New Producer is Completed by Humble Co.

Humble Oil and Refining Company chalked up another producing oil well for the Talco oil field Tuesday when they completed the Penn fee No. 30. Potential will probably be taken in the next few days.

The company now has a rig drilling on the J. C. Young heirs No. 6 and was 330 feet Thursday morning.

Other work for Humble Company is letting contract for a new 6-inch pipeline in East Talco to connect with their producing wells.

Bill Hinton's wildcat, located halfway between Talco and Sulphur Bluff, the T. J. Hargraves No. 1 was reported to be drilling at 3900 feet Thursday morning. Operators expect to have a showing the latter part of the week. If this well is a producer, not only will the fault line be joined all the way to Sulphur Bluff, but a lot of off-sets will have to be drilled.

Farmer Loses \$40,000 in One Night

How a farmer can lose \$40,000 in one night through no fault of his own was demonstrated on the Trinity river in Madison county recently when W. M. Forrest inspected a 900-acre field of fine cotton on his plantation one morning, and a day and two nights later he looked at the same spot and saw only a body of water two miles wide. Flood waters which accumulated on the Trinity above Dallas and Ft. Worth finally had reached Madison county. Mr. Forrest estimated he would have made 500 bales of cotton on his 900 acres which would have been worth with seed about \$40,000.

Fire Destroys Hay Tank and Battery

A hay tank and tank battery were destroyed early Wednesday morning of last week when fire broke out in the hay tank. The tanks were full of oil and all were destroyed. Loss is estimated at about \$2,000.

The property was owned by J. P. Reynolds, located near the Bolin farm. Flames from the fire were seen from Talco, which is about five miles away.

LACY GETS CONTRACT FOR HIGHWAY WORK

The Highway Department announced last week the awarding of a contract to L. H. Lacy Company of Dallas for 2.3 miles of grading and draining structures and paving in and near Mt. Pleasant on Highways 67 and 271. The contract cost for the work was \$79,132.

Victory 'V' Seen Throughout Nation

NEW YORK (Special) — Thousands of "V for Victory" buttons were being distributed this week throughout the country by the Fight for Freedom Committee.



This is the symbol that represents eventual destruction of Hitlerism. Although the "V" is verboten by the Nazis, it is now seen on all sides in the overrun countries of Europe. It is also heard tapped out on tables and store windows—three short and one long, its equivalent in the Morse code.

To date, infuriated Nazis have thrown into jail thousands of people in occupied Europe for scrawling the "V" on walls and sidewalks, and for "telegraphing" it by means of applause at their movies.

It's now even heard on the radio in this country. Editors use it in their papers, and business firms on their stationery.

Fight for Freedom was the first organization to promote adoption of the "V" in this country, and to popularize use of the Morse code symbol for that letter. — Young women members here of Fight for Freedom are pinning "V" buttons on the laps of pedestrians.

Stand Erect for Better Health

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J.—If you want to avoid high blood pressure, hold yourself erect when you walk and avoid sitting in slouched positions.

That advice was contained in a paper submitted by Dr. Lester R. Daniels of Sacramento, Calif.

"Posture is a most important factor in high-blood-pressure cases. People with poor posture ultimately develop abnormal structural patterns.

"This condition tends to increase the burden of circulation, and with a toxic background so often present, it is an important contributing cause of degenerative changes in the blood vessels."

Gin Will be Erected in Talco Soon

Within the next month a gin should be standing in Talco ready for the first bale of cotton.

It is expected that more cotton will be ginned in Talco this year than in several years, due to the fact that a large part of the farmers of the surrounding community will be stockholders in the gin.

Fire Destroys R. H. Glover Home Early Wednesday

The six-room home of Mr. and Mrs. R. H. Glover, located at their tourist camp and store in Southeast Bogata, was completely destroyed by fire early Wednesday morning. The blaze, reportedly caused by the explosion of an oil stove, was discovered about 7.30 a. m.

Efforts of the Bogata fire department and neighbors resulted in saving most of the house furniture, with the exception of that in the kitchen and dining room.

Mrs. Glover's false teeth, which were in the kitchen, were lost in the blaze, as were most of the family shoes, which were in the bathroom. There was only a small amount of insurance on the building.

Coke Stevenson to Take Over Reins of Texas Friday

Lieut.-Gov. Coke R. Stevenson will be inaugurated governor of Texas on Friday, Aug. 8, though the duties of Texas' chief executive automatically fell on his shoulders at 12:25 a. m. Sunday, when Gov. W. Lee O'Daniel's train, headed for Washington, crossed the boundary line into Louisiana.

In leaving for his new post as U. S. Senator, O'Daniel remarked that he was sorry for just one thing: "I wish I was running for something," he said.

In his last official visit with Stevenson, O'Daniel marked a passage in the office Bible. It was Exodus, Chapter 20, and listed the Ten Commandments.

Fulbright Man Dies Sunday

Irvin Smith, 70, died Sunday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Bettie Hulén, near Fulbright. He was born in Mississippi, March 15, 1871. Survivors are three children, Mrs. Hulén, Fulbright; Noel Smith, Harlingen and Mrs. J. S. Ferrell of Kaufman.

His wife and a son were killed in an auto-truck crash three years ago near Houston.

Funeral services were conducted by the Fulbright Methodist pastor, Rev. Wilson, at the home of Mrs. Hulén, Monday afternoon at 2:30. Interment was at the Bethel cemetery.

Farmers to Get Eight Million in Stamps

About one-half million Texas cotton growers will exchange an estimated \$8,000,000 of cotton stamps this year if they use all they qualify for, B. F. Vance, administrative officer of the state AAA, has announced.

Cotton growers, who reduce below the smaller of their 1940 planted acres or 1941 cotton allotment, are eligible to receive stamps at 10 cents per pound times the normal yield on the acres voluntarily reduced. The stamps may be exchanged for cotton goods at stores co-operating in this program.

Cotton Loan Regulations Announced

Details of the cotton loan program based on recently enacted legislation providing for 85 per cent parity loans were announced Monday by Secretary of Agriculture Claude A. Wickard.

Cotton producers co-operating with the Agricultural Adjustment Administration program will be eligible for loans on their entire 1941 cotton production at a rate based on 85 per cent of parity price as of August 1, the beginning of the 1941 marketing year.

The average loan rate on 3/8-inch middling cotton gross weight will be 14.02c per pound, based upon a parity price of 16.49c. Last year the average loan rate on 3/8-inch middling cotton gross weight was 8.90c per pound.

The rate for middling 15-16-inch cotton will be 20 points (.2c per pound) above the basic rate for 3/8-inch middling cotton.

As in 1940, the loan rate will be based on the net weight of the cotton. The net weight loan rate will be 60 points above that for gross weight to compensate for the lesser number of pounds on which the loan is extended. The average loan rate for 15-16-inch middling cotton, net weight, will be 14.82c per pound.

Loans will be made directly by the Commodity Credit Corporation through lending agencies, principally banks approved by the corporation in the same manner as in past cotton loan programs. Cotton producers' notes will bear interest at a rate of 3 per cent per annum and will be callable on demand, and will mature July 31, 1942. Loans will be available until May 1, 1942, and will be made only on cotton represented by warehouse receipts issued by warehouses approved by the CCC.

The full loan rate will be available only to co-operating producers who have not planted cotton in 1941 in excess of the cotton acreage allotment.

Lighter Tare Asked Cotton Wrapping

The marketing division of the Surplus Marketing Administration is asking approximately 5,500 buyers of cotton to sign an agreement to make an allowance of seven pounds for lighter tare on cotton wrapped cotton bales. According to George E. Adams, vice director and state agent of the Texas Extension Service, county agricultural agents and county AAA committeemen will cooperate in obtaining the signatures.

The Surplus Marketing Administration estimates that approximately 2,000,000 bales of the 1941 cotton crop will carry cotton wrapping. A cotton pattern weighs 4 1/2 pounds compared with about 12 pounds for a pattern of jute. Due to gross weight trading this difference in tare penalizes farmers who use cotton bagging about seven pounds a bale unless merchants make an allowance differential.

Army Convoy Passes Through on Monday

Many local people had their first glimpse of Uncle Sam's mobile army Monday afternoon when 81 army vehicles passed through en route from Ft. Sill, Okla., to Jefferson, with large-scale maneuvers in Louisiana as the final destination.

The convoy, with a personnel of more than 350 men, including 119 negroes, was composed largely of trucks carrying supplies and materials, but also included 10 ambulances.

A much larger convoy will make the same route next Monday.

SHOWERS DRENCH THIS AREA SUNDAY AFTERNOON

Drenching showers fell in this area Sunday afternoon, temporarily breaking the heat wave and reviving crops in some sections that were beginning to suffer from the dryness and heat. The sun was back on the job Monday, however, and thermometers have been registering high all week.

 And she thought she heard grandpa yoo-hoo.

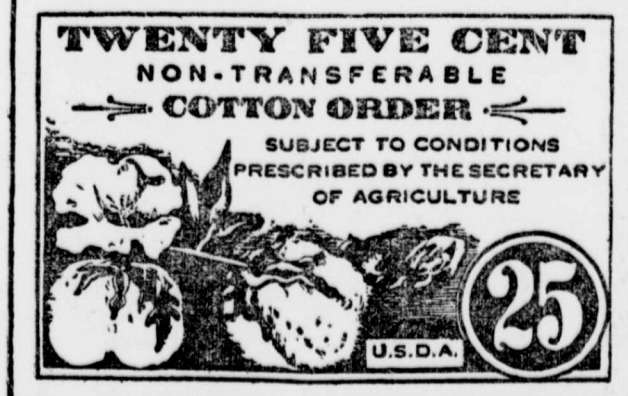
Mary had a little lamb,

TAX PROVISIONS EXPLAINED BY P. O. WILHITE

House Bill No. 76, passed by the Forty-seventh Legislature releases all interest and penalty on delinquent taxes that have become delinquent prior to 1940. As there has been some confusion as to application of the law in some cases, we have not advised the public through the papers until now.

Where delinquent taxes are paid in full on each and every piece of property by the taxpayer we can accept it without any penalty or interest. However, if the payer chooses to pay only on one piece of property while he still owes on other property he will be penalized six per cent on the amount paid.

The Attorney General has ruled that where the Federal Land Bank or any other mortgage holder pays the taxes for their client and does not pay the personal tax or the poll taxes that may be charged herein will be subject to the six per cent penalty, also.

If a taxpayer chooses to pay one or more years taxes that are delinquent against a specific piece of property and leaves some unpaid, we cannot allow him any discount from the original charge.

We wish to call the public's attention to the Certificate of Title Act that went into effect in October, 1939. The law gives the car owner until 1942 to procure a certificate of title to his or her automobile. Section 63, paragraph B reads as follows: "The Department or any agent thereof shall not, after the First of January, 1942, register or renew the registration of any motor vehicle unless and until the owner thereof shall make application for and be granted an official certificate of title for such vehicle." This means that before a motor vehicle owner can register a car in 1942 he must have a certificate of title.

Car owners should make application at once for a title on their car, thereby saving themselves a lot of trouble and delay in registering in 1942 and save the collectors a lot of headaches.

Also H. B. No. 8, passed by the Forty-seventh Legislature, levies 1 per cent sales tax on all new and used car sales, which we collect. The tax goes to the Old Age Pension, Teachers Retirement fund. It is payable at the time application for certificate of title is made.

Ordinary Table Salt will Help Prevent Heat Cramps

AUSTIN.—If your work is such that causes excessive perspiration, add a pinch of ordinary table salt to each drink of water you take to help prevent heat cramps. This is advised by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, to prevent a possible increase in the number of heat victims as the Texas thermometer hits 95 degrees and above.

Laborers, mechanics, farmers and white collar workers whose work causes them to sweat profusely, are in danger of having their body salt content become deficient with resulting heat cramps or heat fag. Salt is a prominent constituent of sweat; the body may lose as high as 40 to 50 grams of salt during hot days.

In industry, a method of preventing heat cramps is to take a tablet of pure salt or mixture of salt and dextrose with each drink of water. Workmen whose duties require muscular exertion should be especially careful to add more than the usual amount of salt to what they eat and drink.

Salt deficiency may be prevented by taking salt in various ways. Where prepared tablets are not available, table salt may be added to each drink of water. Milk is a source of salt and will help to make up for the deficiency caused by sweating. Alcoholic drinks should be avoided.

Heat cramp is characterized by pains (cramps) in the abdominal region, headache, and in severe cases, by nausea and vomiting. The body temperature remains about normal, likewise the pulse rate, and body salt losses occur without the knowledge of the individual until there is a deficiency; then the abdominal muscles begin to cramp.

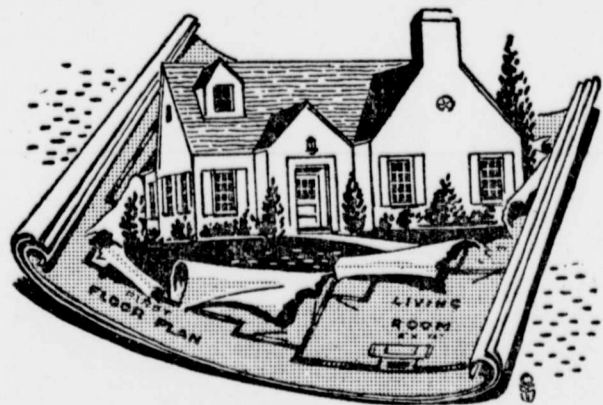
