Tax Shelter Available To More People

Bobby Lemons, vice-president of The City National Bank in Colorado City held a special news conference Wednesday morning to discuss a new light to the IRA (Individual Retirement Accounts), the tax shelter savings plan and a new certificate being offered by the bank.

He said the IRAs will now be available to more persons in the county, stating that the IRA program has been in effect since 1975 and currently there is about a half a million dollars in the IRA accounts. He said, "in the coming year we are expecting to grow a

great deal because the law has been changed to broaden the scope and will include people already covered by retirement programs and to allow all persons to put in additional funds in way of increased limits."

Lemons stated that he expected some confusion in the first couple of months, until the 1981 taxes were figured because they would be operated under two sets of rules; those applying to the tax year 1981 and then the rules applying to 1982.

The rules applying to 1981, Lemons said are: "if

you are not covered by a retirement program you are eligible to open an individual retirement fund account and deposit up to \$1,500 or 15 percent of your gross income. If you have a non-working spouse, you would be able to put in up to \$1,750, but you could not exceed the 15 percent of income.

The rules changing for 1982 are: "the state says you will be eligible for individual retirement account if you have labor income regardless of whether you have another profit sharing or pension plan. You would be eligible to deposit \$2,000 or eligible or put in 100 percent of your labor income up to that \$2,000 and this does not have to be the 15 percent. Also, if you

have a non-working spouse involved the limit increase to \$2,250."

In conclusion, Lemons stated, "the individual retirement program will be available to a great deal of people and we have in the past offered these to individuals and paying the money market rate or the two and half year certificate rate. We will continue to be offering these but beginning January 1, we will also be offering to all IRA accounts, a new 18 month certificate. It has a variable rate tied to the money market rate. We will change the rate on the first day of each month, paying the money market rate for that day's rate for the entire month, and interest will be compounded and added to it."

It was a good year for Mitchell County residents, the weather was extremely good and the town has shown some signs of growth, with several new businesses springing up, new homes being built and some changes in businesses' management and giving them a new challenge in the community.

JANUARY

Robert (Bob) Bullock made the news in the early part of January as he was hired as a full-time Deputy of the Mitchell County Sheriff's Department filling the vacancy left by the resignation of Chief Deputy Mike Stutts which became effective December 31, 1980.

Prudencio Rios of Colorado City was indicted for the rape of a child.

The Opti-Ms Club also announced plans to sponsor a youth basketball program for all youth in Mitchell County.

Also making the news in the early part of January was the announcement of City Hall for applications for a new Chief of Police. Brenda Tarter, city manager, made the announcement after a resignation was submitted by former Chief Robert Bailey.

Newly elected county officials were officially sworn in by Mitchell County Judge Bill Carter. Sworn in were Mike Burt, tax assessor-collector; Bill McGuire, sheriff; Paul Hunter, precinct three commissioner; Paul Logsdon, precinct one commissioner and Pat Barber, county attorney.

Customers of Texas Electric Service Company received a notice of a substantial rate increase and the increase was brought about because gas fuel to produce electricity had risen, as announced by B.B. Hardee, TESCO Manager.

Kiwanians met in the Villa Restaurant and designating "Take Time to Care" as the club's slogan for the year.

Actors and actresses receiving awards were Debbie Kelly, best actress in a leading role; Porter Richardson, co-director of best production; Carl Beery Moore, best supporting actor; Marsha Moore, best actress in a minor role and co-director of a best production; Kent Womack, best actor in a leading role and George Womack, "President's Award."

Bonnie Herrington won overall "Grand Champion" in the Loraine Livestock Show and Fonda Long took "Showmanship Award" for her grand champion lamb.

Larry Dawson took the honors of showing the "Grand and Reserve Champion" lambs and Donald Burnett showed the overall "Grand Champion" swine in the Westbrook show with his heavyweight cross-bred swine.

The first baby of the year born in Mitchell County was Kasey Lynn Garcia, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Garcia. Elias Franco began his duties as patrolman with the Colorado City Police Department January 15, moving here from Pecos.

Marjori Maddox took the "Grand Champion" Steer honors during the Mitchell County 4-H Livestock Show held. Todd Whitesides of Westbrook showed the "Grand Champion" barrow and Donald Burnett, also of Westbrook, had the "Reserve Champion." Adam Merket took the "Reserve Champion" steer title and Randy McPhaul showed the

"Grand Champion" lamb with Kelley Dockrey showing the "Reserve Champion" steer.

Colorado City boxing team won first, second and third place honors in boxing tournament held in Abilene.

Wallace Center's Annual Volleyball Tournament netted \$260 that was donated to the Center.

Stanley Moore of the Landers Community was selected as the Mitchell County Soil and Water Conservation's "Best Farmer-Rancher" of the year by the SCS Board of Directors.

The Wallace Community Center held their first "Playday" at the Center with a tremendous response. More than 250 children turned out to the Center to enjoy games and recreation.

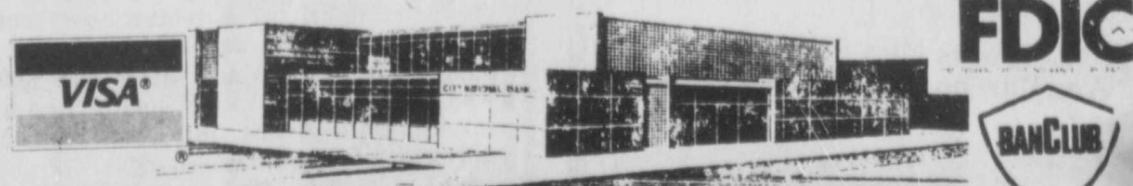

Q. I'd like to change the sparkplugs myself and save a little money. However, to get at the plugs I have to remove the battery and the case. I don't think it's worth it. Do you?
A. That depends on your point of view. Today, several auto manufacturers make access to plugs difficult. However, once you have encountered and surmounted these difficulties the first time, the rest is all downhill. Studies have shown changing plugs yourself will probably save you at least \$20 and, in some instances, as much as \$40 to \$45 per change. A garage or service station may charge you extra where additional work must be done to get to the plugs. So, count your costs including labor charges. You may find a little more time and trouble on your part will save you significant dollars.

Federal Funds Slated

Although final dollar amounts have yet to be awarded at the national level, percentages have been worked out for Texas in regard to the Alcohol, Drug Abuse and Mental Health Block Grant.

The Texas Department of Mental Health-Retardation will receive 40 percent of the federal funds under the block grant, the Drug Abuse Division of the Texas Department of Community Affairs 36 percent and the Texas Commission on Alcoholism 24 percent, according to Jim Clipson, chairman of the oversight committee administering the block grant.

Clipson is TCA chairman. Other committee members are Gray Beck, chairman, TDMHMR, and Sid Weiser, executive director, TDCA.

"Whatever the amount of the block grant, we are concerned that Texas is not getting its fair share," Clipson noted. He said Gov. William P. Clements had written Richard Schweiker, secretary of Health and Human Services, pointing out that, though Texas is the third state in population, and is experiencing one of the greatest rates of population increase in the United States it ranks ninth in percentage of the 1982 allocation.

Clipson said he believes increased federal taxes on alcohol, which have not been raised since 1951—"a decrease in terms of inflation"—could help pay for alcoholism programs. He noted that there has been a decrease in federal funding for alcoholism programs.
