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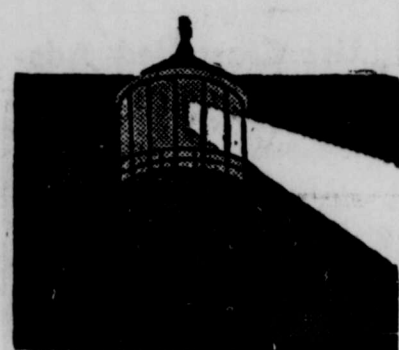

Lone Wolf is the highest point in Mitchell County and is almost sure to have been used by the Indians and early day settlers as a lookout point. If we had a marker for it properly placed, it would be a tourist attraction.

"80" John Wallace Historical Marker Ceremonies Sunday

The Mitchell County Historical Survey Committee is announcing this week, the dedication ceremonies honoring the memory of "80" John Wallace would be held at the Wallace Ranch, at 3 p. m. Sunday, April 3. The ranch home is located about 3 miles from Loraine on the Narrell Road off Interstate 20.

The cast aluminum marker with Swedish steel effect for durability and appearance, measures 18 by 28 inches and is sponsored by the Mitchell County Historical Survey Committee. This is the fifth official Tex-

as Historical Marker to be erected in Mitchell County.

The marking of local historic sites and landmarks is a part of the five-year program of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee, whose program is described as "RAMPS." The RAMPS program envisions the erection of 5,000 historic markers under the sponsorship of the state, counties, cities, civic groups and individuals.

All state erected markers will appear in official tourist guides and directories to help stimulate tourist trade and historical appreciation as well as to acquaint the citizens of the county with their own unique historical heritage.

D. W. "80" John Wallace was born of slave parents, Victoria County. At 15 he became a cowboy and rode from Old Mexico to Kansas.

In 1877, he came to Mitchell County, and rode for Clay Mann, whose "80" brand gave him his name for the rest of his life. On Mann's advice, he bought land and when he was 25 years old and 6 feet, 3 inches tall, he went back to school. In 1891 he left Mann and went to his own ranch and eventually had fine cattle and crops on 12½ sections of land. Also oil was found on his property. When he was 73 he was still riding bucking horses.

He married Laura Owen. Three of their children became school teachers. His interest in education caused a school to be named for him.

Mrs. Witt Hines, chairman of the Historical Survey Committee, stated the public is invited to attend the dedication of this marker.
