GAMES FOR RANGER SQUAD

DAY SHATTUCK HERE FRIDAY
AND AT GRUVER TUES-
DAY IN CONFER-
ENCE GAME

The football games within eight days is the schedule for the Rangers. The next week, one of them conference game and the other intersectional contests.

The ambitious program will open Saturday afternoon on the home grid when the locals meet the Shattuck Indians. While the Indians were easy victims last season they are an undefeated record this year. Only one comparison in scores available is the results of the meeting of the two teams with Pollett. In the season the Indians defeated Pollett by a 32 to 0 count. The Rangers won a 25 to 0 game against the Panthers last Friday. It is reported that two of Pollett's players were injured in the Shattuck game and unable to play against the Rangers last week. This would indicate that Shattuck won over a stronger Pollett than did the Rangers and by larger score.

On Tuesday of next week, the Rangers go to Gruver to meet the Panthers in the second conference game for the locals. Gruver likewise met only one team that played the Rangers, the Good Freshmen squad, winning by a score of 14 to 0. This is the first year Gruver has been in the conference and they are making a strong bid for recognition.

On Friday, October 28, the Rangers will have only two days rest, will go to Canadian to meet the Wildcat in their own den. Whether or not the local team can stand up under the stiff schedule of the preceding week, will remain to be seen.

RECEIVE STATE FISH FOR STOCKING STREAMS

A truck from the Wichita Falls state fish hatchery was in Perryton, Saturday noon, leaving right cans of fish for stocking of streams in this vicinity, secured on application to the Fish, Game and Oyster commission, Austin.

Twenty-five hundred bass, bream, croppie and perch were received in the shipment and local sportsmen unloaded them and took them to Wolf creek where they were placed in the stream. No charge is made by the state for this service and anyone can receive an allotment of fish by making application. No more fall deliveries will be made but it will be possible to obtain fish for stocking streams in the spring shipments.

LOAD OF COTTON GROWN IN COUNTY IS BALED

What is thought to be the first load of cotton grown in Ochiltree county this year passed through Perryton early Wednesday morning for Canadian, where it was baled.

The cotton was grown by J. N. Ashcraft on the J. D. Ware place, ten miles east of here. The cotton, after ginning, weighed six hundred pounds and was sold at the rate of \$5.75 per hundred.

Several cotton patches can be found scattered over the county, especially in the south part, but this load is the first Ochiltree county cotton reported so far this year.

APPROVE \$8,500 FOR OCHILTREE

GOVERNOR APPROVES RELIEF FUND; EXPECT PART OF FUND AVAILABLE IN TWO WEEKS

Initial requests for relief funds from the Reconstruction Finance corporation for nineteen Panhandle counties, involving a total of \$119,946 have been approved by state headquarters at Austin and one-third of the total should be available within two weeks, according to Wilbur C. Hawk, Amarillo, president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, in charge of administration in this section.

Ochiltree county's share of this total was approved at \$8,500, according to Mayor Dave Shanks who heads the local committee.

Mr. Hawk returned to Amarillo Sunday from Austin where he presented the relief petitions to Gov. Ross S. Sterling and Robert W. Kelso, government Reconstruction Finance corporation representative. The requests were approved and were sent on to Washington, D. C., Tuesday.

According to Mr. Hawk, the period over which relief aid will be given extends from October this year until September, 1933, and after the initial payment, the fund will be administered quarterly. The fund available for Perryton and Ochiltree county will not be handed out as a dole but will be used in providing work for the needy. No loans can be made from this fund.

Rangers Win First Conference Game From Follett Panthers

RANGERS SCORE 4 TOUCHDOWNS

FOLLETT TEAM NO MATCH FOR LOCALS: GAME PLAYED ON PANTHER GRID FIELD

The Rangers delivered a 25 to 0 victory in their first conference grid contest of the season last Friday afternoon, defeating the Follett Panthers on their own field.

The Rangers, doped to win by an easy margin, proved superior in every branch of the rather one-sided game over the inexperienced Panthers. They gathered up twenty first downs while Follett was earning one and was given two on Ranger penalties. In yardage the Keiths netted a total of 216 while Follett lost more yardage than they gained.

Two Touchdowns Second Quarter.

In the opening session of the game the Rangers were within scoring distance on three different occasions. The first time they recovered a Follett fumble on the 21 yard tape, but lost it on a fumble on the 11 yard line. The second time, again on the 11 yard line a pass was used on the third down with only 2 yards to go and it fell incomplete over the goal line. The third time was when the quarter ended with the pigskin on the 3 yard line, first and ten to go.

On the first play of the second quarter Johnson plunged over for the counter. A penalty which called Hull back after a beautiful 58 yard return with a punt probably cheated the Rangers out of scoring again early in the period but near the close of the half, they pushed the oval from their own 44 yard marker over the goal with a series of line smashes and dashes around end, Johnson again adding the final push.

Make 80 Yard Drive For T. D.

In the third period, the Rangers took the ball on their own 20 yard tape and advanced down the field without losing possession, tossing forward passes, bucking the line and churning end, McClung accounting for the score. The rest of the period was devoted to a punting battle.

The final period of play accounted for the last Ranger touchdown when Follett was pushed back for 27 yards less in three plays and held for downs. The Rangers taking the oval on the 29 yard tape easily pushed it over, with Les Littleton hugging the ball for the counter. "The Real Depression"

We have been experiencing for several months now what people have termed "a depression". The fact of the matter is we have had the depression for years and this thing which we have, in our lack of understanding, called "the depression" is only a result of the real thing. We have thought the mess the world finds itself in is the depression when it is only the outward result of a thing deeper and real. Our need is deeper than a need for "more elastic currency, better banking methods, a more equitable tariff, better protection against panics, bigger armies and navies". Our great need is sanity character which is the salt of the earth. Ten men, godly men, would have saved Sodom but they were not to be found.

Some of the best thinkers of the world trace the cause of the great war back to the fact that the material progress had outrun spiritual progress. People raised the question, "Has Christianity failed?" The answer was and is, "No, Christianity had been left in the back ground". That great world statesman, Woodrow Wilson, said, "Our material civilization cannot survive unless it is redeemed spiritually".

Historians tell us that England faced a crisis similar to the French revolution but a man who had his heart strangely warmed in a service in Aldgate Street London, went out from that service to touch the life of the masses in England and thus saved his nation. John Wesley was saying, "The real depression is a sad lack of spirituality, a desperate need of genuine saintly character. Israel faced a similar situation in the time of Malachi though they were not able to get themselves in as great a mess as we, in the twentieth century, have done. In America we seem to be in a great mess. We are having a hard time keeping people from starving in a country which produced so much food until there is no sale for it. We are having a hard time in keeping the richest country in the world from going bankrupt. Malachi invited Israel to return to God and He would return to them. America needs to return to God. She needs a revival of the spiritual, a return to the old-fashioned morality, the recovery of something that was lost when we ridiculed Puritanism and threw the Ten Commandments into the street.

May we have a part in the beginning of such a revival by giving our undivided support to the revival meeting being conducted at the Methodist church beginning Sunday. Let the clubs, lodges, organizations of all kinds, and every individual lend his support to these services. Come, and if the house falls in it is covered by insurance. The greatest patriot in America is the one who stands for honesty, integrity, and morals that are the very foundation of American life. The one, who does not support by his interest and presence the institution that undergirds our national life, is an unworthy and dangerous son of the republic.

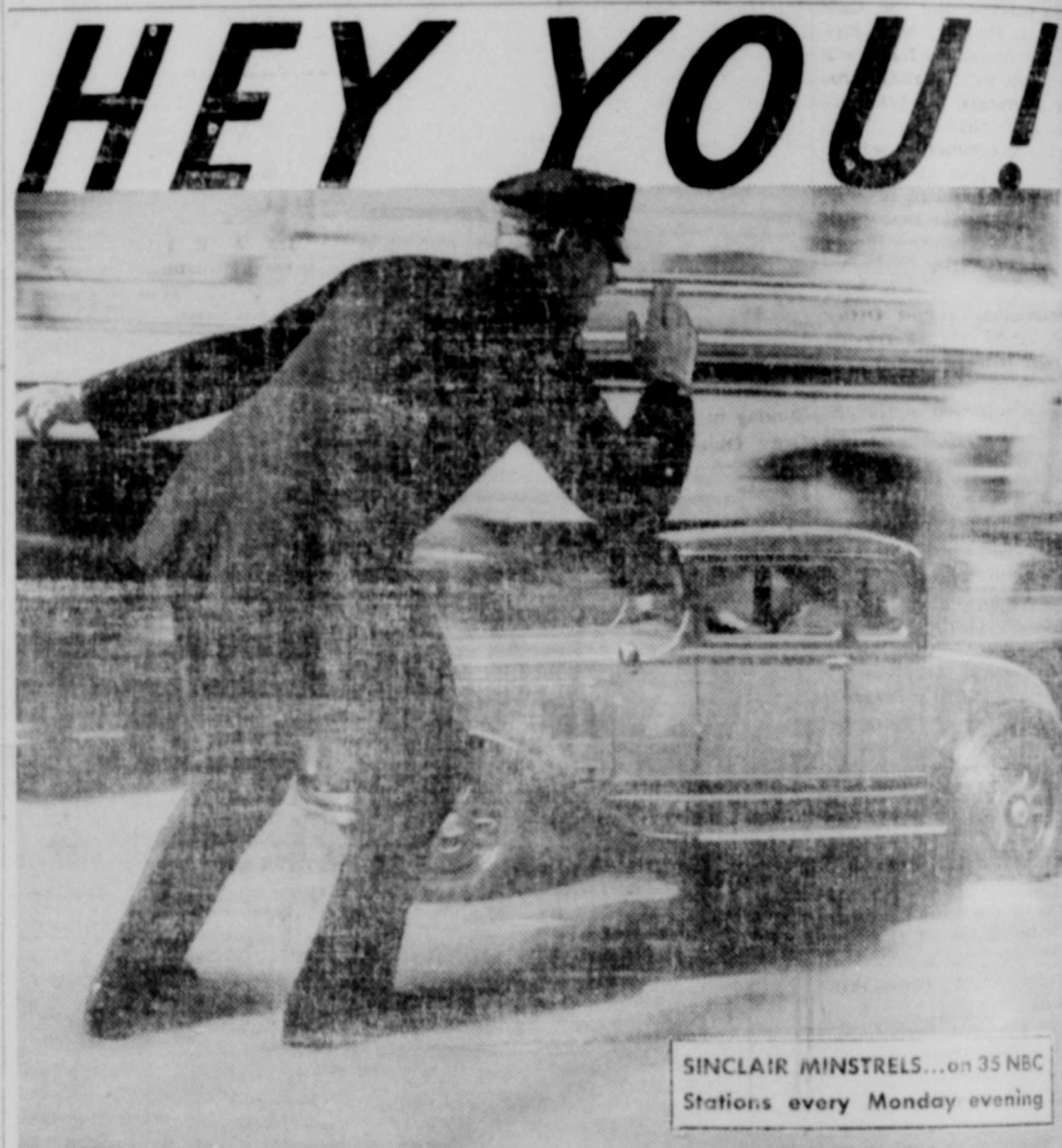
