Name Floydada Man Head of District of 14 Counties

K. A. Osburn of Floydada has been named district supervisor of this district for the old age pension act, which is to begin operations February 14.

Headquarters for this district, which is number 17 and is composed of Hall, Bailey, Briscoe, Castro, Cochran, Crosby, Dickens, Floyd, Hale, Hockley, Lamb, Lubbock, Farmer and Swisher counties, have not been set.

Old-age assistance forms will be available in Memphis by February 14, according to information from Austin, where the Old-Age Assistance Commission is completing set-ups for administration of Texas' old age pension act.

The law passed by the state legislature provides for granting assistance to persons over 65 years of age. The only information re-

Warns WPA Men Against Shirking

Threaten Dismissal For Workers Who Loaf on the Job

Suspension or even dismissal is promised by Harry L. Hopkins for WPA workers who loaf on the job, and bosses who allow them to do it, local WPA officials stated yesterday.

The administration said that a small proportion of workers have been shirking and hampering efficient operation of projects. He added that the warning was aimed not at any general condition but at the few workers "who haven't shown the right attitude."

The same penalties, he said, will apply to the regular workers and the foremen and supervisors.

NO TAXES FOR RAISING BONUS FUNDS REPORT

Farm Tax Program is Discussed Before Actual Drafting

WASHINGTON, Feb. 5.—Actual drafting of a tax program to finance the new farm measure was scheduled by the President, as he pressed forward with a series of major financial conferences.

One leading Democrat said today that definite word had reached the House ways and means committee that the administration had no plans to ask for new taxes to finance the bonus payments, but that the President had summoned advisers to go over the farm tax program.

Tomorrow the President is due to check the possibilities of canceling over a billion dollars of spending, just as yesterday he arranged to cancel over a billion dollars in authorized government credits.

GRIEF BUT NOT DISASTER

It is a little hard to look at the most enormous peace-time deficit in America's history and find reason therein for slapping one's self on the back. Nevertheless, the trick can be done—and in this day of worry and uncertainty it is worth doing.

First, consider the circumstances. The treasury today is substantially more than \$30,000,000,000 in the red, with the bonus bill and the return of the processing taxes adding another three billion, with a new relief bill of a billion in the offing.

All in all, it seems certain that our debt will run beyond thirty-five billion before the year is out. No one knows when it will stop going up, and nobody seems to know from where the money needed to pay for it is coming.

But America, after all, remains a democracy; and it is worth recalling that a democracy is the one and only kind of government that can suffer a strain such as this colossal debt involves without being forced to find a cure worse than the disease.

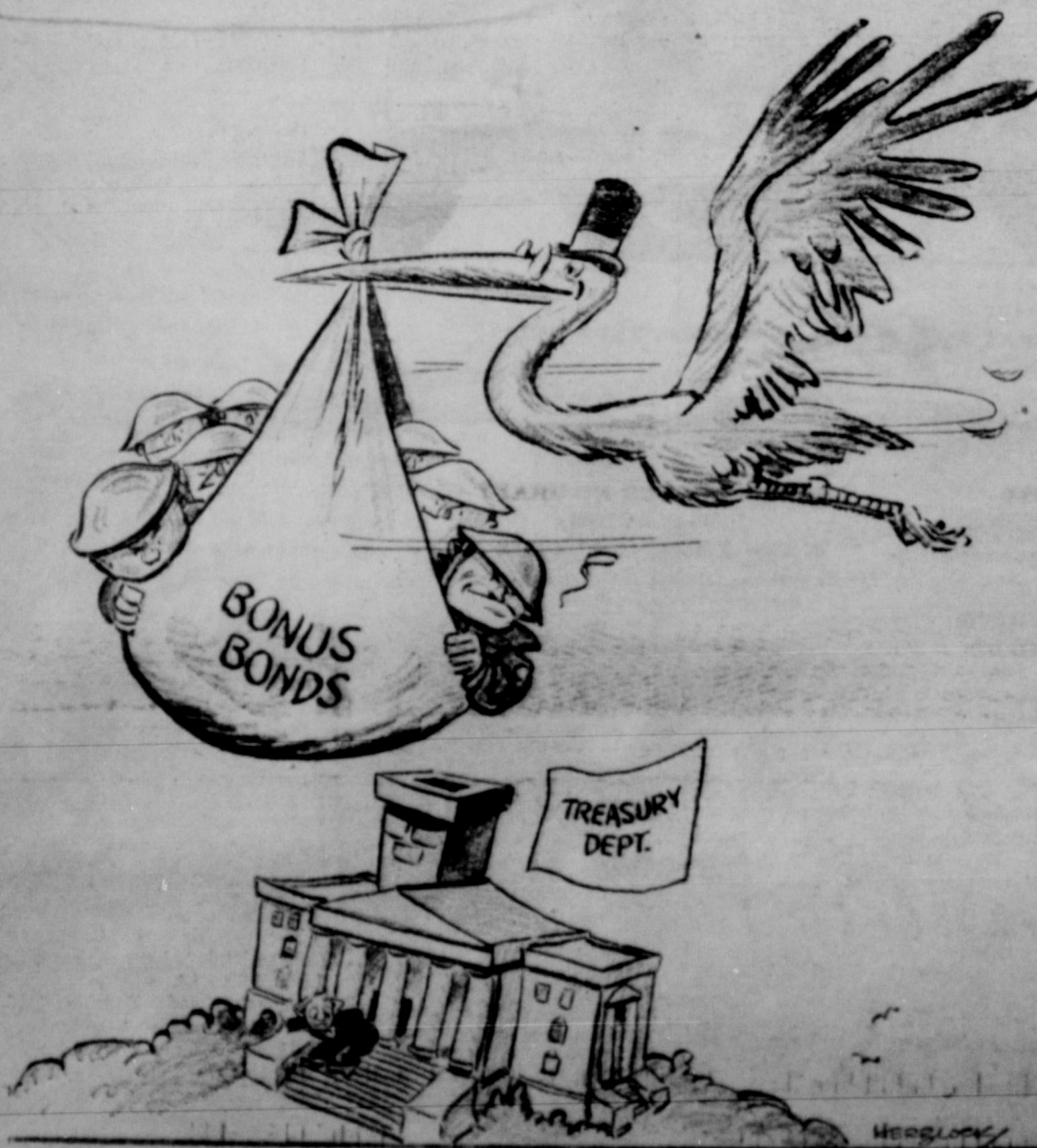
A dictatorship is invariably warlike, because dictators have to be warlike to take their constituents' minds off their domestic troubles, in order to keep their jobs.

A dictator takes office because his country is in a supreme mess. He has to promise everything to get the job, and, being human, he usually fails to do the many things he promised. Sooner or later he is right up against it, and has to pick a fight abroad to take his people's mind off his broken promises. If the war goes well, the dictator has a new lease on life.

And that brings us back to our original point. Living under a democracy, we at least know that our tremendous debt won't do that to us. It may bring us plenty of grief, but it won't shove us off the cliff into complete disaster.

Our soldiers won't have to go overseas to fight to save some all-wise duce or fuhrer from the necessity of admitting that he made a mistake.

Behind the Scenes in Washington

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WASHINGTON—The American Liberty League raised and spent more money last year than did the Republican party and almost as much as the Democratic party.

In many respects the league is a political party. You begin to sense that when you go into the National Press Club building here in Washington and you see President Jouett Shouse's name on the door of Room 1066—which, with a couple of dozen contiguous office rooms, is league headquarters.

Until June, 1932, that space housed the Democratic National Committee and Shouse, who still has his same old desk, was in charge. His secretary of those days, Miss Garey, still guards the Shouse door.

Propaganda is the league's chief mission and from the same old offices Shouse directs a constant fire at the New Deal in somewhat the same manner that he and Charlie Michelson once plastered President Hoover.

THE league's financial support comes in the same way as that of political parties, but it seems to come easier. The organization received \$483,000 in contributions and loans in 1935 and spent \$390,000. There's no fund-raising staff and no need of \$50-a-plate Jackson Day dinners.

There are no dues and membership is free unless you elect to join up as a "contributing member," yet the organization's mailing list—nothing to sneeze at—contains few more than 100,000 names.

The fact is that the league hasn't had any membership drive, because it figures it's much more important to get its ideas across. And 9000 applications—with checks—poured in for the 2000-seat dinner, with Al Smith's speech as its main attraction.

THE league has issued 95 separate pamphlets—attacks on most

important phases of the New Deal anti-New Deal speeches by Shouse and many others, adverse constitutional analyses of New Deal proposals by its lawyers' committee, and so on.

The league estimates that it has sent out about 3,500,000 pamphlets since it began to operate in 1934 and of course there have been many public statements, radio and other speeches, and other uses of the propaganda technique.

The league has members in all states and organizations in all—most of which have offices for publicity and other purposes.

The organization hasn't lobbied yet except through "propaganda pressure"—which may have helped in modification of the 1935 banking act, slight modification of holding company legislation, and suppression to date of the 30-hour wage bill.

THE league resents charges that it is the instrument of "vested interests" or "entrenched greed" since it campaigns for "government by law rather than men" preservation of the present constitutional form of government, curb on presidential power and the congressional delegation of such power.

It has received many letters from farmers, storekeepers, and other small business men and like to point out that \$35,000 of a 1935 money came in dribbles of less than \$100. Nevertheless, the league is controlled by representatives of a tremendous aggregation of wealth—once estimated as at least \$37,000,000,000 in industrial and financial assets.

Political plans for 1936 are so unmade. Apparently the league people aren't seriously considering promotion of a conservative party. But their motto seems to be "let's see something else" and "body but Roosevelt."

Bob Alexander for Re-election

The Democrat is authorized to announce Hon. Bob Alexander, Childress, as a candidate for re-election as representative to the State Legislature from the first district, subject to the action of the democratic primary in July. Mr. Alexander, now serving his second term in the House, is well known to the people of the district, and he needs no introduction to possible newcomers. He has been a resident of Childress County for the past 35 years, with the exception of time

spent in the army overseas during the World War.

Bob is one of only 12 actual farmers who are members of the House, and has a personal knowledge of the problems and necessities which confront farming districts such as this.

His devotion to his duties in the legislature is well illustrated by the fact that during his two terms, he has never been absent from the legislature a single day except while on committee assignments or excused on account of illness.

During all three sessions of the legislature since his election he has been a member of some of the most important committees of the house, including the Revenue and Taxation, the Agricultural, the Constitutional Amendment and the Committee on Livestock and Stock Raising.

He is the author of the farm truck license bill, passed by the 43rd legislature, providing for a reduction in license rates on this class of vehicles. He was likewise the author of two bills tending to the prevention of income tax evasions. Since the passage of this second bill, the income from gasoline taxes has increased almost four million dollars a year. The present gasoline tax measures of the state are regarded as among the best in the nation, being more easily enforced than the average measure of this nature.

Mr. Alexander is the author of the Constitutional Amendment to be voted on in the November election, revising the pardon set-up in Texas, by creating a pardon board. This amendment, if carried, will take away from the Governor the responsibility which no good man desires, and which no bad one should be entrusted with. We commend the candidacy of Mr. Alexander to the careful consideration of the voters of the district, on the basis of his past record as our representative when our people go to the polls in the July primary.

Moss Announces For Judgeship

By this announcement, I desire to submit my candidacy for the nomination to the office of District Judge for the 100th Judicial District of Texas, subject to the Democratic Primary to be held in July of this year, in placing my candidacy before the citizenship of this district, I do so with a full appreciation of the responsibilities connected with this important office.

It is through this court that the greater part of the civil rights of the citizenship must be adjudicated, and a redress for their wrongs established. It is here that the most important part of our criminal laws are to be enforced. This being true, I feel it necessary and required of me, at this time, to submit the matters touching on my qualifications for the office, and my attitude in connection with the carrying out of the purpose for which this court was established.

I have been a member of the Texas Bar for thirty years and have been actively engaged in the practice of law for this period of time and during the last twenty-four years I have resided in this District at Memphis, Hall County, Texas, where the principal part of my service in the practice of law has been rendered. This being true and a goodly number of the citizenship of this District having had observation and contact with such service, I deem it of no value to give further reference.

If it should be the will of the citizenship of this District to show me the favor of electing me to this office, I promise every effort will be made to carry out the purpose for which the District Court was established. Having in mind at all times that it is the duty of a District Judge in acting on matters that come before him as such, to have the law uppermost in his mind as his rule and guide; and do this free from bias or prejudice, uninfluenced by any other motives than to make every honest effort to apply the law to the end that all men may find themselves equal before the law as intended.

I am a firm believer in the enforcement of all of our criminal laws. A lack of enforcement of some of such laws, regardless of the magnitude of the offense condemned by the law, has the tendency to bring about a disregard for other laws. There are abundant reasons why our laws should be enforced for the protection of the social as well as the material welfare of the State, and one last reason that I should add and that is, they should be obeyed because it is the Law.

I fully understand that the Dis-

trict Judge is not an executive officer, but a judicial one. That it is his duty to judge law and not to execute it. That duty is on others. However, there are powers vested in the District Court, when properly used, that can greatly assist the executive officers in bringing about a more full, fair and complete enforcement of the law. These powers I will always stand ready to use, when necessary, and in doing so will recognize that the law was made for its observance as much for the officers selected to administer the law, as it was made for its observance by the masses; and that it should be observed by such officers in the enforcement thereof.

Second only to the duty of the District Judge to do all that is in his power to so administer the affairs of the Court to see that a fair and impartial trial is had of the cases filed and submitted to said court, is the one of economy. Every effort should be made to promptly dispose of the cases pending, avoiding unnecessary delays, which are costly; and in every way possible take such action in the interest of economy in the administration of the duties of the Court as should be found proper. This I shall do, if intrusted with the office.

Before the Primary in July, I

shall make an active campaign and will make every effort to see personally as many of the voters of the District as it will be possible for me to do. However, in the meantime I will be pleased that a careful consideration on the part of the citizenship be given my candidacy and that after making such investigation, as may be desired on the part of the voters, I would greatly appreciate your support.

The association adopted a resolution pledging the 20,000 members to urge their customers to read the newspapers in order that co-operative advertisements would be more widely read.

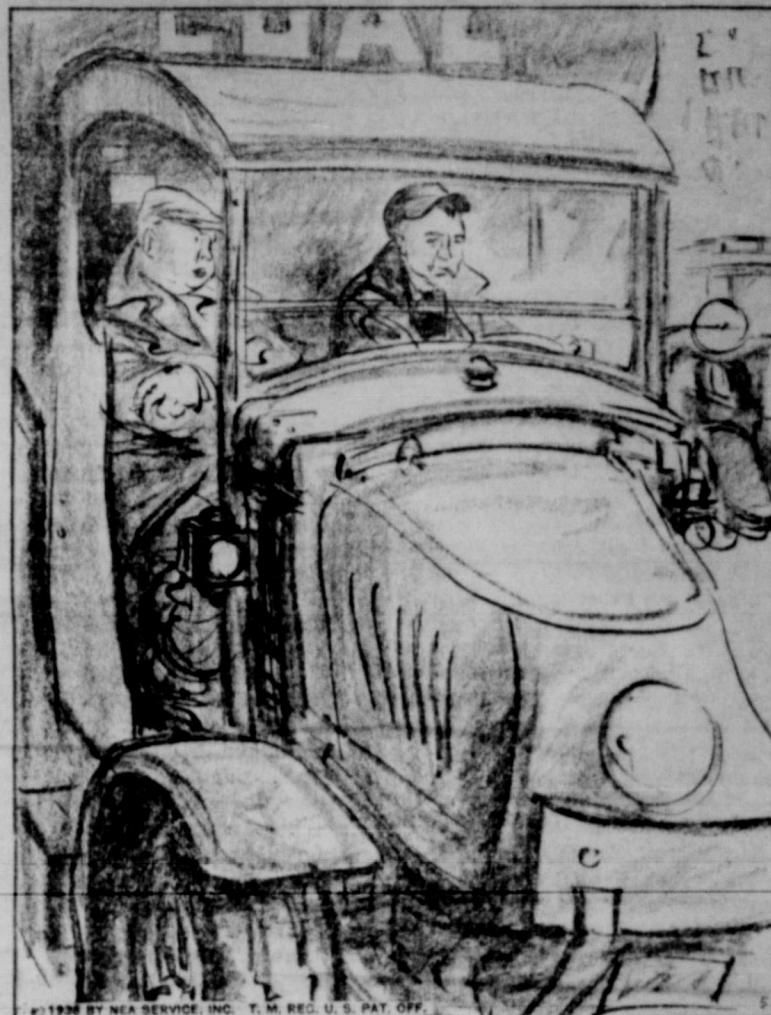
