COCONUT ANGEL DIVINITY

1/2 cup light corn syrup
2 1/2 cups sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup water
2 egg whites
1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla
Few drops peppermint flavoring (optional)
1/2 cup chopped nuts
1 cup cookie coconut
Red and green maraschino cherries, cut in pieces

Combine corn syrup, sugar, salt, and water in saucepan. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until sugar is dissolved. Continue cooking, without stirring, until a small amount of syrup forms a hard ball in cold water (or to a temperature of 262 degrees).

While syrup is cooking, beat egg whites until stiff but not dry. Then, when temperature is reached, pour syrup slowly over egg whites, beating constantly. Beat until mixture begins to appear dull and holds its shape.

Add vanilla, peppermint flavoring, and nuts. Drop from tip of teaspoon into coconut on wax paper to shape candy into a ball and to coat with coconut. Decorate with cherries. Makes about 7 dozen.

"Chocolate Peanut Clusters" are most always a welcome candy around the house. Just happened to run across this recipe.

CHOCOLATE PEANUT CLUSTERS

2 4-oz. bars sweet cooking chocolate
2/3 C sweetened condensed milk
1 C (5-oz. pkg.) shelled, unsalted whole peanuts

In top of double boiler, melt chocolate over hot water. Remove from heat. Add condensed milk and nuts. Stir until all nuts are covered. Drop by teaspoonfuls onto buttered baking sheet. Refrigerate for several hours. Makes about 2 dozen candies 1 3/4" in diameter.

NOTE: If desired, pecans, cashews, walnuts or seedless raisins may be substituted for the peanuts.

"PAULA SCHROEDER'S HARD CANDY"

Spread some newspapers on your table top and cover them with wax paper. Sprinkle confectioners sugar over wax paper until completely well covered.

Combine—
2 cups sugar
3/4 cup Karo
1 cup water

Boil these ingredients to 300 degrees, using a candy thermometer. Remove from burner. Add 1/4 tsp. oil flavoring and some food color. Work very fast to drip by teaspoon into small individual pieces on powdered sugar. When cool and the candy is hard turn pieces over in the powdered sugar.

Put candy into a clear glass candy dish or jar for a pretty color accent.

For a variety of hard candy use the following flavoring and colorings.

Winter green oil—w/ green coloring
Oil of Cloves—purple or yellow coloring

Spearmint Oil—Blue coloring
Cinnamon Oil—Red coloring
Peppermint Oil—Pink coloring

These oil flavorings may be obtained at a pharmacy or drug store.

Christmas Through The Ages

As you deck the halls with holly and pine, you are reminded of the old Northern European belief that the trees of the forest were inhabited by god-like spirits. The Germans brought the trees into their homes to appease these "spirits" and show them they were welcome at the Winter Solstice ceremonies. Later, in the eighth century, St. Boniface converted the German pagans and convinced them to stop worshipping Odin's sacred oak and, instead, to adorn fir trees in their homes in tribute to the Christ Child. There is also no doubt about the meaning of the modern mistletoe, and what will happen to you if you're standing under it. But the custom of kissing under the mistletoe comes down to us from the mystic rites of the primitive British priests. In their faraway age, the mistletoe, which means "all



heal," was believed to have magic qualities—the power to heal disease, neutralize poisons, protect its possessor from witchcraft, and bestow fertility on humans and animals. If a young couple sealed their betrothal with a kiss under the mistletoe, they would receive wonderful blessings and much good luck for the rest of their lives. And what of that jolly old fellow, Santa Claus? In olden times he was a complex symbol and many things to many people. Santa descends from the original St. Nicholas, a kindly man who lived in Patara, Turkey, and died a martyr in 342 A.D., becoming the patron saint of children.

Before long, the cult of St. Nicholas spread across Europe. He became the patron saint of Greece, Holland and Belgium. Merchant sailors used his three golden purses as a device on their guild flags. The Russians passed the good saint to the Scandinavians, at which time he was still mounted on a white horse according to an old tradition of Turkey. But the Scandinavians knew nothing of horses, so they gave him a reindeer-drawn sleigh. They also grafted to him the legend of the Norse God, Thor, who used to ride through the sky in a chariot, and would appear in a red coat for the pagan feast of Yule. In the New World, the Dutch

called St. Nicholas "Santa Claus" for short. Our modern conception of him comes from the famous poem, "The Night Before Christmas."

Dr. Clement C. Moore, a Presbyterian divinity professor in New York State, wrote it to please his children and modeled the hero after a little old wizened Dutch gentleman he bumped into one night in 1822—a man with red cheeks and white

hair, smoking an old clay pipe. The origin of Christmas carols goes back to the times of St. Nicholas too. But, although these religious songs were sung in the first few centuries A.D., they didn't begin as a continuing tradition until the 14th century—as songs sung between the acts of nativity plays. More and more tunes were added, in various languages, and finally people began singing

them other than in church. Actually, we owe the original Christmas carol to St. Francis and his order. He believed in moderate Christmas gaiety, and he modeled the carols on the "carole," which was a French form of sprightly dance. Where did we get the custom of hanging Christmas stockings? According to researchers, the first Christmas stocking was really hung by the chimney TO

DRY! And St. Nick, making his round of chimneys on Christmas Eve, dropped a bag of gold into the stocking by accident! In the old days, Dutch children were more than glad to accept this concept. They used to place their wooden shoes by the chimney for Santa's offerings—but delightfully discovered that long winter stockings could hold far more of the yuletide goodies.

WHAT IS OUR REAL WEALTH? Do we know what it is? Many people, perhaps most people do know and will tell us exactly what it is.

In practice, however, it seems that most of us think our real wealth is the material wealth.

We can surely do better than we are doing. It is quite obvious that our value system needs restructuring with the intention of putting the right things in first place.

A MAN IS WEALTHY because of what is, not because of what he has. This seems to be a true statement. Most of us will probably agree with it, but do we really believe it?

In actual practice, how do we measure

the worth of a person? How do we measure our own worth?

There must be something better than the usual materialistic standard by which to determine the worth of a human being.

SEVERAL YEARS AGO Roger Babson, a well-known business analyst said, "Perhaps real wealth is something that cannot be touched, or seen, or even deposited in a bank or kept in a safe deposit box. I do, however, forecast that the time will come when it will be recognized that wealth is not what nearly everyone now considers "wealth" to be."

WHEN WE THINK of wealth in the future, let us not think first of material possessions. Without denying the importance of material wealth, let us admit that it is not our greatest wealth.

There is another kind of wealth which is often called "unseen wealth" because it is not perceptible to the touch, or visible to the eye.

In the final accounting, it is the unseen wealth that actually determines the value of material wealth.

ALL AUTHENTIC TRUTH has always supported the view that man's greatest wealth is the "unseen wealth".

The "unseen wealth" is not measured by monetary standards, but by spiritual standards.

This wealth is a good home; the value of the soul; the worth of a good name; the peace of mind that passes understanding; a pure heart; good health; true friends; and you can continue the list.

THE POOREST PEOPLE on earth must surely be those who think that material wealth is the only wealth, and they measure everything else by it.

He gave the Coast Guard 48 hours to explain its "grotesque blunder," still has the Coast Guard trembling top to bottom in

anticipation of this threatened "appropriate action."

Personally, the President has studied official reports of State and Transportation departments relating to the episode.

NEVER, through all of the several setbacks suffered by his Administration, did President Nixon react with such "outrage."

Well—

THE SITUATION was indeed mishandled. The snafu derived from the fact that the Coast Guard until now had no instructions on the disposition of defectors.

THIS WAS WHAT the Wisconsin schoolgirl meant the other day when at a White House ceremony she accepted a medal for public service from the President and then questioned his sincerity "until you get us out of Vietnam."

Parents Liable?

(Editor's note: The Sandhills Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm reflects on a proposed new law, more or less.)

Dear editor: I remember reading it in a newspaper, I forget which newspaper and which town it was, but some city government, tired of willful mischief and serious destruction by kids and students, if there's any difference, has passed an ordinance making parents responsible for their children's actions, even to the point of fining them and sending them to jail.

"Maybe this will put a stop to it," officials said, tired of the whole matter. I have thought this over and I don't know whether this law ought to become widespread or not.

Sure, when a kid throws a rock through a hundred dollar plate glass window or sets fire to a library it looks like his parents must have slipped up, and they probably feel that way too, but there's another side to it, to be thought about before you send the parents to jail. Some good people might wind up behind bars.

What I mean is, occasionally some kids who turn out the best come from what is considered some of the worst families, and some who turn out the worst come from

what is considered some of the best families. Kids don't always follow the family pattern.

Now if a neighbor's kid pulls flowers around your house or paint on your new car, a law parent seems like a splendid idea. It's your kids... this requires a headed thought.

On the other hand, if the parent going to be punished for their misdeeds, what's to keep some being out a law to punish grand-children whose parents are great-grandparents?

To hold down on the prison would be better to hold only grand-children responsible. Be prison riots that way.

On still another hand, it does some parents are not doing could, to be generous about it, kids to live in an organized way.

Probably before this new law is universally enacted it ought to be over to a Congressional committee further study. This will delay for years.

1970 are such that few, if any, on the High Plains will choose that route.

On the opposite extreme a farmer can adhere closely to his allotted acreages for cotton, wheat and feed grains, comply with the set-aside requirements and benefit from loans and price support payments on all commodities.

In between these two options is a wide range of other possibilities. A farmer can comply with the set-aside requirement and qualify for payments on cotton, for example, and ignore the program for wheat and feed grains. Then, if he likes, he can plant his total acreage above the set-aside to cotton and the entire production will be eligible for Commodity Credit Corporation loans. And he can follow the same procedure for either wheat or feed grains.

The law for 1971 requires neither cross-compliance between crops nor cross-compliance between farms, giving producers the option to be in the program on one crop and out of the program on others; in the program on one farm and out of the program on another. There is almost no limit to the number of choices available.

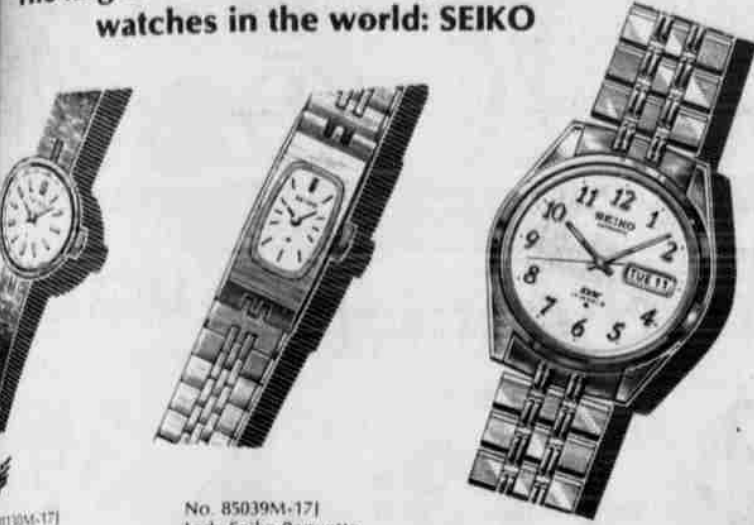

When Steve Spurrier was ten, he came home from school one day and said to his older brother, Graham: "Graham, our school nurse said the most important thing in the world is good health. But that's not right. The most important thing is to believe in God and Jesus Christ."

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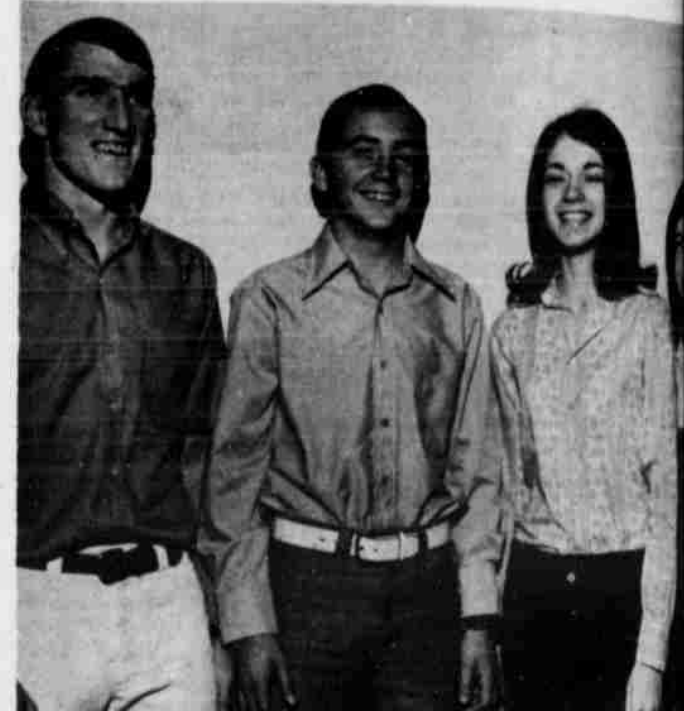
