkling is not baptism). They continued to meet for studying the word of God and observing the Lord's supper for about a year, and searching for the original order of worship and religious practices, guided only by the Word of God. Finally during the month of June, 1812, from this careful investigation of the Word of God alone, accepting it word for word as recorded by inspiration, Alexander Campbell reached the conclusion that no person but an adult ought to be baptized; that is a character who could believe God's Word, repent of his sins, and acknowledge Jesus Christ as Lord of all. He came to the conclusion that baptism was by immersion and that it was for the remission of sins, even as the apostle Peter had declared in Acts 2:38.



With this firm conviction he set out to find some one to immerse him, and made a lengthy journey up the country to the home of one Elder Luce, a Baptist preacher. On the journey he passed by his father's house and his sister Dortha informed him that from her study of the Bible she had decided that infant baptism was untaught. Alexander told her of his findings and conclusions and that he and his wife were on their way to secure Elder Luce to immerse them. Upon discussing the matter further his father and mother along with a few others decided to make the remainder of the trip with them. When they came to Elder Luce, a large crowd assembled on the banks of Buffalo Creek to witness this unusual procedure. Alexander and Thomas Campbell both spoke to the audience assembled and explained their reasons for taking this step and requested Elder Luce to immerse them upon the simple confession made by the couple as recorded in Acts 8:37. When the request was made Elder Luce replied, "It is contrary to Baptist doctrine to baptize upon the simple confession made by Peter, but I believe it to be the truth." (The confession referred to is, "Thou art the Christ the Son of the living God" (Mat. 16:16) and is in substance the same as that of the couple in Acts 8:37.) Then at the risk of being turned out of the Baptist church he immersed them in the name of Christ for the remission of sins.

Question: What did that make of them? What led them to do that? None of the religious bodies of that day so taught. The only influence in the world to cause it was the Word of God. It meant the giving up of Presbyterian doctrine, a thing just as near and dear to them as anything is to any who may chance to read this. It meant the cutting loose from family ties, but their one purpose was to be pleasing to the great God of Heaven and earth. By the simple confession of their faith, and their complete determination to live by the teachings of the Bible only, when they were then immersed in water baptism for their sins; were they not the same thing that people were in the city of Jerusalem in A.D. 33, as recorded in the second chapter of Acts, when they did that same thing? If not why not? They obeyed the same Word which is the "seed of the kingdom." When people in Acts 2 were baptized for the remission of their sins the Lord added them to the church (Acts 2:47). If Alexander Campbell and those with him did the same thing as the people in Acts 2, did not the Lord do the same thing for them as in Acts 2? If people today do the same thing as recorded in Acts 2, will the Lord not do the same for us today as then? If he added to the church then, those that obey Him, and if he adds to the church today those that obey Him, WILL HE NOT ADD THEM TO THE SAME CHURCH?

The Word of God produced Christians and Christians only in the first century, and none will deny this, did it not have the same power in the days of Alexander Campbell? Did it not produce the same thing then as in the first century, Christians and Christians only? Will not the Word of God and that only produce the same thing today? Christians and Christians only, if not, why not?

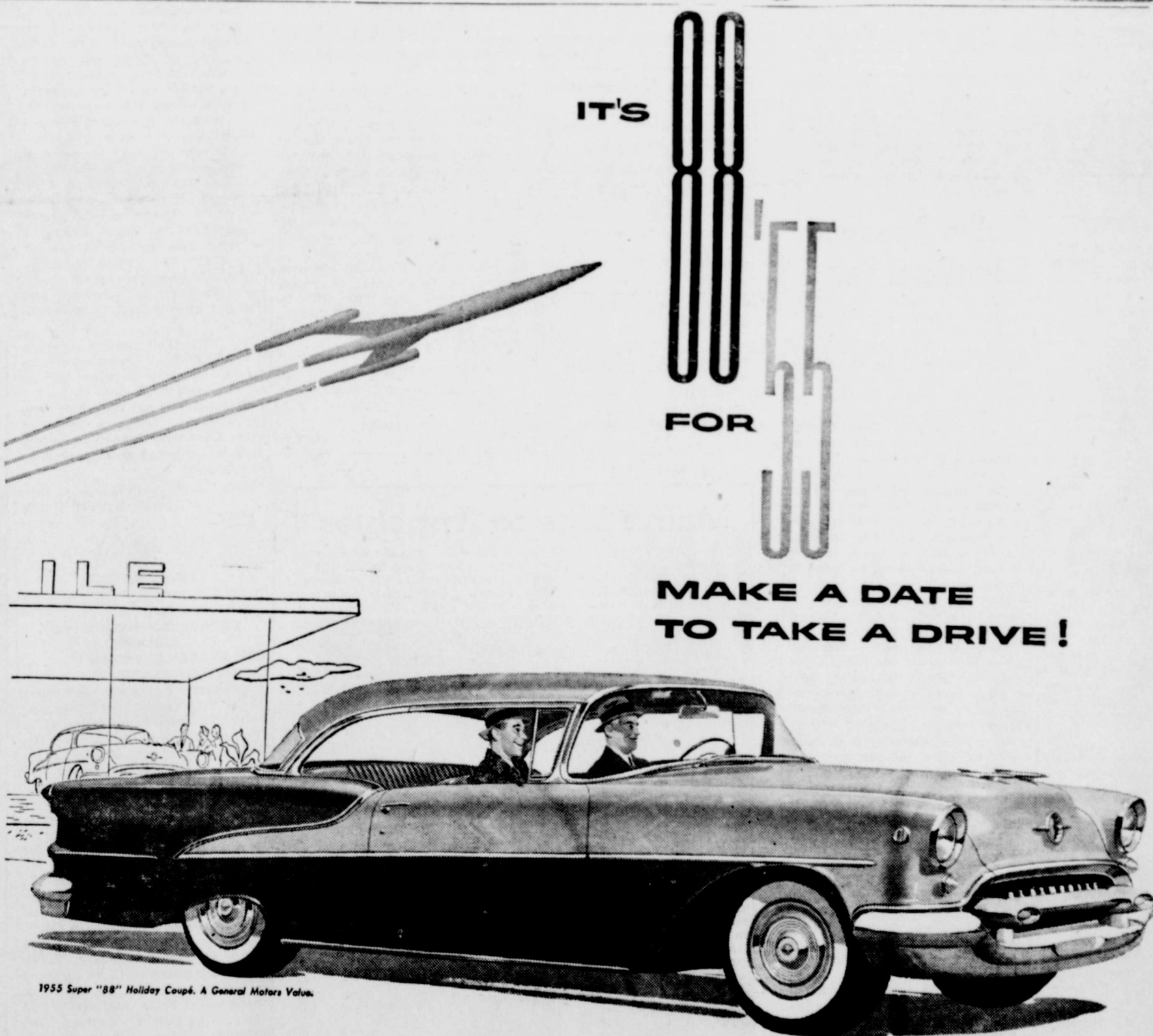

Corbin Opposes Additional Tax

AUSTIN—Declaring his opposition to any form of "sales tax" whether in the form of additional gasoline sales tax or cigarette sales tax, Sen. Kilmer Corbin of Lubbock today pledged a fight to the finish against the sales tax proposals before the Texas Legislature.

In his statement, Sen. Corbin pointed out that Gov. Shivers, in his message to the Legislature, recommended a 50 per cent increase in the gasoline sales tax—from four cents to six cents per gallon—and an additional one-cent increase in the cigarette sales tax. In addition, the senator declared, the 100 per cent recommended increase in the cost of tuition at state colleges—from \$50 to \$100 per year—amounts to nothing more than a sales tax on education.

"There are too many other untapped sources of tax revenues to justify increasing the heavy load of sales taxes already borne by the people of Texas," the South Plains legislator declared. "Until such time as these sources carry their fair share of the tax load, I will never vote to increase the sales tax burden on the people of Texas."

Sen. Corbin emphasized that taxes on the natural gas being carried out of state in the long-line interstate pipelines would be paid largely by industries and people living outside Texas, just as would additional taxes on the other natural resources of Texas which are being rapidly depleted without the people of Texas receiving a fair tax return.

"Oil gas and sulphur are being carried out of Texas as fast as the out-of-state owners and users can get them to the markets," he continued. "Once those resources are gone from Texas, they can never be replaced, but the people of Texas can demand that the State receive enough income from its natural resources to build permanent improvements, such as highways, schools and state institutions, to stand as a monument to the resources we once had. If they continue to deplete our resources without leaving something of value in their place, then our grandchildren and our great grandchildren can well ask: Why did you stand aside and let the out-of-state industrial giants pillage our natural resources?"

Sen. Corbin praised the program for expansion of state facilities and highways and pledged his support in getting the recommendations for such expansion and improvement adopted. But he re-emphasized his firm position that the program should be financed by some means other than additional sales taxes on the people of Texas.

REPORT FROM AUSTIN

By Rep. J. O. Gillham

We had some nice rains in this area yesterday and last night which was much needed. We heard reports that the South Plains might have gotten some moisture also. The area around Austin has been very dry and a lot of rain is needed to restore pastures and to bring the lakes back up to normal.

I have been receiving a lot of mail concerning my county government reorganization plan. I have received more than one hundred favorable letters, telegrams and newspaper editorials, and have had only four letters opposed to the plan and they were received from some present office holders who feared for their own jobs.

I want to discuss the plan in more detail with you this week. Let me say first that I am not interested in any personalities and am only interested in revamping our antiquated nineteenth century county government set-up so that we can have more efficiency and at the same time save considerable money that could very well be used for other needed purposes. I am not after any person's job, but I do think that a system of government set-up in the nineteenth century is not adapted to this year of 1955, and that we should have the courage to make such changes in the system as will promote efficiency and economy.

I think that a great many misconceptions have gotten out concerning the whole plan. Some have the idea that all county offices will be abolished, which is not true. My plan simply combines the

duties of some of our offices, thereby, eliminating some offices at a savings to the taxpayers.

My plan calls for the abolishment of the office of County School Superintendent. This office is costing the taxpayers of Texas approximately 2½ million dollars per year and we have approximately sixty counties which do not have a single common school district. We have many more which only have one or two common schools; hence the work of the county superintendent's office is almost nil in a great many counties. Although my plan calls for the abolishment of this office, it will not become effective until January 1, 1959, since all county superintendents were recently elected to new four-year terms. The abolishment of this office can be accomplished by enactment of the Legislature, while the other parts of my county government reorganization plan will have to be accomplished by the passage of a constitutional amendment, to be voted on by the people in November 1956. The resolution calling for the amendment to be submitted to the people will first have to be passed by the Legislature. I have introduced HJR No. 22, which will place this proposition before the Legislature.

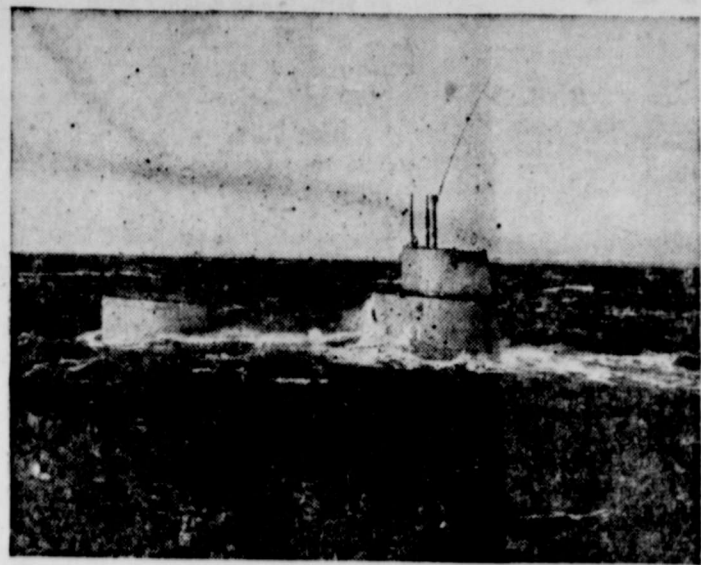
To state the proposition very simply, my amendment would abolish the office of County Treasurer, Constable, Justice of the Peace and County Surveyor. The duties of these offices would be taken over by other county offices, which will have new names in some instances.

The recording functions of the present county clerk's office would not be disturbed, although the office is renamed County Recorder. The county recorder would also act as Treasurer of the county and would take over the reporting of vital statistics now done by the Justice of the Peace. The County Recorder would also be a member and Secretary of the County Board of Supervisors, which takes the place of the present Commission.

of county clerk would be transferred to a new office of Clerk of the Courts. The new Clerk of the Courts would take over all court

responsibilities and duties. In counties having less than 50,000 population, the County Attorney would also act as District Attorney. I think that in a great majority of the counties, the offices of District and County Attorney could be combined, resulting in great savings to the taxpayers and would be a more efficient set-up.

The County Attorney would also be a member of the County Board of Supervisors. The County Board of Supervisors is created to take the place of the present Commissioner's Court. The board would consist of one man from each precinct elected by the voters of each precinct, the same as our present Commissioners are elected. The only difference in my Board of Supervisors and the Commissioners Court is that the Board of Supervisors would be more of a legislative or policy making board than the present Commissioner's Court. The Board of Supervisors would consist of the County Judge, who would be Chairman, the County Attorney, the County Recorder and the four precinct supervisors.

My plan calls for the abolishment of the Justice of the Peace office, transferring the duties of this office to the County Judge. The County Judge would be required to be a lawyer in my plan. My reason for this requirement is that, under my plan, his duties are largely judicial and the jurisdiction of the county court is greatly enlarged. Under my plan the County Court would have jurisdiction in all felonies, all civil cases involving less than \$500.00 and concurrent jurisdiction with the district court in all civil matters involving sums from \$500.00 to \$2,000.00. I think that under my plan we would have a more efficient court set-up in all our counties, resulting in giving faster and more dependable service to the people in court matters. The County Judge would also act as

seven in all. This board would set up the policies of the county government and all moneys of the county would be spent under their direction. The board would be authorized to appoint Road Supervisor, whose duty it would be to supervise all the road work of the entire county. This Road Supervisor would be employed by the board and could be discharged by them for any good reason. Under my plan all the county road and bridge funds would go into one fund, the county would need only one pool of road machinery, not four as we have now in many instances. This alone would result in great savings to the counties. In many of our counties now each commissioner has his own road machinery and employees and in many counties there is a great deal more machinery than needed and many more people working for the county than are actually needed. This one part of my plan would result in the savings of many thousands of dollars to the counties of Texas, and, I firmly believe, give us a more efficient operation. My plan calls for the salaries of all county officials to be set by law as now.

I hope that the people will look at my plan in an unprejudiced manner, and remember that I am not interested in personalities or in getting any particular person's job eliminated. I am only interested in giving Texas counties a more efficient government and in effecting the saving of many millions of dollars, which I believe we can use for the betterment of our great state.

Our state hospitals, our state colleges, our public school system, our highway department and many other divisions of our governmental set-up need more money. We must begin to concentrate on ways and means of effecting some savings in government by modernizing and streamlining, rather than taking it for granted that the only thing

to do is pass some more tax bills. I believe that we are fast approaching the time when taxes — Federal, State and local — will destroy our government. This Legislature is faced with providing the money

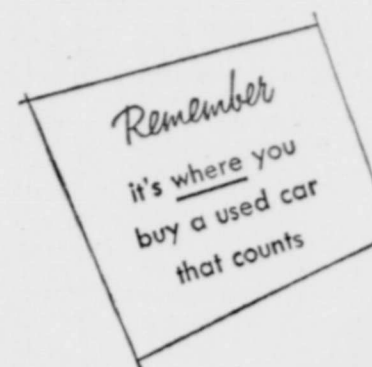
for a deficit of approximately sixty million dollars and every tax that is proposed draws strong opposition from someone. We all believe that the other fellow ought to have his taxes raised, but not

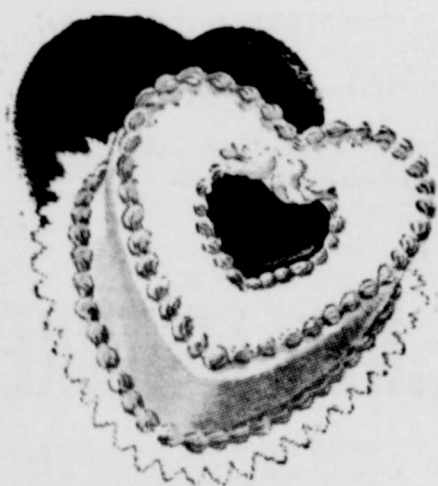

AND WHO WAS CAIN . . . ?

This is published in the interest of Brotherhood Week, February 20-27, sponsored by the National Conference of Christians and Jews.

In Southern Michigan prison, which is just over Cooper St. hill from my office, are hundreds of men who bear the Mark of Cain.

And who was Cain? The man whose crime is the first recorded in the Bible, the murder of his brother.

But outside of that great prison—the largest in the world—are thousands upon thousands of others who share the guilt of Cain in a scarcely lesser sense.

Because it was Cain who asked of the Lord in slurring sarcasm: "Am I my brother's keeper?"

His obvious answer was, "No." And that is the answer of the thousands who turn their faces against others in a negative response to the question, "Am I my brother's keeper?"

They not only turn against individuals but as well groups and races. They blanket all with the sins of the few in an arrogant intolerance.

And they belong to no single class, sect or race.

They say: "I was insulted by a Jew. I hate Jews."

"I found a Methodist, who went to church on Sunday, violating his marriage pledge on Tuesday. Methodists are hypocrites."

"I know those Catholics. I used to live next to a Catholic family. They never missed early mass, but they threw their rubbish in my backyard and their kids broke windows in my house. I want nothing to do with the Catholics."

And so it goes among those who bear in a somewhat lesser degree the Mark of Cain—hatred of their brothers.

It is only small men and small women who thus damn millions for the sins of the few.

In the big prison, which is so near my desk, are Episcopalians, Catholics, Jews, Negroes, Methodists and Mennonites. Criminals all. But outside in this city, which is close to the prison, are fine, understanding friendly Episcopalians, Catholics, Jews, Negroes, Methodists and Mennonites.

How can any man deny with Cain his kinship and his responsibility for his brothers simply because some among every sect and race are evil?

Living near a prison perhaps is helpful to an understanding of the need for brotherhood. Many—too many—of the more than 6,000 convicts out in Blackman township are there because of hate and intolerance for the frailties of others. And many—too many—might have been saved from imprison-

ment had someone at the right moment shown the spirit of brotherhood and accepted the responsibility of a positive response to the Scriptural question, "Am I my brother's keeper?"

AUSTIN, Texas — Austin is full of "land-grab" investigations. Attorney General John Ben Shepperd blew the lid off veterans' land sales to start the movement and the lid is still sailing. Both houses of the legislature have their own investigating committees. Also, peering in the "land block sale" scandals are grand juries in Travis and DeWitt counties.

Voting to conduct a full investigation, the House set up a committee composed of Representatives Joe Burdett, Wade F. Spilman, Virginia Duff, Reagan R. Huffman and Jesse Osborn. Burdett is chairman; Spilman vice-chairman.

Recalled by the Senate investigating committee, headed by Sen. Dorsey B. Hardeman, was Attorney General Shepperd, for testimony under oath, at the request of Sen. Jimmy Phillips.

Because of Phillips' line of questioning, Rep. Leroy Saul charged that the senator was preparing to run for attorney general and using this investigation for "personal publicity."

Shepperd testified that minutes of the Veterans' Land Board showing him present and voting for individual applications were erroneous. He said that the board didn't pass on the applications... former Land Commissioner Bascom Giles.

The same practice is being followed under the new chairman, J. Earl Rudder, Shepperd said. Shepperd also said he didn't use his influence as a board member to get favors for any applicants. He further stated that a 1953 letter from G. Curtis Jackson Jr., Zavala County attorney, complaining of black land deals by C. O. Hagan, was not seen by him until after the investigation started.

Shepperd filed the first two of a prospective long list of suits to forfeit black land deals and recover the money paid land operators.

G. Curtis Jackson Jr. was a defendant named in one of the suits. Shepperd testified that Jackson was identified in one of the land deals.

Shepperd's first two suits were against L. V. Ruffin and B. R. Sheffield, both of Brady, and J. Paul Little, G. Curtis Jackson Jr. and W. R. Stallings, of Crystal City. Ruffin was sued for \$150,000; the latter for \$150,000. Sheffield was identified as a former business associate of Bascom Giles, who quit as land commissioner and veterans' land board chairman on Jan. 1. Giles refused to testify before the Senate committee on his business relations with Sheffield and other land

operators.

Rep. Dolph Briscoe Jr., author of the House investigation measure, also introduced a bill providing 10-year prison terms and \$10,000 fines for using deceit, fraud or duress on veterans, or false or forged documents in land deals.

Insurance Committee Action

Corrective insurance bills have run into a slow-down. Four were heard by a House Committee including one to regulate insurance company securities. All were sent to a sub-committee for two weeks.

In the Senate the insurance committee heard two bills. One would fix a \$75,000 minimum capital and surplus for new legal reserve life companies, all in cash. One requires examinations of legal reserve life agents. Both were referred as monopolies — for the big companies and were sent to sub-committees.

Legislative committees moved slowly on a mass of other bills awaiting their action.

Several labor bills were heard. One by Sen. George Parkhouse, dealing with "the Port Arthur situation," won favorable action. It would permit picketing only by employees representing a majority of the workers of a struck firm.

Another bill by Parkhouse would prevent pickets from interfering with common carrier service to a struck plant; and would fine or jail common carrier employees for refusing to cross a picket line.

Water Committee Busy

Two committees studied water legislation. Rep. Harold Parish's constitutional amendment for a \$200 million bond issue and a 1-cent property tax was reviewed by the constitutional amendments committee, and held over for action.

Sen. Dorsey B. Hardeman's constitutional amendment for a \$100 million bond issue and a 3-cent tax awaiting committee action.

Another House committee heard arguments on a bill for setting up a water commission. In the Senate, two rival plans by Senator Hardeman, who was chairman of the water resources study committee, and Sen. Crawford Martin, call for a water commission... one appointive, the other elective. All three would abolish the present Board of Water Engineers.

Miscellaneous

Attorney General Shepperd convened his 17th annual law enforcement conference in Austin with David Bria, "Mr. District Attorney" of TV, as a featured speaker.

A new drive for more stringent prohibition laws, including the possibility of an attempted constitutional amendment for something like the old prohibition law, is talked. Conference here by the Texas Council of Churches and the Council of Methodist Women may be the springboard.

Legislators are studying an A&M College report that Texas farm population has slumped 47.9 per cent since 1940 — as compared with a 28.3 per cent decline for the rest of the nation.

In 1944 the farm population was estimated 1,126,000. That's 261,000 less than in 1950 and 1,297,000 under the record year of 1945.

Farms have increased in size to 517 acres average, or twice that of 1930.

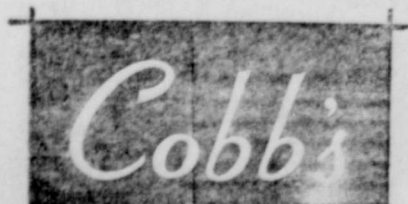
