14 Candidates Seek Office In Navigation Election

Fourteen candidates are vying for five positions on the Aransas County Navigation District Commission Saturday, August 11 - but

individual voters will only cast ballots for two of them. All qualified voters in the district will be able to cast ballots for a candidate in

the at-large post. In addition, each voter may cast a ballot for a candidate seeking to represent the precinct in which the voter

resides. There are no uncontested races in this year's election. Candidates are:
Precinct 1-1A: Jimmy D.

Anders and George Miller. Precinct 2: Hillis Dominguez, Judy Sanders, Joseph C. Harlan and Leslie Casterline.

Precinct 3: R.W. Landrum and James E. (Jimmy) Ankele.

Precinct 4-4A: Ken Faulkner, William B. (Bill) Tilden and Dan R. Shelton.

At-large: David Magugglin, Hal B. McKnight and John P. Jackson.

Anders is the incumbent in the Precinct 1 race. He is owner of Anders Rental and Anders Auto Repair and has lived most of his life in Rockport.

Miller, who is challenger for the Precinct 1 post, is owner of George Miller Sandblasting Company and has lived in Rockport six years.

The Precinct 2 place has been vacant since the death

of Commissioner Richard James (Dick) Fox on June 3. Four candidates are seeking election to that post:

Dominguez is a semi-retired television repairman and former shrimp.

Mrs. Sanders is a sales associate at Wishert Realtors and has been a Rockport resident since 1969.

Harlan has lived in Rockport 15 years, has worked

both as a shrimper and in the boat yards in Rockport and Fulton. He is president of the Seafood Producers Association.

Casterline, 30, is a native of the Rockport-Fulton area and works for Casterline Shrimp Company which is owned by his father, Fulton Mayor L.E. Casterline.

In the Precinct 3 race, Landrum has served on the Navigation District board for eight years. An employee of Ashland Chemical Company, he has lived in Rockport since 1944.

The challenger for Precinct 3 commissioner, Ankele, has been a Rockport-Fulton area resident since 1943 and operates Ankele Towing and Transportation.

No incumbents are running for commissioner. [See ELECTION page 2]

Initiative, Referendum, Recall Covered In Article

Rockport voters will have the rights of initiative, referendum and recall under Article VI of the proposed new City Charter.

Initiative is the right of qualified voters to propose ordinances to the City Council. "If the Council fails to adopt an ordinance so proposed without any change in substance," under Article VI, "the voters shall adopt or reject it (the ordinance) at a city election."

Referendum gives the voters the right to "require reconsideration by the council of any adopted ordinance." Again, if the council fails to reconsider the ordinance or fails to repeal it, the voters may approve or reject it in a city election.

The rights of recall and referendum are specifically not extended to the budget or capital program, or to ordinances relating to appropriation of money or levy of taxes.

Recall gives voters the right to "remove any official serving in an elective office. Grounds for removal of an officer... shall be incompetency, non-compliance with this Charter, misconduct, or malfeasance in office."

An 10 qualified voters who wish to petition for initiative, referendum or recall may do so by filing with the city secretary an affidavit stating they will constitute the petitioners' committee.

The committee is responsible for preparing, printing and circulating the petition and filing it in its "proper form". The affidavit must "set out in full" the proposed initiative

ordinance, the ordinance sought for referendum or, in the case of recall, "a statement of the grounds for removal."

If the petition is for recall, the city secretary must notify the officer or officers named and inform [See CHARTER page 2]

Absentee balloting ended Tuesday, August 7.

Voters will be asked to vote "for" or "against" "Confirmation of the (Aransas County Water Control and Improvement) District."

They will also be asked to elect five persons to the permanent board of directors for the district.

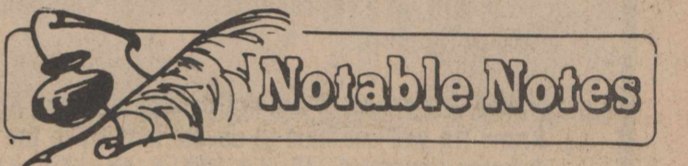
The names of the present temporary board members will appear on the ballot, along with blank spaces so the voter can write in names as an alternative to one or more of the present board members.

Present board members are M. Joan Nish, M.D. president; Frank H. Smith, vice president; Freddie A. Linger, secretary; Fred F. Mullins; and J. Gordon Hargrave.

The boundaries of the District are the same as those for Holiday Beach Subdivision. Only qualified

voters residing in the district and who were registered 30 days before the election are eligible to vote.

"Put signs at the launching ramp that say 'Please operate boats safely.'"

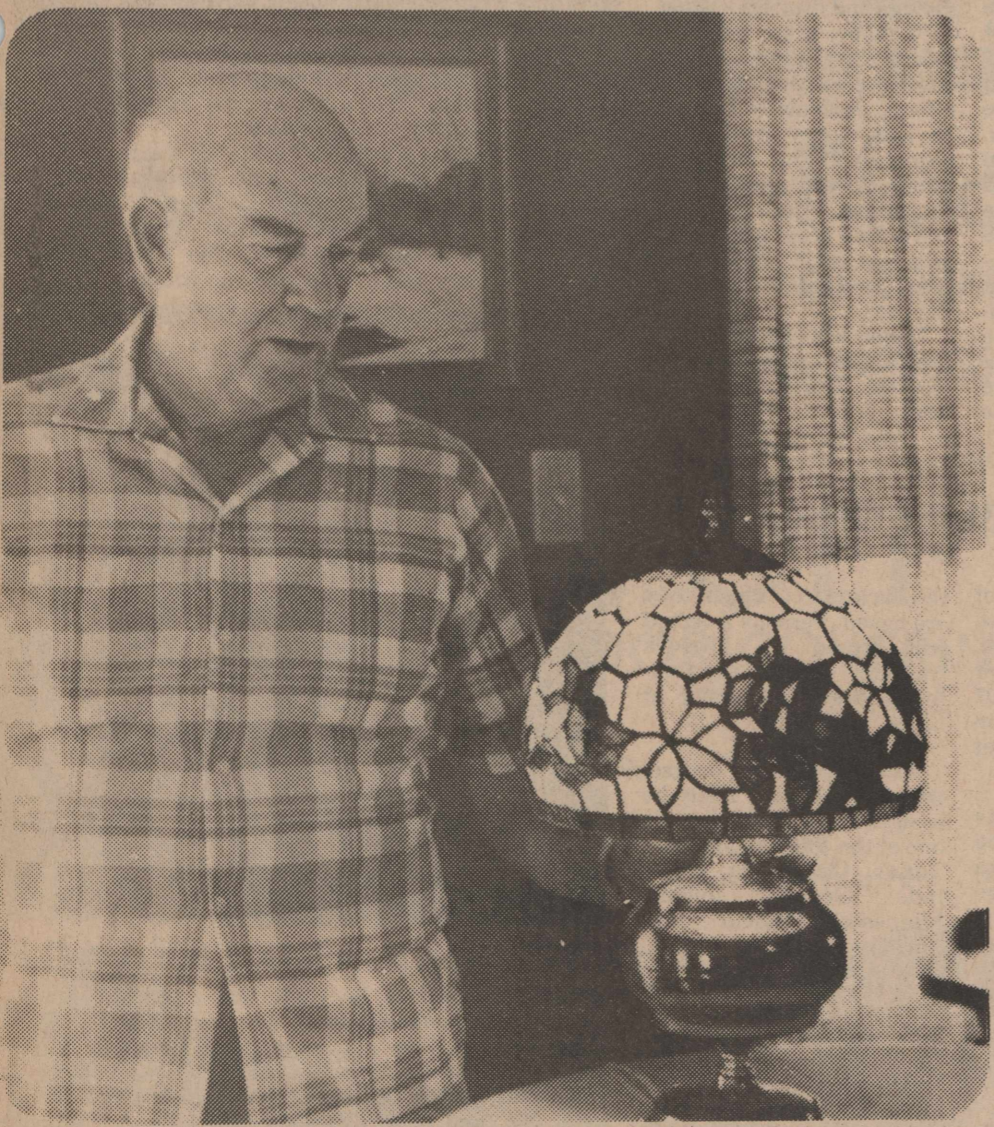
"Outlaw skiing after sundown or dusk."

Rockport Man Works In Fragile Art Form

Working with stained glass, says James B. Arnold, is a lost art that is now "coming back."

Arnold is doing his share in achieving that comeback. Since he started working in stained glass about a year and a half ago, he's turned out six lamps, a stained glass window for the bathroom of his residence in Copano Cove, a couple of mobiles...

And Mrs. Arnold already has an eye on his next project—a terrarium decorated with a stained glass cat.

Arnold started making things while he was employed in a printing business in San Antonio. His creations there were human figures put together from nuts and bolts. "I just started piddling around," he said. "I never made many, and I don't do it any more. It takes welding equipment which I don't have."

He retired from the printing business two and a half years ago, and he and his wife "moved to Rockport the day we retired."

The Arnolds have been

coming down to this area as visitors and part-time residents for 40 years, he said adding, "We used to own a summer house in Fulton."

In February, 1978, the Glass House of Corpus Christi offered a course -- with help from Rockport's Tourist Bureau -- in the art of stained glass.

"I thought I'd like to try cutting glass," Arnold said. "It looked interesting to me -- I was the only man in the class," he added.

"He almost walked out the first day because of all the women," Mrs. Arnold said.

But he stayed, discovering he enjoyed it, and continued to work on his own after the 12-hour course -- spread over two hours once a week for six weeks -- ended.

The first lamp he put on a base, Arnold said, was a pansy design that is now owned by one of the Arnolds' two daughters. "My daughters keep me busy making things for them," he added. The Arnolds have two daughters and three grandchildren.

Arnold is not the only creative member of his family. Paintings by Mrs.

Arnold adorn the walls of their home, and there is a charcoal drawing of three horses done by Mrs. Arnold's mother at the age of 16.

This past May, the Arnolds won the channel lot on Copano Cove that was given away to raise funds for a fire station in the Cove.

The lot is about four blocks from their present home -- "You can see it from the steps," Arnold said--and, he added, he goes over on the riding mower "every once in awhile to cut the grass."

Two small base lamps that Arnold made are part of the living room decor. Each one took about 40 hours to make, he said. There's also a glass case with stained glass top and sides he made to hold a doll that belongs to Mrs. Arnold.

One window is filled with "suncatchers" -- small stained glass figures that reflect the sunlight -- and there's a mobile in the kitchen.

There's also the swag lamp he made for his wife in honor of their 39th wedding [See FRAGILE page 2]

(Continued from Page 1) them of the statement of grounds.

Petitions for any purpose must contain signatures of qualified voters "equal in number to no fewer than 25 percent of the votes cast in the last general municipal election" according to Article VI.

The petition must be presented to the city secretary no later than 30 days following the filing of the affidavit by the petitioners' committee.

After the petition is submitted to the city secretary, it must be determined sufficient. If it is insufficient, the petitioners' committee may ask for a review by the City Council and—if the Council will not accept it—the committee may amend the petition and resubmit it. Once amended, no petition can be

amended again. If the petition is determined to be sufficient, the City Council has 60 days from that date to adopt "without any change in substance" an ordinance proposed for referendum.

If the Council fails to act, an election will be called within 30 to 60 days following the Council meeting. The called election may coincide with a regular city election during that time period.

"No ordinance substantially the same" as a defeated initiated ordinance or an ordinance approved in referendum may be initiated by voters within two years from the election date, according to Article VI, Section 9.

Any person holding an elective office, whether he has been elected or appointed to fill a vacancy,

subject to recall. The official whose removal is sought may request a public hearing. The official must request the hearing within five days

after the recall petition has been presented to the council, and the hearing must be held within five to 15 days after it is requested.

McKnight is the incumbent commissioner in precinct 4-4A, but is challenging Maguglin for the at-large post. A resident of Rockport 12 years, he has been a navigation commissioner for six years.

Jackson is a third-generation member of a Rockport family and vice-president of Jackson Seafood Company.

"Feelings here just aren't as strong as they are in Seadrift. Any fighting there, in Rockport and Aransas County, is mostly

among the Vietnamese themselves," Hewes said. Local opinion on the matter began running so high that J.C. Harlan, president of the Seafood Producers Association was prompted to write Congressman Joe Wyatt, asking that he look into the matter.

In Wyatt's reply he stated that he knew of no federal program which made large loans, but added that there were numerous private organizations which might be making the loans.

Joe Wyatt Appointed House Speaker

U.S. Congressman Joe Wyatt was appointed by U.S. House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill to the Conference Committee on H.R. 111 (Panama Canal Treaty Implementing Legislation) which will try to work out differences between the House and Senate versions of the bill. The Committee organized on Wednesday, August 1, and will continue its deliberations the first week in September.

Congressman Wyatt, an outspoken opponent of the treaties and the legislation, was the only first-term Democrat appointed to this important joint conference committee. Although he continues to strongly oppose the treaties, Wyatt stated, "I am firmly convinced that, if we must give the canal away, the American people deserve the protection afforded by the House legislation."

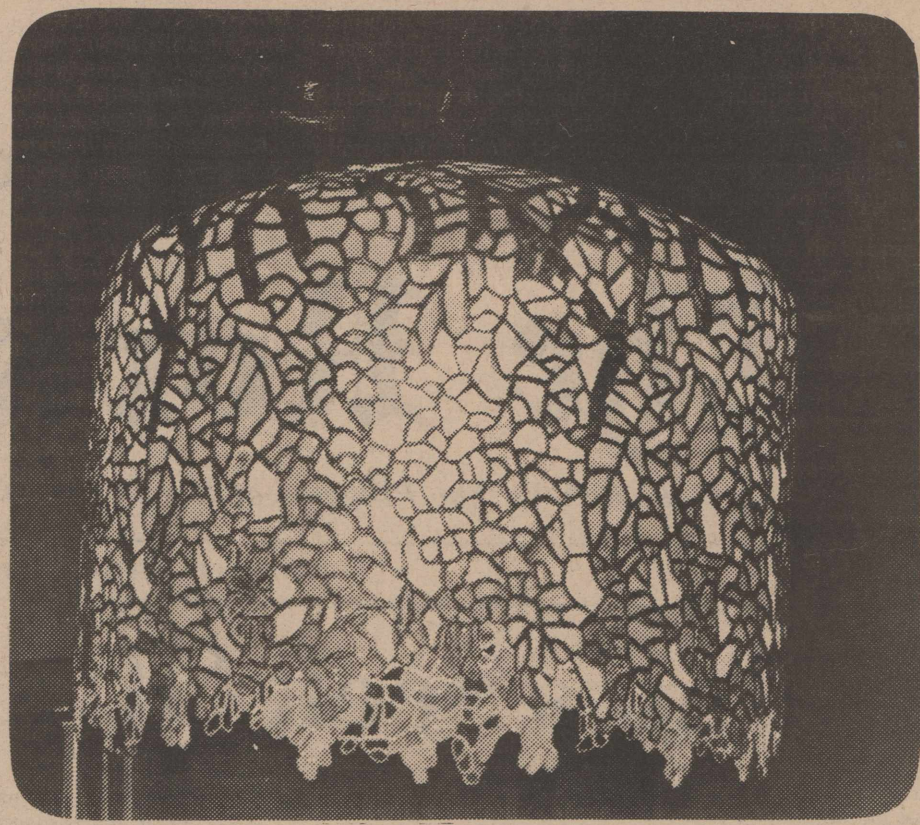

A copy of a Tiffany Lamp -- which was itself a copy -- that sold for \$33,000, Arnold's swag lamp is in the "Wisteria" pattern. It contains 2,500 pieces of glass, "some about the size of a fingernail," he said, and was made in five sections.

"It took four people to put it together," Mrs. Arnold added. "Three of us to hold it while he soldered."

He spent four months -- about 350 hours of actual working time -- making the lamp, Arnold said.

Arnold's workshop is down in the garage, and "when the mood hits or the fishing ain't good, I may go down to work two or three hours," he said.

"It's a pretty expensive hobby," he said, especially since most of the glass he uses comes from England and Germany.

But he isn't in it for the money. "I don't want to get too commercial," he said.

"It's just something to keep me busy."

School District Mails Notices To Resident Property Owners

Residents of Aransas County began receiving their notice of property reappraisals last week, along with a letter stating that if the amount quoted is incorrect, the property owner would have the chance to appear before the Board of Equalization.

The property market value for the 1979 tax year, and school administrators and trustees have repeatedly stated that the tax rate is expected to go down.

In the past the property was valued at 55 percent of the market value, and the taxes were \$1.34 for each \$100 valuation of the property. Through tax law changes, the property is now valued at the full 100

percent market value.

In order for taxes not to increase, the tax rate would have to go down to 73-74 cents for each \$100 valuation of the property.

Because the new tax rate hasn't been set, the Aransas County Independent School District has been giving examples of the 1949 taxes by using the

1978 rate as applied to the 1979 proposed valuation.

County residents who have any questions concerning the valuation of their property should call 729-6142 for an appointment to appear before the Board of Equalization. The board will be meeting between 9 a.m. and noon, and 1-4 p.m. beginning August 23.

Juveniles Taken To CC After Burglary

Rockport Police Sgt. James Jacoby reported the incident about 10:15 p.m. Monday when he saw a juvenile male standing near a broken plate glass window on the south side of the Texaco Station.

Jacoby reported the youth ran behind the service station and into the rear parking of Roaten's Drug Store. Lt. Joe Hinojosa and other police officers joined in the search for the youth and Lt. Hinojosa stopped him as he was running on the east side of

the Bayview Professional Building, Jacoby said.

A second youth was stopped by police after he emerged from the service station.

Police learned the youths entered the building through the plate glass window, then opened the cash register and got the keys to the soft drink and candy machines.

Jacoby said he arrived before anything could be taken.

Police reported both youths were carrying

switchblade knives and had in their possession articles taken from other stores in Rockport. Among these were two BB gun pistols, an electric watch taken from Winn's, two pair of boots taken from HEB Food Store, and a hat from Shoreline Drive In.

The Division of Solid Waste Management of the State Health Department, a resident of Austin and of Aransas County.

Carmichael was discussing the fact that almost no one wants a landfill nearby. At one time, that wasn't much of a problem in Texas. There was plenty of land. Throw your discards in an open dump and move off and leave them.

Today, the open space is shrinking. If you truck waste far from population centers to a fill, today's gasoline prices make that an expensive operation. When you want to save fuel, you think in terms of something other than large vehicles.

In the meantime, we are generating 12 million tons of municipal solid waste in Texas every year. This is the responsibility of the State Health Department.

The Governor has designated municipal solid waste management regions. Local governments, working through their Councils of Governments, are charged with developing a state plan for waste disposal during the next 18 months. Guidelines for the plans were recently issued by the Environmental Protection Agency.

The Texas Department of Water Resources is responsible for waste and the Railroad Commission for solid waste resulting from oil and gas activity.

Representatives of the state agencies held a public hearing in the Coastal Bend at the COG offices, and will hold a state-wide hearing at Austin.

The Federal Solid Waste Disposal Act of 1965 provided financial assistance to states to make surveys and develop legislation. At that time, open pits were common and burning was the usual practice.

A state law regulating disposal was passed in 1969. Local governments have made efforts to comply. It has been an expensive process in many instances and many difficulties have been encountered. But Texas was far down the road of taking care of its own problems by the time the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act of 1976 was passed by the federal government.

Carmichael pointed out that during this same period of time, efforts had been pushed to clean up air and water. The land had to accept this extra load, what had to be disposed of after it was removed from air and water.

You can't buy for a landfill any piece of land offered at a good price. You must avoid areas over aquifers to protect the ground water supply. Don't get close to an airport. Landfills attract seagulls and

birds are a danger to jets. Soil conditions must be acceptable.

In the Coastal Bend, we have to worry about high water tables and drainage conditions, always keeping in mind the possibility of hurricanes and flooding.

Plans for a landfill are as massive and detailed as plans for an office building. Unless the fill can be excavated in heavy clay or shale, a liner may be required. What is built is much like a swimming pool.

The process is underway in a few areas in the United States. Combustibles are processed in several ways, such as compacting or shredding, to provide a ready source of energy.

The plan that will be developed in the next year and a half will indicate what directions we may move in disposing of solid waste in the Coastal Bend.

Mourning, Whitewing Dove Seasons Set

AUSTIN - Split North and South Zone mourning dove seasons and four half-days of hunting for whitewings have been set by Parks and Wildlife Commissioners at their July 24 meeting.

P&W Commissioners decided on September 1 through October 21, 1979, and January 5-13, 1980, seasons for the North Zone; and September 22 through November 4, 1979, and January 5-20, 1980, seasons for the South Zone.

In those counties along the Rio Grande which have white-winged dove hunting, the fall segment of the South Zone hunting will end October 31.

Shooting hours, bag and possession limits for mourning doves remain the same as last year--30 minutes before sunrise to sunset, bag of 10 birds and possession limit of 20.

White-winged dove season is September 1-2 and 8-9, in the counties of Brewster, Cameron, Culberson, El Paso, Hidalgo, Hudspeth, Jeff Davis, Kinney, Maverick, Presidio, Starr, Terrell, Val Verde, Webb, Willacy and Zapata.

Shooting hours remain at noon to sunset; with a bag of 10 whitewings, 10 mourning doves and possession of 20 birds of both species.

A system of alternating sanctuaries for whitewing hunting remains in effect this year.

At their July 24 meeting, Commissioners also established seasons for some other waterfowl species:

--Teal Ducks: September 15-23, 1979; bag of four teal in the aggregate; possession limit of eight in the aggregate.

--King and Clapper Rails: September 1 through November 9; bag of 15 in the aggregate; possession of 30 in the aggregate.

--Sora and Virginia Rails: September 1 through November 9; bag of 15; possession of 30.

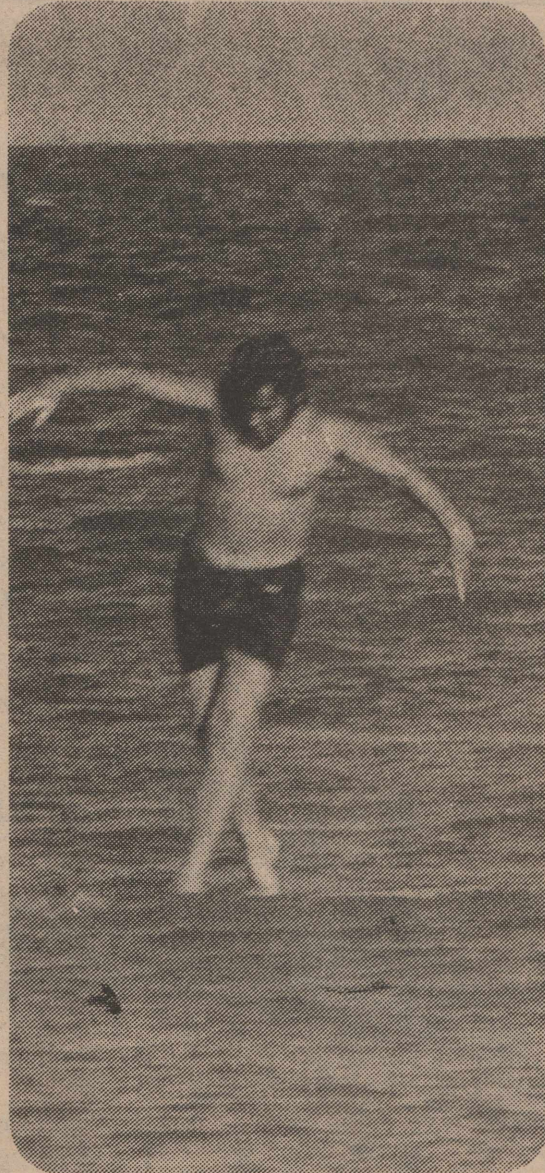

Weekly Report

Paramedics for the Aransas County Emergency Medical Services reported answering 16 calls during the week beginning July 30. They had expected at least 15 calls during that time.

Mileage for the week totaled 384 miles, and the average response time was five minutes and 40 seconds.

The overall look for the month of July shows paramedics answering 103 calls, 24 of which were miscellaneous calls. They answered 16 calls for heart attack victims, 12 auto accident calls, and 11 assault calls. There were also seven fall victims, six recreational accidents and drug overdoses each, five industrial accidents and four water rescues.

In addition, they answered one call each for a motorcycle accident, a burn, a gunshot, a diabetic complication, and a false alarm.

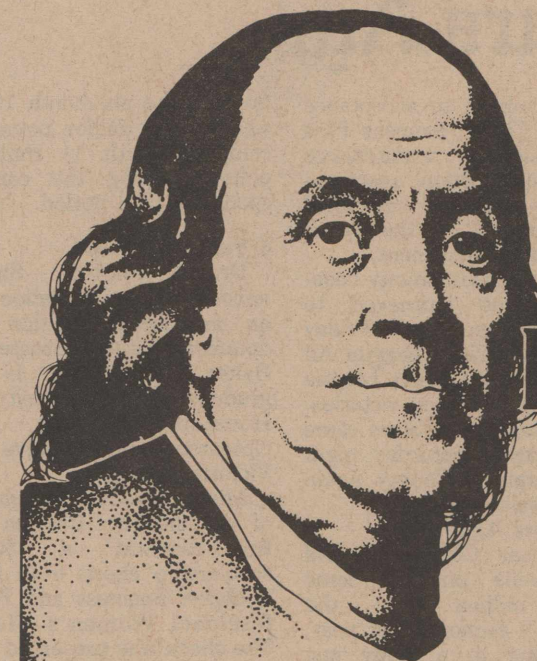
Calls originating in the city numbered 48, and 55 came from in the county.

The Life Pak Heart Machine was used 33 times, and two patients were defibrillated. twenty-three patients were given IV's and 13 were given drugs.

A total of 59 patients were transported to local area hospitals, with 21 going to Lyman-Roberts, 13 to Memorial Hospital and 12 were taken to the Enterprise Medical Center. Seven patients were taken to Spohn Hospital, two were transported to Driscoll Children's Hospital, with the remaining four taken to other local hospitals.

Milage for the month was 2,935.0 miles, and 83 patients were billed. Bills can be paid at the Chamber of Commerce.

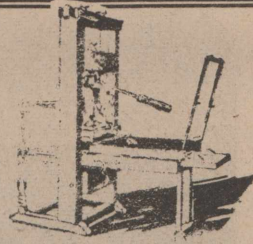

Letters From Our Readers

Dear Sir,
Your Speaking Out Program on the Ski Basin is good. I welcome the opportunity to speak out about the basin. I am well acquainted with it for I frequently water ski there.

A basic problem with the Ski Basin is that unlimited power boating is done in a limited area. The basin is not a big area for boating and water sports. Water skiing just takes lots of room.

The area on the side of the public boat ramp is adequate. However, the restriction along the west side imposed by a narrow channel creates situations that someday will lead to serious accidents. Of all the basin, the west side becomes the most limited, most congested area. The west side channel is not wide enough for a skier to play his turns to both sides of the towing boat and remain over "deep" water. Even in the channel it is not unusual for a skier to stand on the bottom while awaiting to be picked up.

A dangerous situation occurs when a skier falls into the water on the west side and the towing boat makes a sharp turn to return and pick up the skier. You then have two-way traffic in an area not wide enough for one-way ski traffic. To this unsafe condition while picking up a fallen skier, comes the power boat pleasure riders.

The Ski Basin with its protected - smooth water basks power boats to go for a pleasure speed run. And rightly so for the basin is a perfect place and speed boats are made for speed. The speed signs posted there are useless. The new shallow water markers will help many a boater stay afloat.

Skiing and boating can be done reasonably safe in the basin. There are times now when skiing there is quite safe; other times when it is risky primarily due to congestion. That hazard comes from the narrow channel on the west side which necessitates that water traffic follow directly behind the boat ahead. Widening of that channel would permit boat

traffic to spread out. This would be a major step toward making the Ski Basin a safer place to enjoy water sports.

The basin is a credit to the Rockport community and should be utilized for swimming, fishing, skiing and boating. Properly managed, that can be done. There are swimming and fishing areas that boaters don't go into. The areas could be designated and marked for the benefit of all.

Senator Lloyd Bentsen Watching Washington

Washington, D. C. -- "Sooner or later," Senator Lloyd Bentsen said Thursday, "the coming recession will force this Congress to enact a tax cut. Our economy will be far better served if it is done sooner."

"I am deeply disturbed by the new White House economic forecast," Bentsen said in a Senate speech Thursday.

"It shows unemployment rising to 8.2 percent next year instead of 6.9 percent as projected earlier. It shows inflation continuing at the double-digit rate of 11 percent for the last three months of this year instead of 9.8 percent as projected earlier. It shows our economy shrinking by 1.4 percent this year instead of 0.5 percent as projected earlier."

"This disturbing new internal forecast clearly shows that our economic problems are far worse than expected and prompts me today to stand in the Senate and urge this Con-

gress to take action to turn our economy around."

"We cannot rely on the traditional response of more government spending. It will do nothing but fan the flames of inflation if Congress tries to spend our way out of the coming recession," Bentsen said.

"Since June I have been calling for a tax cut and I renew that call again today."

"I'm not talking about a traditional tax cut that simply pumps more money into the economy. I'm talking about a tax cut that will help combat both inflation and recession, that will help end the seemingly endless cycle of boom-and-bust in this country by increasing our productive capacity."

"I have been calling for a tax cut in the neighborhood of \$20 billion with half going to individuals to help them cope with an inflation rate that has pushed them into higher tax brackets and with half going to the supply side to help bring up our lagging productivity rate," Bentsen said.

"A \$20 billion tax cut would not add one whit to inflation, not with higher Social Security taxes and higher corporate taxes and higher OPEC prices taking more than \$50 billion out of consumers' pockets."

"It is important that Congress act quickly to approve a tax cut. It moved far too slowly to combat the recession of 1974. By the time the tax cut went into effect, on May 1, 1975, the recession had ended and the economy was already moving up. Because of late timing in that case the recession was worse than it need to have been and the recovery was too strong, which only added to the rate of inflation," Bentsen said.

"I know that few of my colleagues favor reduced taxes at this time. But sooner or later the coming recession will force this Congress to enact a tax cut. Our economy will be far better served if it is done sooner," Senator Bentsen said.

Amateur Radio Operator Classes To Be Held

As the descent of Skylab approached, amateur radio operators around the world stood by, alert to give the first warning if a rain of metal began where it was not scheduled.

Amateur radio operators are usually the first to put out

a call for help when an emergency or disaster occurs, and to obtain and relay information when all other forms of communication are knocked out.

There are about 1,500 licensed amateurs in the Coastal Bend. About half of

these have equipment today and are on the air, for us to call on if we need them.

It is the amateurs who are responsible for many of our electronic advances. Such was Marconi, who invented wireless telegraphy. Today, the amateurs build their own satellites, the seventh and eighth now in orbit and functional. They are working with computers, transmitting computer programs over the air in Morse Code.

Their equipment may be large, almost filling a room, or a hand-carried box that moves their base of communications with them wherever they go. Around the Coastal Bend, as well as elsewhere in the world, there are repeater stations that pick up what they transmit and give it carrying power.

The amateur is in a completely different category than the much more common CB operator. The amateur must learn to be proficient in Morse Code and learn technical information,

rules and regulations to be examined for licensing on different levels.

Classes to prepare operators for licensing are held in Corpus Christi, (Call 888 6906 for information) and Beeville (call 358-7030).

Contacts are made around the world. English is the international language of the amateur operators. Iron curtain countries, although somewhat more restrictive, do license operators and allow them to talk on this far-flung network. When operators contact one another across the world, they exchange postcards to confirm the contact.

To the amateur, the conversation with an operator in Russia may be the most intriguing. Or perhaps it is to talk to Tom Christian, descendent of Fletcher Christian, operating the only station on Pitcairn Island, or King Hussein of Jordan.

So why then condemn Ted Kennedy? My answer is simple -- because of the prevarications and pretenses in which he indulged afterwards. Hypocrisy of the vilest, lowest sort, but effective enough to save him from landing in jail. However, forget for the moment the wild tales told and circulated by Ted. Consider a single substantial fact.

There were two roads on the tiny island of Chappaquiddick, a place which Ted had known from early boyhood. One of the roads was paved, the other not. To pass on to the unpaved road required a sharp turn to the right, a maneuver Ted would not have made without intent, even had he been intoxicated to the point of total irresponsibility. And that is a circumstance that must be doubted if for no better reason than to remember his own accounts of events, be they true or not. But here I am rehashing old stuff. I began by declaring that Ted will not become a presidential nominee. Here's the real reason. Remember the funeral of Marty Jo? Kennedy's wife attended and I still remember the film clips. Here I may be accused of dramatizing a small thing, however one that deeply impressed me. She was dressed in virginal white and the few pictures showed her face to be almost totally expressionless. At the time I was impressed with her costume and wondered, rightly or wrongly, what pressure was placed upon her to attend the burial.

That was before her personal troubles began, or at least before they became public knowledge. Many of us are left to believe that that was the beginning, although who knows.

In any event, because of Mrs. Kennedy, I am convinced that Teddy's public life will never advance beyond its present state, and that to a degree must be acknowledged as something that is to his credit.

The life of a First Lady is not an easy one. Considering Mrs. Kennedy's present state of health I much doubt that she could stand the stresses. No one can know that better than Ted Kennedy.

SO HERE I BECOME AN ODDS MAKER. JIMMY Carter, no matter the turn of events, the boo-boos he may become guilty of, will be the next Democratic candidate. On the GOP side, Ronald Reagan will fall by the wayside, a couple of other candidates will look promising for a while but they too will slip. Things will boil down to a convention contest between two Texans, John Connally and George Bush. Old line Republicans who were behind the put up job to discredit Big John with the milk scandal will still fight him, and continue to exert their influence. They will paint him into a corner with charges of ultra-conservatism. The Reagan forces will move to Bush and George Bush will become the candidate. Who will be the winner, Carter or Bush? There I hedge my bets. Now, just for the heck of it, tuck this paragraph away. You'll enjoy confronting me with it, especially if I should prove to be all wet. The ball dear readers is in your court.

New students should bring their report cards, book card, and health record showing proof of having immunization for tetanus, diphtheria, and polio in the last ten years.

All new students should be enrolled before September 1, 1979, as school will

begin on September 4, 1979, and students should be prepared to meet all their classes the first day of school.

Rockport Receives \$220 From Mixed Drink Remittance

Rockport's share of gross receipts taxes on mixed drinks amounted to \$220.34 for the months of April, May and June, State Comptroller Bob Bullock has announced. Total city revenue collected on the tax totalled \$1,463.91 for the period. Texas cities and counties receive a 15 percent rebate on the tax collected on mixed drinks sold within their boundaries. Mixed drink tax collected in Aransas County during the three-month period totalled \$27,797.56 of which the county's share was \$4,169.63. Aransas Pass taxes totalled \$8,378.67 collected, with \$1,256.80 refunded to the city. The 10 percent gross receipts tax on sales of mixed drinks is collected by the Alcoholic Beverage Commission and the city-county share is rebated on a quarterly basis by the Comptroller's office.

Last year, the mixed drink tax generated more than \$65.3 million for state, county and city governments, Bullock said.

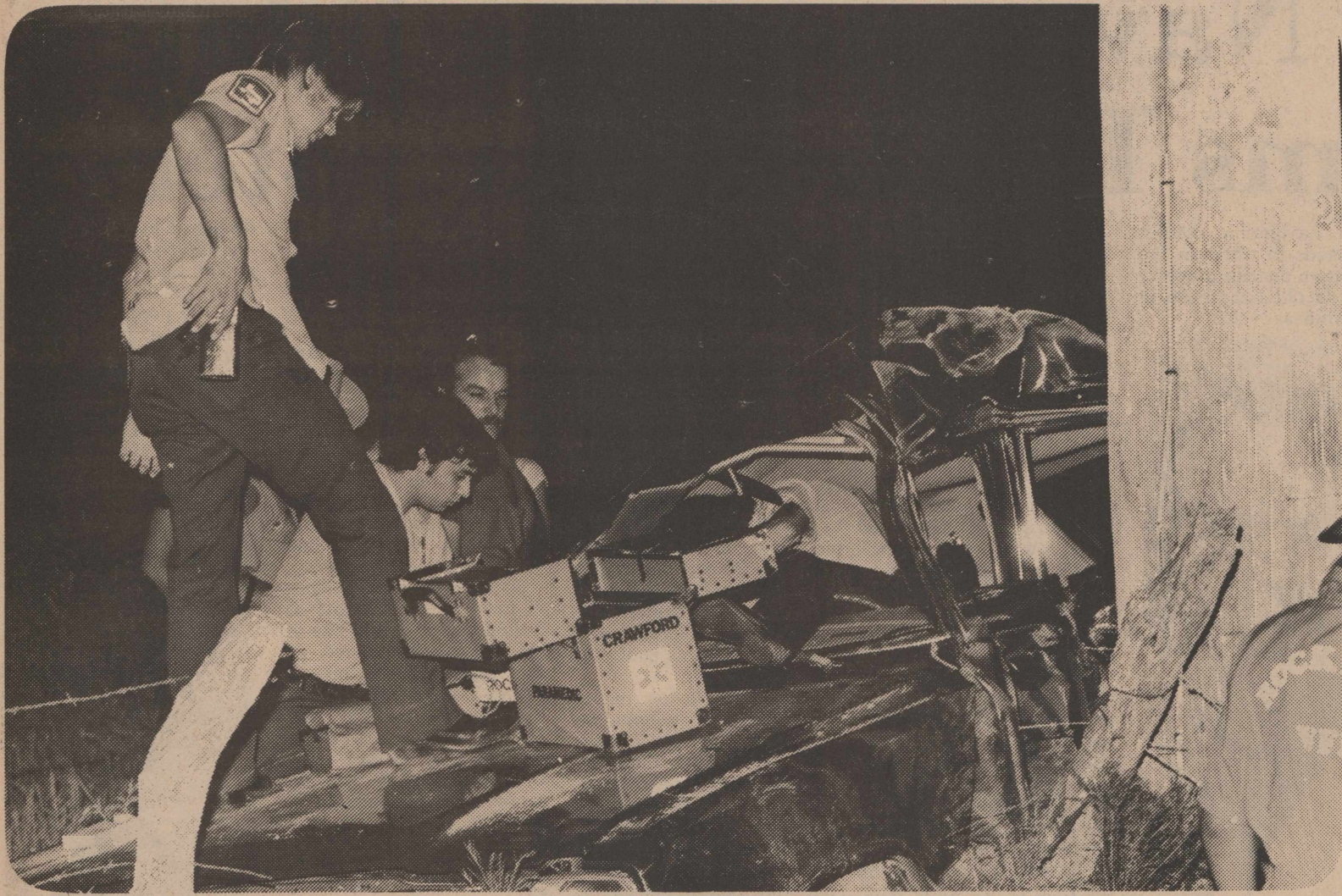

In the past, the Division spent literally thousands of dollars and countless hours of limited staff time attempting to mediate disputes between consumers and businesses even though

those disputes frequently did not involve illegal conduct. Because the number of complaints filed each year has grown, an increasing amount of the Division's staff time has been spent informally mediating complaints with less and less time spent in actual investigations and prosecutions of those who violate the Consumer Protection Act.

These factors have convinced us that some modification of the consumer complaint process was needed. Each staff proposal was measured against our

determination that the new system must serve the consumers of this State at least as well, and preferably better than the previous system.

The informal mediation service offered by the Division was a good public service. Nevertheless, the same service has been offered by local Better Business Bureaus for many years. And statistics indicate that the Bureaus are as good, or better at mediating individual consumer complaints than the Division.

After much deliberation, my staff and I recently met with the Presidents of the fourteen Better Business Bureaus in Texas and obtained an agreement that the Bureaus would work with the Attorney General to help implement a more effective consumer complaint program.

This new program will work as follows:

- When a consumer contacts the Attorney General

Where To Vote:

with a complaint, the staff will review the complaint to determine if it alleges conduct that violates the Consumer Protection Act. If the complaint does appear to involve such conduct, the staff will investigate the complaint and, if in the public interest, prosecute the wrongdoer.

If the complaint does involve conduct which appears to violate the Consumer Protection Act, the Better Business Bureau will be asked to mediate the complaint on the consumer's behalf. The Bureau will then notify the consumer of the outcome of the complaint.

In those relatively few cases when the Bureau is unable to resolve the complaint, it will be returned to the Division to insure that everything possible has been done to help the consumer.

In addition, each of the Better Business Bureaus in Texas has agreed to provide the Division with monthly reports indicating the types, numbers and resolution rates of all consumer complaints filed with Bureaus. This will insure that the Division is able to keep abreast of trends in consumer complaints and problem areas for consumers--information that is essential to any effective enforcement program.

This program has been in operation on a trial basis for nearly three months in our Dallas Regional Office and has proved most successful. Indeed, the Division's record in terms of the number of lawsuits filed and the amount of money recovered for consumers for the past six months has been excellent only once in any previous six months' period in the history of the office. We are confident that our new program will make the Division even more responsive to consumer complaints and more effective in stopping unlawful conduct than it has been in the past.

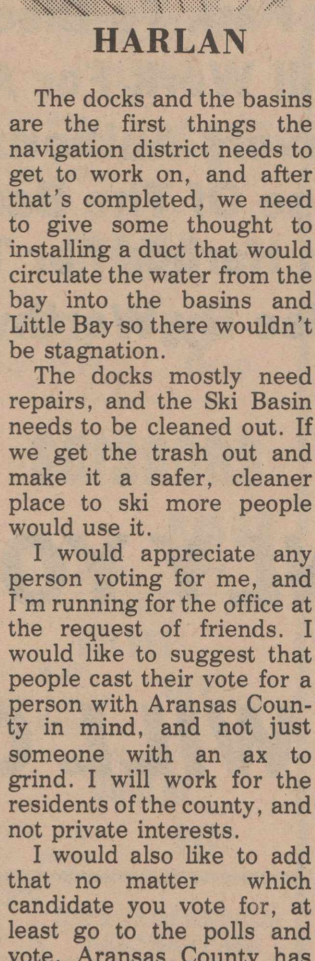
I feel my experience in marine business, working for Casterline Fish Company, qualifies me as a navigation candidate. My familiarity with sea-related work is especially helpful.

under the control of the Navigation District. However, with limited revenue to work with, only the emergency needs can be met (at this time).

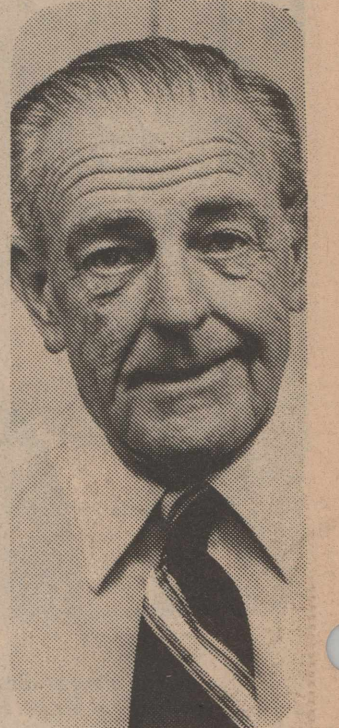

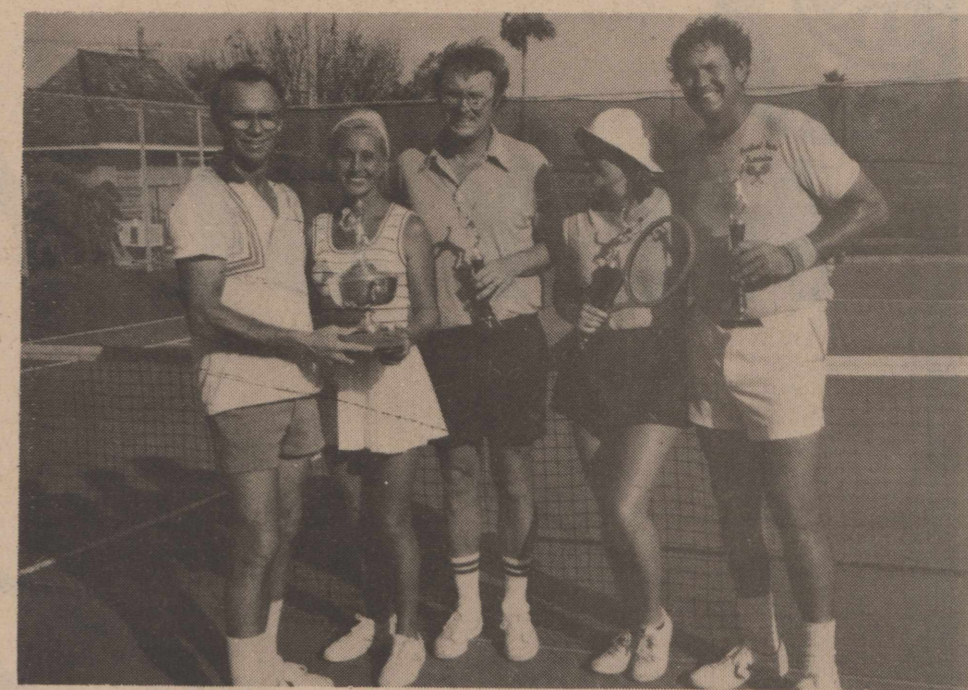

Propane Engine Fuel Offers Motorists Advantages

Austin--High prices and gasoline shortages are causing record numbers of motorists to consider converting their automobiles to operate on propane (liquefied petroleum gas) engine fuel, according to Lowry M. Carpenter, Executive Director of the Texas LP-Gas Association.

Propane has many distinct advantages over gasoline as engine fuel, the expert explained. It is an unleaded fuel with a naturally high octane rating of 110-120--which is considerably higher than most unleaded gasoline.

LP-Gas has a lower cost per gallon, a cleaner burning engine, and lower exhaust emissions than gasoline, he continued.

The fact that it contains no lead, carbon or other sludge-creating properties means fewer oil filters are used, fewer oil changes are required, carburetor expense is reduced, engines require less down time and less money is spent on overhauls.

Carpenter said propane also extends spark plug life, and eliminates pilferage and spillage.

Conversion costs, he said, are quickly reclaimed; and within a short period of time motorists begin saving money on the operation of converted automobiles.

Carpenter emphasized safe and efficient operation of a propane-fueled vehicle depends in large part on proper installation of the entire fuel system.

He stressed that conversions should be done by qualified firms employing experienced personnel. In addition to the installation of the propane fuel system, the vehicle's engine may require internal modifications for efficient operation. Such modifications require considerable expertise, in

addition to special parts and equipment.

LP-Gas engine conversion, Carpenter said, is "not a do-it-yourself" project.

Propane powers industrial lift trucks, farm tractors and other implements,

fleet vehicles, taxi cabs, buses, municipal trucks and cars; stationary engines such as those used in irrigation pumping; recreational vehicles and a growing number of passenger cars.

Over 60 million people

Cooking Corner

We think of corned beef as an Irish favorite, but it never has been a common dish of the Irish in Ireland — the overpopulated Emerald Isle does not have grazing grounds for large herds of beef cattle. Corned beef became a favorite of the Irish

when more than 1.6 million immigrated to this country following the tragic potato blight of the 1840s.

It became a favorite in this country because it was cheap—selling for five cents a pound in Boston and New York, where most of the immigrants settled. Cabbage was cheap, too, and potatoes always had been a mainstay

Irish Not Only Ones To Like Corned Beef

of the Irish diet.

Potatoes grew in Ireland where nothing else would. It was only natural that the newcomers would combine the corned beef, cabbage and potatoes into a tasty and hearty meal that has become all-American.

So bless the Irish and pass the potatoes, or serve them along with this alternative to corned beef:

BLARNEY BEEF POT ROAST

- 3 to 5 lbs. boneless beef chuck eye roast
- 1/4 cup flour
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 1 tsp. salt
- 2 tbsps. cooking fat
- 3/4 cup water
- 1 tsp. instant beef bouillon
- 1 tsp. leaf thyme
- 6 medium potatoes, peeled and halved
- 1 lb. leeks, sliced in

two-inch pieces
1/2 cup brewed tea
2 tbsps. snipped parsley

Combine flour, salt and pepper. Dredge roast and reserve leftover flour. Brown roast in cooking fat in Dutch oven.

Pour off drippings. Add water, instant bouillon and thyme. Cover tightly and cook slowly one and one-half to two and one-half hours. Add potatoes, continue cook-

ing, covered, 40 minutes.

Add leeks and cook, covered, 20 minutes or until meat and vegetables are tender. (Allow approximately 45 minutes per pound for cooking.) Remove pot roast and vegetables to warm platter.

Combine reserved flour with one-half cup tea, add to cooking liquid and cook, stirring until thickened. Reduce heat and cook slowly three to five minutes. Sprinkle parsley over potatoes.

Beef, whether fresh or corned, is a top source of the high-quality protein needed to build, maintain and repair body tissues. It also is an important source of B vitamins and minerals.

To cook corned beef brisket:

Place brisket in Dutch oven, add water to cover. Cover tightly and simmer three to four hours. Add peeled and halved potatoes

and wedges of cabbage the last 30 minutes. Carve brisket diagonally across the grain into thin slices. (Wine vinegar or herb vinegar for the cabbage and horseradish for the brisket add wonderful flavor.)

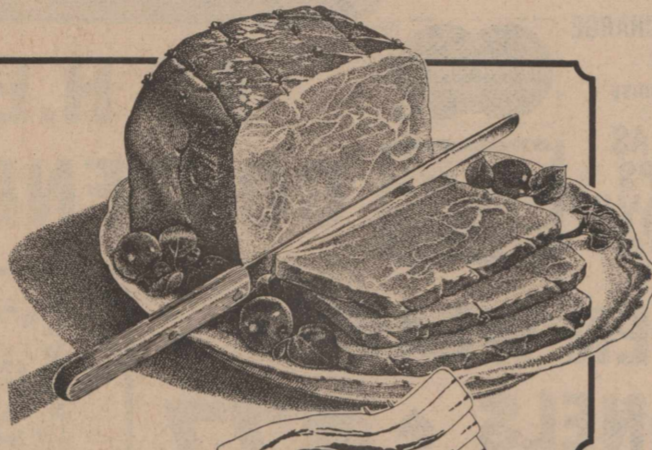

Eat Yourself Slim

Hypertension is the medical term for high blood pressure, a problem that affects thousands of people and has baffled both doctors and patients for endless years. The causes of the development of the disease are still

for the most part, unclear. Why some people are susceptible while others are not is the subject of continuing scientific interest.

The old idea that habitual and excessive intake of salt may cause high blood pressure does seem to have scientific support. Some people apparently are genetically susceptible, while others are not.

How Much Salt Is Too Much?

Recent studies showed that approximately 15 to 20 percent of the American people are susceptible.

Chronic overloading of salt in the diet does not appear to cause blood pressure to rise immediately, but rather, sets in motion a process that eventually becomes irreversible, and uncorrectible by simply reducing salt intake.

The ultimate effect of this process is on the kidneys. Their ability to handle sodium (salt) is altered permanently in some people.

High blood pressure frequently accompanies other diseases. Gout and hypertension seem to be closely related. Obesity often is present in the hypertensive patient. High blood fat levels occur, especially with a diet of excessive carbohydrates, such as simple sugars.

Diabetes and hypertension often occur together, with overweight causing the triggering factor in their development.

Chronic high blood pressure may lead to cerebral

vascular accidents, more commonly known as "strokes." Heart attacks may accompany hypertension.

All of these disabling and killer diseases are directly related to the diet. It is true that the grave can be dug with a knife and fork. What can be done to lessen the impact of improper eating habits of thousands of Americans? How much salt is too much?

Metabolic studies have shown that people do not re-

quire more than 200 mg. of sodium per day — just one-tenth of a teaspoon of ordinary table salt. Most people in the United States take about 5,000 mg. per day, or 25 times more than they actually need. Even larger amounts are ingested if the diet is made up of highly processed "fast foods."

MSG is often added as a "flavor enhancer" by many restaurants, which adds considerably more sodium to the already highly salted foods. Many people become addict-

ed to high salt diets, and will automatically add salt to food before they even taste it.

Lactating women and people working in hot, humid climates increases the need for salt, somewhat, but even then 2,000 mg. per day is enough to meet the most strenuous demands.

If you suspect that your diet is too high in sodium, you might help yourself by substituting lemon in place of salt, and using flavorful herbs and spices for seasonings. The following foods are

high in sodium, and should be omitted if hypertension is suspected: processed

cheeses, pickles, graham crackers and salted crackers, cured hams and meats, sauerkraut, green olives,

corn flakes, canned, salted fish, table salt and MSG, salted nuts, milk, cottage cheese, salted tomato juice, celery

and eggs have moderately high salt content. Washing off canned foods with water will help reduce the salt content.

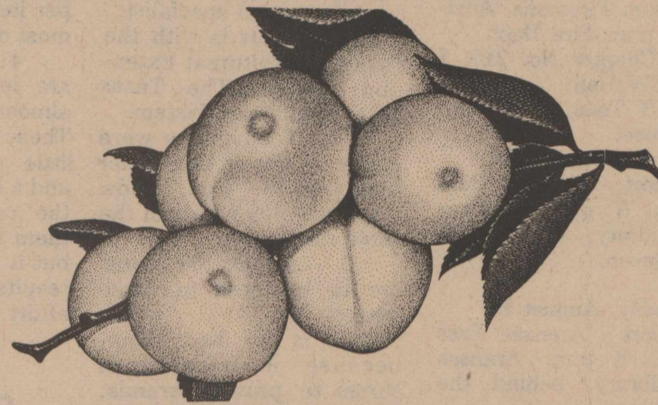

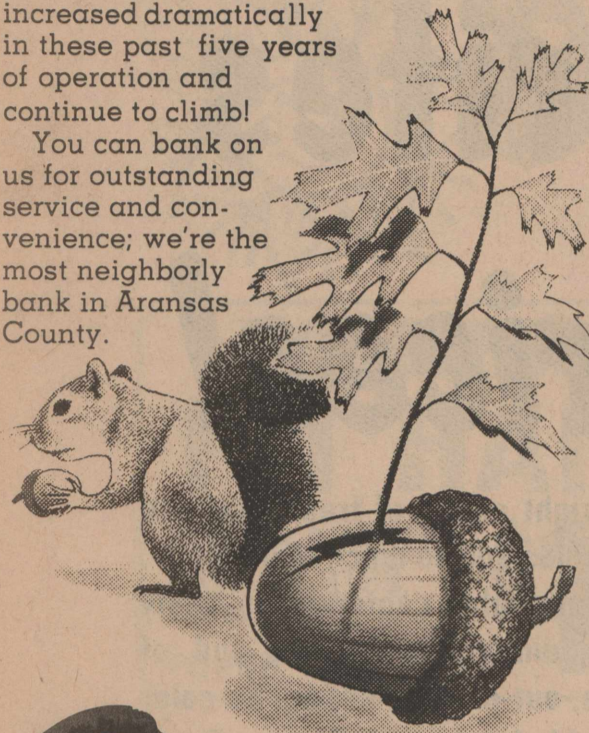

Fight Inflation, Face Food Facts

COLLEGE STATION -- "We're going to have to face facts about food costs."

"That is, if we're going to keep our financial heads above water in these days of inflated costs for everything," says Gwendolyn Clyatt, a consumer marketing information specialist.

Mrs. Clyatt is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

1 -- Food prices were going up slower than other things in the past. Now they are going up about the same rate.

2 -- All grocery stores are in business to make money.

This is no bad thing, because it encourages stores to provide brands, kinds of varieties of food--along with all kinds and cuts of meat and services--that we, the customers, want to buy.

Grocery stores can stay

in business only if they provide us with what we want at the best possible prices.

3 -- Roughly one-third of our food budgets go for meat, so when there are "specials" on meat, we're likely to save more money per item than we would on most other "specials."

4 -- Cuts of meat that are least in demand are almost always cheapest. These cuts generally take a little more time to cook and a bit more attention on the cook's part--to make them tender and delicious, but it can be done and the results are well worth the effort.

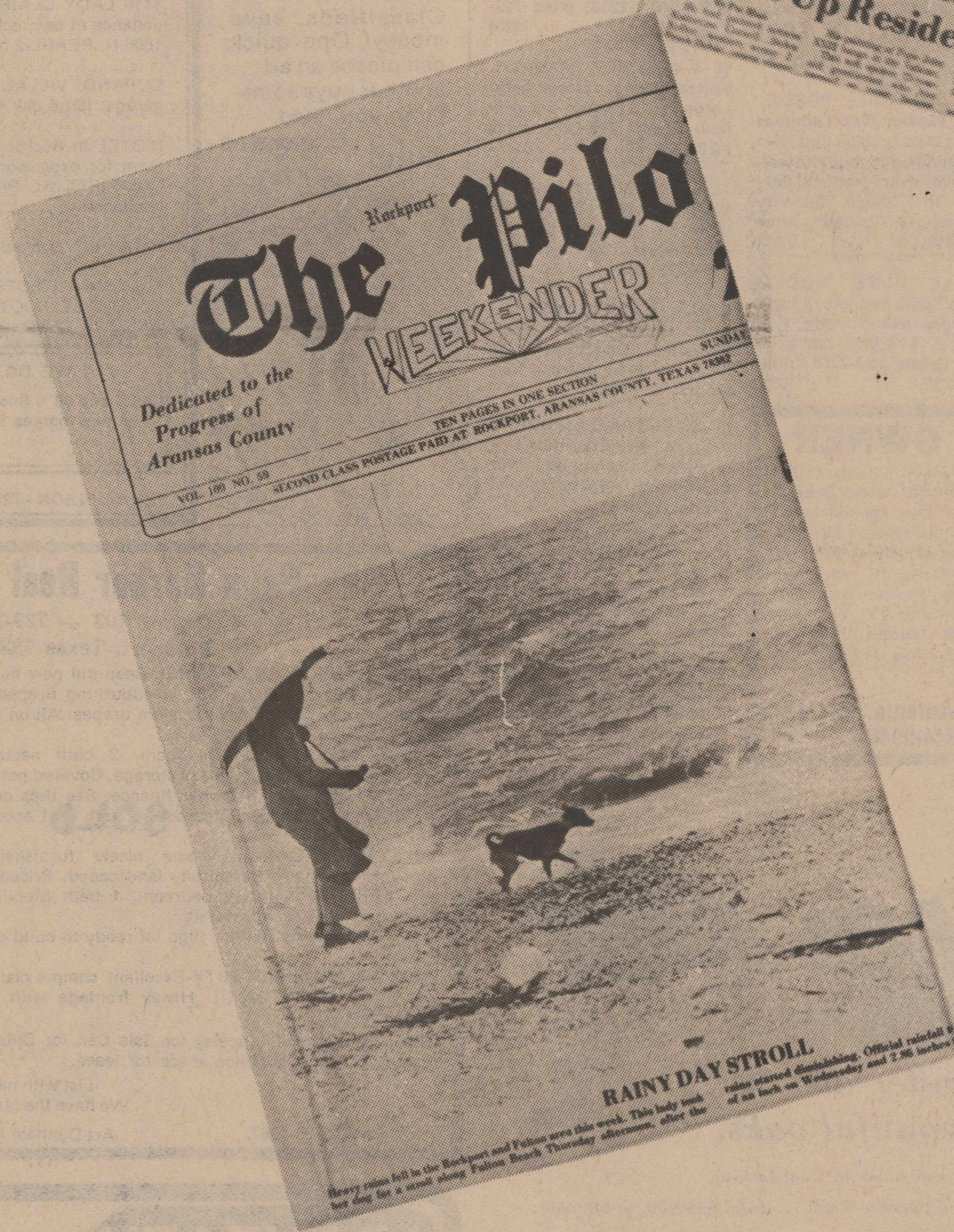

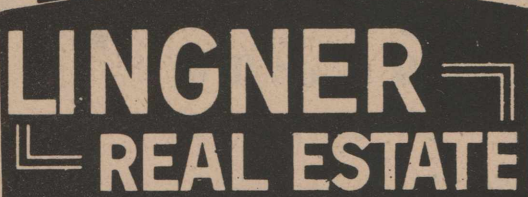

**The Legal Way
Procedure for no-will estates**

All states by statute provide for a summary probate court proceedings when administration in a no-will estate is unnecessary. The following is an example.

Q. Our son, 21 and single, died without a will. He left a savings of \$5,651, a paid-for mobile home valued at \$2,500 and a paid land lease with 18 months to run. He had one debt, a utility debt which we paid. We live in Indiana. Are we his heirs, and does the law require probate in his case?

A. Indiana descent and distribution statute (IC Sec. 29-1-2-1) says you are your son's sole heirs.

If your son's total estate is what you report, the Indiana Statute (IC 29-1-8-3,4) says probate court administration is unnecessary. In a summary proceedings, to close his estate an affidavit is filed with the probate court listing payment of inheritance tax, if any, court costs, funeral expenses and the distribution made to the parents. That closes the estate.

Q. A state trooper on patrol crashed a red light, not on urgent duty at the time, and collided with our son's car while he was on his way home from work. Personal injury and property damages resulted. Our neighbor and a retired policeman informs that we cannot sue the State of Hawaii where we live. Are they right?

A. Hawaiian Statute (Sec. C 661.2) says the state of Hawaii is liable if tort, a wrong, is caused by its agent while not on emergency duty for injuries and personal property damage. But the state is not liable for interest prior to judgment, nor punitive damages. The action must be filed within two years after the collision.

Q. We are to discuss mar-

ried women's property rights in Arizona at our Women's Club meeting. I am assigned to explain and define separate and community property rights. I would be grateful for your help.

A. Arizona Statutes (Sec.'s 25-211,213,214) define separate property as that which was owned by either spouse before marriage and acquired after marriage by gift, devise or descent and

all the profits therefrom. Separate real property of spouse 18 or older may be conveyed without the other spouse joining in the conveyance (ARS 22-451).

Community property is all property acquired by the efforts of either or both spouses while married and domiciled in Arizona, a community property state. Net one-half — after all the bills of the community are paid — vests, is owned by each spouse.

Basically, the same law applies in the other seven community property states: California, Idaho, Louisiana, Nevada, New Mexico, Texas, and Washington.

Q. I plan to go into business for myself. It will take one-third of our family savings to do it. How can I assure the family my creditors in business cannot reach that two-thirds if I should fail? We live in Maryland.

A. Maryland Supreme Court (116 MD 655) ruled that a trust which secures income and principal against creditors is valid, but you, the businessman, may not create such a trust in his favor. Have a lawyer draft the trust agreement.

Healthful Hints

Most Often-Asked Questions On Nutrition
By Jean Glowka

Q. I have a six-year-old son who never wants breakfast. I offer him eggs, pancakes, cereal, etc., but they just don't appeal to him. I have to practically force him to eat every morning, and it causes a big hassle (very unpleasant). Sometimes he'll drink some milk, but that's about it. I know he needs a good breakfast. Do you have any suggestions?

A. There are some things you could try. We often fail to consider anything "appropriate" for breakfast other than the "conventional" accepted dishes (cereal, pancakes, eggs, etc.).

A "high-protein drink" might appeal to him, since he will drink milk—put 8 oz. whole milk into your blender; add about three tablespoons of a good-tasting, high-quality protein powder, one teaspoon vanilla extract, and honey to taste. If he likes bananas, throw

in about 1/4 of a banana—it's delicious! (This drink alone will probably provide as many - or more - nutrients as a "conventional" breakfast.)

Heat up "last night's leftovers"—or make him a grilled cheese sandwich (whole grain bread, of course), or tuna on toast. Use your imagination; just go heavy on the protein and light on the "junk."

Good luck! He does need a nutritious, high-protein breakfast to get the day going right!

Q. I know what minerals are, but why are some of them referred to as "trace minerals?"

Minerals which are essential for proper body functioning, but which are present in the body in only extremely minute amounts are termed as trace minerals. Some of these are chromium, cobalt, and selenium (there are many more) and are usually measured in micrograms.

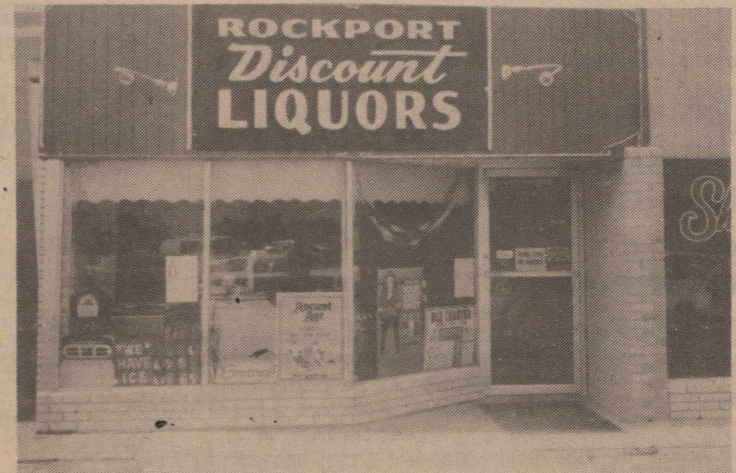

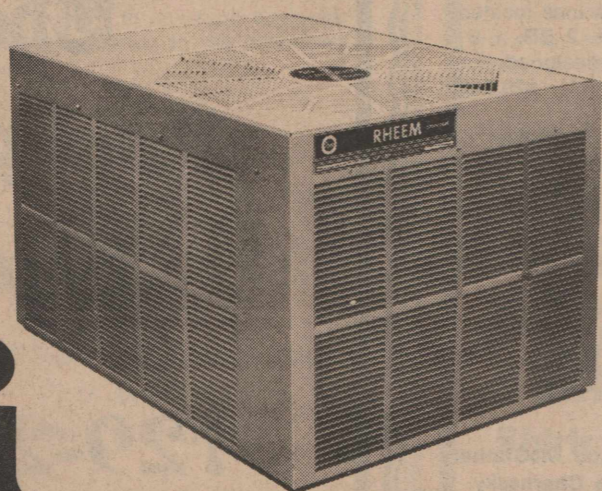
