LOCAL YOUTH BURNED TO DEATH FRIDAY

\$2,000 Will Be Given Farmers Of Area

Money Practically Assured For Farm Prizes For 2 Years

Enthusiasm Is Shown At Meeting Tuesday

Another group meeting among Lamesa's business men was held Tuesday of this week to further the huge farm program which is being undertaken. Much enthusiasm was shown among those present, and according to leaders in the move, the financial success of the program is practically assured as additional business men of the city are joining the movement. Monies for the program are practically assured according to those in charge.

Prizes are to be offered to farmers living in this trade territory and who use Lamesa as their principal trading point, as an inducement to better farming conditions of both the individual, as well as the section as a whole.

Under present plans, \$1,000 will be given away each year for a period of two years, divided into suitable premiums to individual farmers.

Although all plans have not been definitely worked out, the general plan is to encourage farmers to better their own condition and will be based on the improvement of an individual farmer makes, in live stock as well as general living conditions around his home. A set of rules will be worked out and every farmer who desires to enter the contest will be permitted to do so with out any obligation on his part. The rules will be made so that a small farmer will have an equal chance to win as the largest farmer in the territory.

More detailed information will be given at a date in the near future according to officials in charge.

The Lamesa High School Golden Tornadoes were unable to schedule a satisfactory Thanksgiving Day game this season and abandoned the effort on Tuesday of this week. This will be the first time in many years that the locals have not been playing on the holiday.

The boys have played nine games this year and have engaged in numerous hard scrimmages with each other. They wound up the 1938 season with five victories, one tie and three defeats. The victories were over Big Spring, Tahoka, Littlefield, Borger and Bowie high of El Paso. The tie game was with the Pampa High Harvesters. The losses were to Amarillo, Lubbock and Plainview. The first year as a member of Conference A, is regarded as quite successful in the light of experience and the strength of the opposition. The boys have proved that Lamesa high can compete successfully in the conference and is not a "set-up" for some of the most highly rated teams in Texas.

The schedule for next season indicates that not nearly so many miles will have to be traveled by players and fans to reach the sites of games, especially conference games.

Golden Tornadoes 1939 Schedule Is Announced Here By School Officials

San Angelo To Be Here Thanksgiving Next Year

Lamesa high school's football schedule for 1939 was adopted last Monday night at a meeting of school officials in Big Spring. The newly formed district is composed of the high schools in Big Spring, Midland, Odessa, San Angelo, Sweetwater and Lamesa.

Each team will play the other once during the football season, closing on Thanksgiving Day, November 30th, 1939. The schedule for Lamesa is officially adopted as follows: October 13, 1939 Odessa at Lamesa; October 20, Lamesa at Big Spring; October 27, open; November 3, open; November 11, Lamesa

Daw-Tex Oil Company of Denver staked location for a 5,000 foot test ten miles north of Lamesa. It is the No. 1 J. E. Neely and is 600 feet from the north and west line of section 28 survey block 35, township 6 north T. & P.

Actual spudding in the well may be expected within a few days, as the drilling company, the Oil Well Drilling Company of Dallas, who have the contract to drill, will begin moving in this weekend, according to information obtained Wednesday.

S. Lester Guinn, president of the Daw-Tex Company, will have charge of the well and while it is being drilled will make his headquarters at the Plaza hotel in Lamesa. He is reported to have secured \$10,000 dry-hole money from the Pure Oil Company, which owns extensive leases in the area. Completion rotary and cable tool rig will be used to drill the well, cable tools replacing the former when first pipe is set.

The site of this well is just nine miles east of the Albaugh well, discovery pumper and the first oil well in the county.

Mr. Guinn has been a taxpayer in Dawson county for the past nineteen years and owns the farm just west of the drilling site, which he has owned all that time. This is one of the major reasons he had in seeing the test go down.

It is expected that the well will be spudded in the latter part of this week, but inclement weather may cause some delay.

Gasoline Ignites In Car In Which Two Others Are Riding

One Other Seriously Burned In Freak Blaze

Friday afternoon, W. J. Davis, 18, and a companion by the name of Franklin ran out of gasoline about a half mile from the McClaine home near Munger. They walked to the McClaine home where they obtained some gas. An open pitcher was the only container available. A son of Mr. McClaine volunteered to take the youths back to their car.

The jostling of the car caused some of the gas to spill out of the pitcher, and it became ignited, according to reports. When the fire showed through the floor boards, an attempt was made to dash the gasoline out through the window, but in the excitement the entire contents were turned over on young Davis.

He suffered first degree burns from which he succumbed in a local hospital a short time later. It is understood that young Franklin is in a very serious condition at a local hospital as a result of burns received at the same time.

Mr. Davis was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ross Davis. The family had lived in Dawson county about three years.

The body was taken overland to Mt. Vernon for burial by Higginbotham Funeral Home, where burial was made Sunday afternoon.

Besides his parents he is survived by three brothers, Annis of Maquero, N. M., Charles and Homer of Lamesa, one sister, Martha, also of Lamesa, and several aunts and uncles who reside in Mt. Vernon.

Dr. Cox Says:
Prefacing some seasonable advice on common sense ways of avoiding colds, with the remark that it is a mistake to say you "catch" a cold, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, added "As a matter of fact the cold catches you when you are not up to the mark, physically. Therefore:
1. Keep yourself as physically fit as possible. Eat nourishing food. Have your meals at regular times. Avoid rich, indigestible combinations. Include plenty of milk, other dairy products and fruit in your diet. Remember to drink plenty of water—several glasses during the day, every day.
2. Dress according to the weather. Add a sweater to your outfit or a heavy

coat when the frosty days come. Avoid sudden chilling. Don't expose yourself unnecessarily to draughts. Don't sit around in wet clothing. If you are caught in a drenching downpour, change to dry clothing as soon as possible.
3. Take some outdoor exercise every day. Be out in the sunlight as much as possible. If you have a job that keeps you indoors most of the day you will find it pays to spend a few minutes two or three times a day, at an open window, flushing your breathing apparatus with fresh air.
4. Get plenty of sleep. Strike a balance between work and play. Don't fool yourself into thinking you can play around at all hours of the day or night, day after day; snatch a few hours sleep, and be entirely fit, physically, and ready for your profession, your job, or for school, or household duties, when morning comes.
5. Colds are spread by the discharges from the nose and throat. Every time the victim of a cold has a coughing spell, germ-laden droplets of mucus are brought to the surface and spread around. Every sneeze throws germ-laden sprays into the air. Avoid these hazards. Don't mingle unnecessarily with persons who have colds.
6. The careless cougher or sneezer sprays his germs all around the place and leaves them on everything he touches. Don't use a common drinking cup. Have your own towel and wash cloth. Always wash your hands before eating.
7. If you happen to be overtaken by a cold, show as much consideration for your neighbor as you would like him to show to you. Don't be a transmitter. Don't broadcast your germs. Sneezes or coughs into your handkerchief. Use paper handkerchiefs that can be burned or otherwise disposed of. The quickest way to get rid of a cold is to go to bed; eat very lightly and drink plenty of water. At the first indication of fever, send for your doctor, and then follow his advice.

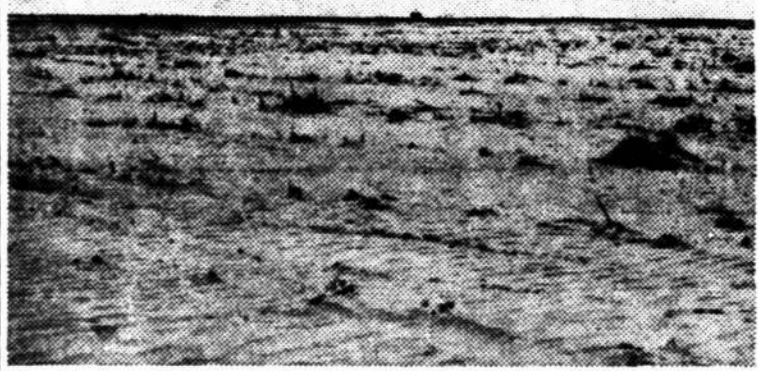

TEXAS AUTO REGISTRATION SHOWS INCREASE IN 1938

Registrations of new automobiles in Texas during September were moderately above the preceding month, but sharply below September last year, according to the Bureau of Business Research of the University of Texas. The gain in total registrations over August resulted from the sharp gains in the intermediate and upper price groups, the lowest price group showing a decline for both comparable periods, the bureau said.

Reports from sixteen representative Texas counties indicate an increase of 8.7 per cent in total registrations during September over the preceding month, but a decline of 40.1 per cent from the like month last year. Aggregate registrations during the first nine months of the year in the sixteen counties were 36.6 per cent below the corresponding period last year.

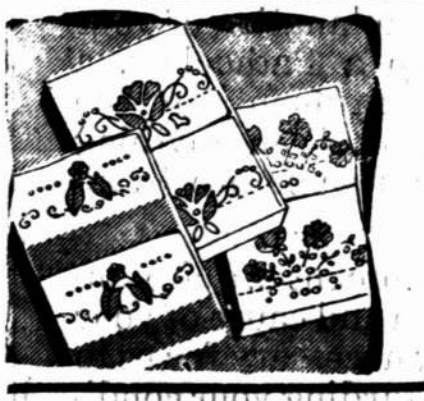

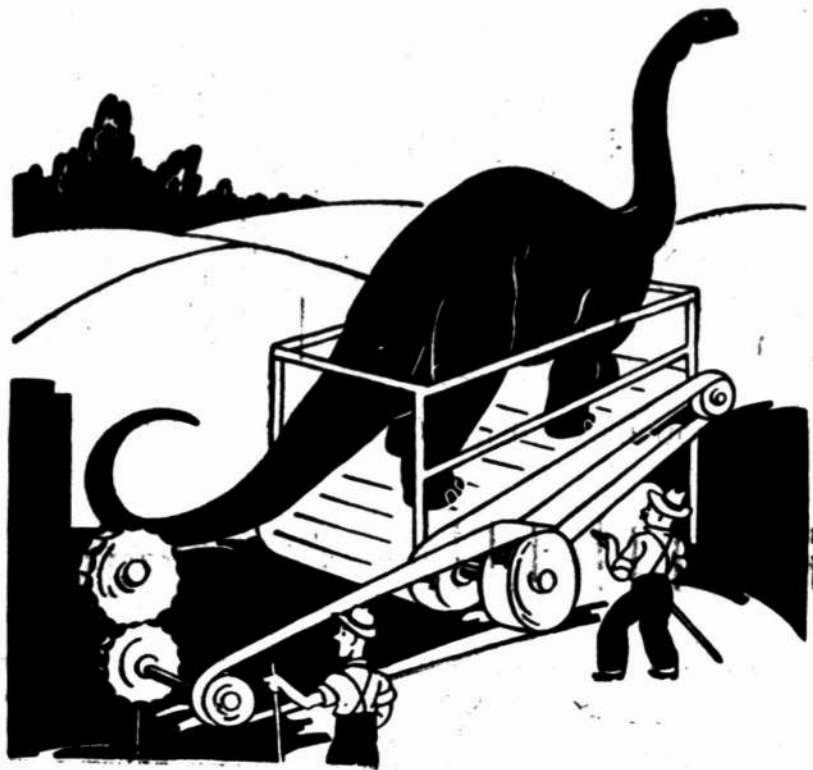

TEXAS BUSINESS IS MUCH IMPROVED THIS YEAR

Very definite proof of improved business conditions in Texas is shown in the monthly report just prepared by the Federal Home Loan Bank of Little Rock, which serves the 120 insured savings and loan associations in the state.

Marked increases are noted in savings funds received from investors and in loans made for home financing by the associations throughout Texas, according to the figures for October. During the past month savings funds totaling \$1,200,000 were placed in the associations, bringing the total received since January 1st to a new record for any similar period of \$12,600,000.

Officers of the bank attributed the large increases to better business conditions generally and to the fact that all funds in the associations are insured against loss up to \$6,000 for each account by the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation.

"It is gratifying to note the steady growth in the savings accounts throughout the state," said B. H. Wooten, president of the Federal Home Loan Bank of Little Rock, "especially when these increases often represent some of the difference between earnings and the cost of living of thousands of Texans who are laying aside in safety part of their surplus funds."

Included in the compilation prepared by the bank are the figures of the Lamesa Federal Savings and Loan Association, which along with other insured associations in Texas, showed substantial gains during the period.

In addition to the increases in savings accounts there was much activity in October by the associations in home financing. 957 loans totaling \$1,788,000 were made during the month, more than half of which was for new construction. The associations are reported to have available ample funds for additional home loans. Because of the liberal terms upon which loans may be obtained, the present activity in new home construction is expected to continue indefinitely as more and more people become aware of the advantages of home ownership under the new home-financing plan.

Stuffing the Bird

The old colonial squire who complained that though "there are divers ways of stuffing the holiday bird, it is an artie with but few" wrote modern sentiments, if not in modern diction. "Divers" applies to tastes as well as stuffings. There are those who advocate "dry" stuffings, and those who want theirs "nice and moist", and those who crave oysters, or sausage, or some other highly flavorful ingredient in their stuffing. All are staunchly uncompromising; all equally ardent upholders of their school of taste.

Yet, despite these "divers" opinions, the Thanksgiving bird can't be stuffed but once—so select we must. The bird may be a turkey or chicken, guinea hen, duck, goose, or capon. Sometimes it even turns out to be crown roast of lamb or a boned ham. But stuffing is a part of the unwritten Thanksgiving tradition.

And although no two birds may be stuffed by exactly the same recipe, all poultry and meat stuffings are built on the same general pattern. First, there is a starchy base. Usually it is bread crumbs of various kinds—white, brown, or corn bread. Flaky, boiled rice, and well-seasoned mashed potatoes are also popular with many.

Second, melted butter, or some other good-flavor fat, is added for richness.

Then comes the seasoning, with its 101 possibilities. To the venturesome cook, stuffing seasonings furnish one of the year's most promising opportunities. Her selection lies first among the many herbs, then seasoning vegetables, and other interesting additions—mushrooms, dried apricots, prunes or raisins, or candied cranberries, sausage

diced salt pork, and tart apple cubes—to mention but a few.

For the perfect bread stuffing, first look to the quality of the bread crumbs. Use bread two or three days old. Cut each loaf in two and fork out the inside, leaving the crusts. Crusts may be handy for other dishes later, but their hard, brown lumps ruin the texture of stuffing.

After forking on the pieces of bread, continue to pick the larger ones apart with the tips of the fingers, until all crumbs are fine an even in size. Fineness is less important for a moist than for a dry stuffing, but it always makes for a complete blend of flavors.

Specialists of the Bureau of Home Economics offer this rule on how many crumbs to allow for birds of different size:

"For every pound of a bird that weighs less than 10 pounds use a cup of bread crumbs, minus one. For a bird weighing 10 pounds or more, use a cup of crumbs, per pound of bird, minus two."

Count the weight of the bird as you buy it in the market, dressed, that is plucked, but not drawn, and with the head and feet attached. Thus a 4-pound bird, whether chicken, duck or guinea hen, you will need 3 cups of crumbs. For a 5-pound bird, allow 4 cups. And for a 12-pound turkey or goose, 10 cups of bread crumbs should be enough. Usually a one-pound loaf of bread makes about one quart of medium-dry bread crumbs.

Among the seasoning possibilities, herbs alone offer a wide choice. Some of our grandmothers favorites are back in fashion now with the revival of the kitchen herb garden—summer savory, thyme, sweet marjoram. Mixed herbs, such as savory and poultry seasoning, are probably safest for the hostess who is not well acquainted with her guests' tastes. Sage still holds prominence, but is most effective in small quantities.

Celery seed is also excellent when used with caution.

Seasoning vegetables—celery, parsley and onion—have a better flavor if chopped fine and fried in fat for a few moments. Try out some of the fat from the bird, if there is any to spare. Or sometimes enough fat comes in the bits of crisp salt pork, bacon, or sausage added to the stuffing.

And if possible, fry the seasoning, vegetables, in a skillet or pan large enough to hold bread crumbs and all. Then the stuffing can go into the bird piping hot. Putting the stuffing hot into the bird, speeds up the roasting and improves flavor.

But if your time plan calls for stuffing the turkey on the day before the big feast keep the stuffing cool, and the bird well chilled. If held over night the turkey will absorb some of the flavor of the stuffing, sometimes a decided disadvantage.

If you want something just a little different for the 1938 Thanksgiving stuffing, add mushrooms to the bread crumbs base. For mushroom stuffing, with a delightful flavor, allow a pound of mushrooms to every quart of crumbs. To get full benefit of the mushroom flavor, fry them in butter for 5 or 10 minutes, before adding them to the crumbs. A generous quantity of chopped celery and parsley are good with mushrooms, but it's better to reduce onion, herb, and other potent seasonings to a minimum, as they mask the mushroom flavor.

Nuts, in large or small quantity also do much to improve a plain bread stuffing. For a true nut stuffing a good proportion is about one third as many chopped nuts as bread crumbs.

For the popular chestnut stuffing, the easiest way to remove the shells and brown skins is to boil the nuts for about 15 minutes. Then keep them very hot, while you cut off the outside layers with a sharp knife.

Blanched filberts, or blanched, sliced

almonds or Brazil nuts give a pleasing bit of crispness. Pecans are very rich, and are best broken in pieces. Peanuts, pine nuts, and walnuts are also good. Stir the nuts into the crumbs mixture, just before stuffing the bird.

Apple stuffing, popular with those who have a slightly sweet tooth, is especially good with duck or stuffed spare ribs of pork. The stuffing will have more apple flavor and be less compact if the apples are candied before they are added to the mixture. To do this select very firm, tart apples, and after they are pared and cubed, sprinkle with sugar and cook slowly in fat in an uncovered skillet until the juice evaporates.

Good proportions to every cup of bread crumbs are 5 or 6 tart apples, 1-2 cup of sugar, 1-2 cup of celery, a little chopped onion and parsley and if desired, diced salt pork fried until crisp.

And here is a rice and apricot stuffing especially delicious in roast duck. For a 5-pound duck use about 3 cups of flaky, cooked rice; 1-4 pound of dried apricots; 3 tablespoons of butter; one cup of chopped celery and tops; one small onion and a spring or two of parsley, chopped; and 1-2 teaspoon of savory seasoning. The rice is sure to go on swelling inside the duck, even if you let it expand over hot water after cooking. So leave plenty of room. For the apricots, simply wash and dry them first, then snip them into strips with the scissors and mix them in with the rice and seasonings.

And here are some last minute warnings. Taste the stuffing again to check the salt and pepper. And whatever else you do don't pack the stuffing into the bird.

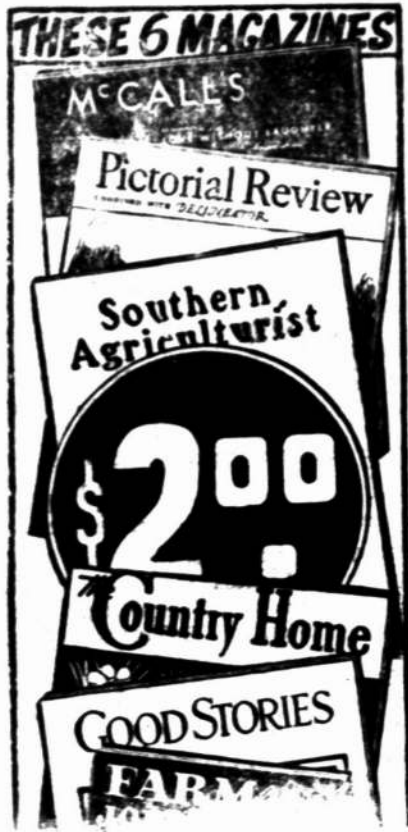
