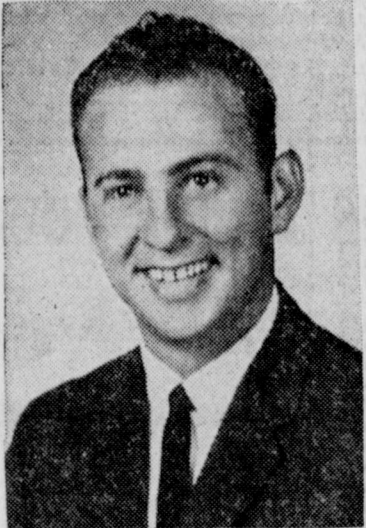

Wright Patman's Weekly Letter

First Congressional Dist. of Texas "Heart of the Gulf Southwest"

IT IS NOW LAW. One of the most comprehensive and forward-looking measures ever enacted in the field of housing was signed by the President last Thursday. With 17 different titles my bill helps Americans with home ownership and rural housing, Federal Housing Administration financing, new communities, flood insurance, college housing, nursing homes, mortgage insurance for nonprofit hospitals, and (very important for rural development) water and sewer grants and loans. A 71-page summary of these and other features of this landmark 1068 Housing Act will be sent to interested constituents upon request to my office.

ON THE MOVE. About 18 million American will change their addresses during these summer months, mainly because of shifting employment situations. Young people between 25 and 34 have the highest mobility rate. There are substantial indications that East Texas is beginning to reverse the trend to the cities — and more young people are seriously considering a career in the Great Gulf Southwest.

TEXAS has an "official" state tree (pecan), flower (bluebonnet), and bird (mockingbird), but not a designated state fish, although 11 other states have chosen a favorite fish mascot. The choice for Texas would not be easy because our state is so large and diverse with many freshwater and salt-water contenders for the title. Three front runners would be the large-mouth bass, the crappie (white perch) and the channel catfish. All of these fish are found throughout Texas — from the Canadian to the Rio Grande and from the Sabine to the Pecos. While the sporting black bass has much to commend it, a less glamorous candidate might get the vote — the channel catfish. This good-tasting fish is a table delicacy and is now being "farmed" with great success in Texas.

BECAUSE IT HAS 367 MILES OF GENERAL COASTLINE along the Gulf, Texas is also a great salt-water empire, actually ranking 6th among the 50 states in length of coastline. Alaska has 6640 miles, Florida 1350, California 840, Hawaii 750, and Louisiana 397.

"LIFETIME RESERVE." Medicare coverage for hospital care is normally limited to 90 days, but a recent change in the law provides a "lifetime reserve" of an additional 60 days of hospital benefits to pay for all but \$20 a day of costs beyond 90 days. A patient who has been in the hospital 90 days can use part of his reserve if he wishes, or if he can meet the costs, he can save his "lifetime reserve" for the future.

THE MONDAY HOLIDAY BILL (PL 90-363) has been signed by the President creating one new public holiday (Columbus Day, the second Monday in October) and switching three other holidays (Washington's Birthday, Memorial Day, and Veterans' Day) so that they will fall on Mondays. These added 3-day weekends or "mini-vacations" are expected to boost travel and resort business by about 20%.

THIS NEW HOLIDAY LAW, effective in 1971, applies only to Federal employees and to the District of Columbia, but it is expected that many states will enact legislation. Five of our nine national legal holidays can therefore be observed on Monday, but the remaining four—New Year's, the 4th of July, Thanksgiving and Christmas Day — because of our religious, patriotic and historic traditions, should definitely be left as they are.

THE RIVERS AND HARBORS FLOOD CONTROL ACT, authorizing navigation to Daingerfield, and the Pat Mayse Wildlife refuge in Lamar County, has been approved by Congress.

THE MERE OWNERSHIP OF A HAND GUN OR RIFLE may serve as an outlet or substitute for feelings of aggression. It has been suggested that the average law-abiding individual is better able to cope with the stress and strain of daily living because he has a firearm at home. This is privately admitted by sociologists who are reluctant to make a public statement on the subject because of the current hysteria for all-out gun controls and confiscation.

Students Asked To Register Prior To Aug. 31, PJC

Students planning to enter Paris Junior College the fall semester are asked to register prior to August 31 to assure proper counseling and planning of courses, according to Ralph Webb, Dean of the college.

Pre-registration has been scheduled at the office of the Registrar Monday, August 5, through Friday, August 30, from 9 a. m. until 4:30 p. m.

"Purpose of our new pre-registration program is to study each prospective student's individual needs so that maximum assistance can be given to planning his college courses," Louis B. Williams, President of PJC, explained.

Dean Webb stressed that those who already have their college folders completed are to come early to the office of the Registrar to pick up IBM packs so that their counseling and pre-registration can proceed.

Application for admission, transcript of high school or college work, and a copy of ACT scores must be in the completed folders. Students with incomplete records are urged by the Dean to report to the Registrar in August.

"Pre-registration takes place of fall registration, and if a student goes all the way through with making out his class schedule and paying fees, he will not have to return until Freshman Orientation on Thursday, Sept. 5, and then on the first day of class, Sept. 9," Dean Webb stated.

Assisting Dean Webb with pre-registration counseling will be Miss Zella Hibler, counselor and instructor in physical education, and Paul Smith, who has recently joined the PJC faculty as counselor and instructor in orientation.

Smith comes to Paris from San Marcos, where he was staff specialist for testing, evaluation, and research at Gary Job Corps Training Center. Previously he was counselor for the Uvalde School District, school social worker and psychologist for Galena Park School District, and vocational rehabilitation counselor for Texas Education Agency at Houston.

Graduate of Temple High School and Temple Junior College, he obtained a B. S. degree from North Texas State University and a M. S. degree in guidance from East Texas State University.

Smith has been active in Boy Scout work and in sports and is a Baptist deacon. He is married to the former Miss Charlotte Vaughan of Paris, and they and their two children reside at 847 Church St.

Prospective students of PJC are reminded by President Williams that all bachelor degree courses are fully credited and transferable to four-year colleges and universities, the same as if the courses had been taken in the four year institution. All courses are also approved by the Veterans' Administration.

Talco - Bogata Schools Open On August 30

General registration for the Bogata Elementary School, Talco-Bogata High School, and Rivercrest High School will be held Friday morning, August 30. Buses will make their regular runs on Friday morning and will return students to their homes about mid-morning.

Monday, Sept. 2 will be observed as Labor Day holiday. Buses will make their regular runs on Tuesday, Sept. 3 with students remaining at school the entire day and meals will be served in the cafeteria.

Pupils entering the Talco-Bogata Schools, who attended elsewhere the previous year, will need transcripts or report cards and textbook cards showing that all textbooks were cleared.

All children entering the Talco-Bogata Schools must be six years of age on or before September 1 of the current school year. Birth certificates or the equivalency of a birth certificate will be required of every child enrolling in the first grade.

All students entering the first grade of the Talco-Bogata Schools shall be required to show proof of having received DPT (Diphtheria, Pertussis and Tetanus) and smallpox vaccination. A new requirement of all first grade students includes immunization against measles and polio.

Faculty meetings are scheduled for all faculty members at 8:30 a. m. on Wednesday, August 28 and Thursday, August 29.

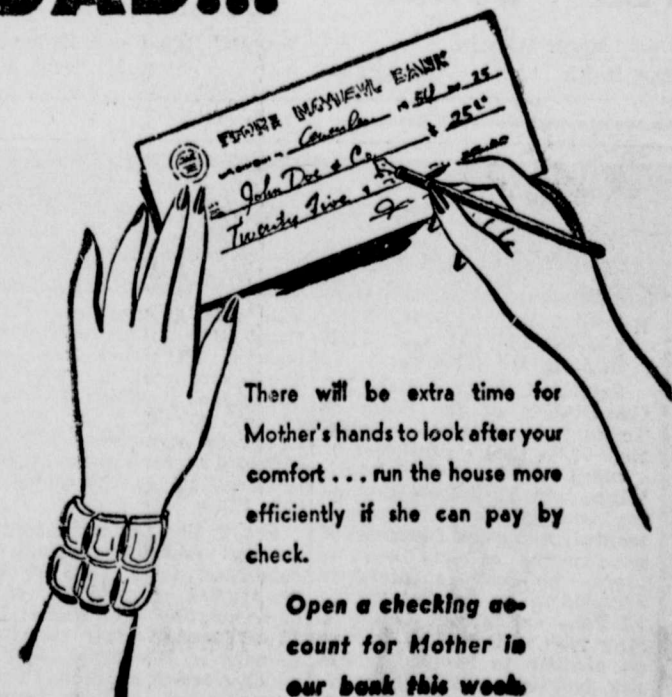

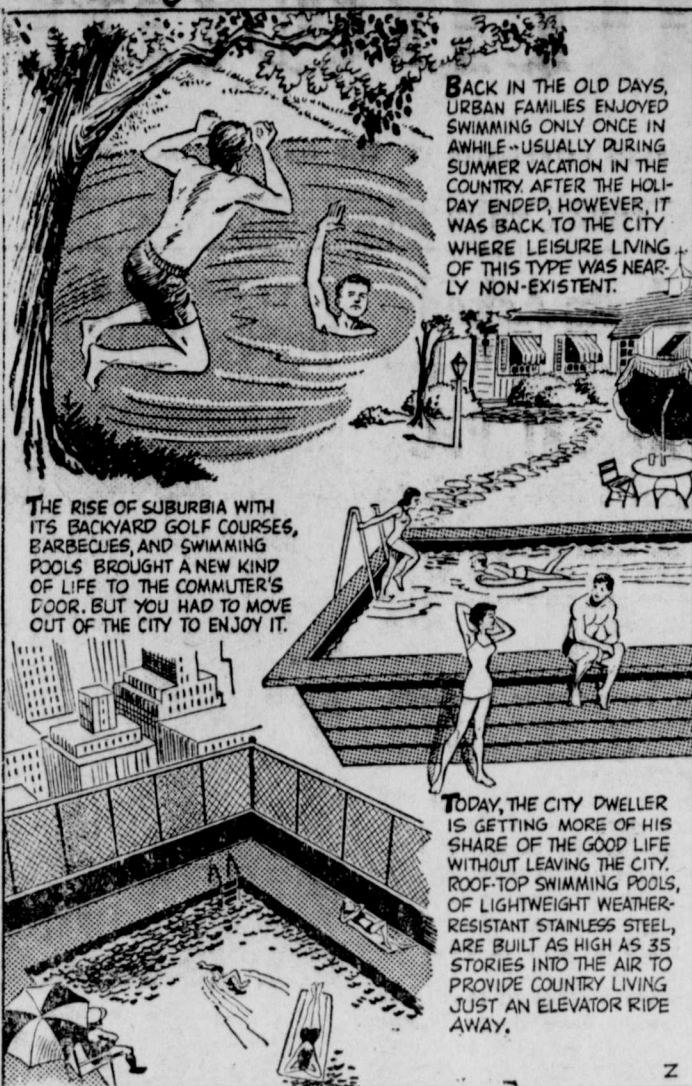
When the couple left on a short wedding trip, the bride was attired in an off white tunic with pink accessories.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (HJR20)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 11a, Article VII, of the Constitution of The State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 11a. In addition to the bonds enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, the Board of Regents of The University of Texas may invest the Permanent University Fund in securities, bonds or other obligations issued, insured, or guaranteed in any manner by the United States Government, or any of its agencies, and in such bonds, debentures, or obligations, and preferred and common stocks issued by corporations, associations, or other institutions as the Board of Regents of The University of Texas System may deem to be proper investments for said funds; provided, however, that not more than one per cent (1%) of said fund shall be invested in the securities of any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; provided, further, that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid dividends for five (5) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its successors."

"In making each and all of such investments said Board of Regents shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which men of ordinary prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs, not

in regard to speculation but in regard to the permanent disposition of their funds, considering the probable income therefrom as well as the probable safety of their capital.

"The interest, dividends and other income accruing from the investments of the Permanent University Fund, except the portion thereof which is appropriated by the operation of Section 18 of Article VII for the payment of principal and interest on bonds or notes issued thereunder, shall be subject to appropriation by the Legislature to accomplish the purposes declared in Section 10 of Article VII of this Constitution."

"This amendment shall be self-enacting, and shall become effective upon its adoption, provided, however, that the Legislature shall provide by law for full disclosure of all details concerning the investments in corporate stocks and bonds and other investments authorized herein."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment providing for investment of the Permanent University Fund by the Board of Regents of The University of Texas in certain types of securities within the prudent man rule."

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PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ELEVEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR60)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to add Section 64 to read as follows:

"Section 64. (a) The Legislature may by statute provide for consolidation of governmental offices and functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within El Paso or Tarrant Counties. Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivisions affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these subdivisions, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require."

"(b) The county government, or any political subdivision(s) comprising or located therein, may contract one with another for the performance of governmental functions required or authorized by this Constitution or the Laws of this State, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may prescribe. No person acting under a contract made pursuant to this Subsection (b) shall be deemed to hold more than one office of honor, trust or profit or more than one civil office of emolument."

The term "governmental functions," as it relates to counties, includes all duties, activities and operations of statewide importance in which the county acts for the State, as well as of local importance, whether required or authorized by this Constitution or the Laws of this State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for offices and functions and allowing political subdivisions to contract for performance of governmental functions in El Paso and Tarrant counties."

NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR49)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 21 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

NUMBER TWELVE ON THE BALLOT (SJR14)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 14 proposing an amendment to Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new Section 52a to give the Legislature the power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 52a to read as follows:

"Section 52a. The Legislature shall have the power to authorize counties, cities, and towns to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes, or in aid thereof; provided, that property acquired from proceeds of the bonds shall be subject to ad valorem taxes. Legislation passed in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment shall not be invalid solely because of its anticipatory nature. The tax revenue, the utility revenue, and the revenue from services of any county, city or town may not be used to pay any

bonds issued pursuant to this authority nor the interest thereon."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment to give the Legislature the power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment to give the Legislature the power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.
