State Capital NEWS

Austin, — Texas has crossed the great divide of controversy and entered the field of general sales taxation. To the central collection point for the operation of the state's business, this means some \$320,000,000 in the next two-year period.

To the individual taxpayer, the cost is unknown, but educated guesses already are being made.

James McGrew, research director for the Texas Research League, has estimated it will cost the average Texas family \$25 to \$30 a year, "maybe less if they don't buy any furniture or home appliances."

With some exceptions, the general sales tax will be two percent on purchases of 25c or more.

Passage of the tax bill and the attending publicity caused many a man—and woman—on the street to suddenly realize that there already was a state sales tax on such things as cosmetics and appliances.

Actually, the sales tax bill was only part of the tax package handed down by the lawmakers. In addition to the \$320,000,000 estimated to come from this source, they passed a corporate franchise tax worth \$20,500,000. They increased drivers' license fees by \$7,250,000. They made a bookkeeping transfer of motor fuel tax funds totaling \$4,000,000. They also taxed dedicated gas reserves \$3,330,000. And they passed a bill designed to bring in some \$3,000,000 from abandoned property.

In addition, the Legislature previously had passed a tax on private clubs, calculated to raise some \$4,000,000.

Roughly, it is figured that all these things will cover the state's needs for the next two-year period, and provide for a school teachers' pay raise of \$810 per year.

ESCHEAT BILL OMITS BANKS — Gov. Price Daniel won a partial victory in his long fight to tighten the state's escheat law. It's the law under which abandoned cash and property held by private business and industry is supposed to revert to the state.

After several attempts the Legislature passed a bill requiring institutions holding such pro-

perty to report it to the state. Banks, however, were exempt from the provisions of the bill, much to the dismay of Governor Daniel.

"With everyone else covered," he said, "the banks cannot hold out much longer. The enforcement procedures should include banks and I shall continue to fight for this, both as a principle and as a means for the state to obtain property it already owns under the present escheat law."

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL SWAMPED — The Texas Legislative Council has been requested by the Legislature to look into a host of things which may require new laws.

One request asks a study of the adequacy of the present cattle brand inspection laws. It was pointed out that Texas, unlike many other western states, has no state-wide brand registration system, relying on county by county registration which permits duplication of brands.

TLC also has been asked to look into the problems of job discrimination because of age; problems of urban mass transportation; and the feasibility of using state parks as evacuation centers in the event of enemy attack.

TEXAS BUSINESS GOOD — Business activity in Texas dropped three per cent in June, from an all-time high in May, reports the UT Bureau of Business Research. But it still was seven per cent above the level of one year ago.

June activity also was the second highest for any month since the bureau began computing in 1935.

Prospects are fine for good business conditions to extend well into 1962. This partially as a result of the expanded arms program, resulting from the Berlin situation. However, the agency said there is a possibility of inflation plaguing the economy again.

STATE GUARD STRENGTH REPORTED — With the possibility of calling up the National Guard for active duty, Adjutant Gen. James E. Taylor has been furnished a report on the active strength of the Texas State Guard—1,504 officers and enlist-

Corps has a total authorized strength of 10,000, when mobilized to full table of organization. All officers and men in this service serve without compensation and provide their own uniforms. The State Guard is subject to being called by the Governor for internal security service.

COLLEGIANS URGED TO STAY WITH IT — Colonel Morris Schwartz, State Director of Selective Service, has advised college students to stay with their studies and not be disturbed by increased draft calls.

He predicted no change in the present policy of not drafting anyone under the age of 22, "at least in the foreseeable future," and said college students will be considered for scholastic deferment and likely will be deferred if they are full-time students making passing grades.

He reported Texas draft boards currently have more than 8,000 college students deferred on the basis of education.

SHORT SNORTS

State Health Department is raising fee for certified copies of birth certificates—important item with school soon to open. Fee after September 1 will be \$1.50 instead of \$1.00. Increase applies only to birth certificates requested from the State Health Department section on records and statistics.

Texas cotton production is expected to be six per cent above last year at 4,600,000 bales, according to Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Harvest is a week ahead of 1960.

Pick Favorites Dist. 15A Crown

At a coaching school held last week in San Antonio, coaches voted Mt. Vernon Tigers as favorites to capture the 1961 crown in District 15-A. All coaches except one picked them to repeat as champions in the balloting at the Texas Coaching School.

Mt. Vernon was selected to win the championship again because of 14 returning lettermen and 13 regulars back from the team which advanced to the state quarterfinals last year.

Talco, probably stronger than last year, was picked second by the coaches. Queen City was predicted to finish third, with James Bowie coming in fourth and Bogata last.

Talco has 14 lettermen, including eight starters, back from the team which finished second last year. Fullback Pete Dixon is the Trojans' leading offensive punch, and they'll also have a strong experienced line up front.

Bogata has only seven lettermen and two regulars back from the team which failed to win in nine attempts last year.

Martin Theatre Operator Dies

Shelton L. Gerhard, 59, co-owner and operator of the Martin Theatre, Mt. Pleasant, died at Baylor Hospital in Dallas last Wednesday following a month's illness. Funeral service and burial were Friday at Mt. Pleasant.

Mr. Gerhard came to Mount Pleasant in 1935 to operate the Martin and old Texan theatres with his brother, the late Roy Gerhard. He is survived by two daughters, both of Mt. Pleasant, a brother, a sister and three grandchildren.

Delay In R. R. Co. Development Aid

A revision of the "overall economic development plan" will delay Red River County's applying for Federal assistance under the area redevelopment act, according to County Judge Gavin Watson.

Originally scheduled to have been filed this week, the application now probably will be filed sometime next week, the judge said.

Revision of the plan came after a meeting of several Clarksville leaders with Ray Morrison of Fort Worth, field coordinator, area development administration, Department of Commerce, and Rip Loftis, Texas A&M rural resource development specialist.

TEACHER PAY RAISE IN THREE NEW LAWS PASSED BY SESSION

Austin, — Texas lawmakers have wound up their second special session after giving Gov. Price Daniel three of the four new laws he requested.

Daniel's box score in the five-day session:

1. An \$810 a year pay raise for public school teachers—passed.

2. A new election law requiring an overall majority in special elections to fill vacancies in the U. S. House of Representatives—passed Monday.

3. Delay in the coming two fiscal years of state contributions to the teachers retirement system—passed late Monday.

4. Legislation requiring an overall majority in special elections for the Legislature—advanced in the House Monday but allowed to die as the session adjourned.

The \$139 million teacher pay raise bill passed Friday night.

The other three bills kept the Legislature moving all day Monday as the House balked at conference committee reports on the congressional election bill and the retirement fund bill. The House rejected conference reports Saturday on both bills.

The Texas teachers' pay raise passed by the Legislature will bring an increase in local school district participation. But the exact amount isn't yet known.

Teachers are due an \$810 annual boost in the base state salary schedule. Part will be paid by the state, part by local districts under the state's foundation program. School districts will be faced with providing their share of the increase for their teachers.

The new state salary schedule under the Hale-Aikin proposal passed by the Legislature, provides for a minimum salary of \$4,014 per year for a beginning teacher with a BA degree. The same teacher would receive a \$108 annual increase for a maximum of \$5,094 in 10 years.

Other portions of the raise include boosts for administrative officials and other incentives.

The exact cost of the raises to local districts won't be known until a complete breakdown is provided from Austin. Each district's state aid and local share of the overall cost is figured in a formula which includes use of the economic index.

Corbell Resigns After 23 Years

W. J. Corbell of Bogata, who has served as constable of Red River County for 23 years, has resigned to accept a position with the Mt. Vernon police force.

In announcing this move Corbell expresses his appreciation to the people of Bogata and Precinct 2 for their many favors and co-operation thru the years.

Mr. and Mrs. Corbell and daughter, Carol, moved to Mt. Vernon last week and the lawman assumed his new duties Tuesday.

Gym Set Falls, Breaks Child's Leg

Mona, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John D. Wright of Talco, was injured Saturday when the gym set in which she was swinging, fell on her. Mona had received the gym set for her fifth birthday, which was Thursday.

It was being assembled, but had not been set in cement and when Mona attempted to swing, the set fell. An iron bar fell on her leg, breaking it in two places. She was resting well Tuesday at her home.

Medical Aid For Aged January 1

Old-age assistance recipients will begin to get the first benefits of the new vendors medical care program Jan. 1, says the Texas Medical Association.

The Texas program is the first phase of the Kerr-Mills Act passed by Congress last summer. State funds for the act will be made available to the State Department of Public Welfare at the rate of \$12 per month per recipient. Federal funds tripling the state appropriations will add to the total.

The program will provide for an in-patient hospital care including medical and surgical services performed by physicians and nursing home benefits, the TMA said.

A Great Year For Chiggers in Texas

Austin. — It's been a great year for the chiggers, State Health Department entomologists say. And for tens of thousands of itchy Texans that's the understatement of the decade.

Texas probably has the nation's longest chigger season, entomologists report. The pernicious little parasites are a year-around menace in the southern part of the state, and elsewhere survive until frost. The season is now at its height.

If you're susceptible to chigger

depressions—and it is almost a sure thing you are—here is the very best thinking of state and national authorities on how to avoid being attacked in the first place, or, failing that, how to ease the itching.

There are several highly effective repellents on the market now. Some of them act against mosquitoes and other insects as well as chiggers. Particularly useful repellents are those containing diethyltoluamide, dimethyl ythylate, dimethyl carbate, ethyl hexanediol and benzyl benzoate.

Since these chemical names are difficult to remember or even to pronounce, clip this article and

take it with you when you purchase your repellent.

Apply the repellent lightly with your fingers to uncovered skin surfaces on arms and legs. Treat sock after you put them on. Run a ring of repellent around the tops of shoes, and treat openings that are buttoned, zippered or otherwise fastened.

On trousers and slacks, treat cuff and waistband; on shirts and blouses, treat armholes and neckbands.

If you go into a chigger-infested place without the protection of a repellent, it is almost certain you will be attacked. If this happens, the experts advise taking a bath as soon as possible.

Alternate lathering and rinsing with a germicidal soap several times.

Next, apply a dab of antiseptic to each welt to kill any chiggers not washed off or killed by the bath. This will also help prevent infection.

Destroying the chiggers will reduce the itching, but will not stop it altogether. The fluid injected by the chiggers to dissolve tissue is the itching agent and there is no known way to remove it or to get permanent relief from the itching. Your physician can recommend a local anesthetic for temporary relief.

Remember, the quicker you get into a soapy bath after ex-

posure the better. If you can make it within an hour after the attack, chances are good most of them will be killed before they can attach.

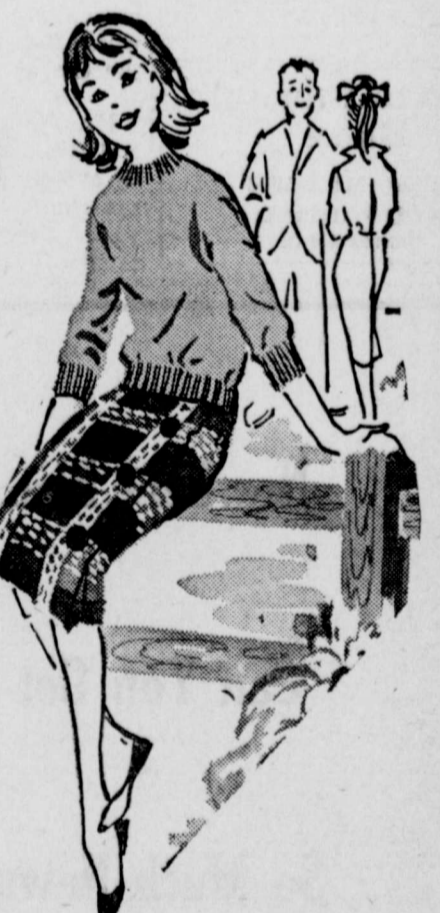
