32nd Post Stampede to blast off next Thursday

Three nights of rodeoing on tap

With Mayor Giles C. McCrary and the city council having designated the week of Aug. 14-19 as "Western Week" in Post, and the rodeo business office scheduled to open at 8 a.m. Monday, Aug. 28, according to school administrators.

While Aug. 28 will be the first day of school for the students, the administrators and teachers will begin their work a week earlier when they report Monday, Aug. 21, for a week of in-service training and workshops.

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City to buy tools for Green Thumbs

Thanks to the City of Post, the Green Thumb crews will soon have a wheelbarrow and hoes and rakes with which to work.

The council voted at its August meeting Monday night to purchase the wheelbarrow and tools and make them available to the Green Thumb crews.

On numerous occasions, the Green Thumbs have found it necessary to borrow tools from the city warehouse, and the council decided it would simplify matters to buy them the equipment they need.

A special county calf roping contest, open only to Garza County residents, is also on the schedule, according to J. L. Hedrick, Post Stampede president. Ropers wishing to enter this event are asked to telephone Hedrick at 2363.

The wild mare race, scheduled for each night's show, will be another added attraction.

There will be a rodeo dance each night on a greatly enlarged dance slab at the arena, with Fernie Reed and the Westernaires furnishing the music.

The traditional street parade at 5:30 p.m. Thursday will officially open the rodeo activities. Floats will be competing for \$200 in cash

prizes being given by the Post Chamber of Commerce. Out-of-town sheriff's posses and other riding groups will compete for first, second and third place trophies.

Many merchants are helping the town decorate for "Western Week" by renting rodeo flags from the Post Lions Club. The flags have already started going up on store fronts here.

New kind of 'steeds' to give parade 'zip'

There will be "a new breed of steed" in the Post Stampede Rodeo parade late next Thursday afternoon.

Chamber directors at their August meeting yesterday noon in the Drover House Restaurant decided to invite motorcyclists to participate in the traditional horse event.

To keep the motif western, all motorcycle riders are asked to turn up in western garb.

There will be other innovations too. All the oldsters with three-wheel "bicycles" are invited to join the line of march and pump around the downtown course.

Wyvonne Kennedy, Chamber secretary, reported five riding groups have accepted invitations to participate in the parade to date.

Only three floats had "definitely been entered" in the float division of the parade up to yesterday noon but Chamber sponsors were trying to round up another half dozen.

With \$200 in prizes, including a \$100 first prize the prize money is expected to be some incentive for clubs looking for means to raise money for project activities for the rapidly approaching new club year to enter floats.

Other cash prizes will be \$50, \$30 and \$20.

Music too also is being sought for the parade and Co-Chairmen Joe McCowan and Curtis Hudman are open to all suggestions on this "score."

The Chamber office would like to hear in advance on float and various other parade entries.

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In 1968, dry land cotton in Garza County averaged around one and one-half bales to the acre.

Herron said the cotton has overcome early diseases and any insect problems it has had.

He added that all the moisture — 12.78 inches to date officially in Post and varying above and below that figure around the county — has made it necessary for farmers to "get their cotton out of the weeds" but Herron added that the farmers are doing a good job of that.

Only adverse effects in the grow-

ing season to date has been some small patches of spring hail damage and the fact that some cotton stands are not as thick as farmers would like.

Post officially received 1.49 inches of moisture last Thursday evening and Friday morning — .58 being recorded on Thursday and .91 of an inch Friday.

Amounts around the county varied, mostly from an inch on up, with only the Grassland area reporting from .30 to half an inch.

August has yet to produce a 100-degree temperature high here either, with the last "century day" being July 31 when the thermometer topped at exactly that figure.

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Jailbreak emphasizes need for new lock-up

Terry Wayne Travis, the 26-year-old Missourian who is awaiting grand jury action on charges growing out of an early morning crime spree here recently, spotlighted Garza County's need for a new jail last Friday.

He broke jail but was recaptured within a matter of hours, thanks to an alert local citizen who saw him trying to "hitch" a ride northwest of Post on US-84.

He offered no resistance when Sheriff J. A. (Jimmy) Holliman raced out with another officer to put him back in custody.

All he got for his troubles was a third charge and an indefinite stay in the Lubbock County Jail where the "disappearing act" is much harder to come by.

Travis squeezed his small frame through an old six-inch by 12-inch hole in the steel plating above the "run around" in the second-floor

county jail sometime Thursday night or early Friday.

From there he got out onto the roof and used the fire escape to descend to the ground and make his get-away.

Sheriff Holliman discovered the "break" when he personally took Travis' breakfast up to the jail at 8 a.m. Friday.

The only other prisoner in the jail, being held on a DWI charge, informed the sheriff that Travis had gotten away.

An employee for Starkey Electric driving on US-84 noticed Travis trying to thumb a ride at a point about a mile and a half north of the FM-211 intersection on US-84 early in the afternoon.

He radioed the information back and the sheriff was called.

Now Travis has a felony charge of "attempted jail breaking" added to the others in his local file.

QUESTIONS BRING ANSWERS

School costs: now they can be told

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Following is the first in a series of articles about program development in the Post Public Schools. Written by Supt. Bill Shiver, the articles will be divided into three major categories: (1) Background data that provoked the need for changes; (2) Evaluation of the school program; and (3) the program change in the Post schools—the teaching-learning process.)

BACKGROUND INFORMATION
By Supt. William F. Shiver

Although the Post Independent School District is not considered a business in the sense of making a monetary profit, it is a business enterprise. Public school money must be accounted for according to how it was intended to be spent. We shall refer to this as Educational Accountability.

For about the past eight years, the board of trustees of our school system has been asking questions with increased frequency about the costs of particular programs. Since the majority of them hail from the self-employed business community, it is not surprising that such questions have been asked. Independent studies were made and presented

to the board, but such data was often over-simplified, because the questions that were in back of the minds of the board were not answered: "Who is accountable to whom and for what?"

The inquisitiveness of the board might have represented a local reaction to a rash of criticism of education throughout the United States by interested patrons who

The councilmen, agreeing that the campaign, which has been under way about three weeks, should have pretty well "cleaned out" the strays for awhile, decided to "call off" the bounty, effective Monday.

'Howdy Stop' may be made here by Texas Air Tour

The new city-county airport will be a "howdy stop" on the 24th annual All Texas Air Tour this fall.

At least the Post Chamber of Commerce directors are accepting the responsibilities for making Post a tour stop and Director Earl Chapman is getting in touch with the Air Tour planners so that the "howdy stop" here will definitely be on the tour.

Approximately 50 planes with some 125 persons aboard, many of them out-of-state business men, bankers and ranchers, are expected for the week-long tour, Oct. 7-14.

The tour will start in Temple and end in Kerrville and will include some 32 airport stops and 3,100 flight miles.

Post has been assigned a 1:30 p.m. stop on Wednesday, Oct. 11, if local acceptance finalizes it into tour plans.

Chamber directors gave it the "go ahead" at the August luncheon board meeting yesterday.

A "howdy stop" means about a 30 to 45 minute set down for the air tourists. Light refreshments, gassing of planes, etc., even some entertainment can be scheduled.

The air tour was created 24 years ago to promote interest in aviation and Texas airports on both a state and local level.

E. M. Anderson Jr., of Medina, Tex., is president of the Texas Air Tour, and extended an invitation to Post to be a part of the 1972 event.

Most of the items on the agenda at the regular August meeting of the city council Monday night were of the type on which no action could be taken pending further work on the city budget for the new fiscal year.

"A called meeting of the council will be held sometime next week to tentatively approve the budget, set the tax rate and set a budget hearing date," Mayor Giles C. McCrary said.

No definite date was set for the special meeting, but the councilmen were told they will be notified of the meeting as soon as the day

The council postponed action on the youth recreation committee's request for \$3,035 with which to operate next summer's youth recreation program pending further work on the budget, and also pending a meeting of the mayor and Pele Maddox, superintendent of public works, with the county commissioners to ask that the county share the costs of the 1973 program.

The council was told by James Kennedy, a member of the youth recreation program, that this sum-

Everything seems to be working out

At long last the way apparently is clear for Garza County to get its long-needed new jail.

Grand juries have complained about its miserable condition since we purchased The Dispatch and moved to Post over 15 years ago. On the other side of the coin, the sheriffs have had a constant battle to keep prisoners in the jail. It's been too easy to break out of — witness the "break" last Friday morning as the latest in a long string.

Building a jail to provide essential welfare for prisoners and essential safe keeping for the sheriff's peace of mind is not something which catches the public's imagination.

A lot of crusades have been conducted in the interest of the downtrodden, but seldom one anywhere to build a better jail.

This is not a situation which has existed just in Post. It is a current problem all across Texas in big cities and small towns alike.

Garza County is indeed fortunate to get a 50 per cent federal grant to build its new jail and badly needed law enforcement offices. We are to be "an experiment" in trying to get city and county law arms united into one working unit. City officials will tell you for all practical purposes we have already achieved our goal. But it is far from a clean-cut consolidation. Due to public "law and order demands" — the group who seems to want the city dads to maintain control and probably some of the city dads themselves — this unofficial cooperative status of the city and county law arms probably will successfully continue until some "personality clash" down the line develops among the law personnel involved.

Other cities and towns in Texas are

soon going to be forced to "face up" to their lack of proper jail facilities. The Texas Civil Liberties Union moved last week to go into court and force compliance.

County Judge Giles W. Dalby and the county commissioners who have worked so hard to obtain federal money for these needed facilities deserve the public's appreciation for their efforts. It hasn't been an easy assignment. The buck went flying off in innumerable directions at times, but they stayed with it and worked it out and then stuck to their guns and went the "tax warrant" route to get the county financing through in time.

The city, tough steerin' away from a "full union" of the two law arms, has gone far enough down the line to satisfy federal requirements for a building grant and to get law officers working together for the first time in over a decade. So they deserve commendation too for their effort in bringing this law complex project off.

The Dispatch has always been a strong advocate of the "integrated" law arm of the city and county officers as both a "money saver" and "efficiency producer."

An alliance has been forged and the two law units are working together and out of the same office. That's a good start — and in a few years both public and official objections to a full union will gradually fade away as the new system proves itself.

Right now, The Dispatch is proud of the way city and county law officers work together and get along. In other times — and with other lawmen — this would not have been possible.

So everything seems to be working out. —JC

Postex Hall plant's anniversary

The Dispatch this week congratulates the Postex Hall Plant in Memphis, Tex., on its tenth anniversary. It's a "special week" for Tom Drake, overseer, and the 125 other employees of the plant, although we understand no special observance is being held.

The Postex Hall Plant was established first as a "pilot" plant on Noel Street in Memphis, and later in a new building constructed on an industrial site in northwest Memphis.

There have been five plant overseers, the first being J. P. Parnell, who went to Memphis from Post to guide the plant in its early days. Parnell has been followed by Fred Byerly, Kent Magness, James Brown, and now Tom Drake.

For three women still employed at the sewing plant, the tenth anniversary is indeed a special one, for they will be three of 11 employees who will receive 10-year service pins. These three — Mary Diggs, Della Linville and Eunice Spruill — were among the

very first women to be hired to try out for employment in the "pilot" plant when Postex was just first considering the construction of a sewing plant in Memphis. That was in the summer of 1962.

During Postex Hall Plant's ten years of operation, a number of Post families have moved there with one or more members going to work in the sewing plant. This has brought on a closer relationship between the towns of Post and Memphis.

Vic Slater, general manager of Burlington's Postex Plant in Post and also of the Memphis plant, said, "We are real proud of our operation in Memphis. We feel we have excellent community relations."

The general manager also said that in the Burlington Division there are two satellite sewing plants, and he feels that the Memphis plant is the best.

So, The Dispatch joins our own Postex Plant in congratulating the Postex Hall Plant in Memphis, over 100 miles "up the road," on its ten years of successful operation. —CD

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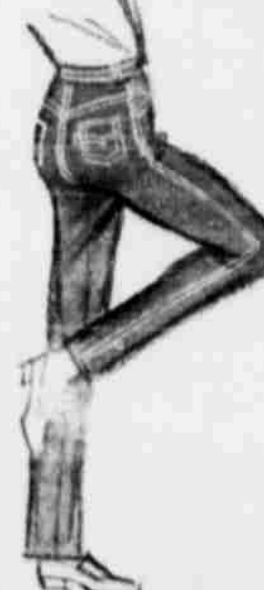

THE INFORMED CONSUMER

By Crawford C. Martin Attorney General of Texas

BUDGETING

"We can't live on a budget!" Or is it that you don't want to? How else can you find out where your money goes — or where it's taking you? A smart consumer not only spends his money wisely, but plans his spending as well.

Good money management considers the past, present, and future. Look at the past to see where your money goes as well as where it comes from. Keep an extra close check on spending for a month or more to determine your spending patterns.

Then figure how much money is coming in. Your spendable income basically is your pay check. If you have cash income from other sources, such as dividends, interest, or rent, be sure to include it.

Look at the present to check family needs and wants for which you can spend current income. First, list the things you need — your fixed expenses. This includes food, shelter (house payments, repairs, furniture, appliances, utilities), clothing (new, repairs), taxes, transportation (bus fare, auto payments and repairs, gas, oil), insurance, health (doctor and dentist, drugs, eye glasses), and savings (including emergencies).

Second, list the things you want — flexible expenses. These include education (books, tuition, newspapers, magazines), recreation (movies, sports, records, pets, vacations), gifts, personal grooming, contributions and dues, etc.

Third, add up these items to see if they fit the family's total expected income. If you're like most people starting a budget, you're probably overspent. You'll have to alter your plan. Remember your important needs — food, a place to live and clothing. Can these costs be cut? What about other expenses? What could be left out or put off until later.

Make your plan, but keep it simple. If it's easy to use, you'll be more likely to stick to it. Then try your plan for a month or two. Perhaps you've overestimated spendings in some areas and underestimated in others. Try to leave a "cushion" of a few dollars.

Look to the future and adjust to change. Spending and savings plans seldom remain the same for long periods of time. Major changes may have to be made as financial problems are solved, as goals are reached or reevaluated, as you move from one stage to another in the family life cycle, if you have a change in income.

All consumers know how easy it is to spend money. But to spend it wisely is really a challenge. These guidelines for your budget can help you meet that challenge.

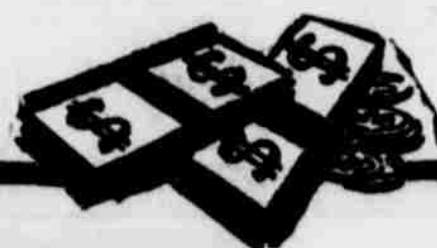

'1906 Picnic' marker to be erected Sept. 1

Friday, Sept. 1, has been set as the date for the erection of an Official Texas Historical Marker for "The Famous Picnic of 1906," Mrs. A. C. Surman and Mrs. Walter Boren of the Garza County Historical Survey Committee announced today.

The marker will be placed off U. S. Hwy. 84 in a grove near the O. S. Ranch headquarters. Dedication plans will be announced in the near future.

Made of cast aluminum with Swedish steel effect, the marker measures 27 by 42 inches and is sponsored by the GCHSC and Connel Estate (McCrory & Dalby).

The inscription on the marker reads:

"The famous Post Picnic of 1906. After this area was freed of Indians, Garza County was created and named in 1876 for a patriotic family of early Texas. With its ranching population rising from 36 in 1880 to only 180 by 1900, Garza remained attached for judicial purposes to Borden County.

"In 1906 Charles William Post

(1854-1914), "The Cereal King" of Battle Creek, Mich., sought Texas land for development. In the month of March, he and his wife and daughter visited here at the O. S. Ranch where a barbecue picnic was given in their honor. In the gathering, Post made a speech suggesting the county be organized for self-government, as he proposed to establish a modern farm colony and a modern town.

"Cowboys from a wide area were at the O. S. that day working in spring roundup. Immediately they called an informal election in the bunkhouse. A boy who had won all the money gaming the previous evening now gave a dollar to each voter, to be placed in a fund to defray expenses of a future, legal election. It is said that even the horses voted in the Post proposal for the al.

"After a petition was filed on May 13, 1907, the election was held and the county organized on June 15, 1907. By that time Post City was being built as county seat. County and city still prosper."

It's the Law . . .

WHEN YOU GO DANCING

Whenever business was good at a suburban night club, the management would "stretch" their space by putting extra tables and chairs on the edge of the dance floor. One night, a dancing couple stumbled over a stray chair.

The woman suffered a painful injury, and later sued the club for damages. She pointed out that the chair had been shoved several feet into the dancing area.

"If it was," countered the management, "some other customer must have done the shoving. We are not legally liable for what our customers do."

But the court granted the woman's claim. The court said that by placing chairs directly onto the dance floor, the management had set the stage for trouble.

When you go dancing in a public place, you are entitled to conditions of reasonable safety. The dance floor, the lighting, and the furnishings should all be maintained in such a way as to minimize the chance of accidents.

Nevertheless, merely by choosing this form of recreation, you are accepting those dangers that are "natural" to it. For example:

Another woman, injured while dancing, claimed she lost her footing because the floor was slick. But the court found no reason to blame the management for this. As one judge put it:

"Dance floors are intended to be slippery."

Furthermore, your own behavior might amount to negligence. That was the court ruling in a case in which the claimant had ventured onto a ballroom floor in a state of advanced intoxication.

And in another case, the court declared it was negligence for a woman to try a particularly tricky step while wearing heels three-and-a-half inches high.

"The situation," the judge said, "parallels that of the risk taken by a participant in a sport."

Levelland college to begin new class Aug. 29 for LVN's

LEVELLAND — South Plains College will begin a new class on Aug. 29 for persons interested in becoming a Licensed Vocational Nurse. A second class for LVN's will register in January of 1973 for a class beginning in February of that same year.

The program objective is to train vocational-practical nurses who provide nursing care under the direction of a licensed physician, a licensed dentist, or a registered nurse.

Lecture and clinical experiences are provided in the 12 month program. College housing is available on the SPC campus. Twenty-six weeks of pre-clinical instruction is taught on the South Plains College campus while the remaining 26 weeks are spent working in 40 hour week schedules in actual hospital work.

Nursing aptitude exams must be taken and passed by Aug. 29 or persons will not be allowed to register in the program.

1965 and reap almost \$400 million for their efforts.

The estimate, compiled jointly by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., and the Lubbock Cotton Exchange, sets production from about 2,602,000 standing acres in the 25 PGC counties surrounding Lubbock at 1,917,000 acres.

Last year's production came to only 1,279,150 bales. The 1965 crop totaled 2.3 million. The all-time high for the Plains was 2,457,703 bales produced in 1961.

Assuming market prices of 24 cents a pound for lint and \$60 a ton for seed, and including some \$130 million in price support payments, the value of the crop would be \$389,178,000. That figure, if realized, would just about equal the cash value of the record 1961 crop.

There is of course a lot of uncertainty about the weeks before the actual harvest.

Last year's early-season estimate also projected a rosy picture for the fleecy crop, but unseasonably cool, wet weather in August and September ruined these prospects. The Sept. 1 PGC-LCE estimate indicated the area would produce a little over 2 million bales in 1971 as compared to final production of less than 1.3 million.

Garza county's High Plains cotton production estimate as of Aug. 1 shows 47,000 estimated cotton acres, 234 pounds per acre estimated yield, for a 21,000 estimated bale yield as compared to 16,190 bales actually produced in 1971.

Garza's per pound yield is the lowest listed among the 25 High Plains counties in the forecast and local cotton experts are figuring a much higher acre yield than that. In recent years, the High Plains forecast has generally been much higher than the predictions of local crop-watchers.

The 1968 production for Garza ran between 27,000 and 28,000, if memory can be relied upon.

COTTON IRRIGATION

Proper management of irrigation water now will certainly mean extra cotton profits this fall. Cotton has made good progress during recent hot weather. We must make every effort not to hamper this progress by improper timing of irrigations. The lateness and varying stages of growth due to earlier adverse weather and subsequent disease attack requires that special attention be given to irrigation.

Early planted cotton which has made good growth and is fruiting heavily is now being benefited by irrigation, says the specialists.

Irrigation should be timed to the fruiting stage. Remember a good rule of thumb is to wait until the first white blooms appear before applying that first irrigation. Water requirements by plants are relatively low until the bloom stage is reached and then continues to be high during the critical boll development period. Additional moisture will especially be needed on light soils that store limited water or in areas which do not receive ample rainfall.

Some early planted cotton was delayed as much as two to three weeks by adverse weather and wet-weather blight. This cotton will have only a short time to produce a crop and can be further delayed by irrigation if stimulated to grow vegetatively. This cotton has used little moisture until recent growth; therefore, soil moisture conditions should be good, adds the specialists. Only in situations where cotton is fruiting rapidly and not growing vegetatively is an irrigation profitable.

June planted cotton will require almost ideal growing conditions to reach maturity by frost and in most cases will not require irrigation — this is especially true of cotton planted the middle of June or later. Yield potential for this cotton is less and, therefore, water requirements will not be as great as early cotton. Since late cotton is more easily shifted into vegetative growth, irrigation is more likely to delay fiber maturity rather than increase yields.

Verticillium Wilt has appeared early on the South Plains this year. Excessive amounts or poor timing of irrigation water can increase the wilt disease problem and reduce yields. The presence of wilt does not necessarily mean not watering as irrigation will likely be required to maintain normal fruiting and growth and produce an acceptable yield. He may need to apply lighter irrigations or use alternate row irrigation to avoid excessive cooling of soil to reduce wilt and maintain this fruiting-vegetative balance.

When discussing cotton irrigation proper cut-off time is most critical

to profitable cotton production. In all cases irrigation should cut-off by Aug. 15 to 20 north of Lubbock and Aug. 20 to 25 south of Lubbock, cautions New and Metzger.

mer's abbreviated program of two weeks worked out real well.

Kennedy said more children participated in this summer's program than in last summer's, mainly because more areas of recreation were offered. He said participation in the program averaged about 75 a day and that Joe Giddens, the director, "did a fine job."

Kennedy told the council the committee is hopeful of having a program next year in which from 150 to 200 children will participate.

The \$3,035 the committee seeks for next summer includes \$240 for rental of the swimming pool, \$1,205 for purchase of equipment, and \$1,590 for salaries for a director, 10 part-time workers, one full-time worker, one girls' basketball instructor and one boys' basketball instructor.

Salary increases for city employees and purchase of new equipment also were discussed by the council, but no action was taken pending further work on the budget.

The superintendent of public works said Bud White, auditor for the city, told him he needs to know what new equipment the city plans to buy so it can be included in the budget. Maddox mentioned a street sweeper, pickup truck and garbage truck as the main items of new equipment which will need to be included in the budget.

Consideration of salary raises for city employees will also include a decision on raises for members of the police department, the council indicated.

The council also discussed with Mike Mitchell the purchase of an all-metal grain warehouse he has offered to sell the city for \$8,000 if they will move out the equipment and for \$9,000 if he moves out the equipment.

Maddox said a building of the type Mitchell offered is needed by the city, since "we are running out of room at our present warehouse."

The building offered for sale by Mitchell is in the south part of town just west of the railroad tracks. The property includes three lots.

The council told Mitchell it would "take a look at the building" and let him know within the next week or two whether the city would buy it.

The council charged off \$806 worth of "bad debts" in the water department, most of them for sums under \$10.

questioned both the goals and goal achievement for schools. Education was hurt because it did not have a general framework for educational planning which would integrate financial costs with planning and results. But there was one redeeming fact — the entire federal governmental structure suffered from the same illness. The Rand Corporation whose name stands for Research and Development, a non-profit organization focused on governmental problems, helped refine "Planning-Program-Budgetary System" in 1954, for its implementation at the federal level. The effective implementation of PPBS in the Department of Defense in 1961, stimulated the president to order its implementation throughout the federal government.

What was lacking in the local attempt to answer questions of the board of trustees was just such a systematic approach. Simply, the various parts of a school cannot be planned and supported with tax dollars without an understanding of the total system of which they are a part. PPBS was introduced to me in an academic seminar sponsored by the University of Texas at Austin, in January of 1968. Professor Harry J. Hartley of New York University was guest professor, and his vast knowledge of the field was very helpful. After disseminating the information to the board, the decision was made to implement PPBS in Post. Since there were no source documents available, we had to devise our own. One of the documents was an instrument showing 42 different ways that a teacher could spend

his time (450 minutes) as a professional teacher and as a worker. We ran several runs of this breakdown, categorized expenditures. One that we discovered that the school day was only 100 minutes of teaching time. We were looking at many dollars of professional time for non-professional purposes than teaching. A percentage of this time could be saved by adequate planning and aids.

By January 1972, it was found that we knew where we were financially—we knew the every segment of our program. At this time we confronted with the incredible system available was used in putting it to work. The logical move was to evaluate school system.

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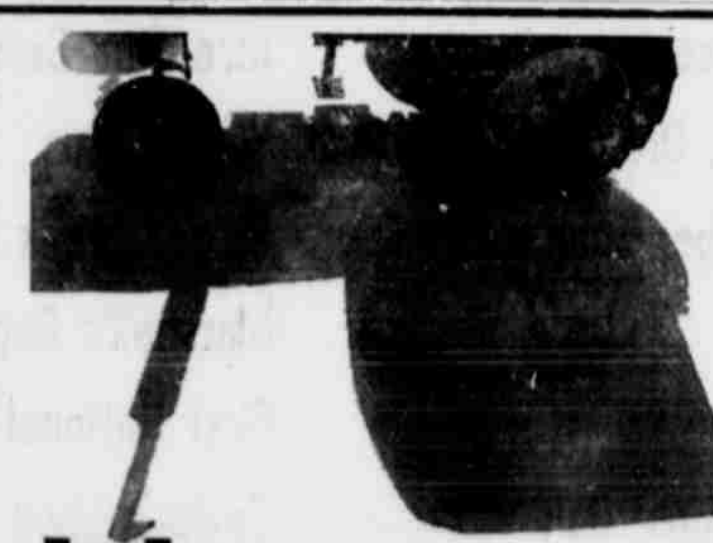

Cong. Burleson offers information on service academy nominations

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Congressman Omar Burleson reminds young men who are interested in competing for nominations to the service academies, for the class entering July 1973, he uses a competitive method of selection so that all young men who meet the necessary requirements may be considered.

The service academies are the Naval Academy at Annapolis, Md., the Military Academy at West Point, N.Y., the Air Force Academy near Colorado Springs, Colo., and the Merchant Marine Academy at Kings Point, N.Y. These institutions offer a fine education and a great opportunity for service to their country by young men who wish to follow a military career.

In order for Congressman Burleson to consider applicants, a candidate must meet these requirements:

- (1) He must be a U. S. citizen;
- (2) He must be over 17 and a legal resident of the 17th Congressional District;
- (3) He must be under 22 years of age on July 2, 1973;
- (4) He must never have been married;
- (5) He must be physically fit, including excellent eyesight;
- (6) He must have a good high school record.

Burleson stresses that political influence is not a factor in his nominations to the academies. The important thing is not who you know but what you are.

Interested young men who meet the above requirements should write Cong. Omar Burleson, House of Representatives, Washington, D. C. 20515, no later than Aug. 30. Examinations then will be scheduled as a rating device to set up slates for nomination. The competition is keen but Congressman Burleson wants to assure that all young men who are interested in a military career may have an opportunity to compete for nomination.

Grant to benefit feedlot cattle

AMARILLO — The board of directors of the Texas Cattle Feeders Association recently approved a \$3,000 grant to aid in research that is aimed at respiratory diseases in feedlot cattle.

The grant went to the College of Veterinary Medicine at Oklahoma State University, Stillwater, which began the research in late 1969 in cooperation with six veterinarians and numerous feedlot operators in the Texas and Oklahoma High Plains.

OU Veterinarians Dr. Richard Corstvet and Dr. Roger Panciera are working with Dr. H. B. Rinker and Associates, who operate five veterinary clinics in the Texas Panhandle.

The veterinarians provide case histories on cattle in the feedlots and help the technician in running tests and sending tissue specimens to OSU for detailed study. They notify the OSU veterinarians whenever a visit to specific cattle seems advisable. Postmortem and ante-mortem examinations of affected cattle are performed in the field.

The research has been planned for a five-year period ending in 1974.

Antelope coach named as regional director

Bobby Davis, Post High School's athletic director and head football coach, was elected as one of three directors to represent Region I on the Texas State Coaches Association at the annual coaching school held last week in Houston.

Davis, who is in his second year as athletic director at the local high school, was elected to a three-year term as director, replacing Bill Mayfield of Levelland.

Biologists spot pheasant broods in area county

SWEETWATER — Texas Parks and Wildlife biologists have spotted eight broods of white-winged pheasants in Terry County, raising hopes that these imports from Afghanistan might be on the verge of permanently establishing themselves.

The department has released 2,445 of the birds in nine counties of the Permian Basin since 1966 to determine if the species could establish itself in huntable numbers.

Biologists say that land-use practices of farmers and ranchers in the Permian Basin may hinder success of pheasant production.

Farming methods and land-use practices are critical, according to biologists, because pheasants must have adequate food and cover during critical winter months.

Landowners could improve the pheasants' chances of survival by planting alfalfa, rye and sorghum along draws and around playa lakes. If enough persons do this, say biologists, the Permian Basin may one day have enough white-winged pheasants to hunt.

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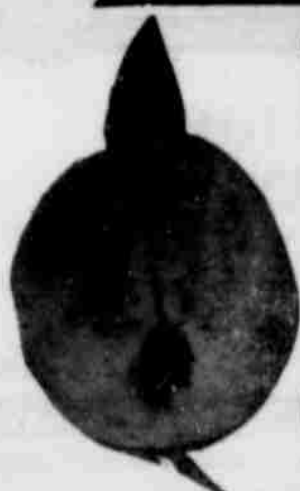

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Publication keeps pace with Burlington Ind.

(EDITOR'S NOTE: What's Burlington Industries doing these days that makes news. The answer is plenty, and we think Dispatch readers will be interested in a news resume from the May, June, July issues of Burlington Review, a monthly Burlington publication which Vic Slater, Postex Plant manager, makes available regularly to The Dispatch news staff.)

In Fortune Magazine's listing of the 500 largest U. S. industrial corporations, Burlington Industries, Inc., ranks 65th on the basis of the company's 1971 sales of \$1.7 billion.

In 1970, Burlington ranked 56th largest in sales. Burlington ranks 90th among the top industrial corporations in assets, with \$1.39 billion, 130th in net profits with \$40.1 million, 26th in number of employees with 82,000, 65th on shareholders equity, and 256th on annual growth rate, 3.26 per cent.

Among textile companies Burlington ranks first in sales, ahead of J. P. Stevens (145th), United Merchants & Manufacturers (170th), etc., with Hanes ranked 500th and 12th among the textile firms.

Coming up this fall in its 8th annual season on network TV, Burlington will help sponsor the following programs, some of which are on all three major networks.

NBC Mystery Movie, Flip Wilson Show, The Bold Ones, Ironside, Bill Cosby, Night Gallery, Julie Andrews, The Odd Couple, Carol Burnett, Spencer's Mountain, Ghost Story, ABC News and Laugh-In.

Burlington has given almost \$1.4 million to various educational causes during the past year.

Through the Aid to Education program of the Burlington Industries Foundation, over 350 colleges, universities and other educational institutions benefitted from direct grants, matched tuition, matched employe giving and matched scholarships for the school year ending last May 31.

Educational support by Burlington over the past 10 years totals almost \$11 million. Most of these funds received by educational institutions were in the form of direct grants.

Burlington's educational loan fund has provided financial assistance to over 1,750 employees or members of their families by making some 3,250 loans for educational purposes during the last decade. The students receiving loans may borrow up to \$3,200 for his four years of college.

Burlington's profit sharing plans rank ninth in asset value of all companies in the United States with profit sharing plans.

The ranking was shown in a recent survey released by the Profit Sharing Research Foundation. Total market value of Burlington's profit sharing funds at the time of the survey was \$11,432,492.

Leo Ward, former plant superintendent here, is now the manager of Burlington's Plant in Durham. Burlington has invested \$13 million in the Durham plant since purchasing it from Erwin Mills in 1962.

So it is good to be reminded in

the Burlington Review that Leo Ward has "made good" by climbing the Burlington ladder to his plant management three years ago.

Talking about bed sheets, Burlington Domestic has introduced a "Presidential Collection" of fine quality bed sheets.

The group is the first annual

collection of luxury bed and bath coordinates and was first shown at the recent Linens and Domestic Market in New York.

"The 'Presidential Collection' contains 11 styles and includes signature collection by name designers, including designer Vera Neumann and muralist Anita Wagners.

Burlington, which has a clean water project under way here at its Postex Plant, during the past year has spent some \$3,500,000 for "pollution abatement."

This year such expenditures are expected to total about \$4 million. It is establishing a laboratory at Jamestown, N. C., that will serve Burlington plants and commercial

users needing analysis for industrial and municipal purposes, providing effluent data in as many as 27,000 tests per year. The laboratory is expected to be in operation by the end of the summer.

Burlington's Aviation Department has been honored by the National Business Aircraft Association for

having flown 10.9 million safe miles.

The company, as well as 10 of its pilots, were honored for having flown 10,860,458 consecutive plane miles over a 12-year period without accident involving damage to property or injury to persons. James Guess, Burlington's chief pilot, leads the firm's pilots by
