## UNDERSTANDING DISPLACES ANTAGONISM

The Manufacturer: In the past decade the directing genius of the public utility industry has undergone remarkable changes in viewpoint, declares P. H. Gadsden, vice-president of the United Gas Improvement Company, of Philadelphia.

"Creation of public service commissions was bitterly opposed by utilities, as depriving them of that complete control over their properties which all other business enjoyed. They were insisted upon by the public to insure that rates should bear a definite and proper relation to service rendered and value of property.

"They have fully justified their existence and by their impartial treatment of the novel and complex questions involved, now enjoy the confidence and respect of both utilities and public. They constitute America's distinctive contribution to this great question. In place of the European system of governmental ownership and operation, America has substituted regulation through State commissions, preserving all the advantages of private initiative, while retaining that degree of supervision necessary to protect the public.

"Slowly, through decisions of these commissions, the public and utilities began to understand that the old basis of antagonism and destructive competition was all wrong, and that their interests were mutual and interdependent.

"It is now generally recognized that a community can grow no faster than its public utilities. For antagonism and suspicion there is gradually being substituted a sympathetic understanding of the economics of the situation."

Think it over.

## SHEEPMEN ABLE TO HOLD THEIR FALL CLIP OF WOOL

San Angelo Standard: If offerings on 1926 fall short wool are not high enough to net a profit to the producers, the sheepmen are financially able to hold their clips, in the opinion of T. A. Kincaid of Ozona, president of the Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association of Texas. He was in San Angelo Monday with Mrs. Kincaid and their son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Marbury Morrison, also of Ozona.

The lighter crop, in pounds, this season than last may serve to strengthen the market, said Mr. Kincaid. He attributes less shearing as much or more to difficulty in getting shearers and to dry strips over the country as to prospects for prices not as high as in 1925. Cotton picking drew many of the shearers and when they became available this month with picking slowed down by the depression the season was advanced too far for much shearing. Mr. Kincaid estimated that shearing in Crockett County this fall is 20 to 25 per cent less than a year ago.

All parts of Crockett County have had some rain recently, Mr. Kincaid reported, and the winter range should be good.

## PECAN INDUSTRY IN TEXAS IN ITS INFANCY

Having established 16 years ago the first course in pecan culture ever to be offered anywhere in the world, the A. & M. College of Texas has come to occupy a leading role in the development and improvement of the pecan as a marketable product. Under the direction of men trained at A. & M. thousands upon thousands of native seedling trees have been top-worked and the variety of the product improved in a way that savors of the miraculous. This work is continuing year by year with a consequent general increase in value of the pecan output of the State.

It is estimated that the pecan crop of Texas, now being harvested, will amount to approximately 300 carloads this year. This will represent about 9,000,000 pounds of nuts which at an average of 15 cents a pound would have a marketable value of \$1,350,000. Many pecans of the improved varieties, developed through grafting or budding in the improved nuts, bring as high as 50 to 60 cents a pound. The native seedling nuts average around 10 cents a pound.

Texas presents a tremendous field for the development of the pecan industry through the immense number of native seedlings found in various sections of the State. Texas now maintains almost as many native pecan trees as all of the other States of the Union combined. It is estimated that there are now between 75,000,000 and 100,000,000 native seedlings in Texas that may be top-worked for improving the product. Despite this great possibility in the development of the pecan, Texas as yet it behind other States in the matter of improved varieties, ranking seventh in that respect. The main objective of the course in pecan culture offered at the A. & M. College is to develop trained men to teach the conversion of native seedlings into the improved variety produced.

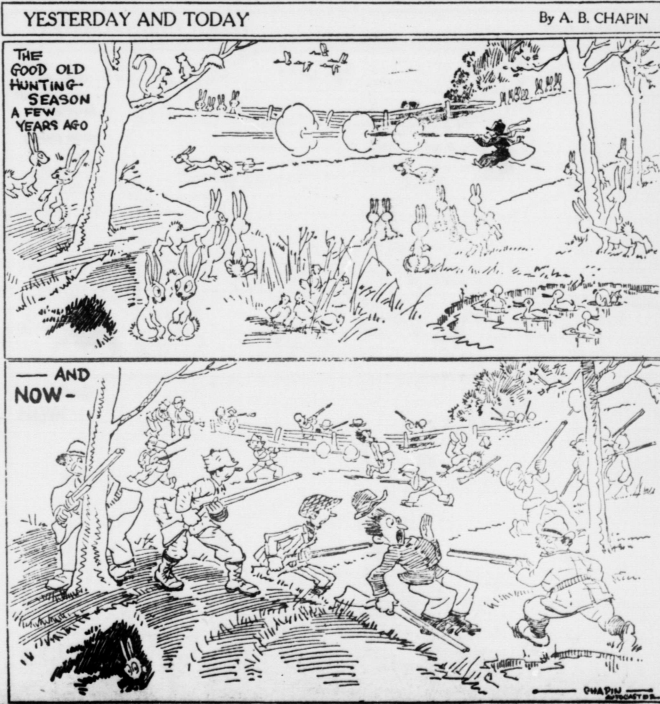
Fred R. Brison, a graduate of A. & M., is now with the horticultural department of the School of Agriculture at the college. For a while he was county agent in San Saba, one of the most extensive pecan growing counties of the State. From there he went to Albany, Georgia, where he became associated with the National Pecan Growers' Exchange. He left that organization to return to college to give instruction in pecan culture.

For several years A. & M. College has been graduating men who have gone from the college to positions as county agents. Many of these took the course in pecan culture and became county agents in the leading pecan growing counties of the State, thus carrying the knowledge acquired here to a practical field of endeavor. These pecan county agents are furthering a movement to organize the producers in other counties and every spring they work over from 10,000 to 30,000 native seedling trees, transforming these from common seedlings to improved varieties.

## L. P. POWELL BUYS SOLID CARLOAD OF WIRE

Mr. L. P. Powell, who recently purchased the James Russell Ranch near Cleo, this week received from Wahl Brothers & Jordan a solid carload of woven wire fencing, to be used on the ranch which he is improving in many ways.

As far as we can learn this is the largest purchase of woven wire fencing in this immediate section in some time.

## TEXAS AND TEXANS.

(By Will H. Mayes.)

### “Turn Texas Loose”

The Southern Pacific Railroad is seeking permission from the Interstate Commerce Commission to extend its line 28 miles to Brownsville, and it is stated that this will be contested strongly by the Missouri Pacific on the ground that the territory is already served by the latter road. In other words, the Missouri Pacific claims that it got there first and therefore the country it traverses belongs to it insofar as railroad transportation is concerned. The interest of the people is of but little concern, the railroads must be protected against each other, according to the policies of our Government. In numerous other sections, especially in the rapidly developing Panhandle of Texas, railroad building is being held back and the development of the country is being retarded because of this idea that the railroads must not be allowed to get into competition with each other in a way that they may lose money. What Texas needs is to have the governmental red tape removed and railroads built, even if the roads should lose money occasionally through competition. Texas is losing more through lack of development than the roads will ever lose through business rivalry.

### Cotton Rushed to Market

Reports are that cotton growers and their mercantile and banking creditors are panicky and are forcing cotton on the market to such an extent that the price is being kept down in spite of all the efforts to retard marketing until the price is again up. There has been delay in getting the holding and crop reduction movements under way, and in the meantime there has been manifested a disposition to sell at whatever the crop will bring. It is unfortunate that many farmers either will not or cannot enter into agreements that will insure systematic marketing and reasonable acreage planting. Unless enough do this there is

little hope that cotton prices will advance as they should. It is to be hoped that every farmer who can will use his utmost efforts to aid in restoring cotton to profitable prices.

### What Irrigation Does

A. R. Strong has a 40-acre farm near Pearsall, which he irrigates from two shallow wells. This year he marketed 930 crates of lettuce from three acres, 1,750 crates of cauliflower from 7 acres, and 531 crates of onions an acre from 16 acres of early Bermuda onions. Besides this he has supplied millions of onion, cabbage, tomato, cauliflower, bell pepper and egg plants to growers and plant dealers in other places, and has an acre and a half in citrus fruits. He works the year round, though, and does not spend his time idling around town. Where there is a well and a will there is a way.

### What a Girl Did on One Acre

Miss Lorrene Kelly lives at Douglas, Nacogdoches County. At the Farmers' Short Course at A. & M. College, she was declared the leader among the girls' club workers in Texas. She is 18 years old and is pretty enough to be a society leader. On one acre of land she grew this year vegetables and fruit from which she put up 300 No. 2 and No. 3 cans of vegetables, five dozen quarts of vegetable and fruits, two dozen half gallon cans of fruits, four dozen pints of relishes, six dozen pints of jellies, and fourteen dozen pints of jam—the equivalent of 3,500 cans of vegetables and fruits. She has also made sixteen dresses and six suits of underwear, and has found time to make curtains, pillow slips, scarfs, and paint the furniture and polish the floors. Miss Kelly furnishes an example of what can be done on a small tract of land if one has a combination of good judgment and energy.

### Flour Mills in North Texas

A 500-barrel flour mill has just been completed at Plainview, in that section of Texas that is producing millions of bushels of wheat. The mill has

an elevator with 225,000 bushels capacity. Texas has a number of flour mills, but not enough to handle the immense wheat crop as it is now growing, and there is no better place for flour mills than in the middle of the wheat fields.

### Turkeys Plentiful and Fat

Turkey raising is becoming a large business in Texas. The crop this year is unusually large, it is stated, and the turkeys are already fat. They will be in fine shape for the market, and will bring much money to those who raise them. Killing and picking them and preparing them for market has become a big industry at many points. The Cameron Commercial Club is offering \$150.00 in prizes to those who market the largest droves in that town. Brady is to have a Turkey Trot, which is a day when thousands of turkeys are driven to market and people from all around gather to see the sight. Cuero originated the Turkey Trot idea in Texas, and the event's made that city famous throughout the country. Turkey and chicken growing has become such an important industry that it is now a felony to steal a turkey or chicken in Texas.

### Some Cotton Crop

Nueces and Hidalgo Counties have each ginned about 90,000 bales of cotton this year, in a section where a few years ago the boll weevil wouldn't let cotton grow. Texas lands all the way from Brownsville to Texline are just too prolific to be planted so largely to cotton unless we wish to make it so cheap that all the paupers of the Eastern Hemisphere can afford to clothe themselves in cotton.

### Utopian Enterprise

The Cisco Chamber of Commerce proposes to drill an oil well on land belonging to the city, from which it hopes to realize enough money to pay all the city taxes in future. It is a great scheme and not altogether visionary, since there are producing wells adjoining the land. If the Cisco Chamber of Commerce succeeds in its undertaking, other Texas towns may soon be following the Cisco example.

### Supply and Demand

The Waco Times-Herald says that boot-leg liquor in that city has advanced from \$1.00 to \$10.00 a gallon, and that by January bootleggers in Waco will be so scarce that the liquor will bring \$15.00 a gallon. In other words, bootleg liquor is scarce and hard to get, and therefore brings a fancy price.

THEY WERE IN A HURRY TO GET HOME

Dallas News: In the midst of a wild scramble to get home four days before the expiration of the fathers that a Legislature, eleven bills were not presented to the president of the Senate and Speaker of the House for signature. Without the signature they were simply waste paper and the veto of the Governor was perhaps a formality. In any case the Governor's favorable action was precluded by the circumstances.

Perhaps it was the thought of the fathers that a Legislature which was to sit but a few days would pass but a few laws and consider them well. But the provision has worked in favor of more laws and less consideration. What with preliminaries and organization details, loafing and absence of individual members, a thirty-day session affords not much more than a dozen days of effective work upon legislation. Under such circumstances, the loss of eleven bills through overlooking official signature is not astounding. The repetition of such cases can be prevented only by the greatest diligence upon the part of members, officers and employees of the two houses.

A GREAT TRUTH SIMPLY STATED

Government never functions as well or as economically, man for man, as private or commercial organization; and for the same old reason—overload of personnel and red tape. There is indeed no such thing as efficient government, measured by commercial standards of efficiency. In private industry, carried on for profit, cost of overload and red tape is prohibitory; business cannot stand it, and it is cut out. To simplify work and concentrate it in the fewest hands is vital to success. But with government, not run for profit, and paid for by taxation increased to cover whatever cost may be—often carefully camouflaged to hide that cost, however excessive—it is well-nigh impossible to check its overgrowth, or to hold its vast and varied activities down to the measure of human managing capacity.—C. N. Fay, in his book, "Too Much Government, Too Much Taxation."

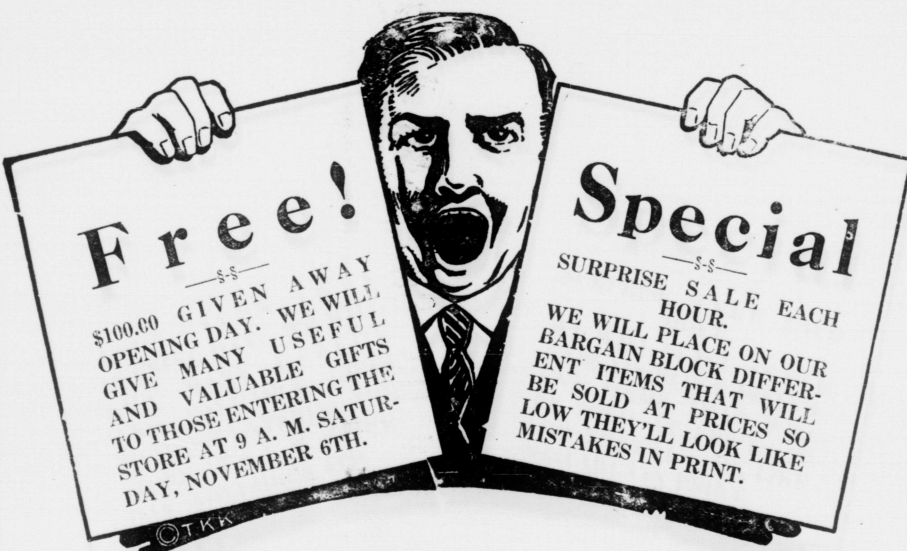

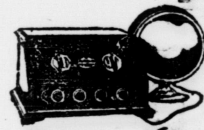

### INSTRUCTION IN RED CROSS FIRST AID SAFETY FACTOR

Its Industrial and Educational  
Service Spreads Throughout  
the United States.

Signs that the United States is awake to the menace of its increasing accident toll are apparent in the growing interest in first aid instruction as offered by experts of the American Red Cross.

Approximately 29,000 Juniors and seniors completed the First Aid course during the fiscal year, passed rigid examinations and received Red Cross First Aid certificates. This represents an increase of 2,500 over the preceding year, and this gain is attributed to the emphasis on health education by various public bodies including not alone the American Red Cross and Government agencies, but life and accident insurance companies, and athletic and recreational groups.

In Dallas, Texas, playground supervisors are required to hold First Aid certificates. In many high schools the subject is included in the regular curriculum. In order to assist in training instructors for this phase of the work, special courses have been conducted in the summer schools of such leading institutions as the University of Maryland and the University of Virginia. Instruction was continued during the year at Loyola University, New Orleans; University of California; San Francisco; University of Kentucky; Temple University, Philadelphia; Peabody Teachers College and similar educational centers.

Work with the public utilities group has shown an exceptional increase during the year. Classes conducted by fourteen of the associated Bell Telephone companies were continued with increased interest and a number of the companies sponsored intensive courses in First Aid for instructors.

The First Aid Instruction Car of the Red Cross was busy throughout the year. In the 125 cities visited by the car 900 meetings were held with an aggregate attendance of 94,000 persons.

Membership of the people in the American Red Cross makes such services possible, the annual opportunity of pledging support through membership being offered in the U. S. C. from November 11 to 25 this year.

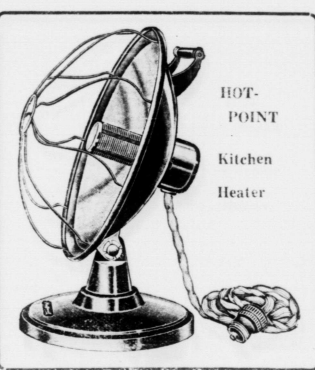

**VETERANS STILL NEED RED CROSS**

Aid to Disabled Men Increases as Problems and Legislation Bring Complications.

20,000 MEN DIE EACH YEAR

Many Entitled to Benefits Still Uninformed of Just Claims to Compensation.

Eight years after the World War finds service to disabled veterans still a major responsibility of the American Red Cross.

This situation is due to the increasing problems involved and the complex character of veteran legislation. There is also an increase in numbers of "death cases" handled, as compared with claims for living veterans, though the work for the latter remains heavy. About 20,000 ex-service men are dying each year, a considerable percentage of these having service-connected disabilities.

In a majority of cases, Red Cross chapters find their assistance is needed in helping dependents present their claims for death compensation, insurance payments, bonus, burial allowances, and other government benefits due them. An episode of the past year illustrates the difficulties frequently encountered by the Red Cross experts in rendering such assistance. A veteran dying from service-connected disease, was trying from his bedside to establish at that late time his claim for Government aid to his family, and the necessary proofs were in a physician's records across the continent from him. To obtain the needed affidavits before it was too late, a cross-continent airplane flight was necessary, then a Red Cross Chapter in Pennsylvania hurried the investigation, sending the papers back to the veteran and his Red Cross helpers in Oregon, by air-mail. It reached there in time.

Another discovery in Red Cross assistance to veterans and their families is that many dependents of those men unquestionably entitled to Government aid, have struggled along, ignorant of their rights.

Approximately 2,689 Red Cross chapters carry on Home Service work, in assistance to veterans and their families. The chapters also conduct campaign among veterans for reinstatement and conversion of their term insurance. Among its other duties, the Red Cross assumed at the Request of the Canadian Government the administration of a fund allotted to the care of Canadian disabled veterans living in the United States.

In the United States the Red Cross assisted an average of about 80,000 disabled veterans and their families every month in the past fiscal year. Indicating the size of this undertaking, National Headquarters of the Red Cross expended \$1,641,178.18 on disabled veterans alone, and \$409,451.72 on assistance to men on active duty with the Army, Navy and Marine Corps, while Red Cross local chapters expended a total of \$1,987,099. Red Cross assistance to service men overshadowed every other phase of its program, even its disaster relief, until the Florida hurricane.

Help for veterans covers many demands, from temporary aid until Government claims are adjusted or until the ex-soldier is properly hospitalized, to extending capital loans to rehabilitated veterans endeavoring to become self-supporting in business. Several such capital loans were to blind veterans.

Contact with veterans in hospitals is maintained by Red Cross personnel which doctors agree influences the veteran's welfare and improvement. The Veterans' Bureau was planned to carry on social work in its hospitals for mental cases, and in many cases the Government and the Red Cross are co-operating for the welfare of the men suffering war disabilities. The public is invited to assist this work by joining the Red Cross during the Annual Roll Call, November 11 to 25.

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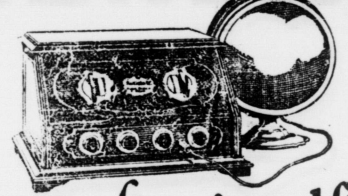

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
