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## Our Town...

WRITING FOR a newspaper, you learn to expect suggestions and requests by the numbers.

Projects, causes, ideas and situations are placed before a newspaper by the dozens each with its own merit for editorial support.

These are suggestions and assistance for which a newspaper cannot do without. These provide grass roots sampling of citizenship and community. These provide integrity of interest, bonafide friendship, cooperation and support — ingredients all for a newspaper's good health.

And, in most cases, these are areas of concern for which a newspaper and the citizenship as a whole should be concerned.

RECENTLY, TO this desk has come polite suggestions for dozens of editorial comment.

We have been asked to "fight" crippling diseases, including highway motorcade. We've been asked to battle Benson and support medical research, renew respect for constitutional law and solve state financial problems.

We've been asked to weave a magic wand of words for quick industrial growth, ignite the spark for construction of new residences, advise high school graduates what they must do to save our spinning world.

We've been called upon to straighten out parents, put young and old to reading books, erase juvenile delinquency, support the Farm Bureau, support Farmers Union, point out pitfalls of inflation, denounce tight money policy, combat rabies, increase attendance at Little League games, lend support for civic group projects, plus many more.

Infact, there are few organizations within our community who, sometimes or another, do not see the need for editorial support from their community newspaper.

THIS BEING a melting pot, so to speak, for ideas and thoughts isn't entirely an easy task.

A person whose keen interest has pushed his study for months into a complicated problem like cancer research or state taxes, for instance, sometimes can't quite understand why a newspaperman — with his suggestion — cannot sit down at a typewriter immediately and compose a princely worded editorial within a period of minutes.

Sometimes, too, it is difficult explaining to a person with definitely charted concept of government that a few hours of study is necessary to determine, first of all, if the newspaper's attitude really coincides with the type of editorial he suggests.

FOR AN HOUR yesterday I totaled an accounting of ideas for editorial comment suggested to me through the years. Not haphazardly, but by listing these one at a time on paper.

There was one glaring fact. Missing from all the list was God and church.

For all the causes, for all the ideas, for all the layman groups and individuals — not one was concerned primarily for God and church.

IT STRUCK me right then in this one sidelight of newspapering is a pretty good critique on our modern life.

We are concerned with life and death, vocation and subsistence, society and its man-made problems.

We have a wonderful way of losing ourselves in Lionism, Kiwanis, Jaycees, Chamber of Commerce, lodge fellowships, women clubs, business organizations, charity programs, projects for health and welfare, politics, better schools, Scout work, baseball and other programs for youngsters.

We can pull ourselves away from our jobs and families, trim our sleep and recreation. See OUB TOWN Pg. 7

## FIREMAN FOR 21 YEARS

# Eual Henderson Named Fire Department Chief

Volunteer firemen have named Eual Henderson, a fireman for 21 years, as their chief.

He succeeds A. G. (Red) Ballard, who has served as chief for the last three years.

Henderson, 55, moves into the chief's position with probably the busiest fire fighting record in the history of Colorado City.

Other fire department officers elected during the last week are Ballard, who becomes first assistant chief; Lon Robertson, second assistant chief; Roy J. Porter, re-elected secretary; treasurer; Rev. Don Mecoy, re-elected chaplain, and Don DeLaney, sergeant at arms.

Named drill captains are Thomas D. (Don) Henderson and J. A. Sadler Jr.

The new chief is the third Henderson to serve as chief of the volunteer department.

His brother, Leonard Henderson, was chief for more than a score of years and his nephew, Don Henderson, also served as chief just before Ballard was named to the post.

Chief Henderson, who is local manager for Southland Ice Company, is a native of Brown County when he was 11 years of age.

He first became a volunteer fireman 21 years ago and has served in that capacity ever since except for two years and seven months, when he was a paid driver for the department.

Henderson has been an employee with Southland Ice for 24 years, except for the interim as a fire department driver. The last 15 years he has been manager of the ice plant.

During his fire department service he has held just about every office, serving in recent years as assistant chief.

He remembers as the city's hardest fought fires the Berry-Lumber blaze — Labor Day 1939, the same date Hitler's army invaded Poland, and the 1954 Colorado Hotel blaze which killed four persons.

# Burglars Grab \$1,000 In Loot At Sport Shop



## Entrance Gained By Roof

Burglars early Saturday morning carried away more than \$1,000 in loot after breaking into The Sport Shop, 411 E. Second.

The thugs, working in a hurry and with know-how efficiency, passed up numerous valuables to haul out only pistols, knives and watches.

Patrolman Billy Henderson discovered the burglary at 3:20 a. m. when he noticed the rear door open at the shop.

Apparently the burglars had entered the building, which adjoins alleys on east and south sides, and completed their crime in 30 or 40 minutes between police door checks in the area.

Tex Keel, owner and operator of The Sport Shop, said value of the loot would exceed more than \$1,000. He was still checking Saturday to determine exact amount of the loss.

Police Chief Leon Yeager said the burglary technique was similar to break-ins reported recently in Snyder, Sweetwater, Big Spring where main loot was guns.

Entrance to The Sport Shop was gained by placing a ladder to the roof at rear of Riordan Hardware and then walking the roof to the shop.

The burglars pulled filter pads from The Sport Shop roof air-conditioner, then entered the building through the air-conditioner.

Inside the shop, they went to the gun, watch and knife displays in the front of the building. They left through the rear door opening onto parking and alley area.

Keel said they passed up more expensive guns for short 22, 25 and .38 caliber pistols.

Reported taken in the break-in were two .25 caliber Calci pistol, one .22 caliber Star pistol, one Bernadelli pistol, one toy Colt Frontier pistol, one .22 caliber Smith & Wesson pistol, two Frontier colt single action pistols, one .38 caliber W. A. C. pistol, undetermined number of watches (mostly women's style) and numerous pocket knives —

# Friday Civic House Meeting To Discuss Museum Project

Plans for Colorado City's museum will be placed before the public Friday night at 8 o'clock in Civic House.

The special meeting for all interested citizens has been set by temporary officers and directors of Colorado Museum Association.

Purpose of the meeting will be to inform citizens of project already accomplished by the association, outline future program and to enlist interest and support for the project, according to R. H. (Harry) Ratliff, association president.

Two principal projects coming up for the association are obtaining building space to house items on display in the

museum collection and to secure expanded membership for the association.

Memberships in the association will be \$5 per person or \$7.50 for a family.

Organizers of the association, headed by Ratliff and C. C. Thompson, vice chairman, emphasized the museum project as an opportunity to preserve the community's historical heritage and to also create tourist attraction.

The association already has paid for the cutting and moving of two sets of buffalo tracks from the sand rock at Seven Wells.

Numerous persons have contacted museum leaders already with suggestions of relics and historical items they wish to contribute to the museum's collection.

This has put museum officials already to investigating building space for the collection.

Among those studied is the American Legion Hut, corner of Chestnut and E. Third, southeast across the intersection from First Baptist Church.

Ratliff said all persons "even remotely acquainted or interested in the Museum" are urged to attend the meeting Friday night in Civic House.

## EDUCATOR TO SPEAK

# Independence Day Program Planned

President-elect of Texas Christian University in Fort Worth will be principal speaker for Colorado City's annual Independence Day observance.

He is Dr. D. Ray Lindley, educator-minister writer, who has been vice president and executive vice president of TCU since 1953.

Lindley will speak July 3 at 8:30 p. m. in the Ruddick Park amphitheater to an all-community audience.

Sponsoring the park program on the eve of Independence Day will be Chamber of Commerce civic committee and Colorado City Ministerial Alliance.

The event has become a traditional observance for the community within late years under the joint chamber-alliance sponsorship.

Lindley, cited regionally and nationally for his accomplishments for Christian education, returned to his alma mater in 1953 as vice president with primary responsibility for campus administration.

Last October he was named executive vice president and when Dr. M. E. Sadler was made chancellor of the university, the board of trustees asked Lindley to take the office of president as of Sept. 1.

Lindley has been a regular contributor to educational and religious journals. He is author of the book, "Apostles of Freedom," published by Bethany Press in 1957.

He was listed in Who's Who in the Ministry as early as 1937, in Who's Who in Education in 1947 and has been listed in Who's Who in America since 1948. Currently, he is a member of the "Panel of Vin Winget,

Scholars" charged with refining the doctrines of the Disciples of Christ.

For three years he was president of Atlantic Christian College in Wilson, N. C., beginning in 1950, leading the college from debt, instituting a major building program, expanding enrollment and faculty.

Previously, he served as dean of Bible College of the Bible, TCU, and minister of churches in Ross, City, Weatherford, Big Spring, New Orleans and San Antonio.

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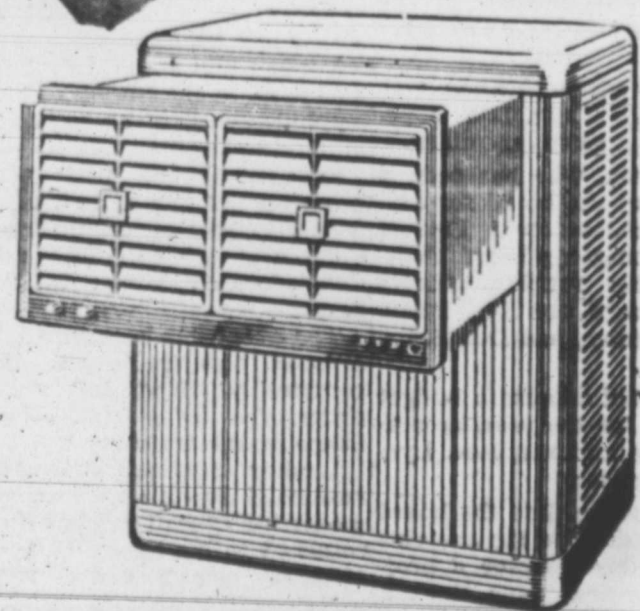

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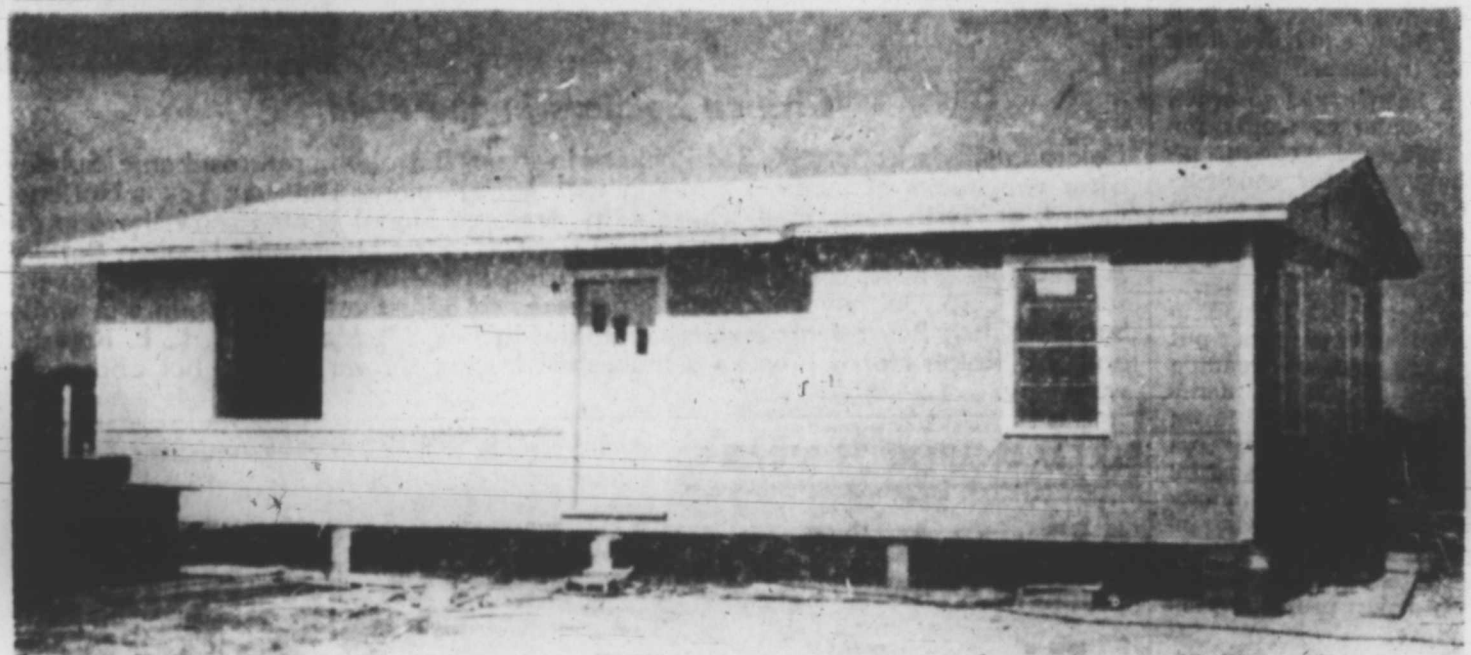

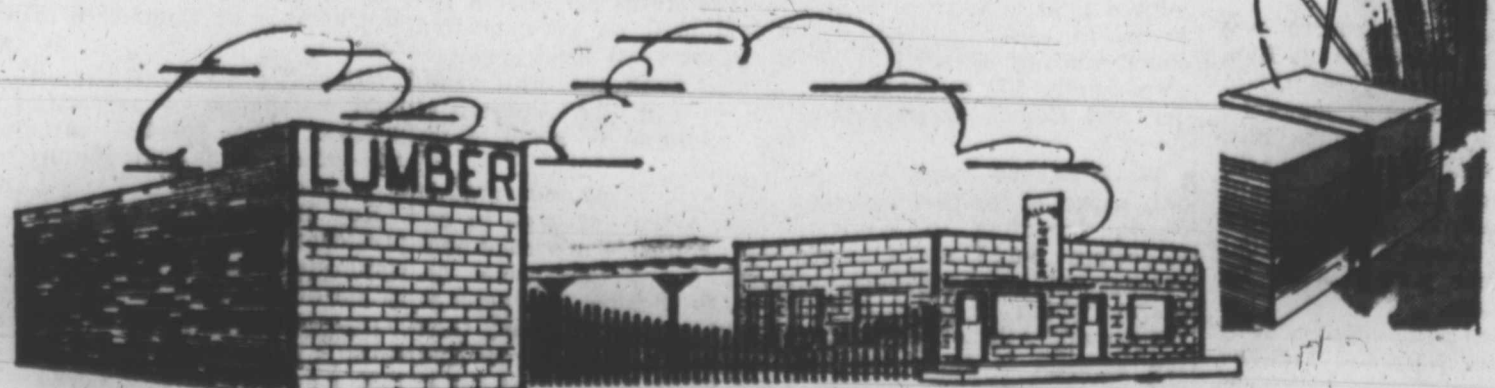

She stated that they were like any large family — when they had a disease or anything, they had five. She added that they had the mumps and measles this spring—five cases of both.

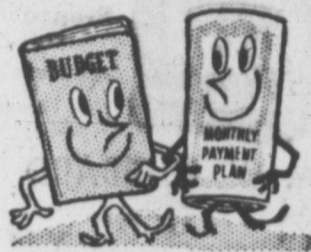
