Family Argument Ends In Charge Of Murder

An argument between two brothers over a bed ended Thursday night, May 29, with the death of one by a gunshot blast and the other being charged with murder. The brothers are originally from Bogata but the dead man was living with another brother at Hagansport where he was killed.

The dead man is Jack Roy English, 27. The brother charged with the shooting is Hollis English, 25.

between 8:30 p.m. and 8:45 p.m. with the call coming to the Sheriff's office in Mt. Vernon at 8:48 p.m.

Two other brothers witnessed the shooting which occurred a short distance west of Sheppard's Grocery on Farm Road 71. Hollis was standing on the shoulder of the Farm Road and Jack was standing a short distance closer to the house when the shooting occurred. Jack was knocked across a ditch filled with water by the blast from the 12-gauge single barrel shotgun. A huge hole was ripped from his neck.

Hollis told officers that Jack got something out of his car on his way to meet him at the edge of the highway and he assumed it was a gun. No gun was found on Jack or at the scene of the shooting.

Jack was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace JoAnn Hughes.

Following the shooting Hollis went to the home of his father, Bill English, in Bogata where the gun was taken from

him by other brothers. He had told witnesses at the scene that he was going back to Bogata and intended to kill himself.

Shortly after his arrival in Bogata he was picked up by J.D. Mitchell of the Red River County Sheriff's office and taken to Clarksville. Franklin County Sheriff, Bobby Biggestaff, went to Clarksville and returned him to Mt. Vernon early Friday morning where he was charged with murder. Justice of the Peace Hughes set bond at \$15,000 but the suspect remains in jail in lieu of bond.

He will be taken before the Franklin County Grand Jury which will be convened on Friday, June 6.

Mike Waters was convicted last week in District Judge William V. Brown's court in Clarksville of theft of a trailer and theft of a horse. He was given a five year suspended sentence.

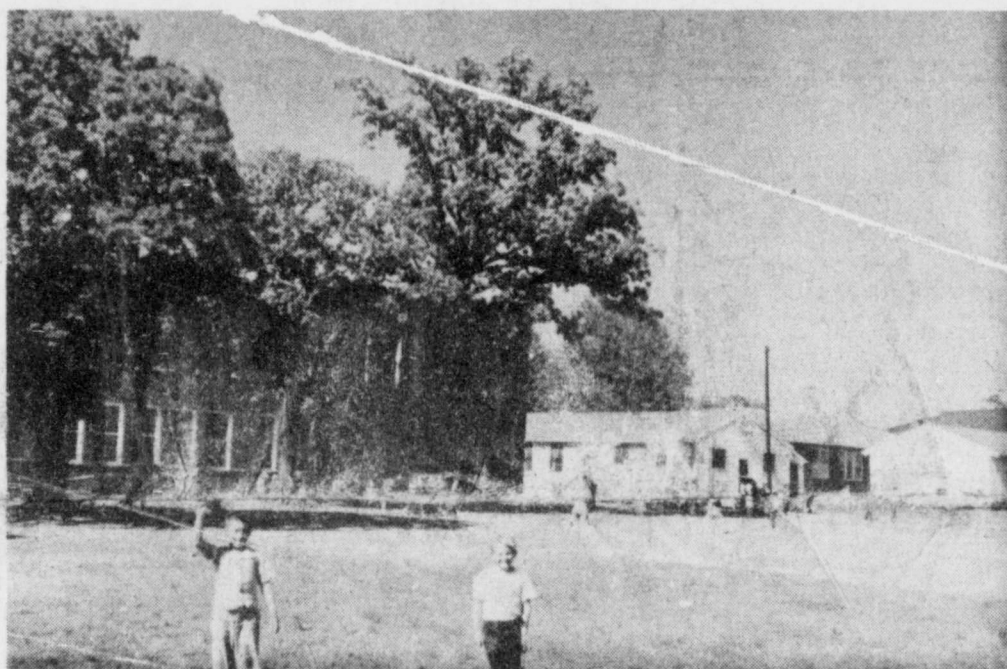

Bid Accepted For Bogata Elementary Science Building

The Talco-Bogata School Board accepted the bid of the Ilcor Company of more than \$9600 for construction of a science building on the Bogata Elementary School campus. Rejected were bids of approximately \$9200 from the Thomas and Martin Construction Company of Lone Star community and \$12,000 from Morgan Portable Buildings.

The building is expected to be completed by the beginning of the school year and will be similar to a school building in New Boston, Texas, which was inspected by Superintendent Talmadge Morgan. The Bogata building will be 24 feet by 40 feet.

In other action the board accepted the resignation of

Larry Tucker as Rivercrest High School Principal, and agreed to consider applications of certified administrators within the school district as well as applications from outside the district. Qualified administrators within the district include Robert Giddens, principal of the Talco Elementary School, B.A. Holbrook, principal of the Bogata Elementary School, and Frank Stubblefield, former principal of the Bogata Elementary School. None have made formal applications for the position.

The board also accepted the resignation of Ray Miller, junior high coach at Talco, and hired Walter Rich, who has been band director at Queen City for three years, as

band director at Rivercrest. Rich has five years experience as a band director, and outlined enthusiastic program for the growth of the Rivercrest band.

Monthly payment of \$50 to Red River County deputy sheriff Jon Latimer was suspended in favor of paying a security officer for each ballgame played at Rivercrest. A letter from Gavin Watson, Red River County judge, indicated to the board that the monthly payments to Latimer were within the law and common practice.

The board voted to add Richard Garrison to the administrator's and school board liability insurance, and named Austin Guest as the

attorney for the school district.

Briscoe Proclaims County History Week

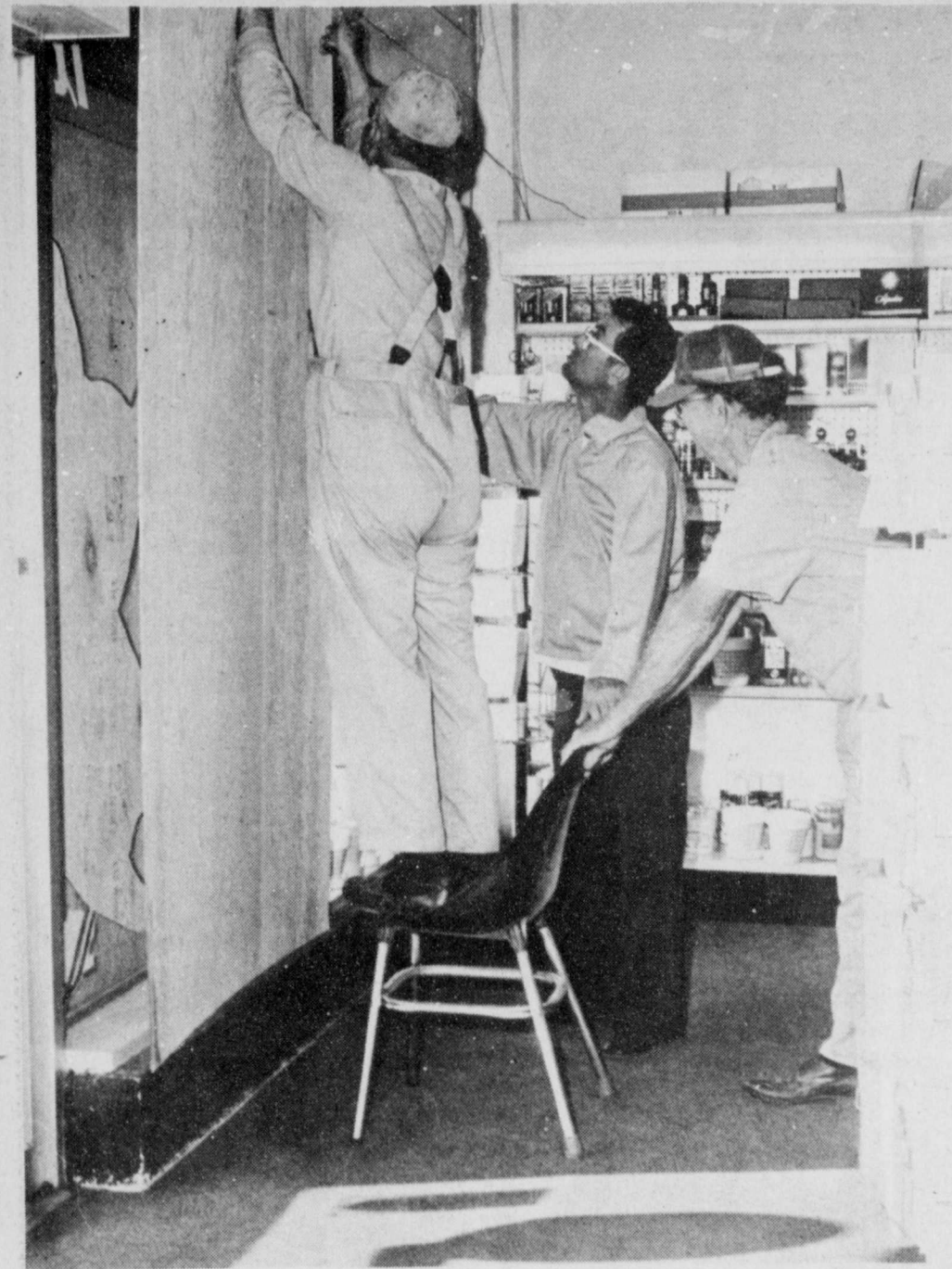

Back on 37 continue north to 195 and turn left, go the F.M. 410 and then right to the Sam Houston Park and marker with Jane Gill grave and monument, continue on 410 to the Wright Plantation, Kiomatia, Kana-wha, Woodland and Detroit and go by the John Nance Garner home. Then to Bagwell to the school building where each room is to have furnishings characteristic of other days, returning to Clarksville to the Presbyterian Church on 106 S. Pecan St. and see the little chapel within the building.

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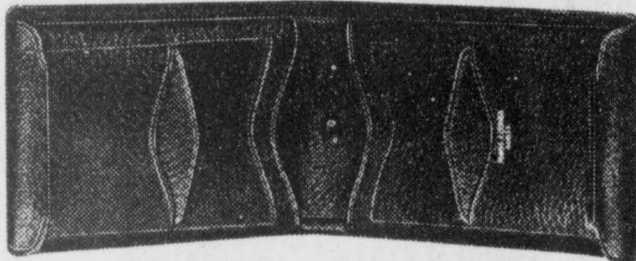
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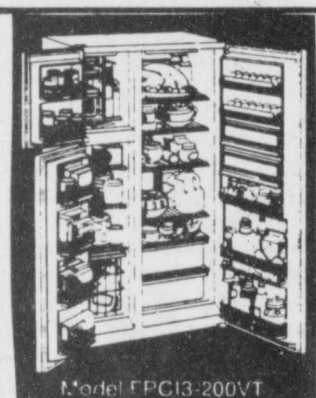

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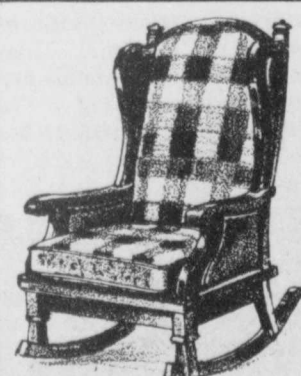

Redesigned Cancer Drugs May Increase Effectiveness

Many cancer drugs exist that can kill or arrest the spread of cancerous cells. But none of these drugs can be considered a satisfactory cure for cancer.

The main drawbacks of most of the drugs presently used in chemotherapy (treatment with chemicals) are threefold: they kill many normal cells, and they are ineffective against resting cancer cells. In addition, the cancerous cells eventually develop a resistance to the drugs.

"While there is no cancer drug without undesired toxicity, some drugs could be redesigned to exist in a harmless storage form that could be distributed throughout the body," says Dr. Joseph Nagyvary, a professor of nucleotide chemistry in the Department of Biochemistry and Biophysics, The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and Texas A&M University.

"These redesigned drugs would be able to easily pass through the walls of all cells and become active mainly when in the presence of abnormal, growing tissue," Nagyvary stated.

"Notice I say abnormal. The approach my group is investigating is expected to work on not only cancerous tissue, but also it is being studied for problems of allergy, psoriasis and brain tissue. At present, problems with all of these involve some of the most resistant cells of the body."

"Biological studies on allergy, effect on the brain and on psoriasis will be performed in collaboration with Dr. A. Szentivanyi (Tampa, Florida) and Dr. W. Klemm (Texas A&M University). "Texans will be pleased to know that while the initial research of the team I head was supported by the Experiment Station and Texas A&M, our present research is strongly supported by federal grants."

"Our involvement in development of new drugs, which was begun

in 1968, has received the attention and financial support of the National Institutes of Health. Results and projects developed here at Texas A&M have been recognized and adopted by some prominent research institutions.

"Drugs can do their thing—good or bad—only in tissues where they are absorbed. The same drug can be invigorating or intoxicating, depending on the site and manner of its administration. Much effort is spent nowadays on regulating or modulating the delivery (logistics) of drugs to selected tissues."

Some of the best drugs, such as aspirin and penicillin, were the result of accidental discoveries, but the modern scientist likes to rely on rational approaches. There are several obvious areas for achieving a better utilization of drugs. The TAMU group is zeroing in on better penetration of tissues by a certain class of drugs called nucleotide anti-metabolites.

"These compounds were unable to penetrate cellular membranes because of their electric charge which, on the other hand, is required for biological activity. The rationale underlying our strategy was suggested by the behavior of organophosphate insecticides which are neutral molecules and possess superior penetration."

Logically, Nagyvary and his colleagues transformed one of the important cellular agents, so called cAMP, into a neutral phosphate. It is known that cAMP not only regulates the growth and shape of cells, it is also involved in diseases such as psoriasis, asthma, diabetes, hypoglycemia and even in aging.

Yet, when injected, cAMP does little good for reasons of poor absorption through cell walls. But after modification in neutral form, it exhibits some of the desired activities and it seems even to stimulate the

nervous system, which is the toughest target to penetrate.

Other advantages of using the neutral organophosphate form of drugs, according to Nagyvary, are that it can be considered a good storage form, from which the active agent is released only slowly with a longer period of action and less toxicity. The application of the same principle to cancer drugs will lead to the development of better efficiency in the treatment of resistant tumors, which otherwise do not respond to chemotherapy.

Nagyvary emphasizes that his group does only the initial part of drug development, including chemical design, studies of biochemical mechanisms of action, and simple small animal studies. Research hospitals take care of the further applications to human diseases. Nagyvary feels much credit should go to those responsible for advocating the new line of research activity. He singles out the work of Dr. R. K. Gohis and Dr. R. G. Gillen.

These findings of the TAES team were presented on May 19 at Buffalo, New York, before the Sixteenth Annual Medicinal Chemistry Symposium.

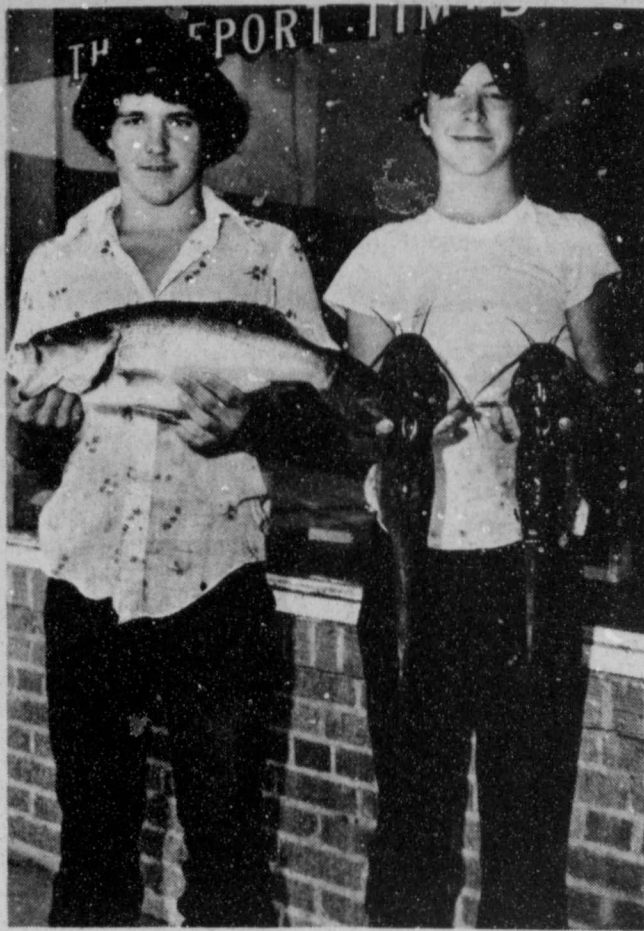
In 1968, Nagyvary's students initiated biological testing of an anti-leukemic agent which was further developed and modified in Japan and is on its way to becoming the best single agent against human leukemia.

There are new horizons, which bring new excitement and challenges, such as the stimulation of the brain and the rejuvenation of cells and organs. Research of such fundamental interest and wide scope is bound to benefit plant, animal and human health.

Concurrent Enrollment At PJC For Seniors

High school seniors interested in getting a head start on earning college credits may enroll at Paris Junior College this summer or next fall while still a high school student. The concurrent enrollment plan is open to

graduating seniors who obtain prior approval from their high school principal, said Jerry deBin, director of admission services at PJC.

Paris Junior College has

established the program through cooperative agreements with area high school officials, deBin said, but the program does not take the place of required or elective high school courses. Grades will be posted on the college transcript for credit after all high school requirements have been met.

Although the plan has been in effect at PJC for several years, this year it has been

extended to include summer school students who will be high school seniors in the fall. Seniors in the plan must enroll at PJC for a reduced course load not to exceed two college courses per semester.

Eligible seniors may enroll in either academic or vocational courses in day or evening school if they (1) obtain written approval of their principal, (2) are scheduled to graduate in the

forthcoming school year, (3) are not required to take a full load of high school courses to meet graduation requirements, (4) have completed at least 14 of the 16 basic high school units required by the Texas Education Agency, (5) have an interview with a PJC counselor concerning educational planning, and (6) have approval of the PJC Admissions Office.

More information on the concurrent enrollment plan may be obtained from deBin at PJC, 784-6601, extension 69, or at the Cypress Basin Community College Center, Mt. Pleasant, and Fannin County Center, Honey Grove. Registration for the first summer term of PJC is June 2, but late registration will be permitted through Friday, June 6.

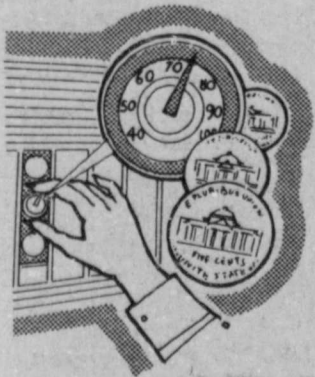

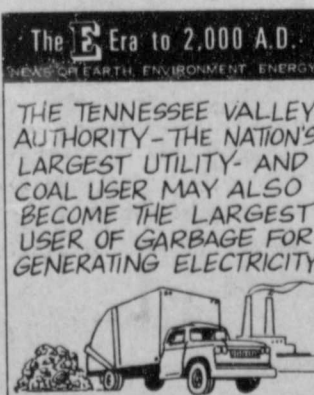

Bloom Drop In Tomatoes

Certain environmental conditions will cause tomato blooms to shed, resulting in a poor fruit set. Partial failure of flowers to develop into fruit will surely result in abnormal

fruits which may be misshapen or catfaced.

Blossom drop is most common in tomatoes which bloom late. The usual cause for poor fruit set is high temperatures—either at night or day. Nighttime temperatures above 72 degrees F. along with daytime temperatures above 90 degrees F. often result in heavy blossom drop. On the other hand, unseasonably cool weather

may also cause blossoms to drop in addition to causing abnormalities in fruits.

Other factors causing lack of fruit set or abnormal fruit include unbalanced nutrition, extended periods of warm, windy weather with low humidity, extended periods of showery, cool, overcast weather in the early spring, and insects and diseases.

Therefore, providing a balanced fertilizer and controlling insects and diseases will help in controlling blossom drop. Of course, little can be done about weather conditions.

Poor fruit set is most common in the large slicing types of tomatoes. However, such varieties as Early Giant, Spring Giant, Spring Set and Improved Summertime have the ability to set fruit during somewhat higher temperatures.

Smaller sized tomatoes that normally do not have the fruit set problem include such varieties as Small Fry, Red Cherry, Roma and the new Texas Agricultural Experiment Station variety, Saladette.

If you bought more seeds than needed to plant your spring vegetable garden, store them properly and they will remain viable for a number of years.

Properly stored seeds can be used for fall gardens as well as for plantings next spring. Saving seeds is especially important since some varieties are often difficult to find. Furthermore, seeds are becoming more expensive so they should not be wasted.

Most vegetable seeds can simply be stored in the home refrigerator for periods of two to five years. Seeds should be packaged in an air tight container such as a glass jar with a tight-fitting lid. Before storing seeds, make sure they are free of moisture.

If seeds are to be placed in packets or envelopes other than the ones they came in, be sure to note the variety and source of seeds on the packet as well as the date seeds are stored.

Most seeds can be stored at least three years except for corn, okra, onion, parsley and parsnip which can be stored up to two years without losing viability. Seeds of vegetables belonging to the cabbage family as well as cucumbers, squash and watermelons can be kept in cold storage up to five years.

It's best to purchase only the amount of fresh seeds you need for a particular planting. However, surplus seeds can be stored safely if they are kept dry and refrigerated.

questions and answers

Q. I am going to apply for supplemental security income. My son, who is 16, is blind. Would he be eligible for payments, too?

A. He may be. Supplemental security income payments can be made to a blind or disabled child, or to someone on a child's behalf. The child should apply for payments, or if he is unable to do so, you should apply in his behalf.

Q. I started getting supplemental security income

payments last year. Do I have to file an application for these payments every year?

A. No, but social security will review your case to re-determine your eligibility and payment amount. You'll receive a letter from social security telling you when it is time for your redetermination.

Q. I'm getting married this month. My husband and I plan to use a hyphenated combination of both our last

names as our married name. Should we both report this change to social security?

A. Yes, especially if you are both employed. Whenever you change the name you use in your employment—because of marriage, divorce, or other reasons—you should have it changed on your social security records. You can change your name by filling out a form available at social security offices and at many post offices and employer personnel offices.

This year Americans may buy as many as 220,000 condominium units. The condominium is the newest American housing trend. Within 20 years, housing experts predict that over 50 percent of the population will be living in this type of housing.

There are many reasons why condominiums are fast becoming so popular. They allow the consumer to buy his own apartment or townhouse with a multiunit

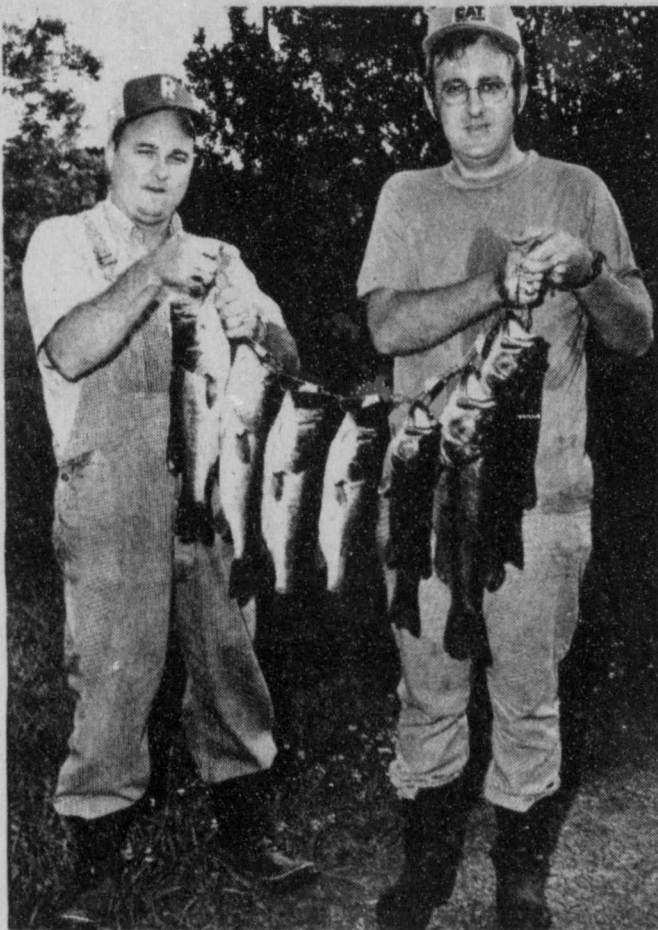
project and at the same time share equally with other owners an interest in the common areas: halls, elevators, stairways, grounds, parking lots, and recreational areas.

Condominiums have certain tax benefits. Because a condominium owner buys his unit as he would a house—with a down payment, monthly mortgage payments, and the payment of real estate taxes—he can make the same tax deductions as a conventional homeowner. Also, there tends to be a greater ease in finding financing for a condominium purchase. Units tend to be lower priced than regular houses for the same amount of living space.

Along with the growing number of consumers who are buying condominiums, comes an increasing number of complaints about shoddy construction, poor maintenance, hidden costs, and resale difficulties. To protect consumers against these and other problems, Federal agencies, like the Federal Trade Commission, are investigating the condominium industry.

SENIOR CITIZEN'S CORNER

HELPFUL IDEAS FOR SUCCESSFUL RETIREMENT

ELDERLY HOUSING

Senior citizens may want less living space than they once might have required. Keep in mind that easy maintenance and safety become paramount considerations at this stage of life. Take the time to create a safe, healthful, stimulating environment without overemphasizing features that constantly remind you or your loved ones of your age and/or your infirmities. In the interests of effective use of space, consider the following:

—Ramps, both inside and outside, are necessary with certain grade level or elevation level

specifications. The maximum grade should be a 1-inch rise in 12 inches to provide for unassisted movement by wheelchair or walker.

—Provide railings on both sides of all hallways to allow safer travel through these areas.

—Install lever-type handles on all inside door latches. Elderly persons often find it difficult to operate round or oval knobs.

—Locate all apartment electrical switches, convenience outlets, and thermostats 36 inches above the floor (except over kitchen counters).

—All single doors within a living unit should be at least 3 feet wide.

—In the kitchen, cover the back-splash area between the counter tops and upper cabinets with 1/4" perforated hardboard. Adjustable shelves can be attached to this surface at an easily-reached height for small items.

—Upper shelves in kitchen cabinets, as well as shelves in storage areas, should be easily adjustable for storing items of varying heights.

—Strip lighting under upper cabinets increases the light level at the counter top.

—Plan a counter top that will be adjacent to both the range and refrigerator.

—Install a fire alarm or heat-sensing unit over the kitchen stove area.
