An estimated census of Lubbock county gives it 70,000 hens, on its little more than 2,000 farms. That's way under what average number of hens per farm ought to be, but it is a big increase over what it has been.

An average of 100 hens to the farm is low, as the figure should be around the 300 per farm figure. "And with 300 hens on every farm in Lubbock county," said R. E. Swain of Lubbock, owner of the R. E. Swain Feed and Hatchery company, "the city's population would increase another 500 people every year, in addition to regular increase."

Shortage of Chickens

Right at this time, Mr. Swain contends, there is a shortage of chickens all over the country of around thirty-million. For this reason there ought to be the best prices for chickens and eggs this winter than in a good many years. Interest in fine poultry all over this section has seen a marvelous increase during the past several months, Mr. Swain thinks, and cites the fact that his hatchery, which started on January 16, last, and kept continually busy until the middle of August, now secures the majority of its good eggs from this vicinity, when, at first, it was compelled to secure them elsewhere.

The hatchery has a capacity of 94,000 eggs every 21 days, and it is now able to offer people of the South Plains as good chickens as are to be found anywhere in the United States.

Eggs Are Greater

Another evidence of increased interest locally, is the fact that last year only about 100 to 150 birds were entered at the Panhandle-South Plains fair, while the present fair, now in session has a total of 541 entries. "And lots of the entries are of chickens raised by our customers," Mr. Swain states.

"The shortage of chickens at the present time is because such a good price has been offered for chickens all this year that farmers have sold off a great number of them," declared Swain. "As an inkling of what poultry raising has meant to farmers, our company has paid to them, from January to August, about \$10,000, money they would not otherwise have received. And our being in the market for them has taken about 500,000 eggs off the local market and raised the price from about 18 cents per dozen to anywhere from 30 to 48 cents a dozen. The lowest price we have paid at any time this year was 18 cents a dozen. The increase from 18 cents to 30 cents, means 12 cents per dozen, all to the raiser of poultry."

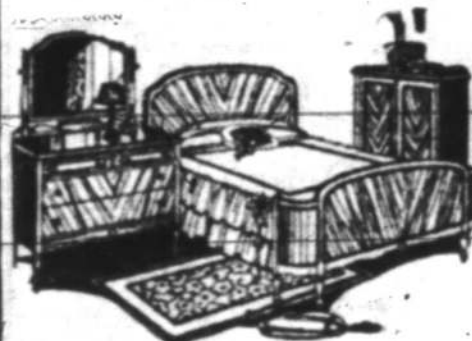

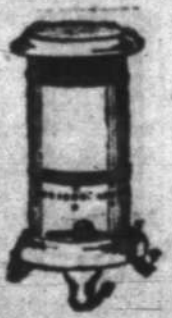

Station Gets New Fire Equipment

City's Fire Fighting Will Be Greatly Strengthened By New Truck; Station Under Construction.

(Special To The Advance) LUBBOCK, Oct. 4. (AP)—The city's fire fighting equipment was greatly strengthened by the purchase of a new truck and pump, with a capacity of 150 gallons per minute, was unloaded here Wednesday for addition to the station fire department's equipment. Old equipment was retained after being overhauled. This will greatly strengthen the city's protection against fire. Mayor W. G. Reese pointed out.

In securing the new apparatus, purchased last June, station will have more than enough in insurance to pay for the cost of the new equipment, city officials said. A new and thoroughly modern fire station, to cost \$15,000, is now under construction here, and will be completed by the first of the coming year. It will house all the city's fire apparatus when finished.

DAILY MARKETS

FORT WORTH LIVESTOCK
FORT WORTH, Oct. 4. (AP)—Mixed receipts today caused the cattle market here to have a slow appearance. No desirable slaughter steers and yearlings were on the market. Steers were about steady with cows selling from \$7.50 to \$8.00. Calves were slow and about 25c lower. The bulk of this class sold from \$10.00 to \$10.40.

Hogs were mostly steady. The top price recorded was \$12.40. The bulk sold from \$12.00 to \$12.20. Some brought from \$7.75 to \$8.50 and pigs from \$7.25 to \$7.75.

Sheep trade was steady, with some and yearlings selling at \$11.00 and others at \$8.25.

NEW YORK STOCKS
NEW YORK, Oct. 4. (AP)—The stock market gave an impressive showing of strength today in the face of a statement by John J. Raskob that there had been a serious decline in the stock market. The Raskob statement caused only a temporary check to the advance, which carried more than 4 score issues to new high levels on gains ranging from 1 to 4 points. Most of the gains were in the industrial and utility groups. Outside the stock market, chief speculative interest centered in the establishment of a new low record by sterling exchange, reviving hopes of further gold imports; a lowering of call money rates and the publication after the close of the market of the weekly federal reserve statement on brokers' loans. The statement showed a new high record at \$4,500,000, bringing the total to a new high record at \$4,500,000.

The Raskob statement took Wall Street by surprise as he has been recognized as one of the leaders of the "bull" movement of the last few years.

Call money remained at 7-1/2 percent, as against yesterday, dropped to 7 and thence to 6-1/2 with a plentiful supply of funds available as a result of the heavy return flow of October first disbursements. There was no change in time money and commercial paper. Sterling cables sold down to \$4.84 1/2-1/4, with slight reactions in most of the other leading European exchanges.

While the Raskob statement failed to halt the "bull" movement, it had a restraining effect on trading and tended to increase profit-taking on the rallies. General Motors fell from an early high of 217 3/4 to 2-13 and snapped back to 214 1/2, where it was up nearly 3 points by the close. Steel common closed slightly more than a point higher at 138 1/8 after having duplicated the year's top of 141 5/8. Bethlehem Steel changed hands in large volume, closing 3 points higher on buying influenced by unfounded rumors of a dividend resumption at the January meeting.

Warren Bros. broke 10 points and gained 4. Abraham & Strauss showed a net loss of 5 3/4 and A. M. Myers, Co. and Gold Dust, International Business Machines and Tobacco Products lost 2 points or more.

Bulls drifted lower although with the exception of New York Central which dropped 2 points, the losses were held to 1 point or less. Commodities prices moved within narrow and irregular limits. Cotton futures lost 50 to 75 cents a bale in reflection of the usual evening-up of speculative accounts prior to the publication of the government crop report. Wheat prices improved slightly. Coffee and sugar quotations held firm.

KANSAS CITY LIVESTOCK
KANSAS CITY, Oct. 4. (AP)—The 11-market cattle receipts were estimated at 22,100 as compared with 21,700 Thursday and 20,400 a year ago. Curtailed supplies created a better feeling throughout the trade and prices were on a steady to strong basis. Country demand has lightened considerably for steers, but feeder trade at some points continued sluggish. Choice yearlings at Chicago realized \$17.40 while weighty steers topped at \$18.50.

Although hog supplies were comparatively light, moderate shipping orders prevented any material price advance. Light hogs at some points registered an uptick of 25c but the central market was steady to 10c higher. The day's extreme to top \$11.35 was paid at St. Louis. Total offerings amounted \$7,000, a decrease of 15,000 from a week ago and 63,000 from the same day last year. Fat lambs were generally steady to 25c lower, with the maximum decline of 50c at St. Louis on natives. Choice range lambs at Chicago and Omaha cleared

Seven Miles Up, Army Fliers Make Series of Aerial Photograph Maps

DAYTON, O., Oct. 3. (AP)—Extraordinary possibilities for the use of aerial photography in accurate map-making have been revealed and new data on methods of calculating altitude of planes assembled in a series of altitude flights for photographic experimental work at Wright field.

A new record for high altitude aerial photography was set by Lieut. James Doolittle and Capt. Alfred W. Stevens, of the United States army air corps, who braved a temperature of 59 degrees below zero as well as a thin consciousness at times.

They ascended almost seven miles above the spot where Wilbur and Orville Wright first experimented with airplanes. Captain Stevens, chief of the photographic section at the Wright Field laboratories, took pictures from the cockpit of the plane as they continued upward obtaining new record photographs at an altitude of 35,000 feet. Ice from on the lenses of the camera when the aviators reached the top of their skyward climb.

making additional pictures impossible. The photographs, showing the terrain of the surrounding country in detail except where patches of clouds hid the ground, embraced an area of 30.7 square miles, the greatest ever covered in a single exposure. A photograph of the city of Dayton from a height of 32,200 feet by Captain Stevens with Lieut. John A. MacReady as pilot, constituted the former record.

Tests Accuracy
Captain Stevens, also experimenting to test the accuracy of barographs in determining altitude records, checked the barograph calibrations of the plane's height with the aerial photographs, which disclose the exact altitude of the plane at the time the shutter is snapped. The photographic method of determining altitudes produces an inaccuracy of less than one-tenth of one per cent, and the data when it is finally studied and interpreted may show that barograph calibrations are grossly inaccurate.

Other flights have been planned with Capt. St. Clair Street, chief test pilot at Wright field, replacing Lieutenant Doolittle, who has been transferred to Mitchell Field, L. I., for other experimental work.

He said he did not know whether he would be in Albany over the week-end, but wanted to leave a day ahead of time so he could spend a day in New York before starting out on the second swing.
