He explained that citizens here are to donate metal and paper, and requested that persons sell it to scrap dealers if they do not donate it. Salvage materials which this army unit will collect will be sold through commercial channels and the check will be made to the Treasury of the United States. Tin cans are not wanted in this drive.

## Details of S-Sgt. A. Brown's Heroic Death Are Given

Editor's Note: Following is the story of the heroic death of Tech Sgt. Andrew J. Brown, who several years ago was employed at Bryant Pharmacy in this city.

A communication from England has supplied Mr. and Mrs. Guy M. Brown of Jayton with details of the heroic death of their son, Tech Sgt. Andrew J. Brown, who was a drug store owner in Anson before he enlisted in the Air Corps and was top turret gunner and flight engineer of a Flying Fortress based in England.

Brown held the Air Medal with nine other members of his crew. A veteran of 26 combat missions, he died June 4 in a burning plane high over England, fighting a fire which raged in the cockpit, as he shouted to the crew to bail out. His own chute a bundle of ashes, he made a final gamble for life, taking the big bomber down for a crash landing. Flames caught the gas supply shortly before the Fortress hit the ground and it blew up.

Brown held the Air Medal with four clusters and wore his group's Distinguished Unit Badge. He had flown several missions over Berlin.

### O. W. RICHARDSON RESIGNS AS LOCAL FSA OFFICIAL

O. W. Richardson resigned his position as head of the local Farm Security Administration July 27, to accept employment at Higginbotham Feed & Elevator Company.

He assumed duties there August 11.

According to an article appearing in the August 4 issue of the Dallas Morning News, Lamesa Field has been designated as a sales center for surplus airplanes. This story reported that surplus war planes would be sold or stored, or both, at five other centers in Texas besides Lamesa.

The article stated: Delivery of planes to some of the sales center, sales and storage centers, and storage depots has already been initiated. Complete deliveries will be effected under schedules being developed by the Army Air Forces.

The armed services will, over a period of time, declare a large number of airplanes surplus, but only a small fraction of such total surplus will be adaptable for use as personal aircraft. The supply of surplus planes for personal use will, in all probability, be far short of demand, said Jesse H. Jones, Secretary of Commerce and head of the government money-lending agencies.

A limited number of sixty-five-horsepower trainers, Army and Navy primary trainers, and advanced light twin-engine trainers have been declared surplus. Large twin-engine cargo airplanes which will be in demand for commercial transport purposes will not be available except in very limited quantities until the war ends.

Civil Aeronautics Administration personnel working in close co-operation with the Defense Plant Corporation will assist in the sales and storage of surplus planes. Planes will be disposed of on an "as is" basis without warranty.

Interested parties may obtain full information regarding planes to be offered for sale by requesting to be placed upon invitation to bid lists sent out from CAA regional offices, one of which is located at Fort Worth.

The Rev. Fred Smith, regular pastor of Fairview church, invites each of you to attend these services, and feels that you will derive much good from them.

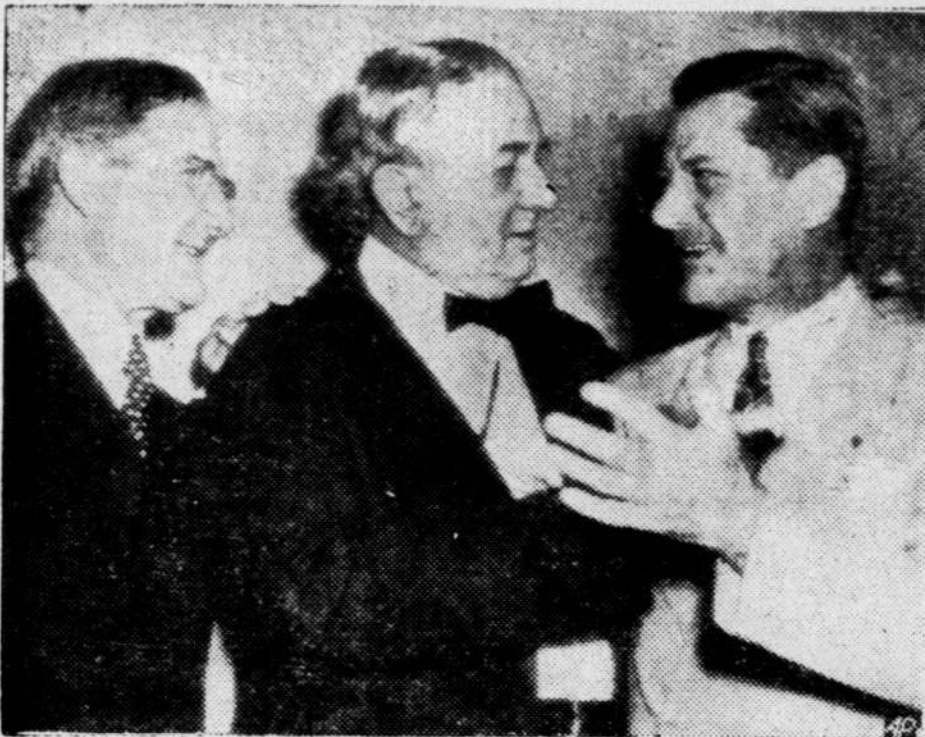
### Demonstration To Be Given At Key Friday

### OPA Asks All To Keep Tokens Circulating

Hoarding of ration tokens has brought about a serious shortage of tokens in this District, the Ration Banking Section of the District Office of Price Administration has reported.

An appeal is made to all housewives to use all "loose change" in tokens before using other stamps from ration banks, thus keeping tokens in circulation. Hoarding of tokens makes it necessary to manufacture more and more tokens. In addition to this needless expense, it ties up equipment and machinery needed for manufacturing other items.

All ration stamps, both for processed foods and meat, are valid indefinitely—hoarding doesn't help anyone. Keep your ration tokens circulating!

### English Kids Back From U. S. Talk New Lingo

LONDON — It's a wise father who knows his own child—particularly if the father's English, and the child has just returned from four years in the United States, says the London Mail.

Hundreds of English children between seven and 17 who met their fathers again for the first time in years greeted them with "hi, ya, pop," and stick chewing-gum kisses — after someone pointed out who Dad was. They were shy when they left England in 1940, but now they treat anybody as a buddy, and almost always find something to say for themselves.

The more than 2,000 expatriate children and mothers immediately began to learn some of the difficulties of wartime England: they couldn't find a taxi, arrange a comfortable train journey home or get American table delicacies on the 5s. (\$1) dinner. They saw utility cloth-

ing, contrasting with their own brightly colored smart apparel. "It will take the youngsters a year to readjust themselves," one of the mothers said. "They will have to learn that life will be a bit harder, a little slower. And they'll have to reshuffle their ideas on lots of things."

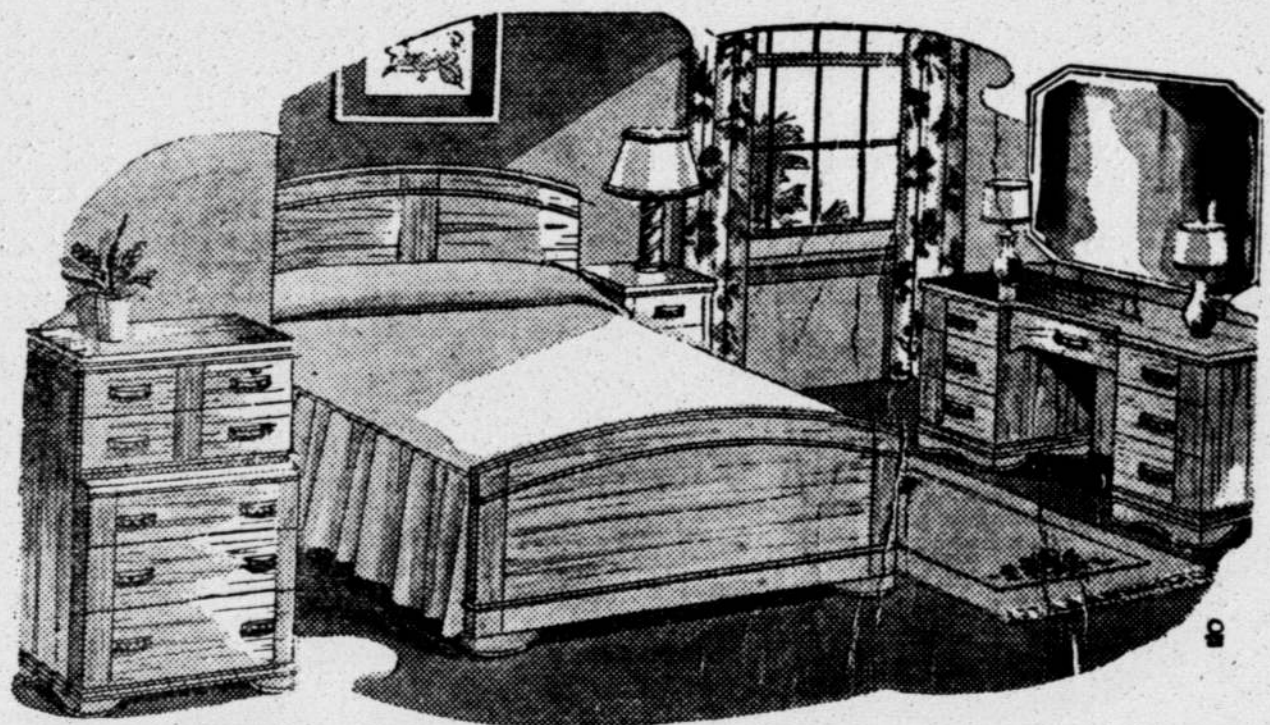

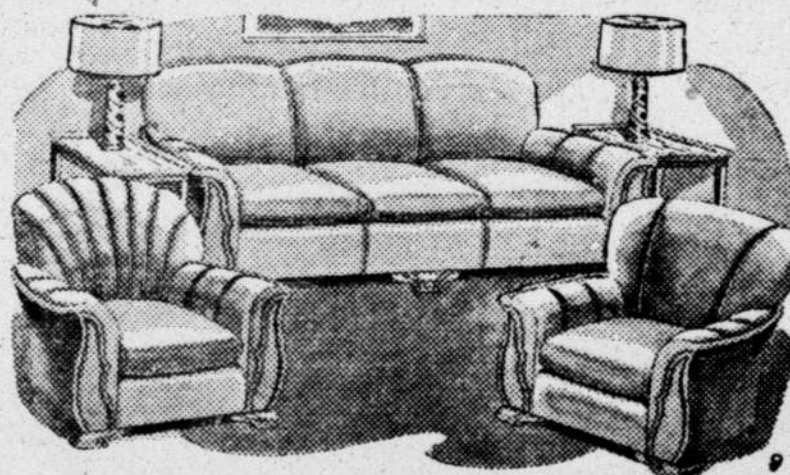

## Care Should Be Given Pullets In Growing Period

The care a pullet receives during the growing period largely determines her productive ability, says A. Moore, poultry husbandman of A. and M. College Extension Service. Chicks shouldn't be turned out on the range to hustle for themselves after preliminary care and balanced feeding in the brooder house. Good feed is as important to pullets on summer range as to chicks in the brooder house or to laying hens. Strong pullets can take a lot of punishment on the range and live, but mismanagement will lower their ability to produce eggs, Moore believes.

Pullets can get much of their livelihood in the form of green feed,

which is an important element in raising them for layers. But they will not make maximum development unless they also have a constant supply of balanced feed. If abundant succulent green feed is available the cost of growing pullets may be reduced materially and their health improved. As tough, woody grass has little feed value the range should be mowed frequently so that young, tender green stuff always is available.

The summer range may be used more effectively if the roosting quarters and other equipment are moved often. By doing so pullets are encouraged to graze all parts of it and not exhaust vegetation immediately surrounding the shelters, feeders and waterers.

Birds placed on clean range which is kept clean by frequent moving of shelters and equipment may be grown to maturity free of disease and parasites. However, fowl pox may attack pullets regardless of sanitation, but it may be prevented by vaccinating the chicks when eight to 12 weeks old. In any case, Moore says, pullets should be vaccinated before they come into production.

Ample cool, fresh water; shade and systematic culling are other necessary elements of good management. Pullets should consume large quantities of water in the hot summer months, but they will not drink enough if forced to go far from the feeders for it. Shade should be provided for the birds while they are inactive at mid-day, and culling should be practiced continuously during the growing period. All under-sized, off-color, off-type or unthrifty birds should be removed when the pullets are moved to the range.

Ely Fonville, District Rationing Executive, who made this announcement, stated that "Car pooling is mandatory for all 'B' and 'C' cardholders who use their automobiles for home-to-work driving." Fon-

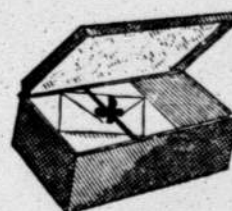

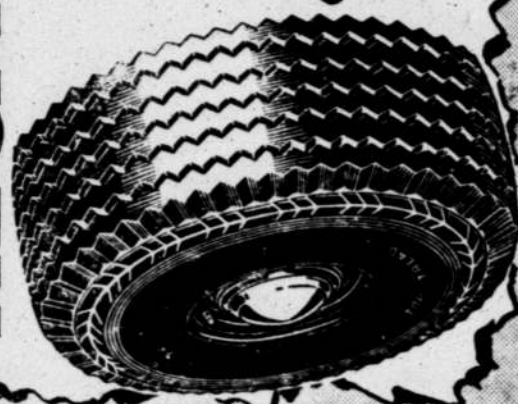

## Price Control Put On New And Used Farm Machines

Sales of used farm equipment and machinery by any person who has acquired it for re-sale have been brought under price control to protect farmers from overcharges, District OPA Price Executive J. B. Mooney has announced. This action, he said, will protect farmers and farm equipment from

speculators who have in the past acquired used farm machinery at or below ceiling prices and then re-sold the items at illegal prices, claiming that they were not retail dealers.

The amendment, effective August 2, also provides that all persons selling farm equipment must keep acquisition cost and sales records available to OPA for inspection.

All new and used farm machines are subject to price control when sold by dealers, but only combines, corn binders, corn pickers, farm and garden tractors, motor or tractor operated hay balers, hay loaders,

manure spreaders, side delivery rakes, tractor-mounted mowers, and a combination of any of the items listed with other items of farm equipment specifically designed for mounting thereon are under price control when sold by farmers or auctioneers for farmers.

The ten implements, regarded by OPA and the War Food Administration as the most urgently needed, when sold "as is" may not be sold for more than 85 per cent of the manufacturer's suggested retail price f.o.b. factory for items less than a year old, and for not more than 70 per cent of this original price if the article is more than a year old.
