## Constitution? Don't query U.S. teens

WASHINGTON (AP) - Three-quarters of all American teen-agers know what city has the ZIP code 90210 (Beverly Hills), but only one-quarter know in what city the Constitution was written (Philadelphia).

And 81 percent know that the musical group Hanson is made up of three brothers. Twenty-one percent know how many lawmakers are in the Senate (100), the National Constitution Center said Wednesday.

The group is building a museum in Philadelphia designed to make Americans more familiar with the Constitution.

There is some good news: Nearly 74 percent know that Al Gore is vice president. But that's well below the 90 percent who know that Leonardo DiCaprio was the male star of the movie "Titanic."

Too few Americans have even a basic working knowledge of their government, especially the Constitution, Philadelphia Mayor Edward Rendell told a Senate Appropriations subcommittee.

"I believe that building this museum and reversing this tide of ignorance is absolutely critical to the health of our democracy," said Rendell, who is chairman of the center. "The Constitution doesn't work by itself. It depends on active, informed citizens."

Groundbreaking for the "experiential" museum is scheduled for Constitution Day, Sept. 17, 2000. Rendell is asking Congress to approve a \$20 million contribution toward the museum this year, and the center hopes the government eventually will contribute half the \$130 million cost.

The center's survey was released a few days before the start of Constitution Week, Sept. 17 to Sept. 23, an observance that will mark the 211th anniversary of the signing of the Constitution.

The nationwide telephone survey of 600 teen-agers between the ages of 13 and 17 had a margin of error of plus or minus 4 percentage points. It also found that:

- Only 41 percent of American teen-agers can name the three branches of government, but 59 percent can name the Three Stooges.

- Seventy-four percent can name the city where cartoon character Bart Simpson lives (Springfield), but only 12 percent know where Abraham Lincoln lived (Springfield, Ill.).

- Less than 2 percent recognize James Madison as the father of the Constitution, while 58 percent know Bill Gates as the father of Microsoft.

- Nearly 95 percent can name the actor who played the Fresh Prince of Bel Air (Will Smith) on television, but only 2 percent can name the chief justice of the Supreme Court (William Rehnquist).

- Twenty-five percent know at least one of the constitutional rights the Fifth Amendment protects. Nearly 64 percent know what "The Club" protects

## LABOR DAY No early start for youngsters this weekend

Thanks to a different football schedule this year, school kids won't get an early start on the Labor Day holiday.

Last year, the Whitefaces traveled to Lovington, N.M., for the first high school football game of the season, and the Hereford Independent School District let out classes at noon to allow students and teachers make the trip to southeastern New Mexico.

This year, however, the Whitefaces opened the season Thursday in Amarillo, so teachers and students will observe normal class hours Friday. The school district will observe the holiday on Monday, with classes resuming Tuesday morning.

All city, county and federal offices will be closed Monday for the holiday, and the Deaf Smith Public Library will be closed Saturday, Sunday and Monday.

Financial institutions will be closed Monday to observe the holiday, although many businesses will be open.

Also, the U.S. Postal Service will not make residential or business mail deliveries and mail will not be distributed for postal box patrons.

The deadlines for advertising copy for Tuesday's issue of *The Hereford Brand* also have been changed to accommodate the holiday schedule. Deadlines for Tuesday classified advertising will be 3 p.m. Friday, while the display advertising schedule is 5 p.m. Friday. The newspaper office will be closed Monday and will reopen at 8 a.m. Tuesday.

Also, drivers, beware! As you cruise the streets of Hereford over the holiday weekend, be sure to buckle up. And, put your children in child safety seats.

The Hereford Police Department once again will implement the STEP program for the holiday weekend. STEP is a zero-tolerance policy on seat belts, child safety seats and unrestrained children.

The program will begin Saturday and run through Tuesday.

As in the past, extra officers will be on patrol specifically to check for the use of seat belts and safety seats. The STEP program is endorsed by the Deaf Smith County District Attorney's Office, the Deaf Smith County Hospital District and the school district.

The purpose of the STEP program is not to raise revenue, but to help prevent accidents with injuries related to the proper use of seat belts and child safety seats.

Also, the Texas Department of Public Safety predicts as many as 34 people could die on Texas roadways over the holiday weekend, according to The Associated Press.

"The Labor Day weekend is traditionally one of the worst holidays in terms of traffic deaths," Col. Dudley M. Thomas, DPS director, said. "People need to take their time and not drive aggressively, keep away from alcohol if they're driving and keep themselves and their children buckled up."

Operation Motorcade, which includes stepped-up traffic enforcement by the DPS, runs from 6 p.m. Friday through midnight on Labor Day.

Last year, 40 people died in 36 traffic crashes during the 78-hour period.

Half of the 1997 fatalities were related to alcohol, which according to the agency is far above what is considered the norm for Texas. Failure to use seat belts also was a strong factor - 19 of those who died weren't buckled up.

State troopers will continue their no-warning policy for seat belt violations. In addition to DPS troopers being out in force, local law enforcement agencies

## Almanac banned from the Texas prisons

DALLAS (AP) - The Texas Almanac is banned in Texas prisons for fear that escaped convicts will find its detailed county maps, with seemingly every little road, creek, mountain and railroad marked out, a little too useful.

"A map would be of great assistance if you were planning to go over the wall," says Larry Fitzgerald, spokesman for the Texas Department of Criminal Justice. "Once they're outside the walls, they go, 'Ooh, I'm out here. What do I do now?' A lot of times they won't have any idea really where they are, what road leads to where."

The publisher of the almanac, *The Dallas Morning News*, isn't upset about the ban. Instead, the paper sees it as a breakout marketing opportunity.

*The Morning News* recently ran an advertisement

for the almanac that bragged: "The powers-that-be feared that inmates might use the detailed county maps to plot escape routes. We're not making this up. If the maps are so good prisoners aren't allowed to read them - imagine what they can do for you."

Fitzgerald says the almanac (\$12.95 in paperback, \$19.95 in hardback) has been banned for years - at least the five he's been with the prison system.

As one example of why, the map for Polk County - the densely forested East Texas home of the Terrell prison unit - includes the tiny towns of Pluck and Ace, Piney and Menard creeks, an Indian reservation and several railroad lines.

The American Civil Liberties Union doesn't think the ban treats unfairly on inmates' rights. Says Jay Jacobson of the ACLU of Texas: "I think one might

be able to express a legitimate security concern with a detailed map that shows nooks and crannies, every hill and dale."

But defense attorney Tom Mills of Dallas complains that the restriction is just another example of how prisons focus on punishment rather than education.

Other banned reading material includes hardcore pornography, hate writings, and outdoor magazines that show how to build weapons or hide in the woods.

It was through a 1996 letter from officials at the Terrell unit that almanac editor Mary G. Ramos learned of the restrictions.

"They sent us a form saying the almanac had been banned because it contained contraband," she recalls. "We had a good laugh over it and put the form in a frame and hung it on the wall."

## Budget ready

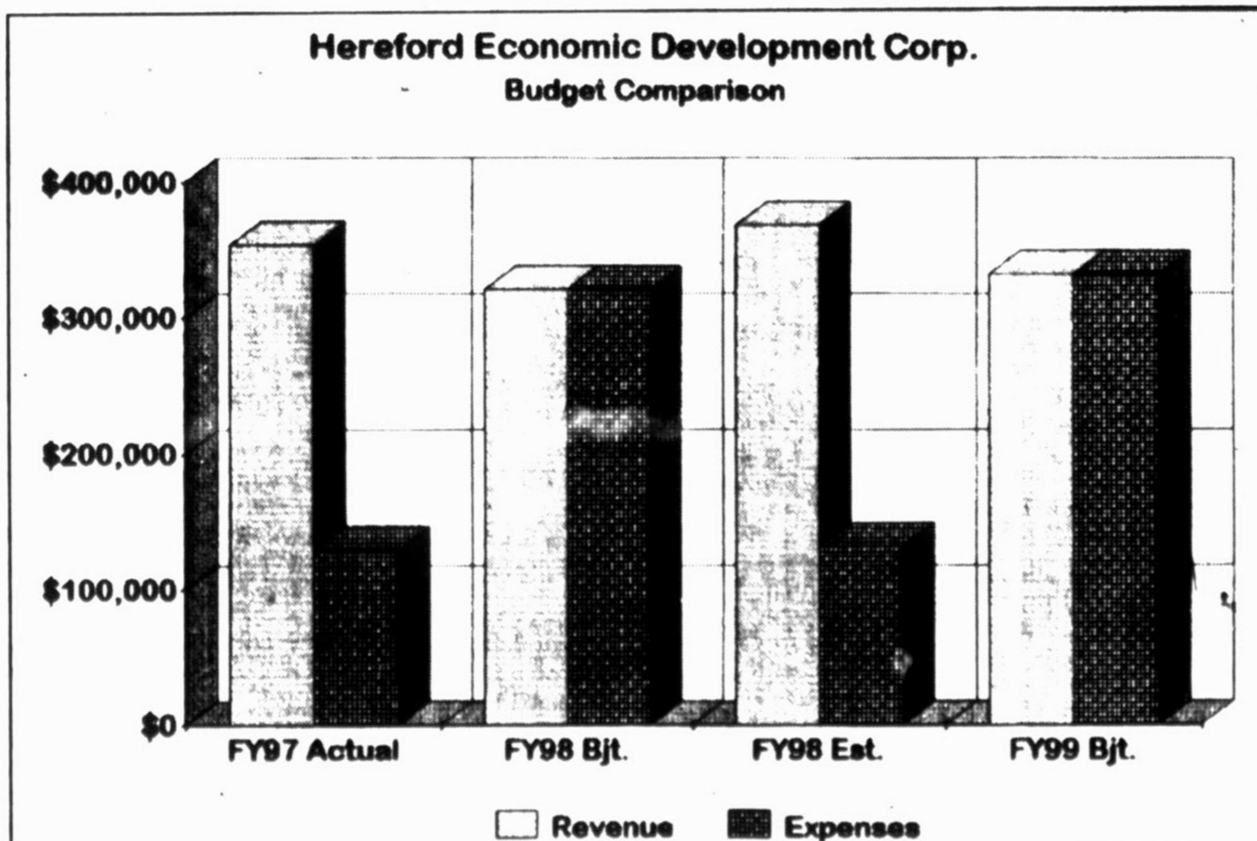

Hereford Economic Development Corp. directors and the Hereford City Commission are being asked to sign on to a budget anticipating less revenue and spending in next fiscal year.

#### Man draws almost 500 years in child pornography case

CORPUS CHRISTI (AP) - A Corpus Christi-area man was sentenced to nearly 500 years in prison after he admitted he sexually molested five young girls and used some of them to produce stacks of child pornography. Jeffrey Alan Orr, 50, of Flour Bluff, will never have a chance to be paroled, prosecutors said.

Orr pleaded guilty Wednesday to nearly 200 separate counts, including four counts of indecency with a child and more than 150 counts of possession of child pornography.

"We cannot tolerate those who prey upon our children. We wanted to be sure there was not a chance he'd be in the community," said Assistant District Attorney Missy Medary. "The children of Nueces County are now safe from Jeffrey Orr."

Orr changed his mind and pleaded guilty Wednesday about 30 minutes before the second day of testimony in his trial was to begin. He told defense lawyer Juan Gonzalez he was ready to plead guilty.

#### Show double-checks data in Kennedy assassination

DALLAS (AP) - A laser beam will retrace the trajectory of the bullet that killed President John F. Kennedy as ballistic experts for a TV show double-check data submitted to the Warren Commission.

Associated Television International is producing a documentary to be shown on the TNT cable channel in November.

"The JFK Assassination Files" is not trying to debunk the Warren Commission report that Lee Harvey Oswald was the lone gunman - or champion theories of a conspiracy, said producer Dan Goldman.

"The show will not be leaning or slant in any direction," Goldman said Wednesday as the production team set up equipment in Dealey Plaza, where Kennedy was gunned down on Nov. 22, 1963.

Dallas police have agreed to close Elm Street for several hours Thursday and Friday as the crew films experts re-measuring the angles of bullets Oswald is believed to have fired from the sixth-floor window of the Texas School Book Depository.

#### INS rounds up legal immigrants over DWI convictions

DALLAS (AP) - Hundreds of legal immigrants are awaiting deportation in detention centers across Texas as part of a federal initiative aimed at immigrants with three or more drunken driving convictions.

The Harlingen, El Paso, San Antonio, Houston and Dallas districts of the Immigration and Naturalization Service all have taken part in the secretive initiative dubbed Operation Last Call.

Officials scheduled news conferences for today to announce the arrests. Dallas INS spokesman Lynn Ligon said about 150 immigrants are being detained here, and estimated that each of the other four Texas districts had arrested about the same number.

Another 150 people are still being sought in the Dallas area.

#### Elsewhere:

**NUKE DUMP:** Demoralized by the Senate's overwhelming and expected endorsement of the Texas Low-Level Radioactive Waste Disposal Compact in Washington Wednesday, anti-nuclear activists from West Texas pledged to derail the dump when the Texas Legislature convenes in January. The dump is set to be built outside of the town of Sierra Blanca.

# Commission approves \$4.4 billion merger

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP) - State regulators say a Texas telecommunications giant can make a corporate connection with Connecticut's main telephone company.

The Connecticut Department of Public Utility Control on Wednesday approved a \$4.4 billion merger between SBC Communications Inc. of San Antonio with Southern New England Telecommunications Corp.

The deal gives SBC a foothold in a region now dominated by Bell Atlantic Corp. SNET executives have said that the dominance of giant telecommunications companies forced them to look for a merger with a larger company.

In a joint statement, SNET and SBC called the decision "great news for Connecticut, for SNET customers and employees and for share owners of both companies."

Attorney General Richard Blumenthal and officials from the state Office of Consumer Counsel had sought to block the merger, or at the very least, make the deal contingent upon rate reductions for customers. Regulators did neither.

A consultant hired by the attorney general had predicted shareholders would reap more than \$200 million in savings, and Blumenthal wanted those savings passed on to customers.

Connecticut consumers were clearly shortchanged by this shortsighted, ill-advised decision," Blumenthal said Wednesday. He also was concerned that SBC would discontinue SNET's newly-introduced cable television service, Americast, which currently has about 18,600 customers in select Connecticut communities. In 1996, SNET was the first business in the country to be granted a statewide cable franchise, and SNET officials said they intended to have the state completely wired for cable service by 2007.

However, SBC has previously eliminated similar cable operations in California and Texas, and state regulators declined to require that SBC maintain the cable service beyond two years after the merger.

SBC spokesman Larry Solomon would only say the company will evaluate Americast's profitability once the merger is complete.

The deal, to be done in a stock swap worth an estimated \$4.4 billion, still requires approval from the Federal Communications Commission. The companies hope to win that approval by year's end.

State regulators said they would require SBC to maintain staffing levels in Connecticut. SNET employs roughly 9,000 people, and SBC has pledged to increase the number to nearly 10,000. SBC will maintain SNET's headquarters in New Haven and operate under the SNET name.

The approval came during a strike by 6,300 operators, technicians and customer service representatives

against SNET. The employees with the Connecticut Union of Telephone Workers and the Communications Workers of America began picketing Aug. 23 after negotiators failed to reach an agreement on wages and health benefits. Negotiations were scheduled to resume this afternoon.

CWA union organizer Russell Davis said the merger approval had been expected but the contract still must be hammered out with SNET. SBC has promised to abide by whatever pact SNET reaches with the unions. CWA represents about 75,000 SBC employees across the country.

"We are now in the process of working with other union members at SBC to pressure SNET to come back with an offer we can accept," Davis said. "Our main concern is that as part of the merger agreement, there is an improvement in the labor climate."

Founded in 1898, SNET is the main provider of local phone service in Connecticut and controls about 30 percent of the state's long-distance market. Earnings last year were \$192.8 million on revenues of \$1.9 billion.

SBC is the dominant local carrier in the Southwest and West Coast, operating under brand names including Southwestern Bell, Pacific Bell, Nevada Bell and Cellular One. SBC has more than 116,000 employees and reported 1997 earnings of \$1.47 billion on revenues of \$24.86 billion.

SBC also has struck a deal to acquire Chicago-based Ameritech, which operates in Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Michigan and Wisconsin.

LOS MOCHIS, Mexico (AP) - Hurricane Isis slammed into the Mexican mainland early today with 75 mph winds and heavy rains, drenching the state of Sinaloa as it headed north along the Gulf of California toward Arizona.

The high winds rocked trucks and blew down road signs, forcing authorities to close the main coastal highway. Hundreds of people were evacuated to shelters.

But there were no immediate reports of injuries and the storm was expected to weaken as it moved over land, the U.S. National Weather Service in Miami reported.

Before dawn, the center of the hurricane was just southwest of Los Mochis, the weather service said. It was moving north about 10 mph and may eventually shift westward.

The government news agency Notimex reported that 2,500 people were evacuated to shelters in Baja California Sur state.

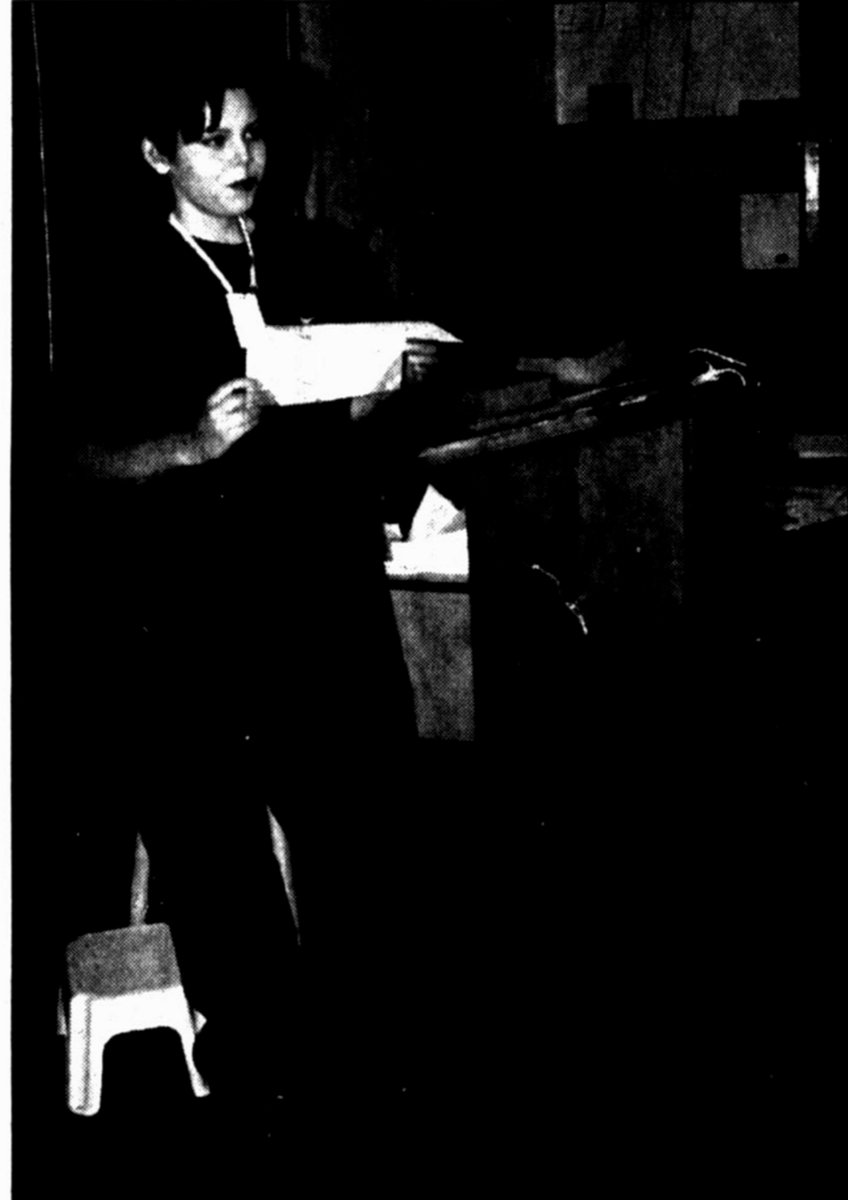
In the port city of Mazatlan, flooding was reported in 15 neighborhoods and the army was helping residents evacuate. Forty-nine shelters have been set up to provide evacuees with food, clothing and medical attention, Notimex reported.

A hurricane warning was in effect today for a 260-mile stretch from Dolores to Punta San Gabriel on the east side of the Baja California peninsula and a 400-mile stretch from El Dorado to Bahia Kino on the mainland. A tropical storm warning was issued effect for 300 miles on the west side of the peninsula from Puerto Cortez to Punta Eugenia.

With Isis toward the west and Hurricane Earl in the east near the Florida coast, heavy rains fell in much of Mexico.

On Wednesday, when Isis was still a tropical storm, it wreaked havoc on the Baja California peninsula, cutting power and electricity and forcing thousands of residents from their homes.

One woman was killed and her husband was missing after they tried to cross a stream in Los Cabos on the southern tip of the peninsula, said Emigdio Suarez Aguilar, a civil protection official.

## Beets execution stay vacated

### Husband killer returned to Henderson County

TYLER, Texas (AP) - A federal judge has cleared the way for a new execution date to be set for a woman convicted of murdering her husband and burying his body under a wishing well in her front yard.

The body of another husband was found buried beneath a storage shed in the back yard of her home.

The stay of execution was vacated Tuesday by U.S. District Judge John H. Hannah Jr., who ruled that the execution of Betty Lou Beets can go forward.

Mrs. Beets was convicted and sentenced to die in 1985 for the August 1983 murder of her husband, Jimmy Don Beets.

The order from Hannah, made public Wednesday, apparently clears the way for the woman to be returned to Henderson County to have an execution date set.

Henderson County District Attorney Donna Bennett said late Wednesday she had not seen the order.

"Until I see the order, I am not going to say anything," she told the Tyler Morning Telegraph.

Mrs. Beets has received two stays of execution since her conviction in October 1985.

A federal court ruled in Tyler in 1991 that defense lawyer E. Ray Andrews of Athens should have resigned to testify in her trial instead of representing her because he was a material witness.

The woman was accused of murdering her husband so that she could collect his insurance or pension benefits.

The 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals rejected her appeal and the case was returned so that Hannah could rule on 23 remaining alleged constitutional violations which Mrs. Beets' lawyers claimed hampered her right to a fair trial and resulted in the unjust imposition of a death sentence.

Hannah discussed each claim and denied them.

"The court finds no violation of Mrs. Beets' constitutional rights that would entitle her to the relief she seeks," Hannah wrote.

The woman's husband, a Dallas firefighter, disappeared Aug. 6, 1983, and his fishing boat was found drifting on Lake Athens. He was presumed drowned, but no body was found following a lengthy search.

Mrs. Beets was attempting to collect insurance and pension benefits for her husband when she was arrested and charged with capital murder on June 8, 1985.

Authorities allege she murdered Beets and buried the body with help from her son, Robbie Branson.

The body of her fourth husband, Doyle Wayne Barker, was found buried beneath a storage shed in the backyard of her home.

Court records showed that she also shot another former husband, Bill Lane, but he survived.

Dear Grateful: What you have written is more than a letter -- it's a sermon. Thank you for making an enormous contribution to my readers today.

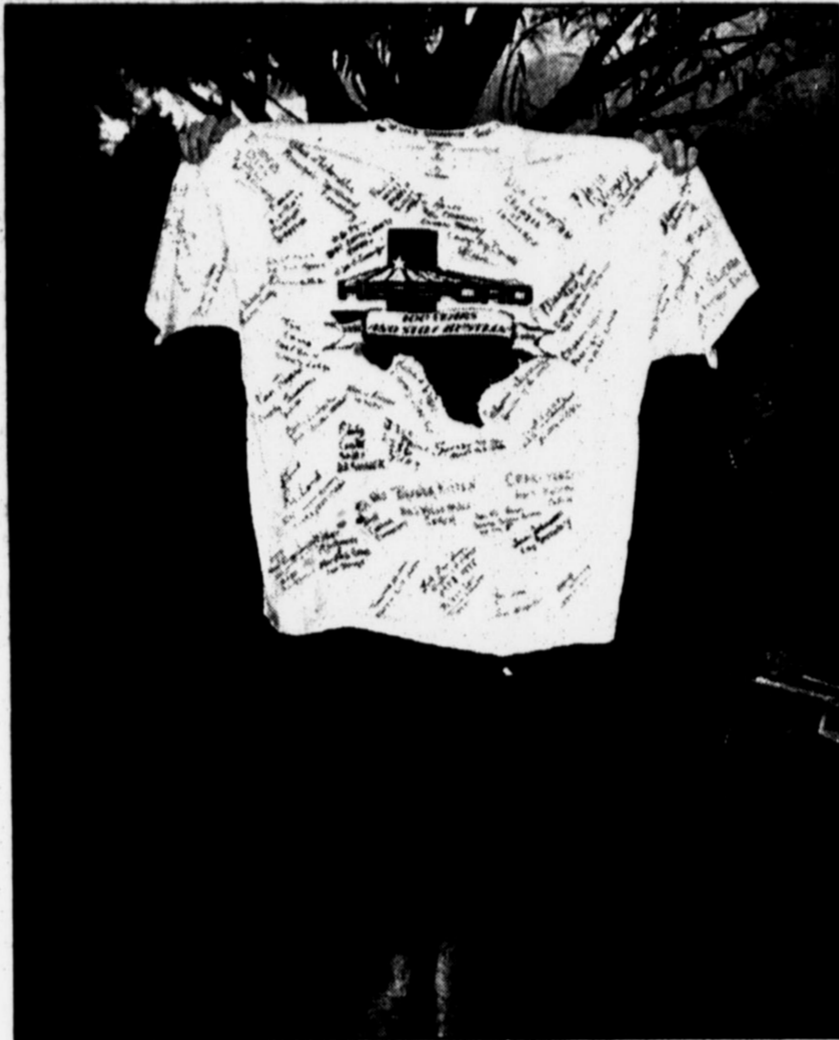

## To Your Good Health

**DEAR DR. DONOHUE:** A little while back, you answered a letter from a woman whose granddaughter had spherocytosis.

A year ago, my sister was diagnosed with the same disease. Neither parent has the disease. Of the five children in our family, she is the only one who has it.

It took several years before my sister found a doctor who tested her for spherocytosis. My sister was 30 years old at the time her spleen was removed. Both of her children have tested positive for the disease. Please elaborate on this illness. — V.N.

**ANSWER:** Spherocytosis is an inherited anemia. The fact that neither parent had the illness can be explained in two ways.

Your sister could have the kind of spherocytosis where both parents are carriers of the gene but do not show signs of illness. A child who gets one spherocytosis gene from his mother and one from his father comes down with spherocytosis anemia.

Perhaps your sister, during embryonic development, suffered a change in her genes — a mutation — that led her to acquire the illness.

Spherocytes are odd-shaped red blood cells. A normal red cell has a central indentation as though someone stuck a finger in the center of an unbacked cookie. Spherocytic red cells

are "spheres," looking like globes.

The spherical shape of the red blood cell decreases its life span. The spleen has a robust appetite for spherocytes, gobbling them up prematurely.

Signs of spherocytosis are signs of anemia. The affected person feels worn out. Climbing a flight of stairs can leave the person gasping for breath. From time to time, the skin might turn yellow. Strangely, spherocytosis patients often form gallstones at an early age, even as young as the teens.

When symptoms make life miserable, spleen removal almost always returns a patient to an active, normal, long life.

**DEAR DR. DONOHUE:** My 53-year-old daughter drinks a case of Pepsi every day. She has done this for many years and says it's good for her. I strongly disagree. Will you please comment on this? — E.M.

**ANSWER:** A case of Pepsi every day? That's a volume of staggering proportions.

Does your daughter have any teeth left? Bathing her teeth with sugar is an invitation to tooth decay.

A 12-ounce can of Pepsi has 160 calories. These are "empty" calories, having no substantive nutritional value — no vitamins, no minerals, no essential amino acids. The case of Pepsi kills her appetite for more

wholesome foods.

Each 12-ounce can of Pepsi contains 38 milligrams of caffeine. A case provides a generous caffeine jolt. She must be wired more tightly than a drum.

Pepsi is my favorite soft drink. However, a case a day is far too much for anyone's health.

**DEAR DR. DONOHUE:** For the past six or seven years, I have occasionally seen blood in my semen. I have consulted with my regular physician and with a urologist. I have had annual prostate exams and PSA tests, all of which have been normal. The physicians both say: "Just don't worry about it." But I do. Any comments? — R.L.

**ANSWER:** Blood in ejaculation fluid makes every man nervous. Cancer springs to mind. But rarely is cancer the cause of blood in seminal fluid.

Inflammation of the prostate gland or the seminal vesicles — manufacturers of ejaculation fluid — can cause bleeding. For most, a cause cannot be found.

It's appropriate to check with the doctor when this happens, as you did. Neither doctor found anything to suggest trouble. With a normal examination and a normal urinalysis, a man can dismiss hematospermia — as the condition is called.

## Seles, Graf make it to third round

NEW YORK -- Monica Seles no longer wears her father's ring on a chain around her neck, and her all-black outfit was replaced by white on a hazy summer afternoon at the U.S. Open.

Though she still mourns, Seles has stopped treating tennis as a catharsis as she deals with her father's death. It is back to being simply a game, albeit a game at which she once was the best in the world.

It was an easy game for her Wednesday, as the sixth-seeded Seles reached the third round with a 6-2, 6-3 win over Joannette Kruger.

### THE U.S. OPEN

Seles was on an emotional roller-coaster when she reached the French Open final in June, less than a month after being at her father's side when he died May 14. She wore his ring on a necklace, and said playing was her solace amid sadness.

"I think it was different (in Paris) because it was so soon after

## Hereford, Rebels will inaugurate new Bivins surface

On paper, Amarillo Tascosa looks tough.

Seventeen returning lettermen from last season's 8-3 bi-district playoff squad, 11 players on the roster who weigh at least 200 pounds and a running back who some say is Division I material would appear to make the Rebels a formidable opponent.

But on the field, Tascosa lost last week. In fact, they were shut out 20-0 by Abilene High -- a perennial bottom feeder in District 4-5A.

So which Rebels will show up? The team that looks good on paper or the team that didn't look good on the field in their opener.

Hereford coach Craig Yenzler is concerned either way. The very fact the Rebels have a game already under their belts puts Tascosa ahead of the Whitefaces as they open their 1998 season at 7:30 p.m. tonight at the newly-turfed Dick Bivins Stadium.

"Certainly, their having gone through the game helps them," Yenzler said. "The live situation -- running the kicking game, getting your substitution patterns in order, and the first-game jitters -- that's a lot of things you get out of the way."

Yenzler, beginning his third campaign as Hereford head coach, will have 21 lettermen returning from last season's 2-8 squad. The 21 lettermen aside, the Whitefaces are still a young team.

And while the first game of the season is always a concern for any coach, it's even more of a one for Yenzler.

"We'll see how we handle it," he said. "It's just the first-game jitters. It's the same thing every year."

And besides the jitters, there are tangible concerns for the Whiteface coaching staff. The big

one is tailback Shawn Samuel, a 5-11, 181-pound senior.

Samuel, touted as a Division I prospect in the backfield, missed last year's 6-0 Tascosa win over Hereford at Whiteface Stadium with an injury. He may also miss tonight's game with the Whitefaces. Samuel sustained a hip injury early in the loss to Abilene High and his status is questionable.

"We've prepared just like he's going to play," he said. "We have a lot of respect for his abilities. He's scary. We've prepared for the worst and we'll hope for the best."

Fifth-year Tascosa coach Doug McCutchen has other weapons to worry the Whiteface defense.

Tascosa has a new quarterback in senior Byron Carter, who'll trigger a Rebel offense geared toward the option.

"I'm very impressed (with Carter)," Yenzler said. "He's a very good operator of the option game."

If Samuel doesn't go, taking his place in the Tascosa backfield will be junior tailback Marlon Brown. Expected to get the start at fullback for the Rebels is junior Aaron Johnson.

Another player to watch when the Rebels are on offense is tight end Rob Mansfield. He's one of the 11 Tascosa players who weigh in at more than 200 pounds. Mansfield comes in at 6-3, 230 pounds.

Tascosa's size is a weighty concern for Yenzler.

"They have a lot of big kids," he said. "They're a huge football team, both on the offensive front and the defensive front. That's a concern -- how well we handle the blocking."

A lot of that Tascosa size will be in the defensive line. The Rebels are expected to start senior Brett Jones (6-2, 262) at one

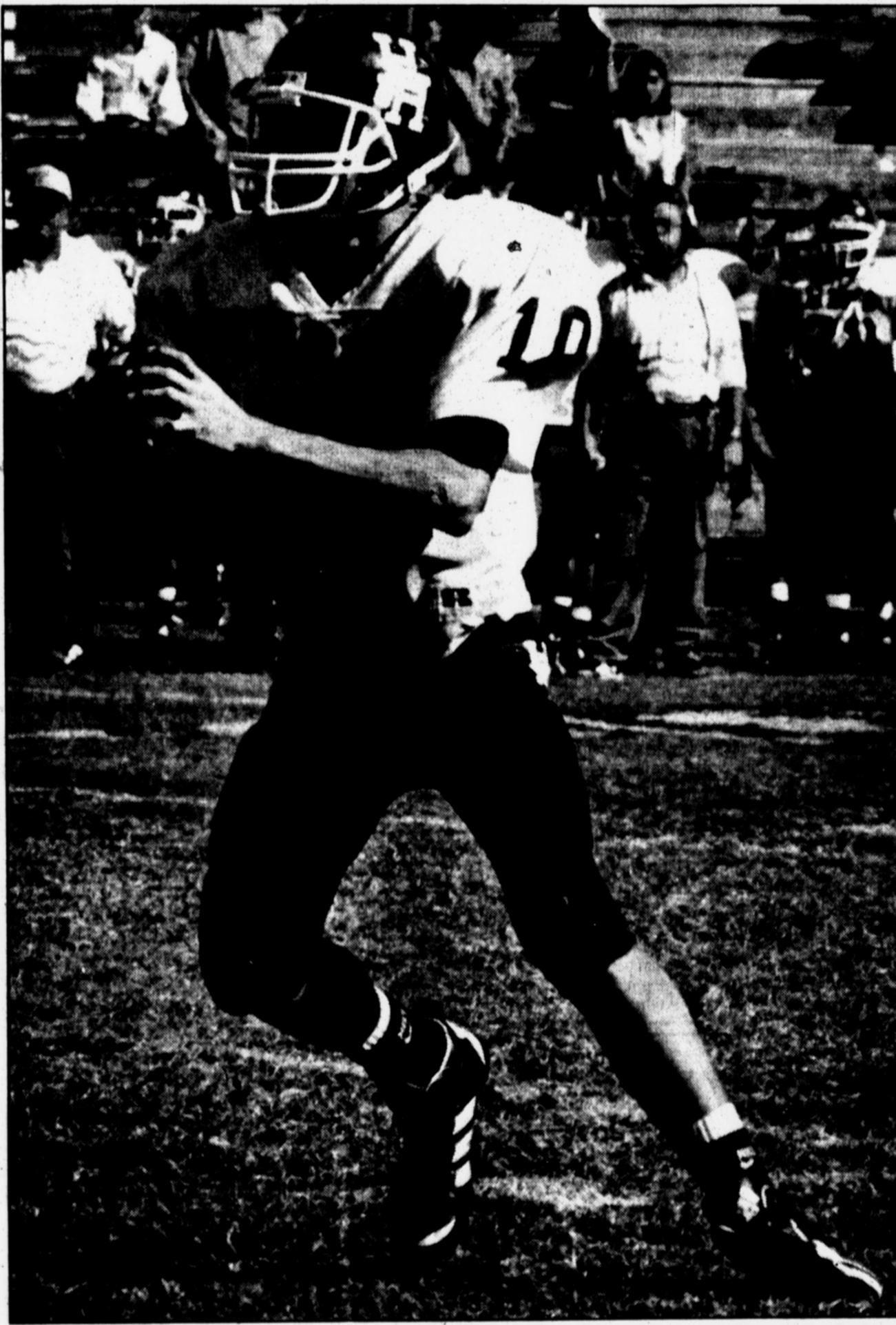
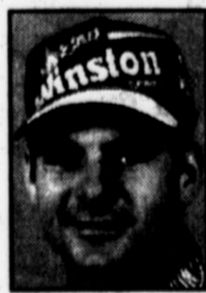

The original Winston Million bonus program awarded the big prize to any driver who won three of the sport's crown jewel races in the same year: the Daytona 500, the Winston 500 in Talladega, Ala., the Coca-Cola 600 in Charlotte, N.C., and the Southern 500.

This year the Winston Million was replaced by the No Bull \$1 million bonus, with different rules and the addition of the Brickyard 400.

Any driver who finishes in the top five at one of the five races and wins the next race in the series takes home \$1 million.

It has become a tremendous lure for drivers. Martin, who won the 1993 Southern 500 and has nine top-five finishes at the track, spent two days testing at Darlington last week.

"I could think of a million reasons to be here," he said, smiling.

Labonte also ran practice laps at Darlington in preparation for the Southern 500.

MIAMI (AP) -- Mark McGwire hit two homers for the second consecutive night Wednesday against the Florida Marlins, giving him a career-high 59. He needs just two more to tie Roger Maris' 37-year-old major league record.

McGwire homered in the seventh inning against Brian Edmondson and again in the eighth on the first pitch from Rob Stanifer. Each was a two-run shot.

The first, which landed halfway up in the upper deck in left field, was estimated at 497 feet, making it the third-longest in the history of Pro Player Stadium. His second homer 30 minutes later was to left-center and traveled an estimated 458 feet, giving the St. Louis Cardinals a 14-3 lead.

It was his eighth multihomer game this season and the 51st of his career.

Maris hit 61 homers in 1961. "I didn't expect to have 57 by Sept. 1," McGwire said before the game. "but when I got to 50, I began to think about the record."

## Houston bests Braves, 4-2

ATLANTA (AP) -- Randy Johnson did his part in one of the best pitching matchups of the season. Greg Maddux didn't.

Showing that power beats finesse -- at least, this time -- the Big Unit dominated Atlanta for eight innings and easily won the head-to-head showdown with four-time Cy Young winner Maddux as the Houston Astros defeated the Braves 4-2 Wednesday night.

Johnson allowed only four hits and fanned 10, the 99th time he's reached

double figures in strikeouts, second in baseball history to Nolan Ryan's 215.

Johnson batted in the ninth and began warming up for the final inning before feeling a cramp in his left leg. The trainer came out and then walked back to the dugout with Johnson at his side.

The Astros ace retired 14 of the last 15 hitters he faced before Billy Wagner worked the ninth for his 27th save despite giving up a homer to Andrew Jones.

During the three weeks that Letterman aired in the Greenville area during July, his A.C. Nielsen numbers on WSPA were a 3 rating and a 14 share. The infomercials got a 3 rating and a 12 share.

A rating point represents the percentage of all possible households tuned to a show. A share point represents the percentage of households watching television tuned to that show.

"I'm surprised," programming director Jimmy Sanders said Wednesday in *The Greenville News*. "But I think you have to put it in the context that it was a one-week experiment. The furor about this may have drawn more attention to it."

**ARNOLD SCHWARZENEGGER**  
SANTA MONICA, Calif. (AP) - Arnold Schwarzenegger says in a \$50 million libel lawsuit that the *Globe* libeled him by reporting he was in ill health and fears having a heart attack.

A *Globe* cover story headlined "Arnie's Heart Crisis" defamed Schwarzenegger by implying his health was poor after heart surgery last year, the "Terminator" star contends in a lawsuit filed Wednesday against the tabloid's publisher, *Globe Communications Corp.*

Schwarzenegger underwent surgery in April 1997 to replace a faulty aortic valve.

The *Globe's* Aug. 4 cover story "maliciously implied that specific doctors had warned Schwarzenegger that he was a 'ticking time bomb,'" said the actor's public relations agency, PMK.

"The physician quoted has never

While William had both parents with him when he enrolled, red-haired Harry, who is said to be easy-going and not too academically inclined, came only with his father. His mother, Princess Diana, died in a car crash a year ago Monday.

William was expected to leave for school late Wednesday.

# Prize-winning author dead

TIBURON, Calif. (AP) - Allen Drury, a longtime Washington correspondent who drew on his own knowledge to weave tales of political intrigue including the Pulitzer Prize-winning novel "Advise and Consent," died of heart failure on his 80th birthday.

Drury died Wednesday in a hospital near his home in Tiburon, said his publisher, Scribner.

"Advise and Consent," a tale of political betrayal and sexual scandal involving the nomination of a new secretary of state, was a bestseller that sparked speculation as to whether it was based on real politicians. Drury won the Pulitzer Prize for literature for the book in 1960.

Drury was covering the U.S. Senate for *The New York Times* when the novel he had been working on for seven years was published in 1959.

He gleaned the title from the Constitution: "The

Senate shall advise and consent to the president's nominations to the Cabinet."

"Advise and Consent" was made into a movie in 1962, directed by Otto Preminger and starring Henry Fonda, Walter Pidgeon and Charles Laughton.

A prolific author, Drury went on to write 19 other novels and five nonfiction books, many dealing with Washington politics. Some elicited criticism from liberals who tired of his conservative view of the Cold War and communist or Soviet threats.

"While he faced savage, scornful opposition from many, some of his closest and most enduring friendships were with honorable people who disagreed with him on this central question," nephew Kenneth Killiany said in a statement issued through Scribner.

Born in Houston, Drury was raised in Porterville and attended Stanford University.

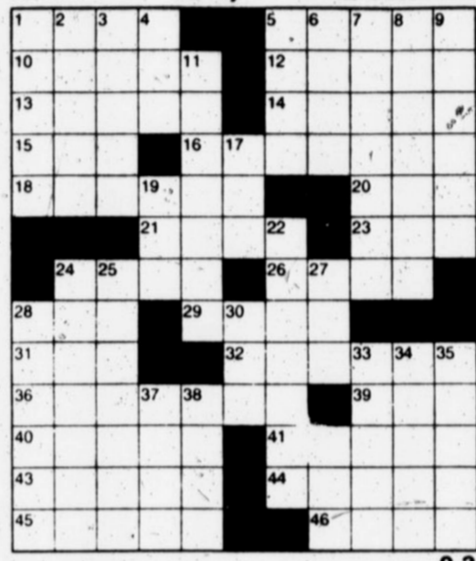

## New special counsel?

WASHINGTON (AP) - Attorney General Janet Reno is considering whether President Clinton's 1996 campaign tried to evade spending limits through the use of so-called "issue" advertisements, legal sources said today.

The sources said Reno is undertaking a 30-day review of the matter and the attorney general must decide by early next week if there is enough information to open a 90-day preliminary inquiry that could lead to appointment of an independent counsel.

The Washington Post reported that the president's private attorney,

David Kendall, met with Justice Department officials Wednesday in an attempt to convince them no further investigation was warranted.

According to the Post, Kendall told the Justice Department that if a formal inquiry does move forward, it should be directed at the 1996 campaign organization rather than at Clinton himself.

The Wall Street Journal reported that Reno ordered the review after examining a memo subpoenaed from the Federal Election Commission. According to the Journal, FEC auditors strongly suggest in the memo that because the president and his top

campaign advisers were so involved in creating campaign-like TV ads financed by the Democratic National Committee that they should be considered campaign expenditures.

"The use of issue ads was entirely legal and appropriate," White House spokesman James Kennedy said in a statement. "The ads focused on real issues before Congress and the American people and they made clear the differences between Democrats and Republicans on balancing the budget, Medicare, welfare and other policy concerns. They were cleared by legal counsel."

business recruitment, retention/expansion and formation line items is above what he knows will be spent. Hatley actually anticipates finishing the year with a surplus.

The major source of revenue for HEDC is from the sales tax. The agency receives about a third of the local sales tax money sent to the city each month by the Texas Comptroller's Office.

The state collects a 7.25 percent sales tax revenue from monthly and quarterly filers. Because many local governments also levy a sales tax, such as Hereford's 1.5 percent, the comptroller's office rebates the local tax revenue.

In the HEDC budget for Fiscal 1999, Hatley projects the agency will receive \$316,229, which is nearly \$5,000 above the FY 1998 budget but well below the \$347,272 projected in the latest budget analysis.

The actual sales tax revenue collected by HEDC in FY 1997 was \$340,142. The budget also predicts HEDC will generate about \$15,000 in interest income, a drop of about about \$3,500.

On the expense side, the largest item is \$47,045 for salaries. The business recruitment, retention/expansion and formation categories each are budgeted to spend \$80,211; however, Hatley said those figures are unlikely to be expended.

## Hurricanes may add to global warming

In addition to wreaking death and destruction, hurricanes might just contribute to global warming.

Scientists at the Bermuda Station for Biological Research found that hurricanes hurl large amounts of carbon dioxide into the atmosphere as their winds furiously churn the ocean over hundreds of square miles.

Carbon dioxide is one of several gases in the atmosphere that trap heat and may be responsible for the record high temperatures of the past decade.

In a study published today in the journal Nature, the Bermuda researchers measured the increased carbon dioxide levels generated by three hurricanes in an otherwise languid region of the Atlantic Ocean known as the Sargasso Sea in 1995.

During Hurricane Felix on Aug. 14-15, they found that the hurricane caused the ocean surface to cool as the storm passed directly overhead. Cooler water cannot hold as much dissolved carbon dioxide.

At the same time, Felix's 130 mph winds churned the ocean surface into a foamy fury, increasing the exchange of carbon dioxide with the atmosphere.

The pattern was repeated in September with Hurricanes Luis and Marilyn.

The three hurricanes increased the total amount of carbon dioxide transfer that summer by 55 percent, said lead author Nicholas R. Bates.

However, the researchers could not precisely determine the contribution that hurricanes might make to global climate change.

The dynamics and local effects of hurricanes are well understood. But climate experts have devoted little attention to the long-term atmospheric effects.

Atmospheric chemists not involved in the Bermuda study said the findings from three storms over a four-week period are not sufficient to reach any firm conclusions about the effects of hurricanes on climate.

are encouraged to increase staffing during the holiday. "Labor Day is a family holiday and we're concerned about safety as people enjoy the three-day weekend," Thomas said.

Also, the Texas Forest Service is asking residents to remain aware of the threat of wildfire.

"The threat of wildfire remains extreme. (Recent) rain has brought some relief, but not enough to move the Panhandle out of danger," Lee McNeely, leader of the High Plains Fire Prevention Team in Amarillo, said.

High temperatures, dry vegetation, little moisture and high winds continue to make the fire danger extreme in the area.

The forest service urges everyone to check the burn ban status before lighting the barbecue grill and offers these reminders:

- Keep a hose or fire extinguisher close at hand;
- Clear the area down to bare soil;
- Be sure the fire is out before leaving the grill; and
- Douse all coals with water when finished.

Also, the forest service urge residents to dispose of smoking materials in an ashtray or crush in bare soil, and drive or park vehicles in areas with short or no grass. Tall grass in contact with a vehicle's hot exhaust system can start fires.

**Bush proposes \$400 million tax cut**

AUSTIN (AP) - Gov. George W. Bush today became the latest candidate to propose a tax cut as the state government enjoys a \$3.7 billion projected budget surplus.

Bush said he would push repeal of several sales tax levies totaling \$400 million.

His plan includes repealing the taxes on over-the-counter medicines, such as aspirin and cold medications; diapers; first-aid items; and access to the computer Internet.

Bush also proposed a two-week "sales tax holiday" on clothing and footwear during the back-to-school period.

"This is a tax cut for the people who pay the bills, the moms and dads who buy diapers and school clothes for their children, and the senior citizens who spend a disproportionate share of their income on over-the-counter medications," Bush said.

Bush's Democratic opponent, Garry Mauro, launched his campaign last year with a proposal to eliminate the state sales tax on cars, pickup trucks and minivans.

And on Wednesday, state Comptroller John Sharp, the Democratic candidate for lieutenant governor, proposed a limited state sales tax moratorium designed to give some of the budget surplus back to taxpayers.

Sharp's plan calls for all clothing under \$50 and school supplies to be exempted from the state's 6.25 percent sales tax for two weeks beginning Aug. 15, 1999.

Texans would save an estimated \$80.3 million as a result - more if Texas cities agree to waive their 2 percent sales tax for the same period.

**Hurricane Earl moves across Florida**

PANAMA CITY BEACH, Fla. (AP) - A weakening Hurricane Earl pushed ashore early today, lashing the Florida Panhandle with wind and torrential rain as thousands of people huddled in powerless homes to wait out the storm.

About 150 people who refused to leave were trapped on St. George Island, about 50 miles southeast of Apalachicola, when water washed over the only bridge to the mainland. All 1,500 homes on the island were without power.

"They're stuck out there right now. They can't be rescued," said Alan Pierce, Franklin County's director of administrative services.

But winds were decreasing rapidly to the west of the storm's center, and Earl could be downgraded to a tropical storm today, said Michelle Huber, a meteorologist with the National Hurricane Center in Miami.

**Clinton meets both sides in Ireland**

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (AP) - Boosted by Sinn Fein leader Gerry Adams' dramatic declaration that violence must end, President Clinton today launched a whirlwind tour of Northern Ireland, hoping to strengthen conciliation and embellish his peacemaker reputation along the way.

Shortly after Air Force One touched down in this storied province, Clinton went into meetings with one-time foes now enmeshed in creating a new government under the terms of an accord he helped broker last April. The most emotional part of the day promised to be his meetings with victims of 30 years of violence in Northern Ireland.

Clinton's national security adviser, Sandy Berger, showed off the day's headline in the Independent, announcing that David Trimble, the Protestant head of Northern Ireland's embryonic government, had agreed to meet with Adams, whose Sinn Fein group is allied with the Irish Republican Army.

Berger called it a breakthrough. "This is the headline we wanted to see when we got here," he enthused to reporters.

One of Northern Ireland's two major highways was shut down at morning rush hour to allow speedy passage of the presidential entourage across Belfast to the site for the new cross-community government, the Stormont office complex atop a hill in the city's eastern suburbs.

Clinton was greeted there by the government's two appointed leaders, Trimble and Seamus Mallon, deputy leader of the Social Democratic and Labor Party, an Irish Catholic. British Prime Minister Tony Blair accompanied them inside Stormont for a briefing on the status of the shaky peace accord and for meetings with elected members of the new Northern Ireland Assembly.

**Compromise hinted in Russia**

MOSCOW (AP) - With the ruble slipping and the International Monetary Fund possibly delaying an upcoming loan payment to Russia, some lawmakers are signaling they want to step back from a confrontation with Boris Yeltsin over his choice of premier.

Yeltsin and his candidate Viktor Chernomyrdin have squared off against opposition lawmakers over who should lead Russia out of its economic crisis. After overwhelmingly rejecting Chernomyrdin on Monday, the lower house of parliament set a second confirmation vote for Friday.

If Chernomyrdin fails to win confirmation a second and third time, Yeltsin is constitutionally empowered to dissolve the parliament, or Duma.

Parties across Russia's political spectrum have been united against Chernomyrdin, whom many blame for landing Russia in its present economic mess. Chernomyrdin served as prime minister for five years before Yeltsin dumped him in the spring.

However, the ranks of those opposing the acting prime minister began to thin on Wednesday.

Ultrarationalist leader Vladimir Zhirinovskiy indicated that his 50-member faction, the third-largest in the Duma, would support the acting premier after having abstained from the vote on Monday.

Influential regional leaders in the Federation Council also endorsed Chernomyrdin. The chamber will likely pass a resolution Friday backing Chernomyrdin's candidacy, council member Murtaza Rakhimov said - putting more pressure on the lawmaking Duma to confirm him.

**Lewinsky had presidential help in job hunt**

WASHINGTON (AP) - In his grand jury testimony, President Clinton acknowledged twice helping Monica Lewinsky in her job searches, including asking one presidential aide in 1997 to see if the former intern could get a job back at the White House, legal sources say.

When Ms. Lewinsky's efforts to return to work at the White House failed and she began looking for a private job, Clinton again turned to White House aides, asking in January if they could provide a favorable recommendation for Ms. Lewinsky's past White House work, the sources told The Associated Press.

The president acknowledged both instances when questioned by prosecutors during his grand jury testimony last month but said he did not order the actions and only asked aides to act as appropriate, according to a person familiar with his testimony.

Independent Counsel Kenneth Starr is weighing whether to send Congress a report that would cite Clinton for possible impeachable offenses, including perjury, obstruction of justice and abuse of power, for his efforts to keep secret from the Paula Jones sexual harassment lawsuit his affair with Ms. Lewinsky.

The source familiar with Clinton's grand jury testimony, speaking only on condition of anonymity, said the president acknowledged asking White House deputy personnel director Marsha Scott in 1997 to consider helping Ms. Lewinsky find a new White House job if it was appropriate.

PEGGY'S COVE, Nova Scotia (AP) - A Swissair pilot reported smoke in the cockpit, dumped tons of fuel and attempted an emergency landing before his jetliner crashed off Nova Scotia, killing all 229 people aboard, including 136 Americans.

Flight SR111 from New York to Geneva plunged into the ocean late Wednesday night after leaving Kennedy International Airport at 8:17 p.m. It carried 215 passengers - including two infants - and 14 crew.

The plane disappeared from radar screens 30 miles south of Halifax International Airport.

Philippe Bruggisse, chief executive officer of Swissair's parent group, said today that the 136 Americans were the largest single group aboard the plane. Some 30 French and 28 Swiss citizens were on board, he said.

The pilot had asked for permission to land in Boston, then decided to go on to Halifax, said Walter Vollenweider, a Swissair official in New York. Vollenweider said he had no indication why the pilot made that choice.

Those on the ground reported hearing sputtering noises from an aircraft passing overhead and then a thundering crash.

"The motors were still going, but it was the worst-sounding deep groan that I've ever heard," said witness Claudia Zinck-Gilroy.

Dozens of fishing boats and coast guard ships immediately headed out in driving rain to the crash site, about six miles off the coast of Peggy's Cove, a picturesque fishing village popular with tourists.

By this morning, 18 bodies had been recovered.

"We knew it was an explosion, there was a silence for two seconds after the explosion, then my ears popped," said Darrell Fralick, 26, a resident of Peggy's Cove. "At that split second, I looked at my watch it was 10:35, I don't know why I looked at my watch, I just did."

The White House said terrorism likely was not a factor in the crash of the McDonnell Douglas MD-11

It was the first crash of a Swissair plane since Oct. 7, 1979, when one of its DC-8s overshot the runway in Athens, Greece, while attempting to land and burst into flames. Fourteen people were killed.
