OVERSEAS SUBSCRIPTIONS FOR NAVY MEN REQUIRE REQUEST

Effective July 1, all magazine and newspaper subscriptions for members of the Navy, Coast Guard and Marine corps overseas will require the submission to the publisher of a written request from the serviceman or woman for the newspaper or the magazine, postal officials announce.

This is the same regulation which has been in effect several months on overseas subscriptions for army personnel, requiring the publisher to show the postmaster a written request from the serviceman before papers may be mailed.

If you wish your serviceman to receive his home paper after July 1, please have him write us direct requesting the paper so we may file the request for postal officials inspection.

SEARCH FOR MISSING PILOT IS ABANDONED

Second Lt. John Neil Harrell, 23, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Harrell of Southland, formerly of Monroe, is missing on a local flight from Sarasota, Fla., since April 5. His plane, a P-51, which he piloted as observer for another pilot flying on instruments, disappeared after a climb to 10,000 feet, and was never seen afterwards.

Search for the plane and pilot, conducted by every source available to the army, and aided by the navy and coast guard in the area, was carried on for 30 days, then the search was announced as abandoned.

Lt. Harrell, graduate of New Deal High school, lacked only part of a semester on his degree in agricultural economics at Texas Tech when he went into the air corps Feb. 24, 1943. His first cadet training was at Maxwell Field, Ala., and after training at Bennettsville and Sumter, S. C., he took his advanced training and received his wings and commission at Marianna, Fla., March 12, 1944.

He was an instructor in instrument and contact flying at Greenville, Miss., until last November when he was assigned to transitional training for combat flying. He was receiving instruction in combat flight at Sarasota Army Air field when his plane was lost.

Lt. Harrell was born near Shallowater, Sept. 2, 1921.

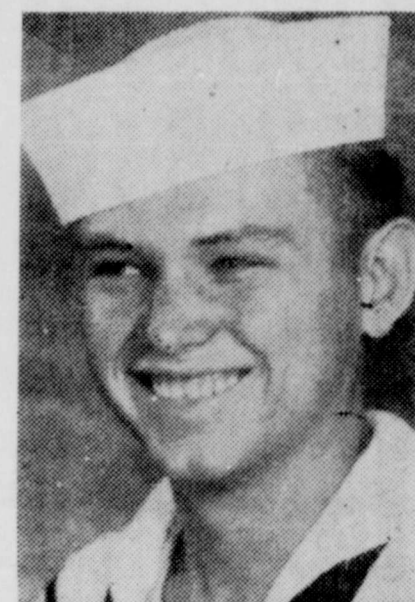

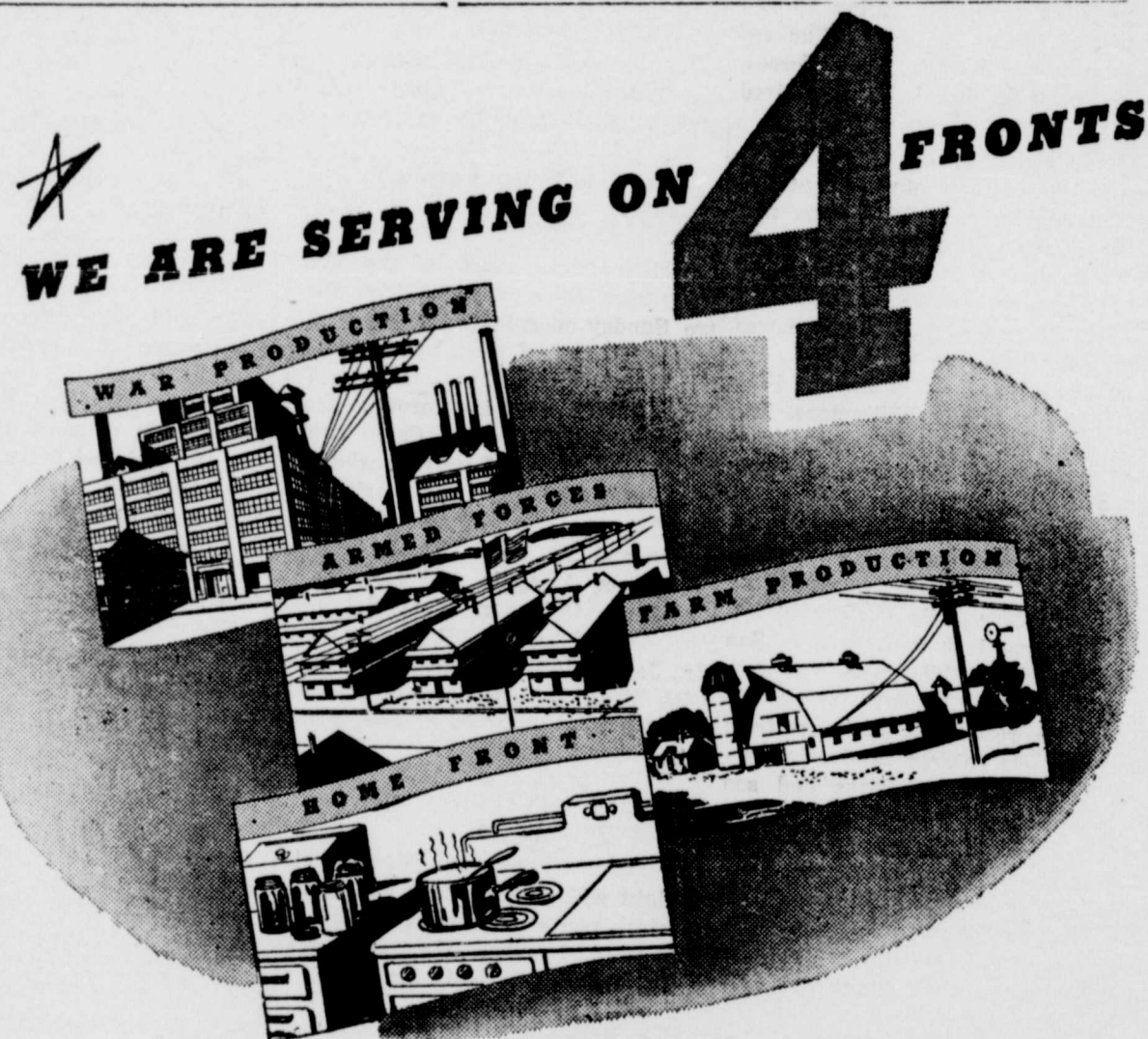

Nationwide Campaign Underway to Check AUTOMOBILE BRAKES . . .

An Automobile Brake Check Program, sponsored by the International Association of Chiefs of Police, in cooperation with Government agencies, started April 15, and will end June 1. Purpose of the program is to help save passenger cars from the scrap heap, to maintain adequate transportation for war workers, and to reduce traffic accidents. In 1914, it is estimated, some 250,000 cars were scrapped after they were damaged beyond repair in accidents. To determine whether your brakes are adequate to stop your car in time, a simple brake check is recommended . . . The check is made by placing an object one inch thick at the base of the brake pedal, and pushing down the brake pedal. If it stops the object before the brakes begin to take hold, they are inadequate and may be in dangerous condition. Between April 15 and June 1 traffic officers will check passenger cars involved (1) in accidents, (2) in traffic violations in which cars are moving, and (3) cars operated in a manner indicating faulty brakes.

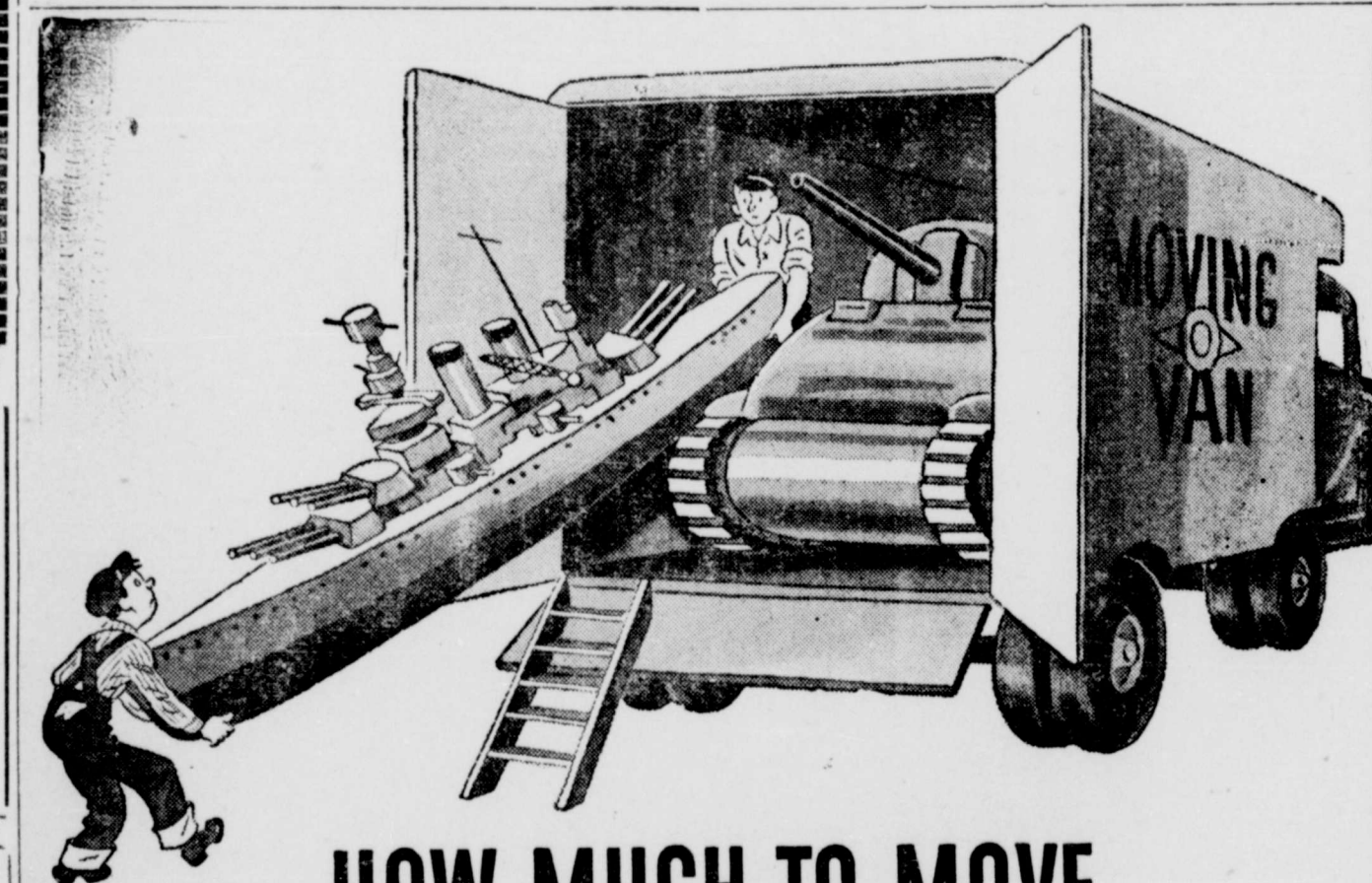
