THE SUMMER OF 1966

I see by the Herald you've been having a bit of a water problem. My sympathies to each and every one of you. It's miserable, isn't it?

Just reading about it gives me the Willies, because I'm reminded of the summer of '66, about which there are no songs nor movies. My folks were living in the Midwest where the humidity often rivals the temperature, and I was home from New York recuperating from my first year of teaching. One day the mercury went up to 100 and didn't bother to come down for a week. There was no rain and not the slightest hint of a breeze.

Naturally those who had air-conditioning turned them on full blast, putting a strain on the power plants and resulting in a planned Brown-out. That means the head switch-puller shut off all electricity in different sections of the City for four hours at a time to prevent a massive unplanned Black-out. If you haven't already found out, four hours is exactly long enough for meat to spoil in a thawed refrigerator.

But we were lucky. Our four hours came in the middle of the night. The meat spoiled, but we didn't notice it until morning. We didn't notice the air-conditioning was off because we didn't have any.

During the day work was impossible. So was sleeping at night—or any other time, for that matter. We were asked to co-operate by not using any more electricity or water than is absolutely necessary, so that eliminated TV and radio for amusement and frequent showers for comfort. Some people got cool by going to big department stores, while their own power was off, then going home and turning the cooler back on.

We found some relief in soaking teach towels in cold water and covering ourselves with them. That may have been primitive, but it helped.

As inevitably happens, there were cheaters—those who continued using every electrical appliance in the house. And there was our neighbor's daughter, Miss Thelma. She decided that was the week to get a suntan, I guess, because I saw her in the yard under a freely flowing garden hose. Not only did she manage to get seen by every boy on the block, she also watered the lawn and washed both cars. If I had had the strength, I'd have shouted something socially unacceptable at her. As it was, even breathing required effort.

The rains finally came, breaking the heatwave, but it had been a dreadful, eerie week, far worse than those 110-plus day spells we survive in West Texas with nothing but a little rotating fan.

Hopefully those who did co-operate by cutting down on electricity and water usage learned not only how precious those commodities are but also how little they can get by with.

Conveniences are great. They save time and energy, put the joy of sound and color into our lives, and make us more comfortable. It's much too easy to take them for granted and use them more than necessary. Sometimes we have to be reminded about all that by doing without for awhile. It is most unpleasant and is happening more and more frequently. You don't forget the experience right away, which may be good. At any rate, my sympathy is sincere, and I hope your crisis is soon over.

Bird Lore

Of the many species of sparrows in the United States, about 12 are seen at various times in our part of Texas. All except one can be classed as "good guys." He is the house or English sparrow, and he was imported.

Even house sparrows can be lovable. A friend was telling me he and his wife rescued a baby sparrow which had fallen from the nest and raised it this summer. Although old enough now to take care of himself, and fly outside at will, he chooses to come back into the house—especially on stormy nights.

The friend is amazed at how the bird knows and reacts to strangers. He recognizes his foster parents by their voices, faces and clothes. When the man puts on a certain red shirt the bird immediately refuses to have anything to do with him. Maybe he should try painting our martin houses red!

Thomas Hubner raised one who accompanied the family on trips to the lake. When the family made stops the little sparrow would fly outside the car but would fly back and hop upon Thomas' shoulder in time to continue the trip.

Some of the sparrows are among my favorite birds. One I enjoy each summer is the Lark sparrow. The white bordered tail and the chestnut and white head marking that resemble that of a quail make adults easy to identify. The white breast is marked in center with a blackish spot.

This little bird is one of the finest singers of the sparrow tribe. It feeds on weed seeds and grass-

es and is considered to be one of the most valuable of sparrows as destroyer of grasshoppers.

A list of those sparrows we can see in winter months are the Savannah, tree, vesper, Harris', white crowned, Lincoln, fox and song. Those we see in summer are the grasshopper and lark. The little field sparrow is a permanent resident.

Yes, we have many native sparrows—and by and large they are a charming family by almost anyone's standards.

Old Friend Visits

Leslie Clark, aged 91, of Berryville, Ark., stopped at an Iowa Park service station this week and inquired as to the whereabouts of Cliff and Annie Burrows. He was not aware Mr. Burrows has died. The station manager took Clark to the home of Mrs. Burrows . . . and such an tour of reminiscence you can't even imagine!

Cliff and Annie had been married only a short time and were living on a farm north of Iowa Park near the Van Horn place 65 years ago, when this bachelor (at that time) asked to live with them and help with the planting and harvesting.

Mr. Burrows was one of the first in this area to try growing cotton as a money crop. That year Leslie helped them harvest 14 bales. He called the blooms "offerings" and said they offered to make cotton.

At plowing time Annie walked ahead of the plow and pulled the stray bolls that were left. She sold them for \$5 and bought a Sears-Roebuck mirror with the money.

When the Burrows moved to town, living in the house on the corner of Yosemite, across the street from where Wayne Williams now lives, she brought that mirror to town, and to this day it is hanging on a door in that house. She got Mr. White, a carpenter, to hang it.

Mr. Clark finally moved away and married. The Burrows went to see him in Arkansas once and asked his wife how she ever persuaded that bachelor to marry. She said she and her sister owned a cafe in Colorado. He ate there at times. One day a friend noticed that courthouse records listed a marriage license for her and Leslie Clark . . . and congratulated her on her marriage.

Mystified, she said to the friend that they were not married and she had not even seen Leslie in days. He showed up in a day or two, marriage license and all, saying, "I did not have time nor money to make two trips. So I just brought the license along in case you said 'yes' when I asked you to marry me."

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SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



"Land leveling is a practice that has not received the attention it merits," according to Bill Fleming, technician with the Soil Conservation Service.

First, what is leveling and what is its purpose? In a general sense it is the alteration of the topography of the land in order to get more even distribution of water and prevent erosion by runoff. The process involves considerable time, patience and labor but the benefits can hardly be over-estimated.

"Land suitable for leveling must be reasonably uniform in slope," Fleming said. "In some instances the problem is to remove the side fall or the natural slope of the land. In others it may be freeing the land of mounds and depressions."

Where irrigation is to be used it is necessary to remove the side slope to where it is perfectly level or to a gentle slope in direction of irrigation. In most instances the land should be leveled in 50 to 100 ft. strips in width, depending on the degree of slope.

Usually it is not practical to level land that has more than 1 foot of slope in 100 feet. Not more than half the depth of the top soil should be removed over large areas unless special treatment is given to restore fertility.

Land leveling is not a practice for irrigation farming alone. Mr. Fleming said that leveling may be even more profitable in dryland farming by making maximum use of normal rainfall. It is possible to level the surface of the land and construct small levees to retain all the rainfall, even in the heaviest downpours.

SCS officials estimate that near one-half of our normal rainfall runs off down creeks and rivers. Most farmers in Wichita Soil and Water Conservation District agree that moisture is the most limiting factor in crop production. In most cases it is the inability of their soil to absorb the rainfall without an excess amount running off, that causes poor yields.

Some farmers in Wichita county who have leveled their land for irrigation in recent months are: Louie McCarthy, Stanley Williamson, George Gunter, A. L. Sauls, Bill Rowland, James Whitaker, Harrel Sullivan and Midwestern University Farm.

Cost-share assistance in leveling land for irrigation purposes is available through the REAP or Great Plains Conservation programs.

NUMBER 11 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 95)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article IV, Section 17 of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 17. If, during the vacancy in the office of Governor, the Lieutenant Governor should die, resign, refuse to serve, or be removed from office, or be unable to serve; or if he shall be impeached or absent from the State, the President of the Senate, for the time being, shall, in like manner, administer the Government until he shall be superseded by a Governor or Lieutenant Governor. During the time the Lieutenant Governor administers the Government, as Governor, he shall receive in like manner the same compensation which the Governor would have received had he been employed in the duties of his office, and no more. The President, for the time being, of the Senate, shall, during the

time he administers the Government, receive in like manner the same compensation, which the Governor would have received had he been employed in the duties of his office."

Sec. 2. That Article III of the Texas Constitution, be amended to add a new Section 24a to read as follows:

"Section 24a. The Lieutenant Governor, while he acts as President of the Senate, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each receive from the public treasury an annual salary of \$22,500."

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER 5 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 35)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 2, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 2. (a) All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes; actual places of religious worship, also any property owned by a church or by a strictly religious society for the exclusive use as a dwelling place for the ministry of such church or religious society, and which yields no revenue whatever to such church or religious society; provided that such exemption shall not extend to more property than is reasonably necessary for a dwelling place and in no event more than one acre of land; places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by persons or associations of persons for school purposes and the necessary furniture of all schools and property used exclusively and reasonably necessary in conducting any association engaged in promoting the religious, educational and physical development of boys, girls, young men or young women operating under a State or National organization of like character; also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit; and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such bonds or mortgages, that such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institutions and no longer, and institutions of purely public charity; and all laws exempting property from taxation other than the property mentioned in this Section shall be null and void."

(b) The Legislature may, by general law, exempt property owned by a disabled veteran or by the surviving spouse and surviving minor children of a disabled veteran. A disabled veteran is a veteran of the

armed services of the United States who is classified as disabled by the Veterans' Administration or by a successor to that agency; or the military service in which he served. A veteran who is certified as having a disability of less than 10 percent is not entitled to an exemption. A veteran having a disability rating of not less than 10 percent nor more than 30 percent may be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$1,500. A veteran having a disability rating of more than 30 percent but not more than 50 percent may be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$2,000. A veteran having a disability rating of more than 50 percent but not more than 70 percent may be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$2,500. A veteran who has a disability rating of not less than 10 percent and has attained the age of 65, or a disabled veteran whose disability consists of the loss or loss of use of one or more limbs, total blindness in one or both eyes, or paraplegia, may be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$3,000. The spouse and children of any member of the United States Armed Forces who loses his life while on active duty will be granted an exemption from taxation for property valued at up to \$2,500. A deceased disabled veteran's surviving spouse and children may be granted an exemption which in the aggregate is equal to the exemption to which the decedent was entitled at the time he died."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment allowing certain tax exemptions to disabled veterans, their surviving spouses and surviving minor children, and the surviving spouses and surviving minor children of members of the armed forces who lose their life while on active duty."

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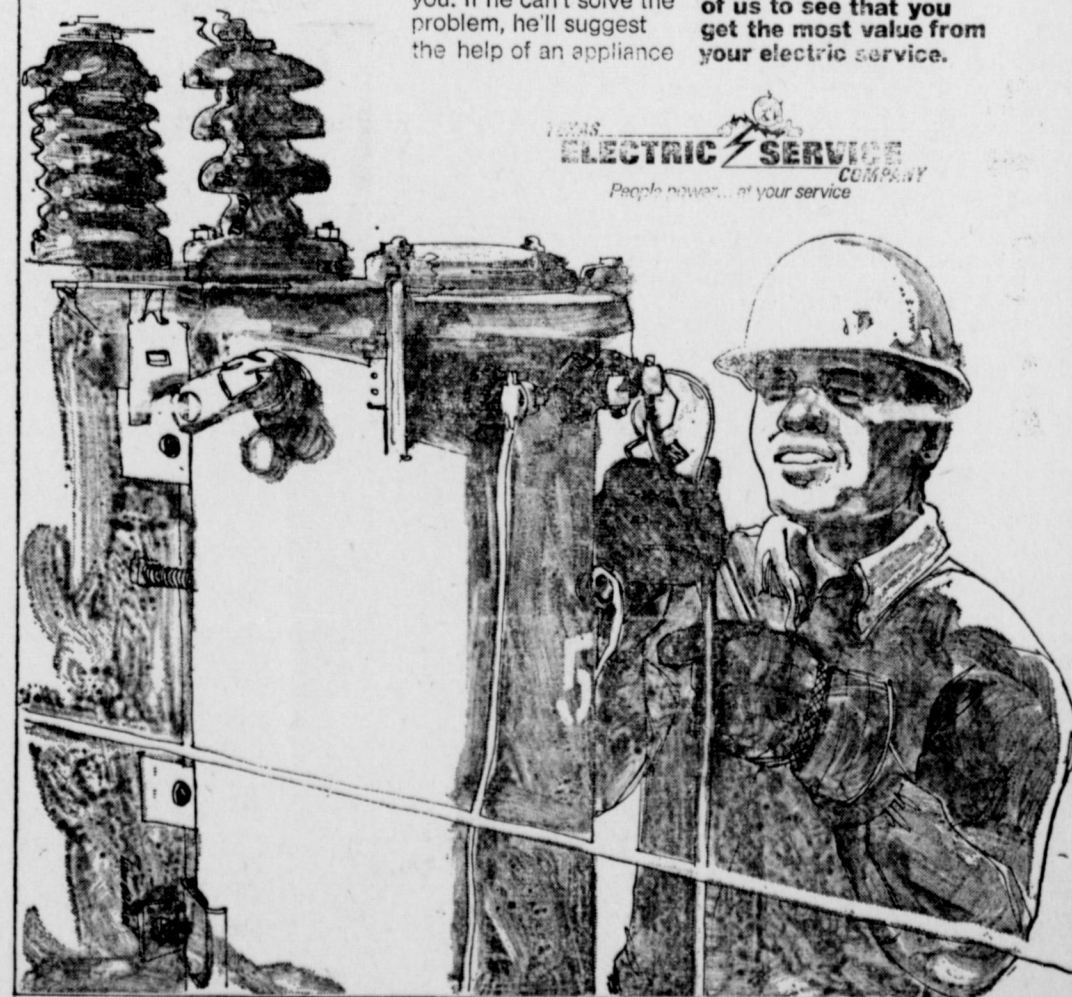

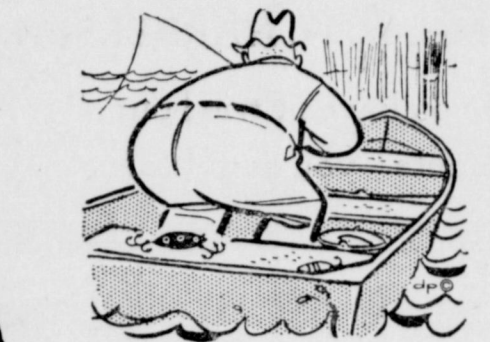

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PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 8 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 1)

General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IV, Section 4, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 4. The Governor elected at the general election in 1974, and thereafter, shall be installed on the first Tuesday after the organization of the Legislature, or as soon thereafter as practicable, and shall hold his office for the term of four years, or until his successor shall be duly installed. He shall be at least thirty years of age, a citizen of the United States, and shall have resided in this State at least five years immediately preceding his election."

Sec. 2. That Article IV, Section 22, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 22. The Attorney General elected at the general election in 1974, and thereafter, shall hold office for four years and until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the State in all suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the State in which the State may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and from time to time, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power or demanding or collecting any species of tax, toll, freight or wharfage not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor and other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall reside at the seat of government during his continuance in office. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature."

Sec. 3. That Article IV, Section 23, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution, shall each hold office for the term of four years and until his successor is qualified. The four-year term applies to these officers who are elected at the general election in 1974 or thereafter. Each shall receive an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature; reside at the Capital of the State during his continuance in office, and perform such duties as are or may be required by law. They and the Secretary of State shall not receive to their own use any fees, costs or perquisites of office. All fees that may be payable by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this section or in his office, shall be paid, when received, into the State Treasury."

Sec. 4. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Secretary of State, and certain statutory State officers."

School Continues Hair and Clothing Rules for Students

The Herald has been authorized to remind prospective students of Iowa Park Consolidated Independent School District and their parents and guardians that the following regulations are to be enforced until changed by official action of the board of trustees:

3.34 SCHOOL DRESS AND GROOMING

There is a strong relationship between how one is dressed and how one acts. Good grooming and proper dress are encouraged at Iowa Park Schools. In this day, many institutions of education have lost prestige and respect of those who once held them in high esteem. It is intended that reasonable line of regulation is held at Iowa Park Public Schools. Iowa Park High School is a responsible educational institution, and for the good of all concerned, some definite guidelines are necessary for students to follow concerning grooming and proper dress. The following policy is for all students in Iowa Park Schools:

HAIR

All boys must keep their hair neatly trimmed at all times according to the following limits:

Hair must be well above the eyebrows if combed forward. Hair must not be long enough that it overhangs the ears. Hair must be trimmed to look neat in the back and on the sides.

The hair in the back should not extend into or over the shirt collar.

Sideburns must not be lower than the bottom of the ear.

Boys will be clean-shaven; no beards are permitted.

Anyone in violation of this policy will be suspended and not be readmitted until they have complied with this policy.

STUDENT DRESS

Student dress is also a matter of good taste. The dress of all students in Iowa Park Public Schools should be in keeping with modesty and decency.

Girls are to wear dresses or skirts and blouses to school. Pant suits are acceptable. Tunic tops are acceptable. Slacks other than blue jeans, levis or stretch pants are acceptable, provided an acceptable vest or coat is worn. The top must be long enough to cover the bottom of the hips.

A pull-over sweater is not acceptable as a top to the slacks. A school jacket is not acceptable as a top to the slacks. A large sweatshirt is not acceptable regardless of the length. T-shirts are not acceptable. Ponchos are not acceptable.

A cardigan type sweater is acceptable, provided the length is proper and the sweater fits as a vest and not as a sweater. All knitted or crocheted vests must be closely woven. Fish net type crocheted vests are not acceptable. Maxi dresses are not acceptable.

No culottes, wrap-around skirts, mini-skirts, or extremely low-cut necklines are to be worn.

Boys will wear full length slacks or jeans at all times. Boys will wear shirt tails tucked in, with the exception of sport shirts that are cut straight around the bottom. Shirts must be buttoned up to the top button below the collar.

No slogan sweatshirts or T-shirts are permitted. Neck medallions or ornament medals should not be worn by boys. Use your good taste. A school classroom is a formal situation. Dress regulations apply at any school activity unless otherwise advised.

Violation of the policy concerning dress is grounds for dismissal.
