## Ambulance board opens bids on Type-III unit

The Mitchell County Ambulance Board voted unanimously Thursday afternoon to recommend to the hospital board, city council and county commissioners that they purchase a Road Rescue ambulance for \$76,066.

The vote for this bid came after some five-and-a-half hours of pouring through bids with a fine-tooth comb by the board members. The meeting convened at 9 a.m. and was over around 2:30 p.m.

Fred Thompson, Sammy Contreras and Carl Guelker serve on this board and Guelker is the chairman. Thompson made the motion for the purchase and Contreras made the motion to second it.

DACO Fire and Safety of Lubbock submitted a bid of \$68,196 for the ambulance and Southern Ambulance Co. submitted a bid of \$71,450.

The county and hospital district will each pay 40% of the cost of the new Type-III ambulance with the city paying 20 percent. The Big Country Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) secured a grant for some \$21,265 for the purchase to greatly ease the load on the three local entities.

Representatives of both DACO and Road Rescue were at the meeting and they answered questions throughout the meeting.

When asked why the board was going to recommend the higher bid, Guelker said the Road Rescue had a life-time warranty on the box part of the ambulance as opposed to 15 years from DACO.

Delivery time was also a factor according to Guelker as Road Rescue promised a delivery date of September 2 of this year and DACO said delivery would be "in October or November if the factory still had a 1993 chassis available."

If a '93 chassis is not available, then delivery time would be in 1994 for the DACO unit.

"We just felt the Road Rescue would fit the needs of the Ambulance Service and the citizens better," added Guelker.

The county has a meeting scheduled for Monday afternoon and the ambulance purchase is on the agenda. The city will meet on their regular time Tuesday night and they also are expected to consider approving the recommendation. The hospital board is scheduled to meet on the 27th but they may have a called meeting for this purpose sooner.

## Dates noted for football practice

Head football coach Mark Howeth has announced some important dates for students who are planning on playing football this fall.

Howeth said equipment will be issued for all Colorado High students on Wednesday, August 4th at the fieldhouse beginning with seniors at 8 a.m. with juniors getting their equipment at 8:30 and sophomores and freshmen getting theirs at 9:00 and 9:30 respectively.

Equipment will be issued for grades 7 and 8 on Thursday, August 12 with 8th graders getting their equipment at 3 p.m. and the 7th grade at 4 p.m. Practice will begin the first day of school, August 17.

Those students who must have physicals before being allowed to practice include all 7th and 9th graders and anyone new to the program. Also, anyone seriously injured last year must have a physical.

Howeth said the high school teams (grades 9-12) will practice one time on August 4 and two-a-days will start on the 5th with practice every day except Sundays until school starts on the 17th.

Players will report at 7:29 and practice will begin at 7:59 a.m. and will continue until 10 a.m. A break will be held from 10 until the next practice starts at 10:59 and it will last until approximately 1:30 p.m.

An intersquad scrimmage is scheduled for Saturday, August 14 and the high school teams will scrimmage Clyde here on August 20 and Winters there on August 27th.

The annual Pigskin Review is tentatively scheduled for August 19th said Howeth.

The varsity Wolves open their 1993 schedule with three straight home games. Hawley will be here Friday, September 3 with Stanton and Slaton here the next two Fridays.

The Wolves will then travel to Coahoma followed by a trip to Muleshoe on October 1.

Sonora will be the first district game with a 7:30 kickoff on October 8 and then the Wolves will travel to Crane and then Kermit.

They'll be back home against Greenwood on Oct 29 and the regular season will end in Big Lake on Friday, November 5.

Homecoming is scheduled for the Sept. 17th Slaton game.

## Residents can help with mosquito war

With a never-ceasing wind and temperatures hovering around 100-degrees daily, one would think that mosquitoes would either be blown

away or cooked, but the pesky critters are still hanging on.

And while city crews are spraying when the weather allows,

homeowners can do several things around their homes to help control them.

The first step toward mosquito control is to understand their life cycle. Mosquitoes usually don't travel far from their breeding habitat - standing water. Thus, the best way to control them is by removing or managing their water home.

Clogged rain gutters, bird baths, flower pots, tree holes, cans, old tire's children's toys and even rain gauges can hold enough water for mosquitoes to breed. If the water source is permanent, such as a backyard pond, one suggestion is to use fish that feed on mosquitoes such as goldfish.

Insect growth regulators with the active ingredient methoprene keep mosquitoes from maturing. Another product to use in your fight against mosquitoes is BTI, or bacillus thuringiensis.

Purple martins are natural enemies of the insects with one martin capable of consuming thousands of mosquitoes daily. Purple martins can be attracted by install'g houses made especially for them.

Information on building homes for purple martins can be found at the Mitchell County Library.

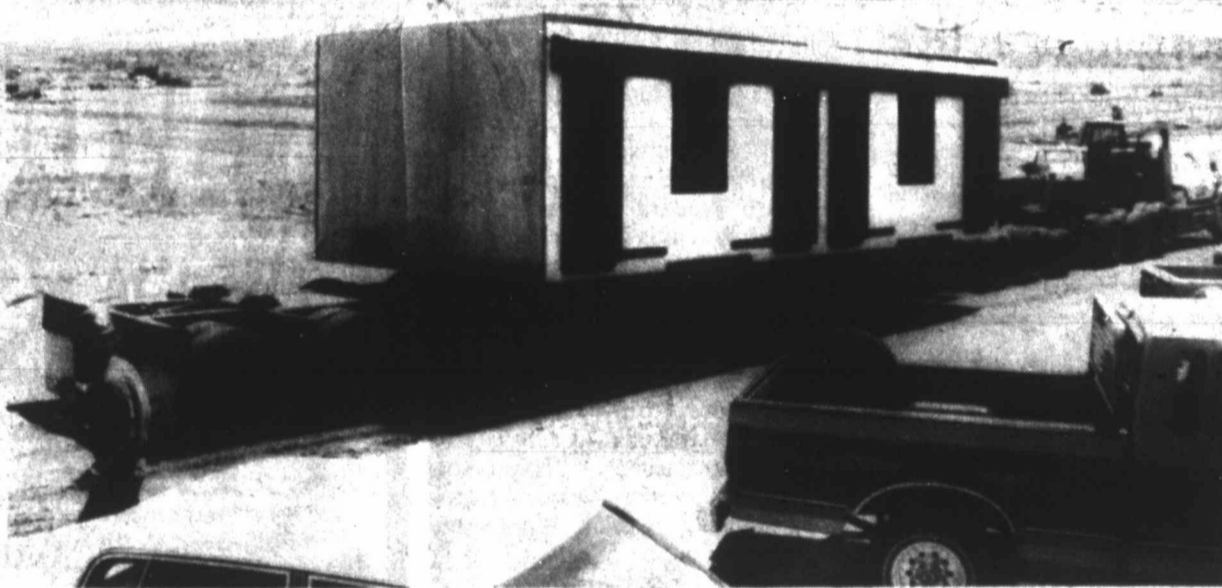
## Tickets remain for Ranch Tour

## Colorado City family wins top prize in Co-Op drawing

Cap Rock Electric members overwhelmingly gave a vote of approval to the cooperative's business ventures in the last year and re-elected all four incumbent directors during the co-op's annual meeting Thursday night at the Chaparral Center of Midland College.

The four directors re-elected to serve three-year terms were Roger Lange, Garden City, District 1; Sammie Buchanan, Big Spring, District 2; Alfred J. Schwartz, Garden City, District 7, and Rob Holman, Colorado City, District 11. The four were unopposed on the ballot after members in their districts failed to nominate any opposing candidates at district meetings.

Members approved a resolution supporting the company's business activities, which in the last year included a merger with Hunt-Collin Electric Cooperative, the formation of a natural gas subsidiary and efforts to construct a new transmission line to allow it to buy cheaper wholesale power.

"When your directors are unopposed and 50 percent of the members vote, that's a pretty good indication that members believe the cooperative's doing a good job and there's a lot of faith and trust in the board and in management," Jones said.

Terrett, of Colorado City, in the Lone Wolf Division of Cap Rock, won the grand prize, a year's worth of free electricity up to \$3,600. Mrs. Terrett, who was present at the meeting, said the prize was "good news" for the retired couple who now lived on the lake. "I'm just so proud of this," she said, with tears in her eyes, as she posed for a picture with Ulen North, vice president of the Stanton Division.

## Ashlyn Danielle Gardner

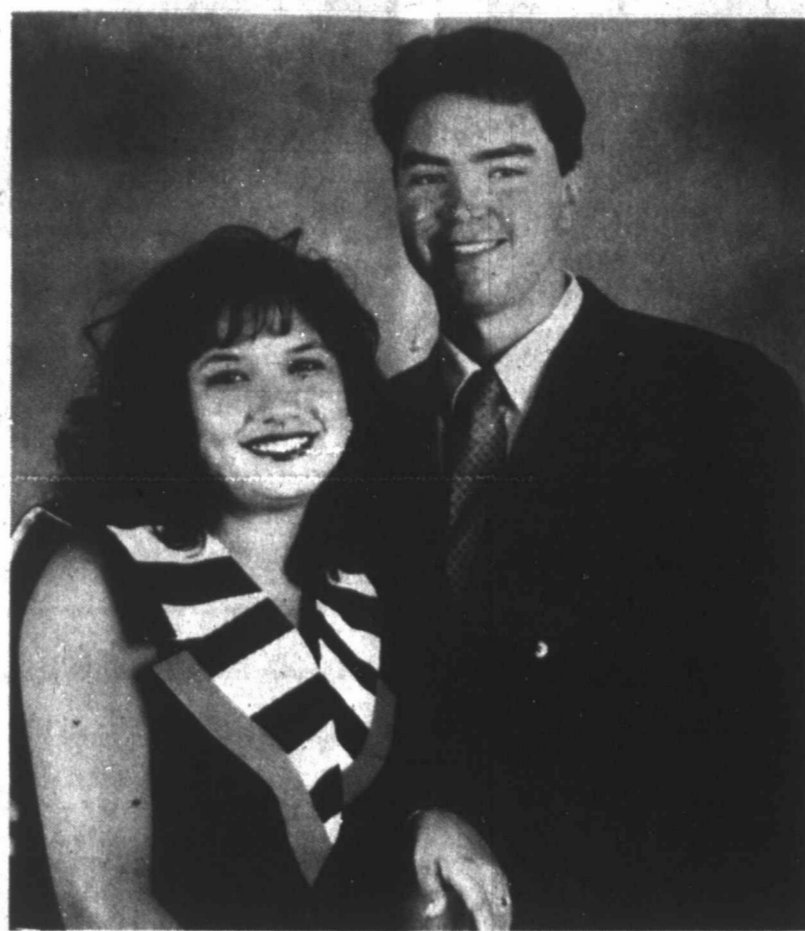

## Smokeless tobacco causes problems

It doesn't matter if you're a big dipper or a little dipper, using smokeless tobacco is a dangerous habit that's hard to break.

"Smokeless tobacco that is kept in the mouth or chewed is more dangerous than a cigarette," says Cheryl Bressler, assistant head nurse of the otolaryngology Intensive Care Unit at The Methodist Hospital in Houston.

Bressler has pioneered a local effort to educate people about the dangers of using smokeless tobacco. Her message may be startling to some, but not as shocking as the age of some of the "users" she's met. "I've talked to a 6-year-old boy who used it regularly," says Bressler, "so I now target elementary and middle school children."

Her message is straightforward. "Tobacco in any form is not good for you. Chewing or dipping tobacco may not cause any major health problems initially, but continued use of these tobacco products can cause cancer." Any cancer is certainly a word even a first-grader understands.

Bressler says smokeless

tobacco contains larger amounts of cancer-causing chemicals found in cigarettes. These chemicals are absorbed through the mouth and stomach and stay in the bloodstream longer.

In fact, smokeless tobacco is one of the leading causes of oral cancer. Each year, there are more than 30,000 new oral cancers detected in the United States and one third of those people die from their disease.

"If you look inside a dipper's mouth, you may see a white patch or sore where they keep the tobacco between their cheek and gum," Bressler explains. "The white patch, called Leukoplakia, will be wrinkled, hardened or cracked. In time, it could turn into cancer."

It doesn't take long for a dipper to discover the signs of danger. Leukoplakia usually develops after just a few months of use, so dippers should examine their mouth, lips, and tongue daily for warning signs.

Sores that bleed easily or don't heal, a sore throat, pain in chewing and swallowing food, or sore or red gums may signal something is

wrong. If any of these signs are present, the dipper should see a doctor.

"Smokeless tobacco is dangerous and addictive," says Bressler.

## Bugs can be summer pest

They're camouflaged under leaves in dense woods. They're hovering around lakes and ponds. They're even hiding in your backyard. Whether you like it or not, they're here: ticks, mosquitos, flies and other pesky insects that are prepared to ruin summer fun.

With the proper use of insect repellents, you can lessen the irritation of insects and make your summer more enjoyable and healthy. Here are some tips from the nation's insect repellent manufacturers on how and why to safely use insect repellents.

**Benefits of Insect Repellents**  
 Common summer pests like mosquitos, ticks and flies can cause more serious problems than the annoying, itching bites most people experience. They can also carry diseases including Lyme disease, encephalitis, Rocky Mountain spotted fever and other serious illnesses. And while scratching an insect bite may make it feel better, it can also cause an open sore that can become infected. Insect repellents containing DEET (N, N-Diethyl-m-toluamide) help to prevent bites from insects and ticks that may carry these serious diseases.

**Selecting the Proper Product**  
 Various forms and concentrations of insect repellent products are available. Consumers should select the product best suited for their activity and location. Aerosol and pump spray products are generally preferred for treating clothing, as well as for skin applications. Liquid, cream lotion and stick products may be used for more precise skin application. Lower concentration DEET products are appropriate for most situations where insect exposure is minimal. Higher concentration products give increased protection which may be particularly useful in highly infested areas or to those individuals more prone to insect bites.

In addition, some species of insects and ticks are more difficult to repel and may require a higher concentration product for effectiveness. Higher concentrations also provide longer-lasting protection for lengthy exposure periods where reapplication may be inconvenient or impractical.

According to Dr. Durand Fish, associate professor of community and preventive medicine at the New York Medical College and director of the Lyme Disease Center, "Skin application of an effective insect repellent is essential to minimize the possibility of acquiring bites from the deer tick. The scientific literature documents that DEET is the most effective insect repellent approved for skin application."

**Applying Insect Repellents**  
 The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) regulates insect repellents. The agency registers products it has determined are effective and pose no adverse health risks to people when used as directed according to label instructions. The EPA recommends the following precautions when using insect repellents:

- \*Apply only to exposed skin and/or clothing as directed on the product label.
- \*Do not use under clothing.
- \*Never use repellents over cuts, wounds, or irritated skin.
- \*Do not apply to eyes and mouth or to the hands of young children.

\*Use just enough repellent to cover exposed skin and/or clothing. Frequent reapplication and saturation is unnecessary for effectiveness.

\*After returning indoors, wash treated skin with soap and water or bathe. This is particularly important when repellents are used repeatedly in a day or on consecutive days.

\*If you suspect you or your child are reacting to an insect repellent, wash treated skin and then call your local poison control center. If you go to the doctor, take the insect repellent with you.

The EPA also recommends that consumers use only those products bearing an EPA-approved label, read the entire product label before using the repellent, follow product directions carefully, and always keep the container out of reach of small children.

**Health Effects**  
 DEET was developed and patented by the U.S. Army in 1956 and was registered for use by the general public in 1957. DEET is the most widely distributed personal insect repellent ingredient in the world, used by an estimated 20 million people each year. The manufacturers of DEET and many companies which market DEET products have collaborated to conduct studies to determine the safety of DEET. To date, 22 health-effect studies, both short-term and long-term, have shown that there is no health risk anticipated with the normal use of DEET products. The adverse health effects from DEET products are generally limited to eye irritation from inadvertent exposure to the eyes and infrequent skin reactions from sensitive individuals.

The American Association of Poison Control Centers has shown that there are very few serious incidents involving DEET products. The study showed that there was no correlation between the number or severity of incidents and the concentration of DEET in products.

Joseph Veltri, Professor of Clinical Toxicology at the University of Utah and director of the Intermountain Regional Poison Control Center said, "My analysis of the poison control center's computer records of human exposures to DEET-containing repellents from 1985-1989 shows that the risk of serious medical effects with the labeled use of DEET-containing insect repellents is quite low."

Consumers who have questions on insect repellents can obtain more information by contacting the product manufacturer at the address or telephone number listed on the product label.

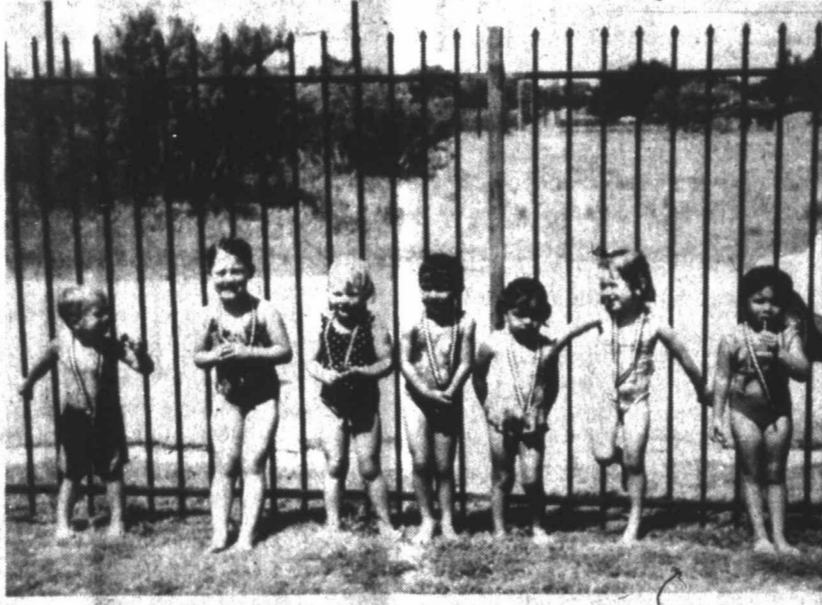
