COMMISSIONERS COURT HIRES COUNTY AGENT

The Commissioners of this county met in their meeting on Monday of this week voted for the hiring of a County Agent. We feel that this is a very wise move and we are sure that no sum of money could be expended for a better purpose. A county agent of the right kind can make our farmers many a dollar, provided they take his advice and act accordingly. In practically every county we have knowledge of, the County Agent proposition has been a success, and we know of no reason why a new office should not be of endless benefit to us. Of course, we have to get the right kind of a man and we feel sure that the Extension Service of the Texas Agricultural & Mechanical College will find us a man who is qualified to fill the bill. Then the County Agent must have the full co-operation of every farmer and citizen. There are none so wise but what the most ignorant can teach us something so that this in mind when our new County Agent arrives on the job. We feel that he will have something in his head that will make more dollars for every farmer in this county. The County Agent will be furnished by the A. & M. College and he will reside here in Perryton. He will be here to begin his duties on January 1st, or soon thereafter. The benefit of those not familiar with the method of paying the salary of a County Agent, we will state is only \$1000.00 of his compensation is paid out of the general fund of the county, the remainder being applied by the State and the Federal Department of Agriculture. Following is the order passed by the Commissioners creating the office of County Agent in this County.

County of Ochiltree, Commissioners Court of Ochiltree County in session January, Term, A. D. 1924. The Commissioners Court of Ochiltree County being desirous of promoting a more profitable method of agriculture and of assisting in the development of more comfortable and convenient rural homes in the county, is of the opinion that a County Agent should be employed to assist said work, and in as much as the U. S. Department of Agriculture, through the Extension Service of the A. & M. College of Texas, will conduct Extension Work in this county, the Commissioners' Court of Ochiltree County will cooperate financially, the court is of the opinion that should make an appropriation to supplement the funds of the Extension Service of the A. and M. College of Texas in conducting such work in accordance with the general laws of the state.

It is, therefore, ordered by this court that the sum of (\$1000.00) be appropriated and the same is hereby appropriated out of the funds of Ochiltree County, to assist in promoting a better method of agriculture and the development of more comfortable and convenient rural homes in Ochiltree County.

This appropriation shall become available on February 1st, 1924, or soon thereafter as the Extension Service of the A. and M. College of Texas shall place an agent in said county for duty, and shall be paid in monthly installments to said agent upon written order duly signed by an authorized representative of said Extension Service.

This appropriation shall be continued until the Commissioners' Court or the Extension Service of the A. and M. College of Texas shall decide to discontinue same, and the order of discontinuance shall be passed during the month of November, December, which time will be near the close of the season and the year. Otherwise this order and agreement shall remain in effect from year to year. The Commissioners' Court of Ochiltree County shall give notice in writing to the other cooperating agency at least thirty days prior to any official action pertaining to the continuance of the work in the county. In the event the work is discontinued, the order shall not be effective until thirty days after the date of its passage.

SCHOOL NOTES

Mid Term examinations are being held this week. The teachers report that the student body show evidence of having applied themselves the past term. The students are co-operating in every manner and are doing fine work. The boys and girls of the High School Department say they are determined to put the Perryton School on the map.

The school has attained its highest enrollment. Attendance is well nigh perfect and in addition a number of new students have enrolled since the holidays.

The school campus has been made attractive by the addition of quite a lot of play ground equipment. Swings, teeter boards, and tennis courts have been put up.

A glee club of about thirty or forty voices has been organized and is making fine progress.

The boys basketball teams started the season off in their usual way Friday night by winning two games. The Perryton second team easily won the game with the Union School.

The game between Perryton's first team and the Beaver team was in doubt until the finish. Beaver gained the lead in the first half, however, Perryton boys rallied in the second half and annexed the game 21 to 18.

The Perryton School is adding to its Science equipment and now has a modern High School Laboratory. The boys and girls are being taught the sciences in an approved manner. They are learning by doing and they are enthusiastic about their work.

A class in solid Geometry has been added to the Mathematics course.

DR. HENRY BLACK BURNS

Dr. Henry Black Burns, who will lecture here on Tuesday January 22 at the High School Auditorium, is not a Doctor of Divinity, yet he believes as many other prominent thinkers of today, that the remedy for the world's state of upheaval is a revival of religion—an application of Christianity beginning in the home.

Dr. Burns is a speaker who does not fear to call things by their right names; he does not throw bouquets, and smooth over what he knows to be faulty, but unflinchingly tells the truth about them, despite the possibility of making himself unpopular by so doing. But he does not make himself unpopular, because he has the rare faculty of telling the people what they do not like to hear in such a way that they take it and are better for it—just like the bitter medicine the old family physician pours into the spoon and makes us swallow.

Years on the platform have developed Dr. Burns and ripened his powers as a public speaker. Of Scotch blood, and reared amid the hardships of a Pennsylvania farm where he labored as a youth, then worked at various occupations to gain his professional education as an "M. D." Dr. Burns has been molded into a fine specimen of manhood which hates sham and is characterized by its quick, human sympathy and understanding.

COWS HELP FARMER GET \$8,000 ON COTTON PATCH

Elmer Bagwell, Claude farmer uses the same land at the same time as a cotton farm and cattle ranch, he said yesterday while in Amarillo on business.

Grass got so high in his cotton, he decided it was useless to try to clean it out. He turned in his cattle herd. The animals fattened on the grass, Bagwell gathered cotton at the rate of a half bale per acre from the land. He sold the cotton from his grass ranch for \$8,000.—Amarillo News.

SOLD FIRST BALE OF COTTON IN GUYMON

A. L., better known in his home neighborhood, the Sutton Grove country, as "Cotton" Johnson, was a Perryton visitor recently and while here signed the cotton acreage pledge at the Summers-Hood Lumber Co. It will be of much interest to many of our readers to know that Mr. Johnson was one of the early raisers of cotton in this section. In 1910, Mr. Johnson marketed the first bale of cotton ever brought into Guymon, Oklahoma, for which he received a premium of \$60.00. Mr. Johnson planted 40 acres to cotton in 1910 and he sold 15 bales which was a very fair yield. There was considerable cotton raised in this section in those days but the ginning machinery at that time would not handle the cotton unless the boll was fully open. The Herald is glad to see a man like this get back into the cotton game. He knows how and he will influence other farmers in his locality to plant a small crop this spring.

REDUCED HOMESSEEKER'S RATES NOW IN EFFECT

The Santa Fe have recently put into effect a reduced rate for home-seekers which should attract many prospective land buyers to our section during the coming spring and summer months. These rates are being made from all states in the central and northern middle west. A rate for the round trip of one fare plus \$2.00 with a 21 day time limit with stopover privileges at any point is being offered. This rate which is to any point on the Santa Fe system in Texas has only one condition and that is that there must be five adult tickets in each home-seeking party.

It has been several years since the railroads offered these reduced rates to people desiring to look this country over with a view of locating. In the early days, much land was sold and many new citizens obtained through the agency of the home-seeker rate. Now the real estate men of this city and other towns in the Panhandle should get busy and send out literature which will cause the eastern and northern farmer to come to the best part of Texas. It has been many years since we had such good prospects or a bountiful crop as we now have. All indications point to a big season, so strike while the iron is hot and get them started this way. CITIZENS OF CANADIAN. DON'T BE MIS-LED

After reading the statement of the Canadian, Water, Light and Power Company in the last week's issue of the Canadian Record, we feel that we should say a few words, not for the benefit of the above concern, but for the good people of Canadian, who are our neighbors and fellow citizens of the Panhandle. As we understand the proposition, the light and power company at Canadian is owned and operated by a private concern but the water system is municipally owned, the city buying power from the private company to pump the water. If such is the case, then we feel that the statements made by the private company are mis-leading, in so far as the municipal plant of Perryton is concerned. What Canadian does in this matter is no concern of ours, but we desire to set the citizens of that fine little city right concerning the municipal plant which is proving such a success in this city.

In the statement of the Canadian concern, they refer to our plant as a \$110,000.00 plant. Well it is true, it did take a \$110,000.00 bond issue to put it over but the bond issue read as follows: \$35,000.00 for electric light plant and \$75,000.00 for water plant. And the books of the city will show that part of the \$35,000.00 voted for the light plant was really borrowed and used in the construction of water system. In reality we have power system that has not cost us quite \$35,000.00. Then on top of this comes the fact that the city council purchased the old water and light plant here, paying more than it was actually worth and knowing that such was the case when they made the transaction.

The municipal plant here is proving to be all that was claimed for it. The plant is being operated at a profit and to date no charge has been made by the light and power department on the water department for the pumping of water, neither has any charge been made against the general fund of the city for street lighting or fire hydrant rent. We understand that the city of Canadian pays a considerable sum every year to the private company for the pumping of water, and street lights. We are not writing this article because we have any concern in the Canadian fight but we do not like to be referred to as a city that has had a poor plant shoved on to us for an exorbitant price. We feel that we have got our money's worth and we know that the books of the City of Perryton will bear out any statement that we have made.

PAY YOUR POLL TAX THIS MONTH

As this is an important election year in which we vote for officers from President down to Justice of the Peace, there will no doubt be payment of a large amount of poll taxes, even though the general financial depression over the country may cause some of the property taxes to have to go delinquent the Attorney General having ruled that poll taxes may be paid without making payment of property taxes. Of course to entitle one to vote, his poll tax must be paid on or before the last day in January.

LUBBOCK COTTON CROP SELLS FOR NEARLY \$4,000,000.00

The Lubbock cotton crop will pass the 25,000 bale mark for this year according to present estimates based on reports of slightly over 21,000 bales ginned to date. Just think what this means to the farmers of the Lubbock country. It is almost certain that the growers of this cotton received an average price of 30c per pound. Taking this as an average price, the Lubbock crop will bring in the stupendous sum of \$3,750,000.00. Rather a neat sum to be turned loose. This territory would be rolling in the fat of the land if we were selling a 25,000 bale cotton crop this year.

TO THE VOTERS OF OCHILTREE COUNTY:

I have been asked the question quite often whether I would be a candidate for the office of Sheriff. I hate to make long races but at this time will say I do not see how I can do otherwise. The situation is simply this: the sheriff's office in this county has been hammered to the lowest salaried office in the county when it should be the highest for the reason, that it is the only office that has any expense. It has all the janitor work. This office does work which none of the rest will do. In most counties it is paid the highest salary in the county. This county pays \$1,000.00, which will not more than hire a helper. There are fees but they will not pay the cost expended to make them, as the legal fees will not pay for work done to earn them, besides sixty percent of people who file lawsuits never pay any costs at all. The Sheriff must handle all criminal cases filed in county and justice courts at his own expense. If a conviction is not made, then there is no pay for the sheriff. No matter how much he has spent to get the party in court. In fact the sheriffs of Texas are made to do all the criminal prosecution out of their own pockets in those two courts.

The threat by the commissioners Court to cut off \$500.00 of the \$1000. now allowed would keep any good sized school boy from running for Sheriff if it was not for the tax collectors office being tied to the Sheriff office, and just here I want to say the commission form of taxes is the only pay for the two offices, as this all depends on collection of the tax. The last two years has been so hard financially that thirteen hundred dollars of my last two years pay is now tied up on delinquent taxes, or all I should have cleaned up after the expenses of the office were paid, and a prospect of this year's pay going the same way, which forces me to pay out of my pocket a part of the office expense so there is nothing for me to do but get in the race and win the office, or loose the last three years work. It has been hard on you who could not pay your taxes, but my pay depends on your ability to do so, and it cost me the same to keep the office ready to collect as if I had done so, and as the only profit is now tied to the delinquent tax rolls, I am opposed to any attempt to force collections until you raise a crop. I do not think any man would go on the delinquent rolls if he could help it. I am justly entitled to these delinquent fees as it would have taken them to make me clear for the last three years in office. And just here I want to take a few jabs at the threat some one made about cutting salaries of the county officers. This town pays two mar-

shals twenty four hundred dollars and tax collectors extra, and they haven't a cent expense to pay, and Ochiltree County pays its peace officers One Thousand, and he has to be a knocking block for all who wish to knock, even some want to cuss the town and kick the sheriff for that also. He has to janitor the court house. The amount now paid will not hire an office helper. Oh! but they say he gets a tax commission. Yes, he does, but all the money both offices get out of Ochiltree county's pocket is less than \$2,000.00. The trouble with the party who wrote that article was he had not taken time to ascertain what each office paid and the expenses attached to them. The law is that the county furnish a car for the sheriff. This county furnishes none.

Now I wish to say I am running again to get pay for my past wages already earned. If the commissioners would do what they should they would pay enough to keep a good man at the office and as much for field man as he could earn on a farm, then maybe things could be done that some people want the sheriff to do at his own expense. Remember that the only prosecution in county and justice courts are paid out of the sheriff's purse. If he runs all over the county he does not get a cent unless a conviction is had.

With this explanation I am going to say I am again out for Sheriff and collector in self defense and ask all who can to vote for me.

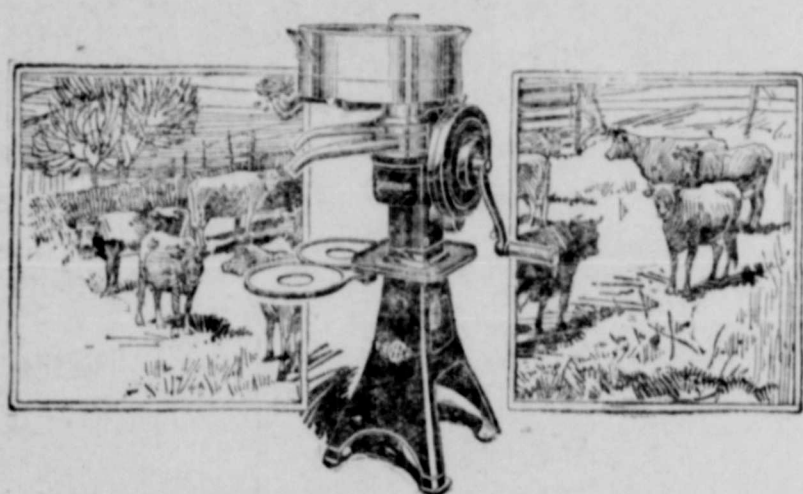

It is alleged that Kennedy escaped from the old man and got in the car, intending to avoid further trouble, but, it is alleged, that Barton pulled him out of the car once again, knocked him down, began to stamp on him, and finally got on top of the boy, beating him with his fists. It was at this time that Kennedy drew a knife and stabbed Barton in the throat, inflicting a fatal wound.

Kennedy is now in jail at Cheyenne—Higgins News.

EDITORIAL

From the fourteenth to the eighteenth of January there will be held in Chicago, the greatest exhibition of road machinery materials, and methods ever staged in the history of road making.

It is difficult to estimate the importance of such a great exposition either from the standpoint of the road builder or the road buyer. The intimate contact thus made possible between maker of machinery and maker of material can not but aid both to do better work. The bringing together of so many different ways of road making must be of incalculable value to the road buyer; the county and State engineer, the road supervisor, and the taxpayer.

But perhaps the greatest benefit from this mutual contact of the forces which are behind the good road, is in the laying before the country, the magnitude of the effort involved and showing to the world what progress has been made in the hard surface highway idea.

Twenty years ago, before the automobile was more than a toy, the road idea was dead. "We didn't need roads. The roads we had were good enough. To spend money for roads was foolish. The railroads gave all the transportation necessary. Roads were merely an expense, a luxury, not an asset!" Such arguments were common. There were no road builders, there was no road building industry. To-day there are thousands of engineers, hundreds of firms making hard building machinery and products for hard road making, and there is not a State uninterested in modern highways, not a country which isn't talking good roads, not a farmer who doesn't realize the need of them.

This great road exposition is a reflection of the times, and the sentiment which is behind roads; hard roads, the sort of roads which minimize the hauling cost and give the maximum of speed and intercommunication.

The road exposition at the Coliseum, in Chicago, is more than an exhibit; it is a monument to the modern idea of transportation.

TEXAS COTTON CROP HAS
BROUGHT REAL PROSPERITY

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5. The cotton producing sections of Texas are in good condition, not because of the large crop, but of the fine price, according to a report made to the Farm Loan Board by M. H. Gossett of Houston, president of the Federal Land Bank and the Federal intermediate credit banks of that city, who was here recently in conference with the board and president of other land banks.

The wheat-growing sections, Mr. Gossett reported, are not in the best condition because of the short crop and low prices.

Cattle Outlook Better

Growers of live stock, especially cattle are feeling comfortable over the abundant rain in the territory previously dry, but the low price and inactive market is still disappointing. On the whole, however, general agricultural conditions in Texas are better than a year ago, he reported.

The Texas Federal Land Bank has loaned more than \$90,000,000 to more than 32,000 farmers and ranchmen. Notwithstanding the three-year period of depression through which the country has passed, borrowers are meeting their payments splendidly. Less than one-third of 1 per cent was delinquent December 1, Mr. Gossett said.

Credit Bank Service

"The Federal Intermediate Credit Bank, in operation only a few months, has loaned direct to co-operative marketing associations, on security of warehouse receipts on cotton, wool and mohair, more than \$2,000,000. It has discounted for banks, cattle loan companies and agricultural credit corporations paper secured by chattel mortgages on live stock nearly \$2,000,000. Cattle paper is being offered for discount through eligible agencies at the rate of approximately \$500,000 per month. It therefore appears that there is a field for real service for the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank in the Tenth Federal Land Bank District, wherein it may supply the needed capital for live stock loans at a less rate of interest than is customary and for a longer maturity than banks of deposit care to make."

PROTECT THE CHILDREN

Every day in every newspaper there are stories of children run over and hurt by automobiles. In many cases the fault is with the motorists, but in many others the accidents are found to have been inevitable. A man driving a car along a street can do nothing to avert an accident if a child suddenly rushes off the sidewalk and tries to cross the street in front of him. That is the cause of many accidents.

Unfortunately, for many children, the streets are the only possible playgrounds, and it is difficult—but not impossible—to keep them on the sidewalk. Parents can do much to prevent accidents by insisting on their children keeping off the pavement.

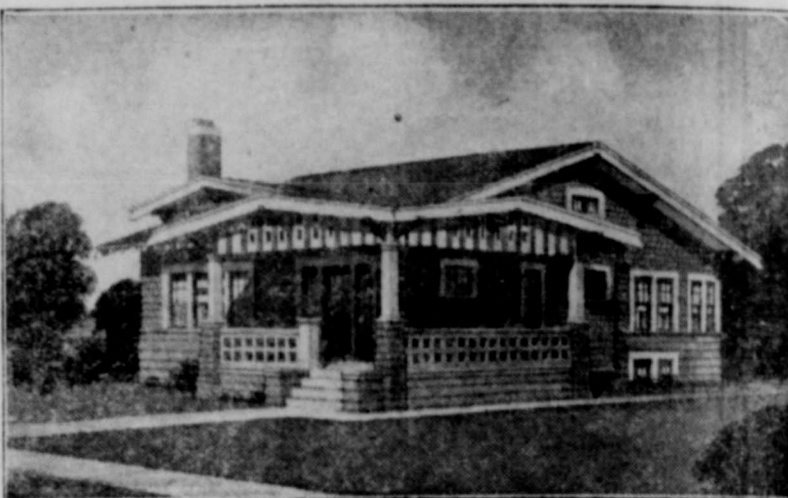
