City receives Texas Capital Grant

\$750,000 awarded to Colorado City for sewer, water project

Last week, Mayor Jim Baum announced that the City of Colorado City is the recipient of a \$750,000 Texas Capital Fund Grant. The grant is part of a federally-funded program tied to job creation in rural areas.

The funding will allow the city to complete the sewer/water line out to the loca-

tion where the Stripes Travel Center will be on the hook for a matching \$750,000 investment which is required by the state as part of the grant.

Because the grant comes from the federal government's job creation initiative, Stripes is also required to create new jobs,

as part of the project. Right now, the company has said the new Travel Center will bring 38 full-time jobs to this area.

Texas Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples weighed in on the announcement. He said that the economy in rural Texas has changed and many youths in small communities are lured away after high

school graduation.

Staples said that the grant is part of the state's focus on rural economic development. "Colorado City has a lot to offer," he said, adding that he hopes the grant will enable the city to continue to move forward.

Sports complex has water woes

Water is the commodity of the future, and that is certainly true in this drought-stricken area of Texas. Disputes and rumors fly over the natural resource, but one thing remains constant: water is a necessity of life.

Lately, rumors have been circulating that the Mitchell County Sports Complex has been unable to water the fields at the facility due to water wells going dry. The rumors have taken a more sinister turn, and it has been said that the sports complex

is running out of water due to the commercial water facility going in nearby.

Wood Family Properties has put in a commercial water facility on Rogers Rd., and several citizens have been heard saying that the facility is causing a water shortage at the complex. However, officials at the Lone Wolf Groundwater Conservation District say there is no evidence to support the theory at this time.

Pipelines criss-crossing Mitchell County will tie into China Grove facility

There are at least five companies building pipelines that run through Mitchell County and tie into the China Grove oil storage facility north of Colorado City. One of those is a 12" pipeline being constructed by Centurion Pipeline L.P., a subsidiary of Occidental Petroleum Corporation, dubbed the Cline Shale Pipeline System.

Once finished the line, which originates near Barnhart, will be capable of transporting approximately 75,000 barrels of crude

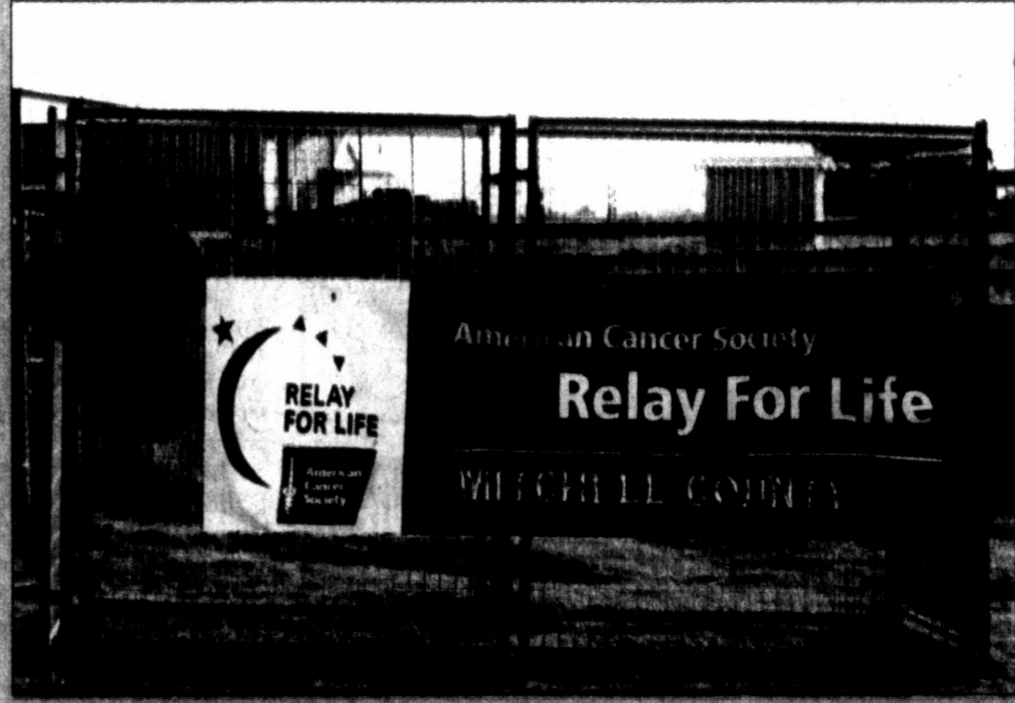
oil per day to the Colorado City station near China Grove, according to Construction Supervisor Wade Sands.

Sands and his wife, Doris, have recently moved to Colorado City, a homecoming of sorts for Doris as she was raised here. As construction supervisor for this area, Sands supervises maintenance and construction crews, as well as working with engineers on projects.

Who's going to jail?

Volunteers of Mitchell County Relay for Life are planning to lock up some of the county's most prominent citizens on Friday, March 28th on the Fuller Foods parking lot. Hospital had exceptional year

The hospital board heard an audit report by Brent Fuller of Durbin & Co. during a regular meeting Tuesday evening. Fuller told board members that the hospital had "an exceptionally good year in 2013."

Fuller said that Mitchell County Hospital District had a positive financial year that saw a \$733,000 increase in cash and a good year in reimbursements. A clean, unqualified audit was the report given to board members.

"It's unusual to have a gain from operating activities," Fuller said, "and you have seen a gain two years in a row. Congratulations!"

Along with bolstering the hospital's cash position, administrators were also able to reduce the long-term debt by \$700,000. Days of cash on hand is now 93.9, up from 72.10 a year ago and up from 25.4 in 2011.

Hospital administrator Robbie Dewberry said that plans for

the new clinic are about 95% complete. The medical staff is reviewing them and Dewberry expects them to be finished in the next couple of weeks.

At that time, a meeting will be called for the board to review and consider approving the plans in the next couple of weeks. Once they are approved by the board, the plans will be forwarded on to the state.

Water planners set bar

When voters approved using \$2 billion from the state's Rainy Day Fund for water financing last November, they were also supporting a measure that reserves 20 percent of that money for "water conservation and reuse projects."

Now, state and local water planning officials have to decide what "water conservation and reuse" actually means. And after months of debate, the Texas Water Development Board, which will ultimately decide how to administer the funds, is still not sure exactly which water projects should fall into that category.

"When funding comes from the state, it is not unusual for there to be disagreements over the definition and what should be included and what shouldn't," said state Sen. Troy Fraser, R-

Horseshoe Bay, the chairman of the Senate Natural Resources Committee. "We want 20 percent allocated to conservation and reuse, but we also gave very broad authority to the board to make these decisions."

So far, there seems to be a consensus over what does not qualify for the reserved conservation funding. In recent public meetings held by the water board, water officials and environmental advocates from across the state agreed that expensive projects like aquifer storage and recovery, a kind of underground reservoir storage solution, and desalination should be excluded. That does not mean they can't be eligible for any low-cost loans provided by the \$2 billion — but they will not get the special treatment afforded to conservation projects.

On the other hand, many

planners agreed that rainwater harvesting projects and brush control practices, which could include removing water-intensive plants like cedar and mesquite, should qualify under the "conservation and reuse" category. There was also broad support for addressing water loss from treatment plants and pipelines.

Beyond defining "conservation and reuse," there are a few other legal issues that could further complicate reserving 20 percent of the funds for that purpose.

Jeff Leuschel, a Dallas lawyer who specializes in public finance law, said the phrasing of the landmark water legislation passed last session leaves some room for interpretation. The statute saying the water board "shall undertake to apply" not less than 20 percent of funds for conservation and reuse leaves a lot of wiggle room for the water board.

"The words in the statute are interesting to a lawyer," Leuschel said at a recent University of Texas panel on water funding. "The 'shall undertake to apply' aspect essentially means to try. What will happen if you fail?" Some environmental groups that fought hard for that portion of the law also have that concern, and fear that there is no real requirement to reserve any funds for conservation in the law — only a suggestion.

The Water Development Board's chairman, Carlos Rubinstein, disagreed. He said he intends for at least 20 percent of the funds to go toward conservation and reuse, if not more.

"Conservation is a critical strategy for protecting the state's water supplies," Rubinstein said. "I read the language ... regarding the 20 percent set aside for conservation and reuse as a floor, not a ceiling."

Reuse projects, which reclaim and treat wastewater to industrial or drinking standards, are also expensive, raising concerns that they would take up a large portion or even all of the fund-

ing reserved for conservation and reuse.

"The whole 20 percent could be used for reuse projects," said Mary Kelly, an Austin-based environmental lawyer and consultant. "But I hope that is not the case, because there's a lot that can be done with efficiency and reduction loss projects that don't qualify as reuse."

Kelly said the greatest risk with administering a \$2 billion fund is that it is appealing for the board to invest in big projects because of mounting political pressure to do something big and flashy. That could tie up a large amount of money in long-term projects that won't be executed until several years, or even decades, from now — failing to address current water needs and potentially even discouraging water conservation.

"The underlying goal should be to use the money to efficiently address real, not paper demands," Kelly said.

In some cases, the funds could be used for unconventional purposes. For instance, cities have spent millions of dollars on public education campaigns to encourage residents to conserve water. Robert Mace, deputy executive administrator at the Texas Water Development Board, said such campaigns would also be eligible to qualify for funding as long as they are part of a strategy in the state water plan and there is a political subdivision, like a county or a city, that could apply for and ultimately spend the money.

Fraser said that state lawmakers meant for the money to be spent on water resource projects rather than measures like public education campaigns, but "if the board decides to include it, I'll be supportive of it."

Carole Baker, executive director at the Texas Water Foundation, said that on top of those types of solutions, consumer-side efficiency technologies — like low-flow toilet or efficient showerhead distribution programs — should be considered "conservation," and they should be able to receive funding.

"We should encourage people to think outside the box and see how technology could open their minds to new ways of water conservation," Baker said.

Mace said the board would strongly encourage the implementation of such technology. Many Texas cities, like as San Antonio, have long had success in reducing residential water use by giving people rebates for water-efficient appliances.

The Texas Water Development Board will come up with draft rules for spending the Proposition 6 water funds by June 2014. After that, the public will have several months to weigh in.

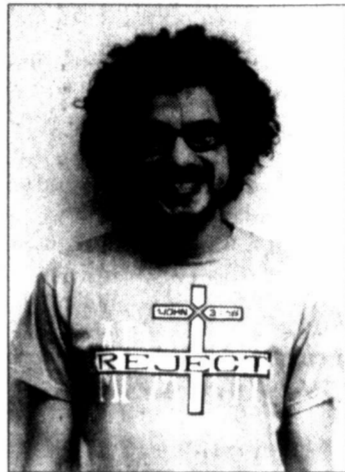

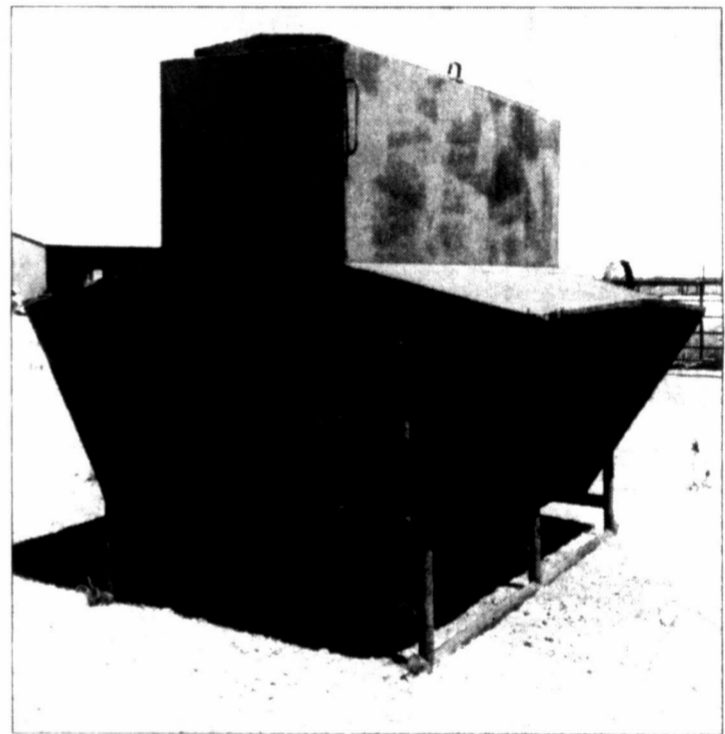

Casares is finalist for IACP top award

Texas Department of Public Safety State Trooper Frank Casares was named Trooper of the Year for the region, an honor resulting in him being nominated as one of four finalists for the 2013 International Association of Chiefs of Police/Motorola Trooper of the Year Award.

He was joined by three other finalists, Sam Moss from Virginia, Jay Farmer of Washington and Brad Williams of Illinois. Casares, along with friends and family members, traveled to New Orleans, Louisiana, to attend a banquet last weekend where the finalists were honored in a number of ways. During the banquet, Virginia Trooper Moss

was honored as the IACP Top National Trooper.

Each of the finalists were presented bronze eagle head trophies, recognizing them for their outstanding service to their units. He said that he was also able to meet many directors from all over the United States. Assistant Colonel David Baker of

Austin helped Casares represent the Texas DPS.

"The hospitality was incredible," he said Monday. "It was really cool."

Casares said that as the banquet was wrapping up, organizers said, "Let's Party Louisiana style!" Two motorcycles and a marching band came into the banquet hall. People threw strings of beads in true Mardi Gras style.

An opportunity arose to meet James B. Comey, Director of the FBI, and Casares said that it made quite an impression on him.

Besides attending the event, Casares got to see the sites in New Orleans for a couple of days before returning home Sunday.

A DPS Director's Citation was presented to Casares in August for his actions which saved his own life and prevented further violence when he was shot at while making a routine traffic stop early last

year. On January 21, 2013, Casares stopped a speeding vehicle on I-20 near Colorado City when an occupant of the car began shooting, and a vehicle pursuit ensued.

Although the three suspects were able to evade police, tips led investigators to a residence where the trio was hiding. A 10-hour standoff ultimately ended with the DPS SWAT team arresting the suspects, who were identified as Oklahoma gang members wanted in connection with a bank robbery and several homicides there.

"DPS is proud to have Trooper Frank Casares within our ranks, and thanks to his selfless dedication, the state of Texas is a safer place. DPS troopers, agents and Texas Rangers risk their lives every day to protect our communities, and it is enormously gratifying that the IACP is recognizing the outstanding work of one of our own," DPS Director Steven McCraw said.

TUMBLEWEED SMITH Chain saw art on a golf course

The Gaines County Golf Course, between Seminole and Seagraves, is a sculpture garden filled with unique wooden carvings created from trees that succumbed to the long standing drought. "We lost a lot of trees and it seemed like such a shame to see them just die," says Kathy Davis of Seminole. "There are some really big trees out there."

Kathy wanted to do something about those dead trees that looked bad on the golf course. She contacted a well-known chainsaw artist, Cam Dockery of Whitharral. He came down and started to work.

"There are nine carvings," says Kathy. "The first one is right outside the pro shop and it is of a magnificent eagle with the American flag in its talons. It's very patriotic and emotion provoking."

One huge tree is full of bears. "There are seven bears in this tree and they're waving and doing all sorts of things."

Perhaps the most dramatic sculpture is a large tree parallel with the ground that has three longhorns coming out of it. "They pretty much explode out of the tree and the roots are still there. He really did a fine job on that one. It was the one that kind of changed the whole thought process of what we were doing. Instead of something kind of fun and campy it became something serious and very artistic. It's historic, too, because it speaks to the history of our country. Getting to watch him carve those longhorns from that big tree was an experience that's hard to describe."

Kathy was raising money for the project when she ran into the county judge at the golf course. She asked him for a hundred dollars and when he asked her what she was going to do with the money, she told him about her plan to create something from those dead trees. He was impressed. "He told me since this was for the good of the county he thought the county could handle it and asked me how much it was going to cost. I gave him an estimate and he said the county could take care of it."

The project, which features chain saw figures of bobcat, coyote and fox, as well as an Indian maiden, took from May to August of last year. "Most of them are trees that were and are still in the ground and he carved them right there where they grew. He could do one big carving or two small ones in a single day. The total cost for the nine carvings came to just under eleven thousand dollars. I don't know of any golf course in the nation that has what we have." Kathy had an idea for the golf course art eight years ago and contacted Cam at that time. But he became ill and was not able to do it. Kathy got busy with other things, and then when the drought got so bad and more trees started to die, she decided to revive the project.

Cam thinks his statue of an Indian Chief is the real showcase. Kathy says it's her favorite, too. He did that one in two days. "The feathers in his head dress look like real feathers. It's fine art."

A detective story...

Where did the C-City railraod depot come from?

Following the Mitchell County Reunion luncheon in Colorado City TX on September 29th this year (2007), my brother Craig and I drove out to Van Horn with the intention of taking a tour of the Red Rock Ranch, located just north of the town. We made the tour, and seeing that red Precambrian sandstone made me think of the stone from which the Texas and Pacific depot was built there at Colorado City. The building no longer exists, having been demolished somewhere around 1977. (The stone was later used to build a low sidewalk fence around the old John Prude home on East 4th Street.)

The questions of 1) when the depot building was built, and 2) where the stone came from kept coming up in my old "rockhead" mind. I had to find out the answers. I still don't know when the building was built, but I am pretty sure -- like Ivory Soap, about 99.44% pure -- that I have the answer as to where the stone came from.

The first "clue" came from Mike Burt. He said that he had heard that the stone came from "...out west of Monahans." Then from Frances (Elliott) Godwin, via her sister Ruth (Elliott) Cooper, I learned of a Mr. Arles Cotton who had lived out in the Toyah area, but who now lived in the Dunn community north of Colorado City and Buford.

I called Mr. Cotton and he told me that he thought the stone might have come from a quarry located between Pyote and Barstow, south of the T & P tracks. He also said that a jail house had

been built of the stone in Toyah.

Have you ever tried to find the phone number of a person in a small town where you don't know a soul? If you have a computer, you go to the internet White Pages and look for a Smith, a Jones, a Johnson, or some name like that. Then you begin calling.

Mr. David Smith of Toyah told me that he knew of the quarry, and that "...lots of buildings in Toyah were built of the stone". He also said that the old jail building had become a bank, then later the building had been destroyed, along with many of the older buildings. He also gave me the name of a Mr. Billie Mac Jobe -- Toyah -- who might have some more information.

Mr. Jobe was quite helpful. He said that he remembered the quarry south of the T & P tracks, and said that a new quarry had been opened north of the tracks in recent years, with the stone being cut into block form in either Barstow or Pecos. He also spoke of it as a "...dark red sandstone."

Mr. Jobe gave me the name of a Mr. Mike Harrison who actually lived in Midland but ranched near Pecos. Mr. Harrison remembered the quarry as being located on the east side of a gully or draw south of the tracks.

My next contact came via a call to the West Texas State School -- a correctional institution -- located in Pyote, practically the only thing actually left in the town these days. They gave me the name and number of a "Mrs. Price". I called the number, but the name was not Price. But the lady did remember

that numerous Pyote buildings were built from the stone from the quarry, and that it was a dark red sandstone.

Now for a little geology. I looked at a copy of the geologic map of Texas and saw that there was an outcrop of Upper Triassic Dockum Group beds in the area. (These beds are roughly age-equivalent to the beds of sandstone found at Seven Wells, south of Colorado City.) Then, I went to Bulletin 3232 of the Texas Bureau of Economic Geology and found "...the lower Dockum consists of 40-50 feet of the main sandstone (quarried at Quito), which is red and gray, cross-bedded, and ripple-marked..."

I have talked to a couple of geologists in Midland TX and they tell me that today you can see blood-red sandstones outcropping in road cuts and in gullies on both the north and south sides of the former T & P tracks -- now the Missouri Pacific. I have also looked at the area via Google Earth and have seen what I think is the old quarry site south of the railroad. The coordinates are 31° 28' 48.97" N, 103° 16' 01.36" W.

I have since found out that there is still an historic building in Big Spring which is faced with the same stone -- the Potton House. Mr Potton was a former conductor or engineer with the T & P railway.

So -- in my mind, I feel that the location of the stone source for the building of the T & P depot building there in Colorado City has been found.

Only the date of construction remains to be determined.

City Manager David Hoover said that the city's sewer/water project has a good start. So far, the city has built a new water tower north of town and extended water and sewer lines from Ruddick Park east to South Hwy. 208.

The grant funding will allow the city to continue the project. Hoover said that crews will begin boring under S. Hwy. 208, near Santiago's Restaurant and eventually under I-20 to bring sewer and water lines to the construction location of Stripes.

The announcement of the grant funding has been made, but the city will have to wait an additional 60 to 90 days to actually receive the funds. Hoover said that the work will continue, as the city is already beginning the engineering work to finish the project.

Along with bringing water to the Travel Center area, Hoover said that the city will tie into water lines just north of the Interstate and run a 12" water line east along I-20.

"This will open the door to further development of the I-20 corridor," Hoover said Tuesday. He also said that the city is looking into more grant funding to develop areas along the Interstate to the west, across from Mitchell County Hospital.

Sands runs from Levelland in the north to the Barnhart area in the south. Barnhart is located at the intersection of Hwy. 163 and Hwy. 67, southwest of San Angelo.

The pipeline will have an additional interconnection to the proposed BridgeTex Pipeline which is expected to provide access to the Texas Gulf Coast by July 2014. According to Centurion's website, the company's pipeline system includes approximately 100 miles of new pipeline and several origination stations, each able to receive crude oil via truck or pipeline.

Sands said construction on the Centurion line is supposed to be finished and the pipeline ready to go on line June 1, 2014. Planning from inception to construction will hit the two-year mark in June.

When Centurion announced in January of 2013 that the reactivation of pipeline in this area was being planned, it was announced that the system would be capable of transporting crude oil from Irion, Tom Green, Sterling, Coke and Mitchell counties in West Texas to the terminal near China Grove. The system includes truck unloading facilities at Centurion's Texas Sterling City and Arden stations.

Some have said they don't expect oil expansion to extend

for each provider. The estimated cost is still at \$2.2 million for the project.

"Our loss is the community's gain," he said.

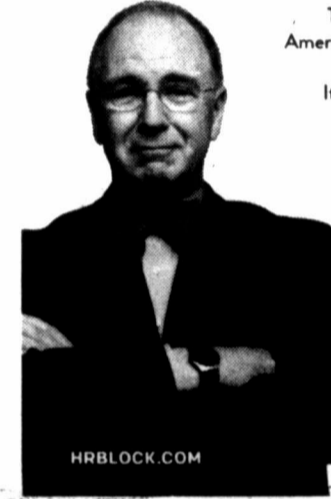

Young updates Lions Club on various county projects

Board of Economic Development Director Sue Young was the featured speaker at Friday's weekly Lions Club meeting. She gave updates to club members on the various projects in the works in the county right now.

Young began by telling club members about the upcoming construction of the power plant, planned to be built in the western part of the county. FGE Power, LLC, plans to break ground on the project on April 20th if everything continues to go as scheduled.

FGE Power, LLC, is an investor group that is very green-oriented. The company prides itself on taking care of the environment and is concerned with conservation of natural resources, according to Young.

FGE has an agreement with the City of Colorado City to buy some of the city's wastewater which will be used in plant operations. Company officials have also spent millions of dollars to use new technology to reduce the amount of water being used to

produce electricity.

Young said that construction workers have started preparations for the foundation of the desalination plant being constructed near the county barn at Westbrook. When the desal plant's construction is complete, water produced by the plant will be sold to Mitchell County Utility, owned by Mike Hemphill.

Young said that various developers planning to construct hotels in the area have purchased permits. To her knowledge, permits have been purchased for five hotels in the area.

So far, Bobby Nobles has constructed three new houses on the east end of 18th Street, and Young said he plans to build six more once the original three have sold. A lack of housing continues to be an issue, and construction of the power plant is supposed to bring in 400 to 500 workers to the area soon.

She also said that the county owns property commonly referred to as the Elliott property, northeast of Alco, which has

76 platted lots. County commissioners have expressed their intent to sell the property as a whole, and developers have expressed interest in the area.

Several Lions Club members asked when citizens could expect to see construction on the hotels begin. Young said she expects construction to begin as soon as the city can get water and sewer infrastructure to the outlying properties.

"They're going fast," Young said of the city's infrastructure progress. The City of Colorado City is looking into further grant funding to help pay for the infrastructure expansion.

Farm Bill offers increased opportunities

Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack today announced increased opportunity for producers as a result of the 2014 Farm Bill. A fact sheet outlining modifications to the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) Farm Loan Programs is available.

"Our nation's farmers and ranchers are the engine of the rural economy. These improvements to our Farm Loan Programs will help a new generation begin farming and grow

existing farm operations," said Secretary Vilsack. "Today's announcement represents just one part of a series of investments the new Farm Bill makes in the next generation of agriculture, which is critical to economic growth in communities across the country."

The Farm Bill expands lending opportunities for thousands of farmers and ranchers to begin and continue operations, including greater flexibility in determining eligibility, raising loan limits, and emphasizing beginning and socially disadvantaged producers.

Changes that will take effect immediately include:

Elimination of loan term

limits for guaranteed operating loans.

Modification of the definition of beginning farmer, using the average farm size for the county as a qualifier instead of the median farm size.

Modification of the Joint Financing Direct Farm Ownership Interest Rate to 2 percent less than regular Direct Farm Ownership rate, with a floor of 2.5 percent. Previously, the rate was established at 5 percent.

Increase of the maximum loan amount for Direct Farm Ownership down payments from \$225,000 to \$300,000.

Elimination of rural residency requirement for Youth Loans, allowing urban youth to

benefit.

Debt forgiveness on Youth Loans, which will not prevent borrowers from obtaining additional loans from the federal government.

Increase of the guaranteed amount on Conservation Loans from 75 to 80 percent and 90 percent for socially disadvantaged borrowers and beginning farmers.

Microloans will not count toward loan term limits for veterans and beginning farmers.

Additional modifications must be implemented through the rulemaking processes. Visit the FSA Farm Bill website for detailed information and updates to farm loan programs.

CMS to begin archery program for all grades

Colorado Middle School students will have the opportunity to check out a new program coming to CMS in the next three weeks. School officials are implementing an archery program which will teach archery to 6th, 7th and 8th graders.

Last week, CMS Principal Mark Merrell met with Mike Hart, archery enthusiast and former CHS student and coach, student and archer Ted Rich, and Coach Brantlee Lemons to announce the inception of the new program at middle school. The curriculum being used to introduce students to archery is the National Archery in the Schools Program (NASP).

Merrell said the project was first presented by Hart when he called to let him know about the archery program's success in Sweetwater schools. Hart expressed an interest in beginning a similar program in Colorado City and volunteered to help get the program started.

Cost of start-up was \$3,300, which was secured through donations. Hart donated some of the money, as did the Sweetwater Bow Hunters Association. Merrell said that other local businesses have also made donations in support of the program.

Coaches Brantlee Lemons and Kevin Wright traveled to McMurry University in Abilene, where they received instruction and certification to become instructors. The two are now certified to present NASP lessons to students.

CMS 8th grader Ted Rich said he has been involved in archery for the past four or five years, and he has competed in archery events in the area. Now 14 years old, he said he loves the sport and plans to continue participating.

With the archery program's ball rolling, Lemons said the equipment has been ordered and they are hoping to begin the program within the next three weeks. So far, 12 bows, 10 right-handed and two left-handed, have been ordered, along with targets, an arrow catch net and racks.

Merrell said that archery is fairly new to West Texas schools, but there are 3.2 million shooters nationwide. He is hoping Colorado City's participation will spur interest in the area.

For now, the program will be available only at the middle school level, but if interest grows, it may be expanded to include high school archers in the future. Hart said that many students really enjoy participating because anyone can be successful in archery.

"It's a real level playing field," he said. Boys and girls will be competing against each other, and Hart said he's seen little

girls beat bigger boys in competition.

The program in Sweetwater was started during the third week of school and now has 68 students participating. Shooting will be done indoors at paper targets. Students will be practicing during P.E. classes, and students who are in athletics may participate during homeroom provided their classroom work and behavior is acceptable.

CMS will be holding invitation archery meets where students can compete against each other. As the program progresses, program officials may look into participating in competitions against other schools. Hart said that top shooters often receive scholarships.

As for safety, Merrell said that the only sport safer than archery last year was ping pong. NASP is specifically designed to be safe for students.

CMS 8th graders prepare for test

Testing has always been stressful for students, but stress levels are heightened more than ever before. Students now have to pass standardized state tests before they can advance to the next grade.

To help prepare for the upcoming STAAR tests, John Lally, secondary math consultant from the Region 14 Education Service Center, came to Colorado Middle School. He spent his time with 8th graders helping them prepare for the STAAR.

The math portion of the test will be given on April 1st, with students taking the reading portion on April 2nd. Students have to pass the tests in order to advance to high school in the fall.

that as far as he knows, one of the wells at the sports complex has been having mechanical problems which could possibly be the cause of the water issue. The water district checks levels in water wells regularly, as there are several wells in that area.

"There's no evidence to support that," Lee said about the theory of a water shortage being caused by the commercial facility. "Now, it hasn't sold much water yet, so over time, it will be interesting to see what happens."

Lee said that the aquifer is down somewhat, but records seem to indicate a seasonal low and an ongoing drought. "Levels fall when we go for months without rain," he said Tuesday.

Sports complex manager Darlene Moore said that the pump in one of the wells did not have water where the pump was located last week. Since then, screens were acidized and there is some water in the well now.

The problem is an ongoing one, and the county is having a water pump company come out and pull the pump on Wednesday in hopes of restoring water pressure to the complex. Moore said that while there

is a back-up well, it takes both to run the sprinklers to water the fields. Another well is located in back of the sports complex, but it is used by the county's precincts to fill water trucks for road repairs and other maintenance.

For now, Moore has turned to watering fields by hand and by small sprinklers, but she wanted to express to citizens that the county will not let the grass on the baseball and softball fields die. "We will do whatever we have to do to get the problem resolved," she said.

Ty Wood, a partner in Wood Family Properties, said that he is unsure what might be causing the problem with the water at the sports complex. He has been in contact with Lee who told him that since the commercial facility has been built, the aquifer has gone down less than 1/10th of an inch.

Wood did say that he has offered to supply water to the county at no charge to be used on the sports complex's fields, because he has "very strong wells". He said that the facility is located on a "very, very strong area of the aquifer."

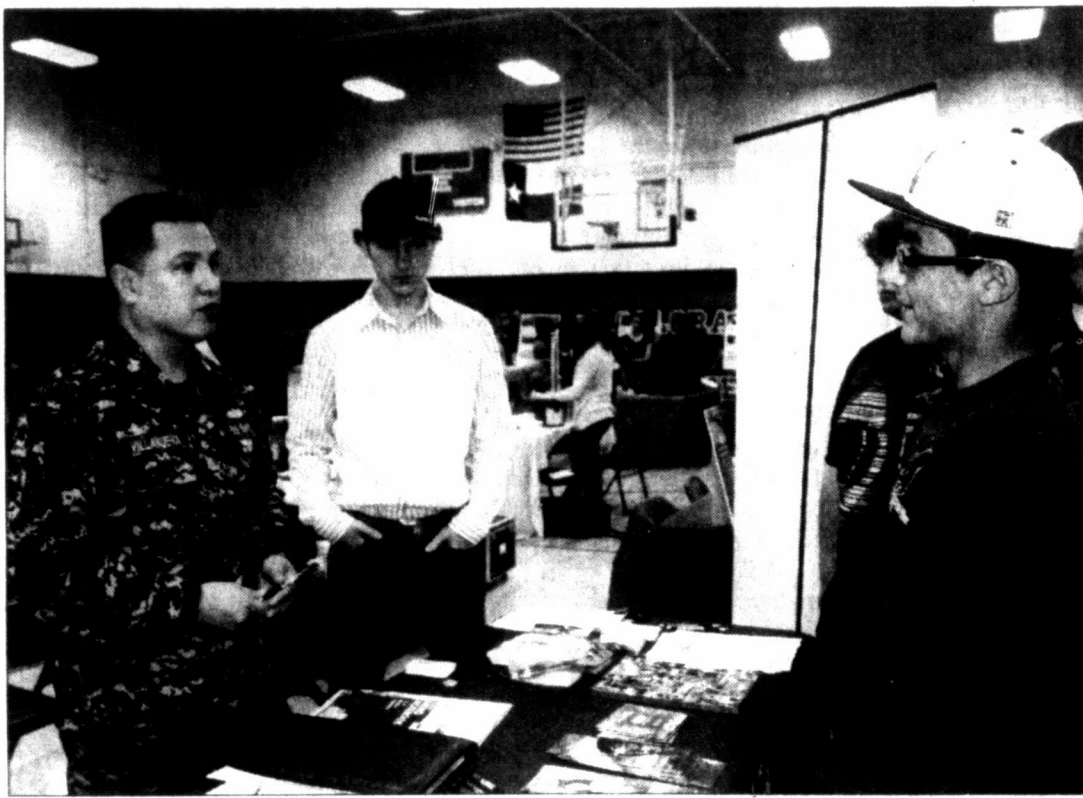

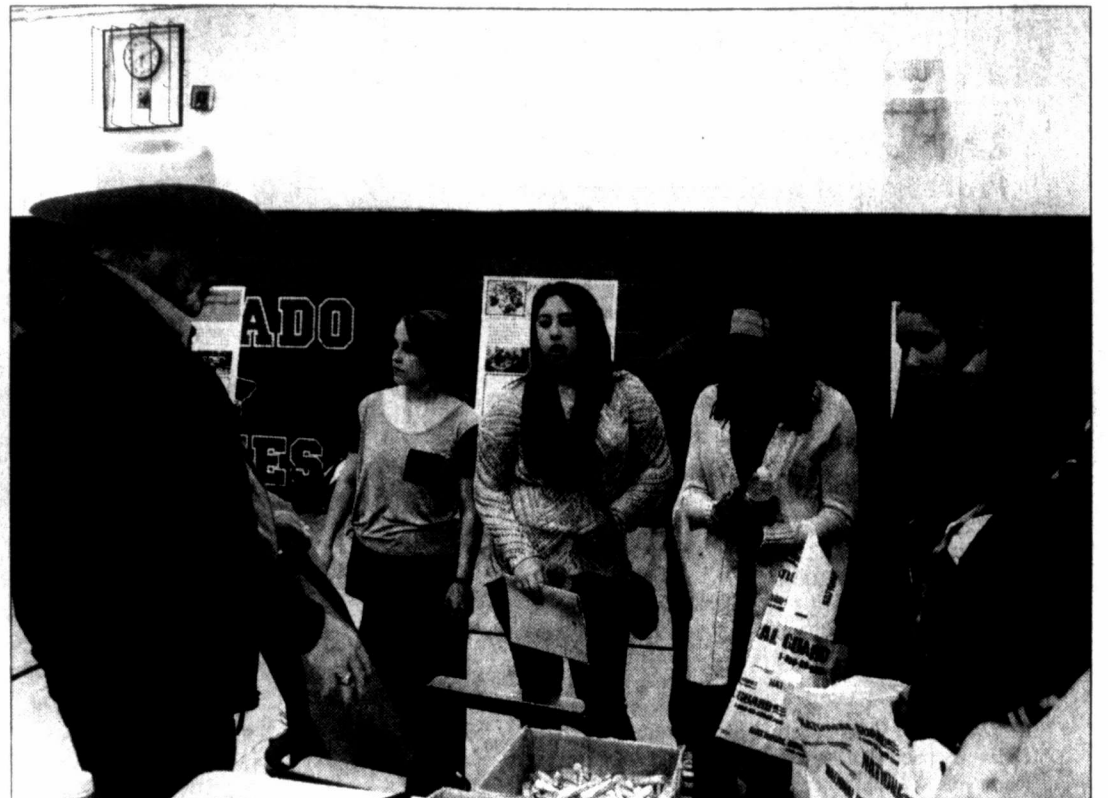
