WELL, LOOKS LIKE "RENT RATIONING" IS HERE, OWI SAYS SO, ANYWAY

Here's a release which came to us from the Office of War Information, Southwest Region, Dallas, Friday morning.

We're going to quote in part. "Beginning November 1 all residential rents in the Killeen-Temple defense-rental area comprising the counties of Bell and Coryell will be cut back to the level of March 1, 1942, Price Administrator Leon Henderson announced today in Washington.

"On November 1, 1942 tenants are to pay no more rent than they were paying on March 1,

1942, for this area. Under the maximum rent regulations which have been issued, the landlords cannot accept nor can the tenants pay more rent than that fixed by the freeze date. Because of peculiar problems involved in each type of living accommodations, two separate maximum rent regulations have been issued, one covering housing accommodations other than hotels and rooming houses, and another covering hotels and rooming houses.

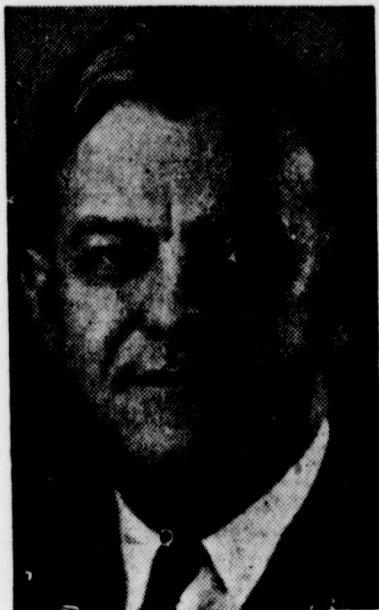

FIRST OCS CLASS GETS "BARS" AT CAMP HOOD SCHOOL

Remember back about three months ago, the first 148 Officer Candidate Class hit Gatesville, trained in the Municipal Auditorium, were housed in the High School Gymnasium and were fed in the High School Cafeteria, drilled on the football field, and "trucked" back and forth from Gatesville to Camp Hood?

Well, one hundred thirty-seven of these boys, who began this OCS course in our little city are now commissioned officers. They got theirs at eleven o'clock Friday morning, and were re-assigned to Tank Destroyer Battalions.

September 20, they moved to "Hood" to their permanent barracks. They took their work the hard way under Col. Hugh Mayberry, and his instructors who are ingenious devising studies which make this the most modern and realistic school in the country.

It was an important moment, and equally important in the life of the Tank Destroyer Center. Heretofore, the Center has drawn on other arms and branches of the service for their officers. These 137 are the first to have been trained extensively and particularly for Tank Destroyer Battalions already activated, to attend this course.

Major General A. D. Bruce, commanding the Center, delivered a terse, man-to-man address, saying, "...and when you eventually fight, add to your courage, your brain—add to your determination, the benefit of your training—add to your side of the ledger against the Axis treachery, brutality, starvation and rape—add to all of these, the vow, in the words of the Tank Destroyer motto, to SEEK, STRIKE, DESTROY."

V. R. LEE ANNOUNCES COTTON GINNING FOR COUNTY TO OCT. 1

V. R. (Happy) Lee, Special Agent for the U. S. D. C., Bureau of the Census, in this Cotton Ginning Report, gives the following:

Cotton ginned to Oct. 1, 1942 is 6,265, as compared to the same period of last year, which was 5,710.

Cotton this year, is a little earlier, and farmers are making a harder effort to get it out while the labor is here, and that may be one reason for the increased showing. From all reports, it's not the acreage, or the crop, just the "hurry".

TD'S TO HELP IN "SCRAP DRIVE" IN CORYELL COUNTY

From Lt. Col. Hal C. Horton, Metal Salvage Officer of Camp Hood, comes the information that Camp Hood's going to take part in the scrap drive which is now going on in Coryell County.

Here, in part is the official release from Lt. Col. Horton.

Someday, you'll see a Military train, and, if you count 'em you will see an average of 50 cars. That's one company of a Tank Destroyer Battalion. It takes 4 or 5 such trains to move the entire Battalion. Many hundreds of tons of iron and steel are in the train and equipment. It is ALL necessary to move and put into action many trains and many hundreds of Battalions in order to win this war.

TD's don't get all the scrap, some must go to Army, Navy, Marine Corps and Air Force.

If country schools will pile up their scrap metal on the school ground in quantities sufficient to get a truck load from 5 tons up, the Army will send trucks and drivers to pick it up. Mr. County Superintendent, organize (if you have not) your country schools and notify your O. C. D., Chairman or County Judge where this scrap is, or notify Col Hal C. Horton, phone 2204, Camp Hood, who is in charge of this effort on the part of the Army for this district.

Soldiers and trucks will be sent to assemble scrap metal in truck load lots in various points. Don't wait, it is your duty to see that it can no more be said "we did too little too late".

Gatesville Taken Without Struggle: Principal Businesses

JAPS LOSE 14 BOMBERS

Washington, Oct. 18 (AP).—Holding in leash for the time being their heavy land forces on Guadalcanal Island, the Japanese are concentrating efforts to soften up the vital American positions there with artillery and aerial bombardment, at a heavy price in planes, the Navy reported Sunday.

U. S. fighter planes and anti-aircraft batteries wiped out completely a flight of 14 bombers which the Japs flew against the airfield Saturday morning.

REDS HOLD NAZIS IN S'GRAD

Moscow, Oct. 19 (AP).—The Russians for the 2nd successive day held firm Sunday against the smashing German drive inside Stalingrad, killing about 2,500 enemy soldiers and destroying 45 tanks in the two main attack areas.

7-MIN. RAID WRECKS PLANTS

LONDON, Oct. 18, (AP).—A streaking armada of 94 giant Lancasters hedge-hopped 400 miles with their block-busting bombs

in the RAF's biggest daylight assault of the war at dusk Saturday on the Schneider armament works at Le Creusot in occupied France, the British disclosed Sunday.

JAPS REINFORCE KISKA

Hdqs. Alaska Defense, Oct. 17 (AP).—The Japs are reinforcing their Kiska garrison and building new installations on the south side of the island at Gertrude Cove, reconnaissance by U. S. Army planes has disclosed.

Portland, Oct. 18 (AP).—"Pickle packers' prospects of getting pickle packers to pick pickles for pickle packers to pack are poor. FOURTH TERM DATA

Not much has been said about it
publicly, but already the question of
the Fourth Term has come in for a
lot of backstage discussion.

Republicans, worried about it,
want to do everything possible to
block it. And in the vicinity of the
White House, some of those who
would like to stay around indefinitely,
want to do everything possible to
encourage it.

But those closest to the President
are convinced that there will be no
Fourth Term. Even if he could get
it, they say that this is the last
thing Roosevelt wants.

Or even if there should be a tre-
mendous demand on the part of the
public against changing horses in
midstream, they don't think the
President would yield. His ideals
for preservation of the democratic
system are too deep-rooted, they
say, for him to continue in office for
what would be a total of 16 years.

However, the President does have
one very definite political goal, and
that is to retain control of congress
during his two remaining years in
office.

He remembers all too clearly,
when he was assistant secretary of
the navy, the chaos which the coun-
try faced when Woodrow Wilson lost
control of the house of representa-
tives. He also remembers the trou-
bles faced by Herbert Hoover, Cal-
vin Coolidge and his cousin Teddy
Roosevelt when they faced a rebel-
lious congress during their last two
years in office.

So the President is out to win the
house, and win it at all costs next
November. To that end he will leave
Washington—something he hasn't
done since 1940—and take a swing
through the Middle West some time
in October.

JOBS TO REPUBLICANS

Some of FDR's political advisers,
among them Democratic Chairman
Ed Flynn, tell him privately that
the battle to control the house in
November will not be easy. One
trouble is patronage.

Patronage is a word which may
bring a bad smell to the public, but
to the politician it is like the smell
of raw meat to a circus lion. He
will not perform without it.

Back in the early days of the
New Deal, Jim Farley kept a little
card index of how every congress-
man voted on important issues and
what jobs he had received. When
the congressman stopped voting
right, he stopped getting jobs for
his constituents. That system
worked like a charm—for a while.
But in recent years Roosevelt him-
self has given more and more jobs
to Republicans, while Leon Ren-
derson, the greatest job dispenser of
war times, has placed everything in
the hands of state governors, a large
proportion of them Republicans.

So today, the President's political
friends say that his definition of pa-
tronage is: "Something which you
hold out to your friends, but use to
reward your enemies."

And these friends have had the
short end of the patronage stick for
so long that, as November ap-
proaches, FDR is finding a lot of
the old politicians unwilling to go to
bat for him, while the rewarded en-
emies won't stay put.

So the congressional elections are
going to be tougher than a lot of
people realize, and you will probably
see certain seasoned political sea-
dogs, among them Ed Flynn, resign-
ing from the picture before many
weeks are over.

Note: Patronage under the old
congressional system had a lot of
faults, but it was not half as bad as
under the present dollar-a-year man
system, where somebody gets a key
WPB job or a cellophane commis-
sion merely because he is the friend
of a big accounting firm or a part-
ner of a Wall Street broker.

RENT "QUIZ & ANZ"

Q. Does rent control apply to government housing projects?

A. Yes, whether the housing accommodations are owned by individuals, corporations, the state or the national government—they all are under federal rent control.

Q. Does rent control extend to services that a landlord may provide—such as janitor service, hot water, laundry facilities or furniture?

A. Yes, authority to regulate and to require the maintenance of services is an essential part of the control of rents.

Q. Does rent control extend to houses under lease?

A. Yes, as soon as a building is ready for rental occupancy, it is subject to rent regulation.

Q. Does rent control apply to houses newly constructed?

A. Yes, as soon as a building is ready for rental occupancy, it is subject to rent regulation.

Q. A tenant lives on the 2nd floor of a building which has a grocery store on the ground floor. Do federal rent regulations apply?

A. To the store, No. To the

living quarters over the store, yes.

Q. Does rent control apply to rented farm dwellings?

A. If a house or room situated on a farm is occupied by a tenant who is engaged for a substantial portion of his time working on the farm, the rent is not controlled.

Q. Is the dwelling place occupied by the janitors, domestic servants, managers, and caretakers included under rent control?

A. No, these quarters, when provided as part of the compensation for persons working on the premises, are exempt.

Q. If a tenant wants to pay more than the maximum rent in order to obtain the living quarters he wants, may he do so.

A. The landlord cannot receive more than the maximum rent permitted under federal regulations. For the landlord to agree to a higher rent makes him subject to civil and criminal penalties for evasion of the maximum-rent regulations.

Setting Maximum Rents by Dates

Q. What is a maximum-rent date?

A. This date marks the level above which rents in general can not go.

Q. How is the date determined?

A. As far as practical, the date is chosen to reflect rental conditions before "defense activities shall have resulted, or threatened to result in increases in rents."

Q. What is the maximum rent date?

A. It is the date set by Price Administrator in issuing rent regulations in placing a ceiling on rents and is March 1, 1942.

Q. What does that date mean?

A. It means that the tenant must not pay any higher rents for his quarters than was paid for the same quarters on March 1, 1942.

Q. If the rent was \$32.00 a month on March 1, 1942, is that the highest that now can be charged?

A. That is correct.

Q. If the rent was \$32 on Mar. 1, and has been increased since then to \$38, how much should the tenant pay?

A. The maximum is \$32 and that is all the tenant can pay.

Q. Will the tenant receive a rebate covering the amount he paid over the maximum up to the time the regulations went into effect?

A. No, there will be no rebate, but henceforth he will pay no more than the maximum.

Q. Altho the rent was \$32 on March 1, the present tenant moved in some months later and has always paid \$38. What is the maximum rent?

A. The maximum is still only \$32. It doesn't matter who paid the rent on the maximum date. The rent must not exceed the amount charged on that date.

Q. How will the tenant know what the rent was on March 1, if he has moved in since then?

A. He can learn this directly from his landlord or thru the registration statement that the landlord files with the local rent director. False information in this statement will subject the landlord to criminal penalties.

Q. What is to be done if landlord and tenant cannot agree or determine what the rent was on March 1, 1942?

A. The rent director acts to fix the maximum rent.

Q. Is not the landlord entitled to some additional rent if he has substantially changed the property by a major, capital improvement since the maximum rent date?

A. Yes, the regulations set up machinery for handling exceptional cases like this.

Q. How is the maximum rent determined if the house was vacant March 1?

A. In that case the last rent charged in the two months prior to March 1, 1942 is the maximum rent.

Q. Suppose the house was vacant during these two months, too. What happens then? And what happens if the owner occupied the house and did not rent it until some time after Mar. 1?

A. In either case the rent can not exceed the first rent charged for the quarters after March 1. However, as a protection to the tenant against an excessive charge, the landlord must file a special

report with the local rent director in these cases and the rent director may reduce the maximum rent if the charge was out of line with what comparable housing accommodations were bringing on March 1.

Q. What is the maximum rent for a newly constructed house or apartment first rented after the maximum rent date?

A. If the housing accommodations were rented for the effective date of the regulation, the maximum rent is the first charge to the occupant of the new quarters. But here again the landlord must report to the rent director, who has authority to adjust the maximum rent to the level of the maximum rent date.

Q. Suppose the house wasn't completed until after federal rent control became effective?

A. At least 15 days before the place is to be rented, the owner must petition the local rent director to set the maximum rent.

Q. On what does the director base the rent?

A. He bases the maximum rent for comparable houses on March 1. He also must make allowance for increases in cost of construction since that date.

Q. What about houses or apartments constructed under government priorities for materials?

A. In that case the maximum rent is the first charged but in no event can it be more than the schedule of rents which the War Production Board required the builder to submit before the board would grant the priority ration.

Q. What control is there over rents charged in government housing projects?

A. In all housing projects, whether owned or operated by the federal, state or local governmental, the rents must conform to those charged the area on the maximum-rent date.

Q. Does the rent director have authority to set maximum rents for government housing projects?

A. Yes.

control will be handled thru an area rent office which personnel selected from this area. Site of the office and the rent director have not yet been determined. The area rent office will be responsible to the regional rent office of OPA in Dallas.

By the way, this article came out in an 'Office of Emergency Management' envelope.

'First step toward rent control in this area came on April 28 when P. A. Henderson designed this community as a defense-rental area and recommended that rents be voluntarily cut back to March 1, 1942 level. OPA granted 60 days for action by local authorities, but at the end of that period an investigation showed that rents generally had not been cut back as recommended. Nineteen other areas in this six-state OPA region will also feel federal rent control on November 1, 1942.

Provisions in the federal rent regulations allow the setting of legal maximum rents by the landlord when accommodations have been newly constructed, where they have been substantially changed by a major capital improvement, and where they were unoccupied on the maximum rent date. Other provisions deal with evictions, services, leases, ground for adjustment in rents, penalties and special tenant-landlord relationships.

"For tenants in these new areas, one over-all guiding principle is set forth by the regulations—

Tenants on paying their November 1, 1942 rent are to pay no more rent than the rent which the same accommodations were bringing on March 1, 1942. The only major exception to this comes

when the accommodations have been substantially changed by a major capital improvement, such as the addition of a room or changing the place from unfurnished to furnished. Ordinary maintenance and repair are not considered a major capital improvement.

'Failure to comply with the registration of rent property, which will be announced soon for this area, may subject the willful violators to the \$5,000 fine, one year's imprisonment, or both, provided under the Emergency Price Control Act for violations of any regulations or order issued under the Act. It is this Act by which Congress gave authority for the control of residential rents. Exact dates for the periods of registration will be announced locally."

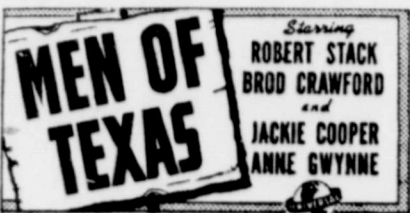
