\$14,000 SCHOOL BOND ISSUE TO BE VOTED ON

INSPECTION OF DAM IS MADE BY ENGINEERS

Directors of Flood Control District Seek Federal Funds to Build

LAKE WOULD BE NEAR MARGARET

\$4,803,000 Asked to Construct Dam, Mile in Length, It Is Made Known

Directors of the Pease River Flood Control District Monday voted to ask the Works Progress Administration to consider as the district's application one already filed by the Pease River Valley Development Association requesting funds for a dam across the river in Ford county, near Margaret.

The application was filed before the flood control district was created.

Col. Lunsford Oliver and Capt. J. S. Seybold, army engineers, inspected the site of the proposed dam Monday and attended the directors meeting.

Site for the proposed dam is near Margaret, seven miles north-east of Crowell. The application already on file for \$4,803,000 for the construction of the mile-long dam.

The newly-created district includes Wichita, Wilbarger, Cottle, Foard, and Hardeman counties.

The proposed lake would furnish a water supply for Quannah, Crowell, and Vernon in addition to affording irrigation to the district.

Original application for the funds through the WPA was held up pending the organization of a political unit. Following the delay the legislature passed a bill creating the Pease River flood control district. The bill was signed by the governor and nine directors named last week.

The new action is expected to open the way for the application to move forward through the regular WPA channels.

CAR AND TRUCK IN COLLISION

EAGLES TACKLE OLNEY IN NEXT GRID CONTEST

Game to Be Played in Olney; Local Cohorts in Playing Shape

Chillicothe Eagles next district grid game finds the lads traveling to Olney where they will square off against the Olney Cubs, runners up in the flag chase last year.

The local lads came out of the last Saturday game against Crowell in very good shape, not damaged enough to be handicapped against Olney, and therefore, are ready to tackle the Cubs all the way. The manner in which Coach Jim Muse has the boys working it will be no surprise to see them win—although to say they will beat the Bruins is going a little too far if the prediction is to be based on what the teams have already done. It happens the Olney team has met stiffer opposition, but in doing so succumbed before Vernon and more recently the Masonic Home team of Fort Worth. On the other hand the Eagles fell before Childress and Quannah, and in the first set for the district gave way to the Archer City Wildcats. In spite of the fact local fandom thinks the Eagles could have won had they played the usual calibre of ball, it must be remembered they didn't win and thus it must go into the lost column.

After Archer City won the Wildcats met Throckmorton and fell hard, being beaten out by a 19-0 count. Then the Eagles traveled some 190 miles to Throckmorton and won 12-2. The two points scored against the Eagles proved a break. It should have been a shut-out. Last Saturday Coach Muse's team lost to Crowell by a score of 6 to 0. So, figuring from a paper standpoint the Olney Cubs are better than the Eagles some two or three touchdowns.

SCHOOL BOARD SETS DATE OF NOVEMBER 16

Building Would Be Erected Costing \$25,000 For School Needs

\$11,000 AS GIFT WOULD BE MADE

Not Necessary to Hike Renditions to Meet Cost of Borrowed Money

Taxpayers of Chillicothe will decide on Saturday, November 16, whether or not the school will issue bonds totaling \$14,000 at 4 per cent interest to go with the \$11,000 gift from the Federal government to erect a \$25,000 building with equipment for school purposes.

The structure will house a modern gymnasium of several hundred seating capacity, room for home economics and vocational agriculture departments of the Chillicothe high school. These departments, one of the school board members asserted, will be moved out of the present high school building and will give ample class rooms for the high school for several years hence. He pointed out the need for more class rooms at the moment and predicted there will be even more students another year.

As for the high school auditorium it will not be disturbed until necessarily demands it be cut into class rooms, as it is the only place furnishing adequate facilities for meetings and entertainment.

At the outset the government first approved a tentative application for \$70,000, but later rescinded the approval, but would approve an application for \$25,000. The school board decided to accept the reduction, and after re-

GIN TURN-OUT IS ABOVE LAST YEAR

3,379 Bales New Total Set By Local Gins

Ginnings in Chillicothe reached a total of 3,379 bales up to last night at the four gins, figures given out this morning revealed. It is an increase by 772 bales over the figure set for the same time last year, there having been 2,607 bales ginned then.

The turnout in 1935, however, is shown at 11,985 for 1931 the ginnings were 9,154; the 1930 total was 4,298, and in 1929 were 1,665 bales.

Prognosticators are "laying low" of late, having about reached the conclusion Chillicothe ginnings will not hit the 10,000-bale mark as was predicted earlier in the season.

RAINFALL FOR OCTOBER GIVEN

1.85 Inches Precipitation at Underwood's

Rain observer C. W. Underwood announced this morning the total precipitation for the month of October is 1.85 inches, as compared to three hundredths of an inch rain that fell in October last year.

There are five record days as follows: October 9—0.07; October 18—0.45; October 24—0.31; October 25—1.00; October 26—0.92.

The total for the year is now 24.26 inches, already ahead of 1934, full twelve months total 4.86 inches, as 1940 inches fell during last year.

WHAT WE MAY EXPECT

The president of an eastern university sounded a warning recently when he said: "Nothing can threaten American industry and civilization more than some of this so-called social legislation. It is begging the unfit, and inviting the fit to join the ranks of the unfit."

This may seem a harsh view to take of the relief situation in this country. But it has in it at least the essence of truth. The sins of our philanthropic politicians are coming home to roost some day. We are making idleness so attractive that millions of persons now in this country will probably never work another day in their lives if they can avoid it.

WAR!

War, bloody and devastating, has been loosed in Africa by Europe's newest caesar, Benito Mussolini, premier of Italy. The nations of the world know the struggle for what it is, a ruthless war of conquest against an almost defenseless people, a shambles for which there is no reason other than territorial greed.

The world's efforts of the last 16 years to evolve an international formula for peace has been betrayed by a war-obsessed dictator, intention on conquering by force of arms the sovereignty and people of Ethiopia. His own sons and son-in-law lead the air squadrons which drop huge bombs to tear thousands of defenseless men, women, and children to pieces.

The League of Nations failed in its half-hearted efforts to prevent the Italo-Ethiopian conflict. Will the nations of the world make a really concerted effort to halt death and destruction now that it has begun? They can do so if they bury their petty differences, decide to act in unison, and strip the velvet glove from the mailed fist. For that league first can be all-powerful.

We in America are far removed from the conflict in Africa, and it would seem there is no possible chance for us to get mixed up in it. We want no part in European intrigues and squabbles, and our leaders at Washington well know this. But we cannot help forming opinions on certain matters and most of us join the general world opinion that this new war of conquest stands as one of the biggest blots on our boasted Twentieth Century civilization.

A lot of men are in danger of overworking themselves trying to live without work.

GIVE BUSINESS A CHANCE

Very few seem to question the reports that business is definitely getting better. The improvement may be slow, but it has been steady, and there have not appeared so many of the seasonal retrogressions of the past. Business seems to be consolidating the gains it has made.

This is good news for America. Most of us have sensed the improvement in conditions, and all of us hope that progress along this line will continue. The early fall pick-up has been noticeable, and prospects are for its continuance until the end of the year, at least. As we enter the first of next year, with the picture brighter than it has been since 1930, most of us are hoping and praying that nothing will develop to upset the business aspect.

In this connection two things must be remembered. We shall do well to avoid all things that will create business uncertainty. And we should curb inclinations to tax to death this growing business boomlet. Not only the federal government, but state governments as well, have fallen into these errors in the past. Therefore the voters should see to it that their legislators refrain from tossing monkey wrenches too promiscuously when law-making bodies meet again, soon after the first of the year. Give business a chance.

HOPING FOR MORE JOBS

The most striking anomaly of the recent business improvement is the apparent failure of employment to keep pace with the increase in production.

Estimates are that there still remain 10,000,000 unemployed in the United States. These same authorities say that scarcely more than 2,000,000 men and women have gone back to jobs since the summer of 1932. Government figures say that production has increased 45 per cent, and employed only 10 per cent. What is the answer to this seeming paradox?

Many explanations have been given. We have heard much about greater efficiency and labor-saving devices. But in neither of these lies the real answer. We must remember that increase in production always affects part-time workers before it can touch the wholly idle.

The greater part of the increase in production in this country has been accomplished by six-hour-a-day or three or four-day-a-week workers getting back to full-time employment. The result is that, while there may be almost as much unemployment, there is far less part-time employment. Figures for September show that hours are 18 per cent longer and payrolls 22 per cent greater than for the same month last year.

It is becoming evident that, with the exception of the building trades and certain of the iron and steel industries, the slack in part-time employment has been pretty well taken up. Continued industrial expansion and greater production will soon have most regular workers on full time. Then the mills and factories will be compelled to reach out into the ranks of the totally unemployed for additional help. When this time comes, we may expect to see unemployment dwindle just as rapidly as production gains.

FAMILIES REPAY LOANS RECEIVED

15,000 in Texas and Oklahoma Better Situated

STILLWATER, Okla., Oct. 24.—Fifteen thousand rehabilitation families in Texas and Oklahoma have worked themselves into an independent position, and are now repaying the loans made them, it was announced today by D. P. Trent, Director of Rural Resettlement in this region. "Families which will no longer need financial aid number almost half of the thirty-eight thousand listed as 'under care', Trent said.

Returning from Washington, where he was in conference with heads of the Resettlement Administration, the director said procedure is now being worked out, and allocation of funds made, under which the pick of rehabilitation families will be accepted for the new and permanent phase of Resettlement, under which they will be given opportunity to purchase small farms.

"This opportunity will no longer be confined to families taken from relief rolls," he said. "Families who gritted their teeth and stayed off relief are now eligible, as well as those who were not so successful or so determined."

Selection of families will be controlled by a local committee of volunteer workers in each county, to act jointly with the county supervisor of Resettlement and the county farm agent and home demonstration agent. These committees will also pass upon the program laid out for each family, and the amount of the loan. Committees have been at work in part of the counties for some time, and their organization in practically all remaining counties will be completed within a week or two.

One hundred and twelve thousand farm families in Texas and Oklahoma had a cash income of less than \$150 a year, even before the depression, he said, and were able to spend only \$5 a month for groceries and \$2.50 a month for clothing. "From a purely selfish standpoint, we must develop the spending power of such families," he said, "in order to build a market for the goods and services with which the rest of us want to supply them."

Half the share-croppers of Oklahoma, he pointed out, went out of business in the past five years, partly because landowners

could no longer furnish them with teams and equipment. Other thousands were set adrift because of increased use of a large-scale machinery. "Many of these have been enabled through our organization to set themselves up on a more independent basis than ever before," he said. "Many are still on unprofitable land, to which they were driven by consolidation of better land into large, mechanized units. One of the objectives of Resettlement is to give an opportunity of moving away from these make-shift farms on which they will never be able to make a satisfactory living."

An increase of several hundred farms per county has been recorded recently, in some of the unfertile counties of Texas and Oklahoma, while more fertile counties have shown a corresponding decrease, as small farms were swallowed up in big ones.

Farmers are eligible for aid from Resettlement only when unable to obtain it from any other financial agency.

HEALTH TALK

By John W. Brown, M. D.
(State Health Officer)

The State Health Officer, Dr. John W. Brown, urges all parents of children from 6 months to 10 years of age who have not been immunized against diphtheria, to take them to the family physician and have this done at once. Last month there were 265 cases of diphtheria in Texas reported to the State Department of Health. This is an increase over the month of August and shows the need of stressing immunization of the children in this age group.

It was not so long ago that parents dreaded diphtheria because of the inability to prevent or cure this scourge. Now that we not only know the cause, but also the remedy there is no reason why this disease cannot be completely eliminated.

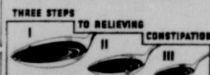
As diphtheria is most dangerous to the very young children, it is of the highest importance that immunization be given early. What is more, in young children there is practically no reaction to

the injection. Immunization has been proven to give absolute protection. It is in the power of the parents of this State, cooperating with their physicians and the health department, to eliminate the disease.

Most children can be protected against diphtheria by a single treatment—with what is known as TOXOID. However, in about six months the child should be given a Schick test to determine if a second treatment is necessary. Early immunization is a routine procedure adopted by modern and up-to-date physicians. Take to Air in Final Quarter
After Ground Work
Proves Futile

Betting on a muddy gridiron for three periods without either team scoring, the invading crew of Grady Graves, defending champions of 1934, none other than the Crowell Wildcats, let loose one pass, Saunders to Wiggins, in the closing period of a great battle, and it was successful. Wiggins crossed the Eagles goal line standing up to register the only count of the game, 6 to 0.

The visitors were forced to rely on the aerial play after their ground work proved futile. Only at times was McKown and mates able to count for yardage through an Eagles line. The lads of Chillicothe played a whale of a defensive game, and while it is true the Wildcats were the better team, first downs of 12 to 5 substantiating this statement, the Eagles were just as scrappy as their opponents. Mase's eleven were out-weighted some eight or ten pounds to the man, which, by the way, does make considerable difference when playing on a muddy field.

The game throughout was cleanly fought. Both teams waging a battle that kept some 1500 fans on their toes, thrilled at the aerial attack of the Wildcats only to see them broken up by the Eagles. Time after time the teams would point for a touchdown then an opponent would change matters.

Although the Eagles were predicted by some of the prognosticators to be some three or four touchdowns inferior to Grady Graves eleven, these same guessers were given a severe jolt as they saw how matters were going. What the game finally looked to be was a 0-0 deadlock, until Saunders and Wiggins finally worked a pass. Instead of a kick for the extra point Crowell tried to shove the ball over via the line, but the Eagles held to hold the count at the one touchdown. The whole army of players re-

presenting the Chillicothe high school colors did themselves proud before their homefolks. Failure to succeed with aerial plays proved their undoing while one was only needed for the Cats. Ramsey's ball-throwing was well-pointed but the field slowed up the footwork of receivers.

Crowell won the ball game, to be sure, but it was a great moral victory for Jim Mase and his team in the eyes of all Chillicothe fans. The line-up:

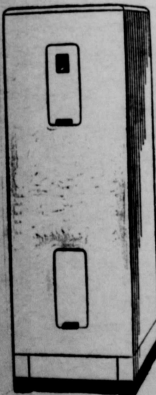

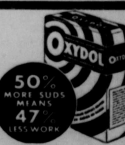

**MUCH SICKNESS DURING
WINTER CAUSED FROM

"If your home is inadequately heated," says the ad, "if you huddle in one room during winter, sudden temperature changes are unavoidable. Even the brief time that it takes to answer the telephone in an unheated hall is sufficient to bring on a cold. This happens many times a day in the average home in this territory and each time it happens the occupants of the house have made themselves susceptible to highly communicable winter diseases."

In an effort to assist its customers to protect their health, the gas company has enlisted doctors, public health authorities and others in the educational program. They are advocating proper ventilation and uniform temperatures throughout the home in every room. A booklet entitled "America's Public Health Enemy Number One," gives vital facts on heating.

VOCATIONALLY SPEAKING

Timely Topics as Viewed By Local Instructor of Vocational Agriculture

Hog Prices Highest in 6 Years

"Prices received by farmers for hogs, at \$10.22 per 100 pounds live weight on August 15, reached the highest level recorded in more than 6 years," states Crops and Markets in the October 14 issue. "Prices at local farm markets advanced \$1.82 from July 15 to August 15 as hog marketings dropped precipitously. Only 635,000 head were slaughtered at eight primary markets during the 4 weeks ended August 16, as compared with 760,000 head during the preceding 4 weeks and 1,400,000 head in the corresponding period of 1934."

How About 1937?

Corn and hog producers realize the necessity of looking ahead more than one year in determining their farming operations. Without an adjustment program to follow that of 1935, the stage is set for another major upswing in hog production, beginning this fall and reaching its peak in 1937. If the feed situation and the price of hogs in relation to the price of corn are as favorable as present conditions indicate—assuming no 1936 program is decided upon—another increase of 25 to 30 percent in the number of pigs farrowed in 1937 may be expected. This would mean a 1937 pig crop 50 to 70 percent larger than the 1935 crop.

A considerable increase in hog production is desirable for the standpoint of both farmers and consumers, since hog numbers were too drastically reduced by the drought. But an unlimited increase in hogs is not to the interest of either producers or consumers. An undue increase in hog numbers means lower prices, smaller incomes, and less buying power for corn and hog producers. When farm incomes fall, a huge market for industrial products is lost.

Almost every factor in the present situation points to an even greater increase in hog production in the next three years from the

1935-36 level than in any previous period, that is, if farmers do not cooperate to control production.

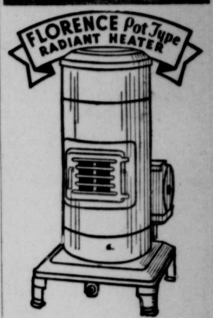

In fact he has made himself liked by one and all; especially is this true with closer friends. Yet, at times what he learned in France pops out, for instance on Armistice Day. Well, does he remember the last celebration.

"I did have a good time in France in spite of the fact I was afraid I was going to be captured by some of those Boches. Well I remember the time when along with a bunch of other American soldiers, camped throughout the night in a trench, the Cap early the next morning ordered all out and to advance. I knew then my time had come. I got to thinking of all the good times spent with some of my old boy friends in Texas; how my best girl looked when I de-

'If that's all that's troublin' you, double-time and then get to thinking what you're goin' to meet in a few minutes,' as he guffawed. 'Well, Cap, that is the helluva it. I have been thinkin' too much about it already.'

Evidently the scrap Harvey put up proved successful. He is back in his home land, healthy, and still full of life.

Harvey Rufus Carr was born in Mississippi in 1889. That makes him forty-five years of age. He looks it—every year of it—and while denying he is that many summers past, friends know better. When he was just 20 years old he hiked off to Texas—whether it was hitchhiking, riding the rods, or the cushions nobody seems to know. Anyhow, he got to Texas and finally found out where his uncle lived, Phipp Spears of the Jackson Springs

community. Harvey found lodging for several years right there. Then in 1918 he answered to the call of the colors, spent his time as has been mentioned, in France, back to the good old USA where he was discharged—honorably, of course—and whether or not it was the miss who saw him leave and return—Lera Frith, daughter of Will Frith—it stands, however, that this young lady agreed to wed him on condition he live a straight and narrow path as all husbands are supposed to live. This he agreed to do. Fortunately, it is well wives do not know everything a husband does.

Even so, Harvey and Mrs. Carr are the proud parents of two children. One is a girl, Clara, the other a boy, Rufus, 14 and 12 respectively. They are fine children and the parents are aware of that.

About eight years ago Harvey convinced F. L. Moffett he was one of the best farmers in this section of the state. His argument won. Undoubtedly he told the truth or else Mr. Moffett would be saying, "Harvey, you are a nice boy and all that, but there are lots of 'em in this grand old world of ours, but all nice boys are not nice cotton growers. You are one of them."

"I have resided at Center Point several years—like it fine. I like the neighbors. A good bunch of people. Yet, their weakness is playing jokes on one another. Of course my character would be far better, I am sure, were it not for O. K. Tooley, Barney Chandler, Homer Johnston, Charley Emerick, and some of the others out there who tell on you, regardless of what you do—tell your wife, too, which is the worst thing of all.

**Marble Machines
Given Extensions**

The last issue of this paper carried a notice to all operators and owners of marble machines setting a deadline on them at Saturday night, October 26, 1935. These machines, as stated in that notice, were declared to be "gambling devices" and the notice applied to Hardeman county. Since that notice was published the officers of the three counties in a 46 Judicial District met in Vernon and came to the following decision:

"We have decided to all work together and set a definite date on the marble machines and the time they are to go out. The owners of the machines themselves want to carry a case to the Court of Criminal Appeals at Austin and we wish to be as fair as possible about the situation.

Therefore, we do hereby grant them an extension of one month's time in order to carry this case to the Court of Criminal Appeals at Austin, which is the court of last resort relative to these cases, and the final date on them will be December 1, 1935. However, should the court rule on the case prior to December 1, 1935, and rule in favor of the State of Texas, then the machines will have to be withdrawn from operation at that time. Should the court not have ruled on the machines by December 1, 1935, then this date shall remain final and the machines will have to be withdrawn from operation. This date is final and the owners and operators of the machines shall consider same so and effective without further notice. This applies to the whole 46th Judicial District which is composed of the following counties: Hardeman, Wilbarger and Ford."

The controversy over the legality of the marble boards arose some time ago. At the outset the Attorney General made a ruling to the effect that they were gambling devices. This was only the opinion of the Attorney General and was not the law. The question arose at that time and the machines were closed in Hardeman county at that time. Then later there was an injunction granted to the machine owners restraining the officers from entering the machines. This injunction was procured during the absence of the district judge of this district and when the District Judge returned he promptly dissolved the injunction and the machine owners took an appeal to the Circuit Court of Civil Appeals at Amarillo. While this case was on appeal the Court of Civil Appeals at Waco made a ruling on the machines and stated that they are gambling devices. The Court of Civil Appeals at Amarillo then rendered their decision affirming the actions of the District Judge in dissolving the injunction. They stated, however, that in order to get a final decision the case should be taken to the Court of Criminal Appeals at Austin which is the court of last resort for the machine owners and should they fail in that case then the machines are definitely out of operation and illegal.

The machine owners say they are going to have a case on the criminal side of the case in Benjamin, Texas, on the 28th of October, and shall immediately carry the case on Appeal to the Court of Criminal Appeals at Austin by a writ of Habeas Corpus and the case should be finally decided within 15 days and at the most not more than 30 days. As the law now stands the machines are illegal as per the decision of the Court of Civil Appeals, and the officers of this district are willing to give the owners and the operators every reasonable doubt.

Therefore, the extension of the time. This has been a topic of conversation for some time and discussed pro and con. It will be a relief to many to have this question finally decided. The date set for the time when the machines are to go out in this district definitely, remains at December 1st, or before, and applies to the whole district and the owners and operators are so notified.

DIED TODAY FROM
STROKE PARALYSIS****Had Practiced Medicine In
Chillicothe For Forty-
four Years**

Dr. T. M. Young, long-time resident and practicing physician of Chillicothe, died at about five o'clock this morning.

Funeral services are to be held this afternoon at 4 o'clock from the First Methodist Church with the Rev. G. S. Hardy of Clarendon, assisted by Rev. R. T. Breedlove, pastor of the church, officiating. Interment will be in the Chillicothe cemetery.

Dr. Young had been in ill health about five years, his condition gradually weakening him. Sunday night he suffered a stroke of paralysis which proved fatal.

He was born in Linden, Tenn., March 28, 1857, having reached an age of 78 years, 7 months and 3 days.

The deceased received his medical degree at Vanderbilt University, Nashville, Tenn.
